The Niles park district initiated sending 660 letters to residents inquiring of their interest in such an action. Twenty-one percent or 139 residents replied. Fourteen percent of the original 660 looked favorably on disannexation to Niles while five percent looked with disfavor of such plans.

Niles park director, Bill Hughes explained the board could not initiate any such annexation action. It would have to be activated by the residents who live there.

Park board president Elaine Heinen told the audience what a "fantastic park district" Niles has had the past 10 years." She said, "the district has climbed to the top," using a bit of hyperbole to tout a district she's very proud of. Continued on Page 42

Simon says legislation would slash gas bills

U.S. Rep. Paul Simon (D-Ill.) recently announced that gas bills in Chicago and surrounding communities could be slashed by twelve percent if legislation he introduced in the last legislative session was passed.

The legislation, which combines two previous bills, would roll back natural gas prices to September, 1982 levels and require pipeline companies to transport cheaper domestic gas to Peoples Gas and Other Illinois Utilities. Price of current natural gas supplies would be rolled back and kept under controls for two more years, after which time they would be allowed to rise no more than the rate of inflation. Gas drilled after enactment would be completely decontrolled, as incentive to production. If no congressional action is undertaken, price controls are set to expire January 1, 1985.

Simon is the chief Democratic sponsor of HR 2565, which would make pipeline companies common carriers, like railroads, and require them to transport gas contracted for delivery directly from purchasers.


Simon noted mos Congressmen have been meeting over the recess with angry constituents about skyrocketing winter utility bills. "I want Congress to consider this bill after a cold cold January," Simon said.

Kustra bill to aid village water and sewer systems

State Senator Bob Kustra (R-28th) has introduced legislation to help local governments finance improvements to their water and sewer systems and other public works projects designed to alleviate flooding and to properly maintain and build waste water treatment plants, solid waste disposal facilities, bridges. and other essential public wor The legislation authorizes the Illinois Development Finance Authority to pool and package local government bond

issues and sell those issues on the national bond market. The new program will be called the Municipal Infrastructure Assistance Program and it will also provide for the Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs and the Illinois **Development Finance Authority** to provide technical assistance to local governments in the areas of debt management bond issuance and proper maintenance proce-

Kustra's bill was recommended strongly by Governor Thomp-son in his State of the State message as a way for smaller cities to use the power of state government to issue bonds and notes to make funds available at reduced rates and on more favorable terms for borrowing by local governments. Citing the advantages of using the state's bonding power, Kustra pointed out, "Flooding is a particularly serious problem in my district and some communities might be able to rebuild some of their sewer systems if they could get more favorable interest rates: inis piece of legislation will do just



New car finishes conceal warning signs for waxing

Auto makers seeking to extend the shiny appearance of cars rolling off Detroit production lines are beginning to use alternative paint systems that impart a longer lasting highgloss look.

One of the newest processes being offered to new car buyers is a twocoat finish that is cosmetically superior to the traditional one-coat paints. Referred to as the "color coat/clear coat" system, it consists of a base coat of pigmented paint over which clear coat is applied to provide a deeper, more lustrous finish.

The result is an eyecatching sheen which greatly enhances the car's overall appearance. However, the new system presents some potential pitfalls for car owners who are in the habit of protecting their vehicles with a coat of wax only when they see the finish begin to lose its gleaming appearance.


With the color coat/clear coat system, the usual indicators for deciding when to wax no longer apply. The finish does not dull slowly over time. Instead, it remains bright and shiny for an extended period even though inclement weather, road film and other hazards may attack the finish. The new system is also susceptible to deterioriation from sunlight which can cause the outer clear coat layer to discolor and break down before its

To capitalize on the beauty of the clear coat effect and give these finishes the protection they need,

mend the same kind of regular waxing schedule used on more conventional finishes. Waxing provides cars with a protective overcoat that shields the clear coat surface from harsh environmental conditions including exposure to ultraviolet radiation from the

Early maintenance extends car's life

If you've put off buying a new car for the past several years. you've chosen the same road as a lot of other Americans.

Today. automobiles in the United States have an average age of seven years or more. Not since World War II. when automobile production was sharply curtailed because of material shortages have Americans kept their cars for so long.

This change in buying habits has resulted in higher per auto costs for maintenance and repair. In 1982. Americans spent a total of \$86.4 billion or an average of 8.7 cents a mile. not including gasoline, to keep their cars in working condition. In 1981. the average was 7.3 cents per mile.

Advice to Consumers If you plan to keep your car for several years. experts at ACF's Carter Automotive Division urge you to start taking care of it early. Have it serviced regularly and pay attention to your owner's manual for guidelines on oil changes. tune-ups and seasonal check-ups.

Proper maintenance will extend your car's useful life. Even so. a car eventually will require major repairs. Such repairs should be done promptly. since a delay can hasten the car's deterioration and make it dangerous to operate. Plan ahead. Locate a



Consult auto manual when changing oil

When it is time to change your engine oil (consult your owner's manual or maintenance schedule for oil change intervals and engine oil capacity). position your vehicle on a flat surface. Run the engine for a few minutes to warm the oil and

help it drain freely. Place a flat drain pan under the motor oil drain plug and washer. Let the oil completely drain from the crankcase and clean and replace plug and washer. Remove the oil dipstick.

Wipe it clean and reinsert it to its full length. Then check the dipstick to make certain the engine oil has been drained. Caution: Be careful


when replacing the plug. It should turn easily; if it does not, back it out and try again, then tighten fully. Place the drain pan under the oil filter. Use an oil filter wrench and turn the filter counterclockwise: remove and throw away.

After the oil stops dripping from the engine. take a rag and wipe the area where you removed the filter. Also apply a thin coat of clean oil to the gasket on the new filter to lubricate it. Spin the new filter onto the engine. turn an additional one half turn unless otherwise directed by the filter manufacturer. Remove the oil filler cap and pour the required amount



Check your owner's manual for the type and amount. Run the engine at idle for a few minutes. Check to be sure the oil pressure light goes out or the gauge indicates pressure. Shut the engine off and check the dipstick eading to be certain the oil evel reads full. Check the oil filter for leaks. Properly dispose of oil according to local ordinances. †
