

## Park studies alternatives to soaring insurance rates

Because of the soaring costs of liability insurance, park district commissioners are considering adopting a program waiver clause for participants in recreational activities.

According to board attorney Gabriel Berrafato, the park district, like other governmental bodies, is facing a serious in-

surance crisis. "We must find ways to cut nuisance (liability) claims because of the risk factors involved in recreational programs," he said. If the measure is adopted, it would mean all participants in programs must sign a waiver in an activity which could result in injury. "This would give protec-

tion to the park district for any injury claim," he said.

Berrafato admitted it's not an "absolute solution" to the liability insurance problem, but it is a step in the right direction.

Programs cited which have a certain degree of risk were volleyball, softball, ice skating, Continued on Page 43

## Library board reviews annexation defeat at polls

Reporting on the Nov. 5 election at the Niles Library Board Meeting, the library attorney said the annexation referendum failed in two areas to be annexed but was passed in the Niles Public Library District. By law, the referendum would have to pass in areas to be annexed as well as the District.

According to the attorney, precinct 74 is half in and half out of the District but residents there, regardless of where they lived, voted for all three items. He said there was a "mathematical possibility" the referendum could have passed and board members could decide Continued on Page 43

If "Big Daddy" Nick Blase and his village board "Little Daddies" met us on Dempster Street and asked us for directions to reach Oakton Street, you can bet your old patootie they'd travel 25,999 miles in the opposite direction rather than accept The Bugle's advice.

## AIDS scare produces problems for village officials

The fear that continues to surround AIDS is producing unexpected problems to some municipal officials who may take steps to protect the health and safety of their public safety officers.

Last week Skokie police officers said they would no longer practice mouth-to-mouth resuscitation (CPR) on mannequins, expressing concern that the mannequins could be infected with the virus believed to cause AIDS, a destructive breakdown of the immune system.

In the aftermath of the incident, Skokie Valley Hospital, which conducts an annual refresher course for the officers, temporarily cancelled its CPR classes for the public according to a hospital spokesman.

Captain Bill Terpinas of the Niles Police Department admitted some of his officers have been

**DISHING IT OUT...** village officials over the years have regulated about everything...from pornographic material, off-track betting parlors, male dance acts at the old Mill Run Playhouse to receiving or satellite dishes in their traditional father-knows-best syndrome...under the divine right of home rule powers.

Some years ago, a town father remarked during the restricting of something-or-other...that Niles laws are not meant for laughs, but new legislation from Capitol Hill could give the last laugh to petitioners...who have been stymied by the village board in efforts to install satellite dishes in their backyards.

The new legislation recently enacted into law by President Reagan not only states that use of a home satellite system is legal for all homeowners everywhere, but also makes it almost impossible for anyone in the future to operate scramble transmissions not available to the public from a public access satellite.

Will the new law affect board decisions in the future regarding the state-of-the-art system? Time will tell...it's a real cliffhanger.

**AROUND TOWN...** Long-time Niles resident Eva Meyers...supervisor of Sears catalogue department for 24 years...is busy completing plans for a holiday luncheon for members of the Chicago WAC Veterans Association to be held at the Continental Hotel in Chicago on Dec. 14. Eva, who is president of the group, said 150 members belong to the organization...the only one of its kind in the state. Many of the former WACs (Women's Army Corp) will be coming from all parts of the country to attend the annual affair.

Eva served in World War II from 1943 to 1945 and was stationed in New Guinea and Manila doing administrative work. A highlight of her army stint occurred while she was being transferred to a new post in Manila and saw a flotilla of ships in the harbor...and learned Japanese officials were signing the peace treaty aboard the "Big Mo" battleship.

Lynne Zielinski recently attended the Adult United States Camp at the Alabama Space and Rocket Center. ACLU 'interested'  
in Niles' obscenity laws

A spokesman for the American Civil Liberties Union in Chicago has said the ACLU is "very interested" in the Niles anti-obscenity ordinance and will be reviewing it to determine if it violates constitutional provisions relating to freedom of speech.

Babette Joseph, a representative of the ACLU, said the organization which specializes in legal tests of ordinances and laws infringing on constitutional rights, would be reviewing ordinance 22-20 of the Niles Village Code.

Niles has recently sought to enforce the controversial measure which calls for the removal of certain selected adult magazines from newsstands. The ACLU, according to Joseph, acknowledges the rights of communities to establish their own standards of acceptability but wants to take a look at selective enforcement of the ordinance.

Emergency Flashing Light

The system, developed by the Morton Grove Advisory Commission on Aging, is composed of a receiver transmitter, and a flashing red strobe light that is plugged into an electrical outlet. The wireless transmitter is carried by the disabled person and may be activated by pushing the transmitter button. Activation of the system may occur up to 500 feet. By placing the system in a street-facing window, the flashing light will alert neighbors, cruising police cars, and other residents that the home needs emergency assistance. The strobe light brightness is intense, measuring 500,000 candlepower. Installed by volunteer members of the Advisory Commission on Aging, the cost of the system is \$60. Avoid the possibility of having to go through ice and snow to renew a drivers license this winter by renewing early. Renewal notices are mailed more than one month before the expiration date and licenses may be renewed up to one year early.

If you decide to renew your license early and have not received a renewal notice, an application will be printed by computer at the driver facility. You must provide a drivers license and two other forms of identification. Early renewal will not change the expiration date on the new license because all licenses expire on the driver's birth date.

Although written and/or driving tests may not be required for renewal, all motorists must go to a facility for the vision test and to have a photo taken.

To avoid the busiest times at the driver facilities, drivers should renew their licenses on Tuesdays or Thursdays at Cook County facilities and on Wednesdays, Thursdays or Fridays at facilities outside of Cook County.

through the Spring of 1986 and that this may become a permanent location for bus traffic. NORTRAN buses will no longer stop at the island near Milwaukee ave. nor the curbs between Sears and J.C. Penney's department stores, as they have done in the past.

Both NORTRAN and Golf Mill management regret any inconvenience and are working together to provide rider amenities for the new waiting area.

## EC offers travel/study to Jamaica

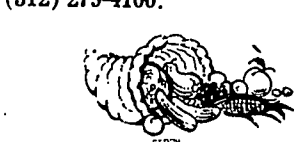

Thus, individuals and especially older people with painful joints or weak leg muscles will usually find it possible and comfortable to move in the water. It is much easier to do leg straddle or stride stretches in water than on the floor. Many individuals jog in the water, but are unable to do so on land!

### CREATIVE COOKING



From an old southern cookbook comes this rich, wholesome recipe for banana bread.

#### OLD SOUTH BANANA BREAD

- 3 ripe large Dole Bananas
- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 1/2 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1-1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 2/3 cup unprocessed bran
- 1/2 cup whole wheat flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup chopped figs
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Mash bananas to make 1-1/2 cups. Cream butter and sugars until light and fluffy. Beat in mashed bananas, egg and vanilla. Combine flours, bran, baking powder, cinnamon and salt. Beat into banana mixture until blended. Stir in figs and walnuts. Pour into a well-greased 9 x 5-inch loaf pan. Bake in 350° F oven 1 hour 15 minutes until bread tests done. Cool in pan 10 minutes. Turn onto wire rack to complete cooling. Makes 1 loaf.

## Capparelli urges seniors to apply for energy assistance

"The average payment per household last year was more than \$200, which really helps ease the burden of today's spiraling

heating bills," he said. "For many seniors and handicapped persons, the program could mean the difference between service and a shutoff during the winter months."

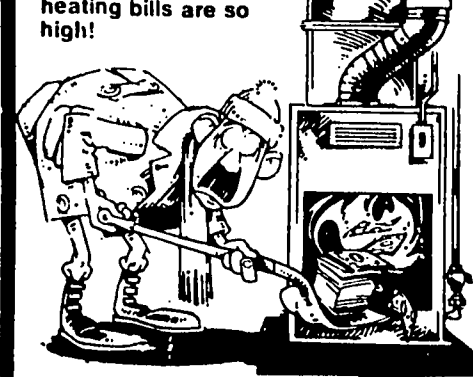

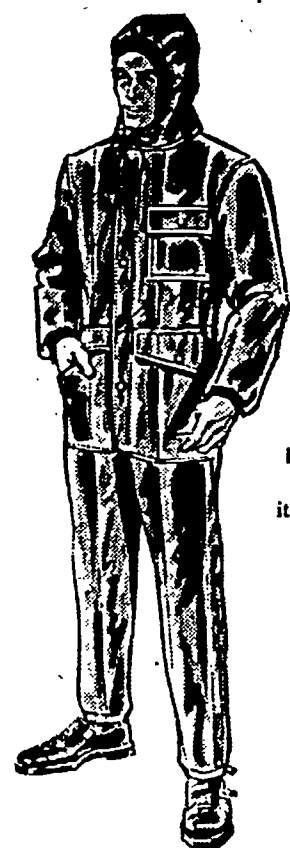

### OCC cagers ready for new season

Oakton Community College basketball Coach Tom Jordnt thinks something old combined with something new will lead to a winning season for the Raiders in the Skyway Conference.

He'll get a preview Thursday, Nov. 21, when the Raiders take on a team of OCC alumni players in the J. Dennis Lamping Memorial Basketball Game, at 7 p.m., in the gym at OCC/Des Plaines, 1600 E. Golf rd. The public is invited, free-of-charge.

The "old" Jordnt has high hopes for "is returning starters Roger Ernst and John Leonard, both of whom Jordnt believes will make their presence felt around the conference this season. The "new" is sophomore guard Tom Kaufman, a transfer from Harper; former Maine West guard Tim English, who has enrolled at Oakton after three years in the Air Force; and Rob Heybrook, a 6 foot, four inch, 220-pound bruiser, who also has a good chance of being the starting catcher on the Raider baseball team.

"I think we'll be tough," Jordnt assessed. "You never really know what the other teams will have in the way of new players, but nobody has many coming back from last year."

If the Raiders are going to have a winning season, Leonard, a six foot, two inch, guard; and Ernst, a six foot, five inch, forward; will have to supply much of the fire power.

Leonard, a Maine South grad, began last season as the Raider's sixth man, before working his way into the starting lineup after Pete Janus' injury.

"John got his chance because of Pete's injury," Jordnt said, "but he probably would have made his way into the starting lineup, anyway. He kept improving as the season progressed, and we're hopeful that he'll pick up right where he left off last season. John's very good at taking the ball into the

middle and then either shooting or passing off to an open teammate. He's also a little taller than many of the guards we play against, and can use his size to his advantage."

Jordnt said Leonard's attitude and composure also are an advantage over many players. "He works hard and he's very intense," Jordnt said, "but he keeps his cool. He doesn't get rattled very easily. I'll definitely be depending on John to be a steady influence on the team." Jordnt hopes Ernst plays more dominantly this season as he did on occasion last year.

"I expect Roger to be steadier this year," Jordnt said. "He showed us that he has the ability to play—he's a good shooter and a good rebounder. All Roger has to do is play with more intensity."

As for the newcomers, Jordnt said he expects Kaufman to play an important role right away for the Raiders. "He's an outstanding shooter and he has very good court sense," Jordnt said. "He had a lot of success in high school, and I think this experience will help."

English, Jordnt said, should bring some added maturity to the Raiders, after having served three years in the Air Force. "I don't really know how much he played while he was in the Air Force, but I think he'll be ready to play," Jordnt said. "He's quick—he'll be a good ball handler and I think he'll do well defensively."

Jordnt said he expects Heybrook to be a big help around the boards. "He's big and he's a good athlete. I'll take a while before we see how he does with the rest of the team, but that's pretty much the case for everyone. Aside from Roger and John, everyone is somewhat of an unknown. I think there's some talent, though, in those unknown players."

### Stricter academic standards for Maine athletes

The academic eligibility requirements for student athletes in Maine Township High School District have become more strict because of new requirements imposed by the Illinois High School Association.

In order for an athlete to be eligible for participation in the Maine Township athletic program he or she must be doing passing work in four classes, not counting physical education. The athlete must also have received passing grades in four classes the previous semester.

### Neset Center Mammography Screening Unit opened

The Neset Health Center recently announced the opening of a Mammography Screening Unit. The center is located at 1775 Ballard rd., Park Ridge. The technically advanced equipment used in the screening can detect breast cancer in its earliest stage. Early detection of the disease is the only preventive approach available at this time.

This can be accomplished through the mammogram and yearly physician examination. The mammogram is a special low-dose x-ray. It has life saving potential for women who have no symptoms of breast cancer.

Traditionally, it has been used to help diagnose breast lumps which have already been detected, but its greatest benefit is in screening women who have no symptoms to find unsuspected cases of very early breast cancer.

One out of 11 women will develop breast cancer during her lifetime. It is the leading cause of death in women between the ages of 40 and 50. Although eight out of ten breast lumps are not cancerous, only a health care professional can make that determination. Women, over the age of 35, who have a personal or family history of breast cancer, are at great risk.

The American Cancer Society recommends that all women between 35 and 40 have a baseline or initial screening to serve as a basis for future comparisons. Women age 40 to 50 should have a mammogram every year or two depending upon their risk factors. Women who are over 50 should have a mammogram every year. It is important to note that women with symptoms or family history of breast cancer may require more frequent examinations.

In a recent screening project conducted by the American Cancer Society and the National Cancer Institute on 288,000 women between the ages of 35 and 74, mammography detected nearly 90 percent of the 3,557 cancers uncovered. Furthermore, the cancers detected by mammography were in a very early stage, curable in a majority of cases.

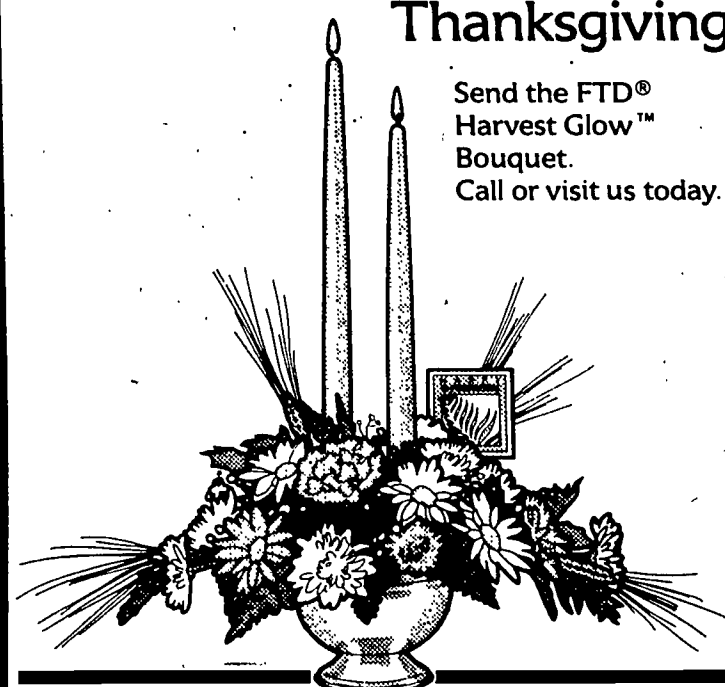

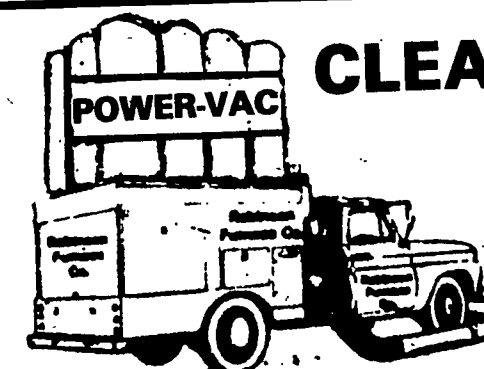

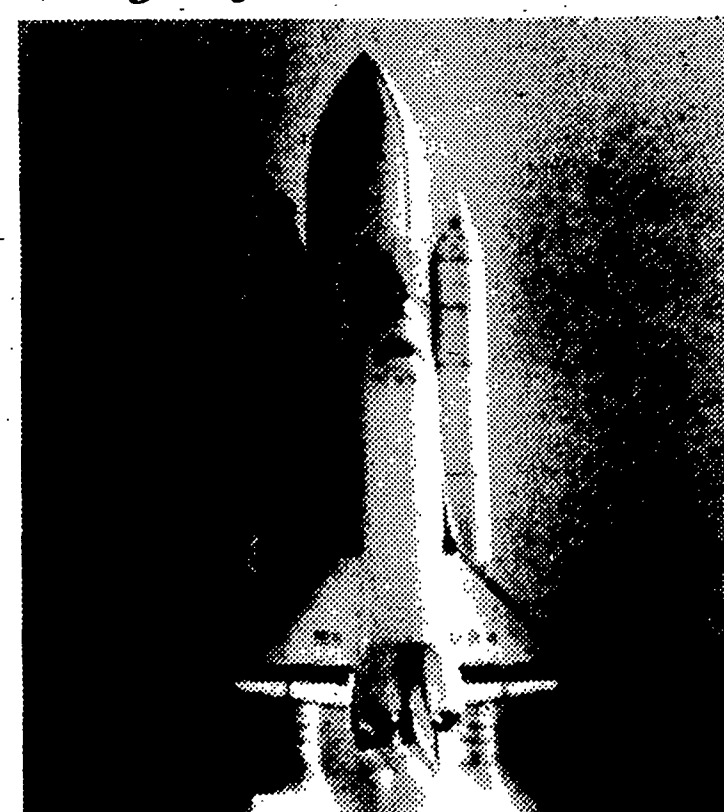

## Happy marriages are the key to health

For decades we have known that married people live longer than single - that heart disease, cancer, stroke or even accidents are more likely to hit single people, especially the widowed or divorced. Now a 38 state study by Drs. John Guidubaldi and Helen Clemshaw indicates that divorce may also harm children's physical health. The changes in family structure, roles and resources leaves the single parents overwhelmed by "role overload."

Unfortunately divorce has become so widespread that many consider it to be of epidemic proportions. More than half of all marriages end in divorce. There are many reasons for marital failure, but one stands out above the rest: a lack of commitment towards solving the everyday problems of marriage. It seems

easier to call a divorce lawyer. This trend is destroying the very fabric of our society. Formerly loving couples turn into hostile, aggressive adversaries. The children tend to become fearful, guilt-ridden, full of pain, anger and confusion.

Family and friends want to help but are often ineffective. Divorce is an "everybody loses situation" - there are no winners. Although this sounds hopeless, there are alternatives. The Re-entry Center, a non-profit agency serving families torn apart by marital discord or in midst of the painful process of divorce or separation has expanded its program of Marriage and Family Counseling. 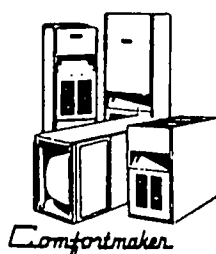

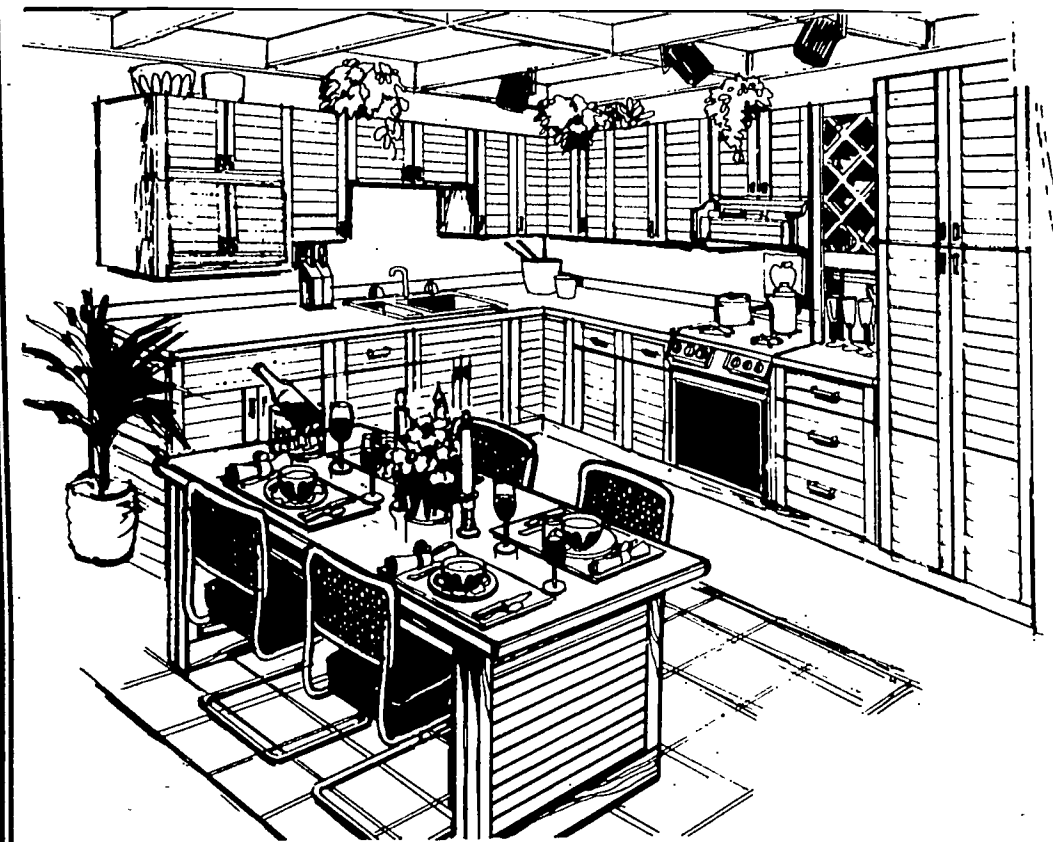

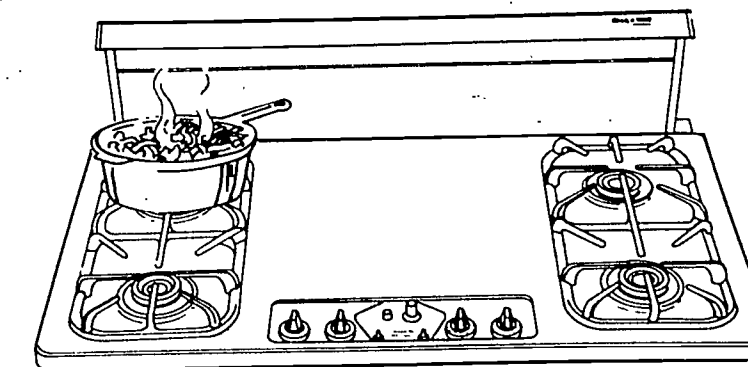

## Maine East senior breaks 'Tiny Bubble'

Everyone has to break out of their self-conscious 'bubble' at some time, and for Jeff Gail what better time to do this than his senior year at Maine East.

Along with thirteen other seniors and one junior, Jeff assembled an act for the recent V-Show at Maine East. This was not your ordinary act, for the guys, including Jeff, dressed as Hawaiian hula girls, singing and dancing. "The best part about it is that there is no talent involved. We just went out and had a good time." The group called itself "Don Hock and the Bubble

Girls," performing to "Tiny Bubble's," best known when performed by Don Hock.

Lucky for this senior from Morton Grove, his involvement in V-Show didn't interfere with his part-time job. For four years now Jeff has been selling T-shirts at college football games. In fact, he probably travels more for his part-time job than any other student at Maine East. The company he works for concentrates on Northwestern University and University of Wisconsin home games so he is busy most Saturdays during the football season.

For Wisconsin games the day's work begins around 5 a.m., and Jeff usually gets home around 10 o'clock. It sounds like a long day's work, but Jeff says it's kind of nice; he can get a glimpse of college life and make some money at the same time. Jeff says he would like to continue his part-time job, but it would be difficult since he's going to Illinois State next year studying pre-business/accounting. "That's why most of my money goes into the bank. I want to have enough spending money at college."

## District 207 committee on teen suicide

"The high divorce rate, easier access to alcohol and drugs, and other social pressures have all combined to increase stress on young people today leading to higher suicide rates among adolescents," said Dr. George Krueger, chief psychologist for Maine Township High School District 207.

That alarming trend reached District 207 in 1984 when two Maine students became suicide victims. At the recommendation of Dr. John T. Benka, assistant superintendent for general administration and personnel, and Krueger, Maine established a committee on adolescent suicide last fall. Since then, the committee has been seeking ways to increase awareness of suicidal signs and promote intervention strategies to stop suicides before they happen, according to Krueger.

In May, the committee sponsored workshops on adolescent suicide for faculty members. Reverend Dan Stauffacher, an expert on adolescent suicide and cohost of Channel 2's Saturday morning program "Different Drummers," talked to teachers about watching for the signs that may indicate suicide.

Crisis teams were established in each building to work with students who might be at risk.

These teams also provide one on one contact should any tragedy touch the life of any student according to Krueger. "That includes not only suicide, but any other tragedy as well," he said.

During the 1985-86 school year, the committee will expand its activities to include workshops for students, suicide prevention weeks in each Maine high school, and workshops for parents.

The students workshops, which will be part of a suicide prevention week, will actively involve every student in suicide prevention. "If they know the warning signs of suicide, students will be more likely to seek help for themselves or their friends," said Krueger.

Suicide prevention weeks in each building will be scheduled between now and January. Evening parent workshops will be scheduled in the spring.

Although the growing number of suicide prevention programs worry some people who believe it is a subject that should not be discussed, Krueger disagrees. "All literature and research shows that getting the topic out in the open reduces the number of suicides," he said. "We have been lucky because we have had no suicides since the two in 1984. We hope these workshops prevent anymore."

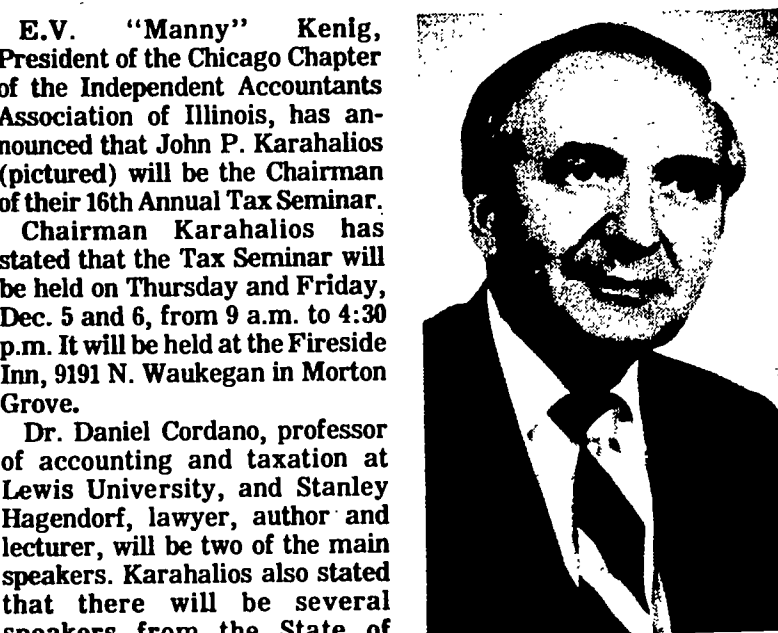

## No choice for Centel Customers

Central Telephone Company's customers here are not being required to choose a primary long distance telephone service right now, according to Catherine Dudderar, customer services manager.

"We have plans to notify our customers at least three months before it's necessary for them to select a primary long distance service," she explained. "However, we don't need to do that yet because we haven't been asked by MCI, Sprint or other long distance companies to provide 'equal access' service at this time."

With equal access, customers have the option to use such long distance networks as Sprint, MCI, Allnet and others in the same way they have traditionally

used AT&T: by dialing "1" plus an area code and a local number. However, with equal access only one long distance service per line can be designated as the "I plus" carrier.

To dial up other available long distance networks it will be necessary to use a five-digit access code. For instance, for Allnet the number is 1044, for AT&T 10288 and for MCI 10222. "There are more than 300 competing long distance telephone companies in operation today," said Dudderar. "Not all of them are in every market. We will provide our customers with details on what services are available for Centel customers when the time comes to preselect a long distance service."

## Crack down takes its toll

The crack down on toll cheats by the Illinois State Police has had an impact on the compliance rate at the toll plazas.

The State Police began to work both covert and overt toll evasion details at the unmanned plazas back in April of this year. As a result, the compliance rate jumped from 88% to 91.3%.

Captain George P. Hornyak, Commander of District 15 State Police in Oak Brook commented, "Of the twelve unmanned toll plazas, five of them have shown a 2% increase while the Spring Road Plaza in Oak Brook had a 4% increase; the Farnsworth Avenue Plaza in Aurora had a 5% increase; and the Half Day Road Plaza in Deerfield showed a 7% increase in toll payment."

"These figures are significant," continued Captain Hornyak, "in that they indicate that our selective enforcement

does impact targeted areas. Our troopers are doing an outstanding job and will continue to work the toll evasion details in the near future."

If a motorist is caught and convicted for toll evasion, the fine could range from \$50 to \$100 plus court costs.

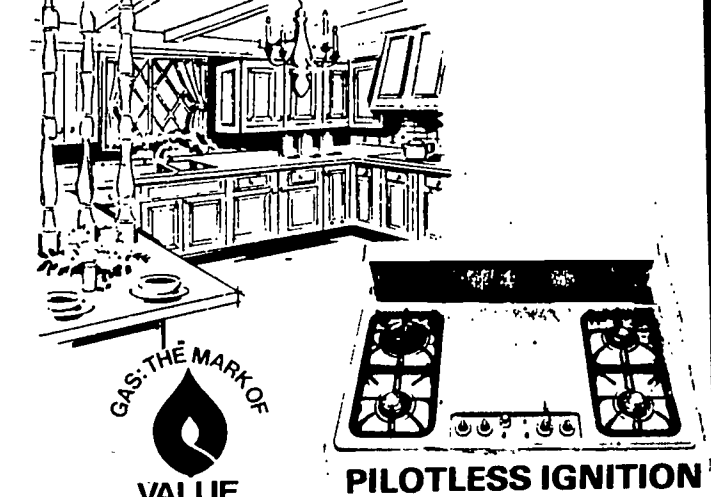

## Residents concerned over Salvadoran bombings

Residents of the North Suburban and far Northwest Chicago parts of the 11th Congressional District visited the district office of Congressman Frank Annunzio on Tuesday afternoon November 5. They expressed their concern that the Salvadoran armed forces are engaged in the bombings of civilian populations and presented documentation of the bombings from the human rights organization, Americas Watch.

The delegation asked that Annunzio oppose U.S. military aid to El Salvador, that he co-sponsor the Conyers Resolution which condemns the indiscriminate bombing of civilians, and that he come in person to a public meeting with members of the 11th District "Stop the Bombing Campaign. They also presented petitions against military aid collected from various parts of the district.

Congressman Annunzio's aide Jim Parker told the group that he did not expect that Annunzio would agree to their request to vote against military aid. He

suggested that the group make a formal written request for a public meeting.

Delegation member Carmen Pappas of Lincolnwood commented, "We told Annunzio's aide that it is our tax dollars that, in the

most part, have financed the blood bath that is currently going on in El Salvador. We said that we need to understand that we are meddling in a civil war. But I don't know whether we had an impact."

## CUB enclosure in Commonwealth Edison bills

Commonwealth Edison customers will find something other than that half a billion dollar rate increase in their next electric bill. Along with Edison's new, higher rates, customers will receive a message from the Citizens Utility Board (CUB).

A CUB enclosure reading "WARNING: This utility bill could be hazardous to your budget!" will be sent out in bills to 2.8 million Edison customers throughout November. The "warning sign" is actually a CUB membership form.

"If you're fed up with Edison's skyrocketing electric rates, now is your chance to do something about it," Susan Stewart, executive director of CUB, said. "Every new member gives CUB

added strength to fight against companies like Commonwealth Edison. We plan to fight this outrageous increase but it will be a long and expensive battle."

Edison was granted the \$495 million rate hike Oct. 24 and the new rates, which will result in increases of as much as 20 percent for residential customers, took effect immediately. CUB plans to ask a Cook County Circuit Court to overturn the increase.

Illinois law allows CUB to insert its literature in utility bills at least four times a year. CUB pays for the printing of the inserts and they are approved by the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC).

"The message we are sending to Edison customers in their electric bills is a warning. We're warning them that unless we all fight back, there will be more and

bigger rate hikes in the future," Stewart said.

Along with soliciting new members to help CUB fight the Edison rate hike, as well as other utility increases, CUB is asking consumers to voice their outrage over the increase by writing to Governor James Thompson.

CUB, a 130,000-member statewide utility watchdog, was created almost two years ago to help consumers fight for lower utility rates and legislation that protects consumers. Since its inception, CUB has intervened successfully, in several rate cases and was instrumental in securing consumer-oriented reforms of the state's Public Utilities Act.

board. She relinquished her chairmanship on the cable committee after Big Daddy and the little Daddies reversed her committee's recommendation for a cable company. The committee had concurred with the recommendations of a joint 18-suburban community committee, which Niles was part of, but they were vetoed by the big and little Daddies of Niles.

At election time The Daddies had a full ticket including a new Momma. Ms. Panek, who had been a part of the Blase tickets in past years, decided she would prefer to run as an independent, which would leave her beholden to no Daddies, big or small. In other words, "her heart didn't belong to Daddy."

Blase and the Daddies, who had workers in every nook and corner of Niles, still were running scared. Just before deadline, Blase's party put up an independent Momma candidate, who is a friend and longtime party member. Since she is a Momma and running as an alleged independent, it was conceived she would drain off enough votes from Panek to assure the Daddy Party's election. She collected 938 votes. Panek lost by 449 votes.

In past years Big Daddy Blase had appointed Bart Murphy and Abe Selman to the village board. Subsequently, they have been elected at the following elections. The new appointee will be Blase's first selectee who was not first elected to the present board.

"If they refuse to place their mouths on the dummies as part of the CPR session, we have to respect their rights. But they would do their duty in an emergency situation.

Terpinas noted the disease has been around for a long time. "They just did not put a name to it. When Rock Hudson died from AIDS, the fear of contracting the disease spread all over the country. There is general misconception about transmitting of the virus... that is the big problem," he said.

Lt. Marty Stankowicz agreed police officers would perform their duty in life-saving situations, such as administering CPR. "However, the officers are not involved that much because paramedics are called to the scene in emergencies," he said. "I really feel we don't have a problem in the department concerning AIDS."

Fire Chief Harry Kinowski said Monday that paramedics use air bags in performing CPR which have a greater exchange of oxygenized air. "It's a manual resuscitation device and not a mouth-to-mouth concept with very little danger of contracting AIDS," he explained.

Kinowski noted no one in his department has indicated they would not do CPR, on the mannequin called "Recorda Annie," which is used in the individual fire stations for CPR recertification purposes. "We use alcohol-soaked swabs to clean the doll after each person uses it," he

said, adding that AIDS virus can only be transmitted by direct contact with the victim "by blood or semen."

In light of the Skokie police incident, Kinowski said he will consider whether better equipment is available for CPR training and expressed interest in a new type of mannequin to be used by Skokie Valley Hospital.

The Skokie hospital has put its CPR training on hold until it receives a new type dummy called "Chris Clean" that has a disposable face. According to a spokesman from the Northbrook-based Armstrong Industries Inc., which manufactures the doll, each student is given his own mask to place on the dummy making it unnecessary to clean it between students.

The mannequin's "lungs" also are changed after each use to prevent the spread of airborne germs, the spokesman said. The basic "Chris Clean" cost \$460 and a deluxe model more than \$1,000, a price Kinowski termed as "relatively cheap."

"We have not received any warning from the fire department's project hospital St. Francis (a resource center for the department) about using Annie, but I would like to obtain more information on the new doll that has been put on the market," he said.

Mary Anne Marcotte, emergency medical service coordinator for St. Francis Hospital in Evanston, oversees

tion (under Chapter 11) on July 25, but had failed to get permission from bankruptcy court to pursue his suit against the village.

"We found out about it when he (Silverman) and his attorneys failed to show up for a deposition at my office and we did some investigating," Troy said. Further investigation revealed Silverman failed to exercise his option to renew the lease on Bubbles last April.

A. L. Zimmer, attorney for Silverman, confirmed the filing for bankruptcy protection and the court must approve counsel for any form of litigation. "I'm sure we will receive that approval and go on with our suit against Niles," he said.

According to Zimmer, Chapter 11 protection will give Bubbles protection from creditors and allow it to remain in business while reorganizing to become profitable.

A decision has been made not to seek another restraining order after the legal technicality is corrected. "We feel the damage has already been done (loss of revenue at Bubbles) and it would not be prudent."

The controversy began when Silverman filed a civil rights suit in federal court to stop constant police checks (for underage drinking) via the injunction and to seek damages for loss revenue, estimated at 50 percent, because of alleged police harassment.

Troy said Bubbles' suit is "frivolous," and is based "on the wrong reasons. He claims the bar has suffered financially because of police harassment and contends the stepped-up patrols began in early July after the village found out it was a gay bar," he said. "The point is...he filed in bankruptcy court on July 25 and could not possibly have lost \$500,000 in revenue in several weeks." The suit was filed in August.

The \$500,000 figure was filed as Silverman's debts in bankruptcy court records. His assets were listed at \$200,000.

In an interview with the Bugle Newspapers, Silverman stated the Chapter 11 action was not an issue in the Niles suit. "It's a separate issue, saying the \$500,000 debt was incurred during the remodeling of Bubbles last January. It is an amount owed to my partners. I filed for the reorganization bankruptcy to give me time to make the business a success. It could

CPR training for new paramedics from Niles. She said that a cream product called MANICK-aid is used on the mouth and nose of the mannequin after each use.

"It has been effective against Herpes virus, bacteria and fungi. There is no reason to believe the product is not effective against the AIDS virus."

She went on to say the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta has emphasized it is "highly unlikely" the AIDS virus is transmitted by saliva. "We alleviate the fear of contracting the virus by telling paramedics to cover their hands with surgeon's gloves when they start intravenous fluids (IV) on a patient to avoid getting body fluid on them," she said.

The public needs to be properly informed about contracting the virus. "People should be educated and then be allowed to form their own conclusions based on sound information," Marcotte said.

become a \$1 million operation." He explained the lease on Bubbles was not renewed because the wording in the language was not clear. We are in the process of negotiating with the landlord to renew.

Silverman added he has received threatening phone calls for the past several weeks.

Adding to his woes, Silverman recently received a 48-hour suspension of his liquor license after two minors were arrested for drinking in the bar.

Noting Bubbles employees have been vigilant in checking patrons' IDs because of the every other night police checks, Silverman said the two minors apparently gave forged IDs to the bartender. "They just got rid of them when they were taken to the police station. Forged IDs are so sophisticated now...you can't tell them from the real thing."

In discussing the 48-hour suspension, Silverman said Mayor Nicholas Base (liquor commissioner) ignored a "stay order" from the Illinois Liquor Commission, which would have stalled the local penalty. "The state group would have had priority in hearing the case. Blase was given the document, but would not accept it. That's an abridgment of rights. It's like being in Nazi Germany...get out of my town, or else," he said.

Blase said he did "nothing wrong" in not accepting the order because it was too late for Silverman to appeal to the state commission. "The office would have been closed before he got there," he said, adding he had been assured by a commissioner everything was legally done.

Referring to the decision to drop the injunction against the police, Silverman said he and his attorneys would get rid of police harassment "some other way," but would not elaborate on what course of action would be taken.

"Blase won the battle...but he will lose the war," he said.

on the referendum remains Glenview residents who oppose annexation to the District. She adds, "Do vote NO."

for an injunction was withdrawn at a court hearing last Wednesday because of a steady stream of police visits and ID checks had eroded business to the point a simple injunction would make little difference in the financial health of the bar.

"We are going to a status conference on December 18 at which time we will clarify our case for damages against the village," Zimmer said. He affirmed his client's intent to seek damages from the Village of Niles, Mayor Nicholas Blase, Police Chief Clarence Emrikson and Deputy Liquor Commissioner Santo Bruno at that hearing.

Malcolm Silverman, the owner of Bubbles, Niles only avowedly gay bar, has claimed a conspiracy on the part of village authorities to drive him out of business because his establishment openly caters to the suburban homosexual crowd. Silverman maintains he was warned not to convert the failing hamburger restaurant into a gay hangout because "he (Blase) ain't going to like a gay bar in his town."

Scott Van Berschott, manager of Bubbles, says police visited the pink and black disco 91 consecutive evenings, "waving flashlights and checking IDs as they moved through the bar."

Berschott emphasized, "You have to understand, most guys just want to come here quietly and have a good time. It's a social club. When the police come through here, though, everybody just clears out. This is the way to crush a bar."

Zimmer said the status conference slated for December 18 will give all parties to the lawsuit a chance to see the evidence and, while his client is "not seeking an out-of-court settlement, he wouldn't discourage one, either."

Niles Police Chief Clarence Emrikson indicated he was not too worried about the lawsuit. Emrikson said, "I've been sued before. I don't get too worried about these things."

hockey and similar sports.

Park District commissioners will meet Dec. 12 to discuss the feasibility of a waiver clause and the legal aspects involved in enforcing the policy.

Niles Park District is self insured with the Park District Risk Management (insurance pool) together with 29 other park districts. Last September, the park districts were forced to revise the original figure of \$10,000 to \$50,000 in the insurance fund because of a 75 percent increase by PDRM.

In other business, the board approved a \$100 donation to the Westfield Homeowners Assn. in unincorporated Glenview said, considering results of the November election, board members could still turn back from the referendum scheduled in March. He said, "It is a waste of the taxpayer's money."

Harry Pestine, board president, said the "Project Plus" grant is paying for the election.

In other matters, board members approved a \$2,500 lease for one month use of a vacant lot adjacent to the library. The area, recently purchased by the Library, was the site of a gas station.

them drivers.

The state has already taken action to reduce this frightening condition. New legislation passed by the House will stiffen the penalties for a person convicted of driving under the influence. In addition a person must consent to take a breathalyzer test if

suspected or face an automatic suspension of his/her license.

Police Chief Emrikson has announced that Niles Police will be extra alert for the signs of a driver under the influence. The enforcement of the new laws will be stepped up and the police have been instructed to administer the breathalyzer test whenever there is good reason to suspect a driver is under the influence. He stated that every drunk driver behind the wheel of a car weighing 3,000 pounds or more is a potential killer and the Niles police will do their best to protect the families of Niles as well as other motorists.

Larry Renetzky noted, however, that any effort must be combined with strict law enforcement and stricter court supervision. The best group to begin this educational campaign with is our nation's youth - the 13 to 18 age group. The statistics on teenage drunk drivers are perhaps the most frightening of all, he stated. Drunk driving and car accidents are the leading killer of teens in this country. And of all the teens who die, 70% of them have drugs or alcohol in their blood. There could be no more traumatic experience for a parent than getting a phone call from a hospital or by the police informing you that your child is seriously hurt or killed.

The Mayor's forum on Driving Under the Influence (DUI) will be the major highlight of the Citizens against DUI. The forum is being held at the Niles Trident Center, 8060 Oakton st., Niles on December 5 at 7:30 p.m. Mayor Blase is urging all adults and especially parents of the children 13 to 21 years of age to circle their calendar for December 5 at 7:30 p.m. All are invited to hear a panel of experts discuss the problem and what to do about it. It's free and will involve school district #219 and #207 as well as the Village of Niles. More on this "Mayor's Forum" will be forthcoming next week - watch for it.

preferential parking as much disabled people do, but did not have a solution.

Although Boznos said he understood there is a need for additional handicapped parking at the center, he said there should be spots available close to the building for people conducting official park business.

"For staff members who are in and out every day, they should have easy access," said Boznos. "It costs the taxpayers money if they waste time walking around."

Said Weidinger: "They should walk."

Commissioner Dodee Connelly felt that she came up with a solution to the parking problem. She said seniors should utilize the free park district bus which would provide them with door service. However, Weidinger said, "We have people who can't get in and out of the bus."

The ultimate solution came from Boznos: "We need a new parking lot."

Park district notes:

A new pickup truck will be purchased from Jerry Gleason Ford in Niles, at a cost of \$7,382. Only two area car dealerships offered the board bids.
