## Oakton approves \$19 million budget

The Oakton Community College Board of Trustees officially approved by a 5 to 1 vote Tuesday night, the college's \$19,074,952 operating budget for 1984-85.

Before casting the sole negative vote, Trustee Diana Loveland said, "I cannot in good conscience vote for this budget."

Although Loveland offered no public explanation for her vote, she has on several occasions in the past chastised the ad-

ministration for wasteful spending. For example, during the last board meeting of August 28th, Loveland seriously questioned a new equipment budget request for the college's recreation program: six 17 foot aluminum canoes at a cost of \$4,000.

In a related move the board also adopted, by a 5 to 1 vote with Loveland dissenting, a resolution

The Maine Township Board Monday, Sept. 10, approved a \$1,597,500 tax levy for the fiscal year 1984-85.

The levy calls for \$750,000 for the General Town Fund, \$597,500 for the Road and Bridge Fund and \$250,000 for the General Assistance Fund.

The levy increased approximately 5.8 percent over last year's levy of \$1,510,242.

Most of the increase is reflected in the levy for general assistance due to increased demands for aid, according to Township Supervisor Paul K. Halverson.

"We made every effort to keep taxes down in this fund although our caseload rose dramatically over the last few years. We have pared administrative costs to the bare bones and they are lower now than they were four years ago despite the increases in caseload.

"Before increasing the levy we depleted all of our cash reserves

in the General Assistance Fund, but now we are forced to raise the levy to have enough cash on hand to meet the projected caseload for the coming year," Halverson said.

There is no increase in the tax levy for the General Town Fund, Halverson said. "In fact, last year we were able to abate that levy by \$50,000 when expenses did not meet our projections," he said.

The Road and Bridge Fund showed about a 4 percent increase over last year's levy of \$573,492 primarily due to the increased cost of materials.

The township has one of the largest unincorporated areas in the country, and we maintain 30 miles of roads. We put a great deal of emphasis on providing high quality maintenance in a cost-effective manner. In fact, our costs per mile for maintenance are one-third those of Cook County."

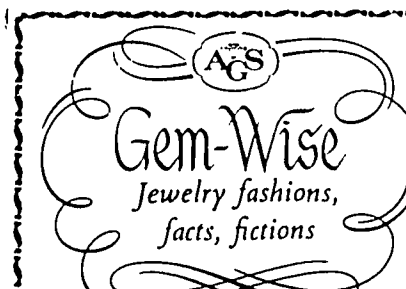
## Niles Employee Fitness Day

### GEM QUIZ

Q: A friend told me that 10 karat gold is more durable than 14K or 18K. If this is so, why is this not preferred?

A: 10K gold is harder than 14K or 18K because it has a greater percentage of alloy in it. Gold is relatively soft, so it must be mixed with base metals for strength. The more gold in the piece, the more precious and valuable it is, so fine gems are set in gold of higher karatage.

Q: My grandmother gave me her diamond to have reset into my engagement ring. I was told it was an Old Mine cut and could be recut to look more modern, but this would make it a smaller stone. It's two carats now. What do you suggest?

A: Recutting an Old Mine cut diamond to modern proportions does pare down the size somewhat, but the increase in beauty is worth it to most people. I show my customers a modern cut stone of the size the old cut stone would turn out to be so they can judge for themselves.

Q: What causes the star in a star sapphire?

A: This is caused by the reflection of light off intersecting needle-like inclusions in the sapphire. These cross at specific angles to form the star. When a gem cutter recognizes the potential for a star occur, he must cut it in a dome shape or the proper reflection will not occur. I'm always happy to talk about gems and jewelry. 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## Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption applications

Senior Citizens are now eligible for a Homestead Exemption during the year in which they turn 65. They no longer have to wait another year as was the situation with the Homestead Act prior to 1984. The Homestead Exemption has also been increased from \$1,500, which it was prior to January 1 and is now \$2,000. However, this benefit will not be reflected on a Tax Bill until the second installment is due in the summer of 1985. Therefore, the 1984 Homestead savings will

not be received until the 1984 Tax Bills are paid in full with the second installment in the year 1985.

The Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption provides tax relief by reducing the equalized assessed valuation of an eligible residence by \$2,000 which can result in a tax savings of as much as \$180. This savings is in the form of a deduction on the second installment of the real estate tax bill.

To be eligible for this exemption you must fulfill the following requirements:

1. You must be 65 years of age or older during the year for which you are applying.
2. As of January 1 of the year in question you must either own the property or have a lease or contract which makes you responsible for the real estate taxes.
3. As of January 1 of the year in question the property must be your principal residence.

If you wish to file in person at the Niles Township Assessor's Office, your documents indicating the following will be examined, copied and returned to you at the time you file. You must

### PROPERTY DISTRIBUTION IN ILLINOIS

Question: If I die, what will happen to my property of cash, bank and savings and loan accounts, insurance, stocks, bonds, real estate, and personal possessions such as auto, jewelry, heirlooms, etc.? Property in your name alone will go through probate. Question: What is probate? It is the orderly transmission of property to beneficiaries named in a Will, by the Executor whom you have nominated, or in cases where there is no Will, to heirs at law, by an Administrator appointed by the court. Question: What does an Executor or Administrator do? First he collects all the assets of the estate and then 1. Pays funeral expenses, 2. Pays all legal debts, 3. Pays taxes due on the estate, 4. Pays expenses of administering the estate (legal fees), 5. Makes distribution of property in accordance with the Will or laws. 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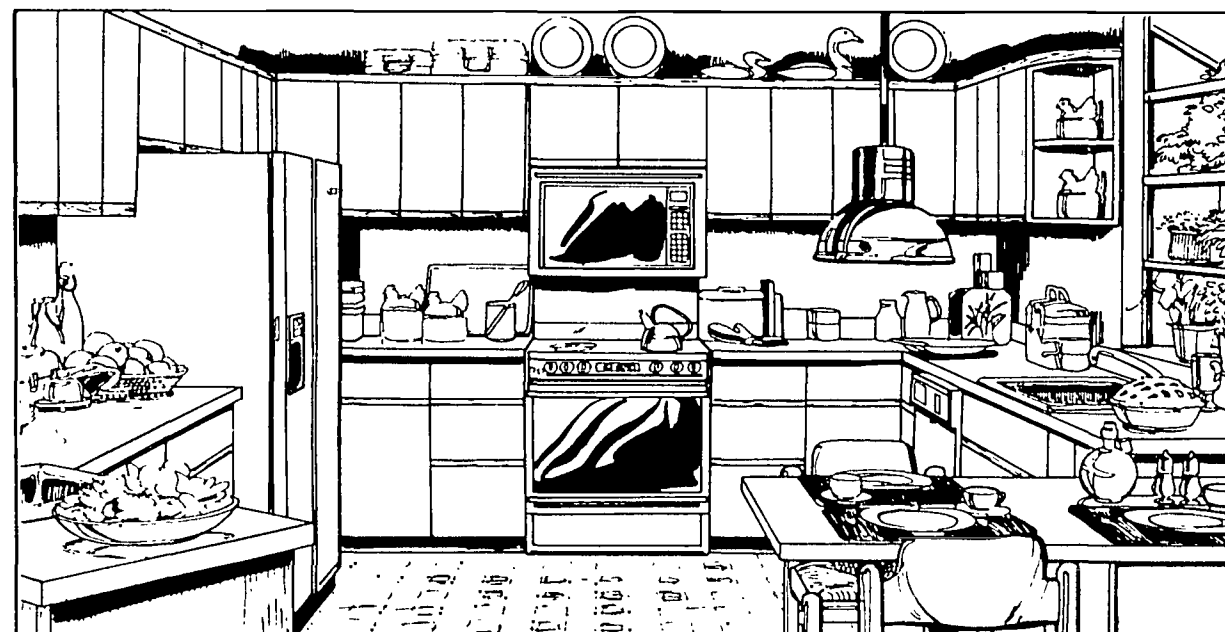

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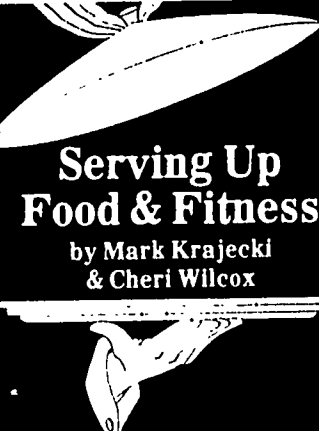

Serves 4  
5 medium carrots  
1 tablespoon butter or margarine  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg  
Dash salt  
1 tablespoon snipped parsley  
Quarter carrots. In medium covered saucepan cook carrots in a small amount of boiling, lightly salted water for 12 to 15 minutes or until just tender; drain and set aside. In the same saucepan melt the butter or margarine. Stir in lemon juice, nutmeg, and salt. Boil gently, uncovered, for 1 minute. Add carrots; toss gently. Turn into serving bowl; sprinkle with parsley.

### ITALIAN VEGETABLE SKILLET

Serves 5  
1/4 cup chopped onion  
1 clove garlic, minced  
2 tablespoons cooking oil  
1 medium zucchini, sliced  
1 cup frozen whole kernel corn, thawed  
1 small green pepper, cut into strips  
1/2 teaspoon dried basil, crushed  
1/2 teaspoon dried oregano, crushed  
1 small tomato, cut into wedges  
In a 10-inch skillet cook onion and garlic in oil until onion is tender. Stir in zucchini, corn, green pepper, basil, oregano, 1/4 teaspoon salt, and 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Cook over medium heat, stirring frequently, about 5 minutes or until zucchini is crisp-tender. Stir in tomato. Cover; cook about 1 minute more or until tomato is heated through. Serve immediately.

### STIR-FRIED TOMATOES AND PEPPERS

Serves 6  
1 teaspoon instant beef bouillon granules  
1/4 cup boiling water  
2 tablespoons soy sauce  
2 teaspoons cornstarch  
1/4 teaspoon ground ginger  
Several dashes of bottled hot pepper sauce  
1 tablespoon cooking oil  
6 green onions, bias sliced into 1-inch pieces  
1/2 cup bias sliced celery  
2 medium green peppers, cut into strips  
1 cup halved cherry tomatoes  
Dissolve bouillon granules in boiling water. Stir together soy sauce, cornstarch, ginger, and hot pepper sauce; stir in bouillon. Set aside.  
Preheat a wok or large skillet over high heat; add cooking oil. Add green onions and celery; stir-fry 2 minutes. Remove vegetables. Add green pepper to wok or skillet; stir-fry 2 minutes. Stir soy mixture; stir into green pepper. Cook and stir until thickened and bubbly. Stir in green onions, celery, and tomatoes. Cover and cook for 1 minute. Serve immediately.

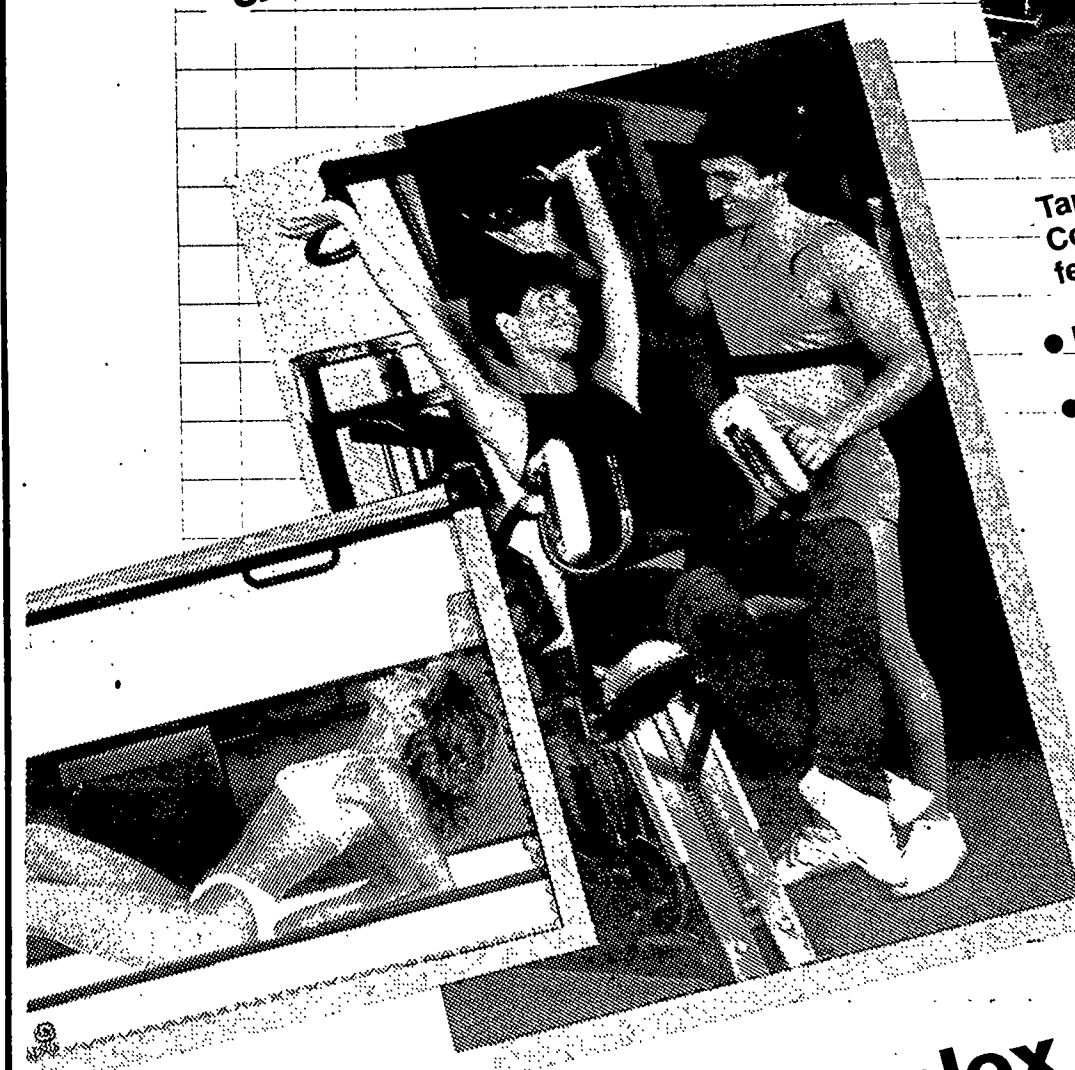

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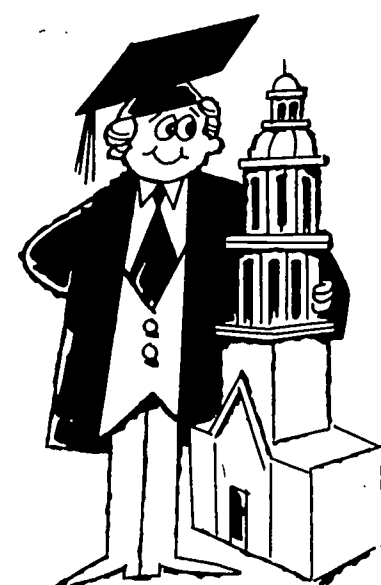

**School speed zone safety hints**

The beginning of a new school year is a good time for Illinois motorists to take a short refresher course on the law regarding school speed zones.

Illinois law states that the 20 mph limit is in effect on school days between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. when children are present and signs are posted.

However, you should slow down anytime you see a school sign, since classes may be held at different hours and many activities are held at night or on the weekend.

School signs are shaped like an old schoolhouse. When school grounds are next to the roadway or a school crossing is ahead, a school area sign is posted. A school crossing sign is at the crosswalk and is also used if there are school crossing signals.

Adult crossing guards, police officers and auxiliary police assist students at many crossings. Student safety patrol leaders frequently work with the crossing guards.

Be especially alert for small children, who are difficult to see and unpredictable in their actions. They may not heed the crossing guard and end up in the street in front of you.

## CMDC adds breast cancer screening program

The Chicago Medical and Dental Center, 6000 W. Touhy ave. in Chicago, has added a breast cancer screening program to the wide spectrum of programs currently implemented. The screening consists of: patient and family history; a breast examination by a physician; and mammography.

Mammography is the most sensitive diagnostic aid for the detection of breast cancer. It is an x-ray examination of the breast, and unlike other x-ray studies, shows the internal structure of the soft tissues of the

body. The value of mammography lies in its ability to detect irregularities in the breast when they are still very small, and therefore able to be more successfully treated. Like other x-ray examinations, mammography is a simple and painless procedure. It is conducted by specially trained and licensed x-ray technologists.

The most commonly used method for mammography is xeroradiography, which was developed by Xerox Corporation. Xeroradiography is now the most widely accepted method for the

early detection of breast cancer. It is painless, effective, and can greatly contribute to a patient's peace of mind.

The recently revised American Cancer Society guidelines for mammography are identical to those published by the American College of Radiology in 1982 and do not differ materially from those published in 1976. They all recommend the following:

**For Symptomatic Women:** Mammography is an essential part of the diagnostic work-up in this group of patients, not only to assess the area in question, but also to detect non-palpable lesions in the same and/or opposite breast, as well as for comparison and more accurate assessment with follow-up studies.

**For Asymptomatic Women:** (those without symptoms): All women should be taught proper breast self-examination techniques by the age of 20 and

should have an annual examination of the breasts by a physician after age 35. The first, or baseline, mammograms should be obtained by age 40. An earlier age is preferable when there is a personal or family history of breast cancer or a history of pre-menopausal breast cancer in the patient's mother and/or sisters. Subsequent mammographic examinations should be performed at 1 to 2 year intervals, determined by the combined analysis of physical and previous mammographic findings or other risk factors, or sooner, if medically indicated.

Mammography has made major contributions in the very early detection and diagnosis of breast cancer, when it is most curable. It is the only reliable means of detecting non-palpable cancers and can detect cancers so small that they may be curable by less operations than mastectomy.

The Chicago Medical and Dental Center is a facility pledged to fight cancer. We recognize that as far as the individual is concerned, the only way to fight it is to find it. The medical center's Director, Dr. Mitchell V. Kaminiski, Jr., is a member of the Prevention Committee of the Illinois Division of the American Cancer Society.

The Chicago Medical and Dental Center, located on Chicago's Northwest side (6000 W. Touhy ave.), is staffed by board-certified specialists who offer the additional service of Papanicolaou (PAP) smears, if desired, to patients coming to their facility for mammography screening.

The Chicago Medical and Dental Center is open to conduct breast cancer screening examinations by appointment Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. and on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

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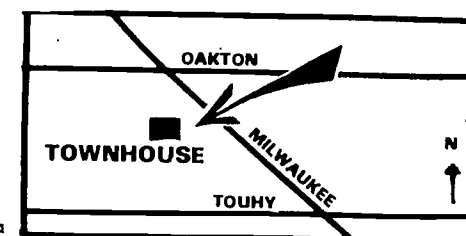
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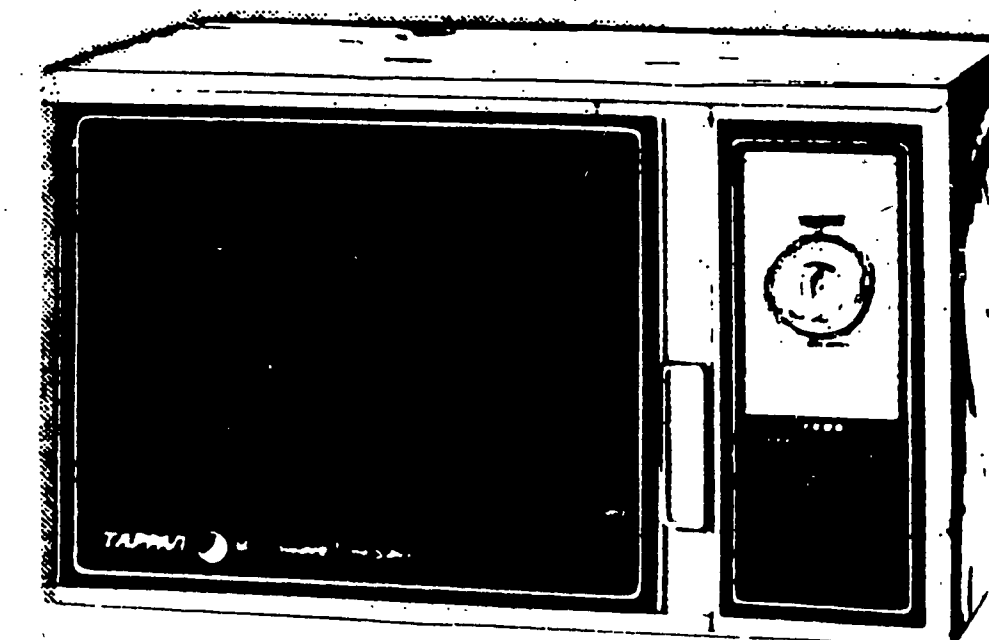

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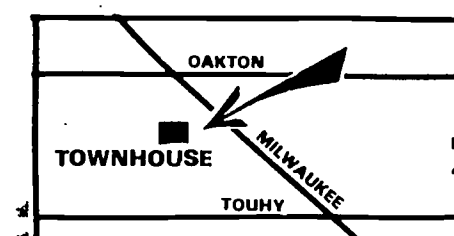

### DENTAL DIGEST BY

GARY M. LAMANTIA, D.D.S.

People who have worn full dentures for a long time often experience increasing looseness of the lower denture. Many times this is because the supporting bone is resorbed by the body.

Research has led to the development of a new material that can be used to replace this missing bone in select cases. This material is composed of hydroxyapatite crystals, which are similar in composition to bone. The process, called ridge augmentation, is relatively easy to perform.

The material is injected under the soft tissue of the existing ridge, increasing its size. Once in place it forms a framework for the formation of new bone. If successful, the patient now has a solid base upon which a new, well fitting denture can be constructed.

The Library Committee supervises the Library of Congress and the Congressional Research Service, an agency which does research work for Members of Congress.

The Administration Committee is also responsible for the operations of the Federal Election Commission, and in disputed House races must determine the winner.

Annunzio, a 20 year veteran of the House, feels that the job of Chairman of the Committee is equal to running a major corporation.

Annunzio now becomes one of 22 Members to head a major Committee, and many on Capitol Hill believe that House Administration is the most important Committee of the House. In accepting the job of Chairman, Annunzio promised to make the Committee operate in a way to serve the 435 Members of the House.

nor the World Series. Last  
January a new contract was  
written between the Major  
League baseball franchises  
and the T.V. networks which  
spells out who does the broad-  
casting during these series.

Sun-Times columnist Irv  
Kupcinet suggested Monday  
somebody up there should  
allow one local broadcaster to  
be included in these broadcasts.  
Kupcinet is rooting for Harry  
Carey's dulcet sounds to be  
heard across the airwaves  
during the post-season play.  
His sounds would include his  
leading the 7th inning "Take  
Me Out To The Ballgame"  
cacophony, a musical treat  
which falls just north of a  
chicken scratching a black-  
board.

Our lone experience with  
World Series tickets dates  
back to 1959 when Chicago's  
real major league team won  
the American League pen-  
nant. Bill Vecek set up a lot-  
tery system where a propor-  
tion of series tickets would go  
to Sox fans in each area of  
Chicago. We sent in a  
couple of hundred dollars worth  
of ticket applications and  
sent them from friends and  
relatives whose addresses  
were in every area of Chicago.  
A certified check had to go  
along with each application  
and our bank account dwindled  
dangerously low as we  
sought out tickets. While we  
weren't among the successful  
selectees we lucked out the day  
before the first game. While  
receiving advertising from  
Rainbow Foods on  
Waukegan Road (which was  
then next to Fankau Drive),  
Frank, the butcher, told me to  
meet a guy in a tavern in  
Chicago and he'd supply me  
with tickets. The guy turned  
out to be an employee of the  
Tribune and he was alone at  
the end of the bar at this  
rather seedy tavern. When I  
asked for the tickets he asked  
me how many I wanted and  
only charged me the regular  
price. But, in handling me the  
tickets, he placed on the bar a  
stack of tickets about three in-

ches high. I estimated he  
may have had over 200 tickets.

Frank and I were sitting in  
the upper deck in right field  
the next day, the first game of  
the 1959 World Series when  
Big Klu (Kluzewski) smashed  
two gigantic homers into the  
right field stands near where  
we were sitting. It was a  
golden day for a Sox fan who  
had waited 25 years for this  
moment.

You Cubbie fans may have  
your "moment in the sun"  
though it's more likely your  
"moment" will be in front of a  
television screen. But if  
you're a guy-gal who just has  
to be in the ballpark then get  
aggressive. There isn't a  
major event in entertainment,  
whether in music or sports,  
where tickets aren't available.

As a returning veteran I  
helped "work" my through  
school by hustling tickets  
before football and basketball  
games in Champaign.

The first football game of  
the post-war era downstate  
was between Notre Dame and  
Illinois. Notre Dame went un-  
defeated and was ranked  
number one in the country and  
Illinois went onto the Rose  
Bowl and zonked U.C.L.A. 49-  
7. It was the "game of the  
year" between the Irish and  
Illini with each team having  
three quarterbacks who  
wound up playing professional  
football (Lujack, Ratterman,  
Perry Moss, etc.). It was a  
classic game and tickets were  
at a premium. But we had  
plenty of tickets for the game,  
even though it was sold out  
weeks before the season  
began.

We mention this little bit of  
fluff just to let you Cub fans  
know if you want to get  
tickets, they are available.  
There'll be some guy like our  
Tribune man, who'll get his  
hands on a stack of tickets and  
then won't know how to get rid  
of them. We've seen it happen  
all through the years. It's a  
part of hustling Americana...  
and certainly, Hustling  
Chicago... City of Clout.

had extinguished a fire in an em-  
ployee lounge located in a rear  
stock room area. Michalsen said  
the fire had started in the vicinity  
of a couch leading to speculation  
it may have been the result of a lit  
cigarette being left near the area.

Michalsen said the building  
was empty at the time of the fire.  
Michalsen credited Niles' strict  
fire codes which require the ad-  
vanced sprinkler system in the  
Jewel Foods. When the tempera-  
ture in the employee lounge  
rose to 165 degrees the sprinkler  
head was activated. Michalsen  
estimated the fire was ex-  
tinguished in thirty seconds.

Since Niles requires this  
sophisticated fire prevention  
system the only sprinkler head  
activated was the one im-  
mediately over the fire resulting  
in a minimum of water damage.

Firemen arrived at the fire  
four minutes after receiving the  
alarm, however, as the fire was  
already extinguished, they only  
had to set up extension ladders to eject  
the smoke from the building.

Michalsen said a more serious  
fire was prevented due to the  
"foresight of the Fire Prevention  
Bureau and the insight of the  
Board of Trustees in passing the  
fire ordinances."

setting local tax levies for 1984;  
\$7,595,000 will be levied for the  
educational fund, while \$2,359,000  
will be levied for the college's  
building fund.

According to David Hilquist,  
Vice President for Business and  
Finance, 50.3 per cent of Oakton's  
total revenue will come from  
local property taxes, 17.2 per cent  
from the State and 16.7 per cent  
from student tuition and fees.

In other business, the board  
approved the following pur-  
chases:

...\$9,639.65 to install a closed cir-  
cuit television system in the  
college's classrooms.

...\$28,678.17 for a year's supply of  
office supplies.

Members of the finance com-  
mittee, who reviewed the levy,  
determined about \$89,400 more  
would be needed to balance the  
budget. Board members in-  
dicated this will be done.

Several budgetary measures,  
recommended by the Planning  
and Development committee,  
were approved by the board.  
Subject to any adjustments by  
the auditor, there will be trans-  
fers of \$5,000 for capital im-  
provements to the corporate  
reserve fund; \$75,000 for capital

and Sites fund; and \$136,587 to the  
Capital Improvements fund.

In State, grants, the District  
will receive about \$20,913. Other  
sources of revenue will include

be adjusted according to the  
varying number of patrons served.

provoked disagreement among  
trustees regarding the newly-  
formed "Friends of the Niles  
Library Branch." Concerns  
centered on a library "Friends"  
group being dedicated to the  
welfare of the entire District or a  
portion of the District as well as  
wording on the request which im-  
plied possible disservice to the  
Branch.

Representing the group was  
Rita Breitbart, former Library  
trustee. She said the group's goal  
was to bring together persons  
using the Branch library who are  
concerned with Branch services.

She told The Bugle the Branch  
library receives about one-ninth  
of funds allocated for materials  
but has about one-half the  
District's circulation. Breitbart  
said that, at a recent budget  
hearing, Board members refused  
to increase Branch allocations  
from one-ninth its present fun-  
ding to one-fifth, or from about  
\$12,000 to \$20,000.

An employee request for a six-  
month leave of absence was  
granted after a short executive  
session. Granted was the em-  
ployee's request to have all ac-  
cumulated sick-leave and  
vacation applied to that time.

Denied was a request for the  
library to pay the employee's in-  
surance also during that time.

After an update on construction  
of the library addition, Board  
members approved filling in the  
parking lot and landscaping  
provided barriers be set up to  
prevent damage.

Also, Board members com-  
mended Mayor Blase and Village  
of Niles officials for granting a  
waiver in regard to installation of  
a sprinkler system for the new  
addition.

A patient coming to READYCARE with an illness or injury will be evaluated immediately by a triage nurse and treated in a room especially designed for READYCARE patients. The average READYCARE patient will be seen, treated and released in 45 minutes. Under the new program, the combined hospital and physician fee can be as low as \$25.

Round-the-clock trauma specialists and skilled professional back-up from the St. Francis Hospital staff of physicians are available in case the illness or injury is of a more serious nature than the patients first assumed.

St. Francis Hospital emergency facilities have been recently remodeled and expanded to accommodate READYCARE. The nursing station is equipped with remote cardiac monitors that report a patient's progress. the survey, as to which the title insurer commits to extend insurance in the manner specified below.

## 6. EXCEPTIONS TO POLICY

If the title commitment policy or plat of survey discloses either unpermitted exceptions or survey matters that render the title unmarketable, SELLER shall have thirty (30) days from the date of delivery thereof to have the exceptions removed from the commitment or to correct such survey defects or to have the title insurer commit to insure against loss or damage that may be occasioned by such exceptions or survey defects.
