

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## Substance Abuse in the elderly

Research indicates that older ults (65 and over) take about three to five prescription drugs, many of them mood-altering **trug**s that exaggerate alcohol content. According to James Van Doren, a social worker at Skokie Valley Hospital's CareUnit Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Program, very often these adults resort to alcohol for more relaxa-

"This was not recognized as a problem in the past," said Van Doren. "But now, society sees it as a disease which needs to be treated. It is a growing problem among the elderly, and it is a serious one."

Van Doren will be one of three guest speakers taking part in a anel discussion, "Substance Abuse in the Elderly," at 7:30 p.m., Thursday, Feb. 26, at Oakton Community College East, 7701 N. Lincoln Ave., Skokie. Other speakers include Charles H. Pecor, CCSAC, program director of St. Francis Hospital's Outpatient Addiction Treatment Education Services (OATES) Program, and Rev. Philip Graham Kraft, MA, MHS, program director of the Hopedale Hall Alcoholism Unit for Senior Citizens

"Our goal is to make people aware of the intensity of the problem," said Helene Block. Oakton professor of Early Childhood Development and coordinator of the Center for Family education, and moderator of the discussion. "We also want to give the message that substance abuse can be treated and that there are educational facilities, hospitals and alcoholism treatment centers to assist seniors who have the problem."

The speakers will discuss how families can respond to the problem by recognizing it in its early stages and seeking professional help and community involvement.

from Downers Grove to Northbrook—a distance of 25 miles—costs 31.5 cents under today's plan. A call of the same distance made within the city of Chicago costs only 4.5 cents, no matter how long the caller talks. When the new plan is implemented, both calls will cost 27.6 cents during the day, and 18.4 cents if made after 9 p.m.

Once the plan goes into effect most residence callers will be able to talk as long as they like on calls made within an eight-mile radius of their local switching center and will be charged only one messge unit-or about a nickel. More than 70 percent of all residence calls are made within this local calling area.

Residence calls to places outside of local calling areas—as well as all business calls—will be billed in message units, based on how long the caller talks, the call's distance and the time of day the call is made.

The company began mailing billing comparisons this month to its customers in northeastern Illinois comparing what they actually paid for telephone service during the months of Oct., Nov., Dec. and Jan. with what they would have paid under the new plan.

The mailings will be spread out during the month, with the last customers receiveing this information at the end of Feb. The comparative billing information will be sent separately from customers' regular bills.

Most important of all - "pack"

Now we move into the second form of tune up that has emerged, a "computer" system tune up. This is a specific test procedure of the numerous components that comprise your emission control system. There are many sensors on the engine that tell the main computer data such as the temperature of the anti-freeze, how hard you're stepping on the gas pedal and how fast the car is actually moving, just to name a select few. All of these sensors have to be properly working 100% in order for your engine to run smoothly and efficiently. A sensor that is even partially failed could cause any one of a number of problems.

The third and last procedure is known as the "fuel system" tune up. In this area the mechanic will check the pressure and output of the fuel pump (manual or electric). They will check all the rubber and steel gas lines to make sure they're in good condition and test the carburetor or fuel injectors to make sure they, too, are working properly. In fuel injected cars a common complaint of sluggishness can sometimes be cured by a process of running a special cleaning solvent through the injectors to dissolve any varnish that has formed.

As you can see from these brief explanations, a problem you thought could be cured with a new set of spark plugs may still exist after the "engine" tune up you ask your mechanic to per-

The best advice for consumers is to tell your mechanic or service manager the particular problems you're experiencing with your car. For example, if you feel a hesitation when starting off from a stop light, tell them exactly that problem. Let them decide whether you have to lean towards the engine, the computer or the fuel system areas. Their diagnosis could save you money in the long run, since you won't be spending money on unneeded repairs.

As automobiles become more complex, the need for shops to keep up on new diagnostic equipment also rises. More and more shops will charge a customer for a system check out procedure. This is the only way to professionally diagnose which component is causing problems. Diagnostic time is something we will all have to get used to due to the complexity of new cars. The bill you pay when picking up your car is approximately 75% diagnostic time when it comes to computer systems and fuel systems. The days of just turning a little screw a half a turn to make an adjustment are long gone. Even just setting the idle on a computer car can take up to half an hour due to the electric motor that receives signals from the main computer.

A car with a fresh engine tune up and all components of the computer system working properly will give you the safe feeling of knowing your car will start easily and give you your maximum gas mileage with the lowest emissions possible.







#### To Tune Or Not To Tune

First is the tune up we've all become familiar with over the years, the basic "engine" tune up. This would consist of spark plugs, distributor cap, rotor, air filter, fuel filter, breather element and pcv valve. If adjustable, the mechanic would set the ignition timing, the air/fuel mixture and the idle. Some tuneups, depending on the place of business, would also include an oil and filter change and cleaning the battery cables of any corrosion that had formed.

ended at the neck. Dental health is an important part of total well-being. If you're careless about your daily oral hygiene routine and haphazard about scheduling regular dental examinations, you're not doing all you can to stay in shape. You owe it to yourself to keep your teeth healthy and looking good for the rest of your life.

Keeping your teeth all your life is easier than you might expect. Nearly all dental disease-tooth decay and periodontal (gum) disease--can be prevented.

At least 3 factors must be present for tooth decay to occur. These are (1) a susceptible individual with teeth, (2) bacteria in a sticky, colorless film called plaque that can produce acids that attack the teeth and (3) a diet that contains refined carbohydrates. Tooth decay starts when sugars are consumer frequently. Sugars provide the nutrients required for bacteria on tooth surfaces to metabolize and produce acid that destroy tooth structure. In order to prevent tooth decay, thorough plaque removal by toothbrushing and flossing at least once a day is essential. Eat a balanced diet with limited sweets. Also, fluoride makes teeth less susceptibel to decay, both when taken internally (such as public water supplies) and when applied direc- partial dentures. tly to erupted teeth (such as in

Periodontal disease, often called "gum disease" can occur at any age. In the early stage of periodontal disease, known as gingivitis, only the soft gum tissue has been affected. The gums are irritated by bacterial plaque, which makes them tender and inflamed. At this stage, the disease is still reversible. If not treated, however, it can lead to periodontitis.

Periodontitis is the later stage of periodontal disease. In this stage, not only are the gums involved, but also the bone and other structures that support the teeth have been damaged. Now the disease may require extensive treatment or teeth may be lost

Because periodontal disease is often painless, you may not be aware you have the disease until your mouth has sustained serious damage. Some warning signs of the disease are :

-Bleeding, gums when you brush your teeth. Such bleeding is not normal and should concern you even if your gums do not hurt

- Red, swollen, or tender gums. - Gums that have pulled away from the teeth.

- Pus between the teeth and gums when the gums are pressed.

- Permanent teeth that are loose or separating. - Any change in the way your

to take place. The people of Ulster love parades. In fact, this was the beginning of the "marching season," a period which lasts from July through September. During this period violent confrontations between Protestant and Catholic extremists usually lead to senseless deaths and injuries on both sides. Paisley was in Ballymoney to help in the unfurling of a new banner for the local Ulster lodge. The old banner had "supposedly" been stolen and burned by the Sinn Fein the year before. Protestant bands led the march to the parade grounds where the banner was dedicated by the Deputy Grand Chaplain of the Orange Order. The "highlight" of the evening was listening to Paisley's twenty-minute diatribe against the policies of both the British Prime Minister, Margaret Thatcher and the Irish Republic. The vitriolic words of Paisley reflected the DUPs commitment to fight off the encroachments of Catholicism and any hint of unification with the Irish Republic. Paisley's evangelical speech reminded me of the ones delivered by such demagogues as Fr. Charles Coughlin and the Rev. Gerald K. Smith in our country during the "Great Depression" of the 1930s. The central theme of Paisley's speech was pure and simple hate! As we left the parade grounds, my wife stopped when we were passing two nolicemen. She told the men that Paisley scared her. The constables nodded their heads as if to say he scared them too.

The next morning we drove to Derry (Londonderry). Upon entering the city we passed a local police station. The complex looked like a prison. It not only was surrounded by a high barbed wire wall, but there were barricades at the entrances. We proceeded to drive into the Protestant section on Castle Street. Here British soldiers were stopping all motor vehicles. The soldiers were ordered to permit only church-goers to pass through the Bishop's Gate area. Since everything appeared to be calm, I parked our car. For the next half-hour my wife and I carried on conversations with several of the young men who were assigned to this detail. Contrary to the stories we receive in the American newspapers, these men had live ammunition in their automatic weapons. We found these men to be candid in their observations about the conditions in Northem Ireland. They left us with the impression that the entire area was a political powder-keg. The fuse had already been lit by extremists on both sides. Following this educational experience we drove down from St. Columb's Cathedral into the Catholic Quarter which is located directly below the Protestant plateau. Here we viewed burned out buildings. IRA slogans were written on nearly all of the exterior walls of the buildings in this public housing project. We felt strangely uncomfortable in the area. Thankfully, it was a Sunday morning and not a Friday or Saturday night!

Irish history from the first Protestant settlements in Elizabethan times to the barricades in Derry and Portadown has been a story of hatred answering hatred. This tragedy has cost more than 2500 lives in the last 17 years. Many journalists, who have visited Northern Ireland, immediately say that this area is a terrible place. They complain that it is ugly and that its people are living in another century. Perhaps it is all of these things, but then why have so many men loved it enough to give their lives for it? What is happening in Northern Ireland is a tragedy. What disturbed us the most was the way the youth of this British province are being manipulated by extremists on both sides. This condition pertuates hatred and fosters violence

You might ask yourself, this scenario is interesting, but what message are you trying to convey? Simply stated, as we enter the third century under our Constitution it is imperative that Americans never lose sight of the importance of this fundamental document. Man must never place himself above the law. As Thomas Paine once said, "The Law Is King." If we do not adhere to the principle of constitutionalism, could what is happening in Northern Ireland, happen in the United States? Our system of government will continue to be responsive to the needs of the people only as long as we continue to be aware, informed, and constructively participate in the political process. In shore, never take the principles in our Constitution for granted!

Ed said they built Jozwiak Park, building the tennis court and the fences there. They also built the fire station at Touhy Avenue as well as the Public Works building. They put in the plumbing, wiring and sprinkling system in both buildings.

Boleks and Bachers and Kazmierczaks and Dennises and Paseks have been a special breed of people in Niles. The fine community we have today is a result of the efforts they made back in the 30's and 40's and 50's.

Their imprint will remain here as long as there is a community named Niles, Illinois.


