

OCC food drive

Philip Jaffe, Oakton Community College professor of chemistry, was surprised when he found out there are people in the generally affluent communities of the OCC district who don't have enough to eat.

But rather than stopping at just being surprised, Jaffe, with the help of the OCC chapter of the Cook County College Teachers' Union, decided to organize a holiday season food drive at Oakton's Des Plaines and Skokie campuses. With a minimum of publicity, Oakton's first food drive resulted in the collection of 40 cartons of non-perishable foods of approximately 25 pounds each in only two weeks.

"Considering that this was our first attempt at this and that we didn't have a whole lot of publicity about it, I'm pretty pleased with the result," Jaffe said. "We collected a lot of canned goods and other non-perishable foods that people dropped off in collection boxes that we had at both campuses."

According to Jaffe, the 40 cartons of collected food were distributed equally between

Voluntary time of day rate for residential customers

The Illinois Commerce Commission has adopted a proposal by Commonwealth Edison to provide a time of day rate for residential customers on a voluntary basis. Unlike the current residential rate, the energy charges for the new rate will be based on daily peak and off-peak periods. Customers who use electricity only during off-peak periods will pay less. Peak periods are from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Customers who use electricity during off-peak periods will pay 3.14 cents per kilowatt-hour for all kilowatt-hours used and 5.63 cents per kilowatt-hour for kilowatt-hours used during the peak periods. There will also be a \$10.41 per kilowatt demand charge, based on the customer's maximum demand during peak periods in the four summer months.

Acting at the request of the Commission, Commonwealth Edison's new rate will operate much like the time of day rate for commercial and industrial customers, in order to put customers on the rate in groups of a manageable size, the rate will be initially available only to customers whose annual use is in excess of 30,000 kilowatt-hours. The average annual residential use is about 6,600 kilowatt-hours. The customer charge will be based on the type of dwelling served. Customers residing in a building with one or two units will pay \$20.62 per month and those living in a building with three or more units \$16.10 per month. The customer charges are higher under the new rate to reflect the use of a time of day meter and the new separation of customer charges.

Customers who are interested in receiving service under this rate should write to Commonwealth Edison. The company will install a time of day meter on the customer's premises and collect demand and energy usage data for approximately one year for research purposes. During that period, the customer will continue to be billed under non-time of day rates. Services under the new rate will be effective after the usage data has been collected.

Tax amnesty \$\$ for schools

Chicago State Senator Howard W. Carroll today announced that public schools in his district, the 1st Legislative District, will receive at least \$50,000 in new one-time funds to help them through the school year as a result of the success of the Tax Amnesty Program sponsored and passed by the senate Democrats last spring.

Suburban public schools in Skokie, Lincolnwood and Morton Grove will receive at least \$50,000 in additional funding. And, the Chicago school district, a portion of which is in Sen. Carroll's legislative district, will receive over \$22 million.

Carroll said, "The General Assembly passed legislation today appropriating an additional \$75 million from Tax Amnesty funds for schools throughout Illinois so that needy school districts will receive a shot-in-the-

arm to help them meet demands for the 1984-85 school year.

The Tax Amnesty Program is a one-time-only amnesty period which ended November 31st. The original legislation earmarked the Amnesty dollars for elementary and secondary education.

Carroll explained, "Last June \$20 million in anticipated Amnesty dollars were budgeted for schools. Two weeks ago we began the process of appropriating an additional \$2.2 million for schools, however, because the program has been so immensely successful, generating a flood of last minute applications totaling \$142 million in revenues as of last Thursday, we were able to up that appropriation to \$75 million.

"The Amnesty program was the brain child of the Senate Democrats and I couldn't be more thrilled with it's incredible success."

Internship Program for legislative staff aides

Sen. Bob Kustra, R-28, said today he is urging college graduates who want first-hand experience in the legislative process to apply for an internship program at Sangamon State University in Springfield.

Sen. Kustra said the 19 internship positions in Sangamon State's Illinois Legislative Staff Internship Program offer students a unique opportunity to work directly with legislators and their staffs and at the same time pursue masters degrees.

"There is increasing competition for these internships," Sen. Kustra reported. "They make it possible for graduate students to gain valuable training with the legislature along with credit toward masters degrees."

Sen. Kustra explained that the one-year internships run from Oct. 1 to the following Aug. 15 and

there is a March 1 deadline each year for applications. College seniors who will complete their undergraduate degrees by Oct. 1 are eligible to apply. The program covers Sangamon State tuition and provides \$1,000 monthly stipends for the interns, who receive eight semester hours of credit for their work.

"Many people are not aware that the majority and minority parties in both houses of the General Assembly have professional staffs to assist and advise the legislators," Sen. Kustra said. "Four interns are chosen to work with each of the four staffs, and the other three in

District 63 studies school day agenda

Maine Township sets revenue sharing hearings

The Maine Township Board of Trustees will hold public hearings on requests for federal revenue sharing funds at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 15 and Wednesday, Jan. 16, in the Maine Township Town Hall, 1700 Ballard rd., Park Ridge.

Agencies that would like to be considered for revenue sharing grants should contact Art Duffy, Maine Township Administrator, at 297-2510, to be placed on the agenda.

According to Maine Township Supervisor Paul K. Halverson, the hearings will follow the same format as in previous years. Each agency will be allowed 15 minutes to make a presentation.

After hearing all of the presentations, the board will study the requests and reach a decision on allocation of funds at a subsequent board meeting, Halverson said.

Each agency requesting funds must submit a copy of its budget, employee salaries, a description of the agency, and the reason for the request.

At the December 11 meeting of the Board of Education of the East Maine Public Schools, District 63, Superintendent Donald E. Bond gave a preliminary report of the work done by the School Day Study Advisory Committee. This group was chaired by Robert Jablon, Principal of Nelson School, and was composed of parents, teachers, administrators, and Board members. The Committee met for six sessions to offer input and recommendations to the Superintendent concerning the length of the school day in the elementary and junior high schools. After reviewing the input of this Committee, of the Administrative Council, of teachers, and of parents, Dr. Bond offered some preliminary recommendations for review and discussion by the members of the Board of Education.

Dr. Bond's report offered the following preliminary recommendations:

(1) The span of time of the school day shall remain as it is in the present program. No additional time shall be added to the students' school day nor to the length of the Teachers' work day.

(2) The Gemini work schedule shall begin at 7:30 a.m. for faculty and at 8:15 a.m. for the students.

Rationale: (A) This schedule allows for prime time for student learning during the day.

(B) This schedule permits more time after school for student activities and athletic practices and contests. For the most part, students will return home from school at an earlier hour.

(C) This schedule will allow more time for student transportation and eliminate long waiting periods for buses to arrive from their elementary school runs. Student supervision time will be minimal and more effective.

(D) Teachers will still have 45 minutes before school for class planning time, correcting students' work, faculty meetings, and meeting with parents.

(3) The school schedule for elementary school students will be modified slightly, by making the starting time later by 5 minutes. Entry time will begin at 8:45 a.m. and dismissal time will be at 3:15 p.m.

Rationale: (A) The five minute

OPAL OPULENCE
Opal is probably the most versatile of the colored gemstones because of its unique display of the spectral hues. It can be white, orange, pink, red, green and blue - all at the same time - so it is easy to wear with just about anything in your wardrobe.
The two most popular varieties of opal are white and black. White opal has a white background, and the patches of color it displays tend toward the pastels. Black opal has a dark background and displays darker, more dramatic colors.
The rainbow effect of opal, called play of color, is caused by the refraction of light from the layers of silica spheres in its structure. The effect is similar to what you see on a soap bubble when light hits it.
The ancient Romans considered opal a symbol of hope since it held the promise of the rainbow. The Arabs believed opals fell from heaven in flashes of lightning, thereby receiving their fiery colors.
Opal has long been regarded as an October birthstone, sharing the spotlight with tourmaline. The famous French actress Sarah Bernhardt was born in October and never considered herself well dressed unless she was wearing opals.

In conjunction with National Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week, the Illinois DUI Task Force will submit its interim report to the governor this week that will make specific recommendations to further combat drunk driving.

Participate in this special week by assuring that neither you nor your friends drink and drive:

1. If you drink alcohol, let a friend drive or call a cab.
2. Be a responsible host. Stop serving drinks early and make sure intoxicated guests don't drive.
3. Designate a driver: Have one person in your group refrain from drinking to assure a safe trip home.
4. Use medications with care. Many prescriptions may impair driving ability. Check with your doctor or pharmacist.
5. Don't mix alcohol and drugs. For example, one antihistamine with a drink may double the impairment effect of both.

Be aware of the dangers of drunk and drugged driving and have a happy and safe holiday season.



Rate increase for Centel customers

On January 1, the supplemental charge of \$2.61 per line per month for Centel's Illinois telephone customers will be increased to \$3 per month, a 39 cents increase.

The Illinois Commerce Commission announced Dec. 11, that the supplemental charge increase would go into effect Jan. 1, for all residential and business telephone customers. The ICC ruled at the time that Centel should increase its rates 39 cents on Jan. 1. Centel does not foresee another increase in the supplemental charge during 1985, unless authorized to do so by the commission.

"The supplemental charge is one means of moving rates for local television service closer to the actual cost of providing that service," explained Donald U. Adkisson, general manager regulatory/planning for Centel.

Whereas the local telephone network was once maintained through subsidies from artificially inflated long distance phone rates, today the deregulated and competitive telephone industry cannot maintain those traditional subsidy practices, Adkisson commented.

Subsidization of the local telephone network with toll revenues began being phased out with the break-up of AT&T on Jan. 1, 1984.

Adkisson emphasized that many changing rate structures in the telephone industry are based on developing charges that more closely reflect the actual cost of providing specific services.

Jahns re-elected to board of Federal Home Loan Bank

Adam A. Jahns, president and chairman of the board, Cragin Federal Savings and Loan Association, Chicago, has been re-elected to another two-year term on the board of directors of the Federal Home Loan Bank of Chicago.

He is a director of Verex Assurance, the Chicago Area Council of Savings Associations, and RESCORP. In addition, he is past president of the Illinois Savings and Loan League, the Chicago Area Council, and the Polish Savings and Loan League; trustee of the Savings and Loan Foundation; and past director of the Illinois Savings and Loan League. He holds a B.S. from Loyola University, and has attended the Graduate School of Savings and Loans, Indiana University, and the Advanced Management School University of Southern California.

The Chicago bank is one of 12 district bank providing central banking and correspondent banking services to savings institutions. The Chicago bank serves the Seventh District, which encompasses Illinois and Wisconsin.

Jahns is among ten board members elected by the Chicago bank's member savings institutions for two-year terms. In addition, the board is comprised of six public directors who are appointed to serve four-year terms by the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, the federal regulatory agency for savings institutions.

time shift will allow for better transportation runs, providing 35 minutes to transport junior high students to their homes.

(B) The 5 minute shift will provide no major problem to parents in getting their children to school.

(4) The elementary lunch period will be 45 minutes each day.

Rationale: (A) The elementary students will gain an additional 1 hour and 15 minutes for instructional time each week.

(B) 45 minutes is an adequate time for children to eat and have recreation time before their afternoon classes. Most elementary schools operate on a 30-45 minute schedule and find this time to be effective.

(C) On inclement weather days, students will be better prepared to work in the afternoon classes with less unstructured time.

(D) Student supervision problems will be minimized.

(E) Student safety will be enhanced. Less time for student games and running on the playground will minimize the number of student accidents being reported to the Health Clerk, especially during the last 15 minutes of the lunch hour.

(F) The teachers work schedules will be equalized throughout the district. At the present time, the junior high teachers have 44 minutes for lunch and the elementary teachers have one hour for lunch.

The Board of Education will consider this report as well as the report on the junior high program which will be made in February. Since these two reports have impact on each other, the Board of Education will weigh both sets of recommendations before it makes decisions on these issues.






The Foundation also cited Ms. Sobieski's involvement in other phases of its patient service programs, including her development of a resource directory of self-help aids and devices available within the metropolitan area.

"Most people plan their volunteer activities around other obligations in their lives, but Judi has been known to schedule needed surgery around her work with the Arthritis Foundation," Mr. Langley said in presenting the award. "We're certainly fortunate to have such a person working on our behalf."

Area residents receive Diabetic Detection Tests

Thanks to Holy Family Hospital's recent free diabetes screening, 23 area residents were alerted to signs of high blood sugar levels and notified to contact a physician to monitor and/or control their symptoms.

An extensive week-long screening to detect 'hidden diabetes' was recently held at Holy Family Hospital in Des Plaines and Holy Family Ambulatory Care Center in Wheeling during National Diabetes Detection Week.

Between both facilities, 190 individuals were tested. A total of 150 free blood sugar tests were given at the hospital and 90 at the Center.

"Prior to having their blood drawn for a plasma specimen, the individual was required to take a Post Prandial Exam," explained Dee Regilio, Community Education Instructor at Holy Family Ambulatory Care Center.

"The exam consisted of eating a special breakfast, lunch or dinner two hours prior to the test so that the individual received an accurate intake of calories and carbohydrates," Regilio said.

The results showed that 39 individuals tested at the Center were normal or without a high blood sugar level content and seven individuals were above normal and showed signs of having diabetes.

Poet laureate visits District 207 schools

Miss Brooks presentation was third in a series of lectures in the fields of science, math, social science, and literature offered to accelerated students in the new Horizons.

Academically accelerated students in District 207 widened their horizons in poetry recently when they heard Gwendolyn Brooks, poet laureate of Illinois, discuss her work.

Miss Brooks, who succeeded Carl Sandburg as poet laureate of Illinois in 1969, told students that she does not consider herself a professional writer. "I haven't thought of writing in that sense. Indeed, one who chooses to become a poet does well not to think of money or even making a living by the writing of verse. I wrote because I wanted to. I knew I'd always compose poetry, whether it was published or not. For a long time, it was not."

Stressing that poetry does not always mean beautiful language, Miss Brooks emphasized that poetry must be real and it must be honest. "Poetry is life distilled," she said. "Life is not always nice or normal or happy or smooth or even-edged."

Miss Brooks' lecture was third in a series of six that will be presented during the 1984-85 school year in a new program to enrich the experiences of gifted students in the Maine high schools. Aply named "Horizons," the program originated with a proposal by Tri-Council, a student advisory group made up of representatives from the student councils at the three high schools, to invite outstanding guest lecturers to speak to gifted students.

Multiple sections of "Introduction to Data Processing" (DPR 101), "Computer Logic and Programming Techniques" (DPR 105), "Introduction to Microcomputers" (DPR 103) and "Psychology of Personal Growth" (PSY 107) are being offered, along with single section offerings in classes such as "Composition I" (COM 101),







The following Amendment and Change to the Rules and Regulations of the Fire and Police Commission of the Village of Niles, IL is hereby adopted to be effective January 1, 1985, pursuant to the provisions of the "Fire and Police Commission Act", Chapter 24, Division 2.1, Article 10 of the Illinois Revised Statutes. Passed this 3rd day of December, 1984.

Section 130.9 Probationary Period

Add to paragraph:
"A Police Officer or Firefighter who is promoted to the rank of Police Sergeant or Fire Lieutenant shall serve a probationary period of one year, as shall promotes to higher rank in either department, in accord with village ordinances."

Section 130.12 Completion of Probationary Period

Substitute "twenty four (24) months" for "eighteen (18) months".

Section 140.12 Training

Add to paragraph:
Fire Department personnel must be certified by the Illinois State Fire Marshal as a Firefighter II before commencing regular full time employment."

Section 150.3 Eligibility for Promotion

Substitute in three places "twenty-four (24) months" for "eighteen (18) months" and add to first sentence in paragraph "following completion of the probationary period as per Section 130.12".

Section 150.8 Seniority Credit

Delete everything after the first paragraph and insert instead the following:

"For promotion to Police Sergeant or Fire Lieutenant:
0-24 months, Probationary Period. Not eligible for examination.
Completion of 36 months to 4 years in grade: 1 point
Completion of 4 years to 5 years in grade: 2 points
Completion of 5 years to 7 years in grade: 3 points
Completion of 7 years to 10 years in grade: 4 points
Over ten years in grade: 5 points

For promotion above the rank of Police Sergeant or Fire Lieutenant: 0-12 months, Probationary Period. Not eligible for examination. Completion of 12-24 months minimum service time in grade. Not eligible for examination.
Completion of 2 yrs to 3 yrs in grade: 1 point
Completion of 3 yrs to 4 yrs in grade: 2 points
Completion of 4 yrs to 5 yrs in grade: 3 points
Completion of 5 yrs to 6 yrs in grade: 4 points
Over six yrs in grade: 5 points
Seniority for promotional purposes shall begin on the day after completion of the probationary period. Reference to time in grade is covered by other sections of the Rules."



School Funding Amendment defeated

State Rep. Penny Pullen (R-55th), House Minority Whip, today expressed disappointment that some suburban lawmakers, including Reps. Ralph Capparelli and Alan Greiman, voted against an amendment that would have benefited suburban school districts. Under the amendment to Senate Bill 1610, funds from the state's Tax Amnesty program

would have been distributed to Illinois school districts through categorical grants rather than General State Aid. Categorical grants fund state-mandated programs such as education for handicapped children.

"Suburban schools simply do not benefit when General State Aid is increased," said Rep. Pullen. "Because of their higher

assessed valuations, suburban school districts receive much less in state aid than districts with lower assessments. We often hear complaints that the state is not fully funding programs that it mandates. My amendment would have improved that situation by pumping the tax amnesty money into those mandates, rather than General State Aid. Defeat of the

amendment guaranteed that the bill would be a Chicago bailout rather than an opportunity to correct past inequities."

Rep. Pullen's amendment would have allocated additional funds into Grants-in-Aid programs for orphanage tuition claims, tuition for handicapped children attending non-public schools, special education

programs, gifted student education and free lunch and breakfast programs, among others.
