Father, son jailed in pizza bombings

The owner of two Nancy's Pizza franchises and his son were sentenced to six and two years in prison, respectively, for ordering the bombings of competing Nancy's Pizza places.

U.S. District Judge Susan Getzendanner said the two men also will be ordered to pay restitution "in excess of \$500,000" as soon as the exact cost of damages is assessed.

Getzendanner sentenced Biagio Cirrincione, 53, of Norridge, to three six-year prison terms; to be served concurrently, for masterminding the bombings.

Bombs twice destroyed Nancy's Pizza Restaurant at 8706 Golf rd., Des Plaines, and once damaged another Nancy's restaurant at 2930 N. Broad-

Village ok's suit against postal service

Niles' never-ending battle with the Postal Service now heads for the federal court as the result of action taken at Tuesday night's village board meeting.

Niles trustee Ang Marcheschi, who has been battling with postal authorities for 20 years, said a request was denied forbidding Niles' mail delivered at the nor-

thwest end of town to be addressed with the Niles village name and the 60016 zip code. This area is within the Des Plaines postal district and has created havoc for Niles in the past. Marcheschi sent letters to the Terrace Square apartment complex in the Dee-Golf Road area

A Niles public works building plaque or bust honoring former director Ed Bacher is likely to be approved at the November Niles village board meeting.

Niles village president Nick Blase told The Bugle Tuesday he expects the board to approve some type of honorary in November.

At a September 17 meeting the newly-formed Niles Dedication-Memorial Committee sent its recommendation of Bacher to the village board. Chairman (Judge) Jim Geocaris said Bacher was "deserving of this honor". He said some type of a bronze plaque on the building with a relief or a separate bust of Bacher was recommended. Geocaris said the committee agreed some type of likeness of Bacher would be placed below the script or lettering which would describe his contribution to Niles.

Geocaris said the committee received a biography of Bacher as well as a petition with 1,600 signatures recommending the new public works building be named in honor of Bacher.

While village president Nick Blase was optimistic about the board approving the commit-

Maine Township honors citizens for youth services

Nearly 100 people were honored Thursday, Oct. 11, for their services to community youth at a recognition celebration sponsored by Maine Township.

The recognition ceremony capped a week of events highlighting youth services during Maine Township's Youth Awareness Week.

Township Supervisor Paul K. Halverson presented certificates to the honorees and commended them for their "dedication" to services designed to improve life experiences of young people and to prepare them for future leadership roles.

26-year-old victim not expected to survive

Drunk driver arrested following hit and run

Drunk driver injures woman

A drunk driver, who had an open beer bottle in his car, drove through a red light in Niles and crashed into a Glenview car sending its driver to the hospital on Friday, October 19.

The drunk driver, a 29-year-old Niles man was, according to police, heading south on Milwaukee ave. at 4:45 p.m. The driver proceeded through a red light at the intersection of Golf rd. and Milwaukee ave. and slammed into a car driven by a 17-year-old Glenview woman.

Arriving on the scene Niles police said they smelled a strong odor of alcohol on the man's breath and observed he had a difficult time walking.

The woman was taken to Lutheran General Hospital by Niles Fire Department Paramedics where she was treated and later released.

Police report finding an open 32 ounce beer bottle inside the Niles car.

After being taken to the Niles Police Department, the offender was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, disobeying a red light and transporting open liquor.

He was assigned a November court date and released after posting a \$100 bond.

A 26-year-old Polish immigrant is not expected to live after being struck by a hit and run driver as he walked along a Niles road on Saturday, Oct. 20.

The driver has since been arrested and charged with drunk driving.

The immigrant, John Kosiba with addresses in Chicago and Lake Zurich, is being kept alive by a ventilator at Lutheran General Hospital.

The driver, Eugene Case, 56, who lives at a Niles motel, is expected to be charged with reckless homicide if Kosiba dies.

Niles Police were notified at 5:45 a.m. that a pedestrian had been struck by a driver on Touhy Ave. west of Central. Arriving on the scene police found Kosiba face down in the mud along Touhy Ave. He had suffered head trauma and a fractured right leg, according to hospital officials.

A witness to the accident, who resides in Schaumburg, was credited with supplying police with enough information to apprehend the driver.

The witness told police that Case's auto had been weaving on Touhy Ave. Driving off the road and onto the shoulder, Case allegedly struck Kosiba who was thrown some sixty feet. The car was reported to have not stopped following the accident.

Niles Police officials said the witness chased Case's car and

was able to get a description of the vehicle, the driver and a partial auto license number.

Niles Police Detective Dennis McEnerney, who was working as an off-duty security guard at the time of the incident, went to the scene of the accident after hearing the report.

McEnerney is credited with searching the area for Case's car and finally finding it parked at the Motel Six, 6450 Touhy ave.

Case was arrested at the motel. Police sources indicated Case had previously been arrested in Niles for shoplifting in 1979.

He is employed as a car salesman at Highland Park Volvo. The car involved in the accident belonged to the car dealership.

Niles Police Chief of Detectives Ray Giovannelli credited McEnerney and Sgt. Charles Sanno for the investigative work done on the case.

Additionally, Giovannelli noted, "McEnerney picked up the investigation practically from the time the accident occurred...He did a fantastic job."

Giovannelli said McEnerney worked 15 hours straight on the case following the accident. Case has so far been charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, leaving the scene of an accident, failure to give aid and information following an acc-

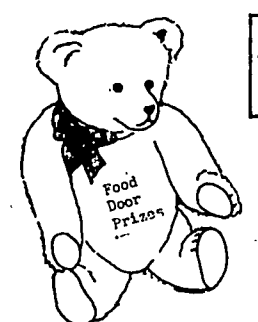

"Like a thermostat stuck at a high level, the body strains to maintain this overarousal which interferes with effectiveness in work and relationships," Dr. Barr explains.

"High stress impacts one's life in many ways," states Dr. Barr, "impairing effectiveness in one's career, leading to stress-related disorders, such as headaches, high blood pressure, ulcers, muscle spasms, heart disease, and others."

The Stress and Health Workshop will introduce stress management techniques developed by cardiologists, neurologists, psychologists, and other health care professionals to

deeply relax the body and enable participants to relearn the ability to recover from stress.

"With practice, these stress management techniques can be more beneficial in 'quieting' the body than deep sleep. They can help return the body back to its natural balance and complement the body's potential to regulate and heal itself," Dr. Barr explains.

Ability to exercise no immunity to heart disease, says cardiologist



"Endurance, exercise, especially promoted by long-distance running, does not confer immunity to cardiovascular disease," stated Noel Nequin, M.D., director of the Cardiac Rehabilitation and Health Enhancement Center at Swedish Covenant Hospital, 5145 N. California. Dr. Nequin was responding to a question about the death of a famed author and running advocate Jim Fixx, during a radio interview today on WBBM-AM.

"Exercise does improve the quality of life. For people who watch their weight as well, there is no question that exercise also has conferred health benefits," he said.

"The death of Jim Fixx can be referred to by non-exercisers as 'I told you so,' but you have to look at his background," explained the cardiologist, who said that Fixx's family had a strong history of heart attacks. His father suffered a heart attack at age 35 and died eight years later.

The latest information on Fixx, said Dr. Nequin, is that an autopsy of his heart showed that three of the arteries were much obstructed. Multiple small scars on the heart indicated that Fixx had several small heart attacks before his death. Dr. Nequin went

on to say that without the regimen of exercise Fixx almost certainly would have died at a much younger age.

Besides the legacy of his writing, beliefs, and example of running, the heart specialist said, the most important legacy Fixx left was "something he didn't do, which cost him his life - medical evaluation and follow-up."

Dr. Nequin pointed out that Fixx had refused medical evaluations as well as a stress test, which would have identified the degree of anatomical problems he had.

"The ability to cover long distance on foot, or

by swimming or on a bicycle, does not relate directly to the status of one's coronary arteries," Dr. Nequin said. "Fixx's coronary artery blockages, however, should have shown on a stress test."

Dr. Nequin, a marathon runner himself, explained that three of his heart patients who belong to the Running Hearts Club at Swedish Covenant Hospital can cover 50 miles in ultra-marathons with no apparent problems.

He went on to say that Fixx is typical of millions of Americans who were sedentary from 10 to 20 years and are now exercising.

tee's recommendations, he said he expected a "spirited" exchange regarding the matter.

Niles trustee Ang Marcheschi, who was the only one of four village board members on the committee who was present, was the sole opposition to the recommendation. He has voiced objections in the past for naming buildings after Nilesites. He told us Tuesday he would prefer some type of an obelisk be considered for an area such as Dutchman's Point, the landscaped area on the northwest corner of Touhy and Milwaukee Avenues in front of the police station. He believes plaques and/or listings of many residents who have served the community might be included there at one central location. He previously voiced objections to the naming of buildings after Nilesites contending the village would soon run out of structures which would bear residents' names.

Marcheschi has also voiced concerns there are many present and past residents who might be considered for such an honor roll but might be neglected if only buildings are named for a limited few.

Whether Marcheschi's voice is a minority one won't be known until the November meeting. Trustees Ottow, Panek and Pesole were absent at the meeting though Panek sent word she supported the committee's recommendations.

At a village board meeting last spring, park board president Elaine Heinen presented petitions to the village board suggesting the new public works building be named for Bacher. At that time Niles was preparing to re-dedicate the village administration building by adding Ken Scheel's name to it. The same afternoon the Blue Boy addition to the fire station was dedicated as was the new public works' building. Rather than act upon the Heinen petitions, Blase recommended a committee be created to review future dedication suggestions. Village trustees Marcheschi, Ottow, Panek and Pesole joined committee chairman Geocaris and four other residents on the committee. The fifth non-board member was the chairman, Jim Geocaris.

At the September 17 meeting committee members Sister Irene Sebo of St. Benedict's Home and longtime Nilesite Betty Kazmerski gave significant testimony about Bacher's many contributions to Niles. Their efforts were crucial in having the committee send its recommendation to Niles village board.

Bacher was the head of the Niles Public Works department from 1956 through 1979. He also served 33 years as assistant fire chief and worked for the village more than 40 years.

Bacher, his brother Charley, a fire department captain, and Niles first fire chief, George Pasek, were responsible for building Niles' first fire station at the southeast corner of Touhy and Milwaukee Avenues, where the present third district circuit court offices are now housed.

Continued from MG P.1 future increases might jeopardize the organization's ability to function in the future.

There has been statewide opposition to the proposed amendment in its present form due to the inclusion, without definition, of "patriotic organizations" as being eligible for the exemption. There is concern if passed as written, the amendment may serve as a tax loophole for any group calling itself "patriotic."

In other business, the board approved a switch in insurance carriers for village and park district employees, expected to save the village approximately \$90,000 a year.

Village Administrator Larry Arft said the switch from the John Hancock Company to Blue Cross/Blue Shield would provide savings through lower administration fees charged by the carrier, and would not effect the quality or extent of coverage employees are receiving.

Lastly, Mayor Richard Flickinger announced the village's Department of Health and Human Services will sponsor a free diabetes screening for residents between 10 a.m. and noon Saturday, Nov. 17 at the Village Hall Senior Center.

Continued from MG P.1 arms, as found in the Illinois Constitution, was not violated by the Morton Grove law. "A ban on all firearms that an individual citizen might use would not be permissible, but a ban on... (specific) categories of firearms such as handguns would be," wrote Simon.

Commenting on whether a village's police powers allow them to restrict ownership of certain guns, Simon said, "This court has long recognized that the police power comprehends laws restraining or prohibiting anything harmful to the welfare of the people."

Opposing the Morton Grove handgun ban were Chief Justice Howard Ryan, and Justices Thomas Moran and Robert Underwood.

Cirincione's son, Thomas, 28, of Park Ridge, was sentenced to two years.

A third defendant, Lester Lewis, who pleaded guilty to constructing the time bomb used in one of the bombings, was sentenced to six months.

The Cirinciones were convicted Aug. 9 on federal conspiracy and bombing charges. Assistant U.S. Attorneys David J. Stetler and Joseph Hartzler contended the bombings were an attempt to gain complete control of the Nancy's pizza chain.

They said Biagio and Thomas Cirincione, Lewis and four other men plotted to destroy the Palese's restaurants. The four other men pleaded guilty and testified as government witnesses.

"As the state's largest consumer lobby organization, we represent the average taxpayer. And that person is searching for someone to speak up and take action. We endorse only those candidates who will actively work for the people on vital consumer

issues, such as utility rates, toxic waste, and health care," said Robert Creamer, Executive Director of Public Action.

Public Action is involved in fighting for utility reforms, including restructuring the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC). The seven ICC commissioners, who are appointed by the governor, are responsible for the skyrocketing increases in utility rates that consumers have seen. Public Action is calling for an elected commission on the grounds that the commissioners would be forced to listen to the voters and consumers.

Yates lauded for Peace Institute funds

Ninth Congressional District Freeze Voters have commended Congressman Sidney R. Yates (D, Ill.) for his efforts in obtaining an initial \$4 million appropriation to establish a United States Institute of Peace.

Funds for the new Institute were included in the Defense Department appropriation bill hammered out last week by the Senate-House Conference of which Yates was a member.

"We in the Ninth District of Illinois are most fortunate to have such an influential peace advocate as Yates as our

congressman," said Mary Warren, co-chair of the local Freeze Voters group.

"We are indebted to him for supporting this comparatively small but very significant sum for peace in the enormous defense appropriation bill. We look forward to working with Mr. Yates in the development and expansion of the Peace Institute."

Under the bill, which is now law, the Peace Institute is directed to work for international peace through research at colleges and universities and public symposia and meetings.

Tucker: prison construction top priority

Mannie Tucker, Republican candidate for Representative from the 56th district, today announced that construction of more prisons, including "first-offender" facilities, must be a top priority in the upcoming legislative session.

"Punishment of criminals by incarceration remains a strong deterrent to crime," said Tucker. "Yet because of the current prison situation

many judges are reluctant to send first offenders to prison or jail. Judges know that the criminal population in our prisons and jails poses a physical danger to the non-hardened criminal, and are disposed toward granting parole for first offenders. Unfortunately, there is very little punishment involved, which sends a message that society is not very serious about crime."

Township Improvement Party attacks Maine officials

In a recent local newspaper article, Maine Township Supervisor, Paul Halverson made several "ridiculous and irresponsible charges" against the newly formed Township Improvement Party according to James A. Mahoney, Jr., Supervisor Candidate.

"Unfortunately, Mr. Halverson has again failed to answer the substantive issues that face Maine Township government," according to Mahoney. He chided Paul Halverson for his "irrelevant and irresponsible comments in attacking the newly

formed Party." Instead Mahoney called on Halverson to institute a meaningful dialogue on Maine Township issues and not resort to name calling, personal attacks and false charges. Again Mahoney said that the "Maine Township voters are too well educated and sophisticated to be fooled by a name calling campaign." He further went on to charge his opponent Paul Halverson with cowardice in meeting his responsibility as a public official. Mahoney states that "a public official has a responsibility to answer questions, address issues

Mahoney concluded his remarks with a plea to Paul Halverson to "open up the campaign for Township government with a public debate on the issues such as taxation, openness in government, duplication of services, and Township headquarters." Mahoney said, "I respond to these issues rather than making a series of phony allegations."

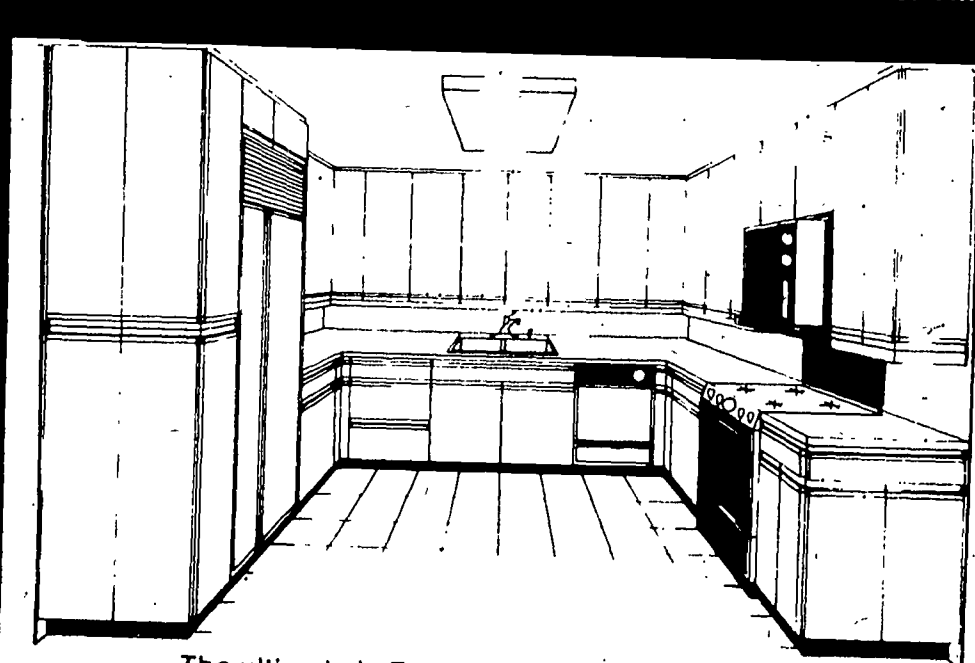

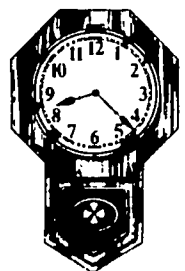

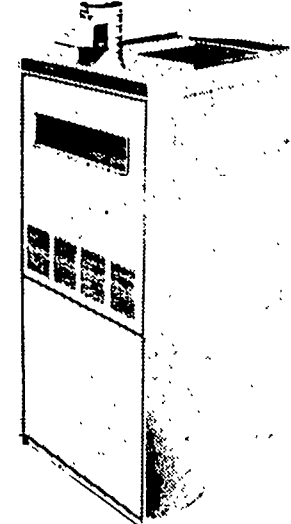

CUB protests 19% utility increase

The Citizens Utility Board has entered its opposition to the 19.3 percent rate increase recently proposed by Illinois Power Company. The cause is now pending before the Illinois Commerce Commission, and is the first major rate-increase case to be undertaken by the new consumer organization.

The announcement follows a unanimous decision by the CUB Board of Directors at its Oct. 5 meeting to proceed with the case.

In filing CUB's intervention petition with the Commerce Commission, Administrative and Program Director Susan Stewart described the watchdog organization's rationale for intervening in the IP case.

"First," said Stewart, "it is CUB's belief that the figures submitted by Illinois Power in this case must be carefully scrutinized. Costs of the Clinton nuclear station, essentially responsible for this rate increase request, have been revised upward again and again. Just last week, IP added another \$290 million to its estimate, boosting Clinton's price tag to almost \$3.15 billion. We have serious doubts about Clinton's economic viability.

"Second," said Stewart, "IP's anticipated start-up date for Clinton, now set at November 1986, is too optimistic and inaccurate,

based upon information we have seen. CUB believes that it is simply too soon to discuss a rate increase for a plant that may not be generating power for years.

"Finally," she added, "because CUB is a grassroots consumer organization, we cannot ignore the great public outcry in central and southern Illinois regarding the economic burden of the Clinton plant and of IP's relations with utility consumers generally. In a series of 'town meetings,' held by CUB and other interested organizations, these subjects have come up again and again. Utility consumers genuinely believe that CUB can make a difference. We will certainly try."

Stewart added one note of caution: "Deliberations on the costs and merits of Clinton have been ongoing for years. We recognize that our involvement does come late in the game. While we are optimistic that our intervention may bring to light some questions about the way the ICC deliberates its rate cases, we are hazardous no predictions about the outcome of this case."

Stewart referred to a dissenting opinion, authored by ICC Commissioner Daniel Rosenblum, which criticized the manner in which the Commission arrived at its decision to grant

Commonwealth Edison a 4.7 percent rate increase in July 1984. The Rosenblum dissent, published in early October, raised serious questions as to the ICC's handling of evidence that had not officially been entered into the record, and took the Commission to task for limiting public participation in rate-increase cases.

"CUB would like to ensure, through our participation in the IP case, that consumers are being given a fair shake at ICC hearings," said Stewart.

The IP case is CUB's second intervention before the ICC. The first came in September, when CUB raised questions about a proposed reorganization of Central Illinois Light Company. That case, still in its early stages, will probably be decided in early 1985.

CUB membership is on the rise as a result of a statewide membership campaign, now in its second phase. More than 45,000 Illinois utility customers now belong to CUB. Additional CUB membership information is appearing in gas and electric bills in October, including those of Illinois Power's residential customers.

addressing them "Niles 60016". He said about 50% of them were delivered. When Marcheschi met with the Des Plaines postmaster, he said that his request was denied to use the Niles village name on envelopes along with the Des Plaines zip code number.

Only the Niles 60048 zip code can be used with the Niles name. Mail going into the village of Niles but the Des Plaines mailing area must have the Des Plaines name on its mail.

Marcheschi related how this postal confusion temporarily cost Niles \$750,000 in sales tax money in the recent past. Revenues from the K-Mart store west of Greenwood were earmarked for Des Plaines rather than the village of Niles because the mail was addressed to Des Plaines. Not until village official Joe Salerno checked out a computer read-out was the problem rectified.

Village attorney Richard Troy said the suit was based on the inconsistency of the post office system. He said he felt it was an abuse of its discretion to properly deliver the mail in the area served by Des Plaines.

Trustee Bart Murphy was wary of the suit and asked village attorney Troy what the suit would cost (about \$14,500). He thought the matter should be pursued by our Congressional representatives.

Mayor Blase told him it was beyond the realm of the Congressman since the postal service is now independent of the government. Marcheschi said Congressman Frank Annunzio has been very cooperative but no progress has been made.

The village board approved the filing of the suit which could be heard by next spring. Only Murphy voted against the suit.

In other actions residents Isabel Curtin, William Hlavacek and John Zaba were given plaques for their service in administering the Niles blood pressure program during the past 10 years. Mayor Blase said "these fine people oversaw the program which literally examined thousands of people".

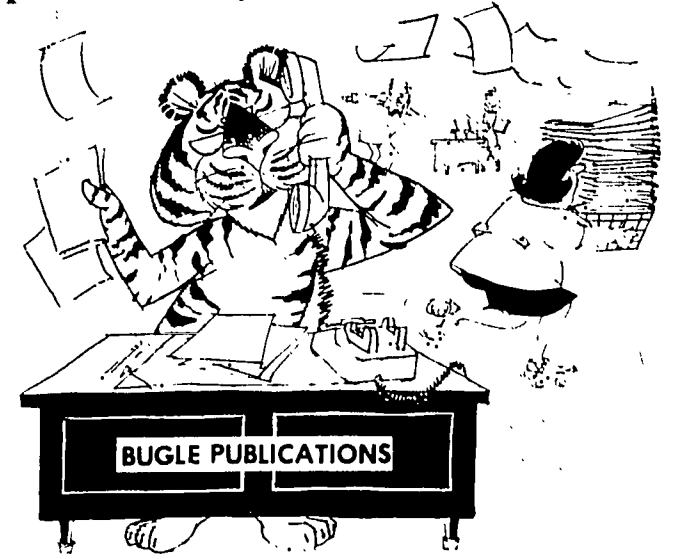
