Niles police arrest 3 in drug bust

A major drug investigation looking into the possible use of Chicago street gangs to distribute narcotics in the Northwest suburbs is underway by Niles Police, and the Illinois State Police Metropolitan Enforcement Group (MEG). The undercover operation yielded the arrests of three area men earlier this month on felony charges of

"possession with intent to distribute cocaine", police said, and recovered cocaine with an estimated street value of \$22,000. Kevin Rose, 21, of Niles; James Hontos, 20, of Skokie and James Lybold, 21, of Evanston were arrested by Niles Police, in conjunction with Skokie Police and MEG agents, November 7 in a Continued on Page 50

District 63 ok's tax levy

An estimated tax levy increase of 14.75 per cent or almost \$9,000,000 is being proposed for East Maine School District 63 as approved by board members at a meeting Nov. 26 in the Educational Service Center, 10150 Dec. Rd., Des Plaines. A hearing on the proposed budget and proposed 1985 tax levy increase will be at 7:30 p.m. Dec. 17 in the ESC.

If approved, almost \$6,600,000 will be budgeted for the Educational Fund.

Other funds and tentative budgets are Operations, Buildings and Maintenance, \$1,361,300; Transportation, \$435,616; and Working Cash, \$181,507.

Three other funds are Illinois Municipal Retirement, \$265,930; Continued on Page 51

Moreover, a growing problem all over the U.S. is unemployment. I think we can do something to help the unemployed citizens of Niles by having a job assistance program. This would be very helpful to the unemployed. The job finding assistance might not find a long-term job but long enough until one finds his own job. In this way the unemployed citizens will feel that there's still hope in finding a new and better job.

In conclusion, more lights on side streets, underground telephone and electrical wires, a local radio station, telecall for the elderly and infirmed, and a job finding assistance program would make Niles a more desirable environment in which to live.

EMME program offers quick progression for students

Niles school program aids foreign speaking pupils

Niles Forum on drunk driving

The Village of Niles and Niles Family Service are joining forces to fight drunk driving by implementing a program "Citizens Against DUI". The public forum will be held at 7:30 p.m., Thursday, Dec. 5 at Niles Trident Center, 8060 Oakton St.

Lt. Marty Stankowicz of the Niles Police Department said police officers are vigilant about taking drivers off the road who appear to be under the influence. "There has been more booking of offenders on drunk charges since the DUI (driving under the influence) went into effect four years ago," he said. "We have seen a great number have their licenses revoked, suspended or placed under court supervision in the last few years."

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For children in foreign language-speaking homes, going to school in America can be a frightening and debilitating experience. The East Maine Multi-cultural Education program in Niles School District 63 was designed to combat this negative experience.

Niles used to be primarily a caucasian community, but since 1970, people from all over the world have made Niles their home. District 63 instituted the East Maine Multi-cultural Education program (EMME), in 1977 to accommodate the special needs of children from these foreign language-speaking homes and to assimilate them as quickly as possible into English-speaking society.

"Fifteen years ago, all of the kids were English-speaking and white," said Raymond Guper, associate principal of Gemini Junior High School and Melzer School. "Now we have Korean, Spanish, Indian, Russian and Vietnamese children."

In the 1970's, the majority of foreign students in Niles were

Spanish speaking. The Teaching English as a Second Language (TESL) program, with an emphasis on gradual and complete transition into the English language emerged from the Niles School District 63 was designed to combat this negative experience.

Many districts in the nation which have switched from TESL to immersion programs are under fire from Mexican-American education groups. In an article published in the November 10 New York Times, Cynthia Sanz wrote these groups "worry that the apparent success of immersion programs will be used as an argument against bilingual education for Spanish-speaking students, and that public funds once set aside for bilingual programs will be transferred to immersion programs."

However, Spanish-only

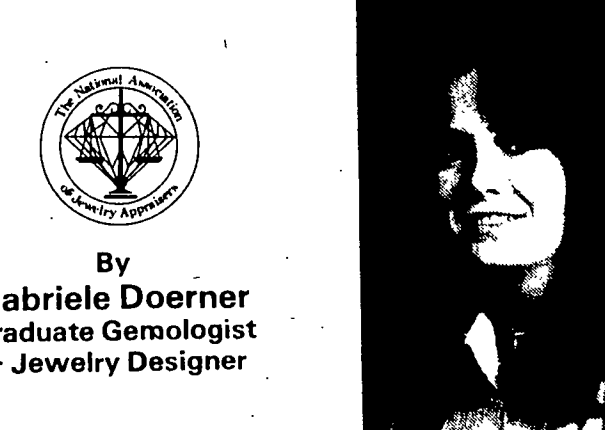

ZIRCONS

Blue Zircon is one of this month's birthstones. Zircon has been known since antiquity. The derivation of its name is uncertain. Because of its strong dispersion, it has great brilliance and intensive fire. Colorless Zircons are rare. But when they do appear they are brilliant cut to imitate a diamond, which is called a "Matare Diamond". The blue variety is also named Starlite, because when cut properly it sparkles like a star. The blue variety is also confused with the Aquamarine. In nature yellow-brown and red-brown are the most common. That variety is called Hyacinth. Green Zircons are rare in the trade and are in demand by collectors. All Zircons (except the green) have strong doubling, which can readily be seen under the loupe at the facet edges on the inclusions inside the stone; an important identification mark. The strong doubling is what makes this stone so unique.

EMERGENCY FLASHING LIGHT
Infirm and disabled Morton Grove residents will have access to a Remote Control Flashing Light System that will enable them to call for medical or emergency assistance. The system, developed by the Morton Grove Advisory Commission on Aging, is composed of a receiver transmitter, and a flashing red strobe light that is plugged into an electrical outlet. The wireless transmitter is carried by the disabled person and may be activated by pushing the transmitter button. Activation of the system may occur up to 500 feet. By placing the system in a street-facing window, the flashing light will alert neighbors, cruising police cars, and other residents that the home needs emergency assistance. The strobe light brightness is intense, measuring 500,000 candlepower. Installed by volunteer members of the Advisory Commission on Aging, the cost of the system is \$60. 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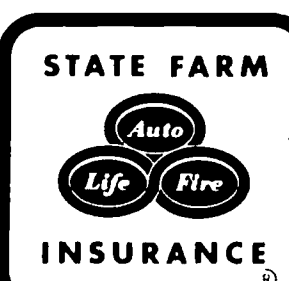

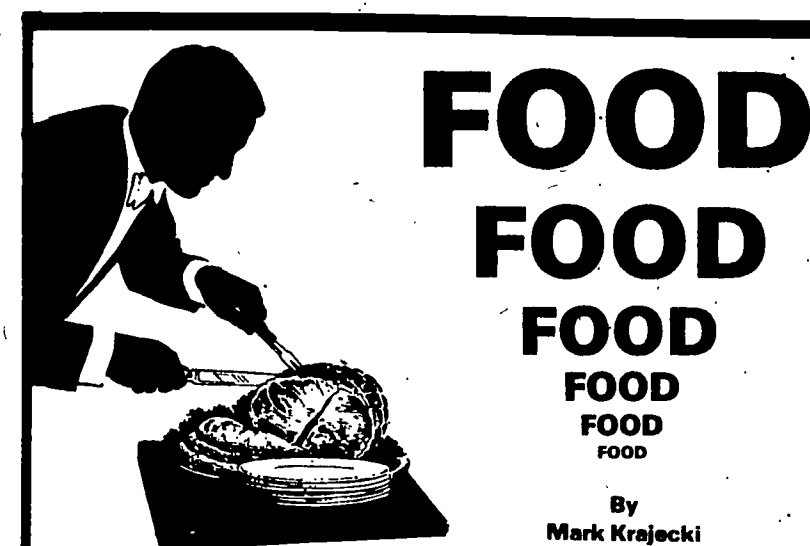

1/4 cup each sliced mushrooms and water chestnuts
1 clove garlic, minced
1 tablespoon oil
3/4 cup chicken broth
1 tablespoon cornstarch
6 cherry tomatoes, halved
Hot cooked rice
Drain salmon, reserving liquid; break into large chunks. Stir-fry asparagus, green pepper, mushrooms, water chestnuts and garlic in oil 1 minute. Combine reserved salmon liquid and chicken broth; gradually blend into cornstarch. Stir broth mixture into vegetables; cook and stir until thickened. Gently stir in salmon; cover and simmer 3 minutes or until thoroughly heated. Stir in tomatoes. Serve over rice. Makes 3 or 4 servings.
*One cup fresh or frozen, thawed broccoli can be substituted.

French Drama For Dessert

A good hostess requires a variety of talents, not the least of which is a sense of drama. A successful party menu, for instance, always builds to the grand finale—a spectacular dessert. *Pouding aux Marrons* is just that. It's based on *crème de marrons* (chestnut spread), which is just one of the many ways French chestnuts are available on the American market. A fine French spirit goes into the preparation of our dessert, Armagnac—the oldest of the great French brandies.

Served with a lovely French white dessert wine, *Pouding aux Marrons* offers a dramatic ending to a dinner party.

POUDING AUX MARRONS (Chestnut Pudding) (Makes 6 to 8 servings)

21-lb. 1-oz. cans *crème de marrons* (chestnut spread)
1 cup half and half
1/4 cup Armagnac brandy
4 eggs, well beaten
1 cup (1/2 pint) heavy cream
1 T. French orange liqueur
Grated rind of 1 orange
1 8 1/4-oz. jar roasted chestnuts

Mix *crème de marrons* and half and half until smooth. Beat in Armagnac and eggs. When well blended, pour mixture into greased 6-cup ring mold. Bake in preheated 350°F. oven for 1 hour or until firm to the touch. Cool and then chill in mold. In bowl, whip cream with liqueur and orange rind until thick. Run knife around edges of mold and tap to loosen. Invert onto platter. (If some of marron mixture sticks to pan, scrape out and spread over mold.) Place flavored whipped cream into pastry bag fitted with large star tip and pipe rosettes at sides and in center of mold. Garnish with roasted chestnuts. Chill until ready to serve.

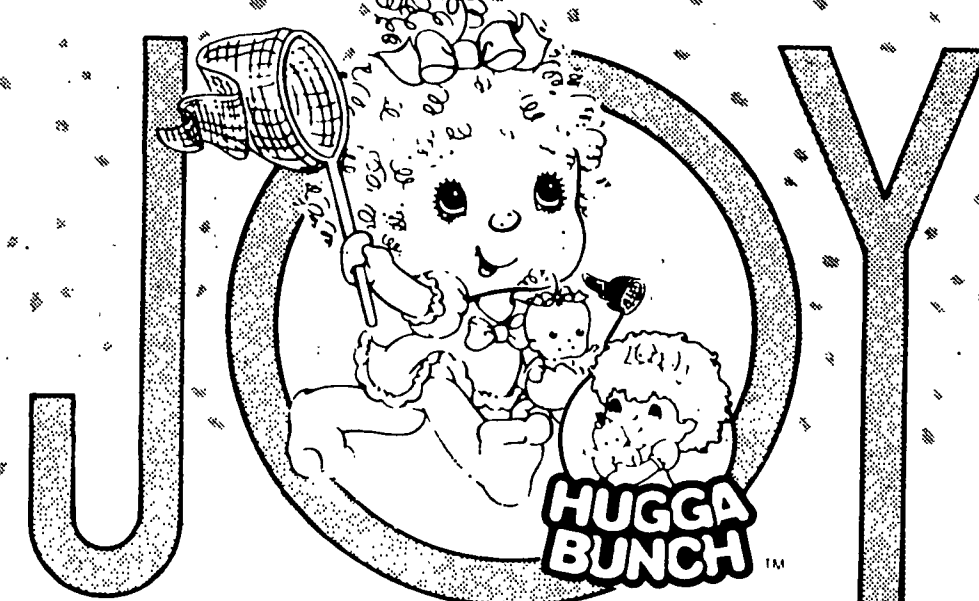

Holiday driving challenges motorists

Children four or five years of age must be in a child safety seat or safety belt. Although the Illinois safety belt law does not require rear seat passengers to wear safety belts, using them can prevent a second collision within the vehicle in the event of an accident.


Allow plenty of time to reach your destination safely by observing the 55 mph speed limit. Make regular rest stops along the way and stop driving if you feel drowsy. A cup of coffee, fresh air and stretching will help you stay awake. However, if you are very sleepy, take a nap.

Maine Township helps form disabled advocacy unit

Maine Township was one of three suburban Cook County townships to inaugurate a new Disabled Advocacy Division of the Township Officials of Illinois.

The new division was launched with a program featuring Sec. of State Jim Edgar as the keynote speaker at an educational conference sponsored by the Township Officials of Illinois Nov. 10 to 13 in Springfield.

Donna Anderson, Maine Township's handicapped services coordinator, played a leading role in organizing and implementing the program along with Gerry Bartnick of Schaumburg Township and Karen Daun of Bloom Township.

Edgar discussed recent legislation to control drunk driving and its results in reducing deaths and injuries. His remarks were particularly significant to Anderson who was disabled when she was hit by a drunk driver 16 years ago.

Edgar also explained his department's efforts to improve recognition of disabled parking ID cards.

Maine Township Supervisor Paul K. Halverson outlined Maine Township's programs for the handicapped, including its involvement in transportation issues and co-sponsorship with Lutheran General Hospital of a support group for physically disabled persons and their families.

Township representatives from throughout the state also heard a panel discussion focusing on

recent legislation, legal assistance, and insurance discrimination. Among other topics discussed was township involvement in initiating new programs for the handicapped with reports from Bloom and Schaumburg townships on educational and recreational programs they provide for handicapped residents.

The program was followed the next day with a visit to the Springfield Center for Independent Living, reputedly one of the best independent living centers for disabled persons in Illinois.

Anderson said the group also toured the ABLE-DATA headquarters, located in the Springfield ILC. ABLE-DATA operates a national computerized information network for disabled persons.

Anderson noted, "In my position as handicapped services coordinator, I frequently use this computer service for information and referral, and it has been extremely helpful."

The Disabled Advocacy Division established a volunteer board made of township representatives and will continue its efforts on behalf of the handicapped as a regular division of the Township Officials of Illinois.

Information regarding emergency school closings or emergency bus routes will be given to radio stations as follows: WBBM - AM 780, FM 96; WGN - AM 720; US 99 - FM 99; WCFB - AM 1000; WIND - AM 560; WCLR - FM 102; WJJC - AM 1160; WJEZ - FM 104.3; WMAQ - AM 670; WLS - AM 890, FM 95; WFPYR - FM 103.

School closing decisions are made on the basis of District-wide student safety. When schools are open on extremely bad weather days, parents should decide whether or not their children should attend school.

Emergency bus routes, using only streets designated as Park Ridge or Niles "snow routes" have been developed. Each child who rides a District 64 bus will receive the emergency routing of his/her bus indicating the bus

stops. If the announcement is made that transportation will be on "emergency routes only" for a given day, the buses will follow the designated emergency routes and schedules only.

The Maine Township Special Education Program (MTSEP) normally follows the same schedule as the Maine Township schools, including Park Ridge - Niles District 64. Therefore, if District 64 schools are closed, the MTSEP classrooms are also closed and transportation will be cancelled. If MTSEP classes are being held, normal transportation will be provided.

Politicos to hold insurance hearing

Senator Bob Kustra (R-Des Plaines) will hold a public hearing in Park Ridge, Dec. 4, on the growing difficulty in obtaining insurance coverage, particularly for local governments and small businesses.

Kustra said a panel of area legislators and insurance department representatives will discuss the emerging crisis in insurance coverage from 10 a.m. to approximately 3 p.m., Dec. 4, at Maine Township Hall, 1700 Ballard rd., Park Ridge. Joining Sen. Kustra will be Representative Penny Pullen (R-Park Ridge) and Representative Margaret Parcells (R-Northfield). The hearing is one in a series being sponsored across the state by the Illinois Department of Insurance.

"We will welcome testimony from government officials of employees and representatives from businesses and organizations and from individuals as well," Kustra said. "We want to hear from anyone who has encountered problems in obtaining insurance coverage or who has been faced with sharp increases in premiums."

"The problem of maintaining insurance coverage has surfaced right here in the 28th District," Kustra said. "Too many horror stories have been reported to me about the doubling of insurance premiums or, even worse, cancellation of policies. Unless a solution is found, property taxes will be raised to pay for these outrageous insurance costs to local governments. Our local businesses will also lose their competitive advantage unless we deal with this serious problem."

New law updates Illinois banking laws

Free checking for senior citizens is one of several provisions of a bill, passed by the General Assembly, which modernizes Illinois banking laws, according to the bill's co-sponsor Sen. Walter Dudyecz (R-Chicago).

Senate Bill 525 would require financial institutions to provide checking accounts with no activity charge on the first 10 checks drawn each month and no required minimum balance for persons 65 or older.

The bill also permits banks/holding companies in Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Michigan, Missouri and Wisconsin to acquire Illinois banks if their home states permit Illinois banks/holding companies to do the same.

The measure also abolishes Illinois' five banking regions, established in 1981 to prevent a bank in one part of the state from purchasing or being purchased

by a bank in another part of the state.

"This measure will move our state's banking system into the 20th Century by creating a more competitive atmosphere, which will increase customer services," Sen. Dudyecz said. "More opportunities for growth and expansion will better prepare our banks for the inevitability of nationwide banking."

Other pro-consumer provisions will: Require full disclosure of all fees, interest rates and conditions imposed on accounts, cut the holding time for deposits to one day for government checks, four days for in-state checks and seven days for out-of-state checks, require annual statements explaining community reinvestment programs, and require holding companies buying Illinois banks to have capital equal to 7 percent of their assets, which is higher than federal standards.

bilingual classes will not help a Ukrainian or Korean child. In District 63 there are 154 Korean students, 133 Spanish speaking students, 116 Indian students, 102 Greek students, 93 Russian students and 63 Polish students. There are 44 different languages, including dialects, spoken in Niles.

Advocates of the immersion program feel it is used less frequently than the TESL programs because many administrators view immersion as a sink-or-swim situation, leaving a child floundering in two languages. Donald Stetina, associate superintendent for District 63 and director of the EMME program disagrees. He compared the immersion program to the country of Israel.

"Israel is a country where the people come from all over the world, he said. "They use immersion programs there to get the people proficient in the language so they can become productive members of society." The major influx of immigrants coming to America in the 19th century started in low jobs and worked up, using education as an equalizer and as a ladder to success. According to Stetina, that takes too long. "We need the productivity and talents of the many minds brought to us now," he said.

District 63 has 136 students currently enrolled in the EMME program. Depending on the student's skills, some need more time than others in the program.

After seeing this movie we thought we had discovered a rare gem. But last week we read where the film has grossed more than \$22 million this year, the most money taken in by any foreign film in the U.S. in 1985.

One book leads to another. We bumped into former Niles official Bill Hlavacek in Stan's parking lot last week and told him about the Yeager book. Bill, who has been a pilot for many years, told us he met Yeager not too long ago at a pilot's get-together at Palwaukee airport. Stankowicz noted the new DUI law which goes into effect Jan. 1 will have "more teeth in it. My understanding is that if they refuse a breathalyzer test, it would mean an automatic six-month suspension."

A police officer issues a ticket for driving under the influence prior to administering the test, which shows the degree of alcohol content. "If anyone balks at taking the test, the officer signs a refusal slip and has 28 days in which to request a hearing before a representative of the Secretary of State's Office," he said.

Larry Renetzky, director of Niles Family Service, said the forum is designed to alert the public to dangers of drunk driving. "Drunk driving-related accidents are the leading killers according to statistics, about 70 percent of teens who die in accidents have been found to have alcohol or drugs in their blood."

The program is geared to Niles youth in the 16 to 19 age group, and adults. "It's a total community effort to make people aware of driver safety on the road and not be a potential killer behind the wheel," he said.

The stepped-up DUI law could curb drunk driving. "We also feel public education combined with law enforcement and strict court supervision will go a long way in reducing statistics on alcohol or drug-related deaths," Renetzky said.

The forum will feature a panel of experts on DUI problems, including State's Attorney Richard Daley and a representative from the Secretary of State's Office. Other participants are representatives of MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Driving) and SADD (Students Against Drunk Driving) from High School Districts 207 and 219.

NWMC villages seek sites for waste disposal

The long-standing problem of garbage disposal coupled with diminishing landfills may be resolved in early January when members of the Northwest Municipal Conference will consider the purpose of land for a solid waste disposal site.

The Village of Niles is among 25 communities which pledged \$5,000 to the organization to secure a purchase contract on proposed landfill sites selected by the NWMC staff. Morton Grove, Des Plaines, Park Ridge and Skokie are also members. "We have chosen more than one property for the membership's consideration, but I can't give a specific number at this time," said Bill Grams, NWMC executive director.

He explained the location of the properties must remain a secret. "If they were made public, the property would skyrocket in price before anything could be finalized," he said. "At the proper time, it becomes a matter of public record...that's the law."

The Conference has been searching for a site as close to the membership towns as possible so that solid waste collection costs to taxpayers could be economically feasible. Important factors in a landfill location include distance, transportation costs, and cost of operations. "Members will discuss these matters, as well as who will manage the landfill operations, before they approve a particular site," Grams said.

In discussing possible opposition from a governmental body or from residents who would be unwilling to allow a landfill in their area, Grams said the conference

ference "mitigated potential problems" by attempting to pick sites away from residential areas.

He explained certain procedures must be followed before purchase of the property is completed. "The most important is falling within guidelines of public safety and welfare laws. The NWMC must also petition the governing body (town or county) for authorization to purchase the land in question. If it is not approved, we would have to consider an alternate site," he said.

The Conference ran into problems last year with North Shore municipal officials regarding a proposed Glenview garbage disposal site. Northfield registered strong opposition because it was only a few hundred feet from Temple Jeremiah and homes in Northfield and Northbrook.

Niles and other communities have been seeking short and long-term solutions to garbage disposal for a number of years. The problem is approaching the crisis stage.

Haul-Away, Inc. of Elk Grove Village (formerly Glen-Golf Disposal of Des Plaines), which handles residential garbage for Niles carries the waste on trucks from the village to a transfer station on Mannheim Rd. near O'Hare Airport. From that point, larger trucks or trailers take it to the Duck Creek landfill area in DuPage County, Hillside and Joliet.

Niles cost for garbage collection is about \$400,000 a year. The village's contract with Haul-Away runs out in 1987.

resistance when police broke up the meeting. One of the suspects had bragged to agents before the arrests that he was carrying a weapon and would call in "friends" waiting outside if there were any trouble.

Police continue to investigate the street gang connection, saying only that the gangs have steadily increased their involvement in drug distribution the last several years but only recently has there been any indication that gangs may be expanded their activities to the suburbs. Giovannelli indicated the gangs initially make contacts with youths in the city, then follow-up with members even after they move to the suburbs, frequently as part of an effort by the parents to get their children away from the influence of street gangs. Giovannelli said the problem of street gangs is increasing, particularly in towns like Evanston and neighboring Skokie and villages such as Niles are "experiencing more and more crime related to street gang activities."

Police still are not sure of the exact degree of involvement in the recent drug case of the Simon City Royals, a "mostly white" street gang whose boundaries are on the city's northwest side. They are sure the trail ultimately leads to Chicago, however, because of the uncult nature of the cocaine and its purity.

Street gangs have gotten into drug dealing, according to police, because of the tremendous profitability of it and the ability to trade drugs for weapons, mostly handguns.

None of the suspects taken into custody was armed, according to police, nor did anyone offer

Cont'd from Niles-E. Maine P.1 there could be problems in meeting the needs of residents, she said.

Statistics show people are living longer, with many preferring to remain in their homes rather than enter a nursing home. "They don't have a place to go and the congregate facility can be the answer for more independent living, by providing services as needed."

She explained that many of the congregate care developments are multi-family unit complexes. "Some are single buildings housing 40 or up to 200 people" which contains a dining room. The management takes care of meals, transportation, recreation and medical care referrals. "Transportation is important in a community like Niles which has a free bus system. It would have an impact on the village by expanding its service to the many residents living in congregate facilities," she said.

Morrissey advised a committee be formed composed of village officials and professionals, such as a geriatrics physician, an architect (familiar with similar housing), a financial advisor and a research expert. They would review proposals from a developer and what he offers in services, look at needs in the community, the market for such developments, mortgage financing and federal money available. "The committee can make recommendations to the zoning and village board after reviewing plans by a developer," she said.

Mayor Nicholas Blase agreed that a task force be established to give "guidance" in considering congregate care developments. "The decision on Southmark will have to wait until the committee reviews the plan," he said.

In regular board business, the board approved changing the village-required 9½ by 20 foot parking spaces to 8'3" size for long term parking, three hours or more, designated for manufacturing and residential property; and 9'6" for short term parking (less than three hours) for commercial areas.

Joe Salerno said compact cars will soon outnumber standard size autos resulting in excessive parking spaces.

The board also approved a special use permit requested by Joseph LoVerde to construct storage garages for rental purposes and a two-story office building at 7060 Milwaukee Ave.

In other board actions, the board passed a resolution to use \$127,500 from a Community Development Block Grant to purchase Ridgewood Gardens. In line with plans to upgrade the southern portion of Niles, an open landscape area will be developed at Milwaukee Ave. and Albion St. to provide an esthetic entranceway to the village.

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Where's the best place to have your checking account?

Like to give a nice little lift to your checking account balance? Or get away from worrisome fees? If you shop around, you may very well find the checking account that will do it.

What should you look for? That depends on you and the way you use your checking account. But here are some points you might consider.

Looking for really low-cost checking? If you really want to save money, you may find that an old-time non-interest-paying account costs less to maintain than one that pays interest.

In general, you'll probably also find that personal checking will cost you less at a savings and loan association than at a bank.

Like to earn interest on your money? If you carry a good-sized balance in your account, you could have substantial extra earnings in an interest bearing checking account paying 5¼%, or in super-checking that pays money market rates.

In any case, the place where you bank can be important. You'll find that your return may differ from one financial institution to another, and these differences can add up over the course of a year...so it pays to shop around.

How much money does it take to open an account? You'll probably find it ranges from \$100 to \$2,500 or more for personal checking in the Chicago area.

What's the minimum you must keep in the account to avoid a service charge? Again, it ranges from \$100 to \$2,500 or more.

What if your balance drops below the minimum? This could mean a service charge of as little as \$3 to as much as \$20 a month.

What if you don't want to keep enough money in your account to avoid the service charge? Some places have no-frills accounts that let you pay a flat monthly fee, with perhaps a per-check charge or limitations on the number of checks you can write each month.

Are you over 55? Do you have direct deposit of government or payroll checks? Then you may very well find a place that will waive all your checking account fees. Some institutions also waive fees for people with substantial sums on deposit.

Is this a convenient place to bank? Is it nearby? Does it have convenient hours? Automatic teller machines? Overdraft protection? Can you bank by mail? Do you feel comfortable there?

Perhaps even more important, do you like the people? Are they helpful and knowledgeable in telling you about financial alternatives, such as money market accounts.

What about money market accounts? They are federally insured, pay money market rates, let you write 3 checks a month, make unlimited cash withdrawals and are available at

savings institutions and banks. But it takes \$1,000 to \$2,500 to open an account.

What about money market funds? They, too, pay money market rates, but they are not federally insured. Also, most of them have a \$100 to \$500 minimum on the size of each check you write.

What about credit unions? Some of them let you write free checks, called share drafts. Or, they waive fees if you keep an average balance of \$300 or more. Also, they generally pay 6% interest instead of 5¼%.

However, most credit unions are open only to people who work for certain companies or belong to certain unions. And, most credit unions don't offer share drafts.

What about asset management accounts? They offer a combination of checking, brokerage and loan services, and let you write as many free checks as you like up to your available balance.

You'll need \$5,000 to \$25,000, however, just to open an asset management account, and most brokerage houses also charge management fees of \$25 to \$100 a year.
