## Niles residents respond favorably to Park Ridge park disannexation

Almost 70 per cent of the Niles homes residing in the Park Ridge Park District which have responded to a recent poll have indicated they would be willing to become a part of the Niles Park District, according to figures released during Tuesday night's

Niles Park District meeting. Commissioner Jim Pierski told board members that initial results of a poll of 650 Niles homes in the Park Ridge Park District show a strong feeling to join the Niles Park District. The 650 homes are located west

of Milwaukee Ave. between Oakton St. and Monroe St. The Niles Park District had sent out letters to these residents asking them to fill out a questionnaire. Pierski said the park district has received 137 responses. Continued on Page 35

## Kustra praises deputy sheriff reform

State Senator Bob Kustra (R-Glenview) this week hailed Cook County Sheriff Richard Elrod's announced clean-up of abuses in the Holiday Court deputy sheriff program as "a reform long overdue — but a welcome reform nonetheless."

Kustra has been critical of the Holiday Court deputy sheriffs both because they have been entitled to carry guns at all times and because many of the deputy sheriffs carrying those guns have had criminal records themselves. Last spring, Kustra introduced a resolution in the Senate calling for an investigation of how deputy badges are granted. "I have a file stuffed with newspaper accounts of deputies arrested for murder, assault, selling badges and other felonies which would make your hair stand on end," stated Kustra. "It

wasn't the badges that bothered me so much, it was the guns those deputies were authorized to carry twenty-four hours a day. I found out in a hurry that Dick Elrod had some good friends on the Democratic side of the aisle. My resolution never made it out of committee."

Elrod's announcement of reforms made at a November 4th press conference followed exposes by two Chicago TV stations. Under Elrod's new orders, part-time deputies will be allowed to carry a weapon only when on duty.

"I give Sheriff Elrod a lot of credit for finally doing something about this problem," commented Kustra. "He inherited the system when he took office, but it's been an embarrassment to all of Cook County."

## Renetzky named to State FSA board

Niles Family Service Board of Commissioners Chairman Lloyd Gillet recently announced that Larry Renetzky, Executive Director of Niles Family Service, has been elected to a position on the Board of Directors of the Illinois Association of Family Service Agencies. According to Mr. Gillet, "the Niles Family Service Board feels that this is a great honor for Larry and for Niles. In his capacity on the Board if I.A.F.S.A. Larry will help to demonstrate policies and programs that will promote family relations state-wide."

The Illinois Association of Family Service Agencies was recently involved in the successful passage of House Bill 1248 which requires certain social service agencies to file a "family impact statement" to show how that agency's actions have strengthened and promoted family stability; the bill also requires agencies to work together to reduce the stress on families which contributes to problems such as child abuse, domestic violence and divorce. The I.A.F.S.A. feels this



cooperation and coordination will encourage policy makers in Illinois to think family when planning social service programs.

Larry Renetzky has served as Executive Director of Niles Family Service since it was opened in January of 1969.

## "The Day After" symposium

When the world they've known is devastated, can those who live through a nuclear attack survive its aftermath? This is the question posed by ABC-TV's controversial film, "The Day After."

On Monday, Nov. 21 (the day following the television broadcast) at 8 p.m., Mayer Kaplan Jewish Community will host a special symposium, THE DAY AFTER "THE DAY AFTER," giving representatives from a dozen vocations an opportunity to share their responses to the survivors' situation.

In the film, physical hardships—radiation sickness and epidemics, inadequate means to care for the sick and dispose of the dead, limited food and water supplies and outbreaks of violence and lawlessness—are compounded by psychic numbness and a feeling of helplessness.

Symposium panelists will discuss how—or if—their particular fields (military, clergy, police, government, health care, etc.), are equipped to handle such an emergency and explore their personal—and professional—responses in event of disaster.

## Maine East honored for accreditation

Maine East High School recently received a special certificate signifying 75 years of accreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. Only 64 other high schools in Illinois have been accredited for 75 years.

According to Dr. John S. Kemp, Illinois State Director of the North Central Association, "75 years of North Central Association accreditation is an honor of which everyone at Maine East and in the school district can be proud. The school has made a long-term commitment to offering a quality educational program to the people of this community."

Today, more than 6,000 secondary schools, elementary schools, colleges and universities in 19 states, plus Department of Defense Dependent Schools around the world, have joined together in the NCA in a cooperative quest for educational improvement.

Accreditation by the North Central Association ensures that the school is meeting the minimal conditions for effectiveness. By setting standards for basic operations of the school and by requiring a comprehensive self-study once every seven years, the NCA stimulates the school towards continuous improvement.

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Niles' new Village Manager, Jack Hadge, began working in Niles October 3. During the past weeks he has had an opportunity to begin formulating ideas about the community and the village employees for which he is now responsible.

He has also begun to consider how he will bring about some changes in the village's day-to-day operation which the Board of Trustees is expecting of him.

During a November 4 interview with The Bugle, Hadge spoke of a number of goals he hopes to accomplish as Village Manager.

Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase said during a recent interview that Niles has become "over-stabilized" due to the few changes in the village officials and administrators.

Blase suggested it was time for an infusion of new ideas.

Hadge seems to be the person chosen to help implement some of these new ideas.

And among the highest priority Hadge will have as the top village administrator will be increasing productivity among the 200 village employees and streamlining the various village departments.

Said Hadge, "I know for a fact that the Mayor is very much interested in increased productivity from employees and the streamlining and more efficient operation of the village of Niles."

On another subject Hadge said

government...I've always felt there's room for improvement in any government I've served. With the cooperation of the department heads more improvements will be made."

Hadge said he would take great care not to institute change quickly. Additionally, he pointed out that changes in the work habits of village employees are possible only with the "cooperation and participation" of the employees.

Hadge said the employees would go along with change "if there are very clear and understandable reasons for the changes and efforts made to have people participate in the decision-making process."

Hadge notes that with cut-backs in grants from the state and federal governments, communities such as Niles "no longer live in a time of largesse."

Noting "we want to plan ahead," Hadge added, "there are certain economies which can be accomplished here...to the benefit of the taxpayer."

Among the immediate changes planned, Hadge said, the village would not be hiring more employees for the time being. While he was quick to add there will be no lay-offs, he also noted, "the idea is not to have any increase in the number of employees."

The Mariavite Old Catholic Church, founded in Poland in 1893, plans to preserve a centuries-old Christmas tradition by making available to area readers the traditional Polish Christmas Oplatki Wafers. The Church seeks to fill the void where such wafers are unobtainable and yet desired for the

preservation of this tradition. In the Christmas tradition of the Polish people, as the first star appears in the eastern skies on Christmas Eve, the family gathers at the table for the Vigil, or "Willa" supper, a feast of Lenten-like foods commemorating the nativity of Christ in Bethlehem.

Before sitting down to eat, all members of the family break the traditional Christmas wafer, Oplatek, and exchange good wishes.

Use of the wafers is no longer restricted to persons of Polish descent, but have become a part of the holiday customs of others, as well.

The wafers, baked by the Mariavite Nuns at their Motherhouse in Poland, are available in envelopes of three each by writing to the Most Rev. Robert R. Zaborowski, O.M., Prime Bishop, Mariavite Old Catholic Church, 2803 10th St., Wyandotte, Michigan 48192-4994.

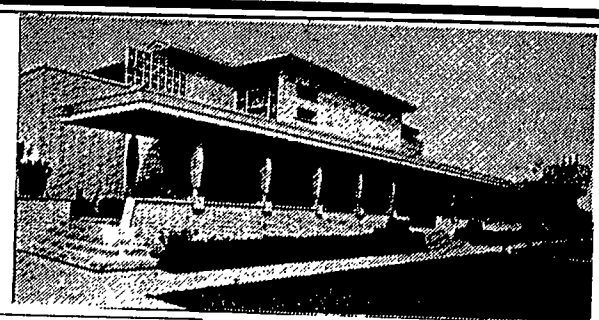

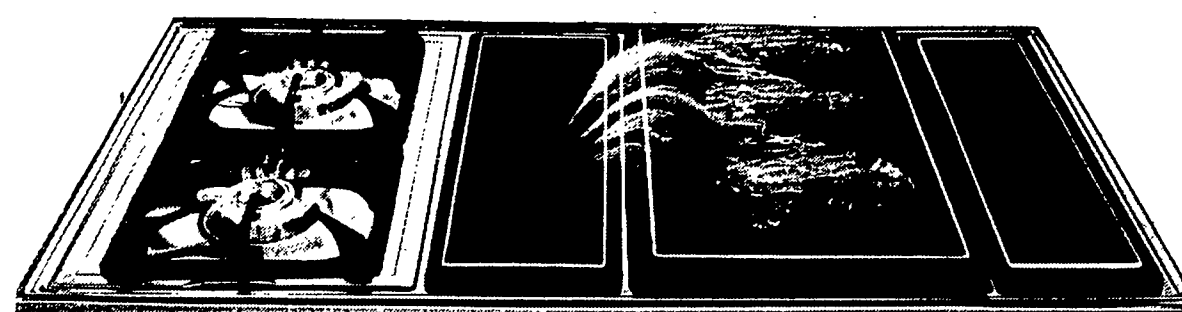

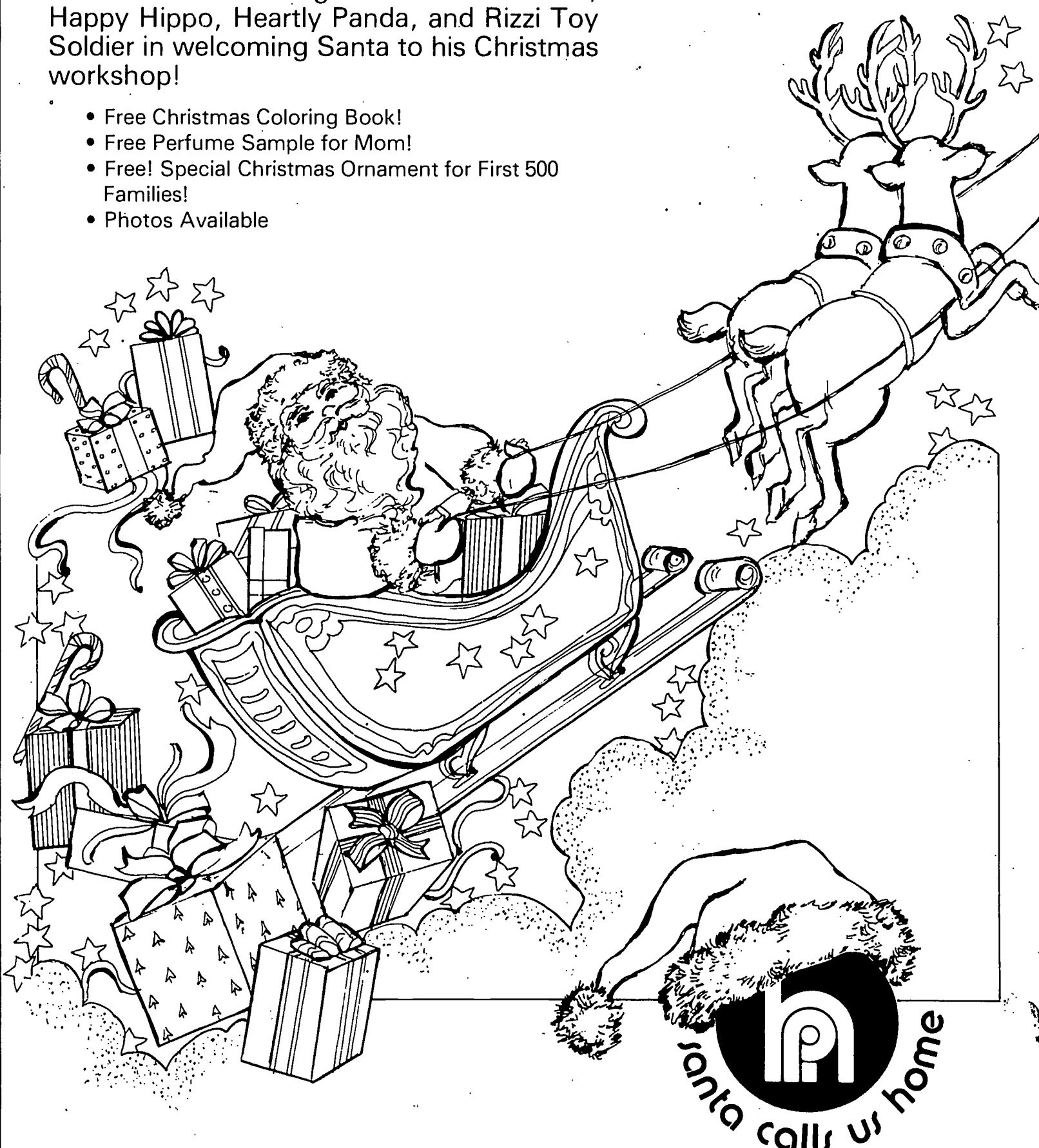

### Dealing with troubled adolescents

Raising children is a difficult task no matter how diligent parents are. It becomes especially difficult for parents of troubled adolescents. While a certain amount of rule breaking and rebellion is normal and to be expected, some young adults have an especially difficult time adjusting to this critical time in their lives. Some of the signs of maladjustment in adolescents include a drop in school performance, isolation from family and friends, a radical change in personality, belligerence, rule breaking, promiscuity, running away from home, alcohol and/or drug abuse. Problems in adolescence can also manifest themselves in vandalism, stealing, angry outbursts or crying without apparent cause.

Frequently parents feel helpless, frustrated and angry. These feelings add to parents anxiety. This anxiety and conflict can disrupt marriages and family function.

The Seven Springs Health Resource Center, an affiliate of Forest Health System is offering an ongoing group for parents of troubled adolescents. It is designed to help parents in coping with the stress of dealing with troubled adolescents.

The group will meet weekly and an initial screening with the leader is necessary for anyone or couple wishing to join. The fee for screening is \$20 and the ongoing group fee is \$20 per person. For information, or to schedule an appointment call the Health Center at 635-4224/225.

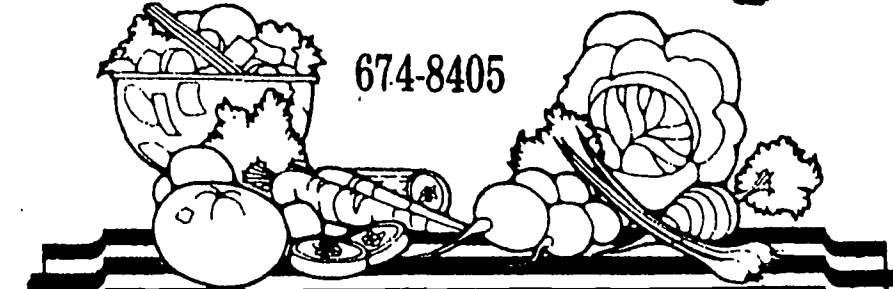

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### New Centel rates approved

The Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) granted a general rate increase to Central Telephone Company of Illinois today, representing an average increase in the telephone rates for most local residential customers of 44 cents a month.

The new rates, which are effective immediately, amount to 11 percent increase in the company's annual revenue. Centel's new rates include the following:

• Each customer will be allowed five free calls per line to directory assistance operators within his area code each billing period. Additional directory assistance calls will be billed at the rate of 20 cents per call.

The charge applies to all calls placed to "411," and to "555-1212" within the same area code. Calls placed from hospitals by patients and from hotels by guests are exempt from the charge, as are calls placed from semi-public and public pay phones. Calls placed to directory assistance by customers unable to use a telephone directory are also exempt from the charge.

However, such a handicap must be certified by a physician. • An \$8 per trip charge will apply when a customer requests that a Centel repairman visit a home or business to repair leased terminal equipment or telephone wiring inside a customer's premises.

• "Leased terminal equipment" includes any telephone, key system, PBX or auxiliary devices that are leased from Centel.

• All customers will be charged \$1 per month for non-published service, effective November 9. This charge helps to offset the cost of providing directory assistance for callers trying to locate telephone numbers not published in Centel's community telephone directory.

Customers who prefer to have a public phone number can change their service and avoid a \$1 per month non-published fee by notifying their local Centel business office.

• All local calls placed from a Centel coin telephone now cost 25 cents per call.

• A one and one-half percent charge will be applied to all bill amounts paid after the payment due date.

Monthly leasing costs for Centel-owned Key. Data and PBX equipment have been increased an average of 45 percent.

• Customers who maintain a semi-public pay telephone in a place of business will now be charged a monthly rate to keep this service. The rate is equal to the rate for a single-line business telephone.

• A new per-feature discount of 25 cents per month applies to custom calling services (call waiting, call forwarding, three-way calling, speed calling and call-within) for customers with two or more features. For example, if you already have one custom calling feature, such as call waiting, and you sign up for a second feature, such as call forwarding, you will begin receiving a monthly discount of 50 cents (25 cents for each feature). However, if you sign up for only one custom calling feature, the discount does not apply. A 50 cent per feature discount applies in the same way for business customers.

• In the Chicago suburban area served by Centel (Des Plaines, Park Ridge and adjacent communities), local calling message unit charges must have been increased to 54 cents per unit. The schedule for overtime message unit billing also has been restructured for calls placed to the inner Metropolitan area. Each minute over the initial period will be charged as one additional unit.

• Detailed printouts of message unit calls are available from Centel at a new charge. Each customer will be allowed one free printout of a month's local calling detail every six months, if the request is placed before that month's billing is processed by Centel. Requests for billing detail placed more frequently than one every six months, or requests placed for an already billed period, will be charged at the rate of \$3 for the initial page of detail, and 40 cents for each additional page. A service charge for retrieving the information also may apply.

To answer customers' questions about the new rates directly, Centel has established a special telephone number: 699-INFO. Company representatives are answering those calls between 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

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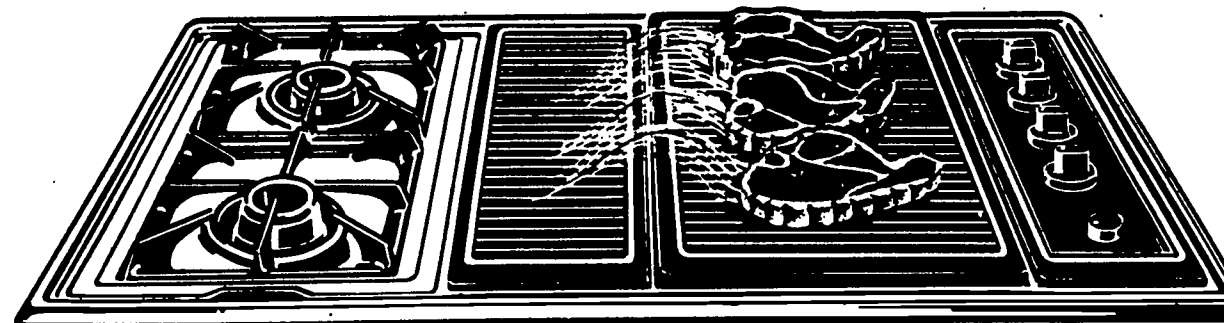
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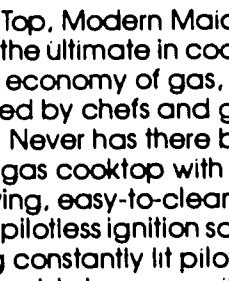
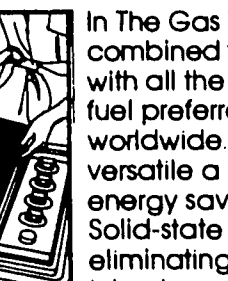
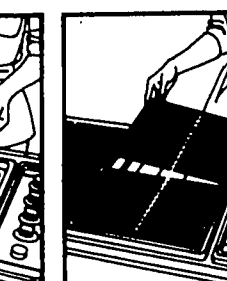
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## Service Guild presents \$120,000 to hospital

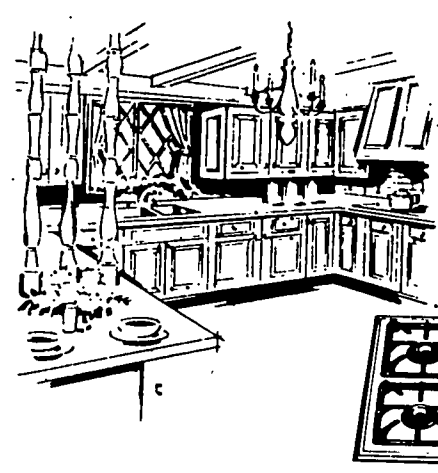

## Illinois troopers to crack down on Over 55 MPH drivers

Illinois State Troopers assigned to patrol the Illinois Tollway System are being asked to look a little harder and give fewer passes at motorists exceeding the 55 mile per hour speed limit.

Captain Hugh S. McGinley, Commander of District 15, on the tollroad stated, "The percentage of motorists complying with the 55 mile per hour speed limit is beginning to decline under 50%. One of our objectives this year is our 'Policing for Results' program is to maintain a 50% compliance rate. Speed plays a big factor in the severity of accidents. The impact inside a vehicle during a 40 mile per hour crash is equivalent to falling from a four story building. As speeds increase the number of injury accidents increase. We must maintain a firm control on the 55 mile per hour speed limit. I will assign additional officers equipped with radar, vascar and plain cars to supplement our

normal complement of patrol officers at peak traffic hours."

Slower speeds change driving habits drastically. Drivers are more relaxed when they arrive at their destination, they are more alert and conscious of the traffic around them and thus able to avoid accidents.

Captain McGinley added, "My troopers do not have a quota for speeding arrests, they can write as many as they want."

golf course in the past. Beusse said he hoped the work would be completed by next spring at the latest.

Speaking of Yates' efforts in getting the Army Corp of Engineers to do this work, Beusse said, "I can't commend him enough for his work on this."

Park Board President Elaine Heinen told the board that the Maine-Niles Association of Special Recreation which provides park and recreation programs for the area handicapped will participate in its first Special Olympics in February in Elmwood Park.

Events area residents will compete in will include swimming, track and field, bowling and gymnastics.

Heinen thanked the local Kiwanis group for offering financial assistance for this project. Heinen also released figures on the revenue taken in at concession stands run by the Park District.

In 1983 receipts totaled \$61,056 compared with \$51,978 in 1982. This is an increase in revenue of just under 20 per cent.

Lastly, Beusse told the board that the Niles company, Computax, Inc., has indicated they may be interested in ending a five-year contract they have with the Park District to park employee cars at the Tam Golf Course in the winter.

Park officials said Computax is looking for a parking area closer to its business.

While no vote was taken on the matter it was the nearly unanimous consensus of the board that Computax, Inc. is responsible for its lease and will be held responsible for rent payment on the leased property.

The board accepted the committee's proposal with Decker's amendment by a 6 to 0 vote.

In other business, the board accepted a \$63,831 bid from the village's current street-light contractor, H and H Electric, for additional street-light installation on Callie and Fernald Avenues, between Dempster and Lincoln. The project is being funded by a 1982 Federal Community Development Block Grant.

Lastly, the board approved a \$6,000 purchase of playground equipment for the mini-park under construction at the southeast corner of Georgiana and Capulina.

Trustee Joan Decker moved to adopt the proposal and begin Step One immediately, further recommending the village begin to secure the necessary agreements with the state and county to carry out the additional steps more quickly, should Step One not be effective.
