



The wireless transmitter is carried by the disabled person and may be activated by pushing the transmitter button. Activation of the system may occur up to 500 feet. By placing the system in a street-facing window, the flashing light will alert neighbors, cruising police cars, and other residents that the home needs emergency assistance. The strobe light brightness is intense, measuring 500,000 candlepower. Installed by volunteer members of the Advisory Commission on Aging, the cost of the system is \$60. It is one of the best physical activities for people of all ages and for many persons who are handicapped. Vigorous water activities can make a major contribution to the flexibility, strength, and circulatory endurance of individuals. With the body submerged in water, blood circulation automatically encreases to some extent; pressure of water on the body also helps promote deeper ventilation of the lungs; and with well-planned activity, both circulation and ventilation increase still more.

Increased flexibility work is performed more easily in water because of the lessening of gravitional pull. A person immersed to the neck in water experienced an apparent loss of 90% of its weight. This means that the feet and legs of a woman weighting 130 lbs. immersed in water only has to support a weight of 13 lbs. Thus, individuals and especially older people with painful joints or weak leg muscles will usually find i possible and comfortable to move in the water. It is much easier to do leg straddle or stride stretches in water than on the floor. Many individuals jog in the water, but are unable to do so on land! As a Holiday special, the

Nesset Center Mammography **Screening Unit opened**

The Nesset Health Center cases recently announced the opening of a Mammography Screening Unit. The center is located at 1775 Ballard rd., Park Ridge. The technically advanced equipment used in the screening can detect breast cancer in its earliest stage. Early detection of the disease is the only preventive approach available at this time. This can be accomplished through the mammogram and yearly physician examination. The mammogram is a special low-dose x-ray. It has life saving potential for women who have no symptoms of breast cancer. Traditionally, it has been used to help diagnose breast lumps which have already been detec-ted, but its greatest benefit is in screening women who have no symptoms to find unsuspected cases of very early breast can-

One out of 11 women will develop breast cancer during her lifetime. It is the leading cause of death in women between the ages of 40 and 50. Although eight out of ten breast lumps are not cancerous, only a health care professional can make that determination. Women, over the age of 35, who have a personal or family history of breast cancer, are at great risk.

The American Cancer Society recommends that all women between 35 and 40 have a baseline or initial screening to serve as a basis for future comparisons. Women age 40 to 50 should have a mammogram every year or two depending upon their risk factors. Women who are over 50 should have a mammogram every year. It is important to note that women with symptoms or family history of breast cancer may require more frequent examinations

In a recent screening project conducted by the American Cancer Society and the National Cancer Institute on 280,000 women between the ages of 35 and 74, mammography detected nearly 90 percent of the 3,557 cancers uncovered. Furthermore, the cancers detected by mamstage, curable in a majority of "Plaines.

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



That alarming trend reached District 207 in 1984 when two Maine students became suicide victims. At the recommendation. of Dr. John T. Benka, assistant superintendent for general administration and personnel, and Krueger, Maine established a committee on adolescent suicide last fall. Since then, the committee has been seeking ways to increase awareness of suicidal signs and promote intervention strategies to stop suicides before they happen, according to Krueger.

In May, the committee sponsored workshops on adolescent suicide for faculty members. Reverend Dan Stauffacher, an expert on adolescent suicide and cohost of Channel 2's Saturday morning program "Different Drummers," talked to teachers about watching for the signs that

may indicate suicide. Crisis teams were established in each building to work with students who might be at risk.

Although the growing number of suicide prevention programs worry some people who believe it is a subject that should not be discussed, Krueger disagrees. "All literature and research shows that getting the topic out in the open reduces the number of suicides," he said. "We have been lucky because we have had no suicides since the two in 1984. We hope these workshops prevent anymore.

for an injunction was withdrawn at a court hearing last Wednesday because of a steady stream of police visits and ID checks had eroded business to the point a simple injunction would make little difference in the financial health of the bar.

"We are going to a status conference on December 18 at which time we will clarify our case for damages against the village," Zimmer said. He affirmed his client's intent to seek damages from the Village of Niles, Mayor Nicholas Blase, Police Chief Clarence Emrikson and Deputy Liquor Commissioner Santo Bruno at that hearing.

Malcolm Silverman, the owner of Bubbles. Niles only avowedly gay bar, has claimed a conspiracy on the part of village authorities to drive him out of business because his establishment openly caters to the suburban homosexual crowd. Silverman maintains he was warned not to convert the failing hamburger restaurant into a gay hangout because "he (Blase) ain't going to like a gay bar in his town.

Scott Van Berschott, manager of Bubbles, says police visited the pink and black disco 91 consecutive evenings, ''waving flashlights and checking ID's as they moved through the bar.

Berschott emphasized, "You have to understand, most gays just want to come here quietly and have a good time. It's a social club. When the police come through here, though, everybody just clears out. This is the way to crush a bar."

Zimmer said the status con ference slated for December 18 will give all parties to the lawsuit a chance to see the evidence and while his client is ''not seeking an out-of-court settlement, he wouldn't discourage one, either."

Niles Police Chief Clarence Emrikson indicated he was not too worried about the lawsuit. Emrikson said, "I've been sued before. I don't get too worried about these things."
