They should include their tax package, W-2 statements from employers and Forms 1099 from banks, savings and loans, and other financial institutions. He also reminded taxpayers that the most commonly used forms and free publications are also available at IRS offices.

IRS tips on fast tax returns

Last year, federal income tax refunds averaging over \$965 apiece were sent to taxpayers in northern Illinois, according to J.R. Starkey, Internal Revenue Service District Director. Most of those taxpayers have received one of the 3.8 million 1986 tax forms packages mailed by the

IRS to taxpayers in this area. For those taxpayers who expect a refund again this year, and hate to wait, the tax forms package contains something that will produce that refund sooner: a preaddressed peel-off label and a special preaddressed envelope.

Starkey noted that use of the special label and envelope will speed up a tax refund because they contain information that reduces IRS's sorting and processing time: In addition, because the label already has the taxpayer's name, address, and social security number printed on it, the chance of errors that could delay the refund check are greatly reduced.

If any of the information on the label is not correct, changes can be made right on the label. In addition to the peel-off label and preaddressed envelope, the tax forms package contains other helpful items, such as important
