### Court rules against water suit

After a long legal battle, the City of Chicago scored a victory when Circuit Judge Albert Green dismissed a suburban suit last week claiming the city had overcharged communities for supplying them with Lake Michigan


water. In a 32-page order, Green ruled the 52 suburbs involved in the litigation did not prove their case regarding the overcharges. Consequently, they were not entitled to a refund of approximately \$150

million as requested in the suit, according to Kathy Janega, one of the attorneys representing the suburbs. At the same time, Green threw out a countersuit by the city. Continued on Page 36

### District 207 1986 tax levies down

### From the Left Hand

As one of my children mentioned last night, "Thanksgiving is a family day and I'm coming over the night before, just to be with the family."

Indeed, Thanksgiving is for family. How often we reached for the family, gathering in the clan from near and far.

Back in 1943, my first year in service, I reached for the family some 700 miles away. I was in an air cadet program in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania and longed to be back home with "family" during this most American of holidays. I don't recall how it happened but I wangled a weekend pass which got me 2 of the 4 days I needed to head back home. The rather inflexible rules demanded I was not to stray more than a few miles from our base. But I hitchhiked to Harrisburg and caught the train to Chicago, aware I had little protection if any M.P.s decided they wanted to see my pass credentials.

In those days of anarchy there was little chance of flying. Continued on Page 47

### Oakton teachers drop strike vote plans

An intent to strike vote Monday morning by teachers at Oakton Community College fell by the wayside after faculty representatives and administrators met that evening to iron out problems linked to teacher salaries.

According to David Hilquist, Oakton's vice president of business and finance, "excellent" progress was made at the special mediation session with both sides agreeing to a compromise on the salary schedule. "The meeting went very well and hopefully, negotiations will be concluded when we meet Wednesday afternoon (Nov. 26)," he said.

The administration had offered a two-year contract with an annual salary closer to \$50,000 in the

# Former Nilesite saves woman from burning home

## Niles Fire Dept. calls

On Nov. 19, firemen responded to a fire at a restaurant, at 8600 Golf Rd. The small fire, which started in a grease chute in the roof section was extinguished. A check was made around exhaust ducts for any possible fire hazard, but found none. There was no damage estimate.

A small of smoke was reported at 7132 Niles Ave. The cause was traced to an overheated furnace. The owner will contact a repair man.

On Nov. 20, Niles and North Maine firefighters extinguished a fire in an oven at 9701 Dee Rd. The oven was being used to heat pizza when grease in the oven ignited. Smoke ejector equipment was used to clear the smoke odor. There was no damage estimate.

Niles firemen responded to a fire at 9028 Cumberland. Upon entering the apartment, they found the fire which had started from grease in the oven broiler had died out.

Although the resident inhaled some smoke, she did not want to go to the hospital and agreed to sign a release.

The son of a Niles resident has been receiving a lot of media attention since he rescued a 71-year-old woman from her burning house on the northwest side of Chicago last week, and may end up getting a citation from Chicago's Mayor Harold Washington for his heroic act.

"My son has appeared on radio and television and there is talk that Senator Phillip Rock will also present him with a plaque recognizing his efforts," said Lucy Bartoszewski, 7706 N. Waukegan rd. "I am so proud of him. I remember he always went

out of his way to help people when he was growing up."

Dale Bartoszewski, 36, who lives in Chicago, was driving a city garbage truck Tuesday, Nov. 11 past a house at 3412 N. Cicero when he saw flames coming out of the third floor building.

With the help of another man, they ran up to the third floor where there was a lot of smoke, but seeing the door was open assumed everybody had left the building.

After going down to the second floor, they saw a door that was

### Mariavites to offer Oplatki wafers

The Mariavite Old Catholic Church, founded in Poland in 1893, plans to preserve a centuries-old tradition by making available the traditional Polish Christmas Eve Wafers (Oplatki). The Oplatki, a symbolic and treasured link between Poland and her children who have settled in various parts of the world, is a thin unleavened wafer similar to communion wafers used in some churches. The Oplatki wafers, which are much larger, are embossed with figures of the Christ Child, or other Nativity scenes. No longer restricted to individuals of Polish descent, use of the wafers have become a part of

the holiday customs and traditions of others as well.

The Church's purpose is to make these often unobtainable and much sought-after wafers available, to area residents for the preservation of this tradition.

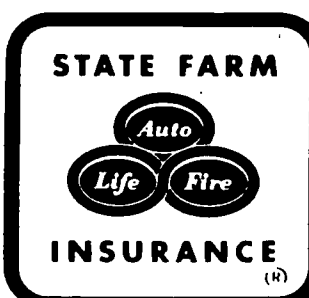

charging the suburbs had violated their contracts by failing to build adequate water reservoirs and had drawn more water from the city during peak-usage periods than the contracts allowed.

Janega said she was disappointed with the court's ruling. "We have not had a chance to read the full text of the order regarding Green's findings in the case. His decision was unexpected," she said.

Mayor Nicholas Blase of Niles, who spearheaded the suit against Chicago, also expressed disappointment and indicated a possible appeal of the ruling. "The first step is to sit down with our attorneys to discuss the matter," he said. "We always seem to have a problem dealing at the circuit court level when it involves Chicago."

He added the suit traveled from the circuit court, "where we lost it" to the Appellate Court, which sent the case back to the lower court for another hearing.

Attorney Marvin Glink of the Chicago-based law firm of Ancel, Glink, Diamond, Murphy and Cope filed the suit in 1977 on behalf of the suburban communities, which contended Chicago had overcharged \$149.5 million during the past ten years (including water rate increases).

Suburban attorneys claimed the suburbs used 17 percent of Lake Michigan water but pay 28 percent of the expenses incurred by Chicago to service the water.

Experts, witnesses for the suburbs included an engineering specialist, who testified

to specific overcharges for each of the suburbs between 1973 and 1982.

The basis of arguments at the trial was that suburbs were being charged 60 percent above the cost of supplying the water, and held this high charge meant they were subsidizing Chicago's corporate fund. Thus, they felt they were paying for the free water supplied to park districts, public buildings, hospitals and churches.

Glink argued about 68 percent of Chicago's customers (most of them homeowners) pay a non-metered flat rate, which he said resulted in waste (customers in the suburbs are metered). He also claimed that \$15.7 million of the suburbs' payments had been turned over to the city's general fund and \$29.7 million more had been used to pay for sewer expenses, with both amounts representing overcharges.

City engineers testified the suburbs' figures were in error and they should be paying more for Lake Michigan water. They noted the erratic flow of water to the suburbs makes it more expensive to supply water. City attorneys argued that Chicago bears the cost to maintain and operate pumping stations to pipe the water to approximately 80 county communities.

Since 1973, there have been three rate increases, the latest in 1981 and 1985. Attorneys for the suburbs petitioned for injunctions to block both the 1981 and 1985 water rate hike, but were turned down by the court. The suburbs are now paying 77 cents per 1,000 gallons for Lake Michigan water.

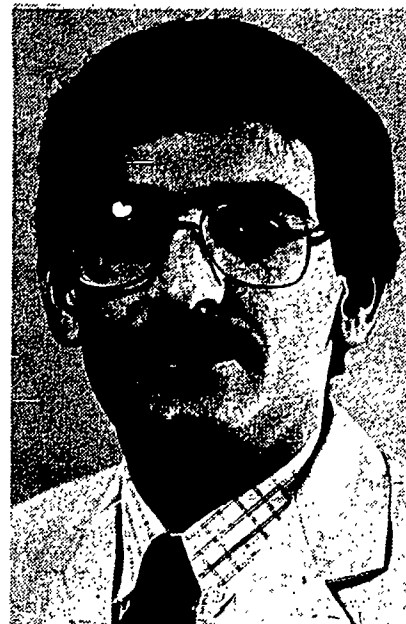

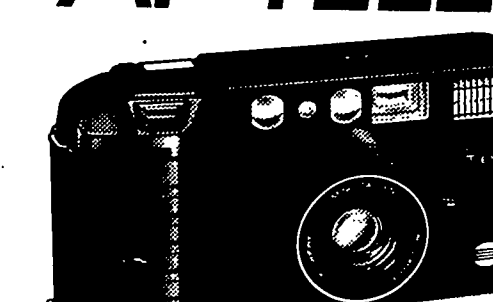

"The advantage of a facade," states Gootnick, "is that it is small, extremely attractive, and can be placed in a lobby display case, hung on the wall or used in display windows."

Gootnick's current project is building a facade of an 1894 vintage fire station in New York City which was recently torn down. He has received many awards for his work, particularly for his miniature replicas of three-dimensional buildings which he builds to scale. His miniature of the Touro Synagogue, the oldest existing synagogue in the U.S. is currently on display at the National Museum of Jewish History in Philadelphia.

Gootnick is often commissioned by corporations and organizations to build miniatures and facades for their marketing programs. His studio is in Niles.

ding a train seat for the trip home. I wandered back to the baggage car and amidst lumpy barracks bags and bone-sharp elbows and knees, I became one more bit of baggage being shipped to the midwest. By the time I got home for our Thanksgiving, my Mother, as only Mothers know, said I didn't look well. She shipped me off to bed where a bit of fever and flu kept me there through the holiday. All the family marched into our house to see the skinny G.I. home for his first visit. They had to march into the bedroom where the fallen hero had the first flush of the holiday season, which was really a typhoid fever. Sunday, I climbed out of bed and reversed the trip back to Gettysburg via another baggage car. Arriving at the Harrisburg station I was welcomed back by my commanding officer, who accompanied several of us back to the camp where we spent the following 4 weekends doing extra curricular activities which lent to the cleanliness of the camp.

Other Thanksgivings past included a yearly trek to an Aunt's home in a western area named Villa Olivia. The Aunt had married a very stylish gent who bought a 60 acre horse farm west of Chicago. He bred Doberman Pinscher dogs and showed them around the country. The Aunt and Uncle converted the upstairs area of the horse stable for their home, above where he housed the dogs.

There were little family reminiscences never to be forgotten. The man tending the dogs always extended an extra bit of warmth to me, the youngster in the family. He would take me out on the track in front of the stables, and had me race against a stopwatch as I streaked around the track. Afterward, I would join him in feeding the 25 or 30 dogs. Later, they would go out individually into the dog runs for exercise. More than once, in later years, I saw my Aunt rush into the runs and separate the dogs which got into the same runs. Two Dobermans, attacking one

another is a vicious, snarling affair and I always thought the Aunt somewhat heroic getting into the runs and separating the angered dogs, ala Frank Buck.

The Aunt's home above the stables was quite elegant and the entire evening was marked by a little extra style. But style and grace and elegance were just added bits of the trimming to a holiday which was first and last, a family affair.

In more recent years our Thanksgiving festivities were preceded by our annual Turkey Bowl football game. Everyone, young and old, boys and girls, participate in an hour-long football game, in what was really 10 minutes of football and 50 minutes of "piling on". We tackle anyone on the field and then young and old pile on the poor guy/gal at the bottom. The game proved so successful that soon we added a band program. The entire family participated in a ragtag parade with everyone playing a slide whistle, a kazoo, or small Indian drums. We added 3 baton twirlers and wound up marching down the street, through the front door and out the back door of a house of a cousin who was also celebrating Thanksgiving in a more conventional way. Returning to our home turf we had our abbreviated football game before adjourning to the more serious matter of wolfing down the evening's turkey. After dinner we presented miniature trophies to all the participants and we now have a traveling trophy which records the yearly scores of the big game. By coincidence, every year's score has ended in a tie.

These are really just little cameos of Thanksgivings past. But as the number two daughter said, "I've got to come over the night before Thanksgiving so we can all be together again."

I think that feeling of Thanksgiving, that feeling of "family" has trickled down to the next generation. We have much to be thankful for.

grown considerably since its inception in 1982. At that time, the fund balance was \$3,720,643. As of April 30, 1986, the balance stood at \$9,945,486. Leavitt said wise investments contributed to the fund's success.

Until now, according to Leavitt, the village was obligated to contribute to the fund in order to make up the difference between the amount of disbursements and the incoming funds. However, this is no longer necessary since the fund is currently taking in a revenue of \$669,506.08 and occurring \$195,000 in expenses. In other words, for every \$1 the fund occurs, it is covered by \$3.42.

Leavitt concluded by reassuring the board there is no conceivable reason for the pension board to ask the village for money in the future.

The board also passed a

resolution which will authorize the village's authority to transfer unused revenue bonding funds to the state of Illinois. The amount of \$1,781,025 will be issued to the Illinois Development Finance Authority to complete the financing of industrial projects in its program throughout Illinois.

Attorney Martin Ashman drew up an ordinance to prohibit parking on the south side of Theobald Rd. from a point 134 feet east of the centerline of Marmora Ave. to a point 300 feet east of the centerline of Marmora Ave.

restaurant came before the zoning board at last month's meeting. That ended in a 3-3 vote. The matter was then referred to the village board with no recommendation.

Attorney Donald Waldman, representing a real estate for "Little Caesar's" (a pizza chain) said a 17-car parking variation would be needed, and the parking area would be readjusted to 60 degree spaces. Curbings would be installed near the alley to avoid cars backing into garages of residents, he said.

Waldman added the restaurant would be strictly a carry-out operation with no delivery service. Business hours would be 10:30 a.m. to midnight, Sunday through Thursday and 10:30 a.m. to 2 a.m. Friday and Saturday. Trustee Peter Pesole said traffic congestion exists on Oakton and a pizza restaurant would compound the problem. He also noted cars would be going through the alley to Osceola to avoid traffic on Oakton St.

"There could be a problem with people eating pizza in their cars posing a parking problem, he said."

Several Seward St. residents objected to a pizza parlor near the residential area citing traffic problems and noise from cars going in and out of the parking lot.

In other business, the board tabled a request by Imperial Cleveite to construct a 32-bay truck terminal building at 6300 W. Howard St.

According to a representative from Consolidated Freightways, the terminal would be located at the rear of the Cleveite plant with a common driveway located east of the property to Howard.

Chairman Nicholas Blase noted the size of the terminal could cause traffic problems and would refer the matter to a board committee for study.

In other actions, the board amended an ordinance to allow 75 percent self serve pumps in gas pumps and 25 percent full serve, changing it from the previous 50-50 gas pump regulation.

At the suggestion of George Nowak of the code enforcement department, trustees also approved that both full serve and self serve have the availability for each grade of gas.

Approved a request by Fire Chief Harry Kinowski to advertise bids for two fire ambulances to replace two older units that are in a deteriorating condition.
