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Centel subscriber line charge increase

The monthly subscriber line charge for multi-line business customers of Central Telephone Company increased from \$3.85 to **\$4.77** a line Jan. 1, 1987.

The subscriber line charge provides telephone companies. with a means to recover costs associated with connecting local lines to the nationwide toll network. The increase will appear on customers' bills in January.

Ron Karr, Centel's customer services manager in Des Plaines, noted that before competition was initiated in long-distance telephone service, such connection costs had been recovered through higher long-distance rates.

The cost for local phone connections will not be entirely covered in subscriber line charges, even after the increase goes into effect. Long-distance companies, which use local phone lines to complete their customers' calls between states, pay a fee for each minute they use local lines. Part of these fees will continue to help pay for local connections to the toll network.

Illinois 'Circuit Breaker'

There are some significant changes in the Senior Citizen benefit plan known as the Circuit Breaker. To be eligible for this program, person must be an Illinois citizen, at least 65 years old, or totally disabled, with a household income of less than \$14,000. Part-year grants are available to persons who turn 65 years of age during 1986. A property owner or renter applying for 'Circuit Breaker' in 1986 is actually applying for relief from property taxes or rent which was paid during the 1985 calendar year. The 'Circuit Breaker' program actually consists of two kinds of cash tan relief: one for property taxes (which is available to any eligible senior or disabled person whose residence is subject to property taxes. whether they own their homes, or rent or live in a nursing home), and one for general taxes, which is availble to every eligible applicant. The property tax grant may be as high as \$700; the general tax grant is for \$80. In addition, qualified individuals receiving Circuit Breaker benefits and who suffer from arthritis now have necessary prescription medicine provided under the Pharmaceutical Assistance Act. Prior to this change, only those requiring heart medicine received this additional benefit. Changes in the state law now provide for arthritis medicine, insulin, and related supplies in addition to heart medicine.

'Medicare'

There have been some Federal changes in laws concerning Senior Citizen programs, and these include Medicare premiums and the removal of the mandatory retirement age in certain fields. Beginning Jan. 1, there will be some changes in Medicare's hospital insurance program. The in-patient hospital deductible will be \$520 (as compared to the current \$492). The daily Medicare coinsurance amounts will be: \$130 for the 61st through the 90th day of hospitalization; \$260 for lifetime reserve days; and \$65 for the 21st through the 100th day of extended care services in a skilled nursing facility. Monthly Medicare premiums, paid by those not receiving Social Security, have also changed. Beginning January 1, 'Part A-Hospital Insurance' Medicare premiums will increase from \$214 to \$226 monthly. 'Part B - Physician Services' Medicare premiums will increase from \$15.50 to \$17.90 monthly. An updated version of the booklet entitled "Medicare and Other Health Care Choices: A Guide for Illinois Seniors" is available by calling toll-free to the Illinois Department of Aging at 1-800-252-8966. The revised booklet focuses upon Senior Citizens, discussing the Medicare Program and possible Medicare supplements.

The United States Congress has enacted changes in the Age and Discrimination Act of 1967 which will help end age discrimination and mandatory retirement. 70 years of age was once the mandatory retirement age, but - for employees in most occupations -Congress recently removed the age limit for mandatory etirement.







Organ procurement program initiated at Bethesda

A formal organ procurement program that could potentially benefit thousands of people needing human organ transplants has been established at Bethesda Hospital; 2451 W. Howard in Chicago. It was announced today by Mr. Richard Snow, Managing Director of the hospital.

According to the National Kidey Foundation, more than 100,000 Americans need transplants annually, yet of the 20,000 potential donors, only 10% participate in this life saving program.

Bethesda Hospital is among ten Universal Health Services' nospitals nationwide designated o conduct this pilot project in organ procurement in conjunction with the National Disease Research Interchange in Philadelphia. We reported Mayor Washington was roundly booed. The mostly white audence meant it. They didn't like the guy and they let him Know how they telt. Was it a black and white matter? Sure it was. Partly. But Chicagoans have mostly booed their politicians and Washington was just one more Chicago pol. When former Cubs outfielder Billy Williams was honored, the crowd cheered and came to their feet. He'd just made the Hall of Fame. But the beered-up audience remembered Billy and his sweet batting swing and they cheered him as lustily as they booed the Mayor. retired umpires. Their pen sion plan is slight so they have to hustle another job in their retiring years.

Rice told me the umpires had no organization in his day. And widows of former umpires would not get more than \$200 a month. While ballplayers were making a better buck, umpires have always had the low end of the baseball totem pole.

It was just a baseball evening. A California baseball scout was telling us he made about \$45,000 of which \$25,000 had to go for expenses. It isn't the path to riches. He said there are only two or three scouts in all of baseball who even get paid \$50,000. The scouts are the peons along with umpires in the baseball profession.

Rice told us about Ted Williams. He said he was umpiring at second base one day when Williams came to bat. With two strikes on him the next pitch hit Williams on the arm. But the ball bounced down into Sherman Lollar's catcher's mitt and behind-theplate umpire Tom Gorman called Williams "out". The next day Rice mentioned the strike-out and said he had seen the ball hit William's arm. But Rice said Williams never disputed the umpire's call and agreed with Gorman it was a third strike. Williams seldom contradicted an umpire.

The California scout we were talking to had a wealth of baseball knowledge. When we told him we saw an Oak Park high school pitcher named Sheldon who looked quite exceptional last year he gave me a complete rundown on him. Here was a guy from California who could recite miniscule statistics about a high school pitcher here in the Chicago area who may be one of a thousand players he comes across every year.

Saturday night I was like a kid in a toyshop. I'm not the sports nut I once was, but still it was fun to be a part of such an evening. Sports fans are a little goofy and somewhat mesmerized by this overconcentration on a game. But all of us were likely reaching back to another time, when sandlots and hot sun-scorched days made us oblivious to the outside world. Times were more gentle. Perhaps, Saturday night, we went back home for a few hours.

han businesses to collect a 1 percent sales tax on merchandise (such as cars) sold to city residents when the merchandise is used more than 50 percent of the time within the city limits.

Attorneys for the suburban auto agency contend the law is too vague and violates state and federal constitutions.

"The city wants suburban husinesses to be collectors of the sales tax. It's ridiculous," Troy. said. "Like Niles and other suburbs, Chicago has no jurisdiction outside its corporate limits. The city needs money and it is out for big bucks."

If the court grants a permanent injunction at the next hearing, it would mean an end to the issue of. collecting sales tax in the suburbs. "In the event city attorneys" appeal, the suburbs will make a decision on what course of action to take," he said.

The issue began in December when the Chicago Revenue Department contacted suburban businesses in Niles and other es in an attempt to collect the percent sales tax or a 1 percent use tax.

According to Curt Hockett, director of the Niles Chamber of Commerce, three retailers and two building contractors have been contacted asking them to open their financial books to its place a bomb under his car.
