**Democrats wage new

**Petition referred to village board
with no recommendation**

**Zoners dump
pizza parlor
in village lap**

In a first in Niles zoning board history, commissioners at Monday's meeting failed to come up with a recommendation for a pizza restaurant because of a deadlock vote on a decision.

The case involved a petition by Donald Waldman for special use and a parking variation for a carry-out pizza restaurant in a vacant store at 7456 Oakton St.

In a motion by Angelo Troiani to deny the request (objections based on parking problems) the vote was 3-3. A second motion for approval was again a tie vote.

Noting that a board member

was missing (Phillip Boyle) the board discussed whether to continue the case before a full board, but decided against that action.

After receiving advice from an attorney in the audience, the board referred the request to the village board with no recommendation. "I've been on this board for more than 15 years, and this is the first time this has happened," remarked John Frick, board chairman.

In a board discussion Troiani said there was a potential parking problem with a pizza Continued on Page 43

**District 63 to renew
library branch lease**

Niles Library District will renew its lease on the Branch Library at the former Ballard School with reduced space in an agreement with School District 63, according to Jim Bowen, business manager.

At a meeting of the building and grounds committee, Harry Pestine, board president, and Administrator Duncan McKenzie said that economics dictated the

reduction of space from the original 9,662 square feet to 6,500 square feet in the school wing. The lease is for one year at \$5.22 a square foot.

The lease began in 1980 with two three-year options. Bowen said, adding that a recommendation for renewal of the contract will be made at the next board meeting.

Niles Senior Center flu clinic

The Niles Senior Center, 8060 Oakton in Niles, will host an influenza immunization clinic on Wednesday, Oct. 15. Niles residents, age 60 and over qualify for the \$5 vaccination. The necessary appointments can be arranged by calling 967-6100 ext. 376.

Flu is a respiratory infection caused by viruses. Symptoms include fever, chills, headache, and dry cough or muscle aches. These may last from several days up to one or more weeks. Usually, complete recovery can be expected. Complications for some people may lead to more serious illnesses such as pneumonia or very rarely, death. The risk of contracting the flu cannot be estimated. Flu can be especially serious for the elderly, persons with diabetes, heart, lung or kidney diseases. The vaccine is composed of killed viruses and contains the strains selected by the U.S. Health Department. A/Chile, A/Mississippi and B/Ann Arbor.

Generally, most people will not experience any harmful side effects as a result of the vaccination. A few might have tenderness at the injection site. Some may experience fever, chills, headaches or muscular aches within the first 48 hours. As with any medications, the possibility of severe and allergic reactions should be considered. The vaccination will not be administered to any individual who has had Guillain Barre Syndrome or who is allergic to eggs, chicken or chicken feathers. Maine Beat

O'HARE LOVE-IN...one of the major airlines is trying to get on more friendly terms with the suburbs by recently implementing new take-off procedures that will relieve noise at O'Hare Airport.

The procedure...which will be put into effect by United Airlines at more than 140 airports in the country...calls for pilots to cut back the throttle during part of the ascent. The system will be used, at the pilot's discretion, on the airline's older noisier planes, such as the Boeing 727 and 737.

The Catch-22 is that the change will reduce noise (as much as 50 percent) for only some residents...those living close to the airport. Suburban leaders fighting noise at O'Hare say it may be a step in the right direction, but United's action does not even approach noise abate measures that should be taken...to benefit all communities plagued by noise and air pollution in the skies. They also point out that the new procedure...cutting back engine power when the plane reaches an altitude of 1,000 feet and continuing reduced throttle to 3,000 feet...will depend on safety factors, such as weather and load of the plane.

A love-in between the suburbs and Chicago (under former mayor Jane Byrne) was struggling along in an attempt to reach some kind of compromise involving noise relief. It did lead to the formation of the Suburban Advisory Committee...which would have input on Chicago's \$1.6 million modernization plan now underway at O'Hare.

The love affair soured when a new mayor came in, who made no bones that the city's interests came first in the scheme of things. It's interesting to note that because of deregulation and the hub concept, the airlines show as many flights as possible into a single community airport. It may be news to some people...but a reported half of the nearly 50 million passengers who use O'Hare...on an annual basis...are in Chicago only because they are making a connecting flight.

Some people may think that the savings will lead to lower air fares. But suburban foes argue that the connecting flights must have maintenance service...which means more business and jobs for the City of Chicago.

AROUND THE AREA...Nels Nelson...the shepherd of Oakton St...will no longer be protecting Niles children (at Prospect and Oakton) going to and from Dist. 64's Field School. Nelson 80 years young, is retiring as a crossing guard after 15 years on the job...and was recently honored by the Niles village board for that service. He now plans to travel to far-off places.

IN THE NEWS...former Morton Grove resident Marlee Matlin recently hit the media news after starring in "Children of a Lesser God." The film version of the Tony award-winning play opened last Friday in the theaters across the country. Her leading man is actor William Hurt.

Marlee, 21, who is severely hearing impaired, had a small part in the Immediate Theater Company's off-Loop production of the play two years ago.

As a child, she performed at the Children's Theater of the Deaf, now in Des Plaines (sponsored by the Center on Deafness) and played leading roles in productions ranging from "Peter Pan" to "Mary Poppins."

INFLUENZA AND PNEUMONIA IMMUNIZATIONS

Each winter, millions of people suffer from the unpleasant effects of the "flu." For most of these people, a few days in bed, a few more days of rest, aspirin, and plenty to drink will be the best treatment. But in older people or in those of any age who have chronic illnesses, flu can be life threatening. By lowering a person's resistance, flu may allow more serious infections to occur, especially pneumonia. A flu shot will help protect against the most commonly suspected flu strains of this winter, and the pneumonia shot gives lifelong immunity to the twenty-three most common forms of the disease. The Morton Grove Village Hall Senior Center will conduct two immunization clinics for residents age 55 and over from 10 a.m. to noon on Sat. Oct. 11 and from 1 to 3 p.m. on Tues. Oct. 14. 

Edgar also said that new, larger renewal stickers for 1987 must be displayed on passenger car license plates expiring in October by midnight Friday, Oct. 31.

Motorists receiving newly designed plates this year are reminded that the sticker attached to the ID card must be placed at the bottom center of the new rear plate.

"The new, blue stickers are twice the size of the current stickers," Edgar said, "making them easier to read and more identifiable for police officers. In addition, owners of 1.7 million automobiles with plates beginning with the letters N through Z are receiving new plates this year, marking the end of the three-year replating program for all 5.6 million cars in Illinois."

Pre-printed renewal applications have been mailed to approximately 550,000 owners who renew their stickers in October, and 180,000 owners who will also receive the new passenger car license plates.

It is now too late to send applications by mail and guarantee delivery of the new plates and/or stickers before the Oct. 31 deadline. However, stickers and plates may be purchased at Secretary of State facilities in Springfield and Chicago, and at more than 1,550 financial institutions, including 762 banks, 194 savings and loan associations, 24 credit unions and about 600 Chicago-area currency exchanges.

Planning your wedding

ANNOUNCING YOUR ENGAGEMENT

Announcements should be sent to 15 newspapers, both in your home town and your fiancée's, if he lives elsewhere. Type or print all information. Indicate the date when you would like the announcement to appear. Allow plenty of time. Be sure your name, address and telephone number are on the upper right hand corner.

Many papers and some photographers have forms on which to fill in your name, your fiancée's name, names and residences of both sets of parents, background material on you both, and the expected date of your wedding. Society editors decide how much of this they can use. You may send along an 8" by 10" glossy photograph.

AN ENGAGEMENT PARTY

Often the bride's family wishes to celebrate the official announcement with a party for the couple. If the bride's family lives a great distance away, the groom's parents may do this, if they wish. It is absolutely essential that both the bride and her fiancée be in attendance. If this is not possible (military separation, school separation, etc.), the party must wait.

The engagement party usually includes relatives and close friends and is given in the form of a cocktail party, dinner or even a summer barbecue. Informal printed invitations should read: first line - your parents name (or his, if they are hosts); second line - your name (or his); third line - "To meet Thomas Johnson (or Jane Jones)." Handwritten or telephone invitations are also correct.

FOUR TO TWELVE MONTHS BEFORE WEDDING

Determine your budget with your parents and decide whether your wedding will be formal or informal and where the ceremony will take place. Visit your clergyman with your fiancée and set the date. Plan the reception, reserve all the services you'll need. Decide which friends you wish to have for attendants. Draw up your invitation list and have your fiancée do his. Enroll with the Bridal Consultant of your favorite store and select your wedding dress, veil and accessories. Choose attendants' dresses and men's formal wear. Select the photographer. See your florist. Plan your music. Plan your home furnishings.

THREE MONTHS BEFORE THE WEDDING

Order your invitations, personal stationary and note paper. Make plans for your honeymoon destination. Begin to shop for your first-year trousseau. Have both mothers choose their gowns. Visit your doctor. Check on rubella immunization.

TWO MONTHS BEFORE THE WEDDING

Plan recording and display of wedding gifts. Finish addressing the wedding invitations. Decide upon gifts for your attendants. Select the wedding ring, if you have not already done so. Go with your fiancée to get the marriage license.

ONE MONTH BEFORE THE WEDDING

Have your hair styled as you would for the wedding. Attend parties in your honor. Make transportation plans for the wedding party. Have the final fitting on your bridal gown. Arrange for the Bridesmaids' gowns to be fitted. Order your wedding cake and the package of groom's cake for guests to take home to "dream on." Arrange for your rehearsal dinner if you plan to have one. Plan accommodations for out-of-town guests. Mail your invitations. Plan bridesmaids' luncheon. Prepare the newspaper announcement of your wedding. Make a household check.

TWO WEEKS BEFORE THE WEDDING

Record each gift as received. Check on attire for everyone in the wedding party. Plan how to handle traffic and parking for guests. Arrange a seating plan for the reception. If you plan to have a bride's table at the reception, write out place cards. Go over personal suitcase. Send your typed announcement and glossy photograph to the newspaper. Arrange for name changes on social security, etc. Arrange to move belongings to your new home.



Bouquet And Boutonnieres

Early bridesmaids' bouquets were made of pungent herbs like thyme and garlic—not flowers. The smell was supposed to scare away any bad fairies eyeing the bridal party. Even the groom wore a few sprigs. Your groom, though, will sport white stephanotis in his lapel, or a flower from your bouquet. And you will carry the traditional flowers. Why not adopt another old idea? Tuck one non-flowering thing in your bridal bouquet to plant—maybe some myrtle or ivy.

Make arrangements for flowers for bridal bouquet, going away corsage, boutonniers for best man and ushers, and mothers' corsages. Pick up wedding rings, check engraving. Arrange lodging for out-of-town relatives and ushers.

Select bridal gift and gifts for attendants. Get legal, medical and religious documents for the wedding in order. Check that ushers have ordered their attire.

Two Weeks Before

Go with fiancée to get marriage license. Organize bachelor dinner with best man. Double check honeymoon reservations. Make sure to arrange transportation from the reception to wherever you are planning to leave on your honeymoon. Move belongings to new home.

One Week Before

Make sure best man notifies ushers of rehearsal time and place. Explain any special seating to head usher. Pack for your honeymoon and get going-away clothes ready to change into after reception. Present gifts to attendants at bachelor party.

Wedding invitations

Choosing the right invitation style for your wedding is among the most important tasks a couple must undertake before their wedding.

Order invitations three months before your wedding day to allow time for printing, addressing, and mailing. Visit your department store, local printer, jeweler or bridal salon to order them. Be sure to request a sample to check for mistakes before your order is printed.

Inviting your favorite people to celebrate your wedding is a big part of the day's fun. If you're having a larger wedding (100 or more guests) you'll want to send formal wedding invitations.

Word formal invitations the traditional way. And do write out what you want before you order. Or ask your printer to show you personalized versions. If all your guests are being invited to both ceremony and reception, consider the "combination" invitation, below:

Mr. and Mrs. John Sampson request the honor of your presence at the Marriage of their Daughter Teresa Dawn

to
Mr. Darrell Charles Tucker on Saturday, the Fourth of August at Four O'Clock
St. James Church
Mt. Prospect, Illinois

and Afterwards
at Old Orchard Country Club
Request replies with an R.S.V.P., Kindly Respond, or Please Respond in the lower left corner, and make it easy for guests to mail them. Printed

reply cards do make it easy for guests. But traditionally, they're reserved for business functions only. If you use cards, why not "code" the envelope with different stamps for your guests and his. It'll make it easier to give an accurate head count to the caterer.

Spell everything on formal invitation - the wedding date, time and all numerals, and names. No abbreviations. Initials or nicknames are used - except Mr., Oe., Mrs., and Jr. Traditionally, only the bride's first and middle names are printed. But if you're a doctor or military officer, you can add your title and full name below the phrase, "their daughter." You may or may not want to add Mr. before your fiancé's name.

Begin your invitations with the name of the person(s) sponsoring the wedding. The name at the top of an invitation is not supposed to tell your guests who's paying the bills, so whether you live at home or not, your parents' names should head the invitations. You might also include the groom's parents name below his on the invitation. John North Fleming, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Fleming... if your parents are deceased, your guardian, a relative, or a friend can host the wedding. Or you two can be your own sponsors. If your parents are divorced, the parent who raised

you usually does the inviting. If that's your mother, and she's remarried, she uses your stepfather's name, inserts the phrase at the marriage of their daughter..., then adds your full name. Divorced but friendly parents can issue a joint invitation.

Have your formal invitations printed in black script on the top page of a double sheet of paper in pale ivory or white. It can be printed or plain. The most popular size 4 1/4" x 5 3/4" fits into an envelope without folding. A larger size 5 1/4" x 7 1/4" is folded once for mailing. It's for very formal weddings.

Add more "personality" to your invitations by choosing a translucent (parchment perhaps) or shiny paper in a pretty pastel or an earthy tone. Use colorful ink, or even a photograph of the two of you.

The Bride's Handkerchief

Early farmers thought a bride's wedding day tears were lucky and brought rain for their crops. Later, a crying bride meant that she'd never shed another tear about her marriage. Why not start your own bridal tradition. Embroider your initials and wedding date on a hanky, then give it to the next woman in your family to marry; she can do the same for another bride. Or maybe even do two hankies—one for your mother, another for his... wedding day keepsakes for their tears of joy.

Questions brides ask most

Q. Who gives the clergyman his fee?

A. The groom pays, but best man hands it over in plain white envelope before or after the ceremony.

Q. May a house wedding be just as formal as a church wedding?

A. Yes, although there are never as many attendants.

Q. How can wedding gifts be displayed if a home reception isn't being held?

A. Close friends may be invited to a tea or cocktail party several days before the wedding.

Q. Are checks displayed with wedding presents?

A. No, but they may be noted on a card.

Q. Is it correct to use "and family" on invitation envelopes?

A. No. Send separate invitations to adult sons and daughters. For small children address the outside envelope to their parents, write their first names on the inner envelope under their parents' names.

Q. How should invitation be inserted in envelope?

A. Invitation is folded with the wording outside and put in the inner envelope (which has no gum on flap) with the folded edge down. The inner envelope is then placed in the outer one facing the flap.

Q. Are reception cards enclosed with invitations?

A. Yes, and so are the reply cards and reply envelopes. The home address would be printed on reply envelopes.

Q. Are identifying cards put with the presents on display?

A. Not these days.

Q. Are gifts ever brought to the reception?

A. No.

Q. Do ushers and best man stand in receiving line?

A. No.

Q. May guests be invited to a reception and not the wedding itself?

A. Yes, when the ceremony is attended only by relatives and close friends.

Q. Must invitations be engraved?

A. They can be. However, simulated engraving is less expensive and just as satisfactory.

Bugle Bridal Guide

Selecting silverware



It's a family affair now — choosing just the right silverware pattern for the new household, surveys of newlyweds reveal, says the Jewelry Industry Council.

Dad might have felt out of place selecting silverware and china patterns with Mom, but times have changed and today's groom is just as interested as his wife when it comes to choosing tableware that will grace their home in the years ahead.

While women may be looking for a graceful silverware pattern that looks attractive with their china and napery, the men tend to select utensils that feel comfortable in the hand.

Traditional, contemporary and modern patterns give young couples a wide range of choice, whether it be in sterling, silver plate or stainless, the Council observes.

Couples may choose six, five or four pieces to their place settings, but the experts advise that eight place settings are most desirable for the average young couple.

Best advice to those who choose sterling is — use it. Daily washing in hot, sudsy water with an occasional silver polishing every month or so is all that is necessary. Rotate the pieces

so all get equal wear to build up the patina on the silver, the Council says.

Silverplate is cared for much as sterling, and of course, stainless is the easiest to care for. Don't use silver cleaner on stainless just wash it in hot sudsy water and follow with a hot water rinse and dry immediately to prevent spotting, the experts say.


Sohn will fight for IRA's

Capparelli announces reform

State Representative Ralph C. Capparelli (D-13) announced today that the Governor signed new insurance reforms into law. "I believe we will see a wider availability of affordable liability insurance for businesses, local governments, day care centers and others who have been effected by skyrocketing rates," Capparelli said.

It is the hope of Illinois lawmakers, businesses, municipalities and nearly every citizen in the state that the liability insurance premiums will begin to go down with the signing of the insurance reform bill (SB1200) by the governor last Friday.

Key elements in the new law call for:

- 1) significant changes in the civil justice system, including modifications of the joint and several liability doctrine;
- 2) immunity protections for directors and officers of not-for-profit corporations;
- 3) new procedures to reduce product liability cases;
- 4) creation of an insurance cost containment program in the Illinois Department of Insurance designed to encourage a more competitive market;
- 5) new requirements for insurance companies to inform business and state officials on their operations and cancellation procedures;
- 6) prohibition of insurance company redlining; and
- 7) condominium associations to form insurance pools.





As a candidate for the Cook County Board, one of my major objectives has been to give people a better understanding of the important role of County government.

I find that many people are uncertain where to place County government within the traditional city/state/federal categories. Perhaps this is because County government provides services normally associated with all three of these categories.

With a budget of approximately one billion dollars, the Cook County Board is the local governing board for all unincorporated areas in Cook County which is about one-fifth of the County. This means police and fire services, building and zoning requirements, the issuance of

restaurant and liquor licenses and the maintenance and repair of streets, highways and bridges. In addition, the County Board is responsible for two major hospitals, forest preserves, several public health clinics, the circuit courts and all elections. Finally, the Board appropriates money for all branches of County government including the Sheriff's Department, the Assessor, the State's Attorney, the County Clerk, the Superintendent of Schools, the juvenile detention home, the probation service and foster home programs. In one way or another Cook County government touches many aspects of our daily lives.

There are 17 Commissioners that comprise the Cook County Board. The Commissioners are elected every four years, at large, with 10 Commissioners

elected from Chicago and 7 from suburban Cook County. By state law, the Commissioners must maintain a balanced budget. You can quickly see why County officials walk a fiscal tightrope every budget year.

Your County government officials are grappling with important issues as they compete with the collar counties for growth industries and yet try to maintain a level of service that County residents deserve.

I urge your readers to learn more about County government and to take seriously their responsibility of electing qualified Commissioners to carry out these important duties.

Allstate assists Red Cross flood efforts

restaurant. "The parking lot is near a residential area and cars could back up into the alley and hit the garages," he said.

Waldman, representing a real estate company for "Little Caesar's" (a pizza chain) presented a parking plan that showed the parking capacity was 93 cars in the shopping center. 



