"Breast cancer is one of the most common forms of cancer. It strikes one out of every 11 women," says Nicholas Kinnas, M.D., **Ra**diology, Lutheran General Hospital. "Early detection is a significant factor in the success of treatment."

The new mammography equipment is call Senographe 500T. It is designed to provide better mammographic imaging capability that can locate cancer the size of a freckle. It also is safe as it involves the lowest dose of radiation

"Mammography allows us to evaluate a palpable mass to see if it is malignant," says Dr. Kinnas. "Mammography is safe and the chances of this type of x-ray producing cancer in the breast is practically non-existent and to date is only a theoretical possibility." Dr. Kinnas adds that it is more dangerous to smoke one-half of a cigarette or to drive a car for 30 miles than it is to have a mammogram.
