

Niles Bike Patrol takes to streets to promote safety

Bicyclists of all ages better obey traffic rules while traveling on village streets this summer, or face the possibility of getting cited for violations by Niles bicycle safety officers.

Traffic accidents and violations involving bicycles

have dropped dramatically since the village began its bicycle safety program 10 years ago, according to Sgt. John Katsoulas. Katsoulas noted that since the village began patrolling the streets with college age (18-23) youths, both adults and young

people have become more aware of Illinois State laws. Violators can be cited from double riding, trick riding, riding four or five abreast, hanging onto cars and trucks and for ignoring regulatory signs. Violators are

"Bubbles" suit heads for Federal Court

A suit filed by Bubbles Bistro seeking monetary damages from the Village of Niles has come under consideration by the U.S. District Federal Court.

According to Niles Village Attorney Richard Troy, attorneys on both sides recently submitted briefs (written legal arguments, cause of action and facts in the case), the last step in legal proceedings toward a ruling in the case. "I have no idea when a decision will be made. It depends on how many cases are before the judge," Troy said.

Bubbles Bistro was a gay bar located on Golf Road in the Golf Glen shopping center. It opened as a gourmet hamburger restaurant, but soon began attracting the gay community.

Bubbles' owner, Malcolm Silverman, claimed when village officials discovered the bar business was gay, the police drove customers away because of

nightly spot checks for underage drinking.

Silverman filed a civil rights suit against Niles last August seeking an injunction to stop regular visits by police. He later withdrew the civil rights suit and sued for monetary damages for loss of business.

Bubbles filed for bankruptcy after several months of poor business topped by having his liquor license suspended for 48 hours for allegedly serving minors. The business closed in February this year.

Troy explained Silverman did

Nursing home residents get hike in allowance

Nursing home residents who receive federal Supplemental Security Income (SSI) would see their monthly personal allowance checks double to \$50 under legislation approved in the Illinois House.

Supported by State Representative Cal Sutker (D-Skokie), House Bill 2784 calls for a \$25 supplemental allowance to elderly and disabled residents of long-term care centers and expands program eligibility to residents of mental health facilities.

"The existing \$25 minimum needs allowance has been at the same level since the program began in 1974 and no longer meets its original intent," Sutker said. "The grants are used by seniors and disabled citizens to purchase

such items as shoes, clothing, non-prescription drugs and cosmetics. Yet the current allowance of 83 cents a day is insufficient to meet the rising costs of these items."

Sutker said federal law permits states participating in the SSI program to raise the personal allowance level. "Illinois should follow the example of other states like New York and Wisconsin in providing this extra support to more than 16,000 seniors, disabled and mentally ill residents."

"The additional \$25 and the annual cost-of-living increase included in the measure will provide welcome relief to the elderly and disabled who have no other source of income," he said.

Speaking of the library...

It's been a year now since I began writing this column. I know it's been a year because I remember my first article dealt with libraries, reading, and National Library Week, and this article is about libraries, reading, and National Library Week. So it must have been a year ago.

In observance of National Library Week (April 6-12), we again wrote to many famous authors, illustrators, actors and scientists to ask them about their thoughts on books. Their replies are on display in our lobby. Many are precious. One made me alternately laugh out loud and then smile all morning. It's from Alan Alda:

"I read a lot of books as a kid and they were all very different. I think the three that had the strongest impression on me were these:

TOP HORSE AT CRESCENT RANCH. This was a children's book. I read it when I was eight and I immediately sat down and tried to write my own book about a horse. From then on, I knew I wanted to write.

THE LEGENDS OF KING ARTHUR. I would read myself to sleep at night with the magic of Merlin and the decency and cleverness of the Knights of the Round Table. From then on, I knew I wanted to be a magician.

THE CONGRESSIONAL RECORD. For some reason, leather bound copies of the goings on in Congress lined the shelves of our living room and I poured over them when I was twelve. I had never read anything so funny. From then on, I knew I wanted to do comedy.

Many of the letters we received express the strong influence that books and reading and libraries have had on the individual's life. Books can take us places we've never been before: to other worlds, other places, other times. Books can stir emotions within us that we never even knew we had. These emotions can be recalled at any time and in many different ways and sometimes by just a word or name or phrase: Heathcliff, Guinevere, Laura, Garp. Once upon a time... Books by authors like Steven King can even make you afraid to turn out the lights at night!

Bill Cosby tells us that he loves reading to children. He enjoys watching their faces light up as they get involved in the tale and their eyebrows raise as the suspense heightens. Cosby says that reading to kids is important. It's a sharing experience which brings children and grownups closer. Plus, says Cosby, if you read to kids now, they'll read to you when you're older!

Reading is a very important and necessary skill. Think of all the times we must read to learn something. When we take medication, we read the instructions. When we buy a microwave, we read directions which help us to operate it. When we shop, we read the ingredients on a can's label. When we go to a restaurant, we read the specials for the day. When we write a check, we read. When we take a driver's test, we read. We read and read and read.

But, not everyone can read. I wrote this last year, and I'll write it again and again until we solve the problem. One out of five adults over the age of 25 cannot read well enough to fill out a job application, or to understand the instructions on a bottle of medicine, or write a check. One out of five adults cannot read a story to their children, help them with their homework, or play Clue or Monopoly with them. One out of five. Someone in your neighborhood, maybe even your family.

There is hope. Our library, and others in the area, have special collections for adults learning to read. We offer free reading classes for adults. Classes are held in Des Plaines and Skokie. Soon we'll be teaching classes at local industrial sites.

We need tutors, and we need students. If you know someone who wants to learn to read or improve their reading skills, or if you are interested in being a volunteer to teach an adult to read, call the Learn to Read program at 638-1426.

What better contribution in life could one make than to teach an adult to read? I know that nothing would make me prouder than to teach an adult to read, and then have him tell me how proud he was to put his little girl on his lap, open the book, and begin by reading "Once upon a time..."

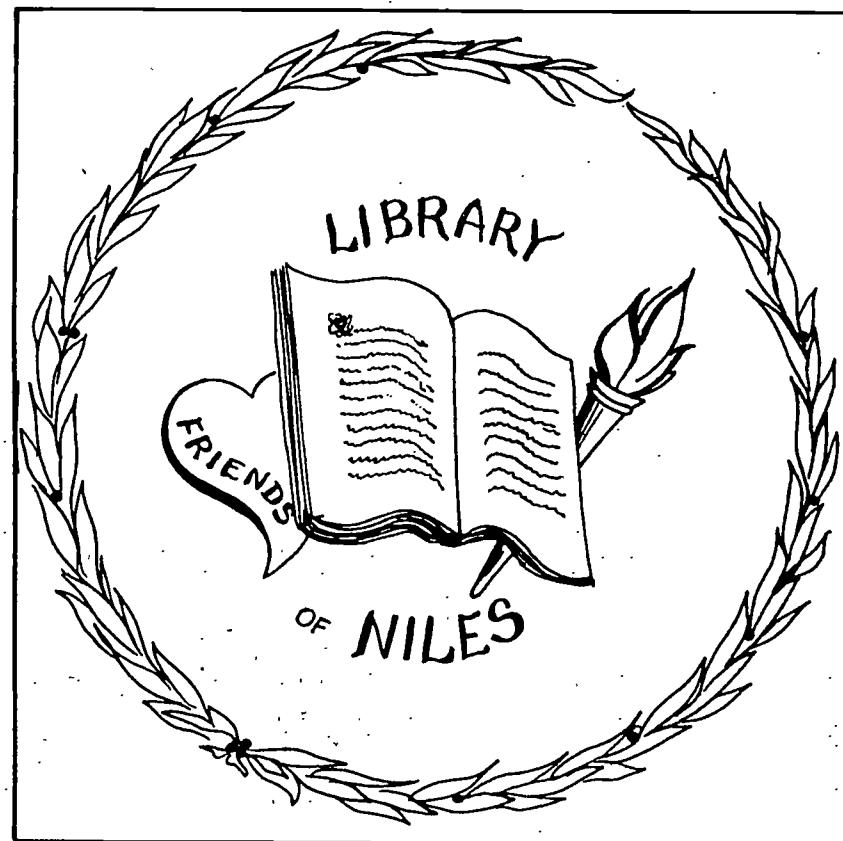
Friends of Library Logo Contest

Muscle tester invaluable in designing rehabilitation program

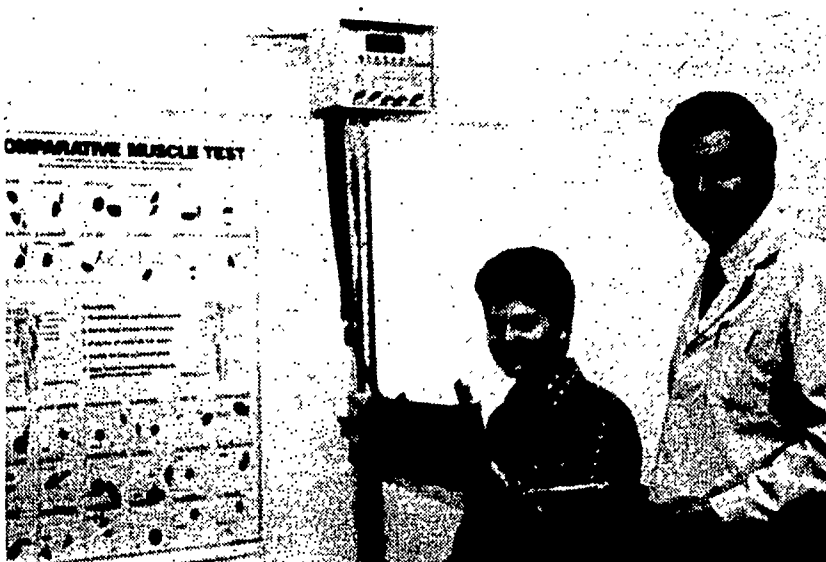

expert's post for one week before turning it over to the Bugle's rightful heir to Ed's mantle.

My first "expert's" pronouncement is the White Sox may have the worst team in baseball this year. The Sox are in the weakest division in baseball. And if you combined the two divisions, the Sox would be in 11th or 12th place among the 14 teams in the American League. All Sox fans know successful Sox teams are superior in pitching, defense and in their ability to traverse the basepaths. They flunk the Comiskey Park litmus test on two out of three of these categories.

Pronouncement number two is manager Tony LaRussa is on the way out and they have already hired their next manager. New general manager Tom Haller will be the new guy in the dugout within a short time.

Pronouncement number three concerns sports bosses, sports teams and sports fans in Chicago. At a recent Dallas Green press conference, the Cubs general manager sort of sneered at Cub fans who were asking some pointed questions about the changing of its manager. It confirmed what we have long realized is the post-Bill Veck syndrome in Chicago. There are no longer any sports team owners who have any interest in the fans.

The name of the game is the bottom line. And if sports fans get in the way they'll be shoved into the background. In the event Bubbles is successful in its suit, the village has asked the court not to allow maximum monetary damages (reportedly \$1 million) but to fix the amount on loss of revenue "up to the period the lease was not renewed," Troy said.

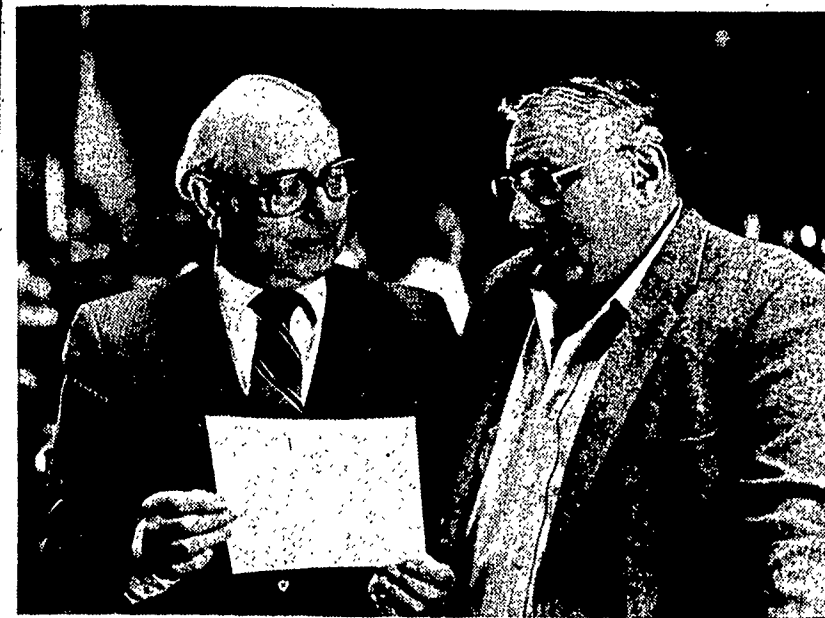

Student transportation grants applications

State Representative Ralph Capparelli (D-Chicago) today encouraged parents of school children who do not have access to free busing to apply for Pupil Transportation Grants at their local school.

"Last year, the Illinois General Assembly approved the grant program to reimburse parents of public and private students who live more than 1 1/2 miles away from school but do not have access to free transportation," said Capparelli, a supporter of the

program. The lawmaker said parents can receive up to \$50 per child this year to cover school transportation costs. In 1987, the maximum reimbursement level will rise to \$100.

"Applications must be filed within 21 days after your local school closes for the summer, so I strongly encourage all parents who think they might be eligible to obtain an application as soon as possible," he said.

Las Vegas bill passes Senate

The Illinois Senate has approved a bill, sponsored by Sen. Walter Dudydz (R-7th), that would let groups qualifying under federal charitable tax exemptions sponsor "Las Vegas Night" fund-raising events.

Senate Bill 1552, which was amended last week to permit cash prizes of up to \$250, would let qualified religious, charitable, fraternal, educational, veteran, youth athletic and senior citizen groups conduct casino-type events for fund-raising purposes if they are licensed by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

"Fund-raising events of this nature are very popular and effective ways for charitable organizations and other groups like private schools and churches

to raise money," Dudydz said. "However they must be regulated carefully to keep out any criminal influences and abuses."

"We are proposing that the events be licensed by the Department of Revenue and closely monitored to ensure they meet all guidelines," the 7th District Senator said. "Each organization will also only be allowed to sponsor a maximum of four casino-type events each year."

Organizations will be required to pay 2 percent of the event's gross proceeds to the state.

Co-sponsored by Sen. Ted Lechowicz (D-6th), the bill is currently being considered in the House of Representatives.

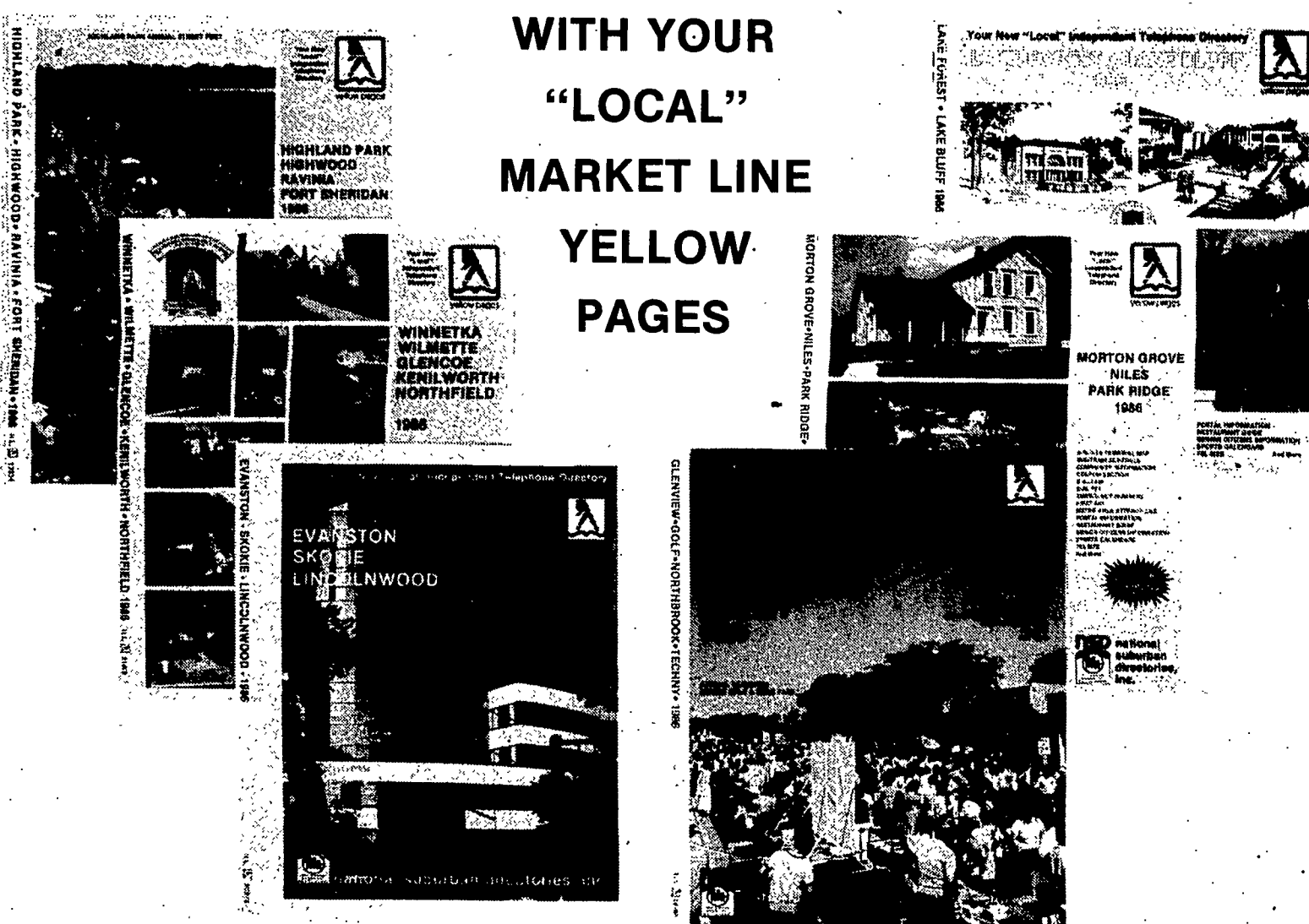
