

Oakton College names new president

Dr. Thomas TenHoeve, Jr., the 14 year president of Pennsylvania's Butler County Community College, was unanimously chosen by the Oakton Community College Board of Trustees Tuesday night to become Oakton's new president.

TenHoeve, 48, will replace interim president Dr. James

Koeller, appointed by the board after its ouster of Oakton's founding president, William A. Koehnline in January of 1984.

TenHoeve's contract for the \$67,200 yearly post begins September 1st, and runs through June 1987.

Dr. TenHoeve has served since 1970 as President of Butler County Community College.

Previously, he was acting President, Academic Dean and a biology instructor at Northwestern College, Orange City, Iowa. Since 1973, he has taught courses on community college administration as an Adjunct Professor of Higher Education at the University of Pittsburgh.

Library Board adopts .02% budget levy

Board members of the Niles Library District adopted a .02 percent budget levy for the following fiscal year at a regular board meeting July 11 in the main library, 6860 Oakton.

I'm a big city boy. Or at least I'm a "I love a big city" boy. Putting it bluntly, I've never met a big city I didn't like.

During the 1943-'46 era, I discovered many of the big cities of the world. While stateside I ran into Los Angeles and San Francisco and wrote home reams of praise for the cities along the Pacific. Soon afterwards Boston became a port of call and I waxed warmly about Bostonians and their fine city. Overseas, I spent a great deal of time in London and Paris and Berlin and wrote enthusiastically about these 3 capitals, two of which were heavily wounded.

Today and yesterday Chicago has my affection. It's more than puppy love. It's been going on too long. It's more a romance of the mature, a passion which is enduring and permanent.

I walk the city and I'm proud. I sit at the el fresco cafe at the First National Bank Plaza and sip ice tea while I people-watch. Chicago has few outdoor sittings which are as pleasing as this one. On a warm 80 degree day the blooming flowers in front of the Chagall Wall makes this setting most pleasing and a bit fantastic. The bright colors Continued on Page 25

Real estate tax bills in mail

The Cook County Treasurer's Office began the mailing of 1.4 million second installment real estate taxes due August 20. These are 1983 taxes collectible 1984.

Cook County Treasurer Edward J. Rosewell said that all tax bills will be in the mail by Friday, July 20.

Real estate taxes paid after August 20 will be subject to a 1.5% per month penalty on all amounts due, as prescribed by law. Rosewell said that any

property owner who does not receive his or her tax bill by the 1st of August should contact the Treasurer's Office at 443-5100 and a duplicate bill will be issued without charge.

Temporary Handicapped Parking I.D. Cards

Louis Black, Clerk of Niles Township, announces that Senate Bill 1269 effective July 1, allows for the issuance of Temporary Handicapped Parking Cards by the Clerk's office up to a 12 month's basis upon completion of an application accompanied by a physician's statement verifying the applicant's temporary disability.

The new yellow non-laminated Card is 4" by 6", with the handicap wheelchair emblem on the front and printed on the back is the Illinois Revised Statute that entitles the handicapped person to enjoy all the privileges afforded an individual with a handicapped

licensed vehicle. The Card is displayed on the driver's visor so the card is visible when the visor is in the down position.

This program is offered as a cooperative effort by the Townships of Cook County in conjunction with the Northwest Municipal Conference, with its purpose to assure the proper use of designated handicapped parking spaces.

Niles will be the site for the Tuesday, July 24 Illinois House Subcommittee Hearings on proposed Video Display Terminal Legislation.

The hearings will begin at 9 a.m. at Notre Dame High School, 7665 Dempster, Niles.

Chairman Andrew McGann (D), Chicago, said Chicago area companies wanting to testify before the Subcommittee should contact the Niles Chamber of Commerce and Industry at 635-0303.

This special subcommittee was formed by the Illinois House Labor and Commerce Committee to study the impact of House Bill 3276, proposed by Representative John S. Matijevich (D), of Waukegan.

At issue are alleged health hazards connected with the

operation of VDT's. Previous business witnesses have told the House Committee that current scientific research has concluded that VDTs do not emit harmful radiation and propose no health hazards.

The proposed legislation could be extremely costly to Illinois businesses. Some of the bill's requirements are:

- 1) No employee shall be required to work at a VDT for more than four hours per day.
- 2) Employee will receive a fifteen minute rest period every hour if they have a high workload.
- 3) Employee will receive a fifteen minute rest period after two hours of continuous VDT use for moderate workloads.
- 4) Light level shall not exceed 700 LUX.
- 5) Terminal tables shall be completely height adjustable.
- 6) Employers must utilize either indirect lighting or recessed fixtures with louvers in order to eliminate glare.



Elrod presents commendations

Officer O'Reilly was honored for his alert pursuit and arrest of two illegal aliens who were

involved in a shooting incident in Palatine Township.

Investigator Sabin was honored with Capt. Frank Braun and Investigator Neal Kirschenbaum for their investigation which led to the arrest and conviction of a career sex offender in the homicide of Julie Ann Angel in 1980. The case involved the interrogation of 288 persons and a unique evidentiary package including an elaborate link analysis pattern and state of the art use of high tech fiber work-ups.

With Sgt. John Reed, Investigator Sabin was also awarded a Commendation for their investi-

gation into a 1981 brutal murder in a Forest Preserve near River Grove involving rival motorcycle gangs and prostitution. The offender was pursued to North Carolina where he was arrested.

Investigator Kraut was honored for his extensive investigation which led to charging an offender with numerous rapes and deviate sexual assaults in the northwest suburbs including closing a 1979 rape case by exception because of the statute of limitations. The offender was also charged in similar cases by the police departments of Arlington Heights, Niles and Schaumburg.

Ed Rooney to discuss freedom of information act

Ed Rooney, assistant professor of journalism at Chicago's Loyola University and former Chicago Sun-Times reporter, will be the guest speaker at the Northwest Press Club's Aug. 3 meeting. He will discuss the impact, ramifications and exemptions of the new Freedom of Information Act for Illinois journalists.

Rooney has the reputation of being the dean of freedom of information in Illinois, and is vice president for the Chicago chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists (Sigma Delta Chi). He also has been responsible for establishment of the Center for Freedom of Information Studies at Loyola.

The new law, effective July 1, 1984, enables reporters, freelance writers and other interested individuals to obtain information about the expenditure of public funds, voting records of public bodies, salaries of public officials and consultant studies commissioned by public agencies. Twenty-six exemptions exist,

however, which allow state and local agencies to prevent disclosure of some information.

Job Training Available at Community Colleges

Free job training centers have been established at three community colleges in the Chicago suburbs to meet the needs of unemployed workers.

The Dislocated Worker Program centers are at Triton College in River Grove, Moraine Valley Community College in Palos Hills and College of DuPage in Glen Ellyn. Each site offers free job training and placement in programs such as data processing, automotive technology, word processing and electronics. Persons in the program receive career counseling as they prepare for new careers in growth areas.

To be eligible, workers must have been terminated or laid-off or received notice of termination or layoff; be eligible for or exhausted unemployment compensation; and be unlikely to return to their previous industry or occupation. Persons who have been terminated or received notice of termination due to a permanent plant or facility closing are also eligible.

POSTAL CARRIER WATCH

All Morton Grove residents who are above age 65 or who are handicapped should consider the Village's free Postal Carrier Watch Program. Participants in this program will fill out a confidential registration form requesting information on an individual's health condition and persons to contact in an emergency. Postal Carriers will then affix a small sticker to the inside of the post box. If mail accumulates over a two day period, the resident, their contact persons, or the appropriate Village emergency department will be alerted. Since an emergency situation can never be foreseen it is recommended that every eligible resident participate in the Postal Carrier Watch Program. GRANDCHILDREN

Current laws permit grandparents to deposit up to \$10,000 each, each year into a Custodian Account for a grandchild without paying a gift tax. All interest earned on the account is credited to the child and this usually means that little or no income tax will be paid on the income earned by the Custodian Account. No income tax is applied on interest up to \$1,000 on such an account. Above that there is a tax on the income but most likely at a much lower rate than the senior's. Of course such an account is considered irrevocable, withdrawals cannot be made without penalty. The primary purpose of a Custodian Account is usually to help provide a college education for the grandchild. Bank or financial institution officers can be contacted to find out more about Custodian Accounts.

SHAKE THE SALT HABIT

Sodium is a mineral required by the body to function properly. It is essential for the proper volume and flow of blood and in body functions. However, a minute amount of sodium is adequate: generally felt to be 1,000 to 3,000 milligrams per day for an adult or less than one teaspoonful of table salt. Too much sodium is one of several factors that is thought to contribute to high blood pressure. Table salt, which is approximately one-half sodium, is only one source. Sodium is a hidden ingredient in many food items, such as: canned food, pickled products, soft drinks, smoked and processed meat and fish, dairy products, condiments, baking powder and baking soda, convenience items, and many nonprescription drugs (aspirin, antacids, laxatives, alkalizers, cough medicine).

oz. in my back yard and a No. 208RD-8 oz. in the bushes under my picture window in the front yard. This looks like pretty dangerous stuff to me. Am I going to be forced to sit on my front steps next year with a hose in my hand to protect my home against fire? Or spend the evening taking some neighbor child to the hospital, missing a couple of fingers?

I am writing to ask the aid of the police and the people of Niles to return safety and sanity to our Fourth of July celebrations so that the majority of the residents can enjoy the holiday. Perhaps more advance publicity to the effect that private fireworks are still illegal and that the law will be strictly enforced might help cut down on their use.

from Chagall, the soft beauty of the flowers and the pretty girls and the warmth of the day makes this stop something special.

I walk east toward Michigan ave. up the steps of the library's culture center and walk with awe through the renovated Center. Upstairs, at Wednesday noon, the Myra Hess concerts are a joy and a respite from the day's activities. Located in the Preston Bradley Room the inlaid tile ceilings and walls are a restful backdrop to the peaceful music.

Downstairs, there is a hydro-sculpture made of soap and detergent bubbles which has a hypnotic effect on the many watchers who sit around and wile away the minutes.

I walk north on Michigan ave., crossing over to the east side of the street. At the river I watch the boat traffic. Down below office workers are boarding boats which take them west to the Northwestern train station. It's a lovely way to end their business day boating their way home after a day at work.

The Plaza in front of the Tribune building is another great spot for people-watching. As the shadows of the Gothic towers of the McCormick's 1924 building languish in the background, you can replenish your energy supply with popcorn from an old-fashioned popcorn cart which is in the square.

I walk across the street to the Wrigley building and head west to the restaurant whose entrance is on the river-side of the building. It is a Chicago restaurant, a little bit of elegance with a bit too much noise. You can turn the clock back 40 years sitting in this restaurant whose heyday was back in the early-radio days. It is still advertising row's favorite. And old chauvinists still point to the male waiters who signify the better restaurants in Chicago.

If I hadn't headed east after sitting at the First National Plaza, I would have moved down the street to Adams and west to Berghoff's Restaurant.

Berghoff's is Chicago-eating at its best. Again, male waiters move officiously, somewhat coldly to and from your table, as they bring you cold steins of dark beer, great barley soup, fresh rye bread and German dishes which give off gemütlich. All cities brag about their fine restaurants. Berghoff's could go to the Olympics for restaurants as our representative for the best in our world.

I walk the city. Alongside Berghoff's is a store which sells Cohasset Punch, a drink of younger days. It brings back memories of New Year's Eve, a peach in the center of a punch bowl. I walk east, west, south, and north and there's a book store nestled down an alleyway, on the second floor of a musty old building. Bookstores are a joy to a walker, a drop-off where you can browse and refresh amidst buckram and old paste.

I walk the city and move into a lobby, the old Rookery building, with its white wrought-iron railings and staircases. It has become a landmark and it is essential Chicago.

I walk the streets and move east to Wabash, south to a record shop filled with old jazz recordings. Or I head north to Rush st. where a better jazz record shop is nestled away around the corner from the neon jungle. Book junkies can loiter away hours hidden in the stacks of old musty stores. Record fans no longer have the joy of lollygagging around an old turntable and playing for hours new-found treasures. Near that south Wabash shop, we used to frequent a store which sold twelve 78 RPM discs for a \$1. And the joy of discovery of an old classic was every bit as exciting as discovering a favorite book.

I walk east at the south end of the loop and pass the Auditorium Theatre, another out-of-another-era building which has been renovated and restored. It's my Chicago. It's my theatre.

I walk east to Michigan ave., then south to the Conrad Hilton. It used to be the Stevens Hotel in our teen days when Griff Williams orchestra played for the young and the old. And it wasn't too many years ago Peter, Paul and Mary were playing their music on the public mezzanine for conventioners who were cheering for Gene McCarthy and Hubert Humphrey. And the kids and their jeans and their barefeet invaded the building, and the police confrontations followed there and in the park across the street and in front of the hotel and down the street south to Roosevelt rd.

I walk south to Roosevelt and west to Jefferson where Manny's cafeteria ladies out soups and gravies and sandwiches and Jewish foods which whet the palates of a most non-secular clientele. If it was Sunday morning I'd walk the streets surrounding Maxwell st. viewing the largest flea market we've ever seen. And I'd eat a 7 a.m. Polish Sausage sandwich, smothered with strong-smelling onions which is ritualistic for any flea market habitue.
