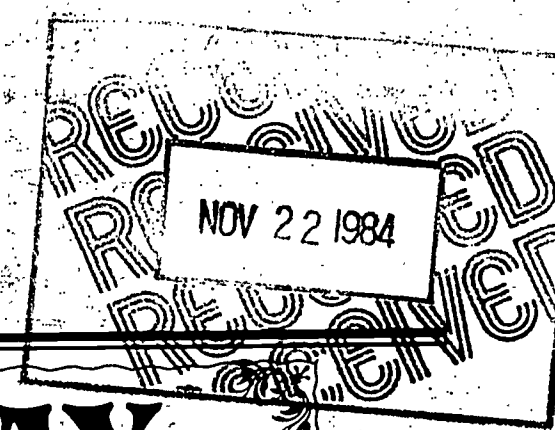
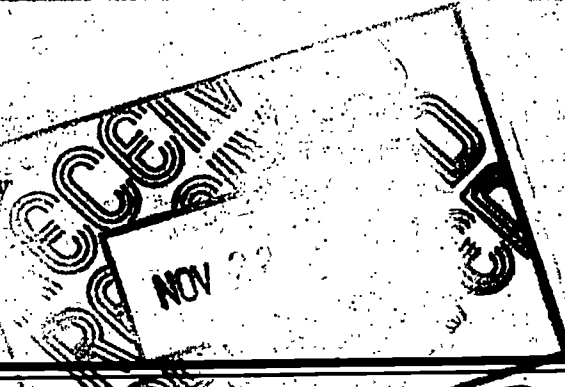

Will not re-name
public service building

No re-naming Public Works building

Niles village board turned down its own commission's recommendation that the new public service (works) building be named for Eddie Bacher, former Public Works director. Instead, it passed a watered-down vote which will place a plaque inside the building, which may include a relief likeness of Bacher and accompanying narrative of Bacher's contribution to Niles.
Niles trustee Ang Marcheschi, who most vocally opposed naming any building after anyone in the community, likely manifested the feelings of Niles Mayor Nick Blase who has had reservations about naming buildings after Nilesites. Blase was against the naming of the administration building after former manager Ken Scheel, but

From the Left Hand

"As one of my children mentioned last night, "Thanksgiving is a family day and I'm coming over the night before, just to be with the family."

Indeed, Thanksgiving is for family. How often we reached for the family, gathering in the clan from near and far.

Back in 1943, our first year in service, we reached for the family some 700 miles away. We were in an air cadet program in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania and longed to be back home with "family" during this most American of holidays. We don't recall how it happened but we wangled a weekend pass which got us 2 of the 4 days we needed to head back home. The rather inflexible rules demanded we were not to stray more than a few miles from our base. But we hitchhiked to Harrisburg and caught the train to Chicago, aware we had little protection if any M.P.s decided they wanted to see our pass credentials.

In those days of anarchy there was little chance of finding a train seat for the trip home. We wandered back to the baggage car and amidst lumpy barracks bags and bone-sharp elbows and knees we became one more bit of baggage being shipped to the midwest. By the time we got

The topic of this year's essay contest was, "What do you think are some of the important services the Village of Niles provides for the community and why?" Following is Soo Kim's essay which compared the Village of Niles to the human body.

"It is simple for one to contrast the Village of Niles as a community of residents highly interested in the growth, strength, and fundamental achievements of Niles.

One could distinguish Niles as the human body. The estimated 32,432 citizens of the village are the cells, the basic unit of life. Together these citizens try their very best to make Niles a community one can immediately grow to love and respect.

By pure nature, the human body needs vital functions to carry out its life processes. The Village of Niles also needs functions, or services, to maintain the excellence of its superb heritage. Services I consider aid Niles the most are the Public Works, the Housing Department, the Niles Public Library, the Niles Courtesy Bus System, the Fire Department, the Police Department, the Senior Citizen Program, and the Niles Park District.

The Public Works will always win a friendly smile from the residents. Working enthusiastically about the problems of sewer and street maintenance, battling below zero weather, the snow removal job is always completed. My family has had recent experience with the Public Works. We were having trouble with the sewer, and the Public Works handled the job suitably and efficiently. The Public Works also maintains tree removal, water services, and engineering services. The residents save money and time, money and time they would rather spend with loved ones.

The Housing Department allows newcomers to feel right at home. The Housing Department inspects the property that was sold, the Housing Department provides the owner a proper amount of time to complete the repairs.

The Niles Public Library, with a branch library and a Bookmobile for those who are not able to get out due to health, schedule or financial problems, has audio-visual materials from A to Z for toddler ages to centenarian ages.

I feel children play an important role in the future of Niles, and the Niles Public Library is a stepping stone to their bright goals. Children need a foundation, and Niles responds to their calls. Niles gives the children the chance and ability to learn through the art of knowledge. There are four elementary school districts, two high school districts, and a community college district governed by an elected seven member board.

The Niles Courtesy Bus System is an economical way of transportation in Niles. Residents can ride safely, comfortably, without a fee, and almost to any site in Niles. I, myself have ridden on the Niles Courtesy Bus to various locations of Golf Mill, the Niles Park Swimming Pool, and to the Leaning Tower YMCA.

The Fire and Police Departments act as services, or function systems, but also as the outer covering of our "human body". The Fire Department guards us against the unfriendly parts of fire, and against the sadness of losing a loved one, home, or other thing of great value.

The Police Department is one of the factors that makes Niles one of the safest towns in Illinois. They fight crime with an undying courage with the outstanding citizens' help.

Unincorporated residents battle Library annexation

Residents of an unincorporated area of Glenview have decided to circulate petitions in their neighborhoods so that an annexation option will be put on the ballot in the upcoming April general elections. Residents of the Countryside area voted unanimously to seek the petitions to fight an attempt by the Niles Library District to annex their area. The unincorporated Glenview area sought by the Niles Library District includes portions of School Districts 63 and 34 and lies east of Milwaukee Avenue and west of the municipal boundaries of the Village of Glenview.

There are approximately 22,000 residents in this unincorporated area who currently pay approximately \$50 to use the services of the Glenview Library. Since Glenview is a municipal library, they can only provide services to residents who live in the village boundaries. Niles is a district library and according to Harry Pestine, Niles Library Board President, "we are constitutionally charged to the service the unserved," which is the reason for the attempted annexation.

If the annexation is approved, residents will pay approximately \$28 yearly per home for the Niles library services. The annexation is being financed through the award of a Project Plus grant from the State of Illinois to the Niles Library District in the amount of \$54,835.

The library has added ten new bookmobile stops in the project area and is looking forward to serving residents of the area with library services from the bookmobile as well as the main and branch libraries. Residents of the project area will begin receiving monthly mailing from the library announcing the grant and detailing library services and programs.

It should also be noted if the Village of Glenview annexes any of the unincorporated area after it is annexed to the Niles Library, that area would automatically become a part of the Glenview Library District and would be dropped from the Niles Library District.

"We are very pleased to have been awarded this grant," said Pestine, "and have begun issuing library cards to the residents. Under the terms of the grant, our full range of services will be available to residents of the unincorporated areas through December 31, 1985."

Park Youth Work Program

This past summer, the Niles Park District in conjunction with the Juvenile Division of the Niles Police Department provided an alternative to the courts for youth offenders within the community. The program allows youth to work constructively within the Niles Park District as a means of retribution for committed offenses. Juvenile offenders who participated in the probation program were assigned work which was carried out under the authority of an assigned juvenile officer, a park district representative and senior citizen volunteers. The program provided youth with specific duties including work at park sites and facilities within the park district.

The goal of the Public Service Work Program was to provide youth with tangible consequences for their offenses by working for the betterment of themselves and the community.

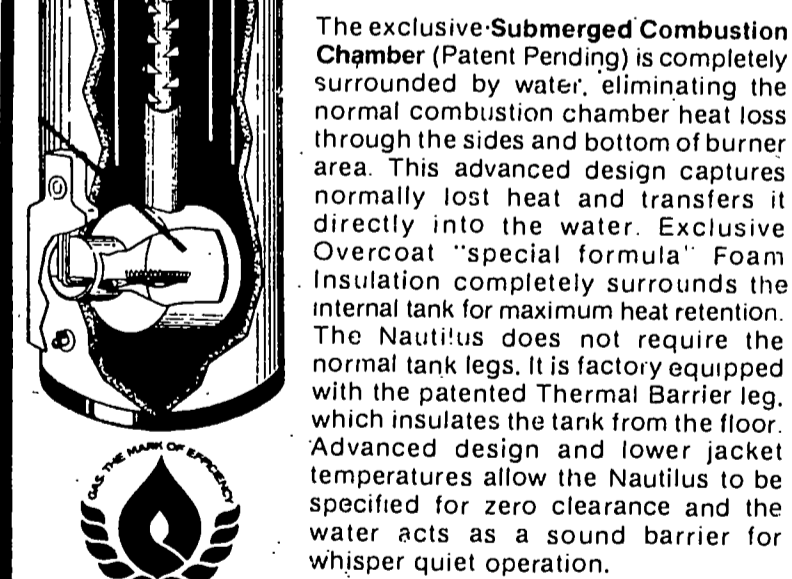

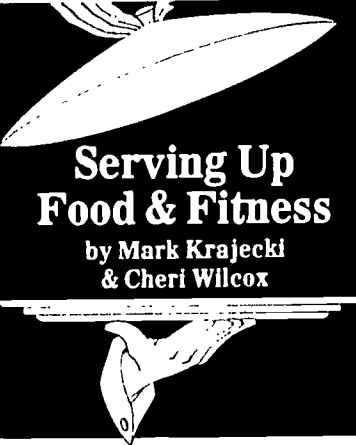

Makes 4 Cups Relish

- 3 cups cranberries
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup light rum
- 2 (16 or 17 ounce) cans apricot halves

Wash and drain cranberries. Place in 13x9x2 inch baking dish. Sprinkle sugar over top. Cover with aluminum foil and bake in 300 degree oven for 45 minutes. Drain syrup from apricots, reserve 1/2 cup. Remove foil, add drained apricots and 1/2 cup syrup. Cover and return to oven for additional 15 minutes. Stir in rum. Cover and chill.

CANDIED SWEET POTATOES

- 18 yams
- 2/3 cup dark corn syrup
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/3 cup sherry

Heat in pot together, corn syrup, cinnamon, butter and sherry. Boil yams, cool, peel, slice in halves lengthwise and place in baking dish, 9x12 inches. Pour syrup mixture over yams and heat in 325 degree oven until thick and glazed. Turn every 30 minutes. Should take 1-1/2-2-1/2 hours, depending on how candied one likes it.

TURKEY CHILI

Makes 8 Servings

- 2 pounds ground turkey
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 tablespoons chili powder, or more to taste
- 2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 1 tablespoon paprika
- 1 can (28 ounces) tomatoes
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- 1 can (15 ounces) red kidney beans
- 1 can (15 ounces) pinto beans

Cook turkey and onions in oil until brown. Add garlic, chili powder, cumin, paprika, tomatoes, salt and pepper. Cover. Bring to a boil over high heat; then reduce heat and simmer for at least 1 hour. Add beans and heat through. Best when prepared a day ahead and simmered one hour just before serving.

TURKEY LASAGNA

Makes 6 Servings

- 8 ounces lasagna noodles
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2/3 cup chopped onion
- 1 pound ground turkey
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 can (14 ounces) tomato sauce
- 1/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese
- 1/2 teaspoon oregano
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 2 cups tomato juice
- 3/4 cup cottage cheese
- 3/4 cup grated mozzarella cheese
- Sliced ripe olives as garnish, optional

Cook noodles as directed on package. Sauté onion in oil. Add turkey, salt, pepper and 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder. Brown turkey. Add tomato sauce, green pepper, Parmesan cheese, oregano, 1 teaspoon garlic powder, and tomato juice. Cover and simmer 20 minutes. Place one-third cooked noodles in bottom of oiled casserole. Cover with half turkey sauce. Place second layer of noodles over sauce. Spread with cottage cheese. Cover with remaining noodles and remaining turkey sauce. Top with mozzarella cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes. Garnish with ripe olives, if desired.

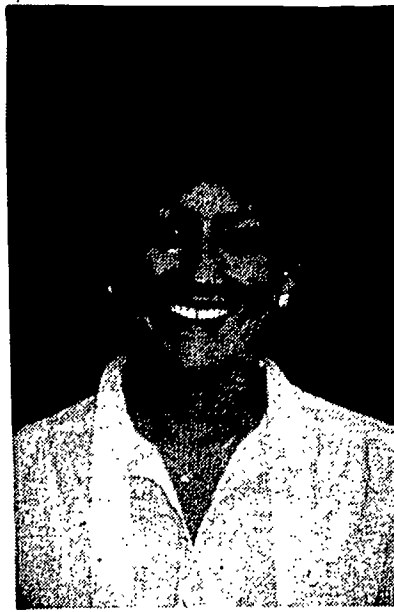

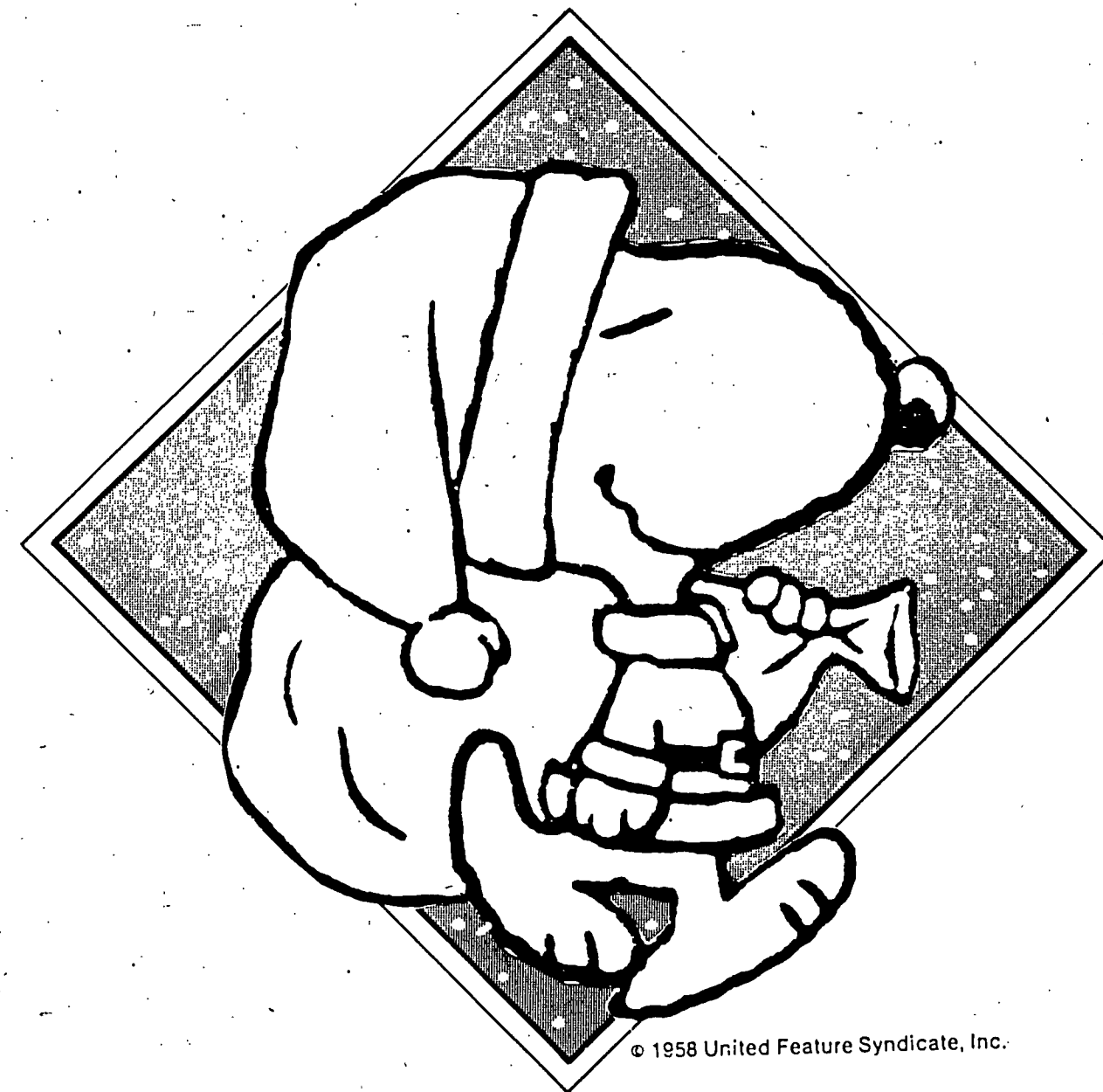

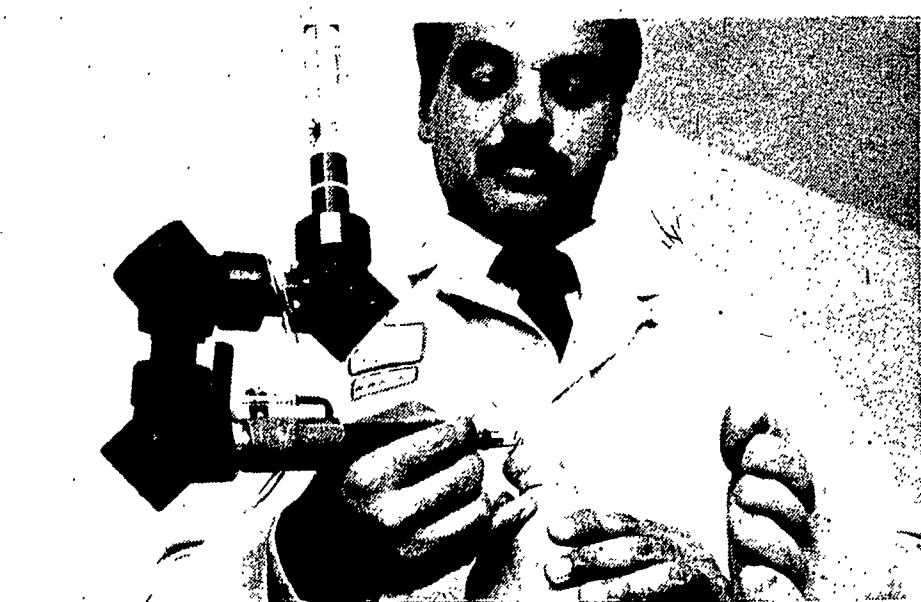

Dr. Elipas applied a dressing and put a Band-Aid over the tiny spot that used to give me so much pain. Total time for the

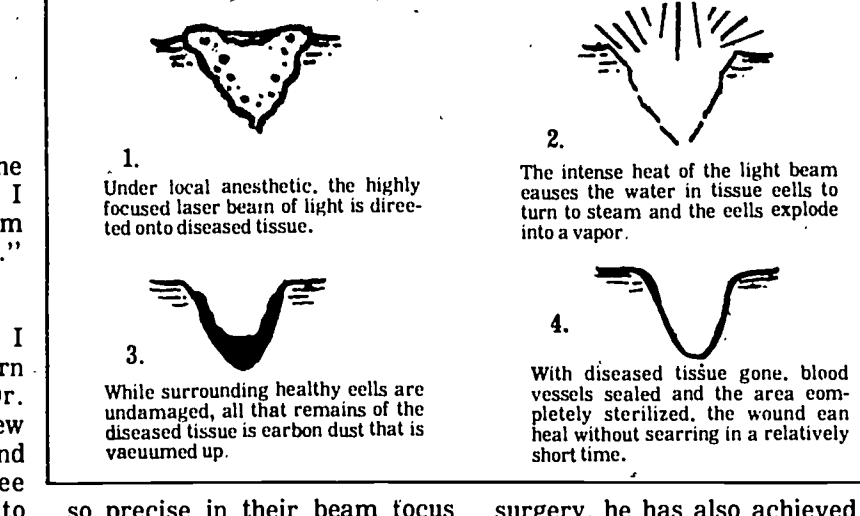
operation? Twenty seconds! No pain, no bleeding, no problem. My reaction to the whole procedure? Absolutely amazed. According to Dr. Elipas, though, mine was not an uncommon reaction. "My patients can't believe how simple and painless laser surgery is," he said. "Not only does the laser make the operation faster, it also offers the benefit of faster healing." According to Elipas, patients who have had laser surgery normally heal in less than ten days versus conventional healing times of up to a month. "It's inherent in the physical properties of the laser beam that instantly blood vessels cut by it will be sealed," he said. "That means no bleeding. Without that bleeding into the wound, there is no swelling or edema. That reduces healing time drastically."

Recently, he performed a complex operation on a patient with no other instrument other than the laser. "As far as we can determine, no other surgeon has done an operation this complex with just a beam of light," Dr. Elipas said. The operation consisted of removing trapped nerve tissue and scar tissue from a patient who had had conventional surgery twice before. Each time she healed she had more scar tissue that compounded the original problem. With the laser, Dr. Elipas removed the scarring and the patient's foot problems were solved.

SIMILAR TO MICROWAVE While lasers sound futuristic and forbidding, Dr. Elipas explains that they have been in use as medical tools for a quarter century. "Ophthalmologists have used them for extraordinarily delicate eye surgery for years. They are so precise in their beam focus that they 'spot weld' detached retinas with them." Lasers have also found their way into gynecological surgery as well. How does a laser perform these modern miracles, I asked him. "It's not a difficult principle at all," he answered. "It's similar to a microwave except that it uses light waves instead of microwaves. The high intensity beam of light heats up the water in tissue cells until the cells literally explode in a flash. By adjusting the size of the beam and the power of the light intensity, I can control exactly how much tissue I want to be removed." **WORKS ON MANY CONDITIONS** Dr. Elipas says he has used the laser to permanently cure plantar warts and remove nerve tumors. He also has had total success with the tool in removing ingrown toenails, fungus infections and other surface diseases. By employing the laser to open the surgical site for complex cases requiring conventional

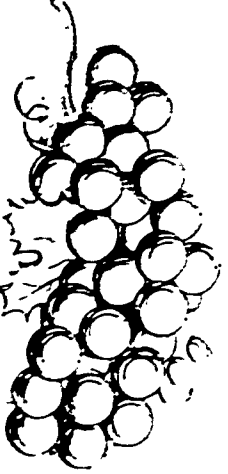

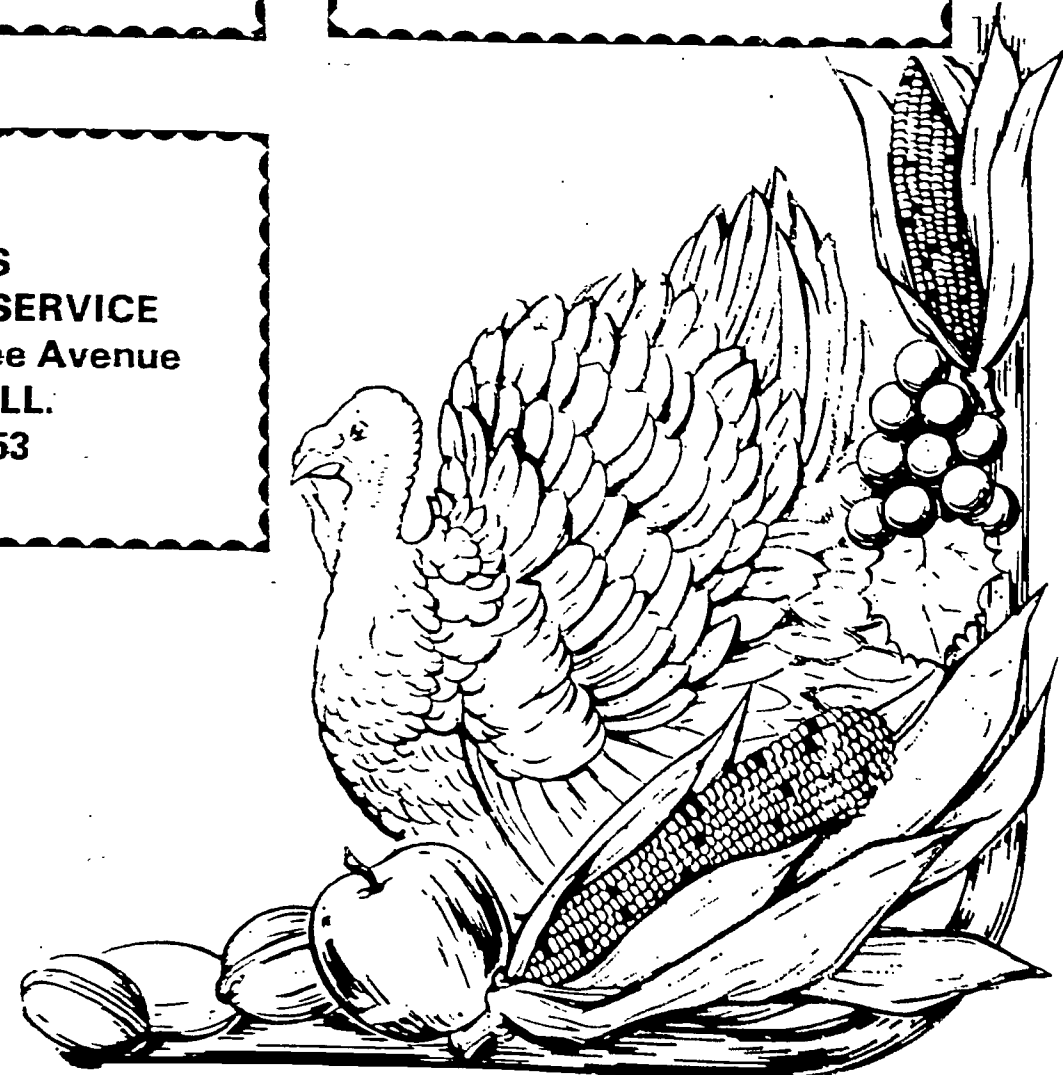

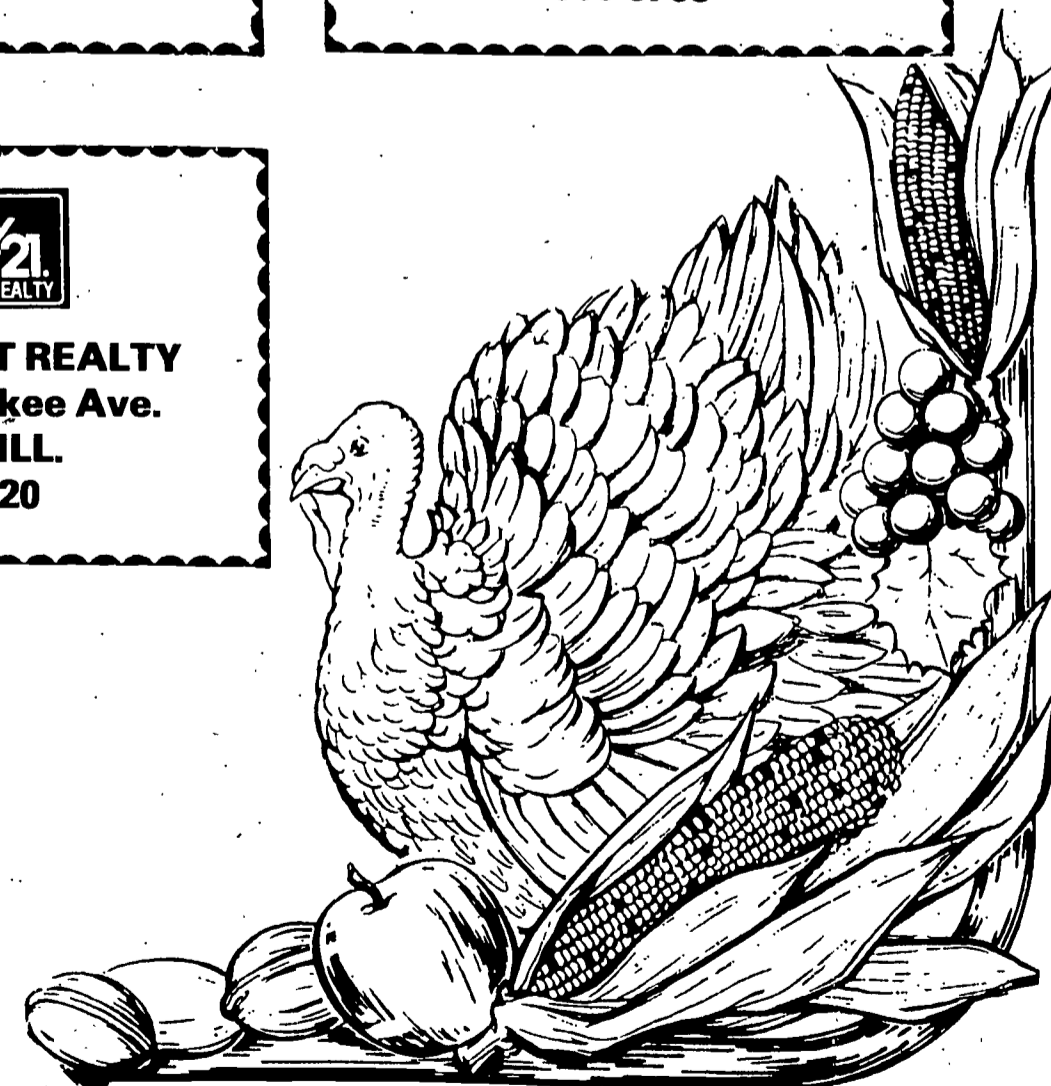

"We have received complaints from several companies regarding solicitation of advertising space," stated Captain Hugh S. McGinley, Commander of Illinois State Police, District 15 in Oak Brook. "The companies were informed as to the position the I.S.P. has taken and also to contact the Illinois Attorney General, where questions of improper representation were identified."

"The best way to determine if the solicitors represent the authorized magazine The State Trooper," McGinley added, "is to call any State Police Headquarters and ask for confirmation."

Holiday Highlights at the Chicago Botanic Garden

The Exhibition Hall at the Chicago Botanic Garden will be festively decorated for the Holiday Season with the theme Christmas with the Birds. The display will feature a giant, blue spruce tree, hundreds of poinsettias, and many small trees decorated with unique and sometimes whimsical ornaments. The exhibit will be open to the public every day, except Christmas Day, from Dec. 10 through Jan. 6 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The highlight of the holiday display will be a forty-five foot

tall blue spruce decorated with thousands of tiny lights. The tree was donated by Mr. and Mrs. John C. West, Jr. of Chicago, cut down late in November by Synstvedt Nursery, and trucked by Lenzi's Excavating of Prairie View.

Twenty-three smaller trees will surround the giant spruce. Each tree will be imaginatively decorated by a local garden club using the theme, 'Christmas with the Birds'. 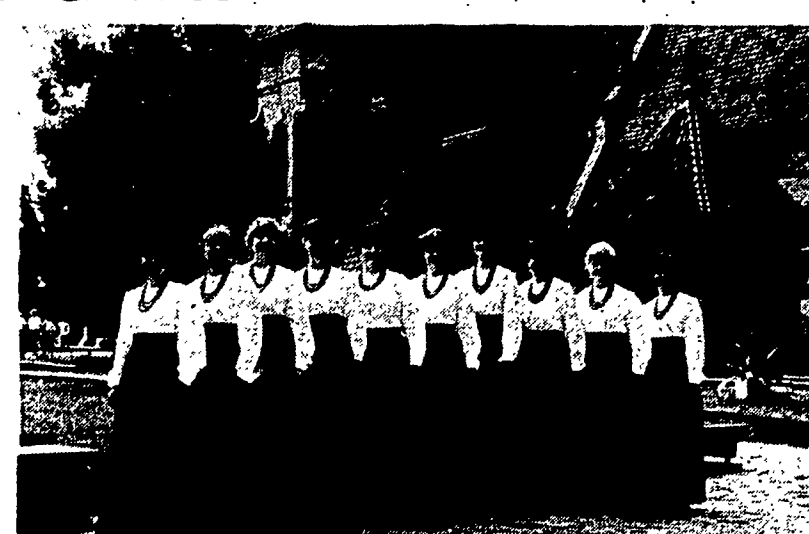
Polish Christmas Gala

home for our Thanksgiving, my Mother, as only Mothers know, said I didn't look well. She shipped me off to bed where a bit of fever and flu kept me there through the holiday. All the family marched into our house to see the new skinny G.I., home for his first visit. They had to march into the bedroom where the fallen hero had the first flush of the holiday season, which was really a hyped fever. Sunday, I climbed out of bed and reversed the trip back to Gettysburg via another baggage car. Arriving at the Harrisburg station we were welcomed back by our commanding officer, who accompanied several of us back to camp where we spent the following 4 weekends doing extra curricular activities which lent to the cleanliness of the camp.

Other Thanksgivings past included a yearly trek to an Aunt's home in a western area named Villa Olivia. The Aunt had married a very stylish gent who bought a 60 acre horse farm west of Chicago. He bred Doberman Pinscher dogs and showed them around the country. The Aunt and Uncle converted the upstairs area of the horse stable for their home, above where he housed the dogs.

There were little family reminiscences never to be forgot-

ten. The man tending the dogs always extended an extra bit of warmth to me, the youngster in the family. He would take me out the stables, and had me race against a stopwatch as I streaked around the track. Afterward, I would join him in feeding the 25 or 30 dogs. Later, they would go out individually into the dog runs for exercise. More than once, in later years, I saw my Aunt rush into the runs and separate the dogs which got into the same runs. Two Dobermans attacking one another was a vicious, snarling affair and I always thought the Aunt somewhat heroic getting into the runs and separating the angered dogs, ala Frank Buck.

The Aunt's home above the stables was quite elegant and the entire evening was marked by a little extra style. But style and grace and elegance were just added bits of the trimming to a holiday which was first and last, a family affair.

In more recent years our Thanksgiving festivities were preceded by our annual Turkey Bowl football game. Everyone, young and old, boys and girls, participate in an hour-long football game, in what was really 10 minutes of football and 50 minutes of "piling on". We

tackle anyone on the field and then young and old pile on the poor guy/gal at the bottom. The game proved so successful that soon we added a band program. The entire family participated in a ragtag parade with everyone playing a slide whistle, a kazoo, or small Indian drums. We added 3 baton twirlers and wound up marching down the street, through the front door and out the back door of a house of a cousin who was also celebrating Thanksgiving in a more conventional way. Returning to our home turf we had our abbreviated football game before adjourning to the more serious matter of wolfing down the evening's turkey. After dinner we presented miniature trophies to all the participants and they now have a traveling trophy which records the yearly scores of the big game. By coincidence, every year's score has ended in a tie.

These are really just little cameos of Thanksgivings past. But as the number two daughter said, "I've got to come over the night before Thanksgiving so we can all be together again."

I think that feeling of "family" has trickled down to the next generation. We have much to be thankful for.

reluctantly agreed after petitions and other pressures confronted him.

After the Scheel incident Blase and the board approved the forming of a commission to set up rules and recommendations for the honoring of Nilesites. Judge James Geocaris chaired the commission and five other non-public Niles residents served with four village trustees.

At the commission meeting a 6 to 1 vote favored the naming of the public works building for Bacher with only Ang Marcheschi opposing it. The other three trustees, Orville Ottow, Carol Panek and Pete Pesole were absent.

At Tuesday night's village board meeting Panek said she was incorrectly quoted that she had sent word she would approve whatever the majority commission members voted. She said she was against the re-naming of the building and agreed with an Evanston guideline which will not honor a local residents until five years after they've died.

Marcheschi thought an obelisk should be placed at the corner of Milwaukee and Touhy and a list of honored residents should have their names included at such a place.

Trustee Ottow didn't agree with Marcheschi but made the motion which was approved unanimously which will place a plaque inside the new public service building.

In other actions the board approved 400 apartment units at the southwest corner of Ballard and Greenwood with Trustee Bart Murphy opposed. He objected to the density resulting from five 50 unit buildings being built there and contended a precedent would be set for approving increased number of units throughout the village. Murphy pointed to other areas in Niles where the board limited the number of units per building to 28 or 30.

Bill Hughes said the computer will eventually take over eleven administrative tasks including payroll, accounting and program registration.

The Park District will allow 18 months to adapt the computer for administrative purposes.
