Niles village board approved three more restaurants Tuesday night bringing the total eateries in the village to approximately 100 sit-down restaurants, cafeterias and carry-out fast order eateries.

D'Lite of America restaurant received approval for a location at 9631 Milwaukee ave. in the

Venture shopping center. The restaurant will emphasize 25% to 40% fewer calorie meals as its main attraction. Representatives from the home corporation said a downtown Wabash Ave. location and a Rolling Meadows restaurant are in its immediate plans.

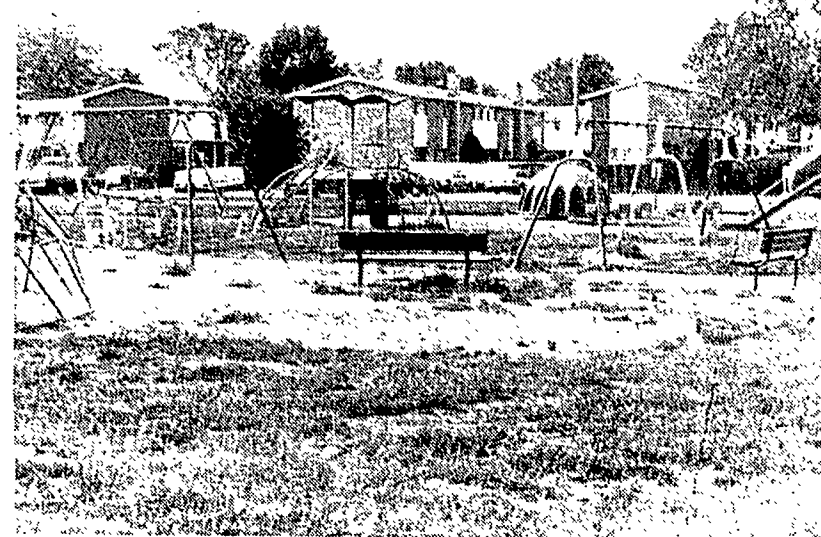
## Courtland Park receives a facelift

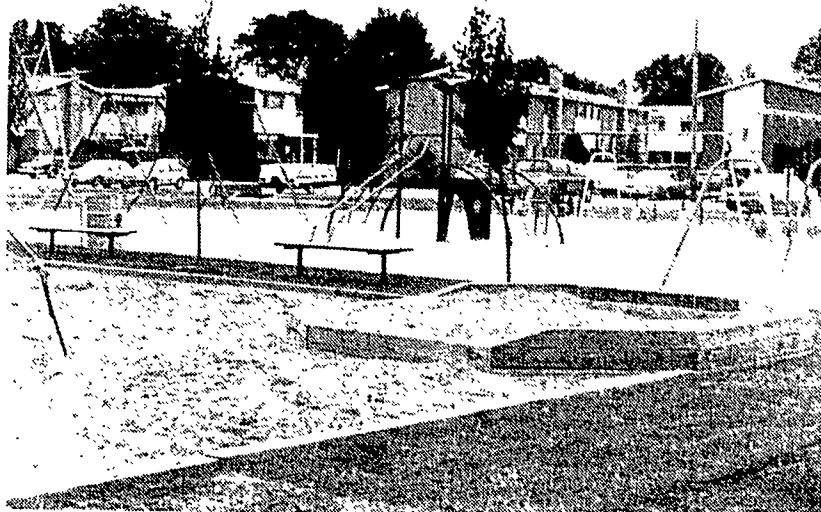

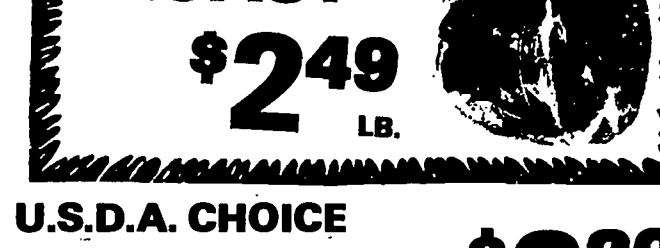

## FOOT NOTES

By Dr. James Elipaz

Podiatrists call it onychomycosis and it sounds really deadly. The textbooks call it Fungus Nail and that makes it sound really yucky. What this common foot ailment is, is nothing but an abnormally thickened toenail caused by a fungus infection.

While the thickened nail is, of course, cosmetically unattractive, the real problem with this type of ailment is the excessive pressure it puts on the toes when shoes are worn. Frequently we see patients with thickened nails who have sore and ulcerated toe tips caused by the downward pressure of the shoe on the nail.

Treatment of a fungus nail is through the surgical removal of the nail. While this used to be an uncomfortable procedure, it is now routinely performed in our offices with the latest in surgical technology, a carbon dioxide laser. Under local anesthetic, the nail is removed painlessly and quickly.

With the new laser equipment, this procedure not only cuts healing time in half but also sterilizes the nail bed, preventing a recurrence of the problem.

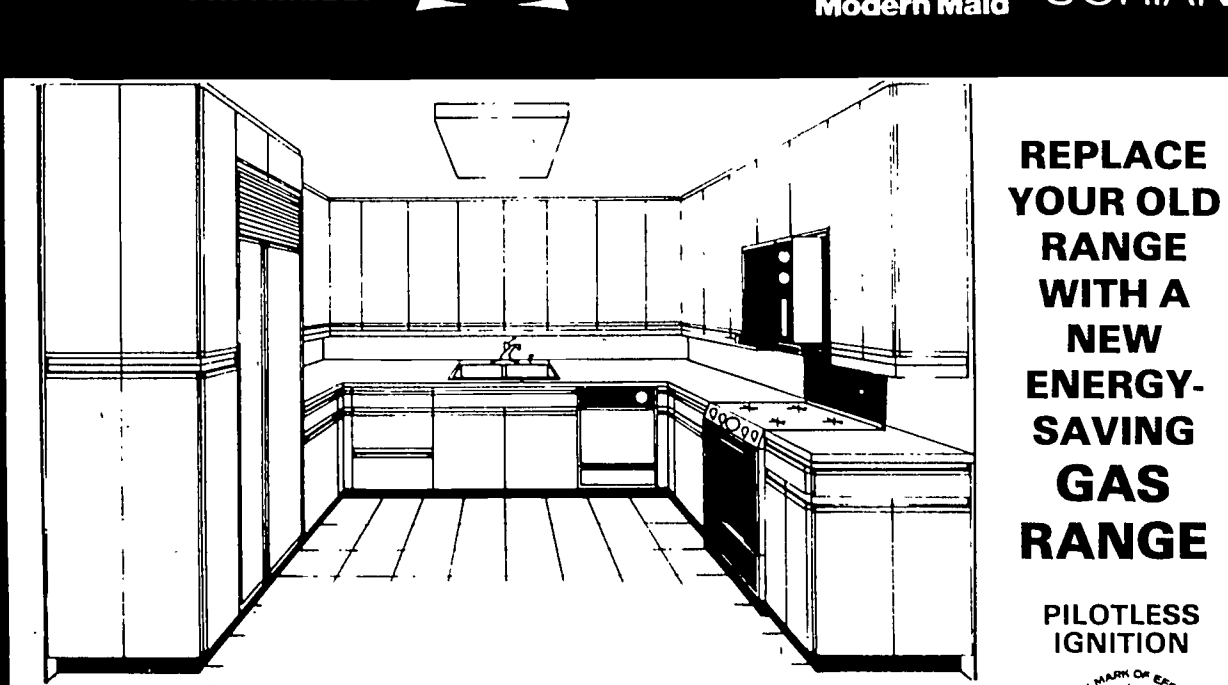

## CMDC adds breast cancer screening program

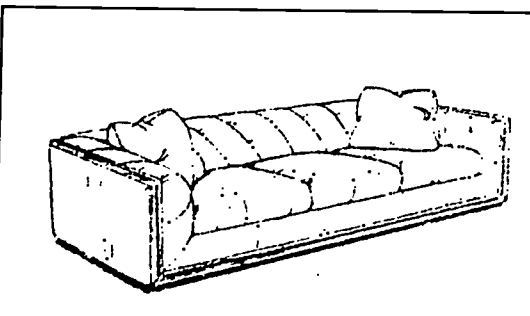

With many people cutting down on the red meat in their diet, fish has risen in popularity as an alternative in dining. Fish is a lean, high protein source and there are so many good eating varieties that are quite easy to purchase, one doesn't tire easily of eating it.

You should purchase your fish as fresh as possible. The skin should be shiny and supple.

**Easy Baked Red Snapper**

4 Servings  
1 pound red snapper fillets  
1 cup tomatoes, peeled, & chopped  
1 cup green pepper strips  
1 cup onion, chopped  
Garlic powder  
Salt and pepper  
Margarine

Rinse and pat dry the fish. Rub garlic powder into the flesh, salt and pepper. Place in a small baking dish. Dot with margarine. Mix the vegetables together and place on top of the fish. Cover dish and bake for 20-25 minutes at 350° or until desired doneness.

**Flounder Provencale**

6 Servings  
6 Flounder fillets (1 1/2 pounds).  
4 Tablespoons margarine  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
2 cloves garlic minced  
1-1 pound can of tomatoes, cut up and use juice  
1/2 cup mushrooms, chopped  
1/4 cup of water  
Salt and pepper

Rinse and pat dry fish fillets. Dot with 1 tablespoon of the margarine and season with salt and pepper. Roll up and secure with wooden picks. Set aside. The eyes should be normal and clear. If the fish is already cut up, the flesh should be fairly firm, and it shouldn't have a strong fishy odor.

Packaged frozen fish can be a good substitute when fresh isn't available. The trick to keeping its freshness is not in the freezing process but in the defrosting. To defrost, place fish in cold water for a couple of hours. Never leave fish to defrost in the open air!

The simplest way to prepare most types of fish is to bake fillets or steaks with a little butter/margarine and season with herbs. Fish can be seasoned well with marjoram, savory, tarragon, or thyme. Dill is extremely nice with salmon or tuna. Or, if you want to try something different, the recipes that follow will show you many different ways fish can be prepared from simple to elegant.

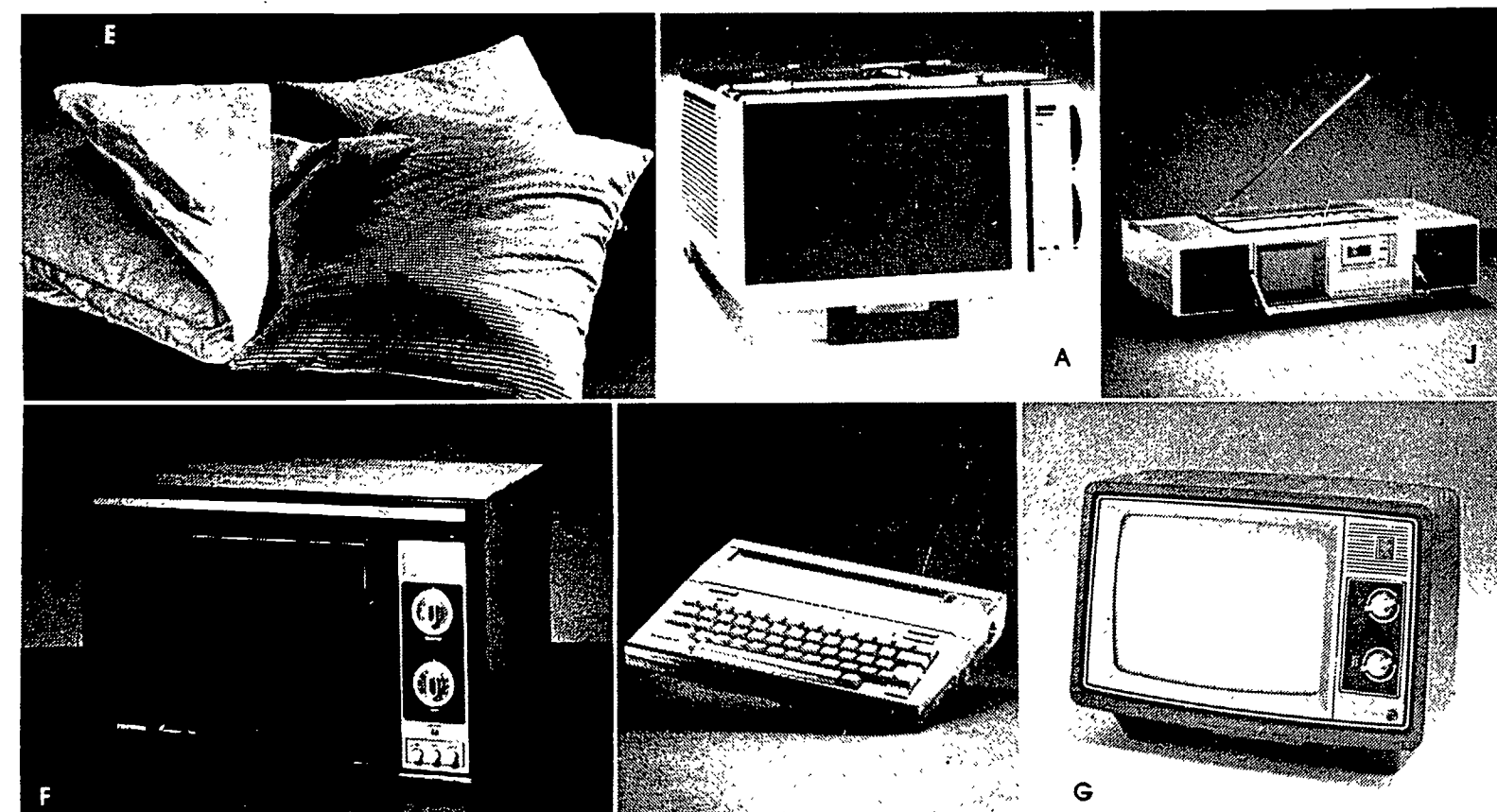

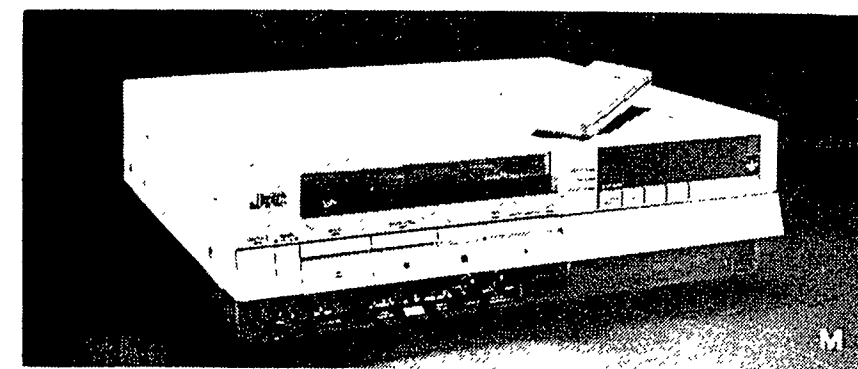

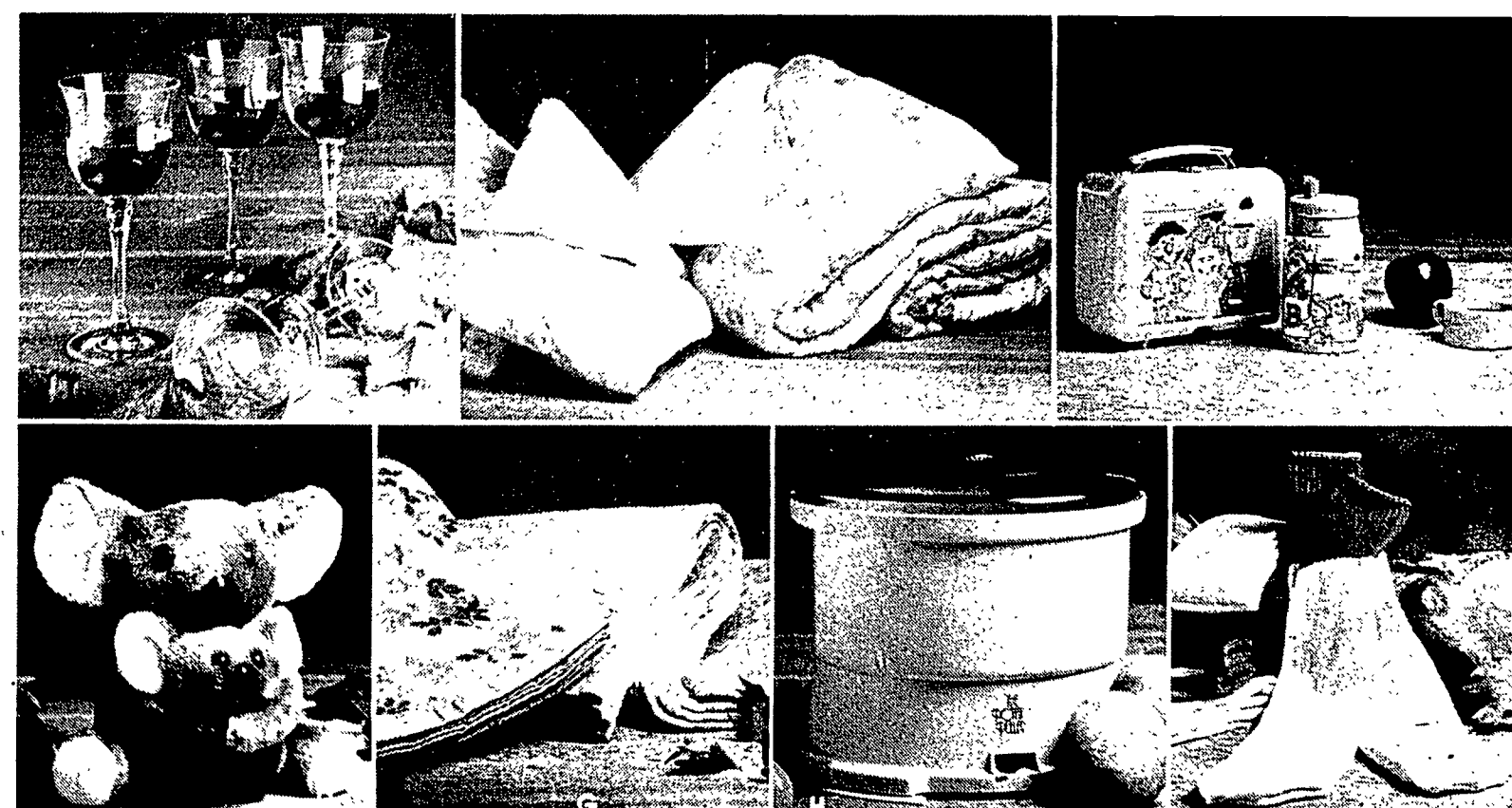

### Oakton runners win Skyway Championship

The Oakton Community College cross country team easily defeated five other community college cross country teams September 10 to win the Skyway Conference cross country title.

Oakton was led by Freshman Tony Vodicka, who ran away from the opposition to win by more than 30 seconds. OCC had four runners in the top seven. Sophomore Thomas Polak (Maine East) placed second, freshman Tony Paul (Maine West) placed fourth, and sophomore Jim Rubey (Maine East) finished seventh. ### Illinois business throws support to Tucker

Mannie H. Tucker, candidate for the Illinois House of Representatives, 56th District, today announced that the Illinois State Chamber of Commerce (ISCC) and the Illinois Manufacturer's Association (IMA) both declared their support for him in the past week. These are two of the largest organizations representing business state wide. Each represents hundreds of small businesses throughout Illinois.

In a statement issued to Tucker the ISCC said "Since joining the Illinois House of Representatives in the 7th session of the General Assembly, Rep. Aaron Jaffe (Tucker's opponent) has constantly compiled one of the worst voting records with respect to business."

The IMA said "this year they were placing their emphasis on candidates who were committed to creating new jobs in Illinois."

Commenting on the support and large donations to his campaign by each of the organizations Tucker said, "I am grateful for their support. These contributions represent an investment by literally thousands of businesses state wide and indicate the merit of my proposals to improve the business climate in Illinois and bring new jobs to the state as opposed to my opponent's record of hampering

business and supporting legislation which forces businesses to leave Illinois such as his voting for SB 1070 and introducing legislation to destroy a whole industry, state wide."

Tucker was referring to the 1983 Senate Bill which added \$20 million annually to the cost of doing business in Illinois and Rep. Jaffe's HB 319 which is commonly known as the "Anti Cottage Industry and Home Work Bill."

Further commenting on the support Tucker continued: "Business people recognize it takes more than legislation sympathetic to business to bring new industry to Illinois. Reasonable tax rates, both personal and corporate, safe streets and communities, quality education and the general quality of life are all factors in the formula used by a company when deciding where to move. Mr. Jaffe's philosophy of Big Brother, authoritarian government, high spending, sympathy toward criminals, permissiveness toward drug and alcohol use, all cause businesses interested in relocating to shy away from Illinois. His record on these is an issue in the campaign."

Tucker indicated he believes these two contributions will be extremely helpful in his general fund raising effort.

### Pullen receives high rating from State Chamber

State Rep. Penny Pullen (R-Park Ridge) has received a near-perfect score for the 1984 legislative session from the political action arm of the Illinois State Chamber of Commerce.

Illinois Political Action Committee (IPAC) announced last week its annual ratings of state representatives and senators for the 1984 session, citing Rep. Pullen for voting with the chamber position on 8 out of 9 key issues tracked by the state business group.

Singled out as key issues by IPAC were votes on workers' compensation reform, health care cost containment, attorneys'

venue shopping and health insurance fraud.

The ratings were based on votes that presented "an opportunity for a senator or representative to stand up and be counted as a friend of business," said Rep. Pullen, who in the Illinois House Republican leadership team.

Rep. Pullen's score for the 1984 legislative session gives her a combined score of 26 out of 28 for the two years of the 83rd General Assembly. She was one of 2 members in the 118-member House to receive an 83.3 percent rating for 1984.

### Jaffe's parentage act signed into law

Rep. Aaron Jaffe (D-Skokie) announced that the Uniform Parentage Act sponsored by him has been signed into law.

This legislation, which repeals the former archaic Illinois Paternal Act found unconstitutional by the Supreme Court, establishes and defines the legal relationships between a child's natural and adoptive parents, provides for guidelines and presumptions concerning who is the legal father of a child, and sets for child support obligations for individuals who have fathered children.

Jaffe explained, "One of the most important benefits of this legislation is that it will now be easier and no longer a criminal offense for men to acknowledge parentage and take responsibility for the support of their children."

This could lighten the public burden of costly support of many children in Illinois."

### Daley-Simon rally

Chicago Democrats will rally around their state and Cook County standard-bearers, U.S. Rep. Paul Simon (D-IL) and State's Attorney Richard Daley, at an old-fashioned, roof-raising rally on Thursday, Oct. 11 at 7 p.m. at the Aragon Ballroom, Lawrence at Broadway.

The rally will celebrate the promises to be a very successful voter registration drive, which will culminate in In-Precinct Registration Day October 9.

### Kustra bill to cut welfare rolls approved

A bill sponsored by State Sen. Bob Kustra to help reduce the welfare rolls has been signed into law by Gov. James Thompson.

The legislation (HB 3221) provides funds to help pay job search expenses for welfare recipients and other unemployed persons and to subsidize start-up expenses for newly employed persons who have not yet received paychecks.

These funds will be used in conjunction with the state's workforce program - Work Incentive (WIN). The money also can be used to pay transportation expenses of job training program participants and to pay benefits to persons whose unemployment is a result of a natural disaster or foreign trade displacement.

The legislation also prohibits recipients from obtaining unemployment benefits while participating in a job training program and receiving welfare benefits.

### Kustra opens campaign office

State Sen. Bob Kustra (R-28th) has announced the opening of his campaign headquarters located at 36 Main st., Park Ridge.

First elected to the Senate two years ago, Kustra is seeking reelection to a four-year term. After completing his first year in the Senate, Kustra was named Best Freshman Senator for 1983.

Kustra served a two-year term as a state representative prior to his election to the Senate. He also was elected Best Freshman Representative for 1981 after his first year in the Illinois House.

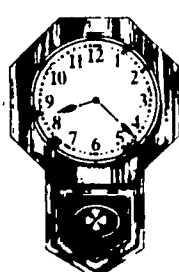

the survey, as to which the title insurer commits to extend insurance in the manner specified below.

## 6. EXCEPTIONS TO POLICY

They wear tee shirts, work for a living and ring lots of doorbells before election time. Cub fans drive fancy cars, head for posh restaurants after the game and tell you their kids all live in condominiums. Sox fans stop for a hot dog after the game, peel into the neighborhood tavern for one more brew and know more about the game than Len La Russas. Cub fans talk about lights in Wrigley Field as if a magicked door will arrive the night they first go on. Sox fans are more concerned about world events and study closely who they'll vote for before voting for their precinct captain's candidate. Cub fans pontificate. They can tell you about Somoza and Sri Lanka and who's on first in Lebanon but they have to ask an usher where the Men's Room is. Sox fans' beer habits have been ensconced for so many years they can tell you without a micro-second's delay how long it takes from their seat to the nearest latrine. Cub fans eat pizza and nachos with cheese between innings. Sox fans bring hot dogs in from the outside, often wearing a touch of brown mustard on their tee shirts. Cub fans wear Sox slickers and Cub baseball caps and have the Cubs logo on pillows, pennants and other circus-like toys. District 63 approved leasing 7,872 square feet in Melzer to the Ryan Foundation which, reportedly, will be one of three such facilities in the United States.

Annual rent for the space is to be \$33,219. Approval was given at a regular board meeting September 25 in the Educational Service Center, 10150 Dee rd., Des Plaines.

According to a therapist present at the meeting, the clinic will have a target population of youngsters 0-16 years of age. Children to be serviced will include those with neuro-sensory dysfunctions and cognitive difficulty.

The therapist also said those needing therapy on the north side of Chicago and northwest suburbs presently travel a long distance for similar services and the Melzer location will be of benefit to them.

In action on another lease, board members renewed a contract with Maine-Oakton-Niles Adult Continuing Education Programs at a yearly cost of \$18,890 for space in Ballard School.

Board members voted to table action on board "policy" regarding employee suspension pending the attorney's clarification. In a related matter, board

members approved an amendment that "No teacher shall be suspended without good cause" which is to be included in the collective bargaining agreement between the board and East Maine Education Assn. This wording must be included in a contract for grievance procedures to be entered into due process. The same wording, if included only in board "policy", only requires that grievance procedures go through court.

In a report to board members, the board attorney said access, or a walkway, to a lot in back of Wilson School was dedicated to the Village of Niles. The walkway provides residents of the area with easy access to a park in Glenview.

Also, the attorney said any buyer of Wilson School could construct a fence which would obstruct access across the walkway. Bids for purchase of the school are now being accepted.

Board members agreed that both the Village of Niles and Park District should be notified of the situation. According to board agreement, specifications already being bid on cannot be changed. However, board members agreed mention of the walkway could be made during negotiations.

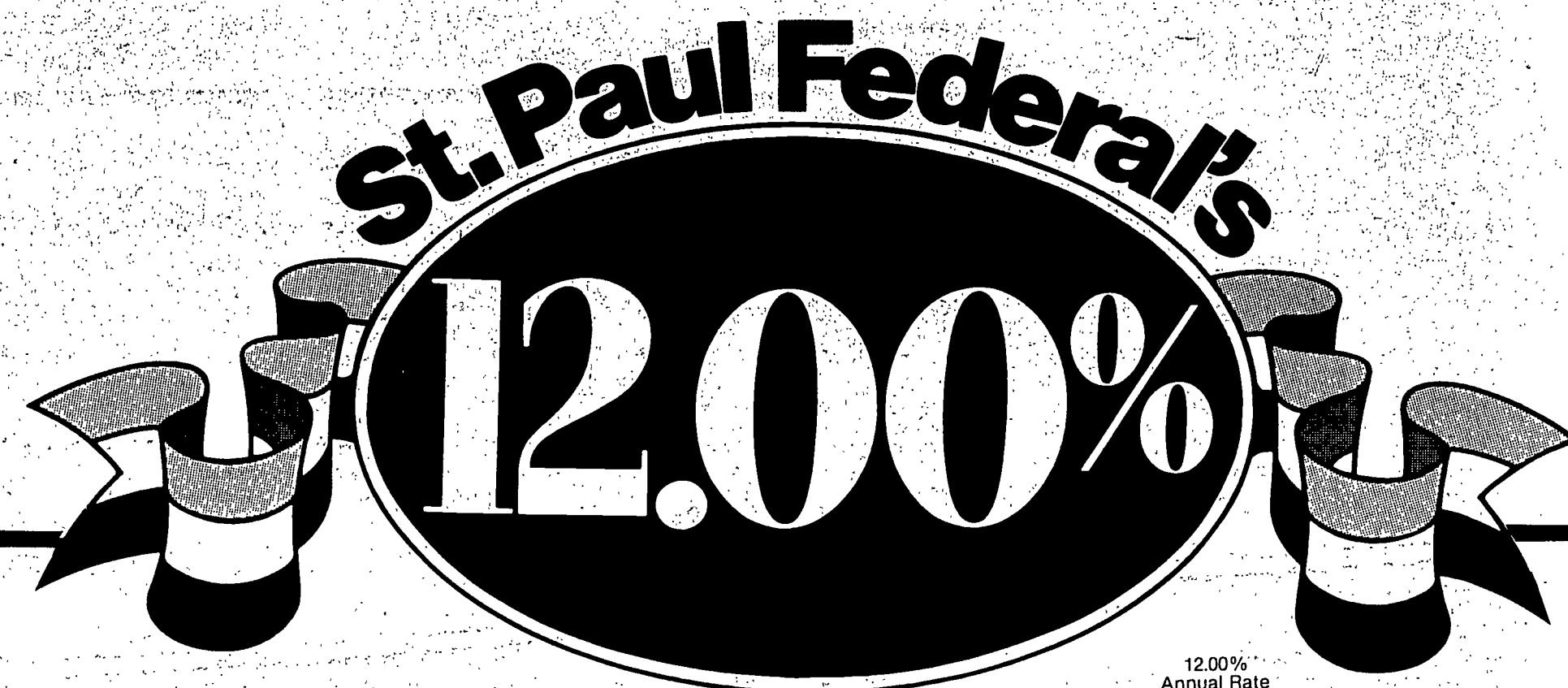

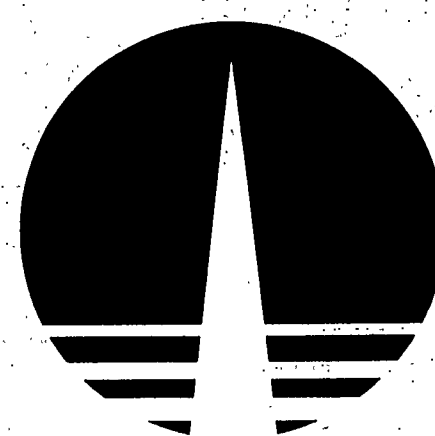
