# 10 week Coca-Cola strike settled


A 10-week strike against Coca-Cola Bottling Co. by Teamsters ended Sunday when Teamster members ratified a concessionary contract, which included a lower wage for new employees and elimination of a second worker on many delivery

About 360 employees of the Niles plant, 7400 Oak Park ave., went on strike May 13, as well as three other Coca-Cola facilities in the Chicagoland area.

The pact was approved by Teamster members in the 303-135 vote. The contract expires April'

Under terms of the contract, the company will eliminate a driver's helper from 48 of its 143 delivery routes over a four-year period. Reportedly the excess helpers will either work as drivers or in some other capacity

Drivers will receive a small increase in commissions on some products (by case) they deliver. According to the contract, they will get two increases totaling 3 cents per case next year, and a establish a two-tier wage penny each in the following two

# District 207 to lose tax \$\$\$

Maine Township High School District 207 is one of six suburban school districts which will lose money under the state aid formula revision bill passed recenty by the Illinois State Legislature. Maine will lose \$10,513.03 according to Superintendent James L.

"We will lose that money because the formula is based on an equation that includes enrollment and the relative wealth per student," said Elliott 'When enrollment declines, a district not only loses money for each lost student, but also for the increase in relative wealth per student that results from that

According to Elliott, the bill that passed was intended to be working outline. However, because of the last minute dynamics in the legislature, the bill passed with a wide margin before State Superintendent Ted Sanders had an opportunity to review it. Sanders had appointed a committee of 10 superintendens from high school districts, elementary districts, and unit districts to study the bill. The committee had determined that it was important that no group o districts was severely hurt by the formula revision.

Other districts that lost money include Thornton Township High School District, Leyden Community High School District, Thornton Fractional, Homewood-Flossmoor, and Ridgewood, The state aid formula sunsets in 1987.

Studies indicate that alcohol is a contributing factor in up to 70 percent of all boating fatalities nationwide. \_Balance and coordination can

be affected after one drink. For example, if the occupants of a small boat or canoe attempt to change places, they may capsize the boat or fall overboard.

Once in the water, intoxicated persons may find that their ability to swim is also impaired. They may be excellent swimmers when sober, but may not be able to save themselves if they have been drinking.

Alcohol threatens safety to reducing inhibitions. A person who is normally safety conscious may be more likely to be involved in high risk situations and participate in dangerous stunts. Drinking and boating is

especially dangerous at night because alcohol affects vision. recover from the glare of bright lights can be delayed 20 to 50 percent, and it takes up to six hours to return to normal. The ability to distinguish between red and green is also impaired. This is important because red and green running lights are used to control

boat traffic at night. A bill making it illegal to operate a watercraft while under the influence of alcohol or other drugs has passed both houses of the Illinois General Assembly.

# hat's the best borrow money?

When you need to borrow money for a car, a refrigerator, vacation, college education or something else you want, you may be wondering how to get the best deal on a loan.

Here are some questions you might ask yourself to help you find the best way for you

Are you ready to shop for the best rates and terms? For instance, it almost always costs you more to borrow from a loan company or use a credit card, than it does to borrow from a credit union, bank or savings

You may find differences, too, from one institution to another.

"The program has worked out well for communities and the county. It frees up bed space in our overcrowded jails and prevents the release of persons who have committed more serious crimes," he said. It also has a positive effect on participants in the program. Many have told me they are going to think twice before driving a car while under the influence of

Hughes said that county residents will benefit from the program. "It provides the opportunity to do some constructive work, and at the same time. serves for the betterment of the

Hughes recalled the park district implemented a similar public service work program in 1983 designed to make juvenile offenders accountable for vandalism in the parks.

The program was undertaken by the park district and the Juvenile Division of the Niles Police Department, which made young offenders responsible for acts of vandalism and provided iuvenile officers with an alternative to the court system.

The program was structured in four-hour shifts held the first Saturday of each month.

Work assignments included planting flowers and bushes, removing litter and repairing equipment. The youths performed one hour of work based on each \$2 worth of damage to park property. A group of adult volunteers supervised the work.

Funds which make up the General Fund include those from real estate taxes, replacement tax, interest, per capita funds and levies. According to the Library's ac-

countant, most of the library surplus was used up and board members have to start operating on what's coming in. About \$750,000 was spent during the last fiscal year on a library addition. The accountant said "Board members must decide between

needs, wants and wishes." The largest part of monies coming in to the General Fund are from real estate taxes. estimated to be about \$825,000 for the 1985-1986 fiscal year. Other funds, not including levies, will be about \$172,700 for a total of \$997,700. Funds for the 1984-1985

fiscal year were \$1,010,500. Harry Pestine, board president, said the \$825,000 amount, based on real estate taxes, should be the floor amount board members consider.

Myles Dimand, board member. said the library aimed only at real estate taxes "in the past" and accumulated money while the library lost employees due to

low salaries. In regard to reserves on hand, the accountant said board members have only about \$422,000 as of June and want to spend \$476,000. She said, "If you go along with this, you will have
