Despite those huge tax increases in Maine Township most of the taxing bodies receiving money are copping out. Each of them are saying they did not raise the tax rate in their district implying we should look elsewhere for the reasons for our huge tax hikes.

A couple of weeks ago East Maine representatives reminded us the District 63 school board did not raise its tax rate. Then the local village boards' echoed the same litany, "We kept our tax rates at the same level as past years".

Friday we were at a breakfast meeting with Cook County President George Dunne who re-echoed the same "We didn't raise our rate" cry.

At a Monday lunch with County Assessor Tom Hynes he tried to place the problem in its proper perspective. He noted if his community of Winnetka had a total assessment of \$100 and needed \$5 from Joe Homeowner, the tax rate would be 5 percent. If the assessment was reassessed at \$200 and the community asked for \$10 from Joe Homeowner, the rate would still be 5 percent. Hynes said the increased spending is what pushed tax bills up. If his village had asked for \$5 as it had in the past, then the increased assessment would have resulted in lowering the tax rate to 2.5 percent and the

Dempster Plaza to undergo remodeling

A \$6 million mortgage to completely remodel Dempster Plaza Shopping Center on the northwest corner of Dempster and Greenwood streets in Niles, has been arranged by Baird & Warner's real estate finance group represented by Michael Miller, assistant vice president.

The 15-year-old center will be given a new facade, new roof and new parking lot. Among the tenants in the 235,000-square-foot facility, which is 95% leased, are Jewel-Osco, K-Mart, Avenue Bank Northwest and Doc Weeds restaurant. The center includes a 30,000-square-foot office building anchored by Parkside Human Services, a division of Lutheran General Hospital. This is the third

shopping center in the area to undergo renovation recently, including the Golf Mill Regional Mall.

The borrower is SIDCOR, a Skokie, Ill.-based investment and development company. Neither the lender, a Baird & Warner correspondent, for the interest rate of the 7-year loan were disclosed.

Architect for the remodeling is Rabin-LeNoble Associates, Skokie, and the contractor is Katz-Weiss Construction Co.

Edison: Don't put signs on utility poles

Now that the 1986 election campaign is in full swing, Commonwealth Edison makes the following appeal to all candidates and their supporters, regardless of party: please don't tack posters, notices or the like on

utility poles. The same poles are addressed to people who want to promote garage sales or reach the public for any other reason.

Anything tacked on utility poles can cause trouble for the line crews. Too often, utility workers suffer cuts and gashes from encounters with nails and tacks used to affix the posters. The hardware larks, awaiting a chance encounter with an unsuspecting lineman's hands or legs on a dark, stormy night when he is restoring power to an area that has had service interrupted.

Although utility crew members carefully inspect each pole before climbing, it's easy to miss a nail or tack in the dark of night. Climbing spikes need the soft wood of a utility pole to be effective, but nails and tacks defeat them, often causing a wearer to slip and injure himself. This can delay the restoration of service.

So please, Mr. and Ms. Campaign Worker: do your best to get out the vote, but don't tack anything on a utility pole.

Indicted were George S. Pistas, 33, of 9901 Wendy Way, Niles, and Edward Kuzniar, 43, of 1505 Barbary Lane, Mt. Prospect, according to an assistant U.S. attorney.

The indictment charged that on April 9, 1985, the two men set a fire to the warehouse at 4120 W. Chicago Ave., Chicago.

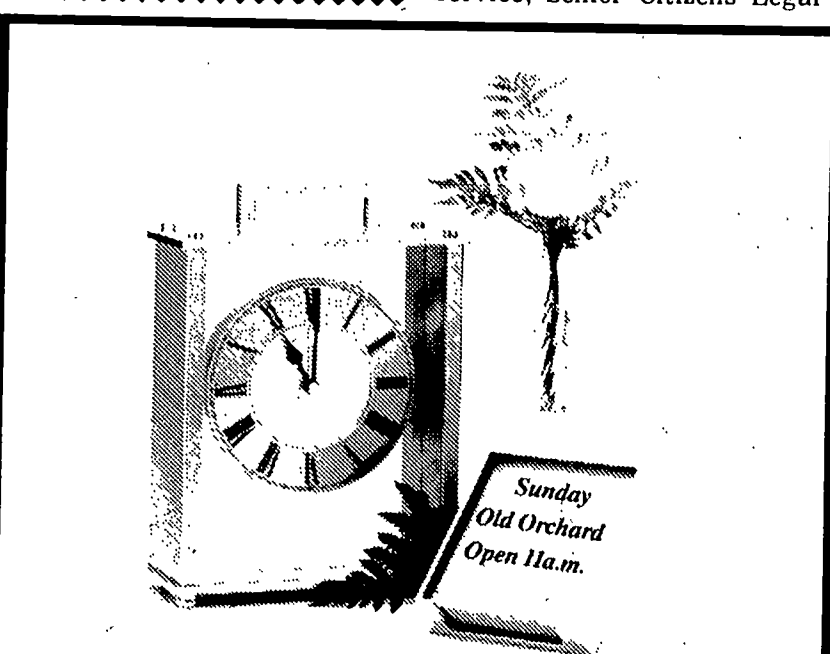

According to a Golf Mill spokesman, the shopping center is scheduled to be fully enclosed by the end of October barring any unforeseen circumstances.

Applications available for Las Vegas Night license

Local charity groups that plan to host "Las Vegas Night" fundraisers can now apply for a special gaming license with the Illinois Department of Revenue, according to State Representative Cal Suter (D-Skokie).

"Beginning September 1, a new law went into effect to erase any confusion surrounding the legality of Las Vegas Night fundraisers," Suter said. "The new law preserves a valuable fundraising tool for a number of schools, churches, synagogues and other charity organizations who depend heavily on the proceeds of the events to cover rising operating costs."

Suter, a co-sponsor of the original measure to legalize Las Vegas Nights, said the law was carefully crafted to require state

licensing and other safeguards needed to "protect the games from being subjected to foul play."

The \$200 state license, available only to not-for-profit organizations, allows the permit holder to sponsor up to four gambling nights per year.

Suter said although no licenses have yet been issued, the Department of Revenue has several pending applications on file, including one for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation which is planning a casino night event at the Shedd Aquarium in Chicago on September 20.

Edison expands security lighting service

Commonwealth Edison has recently expanded its residential and commercial security lighting service. Available in rural and suburban areas, the service now includes energy-efficient high pressure sodium lighting, as well as mercury vapor lamps.

Dusk-to-dawn security lighting has become popular as homes and businesses in seemingly peaceful, remote locations have become targets of burglars or home invaders. The strategic use of outdoor lighting deters trespassers, and also prevents nighttime accidents.

For as little as \$6.77 a month, Edison will furnish a complete security light unit, install it on an existing pole, maintain it, and provide the electricity for its operation. Standard equipment for each unit consists of a mercury vapor or sodium lamp, mounted in a fixture and supported by a 30-inch bracket. The light is photoelectrically controlled, so the owner need not turn it on or off. It will turn automatically when the photoelectric control senses decreasing sunlight-at-dusk-and, conversely, will turn off automatically at dawn.

The monthly charge for a 175-watt mercury vapor light, in-

cluding installation, maintenance, and electricity, is only \$6.77. A 400-watt is available for \$12.11 a month. Sodium lights can be used for \$7.44 a month for a 100-watt lamp or \$9.82 a month for a 250-watt lamp.

Currently, more than 4,000 residential and 6,000 commercial security lights are in use in the Chicago suburbs and outlying areas. Edison does not offer the service within the city of Chicago because of the city's extensive system of street lights.

Voters to decide on two constitutional amendments

Two proposed amendments to the Illinois Constitution will be submitted to voters on Nov. 4, according to Secretary of State Jim Edgar. Edgar said one of the amendments concerns the category of persons who may be denied bail by the courts, while the other would authorize the General Assembly to pass legislation exempting from taxation property used exclusively for veteran's organizations.

same amount of money would have been spent as in the past.

School District 63 is our best focusing point. A couple of years ago they hired a new principal in the district. The elementary district is topheavy in administrative salaries. Despite decreasing the number of district schools from 11 to 5, administration salaries are over \$600,000. If they wanted to decrease the tax load, the board could have transferred one of the administration members to the principal opening. It would have decreased the total teacher-administration cost. But instead the board selected a teacher for the new post.

The board also approved 9.7 percent, 9 percent and 9 percent teacher salary increases over three years despite the average increase in union wages in the U.S. was less than 4 percent.

Monday morning one of the teachers called us and said while our figures are correct there is one thing which is overlooked. She said when she began teaching 25 years ago she was only making around \$4,000. She said her present \$40,000 salary averages out the lesser pay of past years.

This elementary school district also recently hired a new superintendent at a \$67,000 salary. Every few years the district searches for a new superintendent. We would guess we've seen at least seven or eight superintendents in the district during

the past 25 years. Again, it would seem the tentativeness of choosing a new person every few years manifests the job is at best temporary. Since the top-heavy salaryed administration has two or three well-qualified people who have been in the district for many years, it would seem one of these people should have become superintendent, again lessening the administrative salaries in the district.

Mr. Dunne and Mr. Blase and Mr. Districts 63 and 207 and all the other taxing bodies must share the responsibility of not holding the line in expending money. Saying the tax rate is the same as in past years is a phony claim. Mr. Hynes' pointing to increased spending is the cause of ever-increasing money woes.

The Birdbrain Award of the year should go to Niles Park Board president Harry "Piz-za" Pestine. Harry and his friends billed the library district for \$215.55 for pizza and beef sandwiches from last August to this past May. Pestine was quoted as saying he didn't eat lunch and then came to library meetings empty-stomached. He's the same guy who should be nicknamed Harry "Hotel" Pestine. He billed the library board for a hotel and food bill of several hundred dollars a year late after attending a convention in downtown Chicago. "Hotel" Harry could have come home and billed the taxpayers for these birdbrain schemes. Now, he is

asking taxpayers to increase the tax rate for the district. It really must give taxpayers a great deal of confidence to know the guy whose been running the library board as a one-man fiefdom is now asking taxpayers for more money. He'd make a great public relations man.

Perhaps the Pain in the Ear award might go to The Left Hand for its rather feeble effort to lessen the dangers at Beck Lake at Golf Rd. just west of the tollway. Last year we asked Sanitary District member Aurelio Pucinski to do something about lessening the dangers at the lake where 12 people have drowned since 1980. Nothing happened. Last week we confronted George Dunne and he shrugged off the problem inferring it was difficult to stop people from risking their lives by swimming there.

Monday, we cornered Jeanne Quinn, a County Commissioner, who agreed with us a sign could be posted there describing the risks at the lake. We suggested a sign similar to those along some highways, could describe the names and dates of people who have drowned there, hoping it might be a deterrent to those risking swimming there. She promised she would get back to us.

Monday afternoon we visited Morton Grover Joe Gump, whose wife Jean, is serving an 8 year sentence in a Virginia federal prison for sledgehammering the covers and tracks of a missile silo in Kansas. After marking a cross in blood during a Good Saturday demonstration, Jean and her four compatriots waited for federal officials to arrest her. It was the fifth time she had been arrested for civil disobedience.

Jean, who is a mother of twelve, marched in civil rights protests in Alabama, and has been a community and church activist for the past 25 years.

According to one of her supporters she was given 13 years for acting on the Catholic Bishops' Report On Nuclear Disarmament. While that argument might be somewhat specious, nevertheless, the severity of the punishment disturbs many of us. We would welcome your opinions and thoughts regarding the matter and would like to explore efforts at our community level about alleviating her sentence.

Savings accounts could earn 5 1/2 to 6 1/2 percent on a quarterly basis depending on the amount of deposit in the account. "Employees also get dividends on the balance of savings accounts on a quarterly basis," she said. "The village would only be involved in payroll deductions of credit union members."

In reply to a question from Mayor Nicholas Blase on whether payroll transactions would be burdensome or time-consuming, Hodge said the computer could handle the interchange of payroll funds to Metro without any problem. "The operation will go very smoothly," he said.

Blase reminded the board a representative from another credit union was scheduled to appear at next month's meeting. "After that...we can make a decision on the matter," he said.

In other business, the board turned down a request by Delta Sonic to change its negative position regarding construction of a car wash at 8750 Golf Rd. in unincorporated Maine Township.

Village officials filed an objection to the proposed car wash after the case was heard by the Cook County Zoning board of Appeals on August 15. Blase noted the case was pending before the appeals board. "The main objection to the project is traffic problems on Golf Rd. The

According to Murphy, 42,000 persons rode the free bus during the month of August. "On the whole, ridership was 1 percent over last year," he said.
