



The Niles Senior Center, 8060 Oakton in Niles will host an influenza immunization clinic on Wednesday, Oct. 15. Niles residents, age 60 and over qualify for the \$5 vaccination. The necessary appointments can be arranged by calling 967-6100 ext.

Flu is a respiratory infection caused by viruses. Symptoms include fever, chills, headache, and dry cough our muscle aches. These may last from several days up to one or more weeks. Usually, complete recovery can be expected. Complications for some people may lead to more serious illnesses such as' pneumonia or very rarely, death. The risk of contracting the flu cannot be estimated. Flu can be especially serious for the elderly, persons with diabetes, heart, lung or kidney diseases. The vaccine is composed of killed viruses and contains the strains selected by the U.S. Health Department: A/Chile, A/Mississippi and B/Ann Arbor.

Generally, most people will not experience any harmful side effects as a result of the vaccination. A few might have tenderness at the injection site. in the community to a special sday. INFLUENZA AND PNEUMONIA IMMUNIZATIONS Each winter, millions of people suffer from the unpleasant effects of the "flu." For most of these people, a few days in bed, a few more days of rest, aspirin, and plenty to drink will be the best treatment. But in older people or in those of any age who have chronic illnesses, flu can be life threatening. By lowering a person's resistance, flu may allow more serious infections to occur, especially pneumonia. A flu shot will help protect against the most commonly suspected flu strains of this winter, and the pneumonia shot gives lifelong immunity to the twenty-three most common forms of the disease. The Morton Grove Village Hall Senior Center will conduct two immunization clinics for residents age 55 and over from 10 a.m. to noon on Sat. Oct. 11 and from 1 to 3 p.m. on Tues. Oct. 14. Appointments are required and should be made by calling the Senior Hot Line any weekday morning from 9 a.m. to noon at 965-4658. Contributions toward the vaccine cost are suggested at \$2.50 for flu and \$5 for pneumonia.

LOWERING BLOOD PRESSURE

Because of blood pressure's close association with the consumption of salt and because the typical American diet is loaded with salt and salt products, it is recommended that seniors take a close look at the amounts of salt, and particularly sodium, that is contained in the foods they eat. The Morton Grove Village Hall Senior Center will conduct a free clinic to record blood pressure readings and give recommendations as to how individuals can lower their blood pressure through the reduction of sodium. The clinic is set for 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. on Tues. Oct. 14.

HOME REMEDIES: HIT OR MYTH

Home remedies have their advantages while prescription drugs, surgical operations, and laboratory tests for some conditions may be suspect. Author, radio and tv personality, Robert Mendelsohn M.D., will discuss this issue at Oakton Community College's Passages Through Life series at 1 p.m. on Tues. Planning your wedding

ANNOUNCING YOUR THREE MONTHS ENGAGEMENT

Announcements should be sent to the newspapers, both in your home town and your fiance's, if he lives elsewhere. Type or print all information. Indicate the date when you would like the announcement to appear. Allow plenty of time. Be sure your name, address and telephone number are on the upper right hand corner.

Many papers and some photographers have forms on which to fill in your name, your fiance's name, names and residences of both sets of parents, background material on you both, and the expected date of your wedding. Society editors decide how much of this they can use. You may send along an 8" by 10" glossy photograph.

AN ENGAGEMENT PARTY

Often the bride's family wishes to celebrate the official announcement with a party for the couple. If the bride's family lives a great distance away, the groom's parents may do this, if they wish. It is absolutely essential that both the bride and her fiance be in attendance. If this is not possible (military separation, school separation, etc.), the partv must wait.

The engagement party usually Includes relatives and close friends and is given in the form of a cocktail party, dinner or even a summer barbecue. Informal printed invitations should read: first line - your parents name (or his, if they are hosts); second line - your name (or his); third line -"To meet Thomas Johnson (or Jane Jones)." Handwritten or telephone invitations are also correct.

FOUR TO TWELVE MONTHS BEFORE WEDDING

-Determine your budget with your parents and decide whether vour wedding will be formal or informal and where the ceremony will take place. -Visit your clergyman with your fiance and set the date. -Plan the reception, reserve all the services you'll need. -Decide which friends you wish to have for attendants. -Draw up your invitation list and have your fiance do his. -Enroll with the Bridal Consultant-of your favorite store and select your wedding dress, veil

and accessories. -Choose attendants' dresses and men's formal wear. -Select the photographer. -See your florist.
