Morton Grove restaurant settles wage-law dispute

Parfais, Inc., 6415 Dempster, Morton Grove, has agreed to pay \$10,000 in back wages to 114 employees in order to resolve alleged violations of the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), which is the federal wage and hour law.

Parfais, Inc., agreed to the judgment issued in U.S. District Court in Chicago without admitting any violations of the Act. The back wages were alleged to be owed to former and current employees of the Morton Grove restaurant operator as a result of

violations of the minimum wage, overtime pay, and recordkeeping provisions of the FLSA. Enforced by the Wage and Hour Division of the Employment Standards Administration (ESA), the FLSA sets a federal

Discrepancy in required parking spaces delays donut shop

OK Mini-Mart, delay donut shop zoning

Upgrading run-down gas stations at busy intersections, which board member Syd Mitchell described as "eyesores", dominated Monday night's Niles zoning board meeting.

A shuttered Union Oil station on the southeast corner of Dempster and Greenwood was given approval for B-1 special use zoning for a mini-mart gas station.

A probable lease of another closed station on the southwest corner of Dempster and Shermer requested B-2 special use for zoning for a Dunkin' Donut coffee shop. The board continued the

hearing for this zoning until the March 5 meeting.

In granting the mini-mart zoning the board insisted a retaining wall on the south end of the property be built 6 inches above the driveway and parking area to allow running water and erosion to drain properly. A second condition is an acceptable landscaping plan to be presented to the village board, which will give final approval for the zoning.

Other conditions include brick walls be placed over the existing block walls. The parking lot must be re-drawn to allow for 9½ foot

Post Office adds Collection Boxes for Express Mail

If you have to send something across the country that must be there tomorrow, your destination may be within walking distance. Most likely, there is an Express Mail Collection Box nearby. Express Mail Service offers same day or overnight service for high priority shipments within the United States and also high-speed delivery to 19 foreign countries.

Postmaster Frank C. Goldie said the post office has been expanding its deployment of Express Mail collection boxes throughout the city, and has added more than 80 boxes during the past year, bringing the city's total to over 160 collection boxes. Postmaster Goldie said conveniently located boxes allow depositors to avoid making a trip

to the post office when sending Express Mail. For example, our newest collection boxes are located at the corner of Central ave. and Howard, 325 Golf Mill Shopping Plaza and the corner of Dempster and Shermer ave.

He said that customers wishing to know the location of boxes should call 886-6354. The Postmaster advised customers who use the collection boxes to call the post office at the same number to ensure that Express Mail service is available to the city of destination.

Postmaster Goldie said proper postage and labeling also must be affixed. Customer receipt labels will be returned to them by the post office.

Maine Township reports \$50,000 tax abatement

Last day for voter registration

Maine Township Clerk Stephen J. Stults reminds new residents and those newly eligible to vote that February 21 is the last day to register before the March 20 primary election.

The Clerk's office is now located at 1700 Ballard rd. in Park Ridge, and is open for voter registration Monday thru Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and on Saturday mornings from 9 a.m. until 12 noon.

The Saturday morning hours are a convenience for many Maine Township residents who work and cannot get in to register on weekdays, since most municipal buildings and City Clerk offices are not open on Saturdays.

For further information about eligibility to vote, absentee ballot applications, or polling place locations for the primary election, call Maine Township Clerk's office, 297-2510.

Maine Township Supervisor Paul K. Halverson reports that the Town Board voted in December to reduce (abate) the 1984 Town Fund tax levy by \$50,000.

"This decision was discussed earlier in the year and we followed through in reviewing it," says Halverson.

"We believe that the Revenue Sharing program, which was extended for three years, directly affected our decision to lower the property tax from \$800,000 to \$750,000," the Supervisor states. "In fact, less money was spent from the Town Fund last year than in the previous year by \$30,000. Any time a government can spend approximately the same or less money than the previous year, it is an accomplishment that is newsworthy!"

"I am extremely proud that we can tell our community that more efficient and expanded services to youth, senior citizens and handicapped residents were provided with less money, which is certainly good news to the taxpayers. Making local government responsive and working for everyone is a challenge that can be met if elected officials keep in touch," Halverson adds.

"Township government, the form that the Pilgrims used and which Thomas Jefferson felt was the essence of the American system, has proven itself to provide the most economical and efficient services," he continues.

"The Town Board has acted as a 'watchdog' on behalf of the taxpayers. Constant questioning and probing of administration develops better ways to accomplish community programs.

"Advisory citizen groups with mental health and senior citizens, along with administrative improvements in the youth programs will result in issues being discussed, and will continue to help protect the taxpayer from being overburdened in a complex system that includes federal, state and local governments," Supervisor Halverson concludes.

DIETARY SUPPLEMENTS: MORE IS NOT ALWAYS BETTER
Many people are attracted by ads for vitamins and minerals which imply that they will improve appearance, give sex life a boost, prevent or cure diseases, and even lengthen life. But there is, as yet, little scientific evidence to back most of these claims.

Doctors occasionally prescribe dietary supplements to correct deficiencies diagnosed in their patients. For example, people who have osteoporosis - a condition causing thin, brittle bones - may be advised by their physicians to take calcium supplements, usually in combination with vitamin D. But too often, people take high-dose supplements of various vitamins and minerals without a doctor's advice in the hope of preventing or curing a disease or condition. This can be a waste of money or, worse, a threat to health. A doctor or registered dietitian can evaluate a person's health status and dietary intake and then be able to determine if supplements are necessary.

THE ICE CREAM STORY

(excerpted from the "Hein Newsletter", December 1981)
In the old days, it was made of whole eggs, milk and sugar and laboriously cranked in the old home freezer. Today, in this mass-producing, synthetic age, it is another matter entirely. Ice cream manufacturers are not required by law to list the additives used and this is how many of them analyze: Diethyl glucol, a cheap chemical, is used as an emulsifier instead of eggs...the same chemical used in antifreeze and paint removers.

Piperonal is used in place of vanilla (it is the same chemical used to kill lice).
Aldehyde C-17 is used to flavor cherry ice cream. It is a flammable liquid which is also used in aniline dyes, plastic and rubber.

Ethyl acetate is used to give ice cream a pineapple flavor and is used as a leaner of leather and textiles. Its vapors have been known to cause chronic lung, liver and heart damage.

Butyraldehyde is used in nut flavored ice cream...an ingredient of rubber cement.

Amyl acetate is used for its banana flavor and as a paint solvent.

Benzyl acetate is used for its strawberry flavor...it's a nitrate solvent.

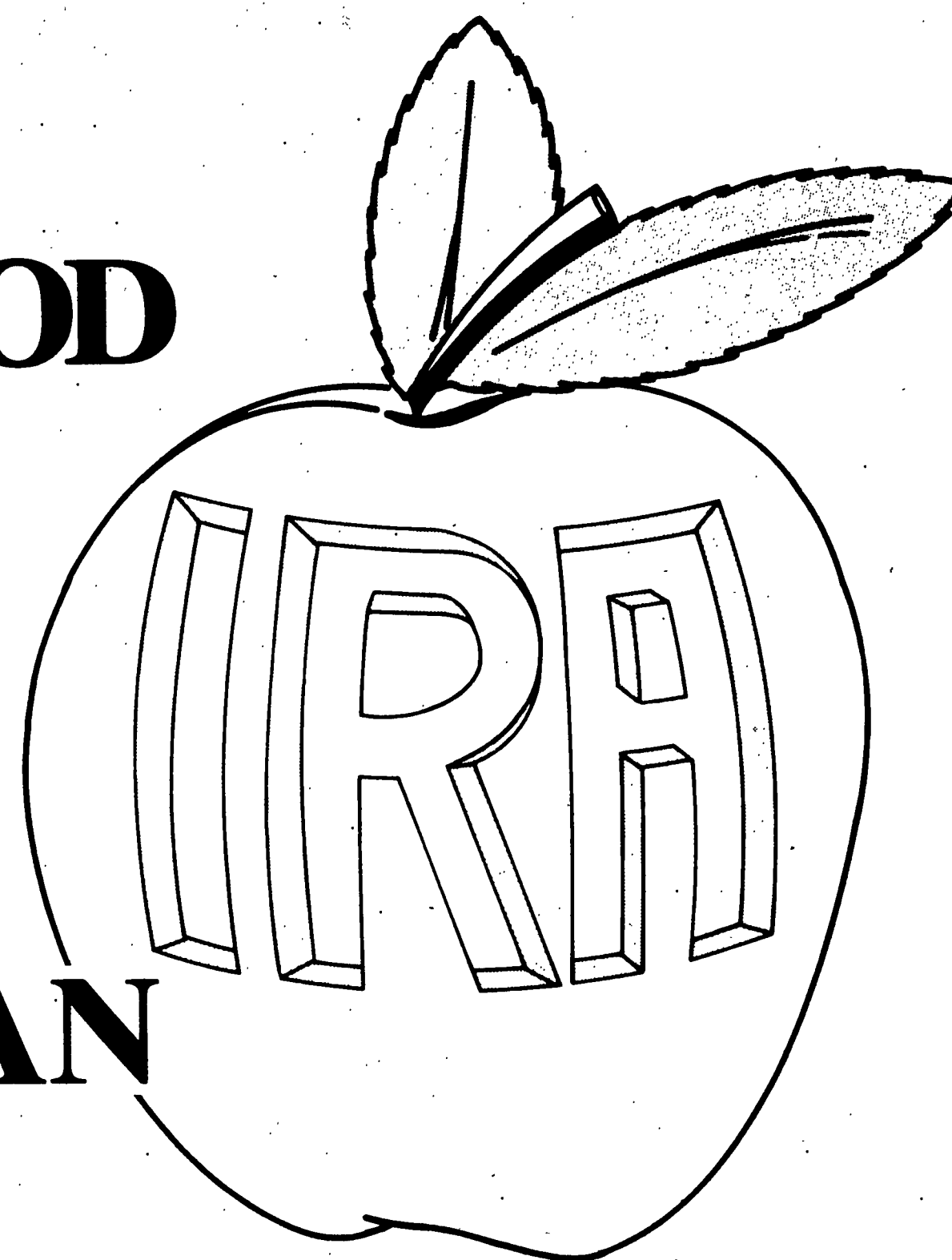

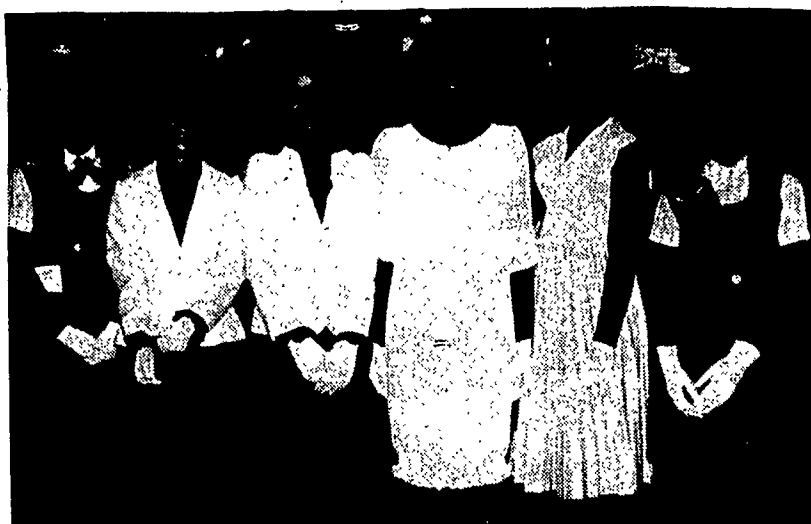

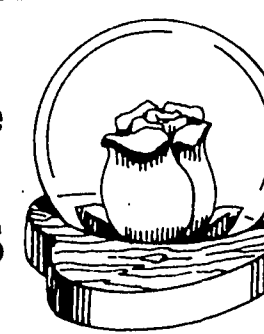

IRS car deduction increases

J. R. Starkey, Internal Revenue Service District Director for Northern Illinois, today reminded taxpayers that the standard mileage rate for cars used in business in 1983 will be 20.5 cents a mile—up from 20 cents a mile in 1982.

The 20.5-cent rate is for the first 15,000 miles of business use of a car that is not fully depreciated. Above 15,000 miles, and for all mileage of fully depreciated cars, the rate will remain at 11 cents, the same as in 1982. For the use of a car in charitable, medical and moving expense deductions the rate will stay at 9 cents a mile, as in 1982.

Starkey pointed out that taxpayers can deduct either the business standard mileage rate or actual expenses for the business use of the car. In addition to the standard mileage rate taxpayers can deduct the business related portion of parking, tolls and interest on the car loan.

No sprinklers in Niles Village Hall or Trident!

Dear Sir:

As a 33 year resident of Niles, I note with interest the court order requiring Lawrencewood to install sprinkler systems in vacant buildings.

Possibly now the Village can sue themselves to get sprinkler systems installed in two buildings they own; the Village Hall and the Senior Citizens Building.

Both buildings are of wood roof construction. I assume both buildings have the latest electronic warning systems if a fire occurs, sending an alarm direct to the fire department.

I also assume both buildings are in accord with building code requirements.

I would also assume the following buildings, to name a few, were in accord with code requirements:

(1) Holy Angels School-Chicago

(2) McCormick Place

(3) M.G.M. Hotel-Las Vegas

After tragedy occurred:

(1) Chicago installed sprinkler systems in all existing schools with wood floors and wood roofs.

(2) McCormick Place rebuilt with complete sprinkler system.

(3) M.G.M.-Closed until all damage was repaired and a complete sprinkler system installed.

I am positive no one in Chicago or Las Vegas expected the final toll of these fires. Most fires start as just a small blaze, but can quickly spread to a point where the best fire department in the world cannot extinguish it, but can only contain it and keep it from spreading.

A sprinkler system cannot extinguish a large fire, but it can and does extinguish small fires. The principle of a sprinkler system is to extinguish the small fire before it becomes a large fire.

Niles has two Public Works Buildings, both with sprinkler systems. Are snow plows more valuable than human beings?

Of course a tragedy such as the examples noted could not happen in Niles.

by 20 foot parking spaces. Another condition is only pre-packaged foods can be dispensed from the mart. Concrete bumper guards fronting the parking lot must be backed by a one foot retaining wall protecting the adjacent residential area. Lighting must be directed away from the residents on the south end of the mart.

The station was constructed before Niles' present building codes took effect. The exterior walls are the cinder block construction. Brick walls are now required and the Union Oil representatives agreed to the new walls. Mr. Ridgeway, an engineer, inquired if vinyl walls would be acceptable but was told the brick was required.

The 700 square foot self-service-mini-mart must have 17 parking spaces. It has been laid

out for 21 spaces for employees and customers. The mart will dispense milk, pop, cigarettes, snacks, pre-packaged foods, and coffee. The gas station will offer related products.

In a second action Dunkin' Donuts request for a sit-down restaurant, drive-in and bakery at Sherman and Dempster will be heard again at the March 5 meeting. One stumbling block Monday concerned the parking spaces. Based on the present code Niles requires 39 parking spaces with a 10% variance. The franchisor only wants 23 places.

The 43 foot square building is on the center of the property sought for re-zoning. The plans call for a drive-in on the Sherman ave. side with an exit onto Sherman.

Board member Syd Mitchell, a resident of the Chesterfield area south of the station insisted no left turn be allowed onto Dempster st. Donut representative Barbara Marino agreed the request was reasonable.

Mitchell also cited flooded streets in the summertime which

is an additional problem.

Board member Ginger Troiani said the code requires 40.5 parking places for such a restaurant. The donut people would like 22 or 23.

Donut officials noted 65% to 70% of their business is bakery and drive-in and take-out and only a small percentage will be sit-down business. They said the amount of time a car would be parked there would be far less because of this.

The property to be re-zoned would be just part of the Dempster frontage area. If the property should be re-subdivided a present landlocked area to the rear of the station, with only about a 25 foot frontage, would be opened up to allow much greater Dempster street frontage, increasing the value of the land many-fold.

While the donut people were told to seek more land to enable more parking for the donut shop the aforementioned re-subdivision likely precludes such action.

A decision is likely to be reached March 5.

In a third action petitioner Ann Curley, 6621 Newcastle, received a variation from seven feet to three feet for a side yard which will enable her to build a one-and-a-half car cedar-sided garage alongside her home. The total side yards are now 12 feet.

Troiani voted against the variation.

minimum wage of \$3.35 an hour for most workers and generally requires overtime pay for hours worked over 40 in any workweek. The Act also protects against child labor abuse and requires employers to keep adequate time and payroll records. ESA is an agency of the U.S. Department of Labor.

The court order, signed by Judge Bernard M. Decker, also prohibits the firm from further minimum wage, overtime or recordkeeping violations.

The legal action resolves a complaint filed by the Labor Department in August 1982. The complaint was filed following an investigation by the Labor Department's Chicago Wage-Hour Area Office, 4th Floor, 230 S. Dearborn st., Chicago, under the supervision of Daniel New, area director.

The village manager is a well-qualified guy who deserves his place in the sun. One of the chief complaints we've gotten through the years is public officials in many districts stick their noses where they don't belong. Morton Grove's village board and Niles park board have both been accused many times in the past of having their officials interfere with the day-to-day operations of the administrative duties which belong in the hands of the employees hired to administer.

Hadge has been accused of not being "friendly", of not being "warm". One of those lady troops mentioned he comes from the east. She said here in the middle-west we're much "warmer" and much "friendlier".

Blase said Hadge has 200 employees under him. He said there are only about 15 women in the administration offices, implying they are the ones who are most critical. He noted he wasn't receiving any negative feedback from the other 185 employees.

Obviously, following Scheel in to this post is difficult. Ken was a part of the community for 25 years. There's no way Hadge can duplicate Scheel's mark in such a short time.

We hope Hadge warms up a bit. And we hope the ladies down at the hall give him a fair chance.

At Monday's zoning board meeting the Dempster-Shermer intersection was a major concern of the officials who are reviewing a zoning matter at that corner.

There's a major concern here because of the number of accidents and the severity of the accidents. The number of ambulances that cart away accident victims here is extremely high.

Being a neighbor in this area we think we may have one answer concerning the accident problem. Traffic west-bound on Dempster street approaching Sherman often misses the light. Because there is another light one block west at Harlem Avenue drivers often have their eyes on the stoplight a block away. Their inattention to the Sherman light causes much havoc at the intersection. State and local officials should make some effort to co-ordinate these lights so they remain the same and change color simultaneously. It would cut-back on cars "running the light" and hopefully cut-back on accidents.

Tough laws to combat drunk drivers

Repeat drunk drivers and persons caught driving after their licenses have been suspended or revoked for driving under the influence (DUI) or other serious traffic convictions can now be jailed or forced to work in a community service capacity.

New laws effective Jan. 1 provide these increased penalties:

1. Senate Bill 125 mandates imprisonment for a minimum of 48 consecutive hours or 10 days of public service work for a second or subsequent DUI conviction committed within five years of a previous violation.

2. Senate Bill 174 mandates imprisonment for a minimum of seven consecutive days or 30 days of public service work for driving on a suspended or revoked license for DUI, reckless homicide or leaving the scene of a personal injury or fatal accident.

Too many persons ignore the law and continue to drive after losing their licenses as a result of a serious traffic conviction because the old law had no deterrent. This legislation gives the law teeth by requiring that these unlicensed drivers be jailed or forced to work in a community service capacity.

Another new law (Senate Bill 173) clarifies the law on the illegal transportation of alcoholic beverages by establishing specific offenses covering the driver and passengers in a vehicle carrying open alcohol. Passengers in motor homes and charter buses are exempt.

Drinking and driving is a significant cause of death among our youth. Alcohol is responsible for 8,000 deaths a year of people ages 16 to 24 and the disfiguring of 40,000 more. In addition, 44% of all night time fatal alcohol-related crashes are caused by young people in the 16 to 24 year-old age group.

In an effort to alert and inform students in Maine Township of this problem, Maine Township is funding a program about SADD in cooperation with Maine Township High School 207 and local Junior Women's clubs. The February 15 parents' program is just the first step. Student programs will be given during normal school hours on Feb. 16 and 17.

According to its founder, Robert Anastas, SADD works because it is student motivated. Since it was founded in 1981, the program has spread to all 50 states and Canada. This success suggests that high school students in Maine Township can take the leadership role in the prevention of their own alcohol-related deaths and injuries from drinking and driving if they are given the necessary information, inspiration, and leadership.

At school, the SADD program will provide a series of lesson plans to present the facts about drinking and driving, permitting high school students to make informed decisions. It will also mobilize students to help one another, through peer pressure, to recognize the potential dangers of mixing driving with alcohol or drugs.

At home, the SADD program will promote a frank dialogue between teenagers and their parents through the SADD contract. Under this agreement, both students and their parents pledge to contact each other should they ever find themselves in a potential DWI (Driving While Intoxicated) situation.

SADD is the first program of its kind to involve the school, the community and the home in public awareness and community spirit to combat the drinking driving issue. Anastas launched the program after seeing two students killed in a drunk driving accident.
