

## Niles denies Cablevision request to postpone fine

The Niles Village Board turned thumbs down on a request by Cablevision of Chicago to postpone final disposition of a \$112,500 fine for non-compliance of the franchise agreement between the cable firm and the village.

Representatives of Cablevision appeared before the board Tuesday to answer charges made at a March 12 meeting regarding non-compliance with some of the provisions outlined in the franchise agreement.

Mayor Nicholas Blase said the fine would remain status quo, and the request for a 60-day extension would not be granted. "Although improvements have been made by Cablevision since March, I see no point for an extension. The fine must be paid for past grievances and abuses by the firm," he said.

Blase added the board had

given the company 60 days to correct problems to avoid the levying of additional fines.

Cablevision general manager Tom Baxter said the company felt the fine was not justified.

"During the past 60 days we have corrected most of the problems and will continue with vigorous efforts to improve service," he said.

# Water rates for Nilesites hiked 11%

Niles residents will have to pay more for water because of a recent 11 percent increase imposed by the City of Chicago that became effective May 1.

The Niles village board Tuesday unanimously approved a recommendation to increase the average homeowners' bill 11 percent effective June 1. Consumers who have been paying \$1.38 per thousand gallons will pay the new rate of \$1.53 for water pumped from Lake Michigan.

Water bills are paid on a quarterly basis, according to village

trustee Abe Selman, chairman of the finance committee.

The 11 percent increase represents the amount of additional money Niles will have to pay the City of Chicago for its water. Village officials has budgeted \$1,200,000 for water expenditure for the 1985 fiscal year.

According to Niles village manager Jack Hadge, the Chicago water rate increase represents an extra \$120,000 expenditure for water.

Selman said there was no alternative but to pass Chicago's

## Niles moves up retail sales ladder

Niles moved up the retail sales ladder to rank number 12 in the State for the fourth quarter of 1984. Niles ranked 18th in the previous quarter according to a report issued by the Niles Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

The Village received \$1,562,611 for the fourth quarter, an increase of \$268,206 over the previous three month period. Sales tax income was up \$241,811 over the corresponding quarter in 1983.

"Niles stands an excellent chance of moving into the top 10 by 1987", said Charles D. Wolfe, Board Chairman of the Niles Chamber.

"Golf Mill should be coming back strong within two years and Niles will be one of the top retail

centers in Illinois," he concluded.

Other significant findings in the Chamber report covering 1,186 Illinois communities show Des Plaines dropping from 14th to 18th position and Mount Prospect moving into the top 25, placing 25th.

Oak Brook moved up nine positions from 19th to 10th. Lombard moved up from 20th to 16th.

Elmhurst and Elgin dropped out of the top 25 retail sales leaders listing.

Downers Grove, Elk Grove Village and Bloomington all dropped four places but remained in the top 25.

## Maine East principal to retire after 28 years

A.K.H. Cochrane, principal of Maine Township High School East, has announced that he will retire at the end of the 1985-86 school year. Cochrane's request for participation in the Voluntary Early Retirement Program-Administrators was approved by the District 207 Board of Education at the May 6 board meeting.

"Although I would have preferred to wait until September to request retirement, I felt it was important that the board of Education know my plans before they selected a new superintendent," said Cochrane.

"I have enjoyed my 28 years in Maine. I am looking forward to the twenty-ninth, and last year, with the same excitement and anticipation I have had during the preceding years."

Cochrane came to Maine East as an earth science teacher in 1957 from Franklin Park where he had taught at the junior high beginning in 1955. In 1959, he moved to Maine West as an earth science teacher. He was assigned as career counselor at West in 1963 and also served as dean of students. In 1967, Cochrane was named assistant principal for students at Maine West. When Maine North opened in 1970, Cochrane became assistant principal for students and staff at that school. In 1976, he became principal at Maine North. When Maine North closed in 1981, Cochrane was assigned to Maine East as principal.

Reflecting on his 30 years in education, Cochrane said, "Most young people grow up to be contributing adults, even those who have problems while they are in high school. My greatest satisfaction comes from working with students and helping them overcome some of the problems they have." According to Cochrane,

the key to overcoming those problems is discipline. "You cannot educate without having an orderly climate in a school," said Cochrane. "And good discipline promotes a positive school climate."

As principal at Maine East, Cochrane headed a staff that developed a new discipline code which established a "fair set of rules and consequences" and a pride and recognition program that "lets students know that good behavior is rewarded." The pride and recognition program recognizes faculty and staff accomplishments as well.

Cochrane considers the most challenging aspect of his career as the closing of Maine North. "We were dealing with a diverse population. The merging of the two faculties, two staffs, and two schools was well done. But it wasn't me. It was my staff. I just happened to be sitting where I could steer," said Cochrane.

After he retires, Cochrane plans to move to Michigan with his family. He also may seek a teaching position at the college level.

## Local mayors protest 33-story buildings

Two mayors and other village and city officials appeared at a public hearing Friday in attempt to block a controversial plan for proposed construction of two 33-story buildings on the site of Fisherman's Dude Ranch in unincorporated Maine Township.

Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase accompanied by mayor Martin Butler of Park Ridge, said it was the first time "in my recollection" that suburban officials had banded together in opposing the buildings. "We feel that a pillar in the sky is out of character with the surrounding area," he said.

The hearing was conducted by the Cook County Zoning Board of Appeals, which is considering a change in zoning from R-7 general residence to R-8 planned unit development (PUD).

Petitioners Mary Ann Reding, owner of the property and Des Plaines are seeking the zoning change that would allow the twin high rises to be built on the site of Fisherman's Dude Ranch, east of the Tri-State Tollway and west of Potter Rd. If the plan is approved, the buildings would be the tallest outside the City of Chicago, according to village and city officials.

Architect Jeffrey Orloff unveiled plans to construct the high rises on 74 acres of land, including the fishing pond and a lake. The two buildings containing a total of 441 units would rise in tiers of 20, five and six stories, with one-two and three bedroom units. Additional plans call for a health club and a 200-seat restaurant.

Landscape amenities would include a fence on three sides of the property, with mounding and planting of trees and bushes on the fourth side facing Golf Rd. The large lake on the land, which

## Fleet Watch fights crime

The Park Ridge Police Department and city service employees have joined forces to implement a special crime prevention program in their community. The program, Fleet Watch, utilizes radio dispatched public service vehicles to watch for and report crimes in progress, suspicious persons and suspected criminal activities to the police. Participating public service vehicles are clearly identified by bright green Fleet Watch bumper stickers.

"Fleet Watch enables us to provide more thorough coverage of Park Ridge, thereby helping to reduce crime and assure the safety of our residents," said Lieutenant William Hominick of the Park Ridge Police Department. 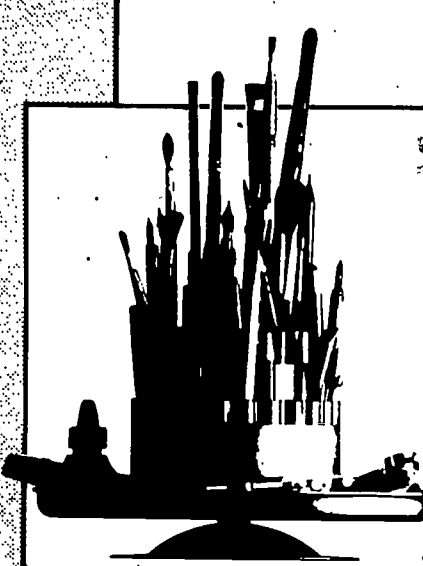

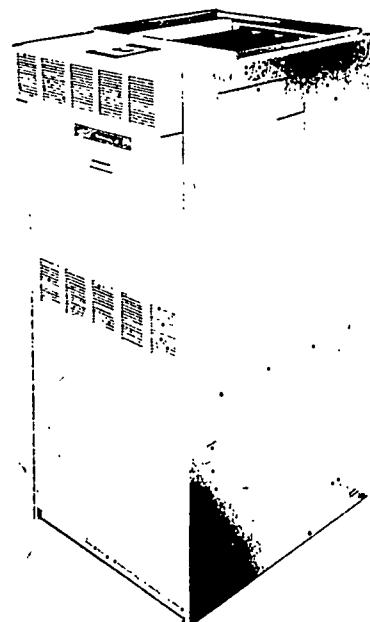

### EDITOR'S NOTE:

Robert Gorey, manager of The Fireside Inn of Morton Grove told The Bugle they are new owners and unaware of any precedent that had been set with the Little League parents in past years. He noted the property being used by the baseball parents is easement property which The Fireside Inn is paying Commonwealth Edison \$1,330.80 per month so they can have the convenience of adding parking for their clientele when needed. Mr. Gorey emphasized that no car has ever been towed from the property to his knowledge.

He added the illegal parking by the baseball parents created a problem for him a short time ago when he had two wedding parties on Saturday morning and there were 30 to 40 cars, vans and trucks illegally parked on the property. At that time, he had to tell visitors to seek parking elsewhere when the lot became filled.

After that, he posted no parking signs which promptly brought a contingent of 8 women, en masse, to The Fireside to protest his actions. "They were rude and voiced their objections in front of a customer who was arranging an \$8,000 wedding," Mr. Gorey noted. The signs were subsequently torn down, property has been damaged and he has received threatening phone calls.

"No official representative from the Baseball League has ever contacted me and tried to sit down to see if parking arrangements could be worked out," he added. Mr. Gorey said he finally took the problem to the village of Morton Grove and Village Administrator Larry Arlt is currently attempting to arrange such a meeting.

Mr. Gorey added he was not in business to antagonize people and disliked being put "on the defense for not doing anything wrong. After all, how would these people feel if someone parked illegally in their driveways at home."

### Parent/Adolescent Series

"I want my kid to be successful" is a thought which is very important to most parents. And many parents are very concerned that their teenagers will be overwhelmed with all of life's pressures and frustrations. With good reason the statistics on teenage drug and alcohol abuse, suicide and depression point out how poorly some of our teenagers are doing. It is obvious to any adult who even casually observes teenage behavior that many of them are making poor decisions. Maybe it's time to ask why so many smart kids are making so many dumb decisions. It certainly isn't that they are lacking the intelligence to make good decisions. It must be something else. Maybe "having" a good mind isn't enough anymore. Maybe our children need to know how to "use" their good minds—and believe that they can use their minds to make difference in their lives. And that, of course, refers to attitude—their preformed beliefs about themselves, others and life. We have noticed that many teenagers at their early stage of development are already suffering from "hardening of the attitudes"—and that condition may lead into paralysis and depression.

Unfortunately, many people talk about changing attitudes in our teenagers, but do very little about teaching positive attitudes. There is one fact which is undeniable—most attitudes are caught—not taught. And what attitudes are your children catching from you? A positive attitude is contagious. Others will catch it from you. There is no doubt that how you feel will influence others around you, including your teenagers. After all, your teenager's moods do affect you. If they snap at you, you are more likely to snap back at them. Also, the opposite is true. If they are in a good mood you will more likely be in a good mood.

So when you decide to change your teenager's negative attitude, first look in the mirror. It is very difficult, if not impossible, to give your teenager these positive attitudes without your having them to give. That can mean simply being optimistic and confident about your own abilities. Greet the day with some positive expression. Express your confidence that you can deal with life. Practice thinking positive thoughts throughout the day. It really works. Oh, by the way, if you are saying "I have nothing to be positive about" then dig a little deeper, change your way of thinking and you will discover you do have something to be positive about.

Unfortunately, having a positive attitude sounds corny today. But more than ever before, a positive attitude is a prerequisite for success and satisfaction in life. Success is getting what you want in life. And satisfaction is wanting what you get. Both are decisions. Only you can decide what you want, and whether your wants are realistic and achievable.

Dr. Cisek's "IDEAL" process has three special meaning for the successful kid: One meaning of IDEAL is that it represents the five steps in the problem solving process. Identify the problem. Describe the possibilities. Evaluate the ideas. Act out a plan and Learn for the future. The second meaning of IDEAL is what you get when you use the problem solving process—an IDEAL answer. The third meaning is the positive attitude that there is no problem so big that I can't deal with it in some way, to some degree. If you didn't believe you could solve your problems, you won't use problem solving. So a positive attitude comes first. If you believe you can solve it, you will try to. Now, if we can only live that and convey it to our children, then there is the possibility that they might live it also.

water rate increase on to the residents. "We can't afford to put the village water fund in deficit. He added the water fund provides financing for operation and maintenance of the water system.

Mayor Nicholas Blase noted Niles is among 52 communities involved in a lawsuit challenging the rates Chicago charges them for water. "Residents will get a refund should any part of the Chicago increase be proved unreasonable," he said.

Blase added the trial currently being heard by Circuit Judge Albert Green-Is "half over" and hopes a decision will be made in the near future.

Attorneys for the suburbs rested their case in April after calling three witnesses to support their contention that the rates charged by Chicago are unreasonable and discriminatory.

Witnesses acting in behalf of Chicago are currently giving testimony in the courts. The reports from expert witnesses will be used in the city's final arguments.

The suit argues that suburban municipalities pay excess water rates for water they buy wholesale from Chicago. The suburbs are seeking a water rate reduction and a refund totaling approximately \$180 million.

Since 1973 (when the suit was filed) there have been three rate increases. The most recent, in 1981, boosted water rates to 69 cents per 1,000 gallons. The new rate calls for 77 cents per 1,000 gallons.

In other business, the board approved payment of \$100,000 to the Niles library to help purchase the old Shell service station property at the intersection of Waukegan Rd. and Oakton St.

Blase read a letter from Library Board President Harry Pestine informing the village that the library had signed a contract to buy the property for \$255,000. It also requested the village to help finance the purchase by contributing \$100,000.

The board approved the amount requested on condition that the money would be refunded in the event the library sold the property in the future.

According to Seiman, the \$100,000 will come out of the village's general fund.

In other action, the board tabled a request to purchase a police monitoring system in a bid offer of \$69,596 by II Morrow Corp of Salem, Oregon.

The tracking unit originally requested by Police Chief Clarence Emrikson would enable the department to detect where officers in patrol cars are located at all times.

Trustee Peter Pesole questioned the need for tracking units, saying the device was a "big brother" concept. "I feel it would create a morale problem," he said.

Emrikson said the tracking system would create a more effective police department and protect the safety of police officers.

After a board discussion, trustees said they would delay the matter to obtain more information on the viability of the tracking device.

Under new business, the board gave conceptual approval of industrial revenue bonds in an amount not to exceed \$2,000,000 requested by MPC Products Corp.

Vincent Roberti, vice president of the firm, said the company has two buildings, one in Skokie, the other in Chicago. "We want to move the Chicago facility to Niles," he said.

He noted the company on March 13 sent approximately 3,200 surveys to determine unresolved problems with service.

Of the 282 returned, he said, 113 complaints were related to television service and the balance technical problems and billing procedures, he said.

Baxter said the cable firm has installed two village "hotlines" to the company's customer service desk. "Complaint calls are getting through more quickly now and response time is within a 48-hour period."

He went on to say the company has connected the park district and library to the system with installation at the Tam golf course scheduled for completion next month.

We feel that we have looked into the quality of service and there has been a big improvement over the last few months. I think the village should take this into consideration and postpone final disposition on the fine."

Trustee Angelo Marcheschi, chairman of the Niles Cable Commission, agreed improvements have been made and many of the problems corrected.

He made a recommendation to the board to allow the cable firm 60 more days to continue improvements in other areas," he said.

At the end of that time, we can review total performance and take any action we want."

Marcheschi said the village will use an objective "third party" to review Cablevision performance. "We are going to use the Cable Television Information Center (CTIC) from Washington D.C. to look into Cablevision service. Investors can review the report CTIC submits to help make a decision on any action we may wish to take with the company."

Although the board agreed to give Cablevision 60 more days "to clean up their act", trustees said the fine must be paid within a reasonable period of time.

Village attorney Richard Troy said the village will give the company a few weeks, in which to pay the \$112,500 fine. "If they don't, I will file a complaint in the court ordering Cablevision to pay it."

In a related matter, Mary Lou Meyers, president of the Niles-Morton Grove League of Women Voters, said she was concerned with the lack of public access training classes. "We were told classes would begin in May, but not many have taken advantage of them."

She suggested the village wage an "educational campaign" to inform Niles residents of training sessions in the use of the television cameras and other equipment. "Public access should be publicized in the village newsletter, newspapers and cable guide," she said. "Public access is as important as service."

Pat Felece, assistant manager for Cablevision said the company would escalate publicity on the training sessions via Channel 19 (public access station). "We can give more information on the sessions and what they involve to inform the public. We are also willing to meet with the League on any suggestions they may have to inform residents about public access."

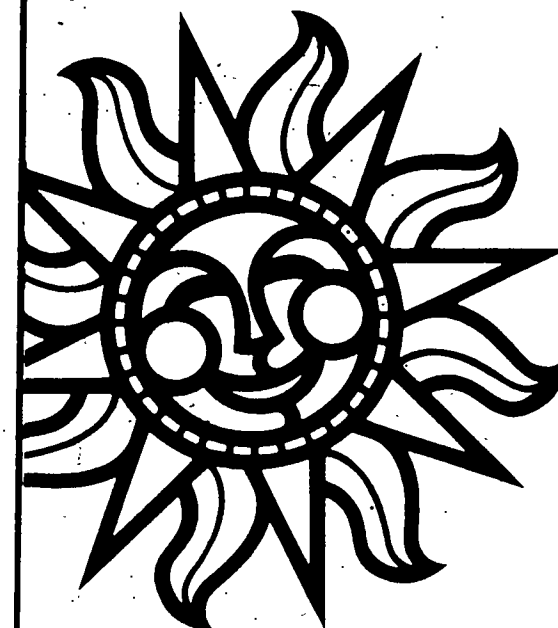

### Kustra bill raises teachers tenure qualification

Teachers would need three years of classroom experience instead of two to qualify for tenure under a bill sponsored by Sen. Bob Kustra, R-28, which the Illinois State Senate approved this week.

The measure, SB 398, now goes to the House for consideration.

"There has been tremendous criticism and resentment of tenure laws," Sen. Kustra said. "A three-year probationary period would provide a better basis for evaluation of teachers' abilities and performance. This requirement is already in effect in Chicago schools and my bill would extend it to all Illinois school districts."

Sen. Kustra pointed out that because of present notice requirements for teacher dismissals, decisions often must be made after a teacher is observed for only 16 months of actual classroom work. "This is really too soon to make a judgment that can be so difficult to reverse," he said.

Tenured teachers can be dismissed for immorality, conditions of health detrimental to the welfare of pupils, incompetency, unprofessional conduct, neglect of any professional duty or willful failure to report suspected cases of child abuse.

"While these are all very valid reasons for dismissal, they are not always easy to substantiate,"

Sen. Kustra said. "A three-year probationary period could help school districts to obtain a quality faculty by allowing them to delay tenure decisions for a year."

Sen. Kustra said he expects strong support for the bill in the House of Representatives.

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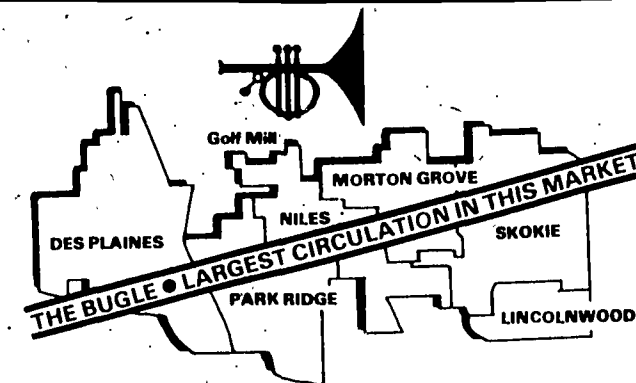
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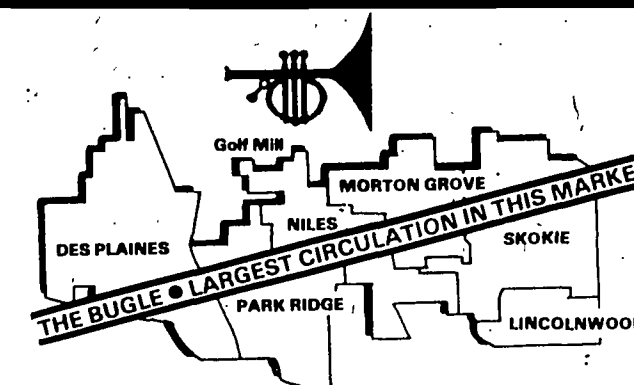
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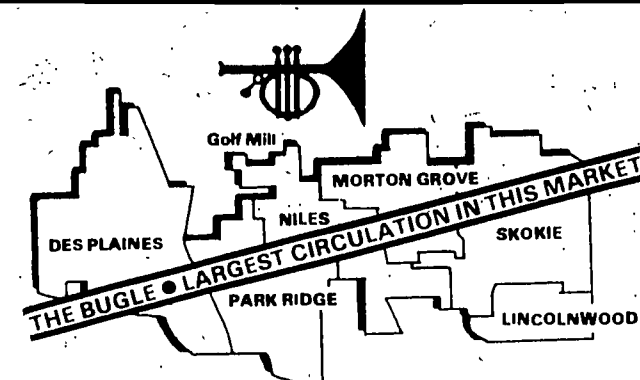

began the ride into the coun-  
try. It took three hours to  
drive 45 miles.

The greatest difficulty in the  
country towns is the center of  
town has a circle with four or  
five roads entering into it. You  
must allow the traffic on your  
right the right-away and if you  
can nudge your way in, you  
then move to the next town. It  
took two days of driving to feel  
comfortable. The small two-  
lane roads were accessible in  
the country, but when you  
came to a town, the parked  
cars forced you into the on-  
coming cars' lane. You began  
feeling like a halfback on  
wheels as you skirted back  
and forth in and out of the  
lanes as you narrowly avoided  
the oncoming cars bearing  
down on you.

No matter where you go in  
England you'll find  
Americans. You can go to  
Lands End at the tip of  
England and you'll find  
Americans there. Come to the  
Roman baths in Bath and  
more Americans. Out in the  
remotest countryside in  
Stonehenge and there's  
Americans wandering over  
the fields. At the theatre in  
Chichester, Americans are  
there seeing an old Noel  
Coward musical. And in Bath,  
Lauren Bacall opened in  
Sweet Bird of Youth and  
Americans were in attendan-  
ce.

The strong dollar has at-  
tracted our countrymen to  
England. Unlike 12 years ago,  
they're on a spending binge. In  
the early 70's you could see  
them at Mark and Spencer's  
Department store buying  
cashmere sweaters for \$20.  
Today, they're all wearing  
Burberry coats at one-half  
what they'd pay at home. And  
at the china shops, the  
Wedgwood shop, and For-  
tmann and Mason's elegant  
food shop in London, there  
seemed to be more Americans  
than there were in all of  
England during World War II.

In the countryside, when  
you're viewing Lord Moun-  
tatten's estate, there's an  
Englishman around to remind  
you, "This is your history  
too". It almost sounded like  
they still think of us as coming  
from the colonies. But  
brushing shoulders with  
history which is 1,000 to 2,000  
years old is awesome. At  
Avenbury the rock formations  
go back at least 1,000 years  
and the Roman baths at Bath  
date back to the first century  
A.D.

Back in London you rub  
shoulders with the punk  
rockers, with their wild hair-  
dos colored in two and three  
colors.

In London the subways and  
subway stations are much  
more safe than in Chicago.  
There's no graffiti as you see  
here and going into "the tube"  
at 11 p.m. is nothing to be  
feared.

Discipline and correct behav-  
ior in London seems to be  
much more under control than  
here at home. Last fall we hesi-  
tated riding the subway at 59th  
Street in New York City. It

was menacing and seemingly  
dangerous. In London there's  
no such fear.

In the newspapers they were  
reporting a series of stricter  
laws were about to be enacted  
which read somewhat restric-  
tive of people's civil liberties.  
But when you see how much  
better the society obeys the  
laws, you pause in criticizing  
such restrictiveness.

On Sunday afternoon we  
visited Hyde Park Corner  
where the Speaker's Corner  
had 15 soap boxes voicing  
their views. As many as 500  
people were surrounding one  
speaker.

The soap boxes included a  
very erudite Methodist  
minister, a communist from  
the midwest, several mid-  
dle east young people,  
religious speakers, political  
speakers and others. There  
were people praying on their  
knees with rosaries in their  
hands alongside Iranian  
students defending the  
Ayatollah.

Naturally, the favorite sub-  
ject of the speakers was the  
"Americans". But most of the  
time the criticism of America  
was done with little anger.  
Surprisingly, the communist  
speaker was among the least  
critical of America. On the  
other hand he drew the largest  
crowds and was contested  
more heatedly than the other  
speakers. But when an  
audience member got out of  
hand, even those who  
disagreed with the com-  
munist reminded the audien-  
ce agitator this was a free  
speech assembly and his  
abuse would not be tolerated.  
A couple of times the police  
(bobbies) will stroll around  
the rear of the crowd, quite  
unobtrusively, just making  
sure free speech would flow  
freely.

You got a second impression  
of this democratic country.  
They were tightening up their  
laws on civil liberties but were  
passionate in making sure  
free speech would be adhered  
to at this point.

We brushed shoulders with  
the past. And we tasted the  
charm of the country villages.  
And we enjoyed the friend-  
liness and warmth of the  
people. We endured their  
roads and their cars. And the  
best food we had was ethnic  
food (Italian and French).  
They pride themselves on  
their roast beef and Yorkshire  
pudding. As an old roast beef  
man we would have to say  
they flunked the course in this  
department.

We felt a bit uncomfortable  
watching Americans over-  
whelm the more posh stores  
with their money. While the  
merchants were happy to  
receive all these pounds, the  
invasion of the rich Americans  
recalled what they said about

will front the proposed buildings,  
will be designed in a marina con-  
cept for boating activities, Orloff  
said.

"We are also planning a  
jogging trail and picnic areas for  
residents. Our goal is to retain  
the natural beauty of the site," he  
said, adding the project would not  
have a negative effect to the en-  
vironments and would be compatible  
to the surrounding area.

Further plans call for parking  
spaces for 666 cars in a three  
level, above grade level garage in  
each of the buildings, with a  
street level parking for another  
178.

During the five hours of  
testimony, engineers for the  
development said the twin high  
rises would have a complete life  
safety system in fire protection  
measures comparable to "high  
rises built in Chicago." A  
sprinkler system would be in-  
stalled throughout the two  
buildings, as well as a fire detec-  
tor system to conform with fire  
safety codes. The North Maine  
Fire Department will provide fire  
protection service.

Fire Marshall Morris Farbm-  
an of the Maine North Fire De-  
partment said he reviewed the site  
plans, and was satisfied with the  
proposed fire protection devices  
for the buildings.

He explained requirements for  
fire protection include a sprinkler  
system, stand pipe system for  
water supply, fire hose packs,  
fire doors and protected stair-  
wells for evacuation to a safe  
area in emergency situations.  
"We also require a tie-in alarm  
system to the department," he  
said. "I feel we can provide good  
fire protection to the project."

Attorney Jordan Shifren,  
representing the Bay Colony  
Homeowners Assn. asked Far-  
bmman whether a water pump or  
other equipment could malfunc-  
tion in fighting a high rise fire.

Farbmman replied that  
"anything is possible" in  
emergency situations. However,  
we have back-up aid from other  
fire stations which participate in  
a mutual aid program," he said.

Farbmman noted that North  
Maine equipment consists of a 100-  
foot aerial ladder, three pum-  
pers, and a paramedic ambulan-  
ce.

Des Plaines City Attorney  
James Smith expressed concern  
over water pressure in the event  
of fire breaking out in the upper  
floors of the building. "Although  
booster pumps will be installed in  
the building, residents in the area  
have complained of low water  
pressure from time to time," he  
said. "I feel a study should be  
made to increase fire protection  
service, as well as police protec-  
tion in the unincorporated area."

Domestic Utilities Company  
will furnish water to the proposed  
project, according to Orloff. The  
Sheriff's Police has jurisdiction  
over the three-square miles of  
unincorporated Maine Township.  
Land planner Ralph Campbell,  
acting in behalf of the petitioner,  
presented exhibits to point out the  
subject property was contiguous  
to commercial buildings, shop-  
ping centers, mid-rise buildings  
and multi-family complexes  
along Golf Rd.

Campbell explained the  
proposed project is in line with  
the 1964 Cook County Com-  
prehensive Plan (which Camp-  
bell authored) for land use, in  
which a tall building acts as a  
"central cone" pyramided by  
multi-family complexes and  
commercial developments.

"Tall buildings have less den-  
sity than mid-rise (10-12 stories)  
and multi-family complexes per  
acres of land. I feel the proposed

project would preserve the  
natural beauty of this site and  
would be compatible to the  
surrounding area which is  
smaller in type and density."

Testimony from a traffic ex-  
pert elicited the information that  
vehicular traffic from the high  
rise complex would generate  
more than 400 cars at peak hours  
of the day. "However, about 200  
vehicles would turn east on Golf  
Rd., and the balance west, he  
said. Two driveways would be  
located at opposite ends of the  
complex, one for ingress-egress,  
and other for exit purposes only.

"Traffic flow would work ef-  
ficiently with sufficient gaps to go  
onto Golf Rd.," he said, adding  
that safety factors would be a  
problem with construction of  
"sheltered left turn lanes."

The project which is expected  
to cost approximately \$25 million  
would generate \$1.5 million to  
taxing bodies. According to  
testimony from a witness, North  
Maine would generate 30 children  
to receive \$166,000; High School  
District 207 between \$750,000 to  
\$800,000; School District 63 in ex-  
cess of \$200,000 and Cook County,  
\$100,000.

According to Orloff, the high  
rises would generate 30 children  
at the elementary school level, 12  
for high school and 23 preschool.  
He noted the development would  
attract young professionals, mid-  
income and high income families.  
Residents of the Bay Colony  
condominium complex lying ad-  
jacent to the proposed develop-  
ment objected to the height of the  
building and traffic problems on  
Golf Rd.

Joe Haggerty, president of the  
condominium association, com-  
plained about the quality of water  
supplied by Domestic Utilities.  
"The water corrodes water  
heater pipes, causes sink stains  
and has a bad odor. Low water  
pressure also presents  
problems," he said.

He presented a slide exhibit  
which showed backup of cars on  
Golf and Potter Rds., and on  
Dempster St. "The high rise  
complex would compound traffic  
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Mayor Blase told the board that  
suburbs near the site do not want  
a big city environment. "There  
would be an imbalance to  
aesthetics if the development is  
approved," he said. "A pillar in  
the sky would destroy that bal-  
ance, and we would have to live  
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Officials from Niles, Park  
Ridge, and Des Plaines requested  
30 days to respond to the petition,  
a time period which allows the  
respective boards and city coun-  
cils to consider the request and  
file a protest with the county  
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Because the site is located in an  
unincorporated area, all villages  
within one and one half miles  
radius may recommend approval  
or disapproval of the petition to

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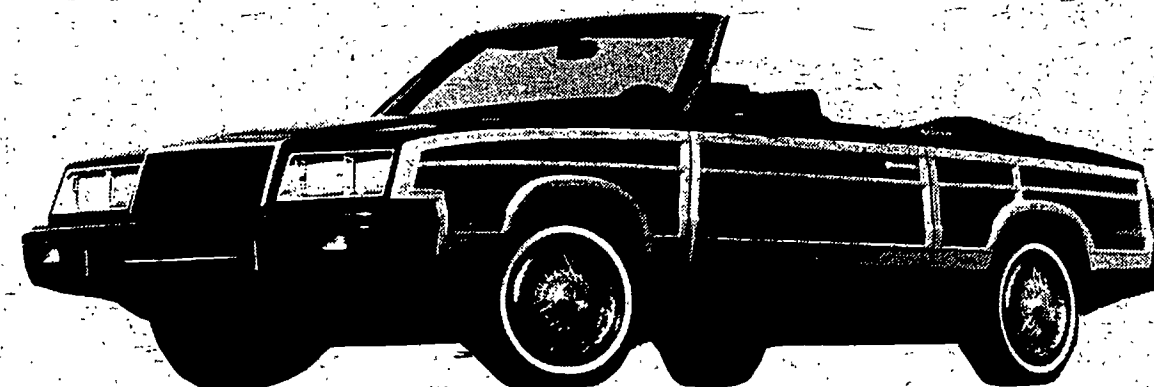
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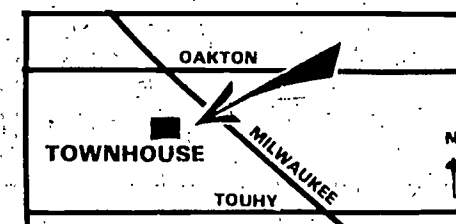
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
