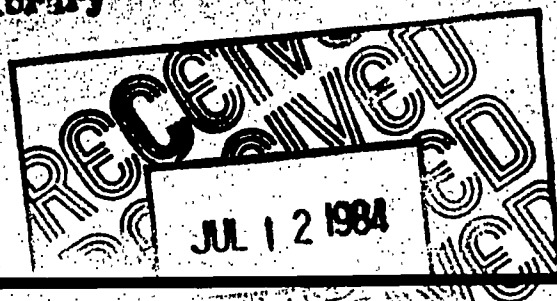

Handgun ban issue flares up at MG board meeting

Even though none of the Morton Grove Board of Trustees showed up at the reviewing stand to officiate the Village's 4th of July fireworks display last week, it was "rockets red glare" at their board meeting Monday night when the handgun ban once again became an issue.

Calling ordinance 81-11, "More symbolic than significant," Trustee Richard Hohn asked the board to include an advisory (non-binding) referendum on the general election's November ballot, asking residents if they wish to retain or reject the controversial 1981 ordinance.

Trustee Hohn explained, "no petition to ban guns in homes" was ever presented to the board, "just the ban of (gun) sales in residential areas...we didn't listen to the people." Hohn said many residents have approached him and voiced Continued on Page 34

Search delayed for Dist. 207 head

Commenting on Tuesday, acting Superintendent Dr. John Benka said he does not anticipate the school board will begin discussing how to go about fin-

ding a new superintendent until a replacement has been found for retiring Maine Township High School board president William Schaeffe. Former Superintendent John Murphy resigned on June 30 to become superintendent of the Prince George County, Maryland school district. New contract nets savings for Edison customers

Commonwealth Edison customers will save in excess of \$1 billion over the life of a new Uranium Enrichment Services Contract that Edison Chairman and President James J. O'Connor signed today with Donald P. Hodel, Secretary of the U.S. Department of Energy.

According to the contract, the Department of Energy will provide the major portion of the nuclear fuel enrichment services required for the company's eight operating nuclear reactors. Four additional Edison nuclear units, scheduled to be completed by 1987, are also covered under the contract.

The savings represent the difference between the costs Edison expects to incur as a result of the new contract and those Edison would have incurred under contracts in effect with the Department of Energy since 1969. At the same time, the Edison contract helps assure that the govern-

ment will have sufficient uranium enrichment business to keep operating efficiently well into the future.

"This is an extremely important step in our continuing effort to keep costs to our customers as low as practical," O'Connor declared. "As a result of the new contract, our customers receive an average of \$40 million a year in savings. It also guarantees that the company will have an adequate supply of low-cost nuclear fuel well into the future. The new contract will go a long way in assuring the continuing economic competitiveness of the nuclear option in northern Illinois."

Commonwealth Edison is the Department of Energy's largest domestic enrichment customer and the largest nuclear utility in the United States. The company serves approximately three million customers in northern Illinois.

North Branch clean-up funding passed by House

The House of Representatives approved \$150,000 for the clean-up of the North Branch of the Chicago River, announced Congressman Frank Annunzio (11 Dist.-ILL), who authored the enabling legislation.

"I am delighted the House has voted to continue this worthy project," said Annunzio, "because our Northwest Side Chicago community had benefited immensely over the past years from the removal of trash and debris from this Chicago natural resource."

The North Branch clean-up funding is part of the Energy and Water Development Appropriation Bill for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1985, which now goes to the Senate before being sent to the President for his signature.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers coordinates the annual North Branch debris removal project, including the cutting and

trimming of trees obstructing the channel and the removal of man-made litter. The work is funded by both Federal appropriations, as included in the Energy and Water Development Appropriation Bill, and by non-Federal interests, represented by the Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago, which pays 25% of the cost of the maintenance operation.

Since 1974, when Congressman Annunzio's amendment to the Water Resources Development and Preservation Act was enacted into law, more than 20,000 cubic yards of debris have been removed - enough to bury a football field under 11 feet of refuse.

According to Chicago District Engineer L. Col. Christos A. Dornas, negotiations are now underway to award a contract for the 1984 clean-up project which is expected to begin sometime next month.

Change in Homestead Exemption procedure

State Rep. Penny Pullen (R-55) explained a change in procedures for the Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption renewal at the assessor's office.

The Homestead Exemption is a reduction of \$1,500 in the assessed valuation of a senior citizen's home before the tax rate is applied. It results in a dollar savings of about \$20 to \$40 in this area, depending on the tax rate. Those who have previously obtained such an exemption need not re-apply. Prompt return of the renewal card each year will continue the exemption. Spouses of deceased exemption holders must re-apply, however, to keep the exemption if they themselves are owners of the eligible age.

Senior Citizens who are over 65 are encouraged to apply for this tax exemption. Applications are available at Rep. Pullen's office, 22 Main st., Park Ridge, phone 823-2023. Office hours are Monday through Thursday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Please call for an appointment.

Tuition waived for OCC students 65 and over

Oakton Community College has announced that it will waive indirect tuition for students with financial need who are age 65 or older, beginning with the Fall, 1984 semester. State law has recently allowed this waiver.

This waiver applies to in-district tuition for Oakton's credit courses and to MONNACEP non-credit courses. The waiver does not apply to any course fees. To be eligible for this tuition waiver, students age 65 or older must present proof of age and residency prior to registration, meet specific family income guidelines and complete an application, available in the Office of Student Financial Aid at OCC/Des Plaines, 1600 E. Golf rd. or OCC/Skokie, 7701 N. Lincoln ave.

MEALS ON WHEELS

PRECAUTION AT HOME

All Morton Grove residents who are above age 65 or who are handicapped should consider the Village's free Postal Carrier Watch Program. Participants in this program will fill out a confidential registration form requesting information on an individual's health condition and persons to contact in an emergency. Postal Carriers will then affix a small sticker to the inside of the post box. If mail accumulates over a two day period, the resident, their contact persons, or the appropriate Village emergency department will be alerted. Since an emergency situation can never be foreseen it is recommended that every eligible resident participate in the Postal Carrier Watch Program. Registration forms are available at the Village Hall Senior Center, 6101 Capulina ave. or by calling the Senior Hot-Line weekday mornings at 965-4658.

TAKE CARE OF YOUR HEARING

Never poke anything, including cotton-tipped swabs into the ear canal. The best way to clean ears is with a soapy washcloth. Blow nose gently, clearing one nostril at a time. When traveling by plane with a cold or sore throat, use a decongestant spray or tablet to clear eustachian tubes. Chewing gum or sucking hard candy, anything that promotes swallowing also helps. A blocked eustachian tube causes fluid to accumulate in the inner ear, causing pain and possible infection. Avoid noise pollution. On the average, a person can safely tolerate noise up to 80 decibels, about the sound of a home vacuum cleaner. If the voice of a person sitting next to you cannot be heard the noise is too loud. Report any of these symptoms to a doctor: pain, ringing, noticeable hearing loss, any discharge other than earwax, "popping" ears, nausea, vomiting, dizziness.

HANDICAPPED LICENSE PLATES

Effective July 1, the Illinois Vehicle Code describes a handicapped person as "every natural person who is unable to walk 200 feet or more unassisted by another person or without the aid of a walker, crutches, braces, prosthetic device, or a wheelchair or without great difficulty or discomfort due to the following impairments: neurologic, orthopedic, respiratory, cardiac, arthritic disorder, blindness, or the loss of function or absence of a limb or limbs." Applications are available at any local Office Of The Secretary Of State.

A new federally-funded program will provide free job retraining for workers who have been effected by plant closings, according to the Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs.

The Dislocated Worker Program is designed to provide free training in marketable careers for workers who have been laid-off, terminated or received notice of layoff or termination due to plant closings, and who have received or exhausted their unemployment

compensation benefits. Three program sites, at Triton College, College of DuPage and Moraine Valley Community College, have been established to assist Chicago-area residents.

More than 50 vocational programs are available, including nursing assistant training, typesetting, data processing and machine tool technology. Most courses can be completed in one year. Participants also receive free job placement assistance and counseling.

There are several eligibility requirements for acceptance in the Dislocated Worker Program. Community residents can receive more information by calling 641-1111.

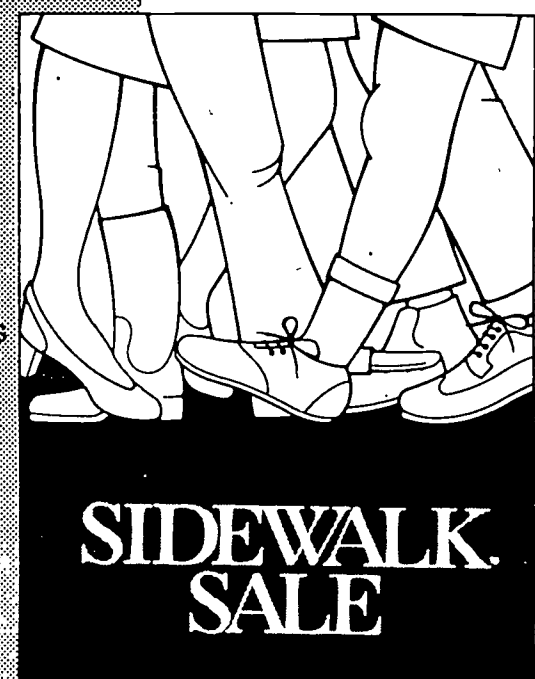

Kustra passes safety law for amusement parks

Amusement park and carnival rides would be required under a bill sponsored by Sen. Bob Kustra, R-28, which has cleared the Illinois Senate and House. The measure will be sent to the governor for his approval.

Senator Kustra said a rash of accidents last month at carnivals and amusement parks all over the country prompted the legislation. "Within a 17-day period, nine people were killed and at least 37 were injured on rides in the U.S. Two of those accidents were in Illinois," he said. A 36-year-old man was killed and his six-year-old son seriously injured May 26 on a carnival ride near Pontiac when a connector snapped and the gondola they were riding flew into a pickup truck. Three boys were injured on a ride at the Great America amusement park near Gurnee a few days earlier.

"While amusement industry people feel this series of accidents was coincidental, it did point up a need for thorough inspections of all ride equipment," the senator said. "It is absolutely vital to do everything we can to avert tragedies for people who are simply out to have a good time. They have no control over how the rides are operated or whether they are maintained properly. State inspectors must step in and help assure the safety of these facilities," he said.

Senator Kustra's bill calls for organizing a new Amusement Safety Board to set up rules and regulations for the inspection, repair, maintenance and operation of all amusement rides and attractions.

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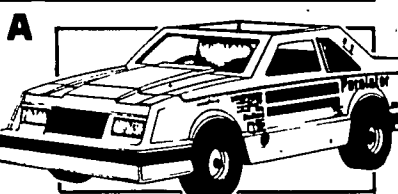

Trailer tips

Now that school is letting out for the summer, more and more vacationers pulling trailers will be taking to the roads. Getting your campers, boat trailers and utility trailers ready for safe travel is an important part of your vacation plan.

Captain Hugh S. McGinley, Commander of the State Police District 15 on the Illinois Tollroad reminds us that before hitching up your towed vehicles, be sure they are safe and in good mechanical condition:

1. Make sure your trailer is equipped with two safety chains long enough to be connected from the hitch to the bumper of the car.
2. Check the electrical connections for corrosion, damaged plugs or loose chafed and dangling wires.
3. Inspect the trailer lights to insure they are all working. The side marker lights must be red to the rear and yellow to the center and front. Two red tail lights are required on the rear of the trailer. Brake (stop) lights and turn signals may be red or yellow and are required to operate day or night. All lights must operate at night and be visible up to 500 feet away.
4. Remove the wheel hubs to inspect and grease the bearings. Lubricate all grease fittings and inspect pivot points for excessive wear. Look for cracks in the springs and frame.
5. Tires should be inflated to the proper recommended air pressure and have a safe amount of tread. Be sure they are free from splits, cuts and dry rot. Always carry a spare tire on the trailer.
6. Make sure the hitch is securely attached to the car frame and the ball hitch is the correct size for the trailer.
7. Trailers operated on Illinois roadways that are based in Illinois must bear proper up-to-date registration.

The Illinois Tollroad system has a house trailer ban regulation which is put into effect when winds reach a velocity of 25 mph or more. Only walk-in type house trailers are restricted.

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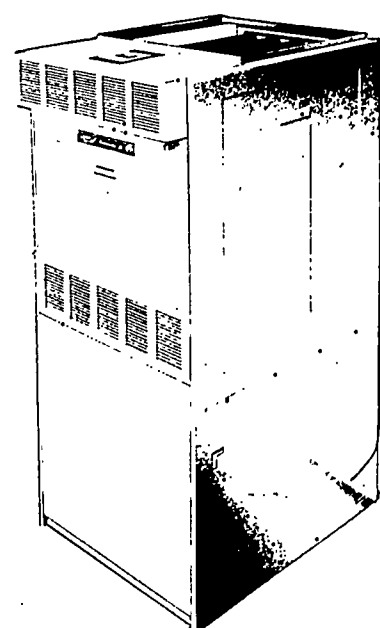


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Selected as Fellow

The common dental injuries suffered by the athletes are teeth broken or lost due to accidental blows to the face. Other expected problems are gum infections among athletes with poor oral hygiene and problems with impacted wisdom teeth.

Parental child abductors face stiffer penalties

Children who undergo the horrors of being abducted by a parent not authorized as the legal guardian will have a greater chance of being found and returned safely home under new legislation sponsored in the Illinois Senate by Robert J. Egan (D-7).

The new measure, Senate Bill 2827, provides greater protection, through tighter law enforcement, to a child who is abducted in cases where the parents are divorced, separated or where legal custody has not yet been established.

"It is important for us to realize that over 100,000 children in this country annually are snatched by estranged parents," Egan said. "The potential of either physical or psychological damage to these children, who are held hostage by parents in hiding, is tremendous. This legislation, which has already passed the House and is on second reading in the Senate, allows law enforcement agencies to act more swiftly by making the charges leveled criminal as well as civil."

Egan outlined the provisions of his bill this way:

The first provision mandates that under the new law police would begin their search for a missing child immediately. Currently law enforcement agencies are required to wait 72 hours before beginning their investigation. Chances of finding a missing youngster are best if the search begins as soon as a report

is made.

The second provision would give police immediate authority to remove a child from a parent who is not in lawful custody. At present it is less likely that police could act without a direct order from the court.

Egan added that the new law would also protect children up to age 18 (presently the age limit is 14) and would require that the State of Illinois hook up with Federal Parental Locator Services which is now only used to find child support delinquents.

The new legislation also protects the mother of the child where paternity has not been established by automatically making the crime of abduction by the "presumed" father a class 4 felony. In addition the law would allow a parent without a custody order to obtain a court decree prohibiting the removal of their youngster by the lawful guardian to places not within the reach of that parent.

A second piece of legislation sponsored by Egan also deals with children and young adults (17-21) who are found missing. ISEARCH, as it is commonly known, is close to passage in the House. According to its sponsor, this bill eliminates the present "24 hour waiting" period frequently used by the police and mandates that investigation begin immediately.

ISEARCH has passed the senate and is now close to final passage in the House.

In fact, Northwestern riders did not even begin riding in their classes until well into the afternoon.

Championship ribbon in Amateur Owner Working Hunters over 30. Laura won first and third-place ribbons over fences in this division towards the Reserve Championship.

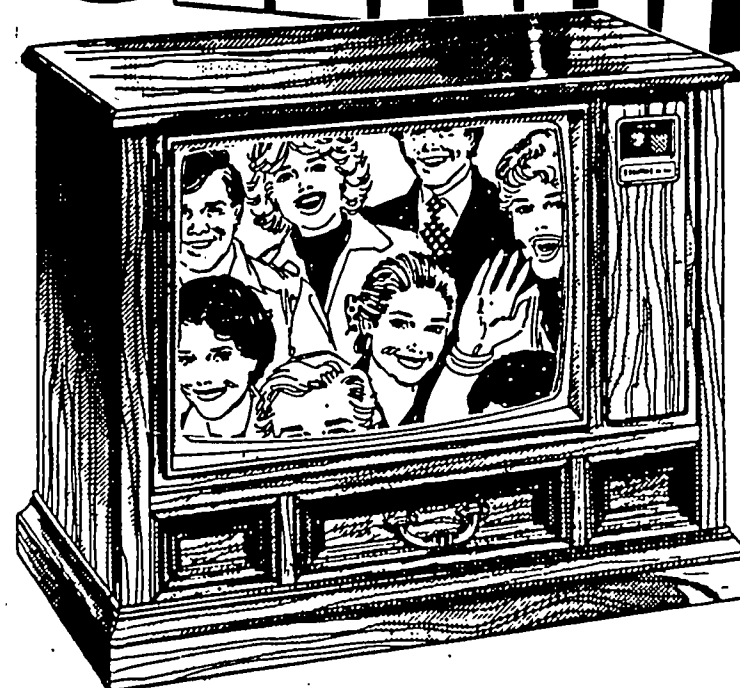

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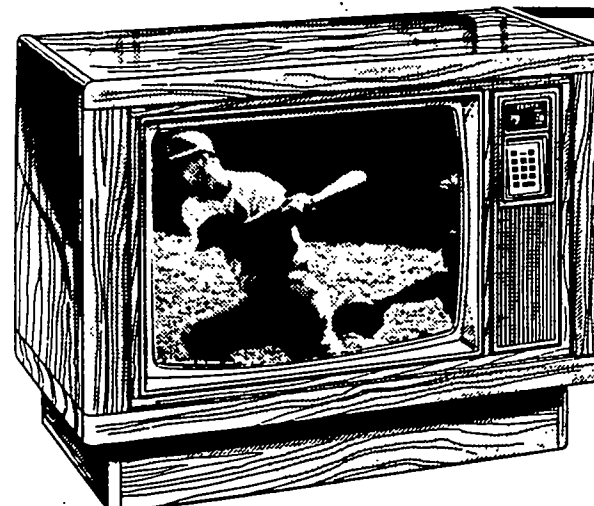
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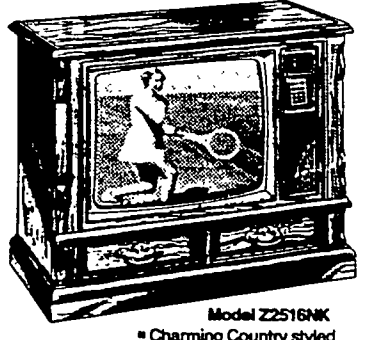

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OCC Theater technician finds his role

Chuck Doolittle figures he won't have to do a whole lot of acting in the lead role of Allan Felix in the Oakton Community College Theater Association production of Woody Allen's "Play It Again, Sam."

The OCC theater technician hasn't acted in four years, having spent the time concentrating on the production and technical aspects of theater. But when the decision was made to run "Play It Again, Sam," Doolittle decided it was time to come out of his acting hibernation.

"I've always felt an affinity for this part," he said. "I can really relate to a lot of things that Allen Felix goes through."

The play centers around Allan Felix and his attempts to understand himself and form a relationship with a woman—any woman. He's guided along the way by the dream presence of Bogart, who Allen believes really knew how to treat a woman, along with his best friends, Dick and Linda Christie who, it turns out, are having troubles of their own. We meet, along the way, Allan's ex-wife, who divorced him on the grounds of insufficient laughter, and we come in contact with a variety of women who have in common their disinterest in and quick rejection of Allan.

Director Carol Verson said she also believes that Doolittle has some of the components of the character within himself.

"I've worked with Chuck before, but it always was with him in a different capacity other than an actor," she said. "I really didn't know what he could do as an actor. He did the best reading, though, at auditions and he also gave the best interpretation. I wasn't looking for a Woody Allen look-alike. Chuck has the right look for the part."

Doolittle said he doesn't plan on playing the role in the same way that Woody Allen did. "I love Woody Allen, but I'm not going to try to be him in this part," he said. "I'm approaching the role

with much more physical humor and I'll probably be more neurotic than he was, too."

Doolittle, who grew up in Park Ridge and lived in Skokie before moving to his current home in Highland Park, first came to Oakton in 1977.

"I was hired as A/V distribution supervisor. When the performing arts center opened, Denis Berkson (OCC speech/theater coordinator) approached me about being theater technician. It was a new position that became necessary and I had worked on plays both at Oakton and in other areas."

Doolittle was hired as Oakton's theater technician, a job that makes him responsible for any activity that takes place in the performing arts center. That includes plays, concerts, lectures and classes.

Most of Doolittle's theater work takes place in the design area. After reading the script, he makes up drawing for the set, which he then shows to the director. A small model of the set is then constructed and changed until it meets with the approval of the director.

The actual building of the set can take from a couple of days up to a month," he said. "It won't really be a problem for me acting in this play, though, because nearly all of my work is done before opening night."

Doolittle, 39, said he's happy with his job as theater technician. Theater is really the only thing I want to do professionally. "I've felt that way ever since I was six years old and saw Rex Harrison in a Broadway production of 'My Fair Lady'."

The dual responsibilities of having the lead role in a play as well as theater technician have made Doolittle's life full of theater.

"It's a lot of work," he said. "I get to work at 7:30 in the morning and I usually don't leave until about 11 at night. But it's nice to know that I can still do this."

"Play It Again, Sam" will run July 19, 20 & 21 and 26, 17 & 28, at OCC/Des Plaines, 1600 E. Golf rd. All performances begin at 8 p.m.

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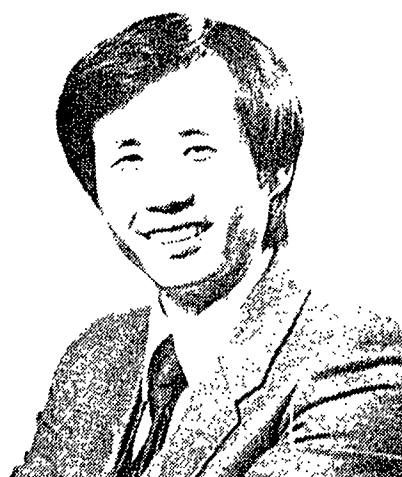

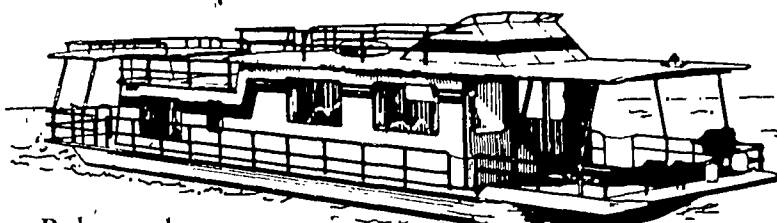

ICC charge increases Centel line charge

On July 1, the monthly supplemental charge initiated by the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) the first of the year will increase by 72 cents each month to \$2.81 per line.

Since January 1, 1984, the supplemental charge has been billed to residential and business telephone subscribers throughout the state, including customers of Central Telephone Company of Illinois, at the rate of \$1.89 per line per month. The increase which goes into effect July 1 was provided for in an ICC order of Dec. 21, 1983.

"The supplemental charge is one means of moving the rates for local telephone service closer to the actual cost of providing that service," explained Donald U. Adkisson, general manager regulatory planning for Centel.

Whereas the local telephone network was once maintained through subsidies from artificially inflated long distance phone rates, today the deregulated and competitive telephone industry cannot maintain those traditional subsidy practices, Adkisson commented. Adkisson emphasized that many of the changing rate structures in the telephone industry are based on developing charges that more closely reflect the actual cost of providing specific services.

displeasure with the law, adding, "...it has also troubled me for some time."

"The only valid government is government by consent of the people," Hols stated.

"Let the people decide what laws they want to live under... the people should decide, not seven guys on a board."

The board's reaction to Hols' request was negative, although Trustees Neil Cashman and Joan Dechert were not present at the meeting.

Village Attorney Marty Ashman said the placement of an advisory referendum on November's ballot would likely require a petition signed by 10 to 25 per cent of all registered voters.

Trustee Gregory Youstra then added, "if the public wanted it (a referendum) they would have brought out a petition."

When it appeared Hols' suggestion was about to be swept under a legal rug, David Selzer, a resident in attendance spoke out.

"If a petition is required, I'll be happy to help Trustee Hols get whatever number of names are necessary...you're just hiding behind the law."

Selzer later said he supported the handgun ban when it was passed three years ago, but agreed with Hols, the entire community should have an opportunity to voice their views.

The board will further discuss Hols' request at its next meeting on July 23.

current board members will not want to fill the superintendent's position until there is a complete board. "Individual board members consider the hiring of a superintendent among the most important things they do," said Benka.

Benka further gave reason to believe the board may have a difficult time filling the position before spring. Benka said it is "extremely difficult" to encourage a currently employed superintendent to break his contract to move to a new school district.

Following the resignation of former Superintendent Richard Short, District 207 hired a consultant to begin a national search resulting in the hiring of Murphy. Normally, it would be expected that such a procedure would again be followed. However, because of the time of year during which the board will have to look, they may choose to appoint a current administrator to the post or let one of the administrators continue as acting superintendent.

Among the extras will be free blood pressure checks and free information on services and programs provided by the many non-profit, community agencies participating in the flea market.

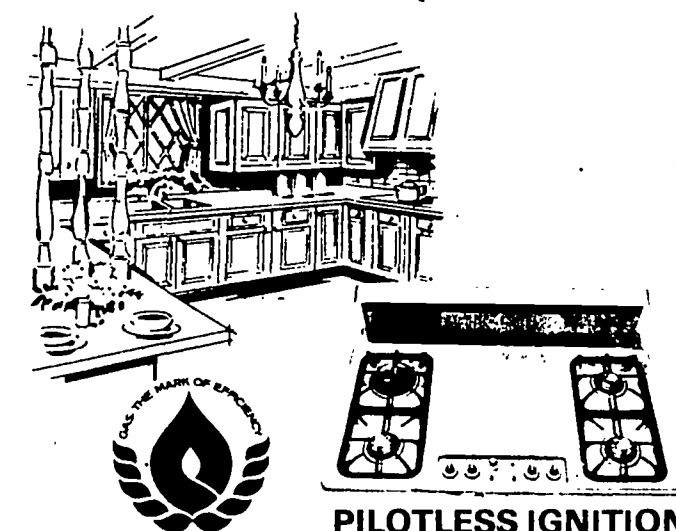
Parents are urged to bring their children. A clown will keep the kids smiling with fun, free balloons and treats.

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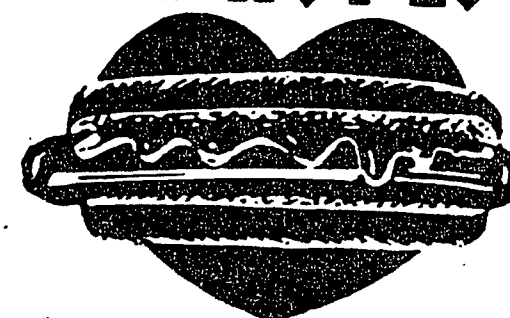
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
