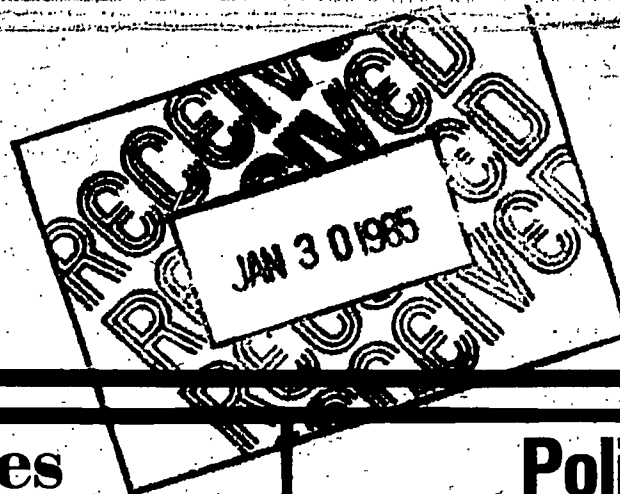

OCC Board approves Honors Program

In a move which will strengthen the academic standards for at least some students at Oakton Community College, the board of trustees Tuesday night approved the establishment of an Honors Program set to begin the 1985 fall semester.

A six credit-hour core course, dealing with the intellectual history of western civilization, will anchor the program which requires students to take at least 18 credit hours of advanced honors classes, out of the usual 60 full-time two year students ac-

crue.

To be admitted to the program, students must meet criteria well above what is necessary to otherwise attend Oakton, including: graduation in the top quarter of their high school class

Police suspect arson in school bus fires

Morton Grove Police have begun an arson investigation to uncover who is responsible for possibly igniting three school buses on Friday, Jan. 11.

Morton Grove Police official Bob Jones said on Tuesday investigators are trying to determine whether an accelerant was used in starting a fire under the buses.

Some time between 8:20 p.m. and 10:30 p.m. the buses, parked at Golf Jr. High, 9401 Waukegan rd., caught fire.

By the time the fire was extinguished three buses had been destroyed.

The Northern Illinois Crime Lab has debris from the fire and is expected to issue its findings on the origin of the fires.

3 park incumbents file petitions

As the deadline for filing petitions for the April Niles Park election approaches, only three incumbent board members have filed, it was disclosed during Tuesday night's Niles Park Board meeting.

Board secretary Grace Johnson told the board that as of January 15 she had received candidacy petitions only from Park President Mary Marusek, and commissioners Jim Pierski and Dan Kosiba.

Johnson said two other petitions had been picked up but not yet returned.

The deadline for filing petitions to be on the April ballot

is Monday, January 21 at 5 p.m. Johnson said 58 signatures are needed for a valid petition.

In other business, Park Board President Mary Marusek told the board work was proceeding to completely computerize the park's administrative work.

Among the tasks to be assumed by the park's computers will include payroll and accounting; both of which are currently being done by outside vendors.

Additionally, the board agreed to consolidate its numerous bank accounts into one account for the purpose of paying bills.

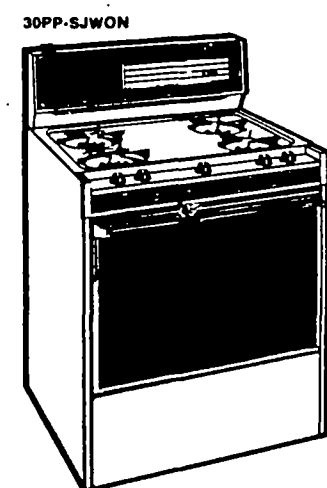
Drug and Alcohol abuse program

IRS Publication Contains Helpful Tax Information

Taxpayers interested in year-round tax tips as well as in a thorough guide to filing season tax information can obtain a copy of the free IRS Publication 910, Taxpayer's Guide to IRS Information.

Publication 910 contains descriptions of IRS services available to help taxpayers prepare their tax returns or to receive assistance with their returns. The booklet also explains how to resolve questions on bills, letters, and notices from the IRS and assists taxpayers with questions concerning their accounts and the status of the refunds they expect.

This year's guide lists the telephone numbers for the IRS toll-free telephone lines which enable a taxpayer to call and speak to an IRS employee for tax assistance.

Other items of interest in the publication are explanations of collection of taxes, examination of returns, and how to file an amended return. Further, the guide describes many of the free publications that are most often requested by taxpayers and includes a handy order blank.

Publication 910 is available free from the IRS by calling 1-800-424-1040 toll-free.

On the Other Hand Cablevision runs true to form

Well fellow Cablevision subscribers, the response to last week's column came not only from many of you relating your experiences, but also from Cablevision officials and Niles officials leading us to believe that a few feathers were ruffled when The Bugle hit the streets last Thursday.

Thursday afternoon, while we were out of the office, a call came through from Tom Coughlin, Business Manager for Cablevision. Mr. Coughlin told our operator his call was service-related, but when we returned his call on Friday morning, Cablevision's administration personnel were "in a meeting." Mr. Coughlin never did return our call.

Friday evening, as we arrived home, we got a call from a George Butcher of Cablevision. Mr. Butcher questioned whether the problem with our cable had been corrected. Since we hadn't placed a service call to Cablevision, we knew Mr. Butcher wasn't calling an unhappy subscriber who was having a problem, but a newspaper editor who happened to write a column.

We asked Mr. Butcher if he was with the service department and he told us he was "with the company." We told him we were still having a problem with the cable reception and he said he would check with Oak Park to see if there were other complaints from our immediate area. He also asked if someone would be home on Saturday and he would have a "technician" come out to check our line.

Needless to say, we were impressed. Up until now we had gotten overbooked servicemen and now we were getting a "technician." At 4 p.m. on Saturday, Mr. Butcher called to see if the line technician had corrected our problem and when we told him we had not seen his technician as yet, he said he would call on Monday to see if everything was okay at that time.

Return the questionnaires!

Let the village know about it!

Let Cablevision know about it!

Well fellow cable subscribers, the Cablevision "technician" never showed up after we stayed home all day and Mr. Butcher never called on Monday to see if the problem had been corrected. Cablevision was running true to form in their method of servicing the public. And if it's any consolation to you, newspaper editors don't get any more preferential treatment than anyone else out there.

Many of you called The Bugle to comment on your encounters with Cablevision. One lady from Ashland Avenue stopped us to say, "Everything you say in your column about Cablevision is true." Nilesite Jan Proh related her experiences to us when she first was approached by Cablevision sales personnel two years ago. Jan signed up for cable at that time, gave the salesman a \$30 check and was told the installation would take place the following Saturday. They never showed up and when she called the Cablevision offices, she waited 1½ hours on the phone listening to FM100 music. Jan fortunately had a speaker phone and did not have to hold a receiver all that day. They promised to hook up her cable the following Saturday and when they didn't show up a second time, she asked for her check back.

"I figured then," said Jan, "if it takes this long to get it installed, how long would I have to wait if I ever needed service?" It took 3 months and numerous calls to get her refund and since that time, Jan said so many of her neighbors have complained to her of their problems that she has never regretted her decision.

Other callers questioned the lack of a community channel after more than two years. They noted their intent in hooking up to the cable was to be able to see village board and zoning board

The two-car brick garage was extensively damaged, according to fire officials.

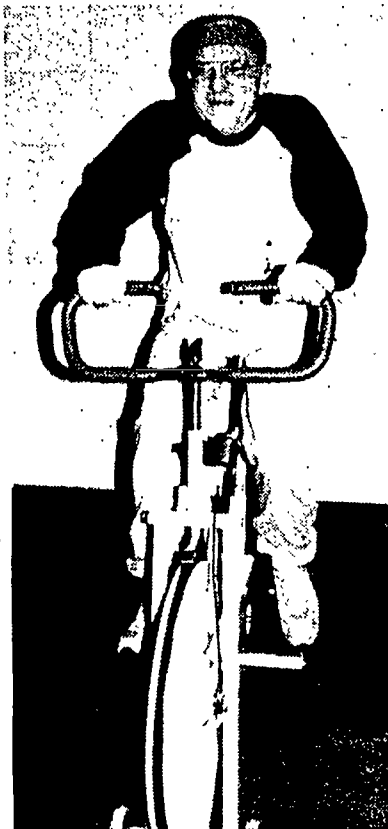

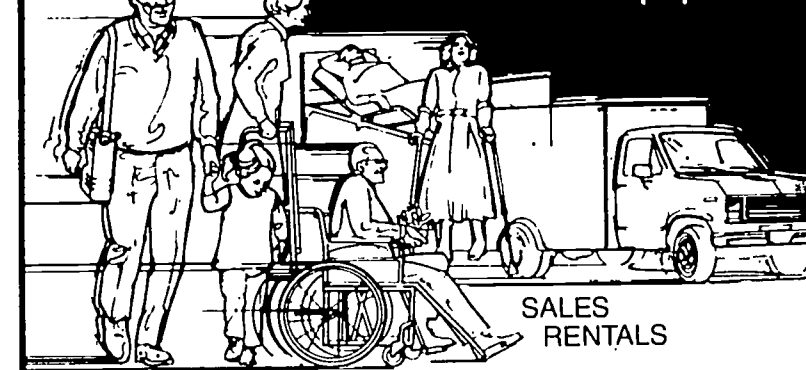

SOCIAL SECURITY RECORD KEEPING

By keeping a monthly record of income, Social Security benefits and adding to the sum, \$15.50 per person monthly for Medicare Part B, a person can determine if their household income would make them eligible for the Illinois Tax Relief Grant (Circuit Breaker) of \$12,000 or less, annually. Claims for this grant must be submitted by Dec. 31 of each calendar year. Assistance with these claims can be arranged by calling the Morton Grove Senior Hot-Line any weekday morning at 965-4658.

SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS TEST

Monthly record keeping of income and Social Security benefits will also help seniors check their earnings against the Social Security Earnings Test. Retirees age 65 through 69 can earn \$7,320 in 1985 (was \$6,960 for 1984) and still receive their full benefits. Retirees, dependents, widows, and other beneficiaries under 65 earnings limit is \$5,400 (was \$5,160 for 1984). People who earn more may still receive their benefits but for every two dollars earned above these amounts, one dollar is forfeited. There is no limit on the amount a person age 70 or over may earn from work and still receive full benefits. If these individuals continue to work part-time, their Social Security tax will be withheld from their pay regardless of age.

BINGO

CREDIT FOR THE ELDERLY

The "Credit For The Elderly" (schedule R) on senior's income tax forms, applies to persons age 65 or older, who have received little or no Social Security benefits during the year. The effect of the credit is to reduce income tax up to a maximum of \$750 for singles and \$1,125 for married filing jointly (both 65 or older). Married individuals may qualify for the credit even when only one spouse is 65 or older. Beginning with the 1984 tax year the "Credit For The Elderly" also applies to individuals under the age 65 if they retired due to a permanent and total disability. These individuals must be receiving a disability pension, or similar payment, from their former employer as a result of the disability.

MORTON GROVE TAX AID

Upper income people need to be concerned about taxation of part of their Social Security benefit. This applies to a single person whose 1984 adjusted gross income (AGI) plus 50 percent of Social Security benefit is \$25,000 or more and married couples with such income totaling \$32,000. The instructions for Form 1040 that are delivered by the IRS will include a worksheet for use in making the computations to discover whether or not an additional amount will be added to the AGI as taxable income. The IRS has a free-reference publication #505, "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax," which provides information on the new tax on Social Security plus details about paying on an estimated tax basis, call 1-800-424-1040.

The Volunteer Income Tax Aides of Morton Grove also provide help to senior tax payers by filing out individual tax returns. This service begins on Feb. 2. For more information or for an appointment, call the Morton Grove Senior Hot-Line any weekday morning at 965-4658.

State reduces auto fee for senior citizens

Senior citizens will receive a benefit under a new state law that reduces the automobile license plate fee by 50 percent for certain persons 65 years or older, State Rep. Penny Pullen (R-Park Ridge) said today.

The law (HB 2751) was approved by the Illinois General Assembly last year. It took effect Jan. 1, 1985.

Under the new law, license plate fees are reduced from \$36 to \$18 for all vehicles with 35 horse power and less; \$48 to \$24 for autos over 35 horse power; and \$30 to \$15 for motorcycles and other vehicles. Senior citizens who qualify for Illinois "Circuit Breaker" property tax relief are eligible for the discount fees.

To determine eligibility under the circuit breaker regulations, persons 65 years or older should call Rep. Pullen's district office at (312) 823-2023.

Senior citizens who meet the circuit breaker qualifications can apply for the reduced license plate fee through the Illinois Secretary of State's office. The new law also requires the Illinois Department of Revenue to furnish the secretary of state with information verifying the circuit breaker status of the motorist.

Rep. Pullen said the new law sets two limitations on the reduced fee, restricting the discount to only one vehicle per person and barring its use toward purchasing vanity plates.

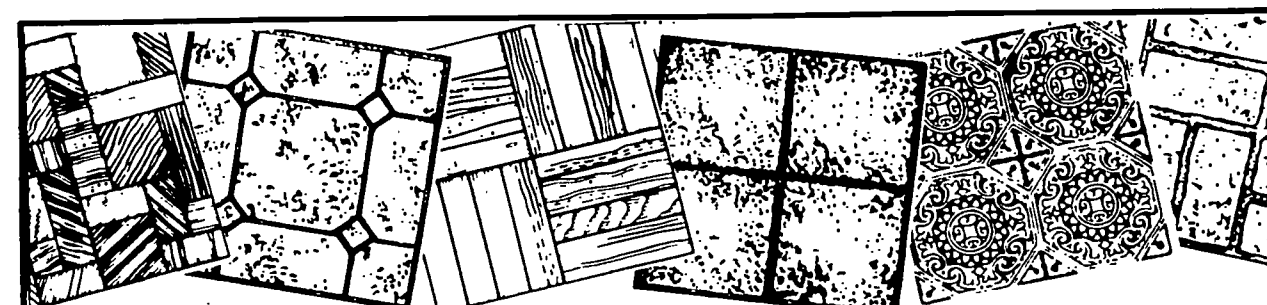

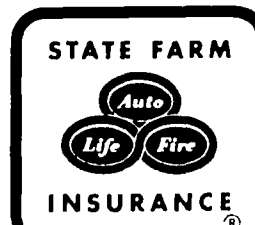

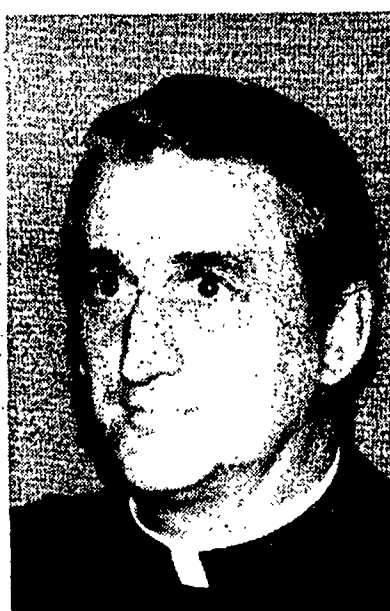

1 can (10½ ounces) condensed onion soup
1 can (12 fl. oz.) beer
½ cup chili sauce
2 teaspoons brown sugar
1 large clove garlic, minced
2 cups carrots cut diagonally in 1-inch pieces
1 package (10 ounces) frozen Italian green beans
1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms (about ¼ pound)
¼ cup water
2 tablespoons flour

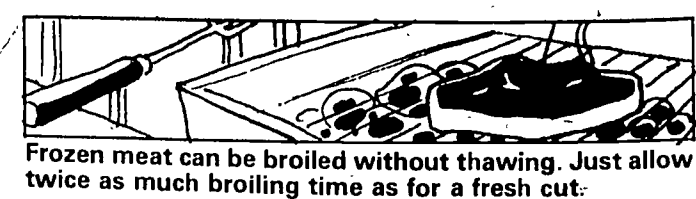
In large heavy pan, brown beef in shortening; pour off fat. Add soup, beer, chili sauce, sugar and garlic. Cover; cook over low heat 1 hour. Add carrots; cook 45 minutes. Add beans and mushrooms; cook 15 minutes more or until done. Stir occasionally. Gradually blend water into flour until smooth; slowly stir into soup mixture. Cook, stirring until thickened.

2 to 3 pounds chicken wings

½ cup Burgundy or other dry red wine
2 cups cubed butternut squash

¼ teaspoon thyme leaves, crushed
1 can (about 20 ounces) white kidney beans, undrained

In large heavy pan, brown chicken in shortening; pour off fat. Add remaining ingredients except beans. Cover; bring to boil. Reduce heat; simmer 20 minutes. Add beans. Cook 10 minutes more or until done. Stir occasionally.

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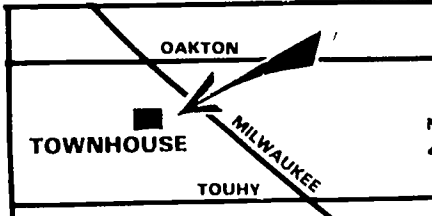
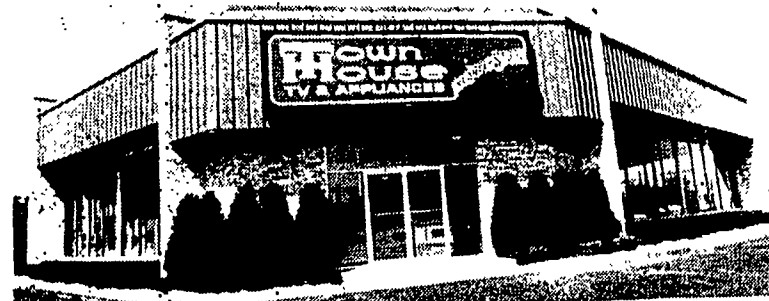

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Niles Township copying fees out of line

Dear Editor:

Because of George Orwell, many of us looked forward to 1984 with apprehension. Well, 1984 has come and gone. It was supposed to be a year symbolic of thought control. Today thought control exists in many parts of the world, and for people who live in these areas, censorship is the rule. For Americans, however, free access to information is still a precious right to be nurtured and guarded. In Illinois, as of July 1, 1984 this right, to inspect most Illinois government records, is defined and protected by law.

You may ask for anything but there are certain restrictions. You will be denied information about teacher's courses and test materials, trade secrets, and files that would constitute an invasion of privacy such as records of disciplinary action in a school or a medical problem and/or tax laws. You may be disappointed with law enforcement agency requests, too, if, as amateur Colombo's or a Tommy and Tuppence duo, you are seeking data from confidential sources, or evidence that would deprive someone of a fair trial.

Also, some computer security information and/or public utility records may remain beyond your reach as could a voluminous request that might require the agency to exist only to supply you with information, as with the current Yutler vs. Skokie Park District hassle. Since work would

have stopped in order to comply with Mr. Yutler's request, it was denied. Now Yutler must appeal to the park board.

When you do decide to file a written request, you can expect an answer in seven (7) working days. In rare instances an agency could ask for another seven (7) days to compile a voluminous or intricate request.

A denial may be appealed to the executive head of a governmental unit then to the board, and then to a court. You should be able to acquire the pro bono services of a legal advisor as court costs can be prohibitive.

The biggest rip-off of the entire acquisition procedure will be found in the copying fees charged. Agencies may only recover the actual cost of copying. The law is quite specific that the cost of employee or computer search time not be included in the cost per sheet that is charged to the inquirer.

You will be surprised at how much actual cost can vary. Skokie Clerk Marlene Williams charges \$.20 per 8 by 11 sheet. Debbie Murphy, Lyons Township Clerk charges \$.05 Louis Black, Clerk of Niles Township, charges \$.30. Black uses a Sharp SF-811. According to Bob Bludorn of the Sharp Corporate Office in Westmont, IL, the cost per sheet is less than \$.01 per sheet. His computation was based on at least 40,000 reproductions per year, and the \$.01 included paper,

style of tangoing seem tame. It's not likely Niles officials would be offended some 15 years later by these films.

Since they presumed to be the keeper of Niles' morals, village officials allowed the police chief to go out to the bookstands and remove paperbacks they thought were unfit for local eyes. That only lasted a few days when the ACLU came steaming down the cabbage patch and threatened them with court action if they didn't return the books.

The eighties have presented a new dilemma. Since the villages give the franchises for the cable T.V. companies, should the village fathers try to restrict the programs which come into the homes? It's highly unlikely. Barring the cable T.V. screens from showing what many might consider distasteful would be an impossible effort. The villages would be dragged into court and would expend enormous sums. The likely outcome of the cases would make court action a very costly gamble.

One service which many of us take for granted is the great snow clearance jobs the local public works departments do each year. After the January 1 snowfall we drove west on Ballard Road. Within Niles the street was snow-free when we drove in early afternoon. But when we passed Greenwood heading west, we began driving on snow-encrusted ice which made driving hazardous. We were driving in the unincorporated area and the County or the Township had not gotten around to cleaning the unincorporated area.

If we were a resident outside a village's borders we'd scream loud and long for bet-

ter services. Residents in unincorporated areas continuously get the "short end" whenever services should be had.

Unincorporated residents should attend the annual township "town hall" meeting when the upcoming year's budget is approved by the attendees in the audience. Unincorporated residents deserve the same services incorporated residents have. They pay the taxes but unfortunately don't get any of the money back for services that their incorporated neighbors get.

Unincorporated residents spend sales tax on goods and services in our communities but get none of it back. They contribute to Niles and Morton Grove's residents' welfare, who receive a great deal of money from sales tax returns. It enables the incorporated villages to improve their services, including more and better snow clearance.

It would be a genuine act of beneficence if a small amount of incorporated village's sales tax could be given to unincorporated areas to improve their services. They would be merely getting back what they have contributed to our towns.

Our local village halls would think such an act is absurd. But if unincorporated residents marched down to the village halls and threatened to boycott local communities commercial areas, perhaps a village like Niles, which gets more than \$4 million returns from sales tax, might pay a little attention to its neighbors.

If each municipality surrounding the unincorporated area would contribute just \$100,000 for improved services outside their village the money would go a long way in upgrading unincorporated areas. It would correct an inequity which has long existed.

Calling for utility regulation to "catch up with the 1980's," the Citizens Utility Board has proposed an agenda to reform utility laws in Illinois. The General Assembly is expected to vote on new utility legislation this spring.

"Ratepayers are in urgent need of stricter laws that catch up with the realities of utility regulation in the 1980's," said CUB Administrative Director Susan Stewart. CUB is urging amendments to the Public Utilities Act, which has been virtually unchanged since it first assigned regulatory responsibility to the Illinois Commerce Commission in 1921.

The CUB reforms would "strengthen and clarify ICC authority over utility companies," Stewart said. Specifically, the Act would set strict guidelines for utility reorganizations to prevent ratepayer dollars from being funneled into non-utility ventures.

The amended Act would also grant the ICC authority to establish excess capacity limits to curb costly errors by utilities when forecasting consumer demand for electricity, Stewart said.

In its report to the 13-member committee drafting the utility legislation, CUB also proposed reforms in the decision-making process at the ICC. "Today's complexities in rate-making demand more extensive and open analysis of the cases," said Stewart.

Hearings on the proposed utility reforms will be held in February when the Joint Committee on Public Utility Reform meets.

Additionally, Pierski said because of the warm weather this past December, the Tam Golf Course took in \$5,172 for 975 rounds of golf played.

In December 1983, which had been much colder, only \$272 was taken in at the golf course. Also, Pierski reported there have been 692 cross country skiers using the Tam Golf Course so far this winter with revenues up \$75.13 per day over last year.

Park Director Bill Hughes said this was evidence that "more and more people are becoming aware and using..." the cross country ski facilities.

meetings, park meetings, Oakton college and Niles library programs. They didn't feel it should have taken this long for a community channel to be in operation.

Our question on the "mystery cable studio" brought a response from Niles cable chairman Ang Marcheschi who took us on a tour of the studio Monday afternoon. Located on the north end of the Niles Village Administration building, the studio which is about 90% complete should be in operation in less than 30 days. Marcheschi was scheduled for a meeting with Cablevision personnel on Tuesday regarding the training program for the use of the studio. A producer, coordinator and two other aides will man the studio and the hours it will be open will depend, according to Marcheschi, on the demand. Four portable cameras will be available to trained persons for the purpose of filming such things as Little League games, parades, school shows, etc. The training program will consist of instructions and hands on training two nights a week for four weeks.

When we told Marcheschi how irate people were over the terrible phone service and the service from the Cablevision repairmen, he said he had a questionnaire inserted in the last village newsletter which sought comments from Cablevision subscribers regarding their service. He noted that of the approximately 3,800 subscribers in Niles, 275 returned the cards. About 10% of those had favorable comments and the rest were complaints. In addition, about 12 people dropped the card, unstamped and not filled out with any comments in the mail box and returned it to the village. "It was difficult to figure out what message these people were trying to relay," noted Marcheschi.

The Village of Niles signed a 15 year franchise with Cablevision and there is a review every three years which comes up in the fall of 1985. If you have a problem with Cablevision, don't just complain to your neighbors and friends. Return the questionnaires! Let the village know about it! Let Cablevision know about it! It's a village service and we may have the choice of selecting another cable company when the review comes.

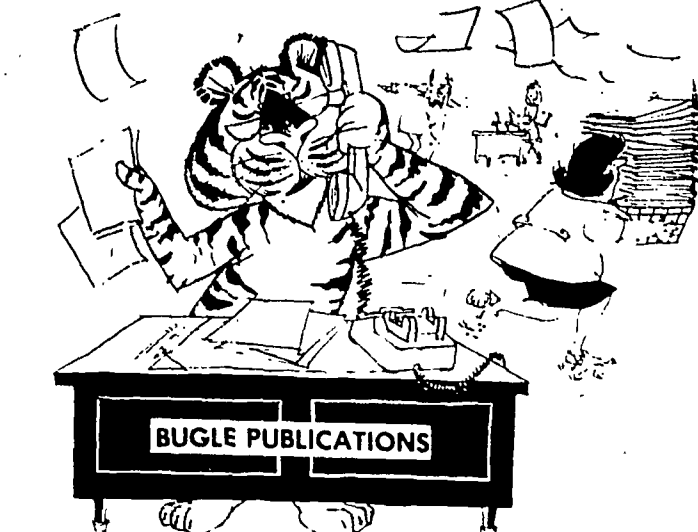
