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Village ready for winter's blast

The Village of Niles is ready for the winter season with salt piled high in a storage shed and more than 20 pieces of equipment for snow removal operations, according to Keith Peck, director of public services.

The department ordered about 2,400 tons of salt which is stored in a pyramid-shaped shed near the public works building at 6849 Touhy Ave. Five salt trucks and 23 pieces of equipment are kept in top condition in the garage to combat the winter snows.

The salt costs \$20.94 a ton, several dollars cheaper than last year. "Membership communities of the Northwest Municipal Conference pay for the salt on a per ratio basis after bids are put out."

by the conference, Peck said, adding the village had 1,200 tons left over from last year because of the moderate snowfall.

In all, the village normally uses between 2,400 and 3,000 tons during the winter season, depending on the weather.

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Speaking of the Library...

As often as we tell people to call or visit the library whenever they need some information, it never ceases to amaze me that people just don't think to do it. Not even my own mother.

I spoke with my parents this past week. My mother called to thank me for a birthday present I had sent her. I had given her a copy of David Pottinger's Quilts from the Indiana Amish, knowing that she has a penchant for handicrafts and adores visiting the Amish country around Middlebury, Indiana. She had read the book from cover to cover and is looking forward to an upcoming return to the area. The purpose for the trip is to price mobile homes or RV's. It seems that many of the RV's are manufactured in the Amish area. My parents are planning to buy a used one and figure visiting the manufacturers to learn the cost of new ones would give them a feel for the worth of a used vehicle. I suggested that a trip to the local library would offer the same information.

Most libraries subscribe to a series of books known as "The Red Book" or "The Blue Book." These are actually pricing guides for the car and truck industry. There are titles which give the dealer's costs for new vehicles, titles which give the wholesale and retail price, and titles which give the value of a used vehicle. These books are helpful not only to those buying vehicles but also to those wanting to sell a used vehicle.

There's another way the library can help everyone, yet few think of it. Here's how I put the library to use in planning my recent vacation in Colonial Williamsburg. My motor route was planned by an Apple computer program called "Road Search." The print-out gave me the most direct route between Chicago and Williamsburg, estimated the amount of gas needed, and suggested the amount of time it would take to travel based upon an average speed. I consulted the Hotel & Motel Red Book to compare motels available near Colonial Williamsburg. Using this guide, I found a motel with very reasonable rates, the amenities I wanted, and a toll free number to use in making the reservation. The Mobile Travel Guide gave details on sites to see in and around Williamsburg and even detailed the major buildings to be seen in Colonial Williamsburg. The library also has some books on Colonial Williamsburg and these gave useful background on the history of Williamsburg, its citizens and buildings. Last but not least, I found a good novel on the new book display to take with me on my vacation.

Now, will my mother use the library in lieu of visiting the Amish country to price RV's? I doubt it. It is, after all, a good excuse for a long weekend trip. But, using the library's consumer information which rates the various models, compares their service records, and reports owner satisfaction, could be a valuable tool in reaching the final decision to purchase.



After coming out of the bathroom, he tried to kiss her.

HYPOTHERMIA

Hypothermia is a condition marked by an abnormally low internal body temperature, typically 95°F or below. A simple drop in skin temperature is not hypothermia. While hypothermia can sometimes develop slowly, it usually occurs fairly quickly, over a period of a few days. With advancing age, many people become less able to resist and recover from stresses such as prolonged exposure to cold. Senior citizens often may not sense that they are becoming cold as readily as younger people, and their bodies may not adjust to changes in temperature as well. Specific measures to be taken that will prevent accidental hypothermia include: heating living and sleeping areas to 65°F, dressing warmly during the day and during sleep, eating enough food, staying active during winter months, and avoid smoking cigarettes.

PARKING

Any motor vehicle transporting a person who is disabled and displaying handicapped license plates, disabled veteran plates or a handicapped parking card may use parking areas designated for use by disabled persons. Other drivers who park in these areas illegally may be subject to a \$50 fine. In addition, the disabled driver or rider is exempt from paying parking meter fees and from ordinances imposing time limitations on parking with the only exception being time limitations of thirty minutes or less. Handicapped parking cards are available at both the Maine Township (297-2433) and Niles Township (673-9300) offices.

COLORECTAL TESTING

A colorectal screening is a simple, convenient and private method for individuals to test themselves for diseases of the colon. The test will detect blood in the stool before it can be seen and is very helpful in identifying the onset of colon cancer. 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

State gives warning on scam

Attorney General Neil F. Hartigan's Carbondale Regional Office alerts consumers about a possible telephone scam involving vacation trips.

Kimberly Dahlen, Assistant Attorney General in charge of the Carbondale Regional Office, reveals that a number of citizens in the Carbondale area have inquired about the legitimacy of the phone offer. The callers notify the consumers that they have been chosen for a trip; if they give their credit card number to the company, a reservation fee will be charged to their credit card. In return for the reservation fee, a package is sent to the consumers for a review of the trip. Upon receiving the packages, consumers are finding that there are conditions which must be met in order to take the trip. Some consumers do not meet the conditions, and thus they do not qualify for the trip.

Until the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division has thoroughly investigated the possible scam, Dahlen advises consumers to be wary of giving out their credit card number over the telephone.

Center of Concern services for elderly

Friendly Visitor, Information and Referral and Telephone Reassurance are three basic programs that make The Center of Concern of Park Ridge what it is - a place for those in the area, especially seniors, who have need of such services to turn to. Dee Heinrichs is the director.

The following case histories indicate four types of assistance in these problem situations that have been used.

Ninety-five year old Mrs. C. has a slight hearing problem and poor vision and receives a stipend from Social Security. Everyday, since she belongs to the Telephone Reassurance Program of The Center of Concern, either she calls in or she is contacted by one of the staff. This is important because, living alone as she does and using a walker in her housekeeping and cooking duties, she might fall and need assistance.

Because of her optimism and high spirits which transmits itself to staff and clients, she agreed to appear on local cable television. Her talk reflected her enthusiasm for The Center's personal care for her, not only through their Telephone Reassurance and Information and Referral areas, but in giving her surplus cheese, bakery goods, other foods and gifts.

Housebound Mr. H. is multiply-handicapped, as he is limited in the use of his hands and he can walk only with great difficulty. A housekeeper takes care of his shopping, cleaning and other chores, but, since he is a bright, well-educated man he has chosen to increase his feelings of self-sufficiency by assisting The Center of Concern as a phone volunteer.

He says it has given new meaning to his life to help others enrolled in the Telephone Reassurance Program. Because of his caring manner and enthusiasm which transmits itself so well over the telephone, he is a valuable addition to the volunteer group.

An older couple, Mr. and Mrs. L., came to The Center of Concern burdened with personal

problems. Even though they are legally divorced they are living together. He has nowhere to go and she is an alcoholic who is abusive and irritable under its influence. It was a very bad situation.

The free Personal Counseling that The Center provides was distorted by the woman so an alternative was chosen. This is a

volunteer who is part of the Friendly Visitor group and who tries to listen to their numerous crisis situations and assisting even in obtaining information on retirement homes and encouraging them in their efforts to live peacefully in their old age. Arranging for "Meals on Wheels" to be delivered and a housekeeper to assist them, as well as enrollment in the Telephone Reassurance program all were taken care of by their visitor, Mr. L. also assisted himself of the free Legal Counseling given at The Center every Saturday by an experienced lawyer.

Several months into her widowhood, Mrs. K. came to The Center of Concern because her son had just died. Since she had also recently lost her two brothers, she needed the Grief Support Group that The Center provides.

However, because of her asthma and consequent pneumonia, she is housebound and was unable physically to attend the meetings of the group. This is where the attendant services of The Center were activated. They arranged for her "Meals on Wheels" to be delivered, volunteers shopped for her and went to the bank. 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
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I Bet You Didn't Know

Niles car racer sets goals for 1987



In 1985, Phil D'Anna of Niles built his first off-road car, for dune hopping. It was a Berrien Buggy 2-seater. As with most enthusiasts, it consisted of being a "weekend warrior", playing in the sand and mud with other buggies, dirt bikes and 4-wheel drive trucks. He never realized then how much he would enjoy it or how involved he had become with it.

In 1987, ground up with the assistance of his co-driver Jay Will and his crew chief Bob Will. He entered his Berrien Buggy in the 2-1600 class of the 15th annual B.F. Goodrich Memorial Day 100. Held at the Lake Geneva Raceway, the Memorial Day 100 is one of the biggest short course endurance races in the United States.

The Memorial Day 100 not only attracts competitors from the midwest, but from across the country and Canada. Phil finished his first race in 13th place of 14 cars. He then raced at Santa Fe Speedway in the Chicago Classic where he finished 6th out of 10 cars. As the months progressed, Phil got more experience behind the wheel as also learning the different terrain at many different tracks. He also raced at Marion County Fair grounds in Decatur

where he finished 6th place of 12 cars.

The finest track in the midwest is at the World's Championship Off-Road Race Brush Run 101 in Crandon, Wisconsin. It is a very competitive and fast-paced heat featuring some of the best drivers in short course off-road racing. Phil was running good until the 7th lap when he went airborne on a high jump, lost control, of the car and hit a large tree stump head-on. To his dismay, he was out of the limited class heat with several broken pieces on the front end suspension. But with his enthusiasm and the help of his pit crew and other racers, they began to dismantle the front suspension and started gathering new parts. Before long they had the car repaired and back in race condition so he could compete in the Championship heat the next day, which he did not finish due to cooling problems with the motor. Through the months of his first racing season he made a lot of friends and raced in much of the midwest. The goal Phil set for the 1986 season was only to finish the races but much to his surprise he finished 13th place of 44 cars in his 2-1600 class.

For the 1987 season, Phil plans to rebuild his car making more reliable. With more experience he hopes to finish in the top 10.

Anderson, chairman of NSPB's Occupational Eye Health and Safety Committee. "Even better, no prior training in battery maintenance or auto mechanics is required to teach NSPB's educational program."

Mr. Anderson stressed that every organization and school should have this valuable

teaching tool designed to save sight and motivate everyone to follow the essentially simple, but crucially important, methods of jump-starting a dead battery and the proper sequences for attaching and removing battery jumper cables.

Out of Mind - Out of Sight illustrates the need for safety measure, such as keeping sparks, flames and cigarettes away from batteries at all times and the importance of wearing eye protection. In addition, upon request, each kit will come with a bonus - the handy, colorful battery instructions clearly outlined.

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


The year began for the junior class with participation in Homecoming, the junior class car entry, titled "Catch the Spirit," won first place.

Uptown Federal to merge with two institutions

Three Chicago area savings institutions - Uptown Federal Savings, Ben Franklin Savings, and Palatine Savings - have agreed to merge. If approved by the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, the merger will create a savings institution with assets of \$1.8 billion with 24 branches serving over 100,000 families.

The proposed merger agreement was announced today by Gerald B. Mullin, Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of Uptown Federal. That institution, which has been on a rapid growth curve during the past two years, merged with Niles Federal Savings in May of this year.

"With federal approval," said Mullin, "the current merger will be effective in the first quarter of 1987." Under the merger plan, Ben Franklin Savings and Palatine Savings will become divisions of Uptown Federal. Customer accounts in all the institutions will continue to be

insured up to \$100,000 by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation.

Mullin also announced that James R. Kudlinski, Uptown's President during the period of the institution's 1986 growth, had completed planned development for future growth and preparations for the merger of the three savings institutions. Mr. Kudlinski has resigned from Uptown Federal to pursue other interests in Kansas City.

In addition, Mullin announced the appointment of James M. Brundy as President and Chief Operating Officer of Uptown Federal. Brundy joined Uptown Federal as Chief Financial Officer earlier this year. Prior to joining Uptown Federal, Brundy worked for Bank of America and the Federal Reserve System. He received his J.D. degree from Georgetown University Law School.

Uptown Federal, founded in

1940, passed the billion-dollar mark in assets earlier this year and reported profits of \$33.2 million for the first nine months of 1986. At year-end 1985, Uptown was designated first in the nation in its size range in "high performance rankings" based on return average assets.

Ben Franklin, the oldest of the three institutions to be merged, was founded in 1921. Palatine Savings began operations in 1956. Their combined net assets total \$795.8 million with profits of \$8.0 million for the first nine months of 1986.

"This merger," said James M. Brundy, Uptown's new President and Chief Operating Officer, "will extend Uptown Federal's service area from the north and northwest to the rapidly growing western areas of Chicago and bring all the innovative banking services of Ben Franklin and Palatine Savings to the customers of Uptown Federal."



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

Affiliated Bank's Tax Reform seminars aid businessmen

It's been said that the new tax reform act will affect nearly every American taxpayer and impact decision-making strategies in virtually every industry in the United States.

Businesses currently paying little or no taxes could be paying a minimum 20 percent of profits to the government, while a number of firms currently paying up to 46 percent will be subject to a 34 percent ceiling by 1988. Although the act's effect will vary from industry to industry, and even between firms within an industry, its overall goal is to shift \$120 billion of the current tax load from individuals and place it instead on the shoulders of the nation's businesses.

Because ramifications of the 2,000-page act appear to be almost endless, seminars, such as one co-sponsored by the Affiliated Banc Group/Morton Grove and the consulting firm of Coopers & Lybrand, are being held in order to educate owners of small businesses on its effects. Following are a few of the major areas which affect businesses:

Change of Accounting Method When Reporting Taxes

Under the new law, some companies may have to change from a cash basis to an accrual basis accounting system for tax purposes. The accrual method records money as it's earned rather than when payment is received. For businesses that

operate on a cash method system, the change to the accrual method of accounting could result in additional taxable income for 1987 and later years. Participants who are subject to this change are encouraged to increase the accrual versus cash income difference.

Filing of Subchapter S
Owners of closely-held businesses are encouraged to consider filing an S Corporation Election form by December 31, 1986. This election form allows corporate owners to convert the corporation into a conduit where the income is taxed at the shareholder level rather than at both the corporate and shareholder levels. Due to the drop in individual tax rates, this is an important planning opportunity.

Deferring Compensation Until 1987


If it's possible to delay any source of income until 1987 or later years - interest, dividends, salary - do so. Income will then be taxed at a lower rate.

According to Ira Nathanson, director of marketing for Affiliated Banc Group, there was virtually "standing room only" attendance at the seminar. "Business owners want to hear the opportunities and pitfalls of the new tax bill from the experts rather than trying to digest it themselves."

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
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
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St. Paul Federal shares the Christmas Spirit

- Even though you're rushed and thinking about a thousand things, stay alert to your surroundings and the people around you when you're out and about.
- Lock your car and close the windows, even if you're gone for only a few minutes. Lock packages in the trunk.
- Wait for public transportation or rides from friends in busy, well-lighted places.
- Teach your children to go to a store clerk and ask for help if you become separated in a store or shopping mall. Children should never go into the parking lot alone.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash; when possible, pay for purchases with a check or credit card.
- Be extra careful with purses and wallets. Carry a purse under your arm, and keep a wallet in an inside pocket.
- When you're home, be extra cautious about locking doors and windows, even if you leave for a few minutes. Leave lights and a radio of television on so your home looks occupied.
- Don't display gifts where they can be seen from a window or doorway.
- If you go away, get an automatic timer for your lights

and have a neighbor watch your home and pick up the mail and newspapers.

• Get your Neighborhood Watch group together and go caroling. And don't forget the elderly and other people who may be especially lonely during the holidays.

The fire hazards of the holidays

With Thanksgiving safely completed hopefully, homeowners should examine the fire hazards of holidays in December - Christmas, Chanukah and New Year's Eve.

State Fire Marshal Tom Bestudik warns, "On these festive occasions, with the joy and excitement, and religious significance, we must take time to identify fire hazards and examine fire safety practices, with emphasis on established, reviewed and practiced exit plans so that if a fire starts, everyone has an opportunity to flee to safety."

"As far as Christmas is concerned, the tree is usually the central focus, especially for children," Bestudik said, "however, we offer a few recommendations for parents:

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Chanukah

"Natural trees should be fresh, not dyed green. The needles should be supple and bend, not snap; when bumped on the ground, only a few needles, not a rain, should fall. The cut end should be sticky from sap."

"Set the tree in water, after cutting off about an inch of the tree to assure water absorption. Use a non-tip stand and guy-wires for stability; keep the tree away from candles, TV sets, fireplaces, open flames and heat vents. Do not set it up in or near an exitway."

"Add water to natural trees every day; plain water is best. When the needles get dry, discard the tree."

"Plastic and metallic trees should carry the label of an approved safety-testing agency."

"Use indirect lighting unless the tree has a built-in electrical unit; do not use decorative lights on a metallic tree."

"Replace worn insulation, loose bulb sockets and broken plugs. Be sure all lighting sets are testing-agency approved."

"Be sure decorative lights are away from combustible materials. Do not use candles or open flame near a tree. Do not use candles in decorations or displays."

"Make sure all decorative lights are turned off before going out or to bed."

"Provide a switch for controlling the lights away from the tree; do not crawl under or around the tree for any reason."

"Indoor lighting sets should not be used outdoors. Outdoor lights, extension cords and fixtures should be testing-agency approved."

"Use only flame-retardant or noncombustible materials. Do not use untreated cotton batting, flocking, tissue paper or flammable foam plastics on or around the tree. Keep gift wrapping and electric trains away from the tree."

"Other holidays have dangers created by the special date. Some of these are:

"Be sure your babysitter knows and understands emergency procedures."

"Install and/or check smoke detectors. (They make excellent gifts for loved ones.)"

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Dreaming of a White Christmas?

If you're dreaming of a white Christmas, your best chance for one is in the northern quarter of the state.

John Vogel, head of the Climate Information Unit at the Illinois State Water Survey, said there is a 50 percent chance for an inch or more snow on the ground Christmas day in the north. Chances drop to 33 percent in the north-central quarter of Illinois, to 20 percent in the south-central quarter, and to 10 percent in the extreme south.

At least a trace of snow was on the ground last Christmas over a large part of Illinois, and flurries were reported as far south as Union county. "Much of the snow on the ground was the result of snow that fell on Christmas Eve," said Vogel. "Five inches of snow was on the ground in extreme northern Illinois."

Temperatures on Christmas day have varied greatly in the past four years. Last year, minimum temperatures Christmas morning were below 0 degrees throughout most of Illinois, one of the coldest Christmas mornings of the century. Temperatures were still 5 to 20 degrees warmer than Christmas 1983, the coldest Christmas on record in Illinois.

Just the year before, tem-

peratures on Christmas Day were in the balmy 60's throughout most of Illinois.

Vogel said the average low temperature for Christmas Day ranges from 15 to 20 degrees in the north, near 20 degrees central, and mid 20's in the south. Average maximum temperatures range from 30 to 35 degrees north, to the mid 30's central, and around 40 degrees in southern Illinois.







- If a guest is intoxicated, offer a ride home or insist they spend the night at your place.

HOLIDAY GIFT GUIDE

Choose safe toys for holiday giving

At this time of year, parents of young children are especially conscious of toy safety. But parents aren't the only ones who need to shop carefully. Grandparents, aunts and uncles - and others who will be giving holiday presents to young children - need to really look at the toys to make sure they're safe.

"A toy that's safe for an 8-year-old may be deadly in the hands of a 2-year-old," according to Katherine Jarrell Reuter, Suburban Cook County Cooperative Extension Home Economist. "So if you're buying for an older child who has a younger sibling, it's best to buy a sturdy toy without small parts."

Some toys are age-labeled to make buying easier. But not all toys provide explanations of why they may be inappropriate or even hazardous for children who are younger or older than the recommended ages. Use any labeling information as a guide in making the selection.

"No matter what the age of the child you're buying for, look for sturdy toy construction. When buying soft toys for young children, be sure to purchase a well-made item with eyes, nose and any other small parts tightly secured," states Reuter. For infants and toddlers, avoid

toys with small parts that they may put in their mouths, or long strings or cords that may cause strangulation.

Avoid toys that shoot or propel objects that may injure eyes or get lodged in throats. Arrows or darts used by children should have soft cork tips, rubber suction cups or other protective tips. Check to be sure the tips are securely attached to their shafts. It's best to check with parents before buying toy guns, arrows and similar items for holiday giving; some parents may not believe that these types of toys are appropriate Christmas gifts.

Electric toys with heating elements are recommended only for children over eight years of age, and only as long as there is adult supervision. Whatever age you're buying for, check the instructions for clarity. They should be clear to you, and, when appropriate, to the child.

Reuter says, "It's sometimes hard for grandparents and others to buy gifts for children they don't get to see very often. In this case, it's probably best to talk with the parents to make sure your gift ideas are in line with the children's abilities and interests."

bear, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

According to Sheely, the animal was being transported in a cage in the back of his covered pickup truck. "We looked back and she was dead," said the 70-year-old farmer. He said he has been transporting bears for years and never had any problems. "She was tearing around trying to get out and it just must have been too much exertion," he said.

Karabush, who raised the bear from a cub after her mother rejected her said he felt like he did "when my parents died." Animal World employees were tearful at the departure of Sheba and Karabush could not immediately break the news of Sheba's death Tuesday evening.

Craig Tisdale, director of Animal Rescue Service in Northbrook, said he thought it was irresponsible to transport the bear without taking more precautions. "She should have been sedated and had her eyes covered," said Tisdale, whose group cares for injured and orphaned animals and returns them to their natural environment after they are well.

Sheba was the object of a demonstration in front of Animal World last week when about 20 protestors from the Animal Advocates Coalition carried signs saying, "Please set the bear free from life imprisonment." The group contended that although it was legal for the store to keep the bear, it was morally wrong to keep her locked up in a pet store environment.

fire reports, it was a minor incident, which did not require the use of Niles fire equipment.

Board. Prior to this commitment, he worked for more than a decade on the District 219 Caucus, a committee which sought qualified candidates for Board membership.

When she resisted, he carried her to the bedroom and allegedly raped her.

According to police, the victim stated her clothes were torn and she received scratches on both sides of her face while fighting him off. Shortly after the offender left the apartment, he called her from a car phone to say he was "sorry" about the incident.

The victim's boyfriend called police, who took her to Lutheran General Hospital. The doctor's report was inventoried, as well as the victim's torn clothing and other items in the apartment for evidence.

Police traced the car phone number and called the offender who agreed to come to the police station.

He was released after posting \$20,000 bond. A hearing was conducted last Friday (Dec. 12), with the offender receiving a continuance to Jan. 16.

Niles Librarian cited for innovative use of computers

With a total of 83 entries in the National Productivity Software contest for 1986, Duncan J. McKenzie, Administrator of the Niles Public Library District, was selected for the top prize in the word processing category. McKenzie won the contest for his program which facilitates the production of pathfinders. Pathfinders are "roadmaps" to special subject areas in the library's collection. This application is used at the library for the production of all pathfinders.

In selecting McKenzie for this award, the judges commented: "The entry exhibits the use of the variety of functions of a word processing program. The number of pathfinders produced using this approach seems impressive based on the number of examples submitted." In concluding comments about the contest, the judges wrote, "In a sense, McKenzie's is a model entry given our initial intent for the contest. He is a practicing librarian, on his own, using productivity software to its fullest extent to reduce his workload and provide a valuable product. In addition, the application has wide applicability to other libraries, even those using different computers and different word processing programs. Finally, the basic concept is applicable to other types of user aids."

The competition was sponsored by Meckler Publishing and judged by a national panel of specialists in library microcomputer applications. McKenzie's application will be the subject of a forthcoming article in Small Computers in Libraries, the largest circulation microcomputer magazine for libraries.

commitment. Howard was then in his college years. It wasn't too many years later her daughter was graduating from Maine East. Board president Howard Blassman was handing a graduation diploma to the younger Futerman, the girl he was supposed to wait for.

Fellow high school board member Ann Sostrin echoed Joan's assessment. Howard was "a very special guy." She said he was gifted, highly principled, intelligent, sensitive and accomplished a great deal in a very few years. As board president he had manifested a quality of leadership which created a cohesive among board members.

Some years ago The Bugle was designated by the library board as the official Niles newspaper for its archives. Its pages would go on microfilm (micro-fiche) and would be available for library patrons. Last week we were told the district has not bound any of the local newspapers and The Bugle filming is six years in arrears. Obviously, the district has the money shorts.

Putting all personnel into one building will better serve the main library. And since Niles has a free public bus service, residents using the branch library won't be seriously hindered in getting to the main building.

We were told Monday, residents using the branch library are up in arms at hearing of its scheduled closing. But ironically, while the protestors holler, they did not come out to the polls at past referenda on behalf of propositions supporting the district. Their hollering today has a dim echo.

The Niles Library District could not afford a branch library. And since no other nearby suburb has had a second library building, the idea of a branch library seemed ill-conceived.

While the library board was concentrating on the real estate enlargement of its land and building, it was losing sight of its basic needs.

In the long-run the enlarged building, and perhaps even the rather questionable and mysterious purchase of the land at Waukegan and Oakton, is likely to benefit the district. But, in this time of its life, the Niles Library District is hurting. Drastic measures had to take place.

The era of "Pizza" Pestine may be drawing to a close within the district. In the election next spring new board members, along with last election's new members, are likely to change the direction of the district. Getting back to basics - books and more books and attendant services - is likely to be the future direction in the upcoming years.

While this is only a hypothesis, if the board had spent the \$40,000 for books for the past five years, the district

might now have 10,000 more books for its patrons. Or, if half that figure went for books and the other half could have been used for salaries, that would have been a \$100,000 salary increase for five years. It is likely many of the departed professionals would have remained in the district.
