

OCC names vice president for Curriculum

The Oakton Community College Board of Trustees appointed Dr. Margaret Mary Lee as Vice President for Curriculum and Instruction during its Tuesday night board meeting.

Dr. Lee, who will replace outgoing Dr. Harvey S. Irlen in June, holds both master's and doctorate degrees in the

Humanities from The University of Chicago.

Chosen from a group of approximately 70 candidates vying for the \$34,000 a year post, Dr. Lee has been Dean of Instruction at Kalamazoo Community College in Michigan since 1982, and was Dean of Liberal Arts at Alpena Community College, also

in Michigan, the preceeding two years.

In other business, David Hilquist, Vice President for Business and Finance, reported Oakton's third quarter investments for FY 1984-85, totaling \$16,928,374, yielded \$1,253,295 in interest. The

Federal Savings & Loan, 2855 W. Touhy, on Dec. 20, 1983, said Assistant State's Attorneys Richard Mottweiler and Nick Trutenko.

"Those may be the most expensive designer jeans he ever bought," Mottweiler said.

New guidelines for courts on drunk driving cases

Niles Family Service stop smoking clinic

Niles Family Service is pleased to announce that we are offering another stop smoking clinic at the agency. However, this stop smoking clinic is closed to adults.

This clinic is available only for teenagers. It will be held on two consecutive Mondays, April 22 and 29 from 7 to 8:30 p.m. The fee for Niles Youth is \$15 for non-Niles youth is \$25. But as usual, no teenager will be rejected from this clinic because of his or her inability to pay. If they want to stop smoking, we will accept them and whatever they could pay! We suggest you talk with your teenager who is smoking and - without preaching - invite him or her to join the stop smoking clinic. They have everything to gain - such as their health and extra money and nothing to lose. For further information, please call Dr. James Cisek at Niles Family Service - 492-3396. Pre-registration is necessary for the stop smoking clinic.

Rigid new rules governing the court's handling of drunk driving cases have been adopted by the Circuit Court of Cook County. Judge Harry G. Comerford, Chief Judge of the Circuit Court, said that the new guidelines have received strong endorsement for circuit judges and will become effective on May 1.

The new rules are directed at expediting the holding of "implied consent" hearings; tightening of and setting for the precise circumstances under which court supervision will be granted; and subsequently terminated; and assigning conditions upon which defendants will be required to perform community services as an alternative to going to jail.

"Drunken driving is a very serious problem both in the Chicago area and throughout the nation," Judge Comerford said.

"Our efforts are aimed at preventing the tragedies which are caused by motorists under the influence of alcohol and other drugs," Judge Comerford said. "The penalties for driving under the influence (DUI) are tough, and deservedly so."

One of the new court rules will require that the "implied consent" hearing shall be heard

"within 60 days of the filing of the request for hearing or as soon thereafter as practicable."

The Illinois Implied Consent law provides that an Illinois driver, in exchange for receiving a license, consents to being tested for alcohol or other drugs if asked to do so by a policeman.

Where a motorist declines to submit to the test, normally a breathalyzer, his license can be revoked for a period of six months.

In accord with this law, the motorist who declines the examination may request a hearing before a judge prior to imposition of the penalty.

Delays have ensued, sometimes for many months, because attorneys have preferred adjudication of the underlying drunk driving charge before holding the "implied consent" hearing.

The new rule will require the court to hold the "implied consent" hearing within 60 days, if possible, regardless of the status of the underlying arrest for driving under the influence of intoxicating beverages.

In cases where supervision is being requested, new rules provide that the defendant must

Older Adult Services is now offering Communi-call, a voice-to-voice communication system for homebound patients. The system puts a person who is elderly, disabled, or confined to a home in touch with a Support Center 24 hours a day. "Communi-call acts as a lifeline for seniors and others in an emergency," says Ellen Browne, director, Older Adult Community Services.

The Communi-call system is simple to use. It consists of a communications unit that plugs into both an electrical outlet and a telephone, and a transmitter that is either worn or carried. By pressing a button on either one, a call is immediately placed to the Support Center.

The Support Center is equipped

with the most advanced computer and telecommunications equipment. The staff at the center has instant access to both a medical summary and emergency instructions for each person.

Keep me from being grim or stubborn about it. But don't let them smother me.

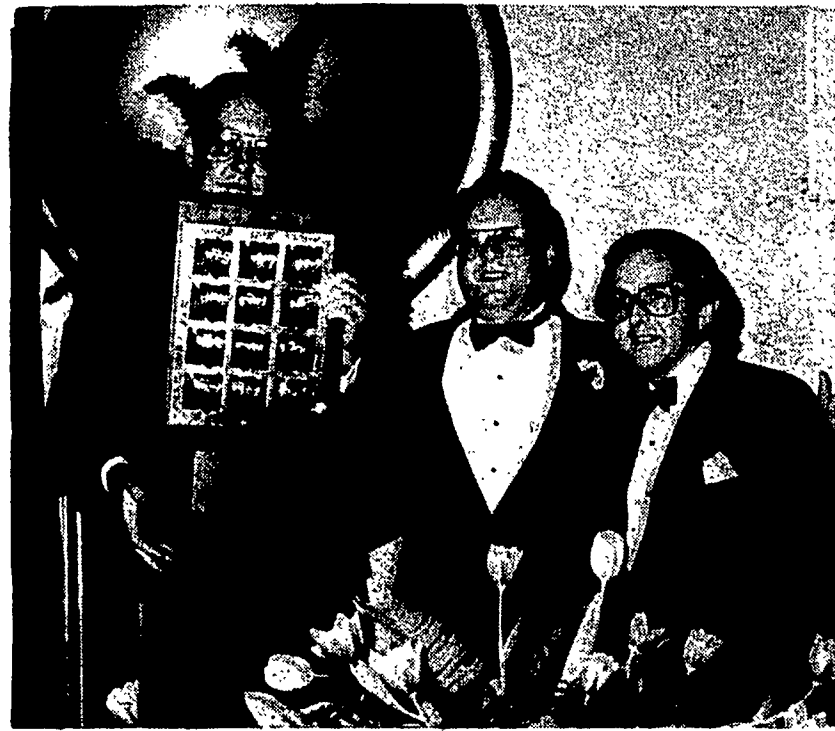

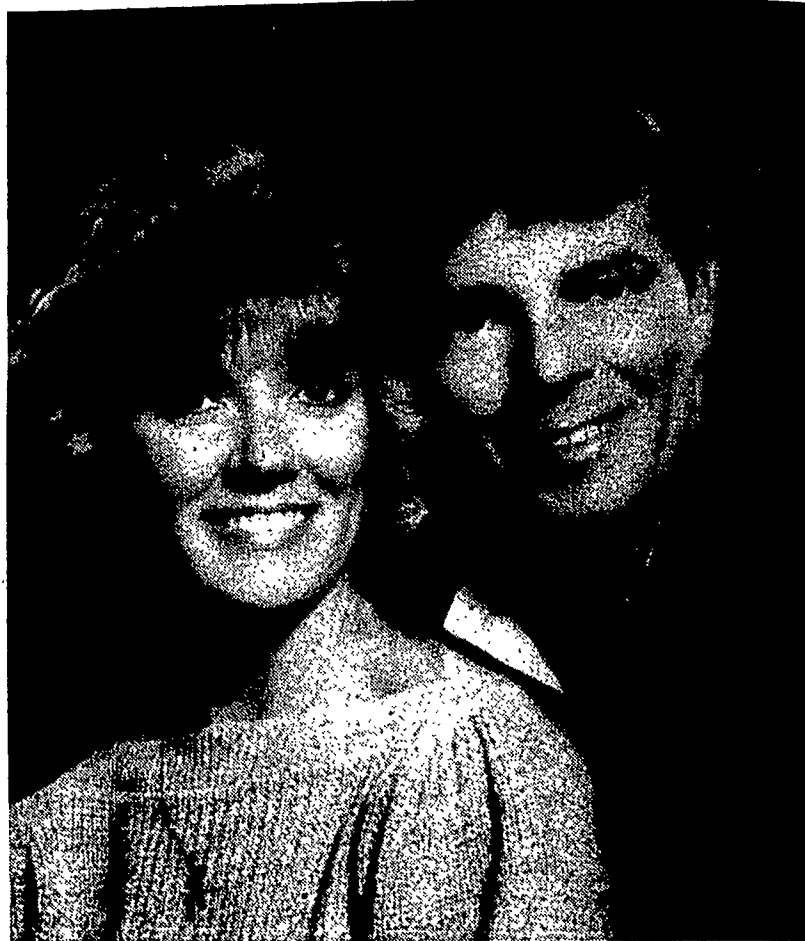

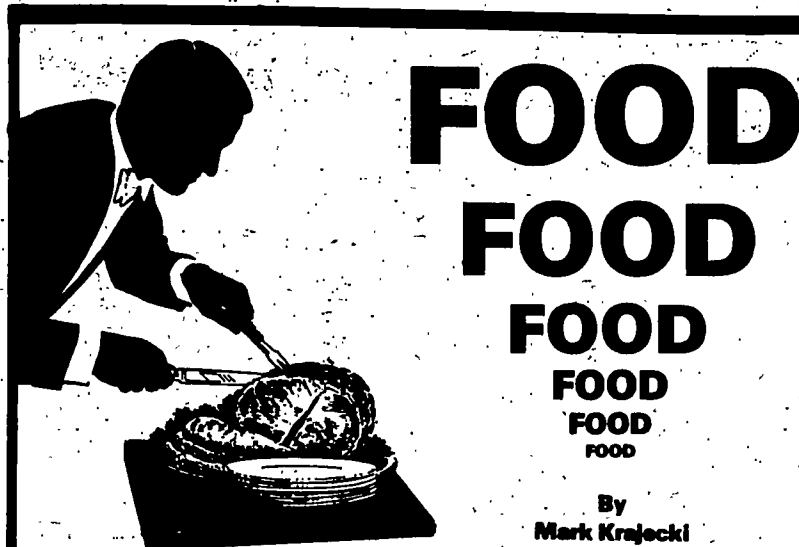

CUBAN CHICKEN

Makes 6 Servings

3 chicken breasts, split, skinned, boned and lightly pounded
2 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
4 tablespoons olive oil
1/4 cup dry white wine
1 cup finely chopped onion
2/3 cup finely chopped green pepper
1 1-pound can tomatoes
2 13 1/2- or 14 1/2 ounce cans chicken broth
1/2 teaspoon oregano, crushed
1/3 cup sliced black olives, optional
1 1-pound can peas and carrots, drained
2 1/2 cups precooked rice

Sprinkle chicken breasts with a mixture of flour, salt, black pepper and garlic powder. Brown chicken in hot oil over medium heat. Remove chicken and set aside. Pour off excess oil.

Add wine, onion, pepper, tomatoes, chicken broth and oregano. Bring to a boil. Add chicken. Cover and simmer 15 minutes. Add olives, peas and carrots. Return to a boil. Stir in rice. Turn off heat, cover and let stand 5 minutes.

Place chicken on broiler pan. Combine remaining ingredients. Brush chicken with part of the mixture. Broil 30 minutes, brushing occasionally with sauce. Turn; broil 15 minutes longer, brushing occasionally.

SPICED LEMON-LIME CHICKEN

Serves 4

1 broiled/fryer chicken (cut into serving pieces)
1/4 cup of vegetable oil
2 cloves of garlic (peeled and left whole)
1/2 cup of lemon juice
1/4 cup of lime juice
1/2 cup of cold water
1/4 cup of tarragon
1/4 teaspoon of dried basil
1/4 teaspoon of thyme
1/4 teaspoon of oregano
1/2 teaspoon of freshly ground black pepper
1 tablespoon of paprika
2 tablespoons of fresh parsley (chopped)

Preheat an electric skillet to 350 degrees and add oil. Brown garlic and remove. Add pieces of chicken that have been washed and thoroughly dried. Brown chicken pieces, turning to ensure even cooking. When browned, remove chicken pieces and set aside. Discard oil.

In a mixing bowl place the remaining ingredients, except the parsley, and beat thoroughly with a wire whisk. Place browned chicken pieces into the skillet increasing its temperature to 400 degrees. Add the mixed ingredients, cover and allow to sizzle for approximately five minutes. Lower the temperature to 300 degrees and allow the chicken to simmer slowly for approximately 30-35 minutes. During the last five minutes add the chopped parsley.

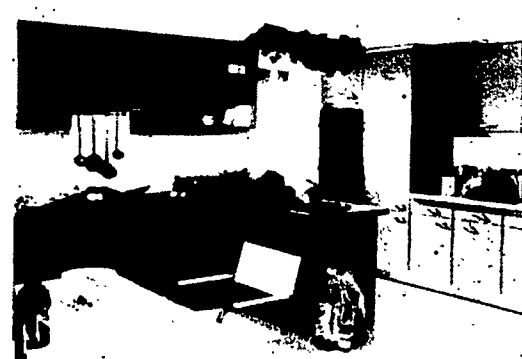

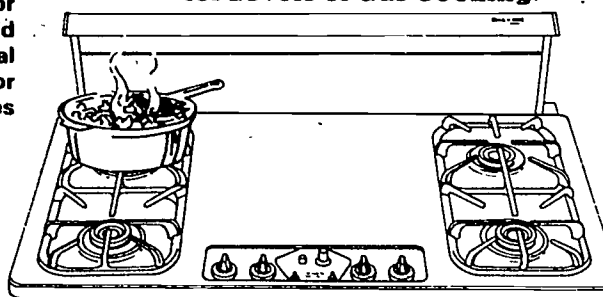

Safety rules for moped drivers

Mopeds, or motorized pedalcycles, provide exercise and are a popular and economical form of transportation for many people. Mopeds, which may be pedaled like bicycles or ridden like motorcycles, can reach speeds of up to 30 mph and are potentially dangerous if not ridden carefully.

Mopeds are subject to the same traffic laws as other vehicles as well as some special regulations. For example, drivers cannot carry passengers unless the moped is designed to carry two persons. These mopeds must have a seat, permanent handgrips and footrests for the passenger.

Although helmets are not required for either the driver or the passenger, wearing them can prevent serious injuries if the moped skids and overturns.

For night driving, a moped must have a headlight that emits a white light visible for at least 500 feet. A red reflector on the rear must be visible from 100 to 600 feet when directly in front of the lower beams of another vehicle's headlight.

Since a moped is a motor vehicle, both the moped and the driver must be licensed. Mopeds have an annual \$30 registration fee and a \$3 title fee. One license plate is issued that is displayed on the rear. Anyone with a current drivers license may operate a moped.

Tickets, at \$1 each, are now being sold by uniformed Scouts calling on homes throughout their communities.

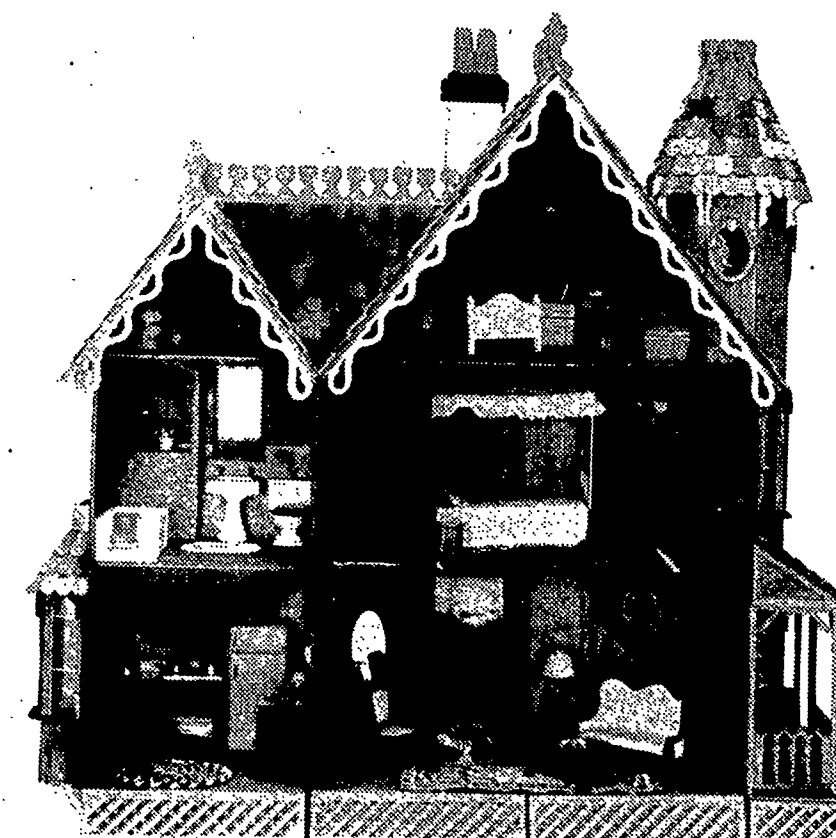

make a statement to the court establishing that:

1. Supervision is in the best interests of the defendant and his family.

2. Supervision is in the best interests of the public.

3. There are other circumstances which would support an order of supervision.

Where the defendant fails to meet this burden, the court will refuse a supervision order.

The new directives also mandate that the precise level of alcohol concentration in the defendant's blood and the personal injuries and property damage which may have resulted from an accident involving the defendant be made a matter of court record, prior to entering into any plea negotiations.

Also, the new rules will require the court to determine if there have been previous supervision orders entered. Supervision will be available only to first time DUI offenders and may be granted only once during a five year period.

Where supervision for DUI has been granted, the defendant will be obligated to return to court on the date for the termination of supervision. His appearance will not be waived.

At the termination hearing, the new rules provide that the court, on the record, shall inquire of the prosecuting authority where there is an objection to termination of the supervision.

The new rules also impose restrictions upon the court's sentencing of a defendant to a term of community service.

Under the Illinois statutes, the court must impose a sentence of a minimum of 48 hours in jail, or a minimum of 10 days of community service upon a defendant convicted of drunken driving for a second time within five years.

Where community service is imposed, rather than the jail time, the defendant will be given the additional burden of paying, wherever possible the reasonable costs associated with his community service activities.

This will include \$100 for an Alcohol and Drug Evaluation Service (A.D.E.S.), for materials used in his work, and for time extended by government in monitoring his community service.

At the expiration of the period for the community service, the defendant shall be required to appear in court with evidence of his successful completion of all aspects of the court's order.

In other actions and reports the
first budget meeting will be held
tonight at 6:45 p.m. at the Rec
Center and President Marusek
said this is one time when com-
munity input is essential.

phases of the budget will be
discussed.

Mike Giannini, the computer
expert who was instrumental in
the recent purchase of use of the
new computers has submitted his
resignation from the district.
Director Hughes said the \$26,700

a substantial increase in salary.
He formerly served in the Jane

For the third consecutive

lease.

Marusek reported the
establishment of salary, grade

been instituted within the district
and it has been "well received".
She said the Niles Park District is

The golf course is now in full

NASR van as Niles has. Heinen
reported insurance will pay for
\$13,000 toward the van purchase
and Niles Township contributed
\$3,000. Maine Township refused
any contribution claiming it will
not give to any other governing
body.

at Jozwiak Park. Heinen said the
opening should be hyped by
publicity and a raffle for the oc-
casion.

Comm. Walt Beusse reported

OFFICIAL ASSESSMENT LIST

This publication list is the official notice to property owners of the 1984 quadrennial assessments on land and improvements in the township of Niles. The 1984 assessments as published herein are those determined by the assessor of Cook County.

LAND VALUATIONS

The land valuations as set forth are the 1984 appraised full values of land (reduced to appropriate assessment level required by the Cook County Board ordinance) per front foot for all city and suburban lots or per square foot or per acre for industrial and farm lands. The determination of full value of a rectangular lot is obtained by multiplying the unit front foot value of the lot by the number of feet frontage, modified by the shape, depth, corner or other influences which affect any individual lot or tract of land.

BUILDING VALUATIONS

Similar development of sound data and procedures were used in valuing buildings under the conditions as of January 1, 1984. Simplification of the rules and careful revision and application of unit building costs based on sound data, which included determination of reproduction cost (new) of different types of buildings with allowances for age, condition and obsolescence produced equitable and uniform assessment of buildings of all classes. Some building values are partial assessments based on occupancy for a fraction of the year. They will be fully assessed for following years.

PROPERTY VALUES

The figures listed herein for the lands and improvements are the assessed full values of such property as of January 1, 1984, as determined by the assessor of Cook County, (reduced to appropriate assessment level required by the Cook County Board ordinance).

It is the duty of the assessor to assess all taxable property on a uniform basis of valuation so that the assessed full values of the various properties are a just and equal assessment of such properties according to law. The assessment roll recording the values of property determines only the distribution of the total tax load among the individual property owners. The assessor of Cook County has no control over the amount of taxes levied, nor the public expenditures. The amount of these assessed values does not determine the amount of the tax bill. The established tax rate does that. The assessor does not make the rate, he merely finds the value of your property.

PERMANENT REAL ESTATE INDEX NUMBER

The permanent real estate index number system was designed for the purpose of simplifying the very complex assessing, tax collecting and tax distribution problems in Cook County, Illinois. In this system areas and sub-areas are established. Generally, areas substitute for townships and sub-areas represent sections. These sub-areas are divided into blocks, as follows:

Blocks 100 to 199 are located in N.W. quarter Blocks 200 to 299 are located in N.E. quarter Blocks 300 to 399 are located in S.W. quarter Blocks 400 to 499 are located in S.E. quarter

Any property owner who has any question in regard to the assessment of his property should inquire at the Office of the Assessor of Cook County, Room 301, in The County Building, Clark, Washington and Randolph Streets, Chicago. Information on the above, as well as the general basis and methods of determining the assessment of the land and improvements thereon will be furnished without cost.

What's the best way to finance your home?

Fixed rate mortgages . . . adjustable rate mortgages . . . what is the best deal for you? Here are some guidelines to help make your dream home a reality for your family.

If you like knowing that your monthly payments will not increase over the years, consider a fixed rate loan. You'll pay a higher rate than with an adjustable rate mortgage, but you will know ahead of time how much you will pay over the entire life of your mortgage.

Many people automatically think first of a 30-year fixed rate mortgage. But you can usually get a lower rate on a 15-year mortgage, and there are other advantages.
