Troy: Cablevision rate increase reasonable by comparison

The decision by Cablevision of Chicago to raise basic cable service from \$4.50 to \$9.95 a month by Jan. 15 was not arbitrary, according to Richard Troy, Niles village attorney.

"Under the franchise agreement with the village

signed in Nov., 1982, Cablevision has the right to raise cable service rates after a three-year period," he said. "After Dec. 13, 1986, the rates can be increased without approval of the village board."

Trustees approved the new

raise because of the contractual agreement, according to a village spokesman. Troy said he feels with the addition of eight channels to the programming, the increase in the basic package is reasonable.

District 63 ok's \$798,000
for life safety repairs

Begin removal of asbestos at Melzer

Board members of East Maine School District 63 approved a recommendation by the Building and Grounds Committee for life safety repairs in all area schools at a cost of about \$798,000.

Action was taken at the Jan. 14 meeting in the Educational Service Center, 10150 Dee Rd., Des Plaines.

Also, a contract for \$11,250 was awarded to Carnow, Conibear & Assoc., Ltd., Chicago, for air monitoring and testing at Melzer school while removal of asbestos is taking place.

In a four to two vote, board members agreed on using the services of Carnow, Conibear as opposed to another company with slightly lower rates but no liability insurance for claims having to do with asbestos.

Prior to the asbestos removal, all Melzer's furniture was removed from the building and placed in Oak School. Moving costs came to \$5,145 and took two days, almost \$3,000 and one day longer than an original estimate by the North Suburban

Bubbles' gay bar may be leaving Niles

Bubbles may float out of the Niles area within the next few months because the gay bar did not exercise the option to renew its lease.

According to Attorney Abe Brustein, representing Malcolm Silverman, owner of Bubbles Bistro, 9046 Golf Rd., it was his "understanding" that Silverman failed to renew the lease which would allow him to continue operations at the establishment. "I don't know why he didn't renew," he said. The lease will expire in April.

Brustein claimed Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase allegedly called the landlord of the building (who lives in New York) to "pressure him into not renewing the lease. However, the suit against the village is still active."

Blase denied the allegation, saying Bubbles went into bankruptcy last summer and Silverman was "laying all his problems on village officials. I was told he had difficulty paying his rent to the landlord shortly after declaring bankruptcy and

some deal was made with the landlord on rental payments until the lease expires in April," he said. "I never called up to pressure anyone... it is not my business."

Reportedly, Silverman has been looking for locations in Chicago, but was unavailable for comment despite repeated efforts to contact him.

Older taxpayers may not need to file tax returns

An estimated 2.9 million persons unnecessarily file a tax return each year. Approximately 81 percent of these are people 65 years of age or older who do not meet the minimum income requirement for filing a tax return.

Receiving a tax package in the mail does not mean a person is required to file. Frequently older taxpayers receive a tax package, even if filing is unnecessary, since the IRS cannot assume that a person does not have to file a tax return and therefore supplies most people with forms and instructions.

For persons age 65 or older, the minimum filing level is higher than the regular filing requirements. The filing requirements are as follows: A single person age 65 or older must have a minimum gross income of \$4470; when married and filing a joint return with one spouse 65 or older, the minimum is \$6660; and the minimum is \$7700 if both spouses are 65 or older.

There are some situations where a person may not meet the minimum filing requirements, yet still need to file a return. A person must file if he or she had at least \$400 in net earnings from self-employment. Also a person must file a return if any advance earned income credit payments have been received, or if any FICA (Social Security) tax on unreported tip income, minimum tax, or tax on an IRA (Individual Retirement Arrangement) is owed. Filing a return is necessary also to get a refund of any tax withheld from income, or to claim the Earned Income Credit.

For details about filing requirements for older taxpayers, northern Illinois residents should call IRS at 1-800-424-1040 and request Free Publication 564, "Tax Information for Older Americans." It contains several chapters on filing requirements, as well as other tax information valuable to older taxpayers.

Niles streets get heavy salting in December

Dropping temperatures throughout most of December resulted in heavy salting of Niles' icy streets decreasing the village's salt supply, according to Keith Peck, director of public services.

The village has ordered an additional 800 tons of salt to ensure it will have a sufficient supply to last the winter. Salt is priced at \$23 a ton and is purchased through the Northwest Municipal Conference based on a group rate.

Peck added as of Jan. 11, 338 tons of salt were used on main thoroughfares and neighborhood streets. This is approximately the same amount as used for the same period last year. The total amount used for the 1984-85 season was 2,572 tons.

"We've had about 10 inches of snow so far compared to 16 inches last year, most of it occurring on New Year's Eve," Peck said. "It is not the snow that causes a

problem, but the low temperatures which causes ice-glazed streets. This requires more spreading of salt on major arterial roads such as Milwaukee Ave. and Dempster St."

He explained salting the streets is effective at above 5 or 10 degrees above zero. "Below that, you have to increase use of liquid calcium chloride for melting action. I think the work crews have done a terrific job in keeping the streets clean."

"The cold weather also caused about 25 to 30 water main breaks in the village, including neighborhood streets. Broken water mains were repaired on Milwaukee, Cumberland and Oakton St. "There was little traffic disruption. One lane was closed during the four hours of repair work," he said.

Work crews were out with snowplows about seven days during December. "We had no

Cash shortage may effect Niles Branch Library

To help cover a possible "shortfall" in cash, the Niles Library District may have to curtail or cut services at the Branch library operated in Ballard School, Niles.

Ballard School is owned by East Maine School District 63 and was closed due to declining student enrollment.

Library objectives, restated at the meeting are to enlarge staff, increase salaries, develop the book collection and not cut back services. To do so, revenues must

be increased. Finance committee recommendations have disregarded raising taxes or establishing a "sinking" fund.

According to Frank Biga, chairman of the Library's finance committee, the Branch library, being a large part of the budget, may have to be closed to cover a possible shortfall in District revenues. Biga said the Branch accounts for 27 percent of the Library's budget. Estimating

LWV forum hosts women in politics

"Good men are brave and powerful but good women are pretty and passive."

According to fairy tales, the wicked stepmother is an example of a woman who attempts to control her environment, said Carol Panek. Panek was moderator of a panel, "The Status of Women in Public Service" sponsored by the Morton Grove-Niles League of Women Voters January 11.

Panek, a candidate for state representative and former Niles trustee, introduced three women who conducted successful campaigns for public office.

Speaking were Sheila Shultz, Wheeling mayor; Ann Wollan, Wilmette trustee and Peggy Wetter, Des Plaines alderman.

Cold weather a deterrent to crime

Capt. William Terpinas of the Niles Police Department hopes for snow and low temperatures for the remainder of winter.

"That is because crime, particularly home burglaries, decrease dramatically during inclement weather," Terpinas said, adding that shopping centers are "quiet" during this time period, with minimal reporting of batteries being removed from cars in parking lots.

According to Terpinas, criminals do not like to go out during cold weather. Also, burglars prefer houses where no one is home. "They are less likely to find such a place when people stay inside rather than venture out into the cold," he said.

Terpinas was not able to give statistics on the decrease in crime during cold weather periods, but said that crime picks up again as the weather warms up. "Prior to Christmas, we receive many reports of home burglaries. Then the really cold weather comes in which deters this type crime."

Crimes also decrease during this time period because suspicious activity is more easily spotted by police when streets are near empty, he explained. "A big deterrent is that the criminal finds it harder to get to his destination or get away on slippery roads in the event a patrol car is chasing him."

Maine Township Democratic Committeeman Nicholas Blase feels the slate of suburban Democratic candidates selected to run for county and judicial offices holds the "magic key" to election in November.

That was the message presented at a breakfast held at the Skokie Hilton last week in which various candidates for respective offices presented their credentials and spoke on issues. "The main thing is...we are focusing on highly qualified candidates and appealing to the voters on issues as they relate to people to win in November," he said.

Blase believes voters are looking for a change and predicted more crossover voting at the polls this year which will benefit the Democratic slate. Looking into his crystal ball, Blase also predicted a majority of voters for state and county positions will be Democratic.

"Jeanne Quinn's election in 1983 to a suburban Cook County suburban seat opened the door for other suburban candidates who were reluctant in the past to run for county positions," he said. "I believe our candidates have the leadership and, if elected, will bring a better quality of life and equitable representation for people, not only in the suburbs but throughout Cook County."

Candidates, for the seven

suburban seats on the Cook County Board present at last week's meeting were Andrew Przybylo of Niles, Renee Thaler (Glenview), Jan Schakowski (Evanston), Kevin Conlon (Park Forest), Joan Murphy (Crestwood), Edward King (LaGrange) and John Rita (Blue Island).

Each of the candidates focused on the issues to be faced in the future by county commissioners and stressed leadership to meet the needs of the people throughout the county. Claiming the majority of the board mem-

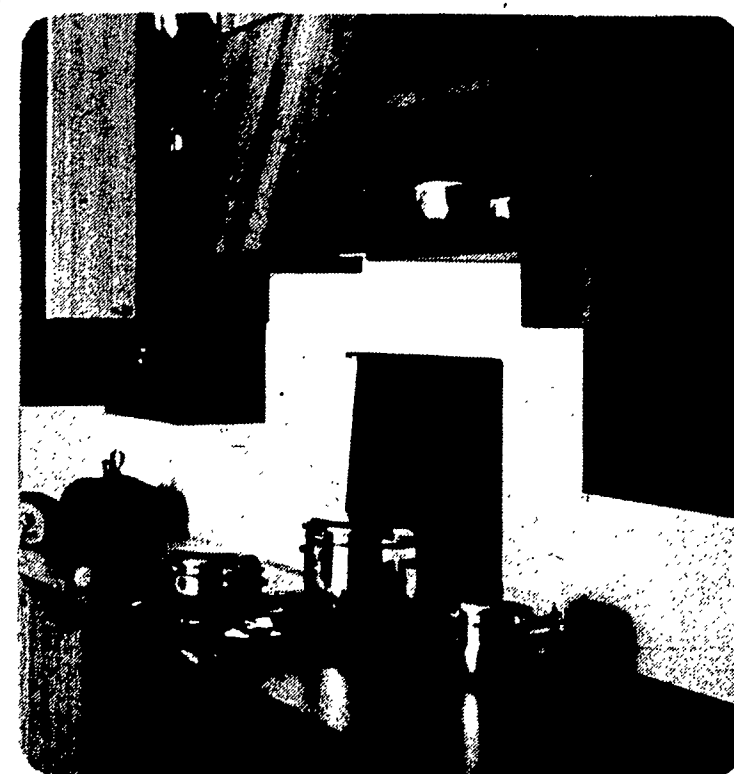

Sprinkle halibut with salt and place in shallow baking dish; top with diced tomato. Combine remaining ingredients except parsley. Bring to boil; pour over halibut. Cover and bake at 450° F. allowing 10 minutes per inch of thickness measured at its thickest part or until halibut flakes when tested with a fork. Sprinkle with chopped parsley. Makes 4 servings.

BANANA MOCHA CAKE
