Speaking of the library...

by Duncan J. McKenzie, Niles Public Library Administrator 'As often as we tell people to call or visit the library whenever they need some information, it never ceases to amaze me that people just don't think to do it. Not even my own mother.

I spoke with my parents this past week. My mother called to thank me for a birthday present I had sent her. I had given her a copy of David Pottinger's Quilts from the Indiana Amish, knowing that she has a penchant for handicrafts and adores visiting the Amish country around Middlebury, Indiana. She had read the book from cover to cover and is looking forward to an upcoming return to the area. The purpose for the trip is to price mobile homes or RV's. It seems that many of the RV's are manufactured in the Amish area. My parents are planning to buy a used one and figure visiting the manufactureres to learn the cost of new ones would give them a feel for the worth of a used vehicle. I suggested that a trip to the local library would offer the same information.

Most libraries subscribe to a series of books known as "The Red Book" or "The Blue Book." These are actually pricing guides for the car and truck industry. There are titles which give the dealer's costs for new vehicles, titles which give the wholesale and retail price, and titles which give the value of a used vehicle. These books are helpful not only to those buying vehicles but also to those wanting to sell a used vehicle.

There's another way the library can help everyone, yet few think of it. Here's how I put the library to use in planning my recent vacation in Colonial Williamsburg. My motor route was planned by an Apple computer program called "Road Search." The print-out gave me the most direct route between Chicago and Williamsburg, estimated the amount of gas needed, and suggested the amount of time it would take to travel based upon an average speed. I consulted the Hotel & Motel Red Book to compare motels available near Colonial Williamsburg. Using this guide, I found a motel with very reasonable rates, the amenities I wanted, and a toll free number to use in making the reservation. The Mobile Travel Guide gave details on sites to see in and around Williamsburg and even detailed the major buildings to be seen in Colonial Williamsburg. The library also has some books on Colonial Williamsburg and these gave useful background on the history of Williamsburg, its citizens and buildings. Last but not least, I found a good novel on the new book display to take with me on my vacation.

Now, will my mother use the library in lieu of visiting the Amish country to price RV's? I doubt it. It is, after all, a good excuse for a long weekend trip. But, using the library's consumer information which rates the various models, compares their service records, and reports owner satisfaction, could be a valuable tool in reaching the final decision to purchase.





Hypothermia is a condition marked by an abnormally low in ternal body temperature, typically 95°F or below. A simple drop in skin temperature is not hypothermia. While hypothermia can sometimes develop slowly, it usually occurs fairly quickly, over a period of a few days. With advancing age, many people prolonged exposure to cold. Senior citizens often may not sense that they are becoming cold as readily as younger people, and their bodies may not adjust to changes in temperature as well. Specific measures to be taken that will prevent accidental hypothermia include: heating living and sleeping areas to 65°F, dressing warmly during the day and during sleep, eating enough food, staying active during winter months, and avoid smoking cigarettes.

Any motor vehicle transporting a person who is disabled and displaying handicapped license plates, disabled veteran plates or a handicapped parking card may use parking areas designated for use by disabled persons. Other drivers who park in these areas illegally may be subject to a \$50 fine. In addition, the disabled driver or rider is exempt from paying parking meter fees and from ordinances imposing time limitations on parking with the only exception being time limitations of thirty minutes or less. Handicapped parking cards are available at both the Maine Township (297-2433) and Niles Township (673-9300) offices.

A colorectal screening is a simple, convenient and private method for individuals to test themselves for diseases of the colon. The test will detect blood in the stool before it can be seen and is very helpful in identifying the onset of colon cancer. Kits and instruction for use can be picked up from 9 to 10 a.m. on Tuesday, Dec. 23 in the Morton Grove Village Hall Senior Center. An appointment will also be arranged to evaluate test results. Kits and test evaluations are free of charge to Morton Grove residents.

MORTON GROVE ROTARY CLUB

Recently the Niles/Morton Grove Rotary donated \$500 to local seniors who wish to purchase the Emergency Flashing Light for their homes. This generous subsidy has reduced the cost of the Light system to just \$25. The remote controlled flashing light system can prove to be life saving for persons who fall, become dizzy, or experience other emergency conditions in their home. ILLINOIS CIRCUIT BREAKER

People age 65 and older with a total household income of less than \$14,000 per year are eligible to receive a tax rebate from the State. The rebate is an annual grant for relief from property taxes but renters and nursing home residents who reside in facilites subject to property taxes can also receive the grant. An additional \$80 grant based on sales tax is also available. This grant may be used for the Pharmaceutical Assistance Card which will pay for prescribed heart medications for one year. In 1987 medications for arthritis and diabetes will also be included in the Pharmaceutical program. For more information about these two grants write to the Illinois Department of Revenue, P.O. CareCab for holiday imbibers

drive can get a free taxi ride home during the holiday season from CareCab, a community cab. service co-sponsored by radio station WXRT and Chicago-areda CareUnits at Central Community, Jackson Park, Mt. Sinai, St. Elizabeth and Skokie Valley Hospitals.

The service will be provided in Cook County from 7 p.m. to 3 a.m., Dec. 24 to Jan. 2. Free rides will be given within a 20-mile radius. Riders will have to make up the difference if they live far-

Alan Falk, program manager of Skokie Valley Hospital's CareUnit and CareCab coordinator, explains that callers for free cab rides will be picked up and driven home only from public places, such as restaurants and bars, not from private parties. "We think that at a private party, the host is responsible for seeing that guests get home safely," he

"It's no secret that drunken driving is a serious problem in this country," Falk continues. "Nearly 650,000 people are injured each year in alcoholrelated automobile crashes. Between 50 and 55 percent of all fatal accidents annually involve a drinking driver.

"It's unrealistic to expect that people won't drink at this time of year," he adds. "But we can help prevent them from driving when they do drink."

"A toy that's safe for an 8-yearold may be deadly in the hands of a 2-year-old," according to Katherine Jarrell Reuter, Subur-Extension Home Economist. "So if you're buying for an older child who has a younger sibling, it's best to buy a sturdy toy without

the residential area or school. The result has been a series of complaints that began in the early 1970's and culminated in the Illinois Supreme Court's decision of 1978. As part of its decision, the Court held that Wells is suitably located. "...We agree with the Appellate Court that the residents and school were on the notice of the possibility that some annovances present in heavymanufacturing areas could affect them, and this fact considerably diminishes the potency of their

complaints," the Court said. Wells emphasized in its brief that the Supreme Court has examined the situation thoroughly and has applied the criteria mandated by Section 33(c) of the Act and has found that Wells was not in violation of Section 9(a) of the Act.

"The state EPA does not and cannot allege a change of circumstances since the Court's opinion. Further, IEPA admits that Wells is in compliance with all rules and regulations stipulated by the Pollution Control Board," the company con-
