Construction of library addition to begin May 1st

Excavation for an addition to the Niles Library, 6960 Oakton, is scheduled to begin May 1 with construction of the million dollar project to be aided by a \$250,000 grant received this year.

Library superintendent Duncan McKenzie presented final

working drawings and plans for approval to the State Library in Springfield April 12. Board approval for the drawings final submission was given at a regular board meeting April 11.

Bids toward construction are scheduled to be opened April 25.

Architect is Orput Associates, Inc.

A second grant toward improving services for visually and hearing impaired was denied.

Reception of funds would have allowed the library to purchase.

Illinois State Immunization Guidelines require all students to be completely immunized by October 15. If not immunized by this date, a student can be excluded from school.

"Many times parents call us about immunizations at the last minute," said Dr. Karen Scott, medical director of the Cook County Department of Public Health. "By offering these extra

106.5 ft. slide to be dedicated June 9th

Niles parks to install waterslide

Niles Park Board President Elaine Heinen announced the purchase of a \$33,500 waterslide facility for the Recreation Center pool, at Tuesday night's board meeting.

The 106.5 foot slide, (purchased from the Miracle Playground Equipment Co.) to be installed by park district personnel at an additional cost of \$5,000, will be dedicated June 9th, Heinen said.

Offered as a reason for the purchase, Heinen observed, "Most people have their own pools now. This slide will be a new attraction."

Park Director William Hughes, reporting for Commissioner

Walter Bousse who was absent, announced the March 30th opening of the Tam Golf course, adding that the facility's first 15 days of operation grossed an expected \$12,000 in green fees.

Hughes also recommended to the board the awarding of an exclusive concession franchise to Coca-Cola.

The board approved the 5-year pact, which grants Coke the exclusive right to sell its products at all park district run concession stands, in exchange for \$2,500.

Board Vice-President Mary Marusek however, suggested an agreed to stipulation, that the franchise may be cancelled at

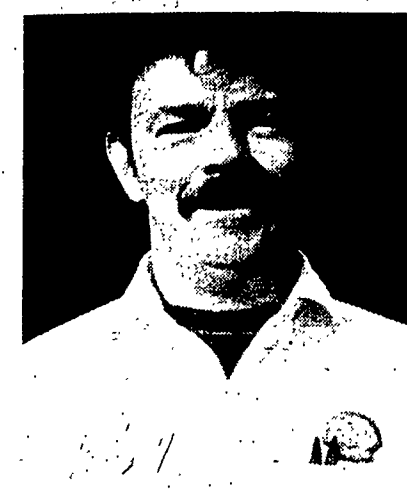

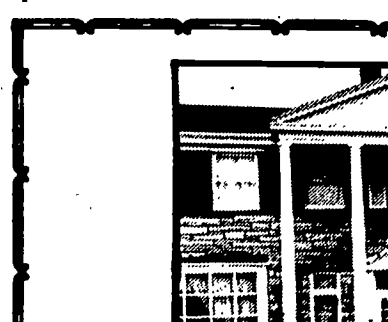

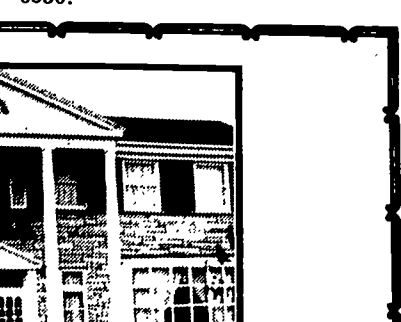

Good vision important to safe driving

Ninety percent of all driving decisions depend on good vision. Good vision is so critical to safe driving that a vision test is now required every time an individual renews an Illinois drivers license.

Vision can and often does change significantly in a three or four year period. The vision test at our drivers license facilities is for visual acuity, or sharpness, and determines if an applicant will be restricted to wearing glasses, using a left outside rear-view mirror, or daylight driving only.

If you can read the small letters in the vision testing machine, it doesn't necessarily mean you have all the vision skills needed for safe driving. According to the American Optometric Association, you also need adequate:

Depth perception - the ability to judge relative distances between objects, or between another vehicle and yourself, especially when both are moving.

Peripheral vision - the ability to see a large area without moving your eyes or head. Being able to see "out of the corner of your eye" increases your total field of vision.

Night vision - the ability to see under low illumination and in the presence of glare.

Don't wait until it's time to renew your license before having your eyes checked, especially if you are having difficulty seeing while driving.

Northeastern program for handicapped

"Adolescence is a difficult time for all of us but many of the problems associated with it are compounded for the young person with some type of handicap," said Gertrude Meyers, associate professor of Special Education at Northeastern Illinois University and one of the coordinators of the university's new master of arts degree program, "Educating Handicapped Adolescents."

It is the first master's degree program in the State of Illinois to focus solely on the needs of handicapped adolescents.

"Adolescents require different methods of teaching than young children," explained Meyers.

"Teachers of handicapped adolescents must be aware of the physical and emotional changes that occur during these years. Handicapped teenagers will desire independence and yet fear it, as do the non-handicapped, but handicapped young people will have more difficulty achieving independence since many have been dependent throughout their lives on parents and teachers."

"These young people need teachers who understand their special learning requirements and their need for guidance in developing social skills and independent living skills."

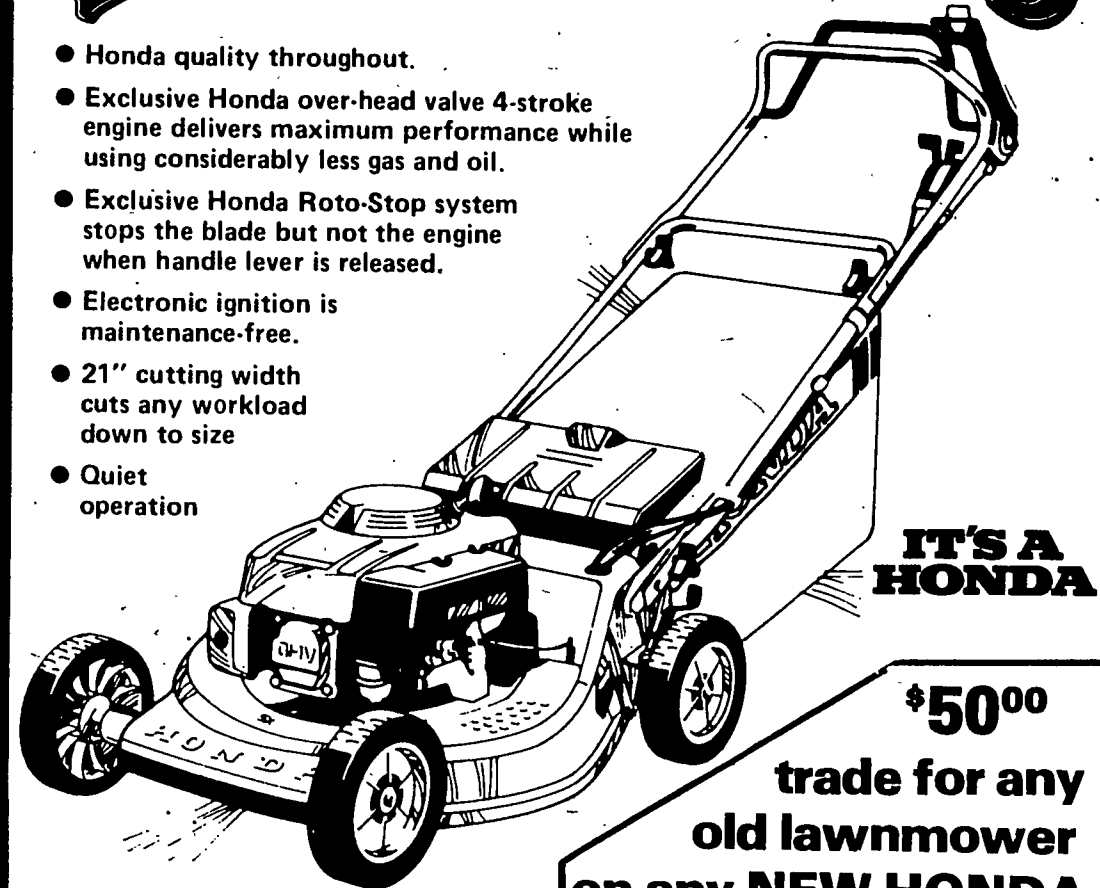

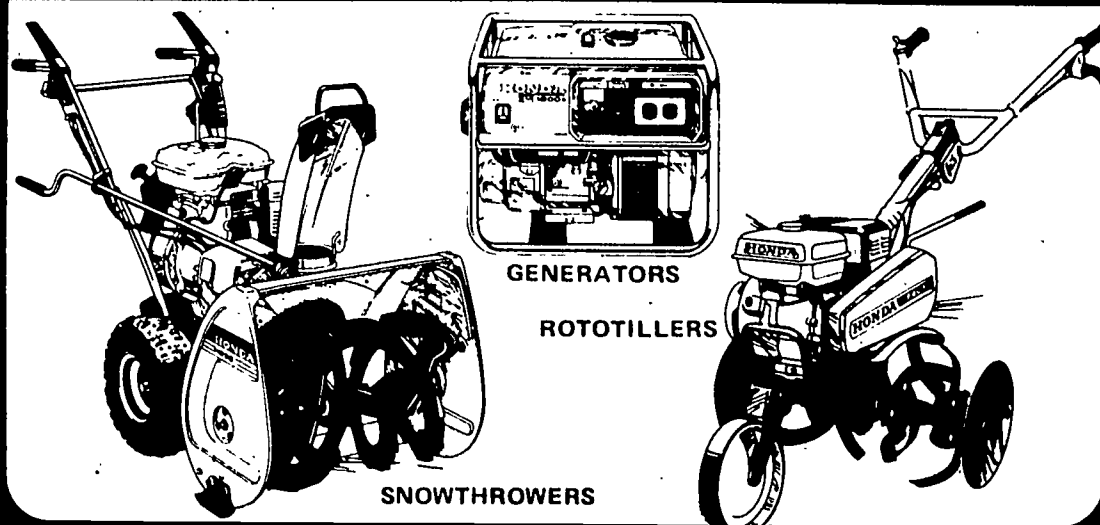

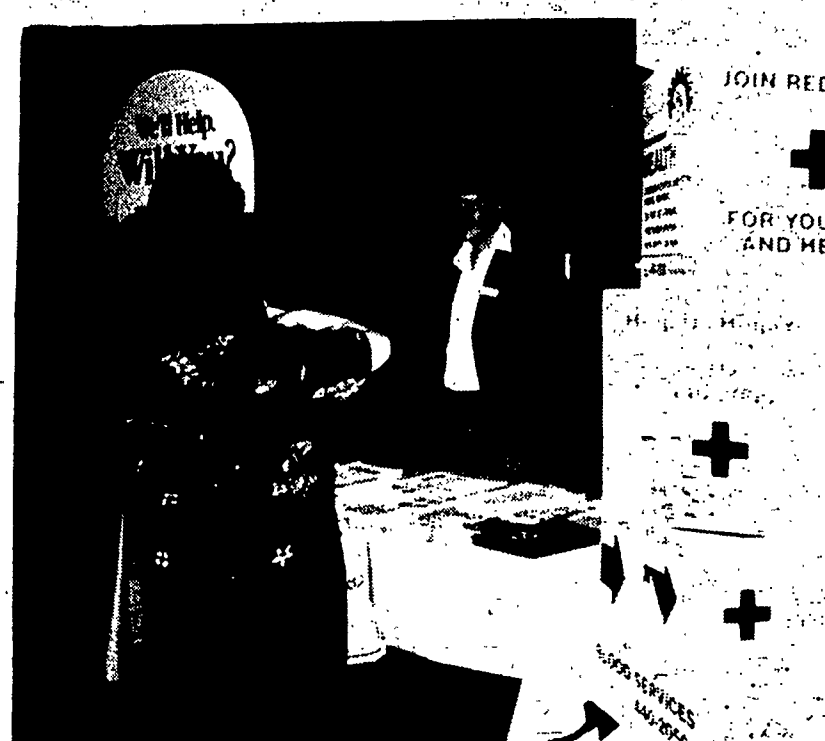

That one quick call to locate underground telephone and other utilities may steer you away from cutting through a telephone cable-keeping you and your neighbors from making phone calls and reaching emergency services such as fire, police or ambulance services.

In Illinois, except within the City of Chicago, diggers should call Julie (Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators), 1-800-892-0123. Within the City of Chicago, call the Utility Alarm Network at 744-7000.

The services are computerized,

one-call notification systems for all diggers-contractors and home gardeners alike.

A single call will automatically notify participating utilities, which will come to the site and mark the location of underground telephone, cable television, electric, gas, water and sewer facilities.

Weather and animals have a hard time getting to Illinois Bell's 53 million miles of underground wire. But a backhoe or even a trowel can slice through a cable in a moment, cutting off service for dozens, hundreds or thousands of telephone customers.

About every three hours, every day of the year, a digger damages an Illinois Bell wire or cable.

Contractors and others who damage Illinois Bell facilities can

be billed for the repair costs. Repairs cost Illinois Bell more than \$1 million last year. Most of the expenses were billed to the people who caused the damage.

Callers to Julie should have the location of the dig at hand, including county and township. Having the section number also is helpful. Needed information can be obtained from tax bills, township and county maps and maps from the Illinois Department of Transportation.

Diggers should call Julie or the Utility Alarm Network at least 48 hours before they intend to start digging. This gives the utilities time to look up necessary information and get to the site to mark service locations before digging begins.

Mandates Act preservation

The basic idea is simple: "If the State won't put its money where its mandate is, the units of local government don't have to comply."

The Act took effect in January of 1981. The flow of mandates slowed to a trickle until 1983. Although the Act clearly set out the state's policy against mandates without money, new bills appeared in 1983 with "bootstrap" sections excluding the legislation from the Act or from reimbursement under the Act.

In 1983 the General Assembly imposed at least \$145 million in new costs on units of local government. Local government consequently passed this on to your property tax.

Local governments do not want this burden imposed on them or their constituency.

Senator Prescott Bloom (R-Peoria) and Representative Harry "Bus" Yourell (D-Oak Lawn) have each offered a resolution calling for a constitutional amendment that will require a three-fifths vote of the House of Representatives and the Senate before such costs can be imposed on local government.

"Local government autonomy, like liberty, must be won again and again," says Senator Bloom.

The Illinois Municipal League and its nearly 1000 member cities, villages and towns have organized a statewide effort for the passage of the constitutional amendment.

Counties, townships, schools

and park districts have joined the Illinois Municipal League in calling on the voters to pass the amendment in an effort to keep the cost of local government and property tax to a minimum.

Yates joins fight against MX missile



"The fight against the MX missile is far from over," Congressman Sidney R. Yates, Democrat from the ninth congressional district, promised a capacity crowd gathered in the Evanston headquarters of the newly-organized Ninth Congressional District Freeze Voters. He predicted renewed congressional efforts to halt further funding for the weapon.

Egan fights GOP on dropping of Circuit Breaker cash grants

State Senator Robert J. Egan (D-7) recently announced his intention to block passage of newly introduced GOP sponsored legislation that would deprive senior citizens of circuit breaker cash grants if they choose to take advantage of a new property tax deferment program for those 65 years of age and older.

According to Egan, the new tax deferment program allows seniors with an annual income of \$10,000 or below to defer all or part of their real estate taxes until either their home is sold or until both spouses are deceased. It also allows a widowed spouse 55 years of age or older to continue to defer property tax payments if he or she so chooses.

The circuit breaker cash grants, of which Egan was a sponsor, gives cash rebates to seniors who earn less than \$12,000 per year. It provides a flat \$80 grant to seniors and an additional grant for qualifying homeowners.

The GOP legislation mandates that seniors who defer their property taxes will be unable to apply for circuit breaker cash grants. The rationale behind the measure is that if seniors are not paying property taxes they should not be able to receive rebates from the state.

Egan argues that this line of thinking is inconsistent. "First of all, this deferment program does not relieve senior citizens from the obligation to pay taxes, it only defers that obligation to a later time. In fact the new tax deferment program will not at all affect reimbursements by the state to local governments," Egan said.

"Secondly, the circuit breaker cash grants are needed by many seniors to pay for food and drugs, utility and hospital bills. In some instances seniors earning less than \$12,000

a year are unable to take care of basic needs in addition to paying property taxes."

"This proposed measure to deprive individuals of cash grants, if they opt for the deferred tax plan, does nothing for our older citizens but offer relief with one hand and then take it away with the other hand," Egan said emphatically. He went on, "The deferred tax payment measure I supported is designed merely as a safety net program for seniors who were about to lose their homes due to high medical costs, utility and grocery bills."

Egan emphasized that in the coming weeks he will lobby to stall the Republican measure in the Rules Committee.

"However, if SB 1412 should be assigned to the Revenue Committee, a committee of which I am a member, I will work with my Democrat colleagues to be sure it dies in that committee."

Bill to pro-rate senior tax breaks approved

The Illinois House last week approved legislation sponsored by State Rep. Ralph C. Capparelli (D-13th), to allow senior citizens to begin receiving circuit breaker benefits on a pro-rated basis upon turning age 65.

"Pro-rating benefits already applies to senior citizen homestead exemptions," Capparelli said. "This measure extends that same principle to circuit breaker benefits so needy seniors can receive these benefits earlier and on a more timely basis."

House Bill 2377 allows persons to receive Circuit Breaker Tax Relief benefits from the month they reach their 65th birthday.

"One of the flaws of the current circuit breaker statute is that upon turning age 65, a person must wait until January 1 of the following year to begin receiving benefits," Capparelli explained. "Seniors should be able to receive those benefits from the day they turn 65."

Circuit breaker relief is available to elderly and disabled homeowners, renters, nursing home residents or public housing residents with an income of \$12,000 or less and whose rent or property taxes equal or exceed a certain percentage of that income. Circuit breaker grants average about \$250 to \$260, but can amount to a maximum of \$700.

"This revision will put \$2.5 million worth of tax relief back in the pockets of our senior citizens," Capparelli said.

The bill now goes to the Senate for action.

mer. The Homeowner's Exemption reduces the taxable value of a person's residential property over what it was in 1977. This year, due to legislation Hynes proposed, the exemption was increased to \$3,500 from \$3,000.

Senior citizens already registered for the 1983 Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption automatically qualify for the 1983 Homeowner's Exemption. Since they do not have to apply, they will not be sent applications for it.

liquor store and lounge at Dempster and Milwaukee.

Up on the roof, Bacher, who was then deputy fire chief, was directing firemen who were aiming their hoses down into the store. Icicles hung on their clothes and helmets, as they fought the blustery cold winds, as well as the smoke and fire. It was a dramatic fire. And it was a bitter cold night. We left the scene after a few minutes. Not too many minutes later we were told the firemen scrambled down from the roof just before it caved in.

We never forgot the images of Bacher, Hoelbl, Hoppe, Adolph Foss and his fellow workers dripping with water, covered with icicles, directing the hoses into the holes in the roof.

We left the scene of the fire around 5 a.m., went home and grabbed a couple hours of sleep. By 9 a.m. we were over at the Public Works Building where the trucks were moving in and out scurrying through town clearing the streets. In the middle of it all was Ed Bacher, who put on his other hat and was now directing the Public Works department. We found his effort above and beyond the call.

In 1981 when Nick Blase took office he asked about the different people in town who were working in the village. We told him how impressed we were with Eddie. He subsequently re-appointed Ed. Bacher was the only department head who was re-

appointed when Blase took office.

Jokingly, Ed used to call us his sponsor but it really wasn't true. Ed was his own sponsor.

We transplanted Chicagoans, who come to these small communities, don't know the effort and dedication which took place in days bygone which created these towns. Despite all the hoopla that accompanied Niles All America choice, it was the day-to-day dedication of the Ed Bachers who made the All America towns.

There's a chance now to say thank you to one guy who is still around and can enjoy the recognition which would come from a special accolade. To re-name the new garage after Eddie would take only a small effort. Considering the large efforts Ed has made, which has made all the politicians look good and which has been a major factor in Niles All America recognition, it would be a small thank you to the most dedicated guy we've met in Niles in all our years here.

A postscript to this column would suggest any residents and friends of Eddie should drop down to the courthouse Tuesday night and let the trustees know their feelings about Ed. A show of force always impresses public bodies even though it seems a shame this kind of effort needs to be made.

among other items, a TTY (teletypewriter) to communicate with deaf patrons, a decoder for captioned television and a machine for visual enlarging of printed matter.

Board members approved new policy to close the library all day before Christmas. A second motion, to close the library all day December 31 failed to pass. Both closings were recommended in a report from the policy committee.

As of July 1, all State library employees will be able to unionize according to another report from the employee management committee.

With board approval, the library administrator is authorized to develop library programs in aiding the Village of Niles to claim a "Certified City" designation by the State of Illinois. Chairing the Village's efforts is village trustee Abe Seiman.

McKenzie said four persons are hired for data input into library terminals. Also, persons are hired for positions of librarian in the children's division of the branch library and for children's services in the main library.

After much discussion, board members agreed to extend a bidding process in order to employ someone for classification of employees.

Board members approved duplication of computer software for loan to patrons so one copy will be in safekeeping. Funds were authorized for attendance of employees and trustees to two conferences.

College students can earn credit at OCC

College students who attend school away from home during the academic year can earn college credit at Oakton Community College this summer if they have trouble finding a summer job.

In fact, Oakton's flexible class schedules at both OCC/Des Plaines and OCC/Skokie allow many students to earn credit even if they are working at a summer job. Most of the general courses required at four-year universities - such as speech, English, math and humanities - can be taken at OCC this summer during the four-day summer school week (Monday through Thursday), which begins June 11.

Nearly 150 different courses are being offered this summer at OCC, including popular courses such as Composition I, Composition II, Effective Speech, American Government, Introduction to Data Processing and Introduction to Psychology. Most of these classes will satisfy graduation requirements at schools such as the University of Illinois, Northern Illinois University, Illinois State University, Southern Illinois University and the University of Iowa. Specific information about transferring credits is available from the OCC Office of Student Development and from the institution where credits will be transferred.
