New state law on motorcycle drivers

By Secretary of State Jim Edgar With the arrival of spring and a new state law allowing 16 and 17year-olds to ride any size motorcycle, all drivers of cars, trucks and buses should be on the alert for increased motorcycle traffic. Since Jan. 1; 16 and 17-year-old riders can be licensed to operate any size motorcycle if they have completed a driver education course, motorcycle training course approved by the Illinois Department of Transportation, and Secretary of State motorcycle driver examination.

Motorcycles, no matter how big or small, have the same right-of way privileges as other vehicles. When you are near a motorcycle. avoid an accident by observing these safety rules:

1. Never crowd a motorcycle. Getting too close can make the rider nervous and cause him or her to lose balance and fall in front of you. A motorcycle can stop faster than a car, so allow more following distance.

2. Motorcycles are entitled to use the full width of a traffic lane, regardless of size. Do not try to stop next to a motorcycle in the same lane. Either change lanes or stay behind. Do not try to pass a motorcycle in the lane it is

3. If you are following a motorcycle, allow even more distance when approaching a railroad track. If the crossing is rough or the tracks cross the road at an angle, the rider not only has to slow down but needs room to maneuver.



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



A space maintainer is a denta appliance that acts to hold open the space previously occupied usually made of plastic or wire: and they may be either removable or cemented into place. The space maintainer only has to be worn until the permanent tooth starts to come into the mouth.

Without the use of a space maintainer, teeth already in the mouth may shift position, causing problems in the align-ment of teeth. In addition, the proper eruption of permanent teeth may be hampered. Repair sale furniture

Sometimes that bargain you got at a garage sale doesn't look quite so good when you get it home. You have a place to use it, but. repairing it really isn't worth a lot of your time. Say there is a crack or a hole that goes right through the top of a table and you don't want to reconstruct the top. Cover the bottom of the crack or hole with masking tape. Then fill the gap with Elmer's Wood Filler, leaving just enough extra filler to allow for sanding flush when dry. Wait 24 hours, remove the masking tape and sand the top.

Clean your gutters

First order of spring is to clean the gutters of leaves and branches which have collected over the winter. Check the joints of the gutter with the house and fill gaps with a water-resistant, paintable caulk such as Elmer's Butyle Caulk. Hint: look at spot to be repaired and cut an opening in the nozzle of the caulk cartridge to the size of the gap. To keep unused caulk from drying, screw on a soderless connection : (the little plastic cap used by electricians to join wires).



Ryan, along with other mem bers of the American Society of Landscape Architects, will be on hand to counsel homeowners on energy-efficient landscaping techniques at the 6th Annual Energy & Home Improvement Fair. The Fair, scheduled April 4 to 8 at the Arlington Park Race Track Exposition Hall, will feature a special Lawn, Garden and Patio Section, emphasizing energy-saving outdoor home improvement ideas.

"The Best time to call in a landscaper is when you decide to build, not after the house is up," says Ryan, but owners of existing homes needn't despair. For them, he offers these conservation ideas:

Plant deciduous trees (those that lose leaves in winter) to shade a southern exposure. This will cool the home in summer and allow the desirable winter sun to shine through.

Patios are best placed on the home's south side with a window overlooking them, and strategically placed trees for summer shade. In winter the patio will reflect the sun into the house.

Vines are great energy savers -- but only for brick homes (they will rot the wood in frame houses).

A storm window provides a second barrier, raising the resistance to conduction and reducing infiltration. The two panes of glass also trap a layer of air between them which acts as a good insu-

Experts provide remodeling tips for today's families

When it comes time to remodel, keep in mind that the kitchens in most of today's homes were designed for the traditional family consisting of a stay-athome mom, working dad and at least two children.

But the fact is such traditional families now are in the minority. What is more common is the family where both parents work and there are fewer children in the home.

This is a good thought to keep in mind when planning to remodel the kitchen. Maytag, which recently entered-the cooking appliance field, has published a booklet on how to get more efficiency out of existing kitchens and how to plan new kitchens that work better.

Called "Kitchens for Today's Living," the booklet focuses on ways to save both human and mechanical energy. For example, it suggests that an automatic dishwasher is one of the most labor and time-saving appliances available. But if the dishwasher is located in the wrong place, or if it is an older model that doesn't do the job, then the appliance becomes an inconvenience rather than a convenience.

A common mistake in dishwasher installation is locating the unit adjacent to an angled corner sink, making it impossible to stand in front of the sink and load the dishwasher.


It is important to follow manufacturers' recommendations with respect to the operation of the appliance. Dishwashers need to be loaded to take full advantage of their capacity. For example, one model can take full-size plates in both the upper and lower racks. If a dishwasher is not loaded properly, it can result in poor washing action, requiring a re-wash of the entire load, and time and energy wasted.

An automatic dishwasher uses an average of 11-16 gallons of hot water for each complete cycle. Stud-

restricted by depreciation rates established by state regulations." Dudderar emphasized that by owning their phones, customers no longer have to pay monthly leasing charges for equipment. At the same time, they have a

much wider choice of phones than the limited selection available under a strictly controlled leased environment. Another Centel reponse to in-

creasing deregulation and competition in the telephone industry was initiated last fall when the company introduced a repair program for phones customers own. Centel customers may now pay a 50-cent charge on their monthly telephone bills for each




