The aging process itself increases susceptibility to drug effects. Various normal changes in the way the body works conibute to this state of affairs. Take, for example, the problem of "invisible overdosing." The usual drug dosages recommended for adults are based on the assumption that the medication will be removed from the body fast enough to prevent an excess from building up in the body. With age, the organs that remove these medications (liver and kidneys) become less efficient, even in healthy individuals. Thus, a "standard" dosage schedule for the "average" adult liver or kidney often leads to an accumulation of the drug in an older person. Then, if the elderly patient suffers fatigue, confusion, or depression, the symptoms may be written off as evidence that he or she is merely "growing old." Whenever seeing a physician, seniors should always inform their doctor of medications they are
