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## Street resurfacing to begin next week

Road improvements for industrial and residential streets in Niles are expected to bring a minimum of traffic problems to residents this summer, according to Robert Kahler, the village's superintendent of engineering.

Public Works crews will resurface five streets and 17 streets will be repaved with the asphalt recycling machine. The project, which is expected to cost approximately \$900,000 will begin in June and is expected to be completed at the end of August, Kahler said.

Work began last week on Maynard st. near Greenwood in the northern section of Niles, a project which was delayed because the bids were let out too

late last year. "The bids were too high and did not meet the village budget set for the work," Kahler noted.

Maynard improvements will include new curbs and gutters, widening of Maynard at the intersection of Greenwood, new sidewalks, and some sewer work to alleviate a flooding problem in the area.

The streets targeted for resurfacing work are: Maryland St. from Milwaukee Ave. to Lyons St.; Loras Ln. from Maryland to Cating; Washington St. from Dempster to Ballard Rd.; Oak Park Ave. from Touhy to Howard; and Jarvis St. from Caldwell to West End.

## Vandals ravage St. Adalbert's tombstones

Niles police are looking into an incident that occurred at St. Adalbert's Cemetery where vandals pushed over 52 tombstones causing between \$200,000 and \$300,000 in damage.

According to Lt. Ray Giovannelli of the Niles Police Department, the vandalism occurred between 7 p.m. and 7 a.m., April 23-24. "Caretakers discovered the tombstones lying on the ground and contacted the police," he said, adding the culprits apparently used their hands and feet to push over the monuments.

According to John Gacek, sexton for St. Adalbert's Cemetery, the vandalism occurred in an area of the cemetery east of Newark. "Some of the tombstones are beyond repair and the families will have to replace them," he said. "Each one will have to be inspected for hairline cracks or other damage before they are put up again. It will be a slow process," Gacek added.

## Niles Fire Dept. calls

In a question relating to her performance in the movie role, she also watched the Center's production of "Annie" on Saturday morning and attended an awards banquet for the Deafness Center that evening at the Sofitel Hotel in Rosemont.

During the Friday afternoon session in the theater auditorium, Matlin's comments to the children and adults were related by sign language through a speaking interpreter. "I'm so excited coming back here where I spent part of my youth and seeing so many of my friends I worked with in stage productions. I just can't believe this!" she said.

Signing words excitedly while discussing her experiences, she said she almost did not audition for a role in the stage version of "Children of a Lesser God" that eventually led to the movie role. "A friend called to tell me they were casting for the play. My answer was I didn't want to try out for any more plays, but I changed my mind and look what happened to my life!"



## Boxing fans to receive refund from Horizon telecast

Illinois Attorney General Neil F. Hartigan today obtained an agreement under which nearly 12,000 boxing fans are entitled to receive 100% refunds for tickets they purchased to watch the closed circuit telecast of the Sugar Ray Leonard/Marvin Hagler middleweight title fight at the Rosemont Horizon.

Hartigan negotiated the agreement following his April 8 suit against Rosemont Horizon and That's Entertainment, Inc., promoters of the closed circuit telecast.

Fans who attended the telecast had paid from \$25 to \$30 for tickets. However, technical difficulties prevented consumers

from seeing the middle portion of the telecast.

The signed agreement, entered by Judge Anthony Scalfino in Cook County Circuit Court today provides that everyone who purchased a ticket is entitled to a 100% refund. Refunds may be obtained as follows:

• Consumers who used credit cards to purchase tickets will have their accounts credited. Each of these consumers will receive a letter indicating that a credit to their account has been issued.

• Consumers who paid cash for their tickets may obtain refunds by mail by writing to: Rosemont

Horizon-Ticket Refund, P.O. Box 1968, Rosemont, IL 60018. If applying by mail, consumers must send ticket stub(s), with the name of the purchaser signed on the back, and a typed or printed letter that includes the purchaser's name, address, zip code, telephone number, and the number of tickets you purchased.

• Consumers who paid cash for their tickets may also obtain refunds in person during normal box office hours - 11 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday through Friday, and noon to 5 p.m. on Saturday - at the Rosemont Horizon, 6920 N. Mannheim rd., Rosemont. Consumers must present signed ticket stub(s), and print their name, address, and phone number on a form that will be provided.

Under the terms of the agreement, there is a 21-day period to apply for refunds - from Monday, April 27 through Monday, May 18. Applications for refunds by mail must be postmarked within that period.

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



### Stereo headsets pose safety problems

Wearing a stereo headset while walking, jogging or biking is fun. However, playing a headset too loudly can create a traffic safety hazard by drowning out traffic sounds.

Wearing a headset does not cause a serious safety problem on sidewalks or bike paths, but many joggers and bikers use busy streets. Loud music is not only distracting but can prevent joggers and bikers from hearing sounds that could save their lives. For example, the sounds of police, fire and ambulance sirens should alert them that vehicles may be swerving into the right-hand lane. Even normally annoying traffic sounds, like

screeching tires and honking horns, can indicate danger or a possible emergency.

When joggers, walkers and bikers are not alert to the sound around them, they become a hazard to themselves and to others. If a driver must slam on the brakes to avoid a jogger, he may cause a chain reaction accident involving innocent victims.

Drivers are prohibited from wearing headsets, but playing radios and tape players loudly can also drown out traffic sounds. Traffic safety requires concentration from both drivers and pedestrians. Whether wearing a headset or listening to a radio or tape player, stay alert to surrounding traffic.

### Clean air is a must!

#### Clean air is a must!

Numerous times over the past decade there were whisperings of mandatory emission testing. Time and time again it fell short of votes to pass the state legislature, but it finally became a law. A year ago Illinois joined most other states with a Clean Air Act and it is most definitely here to stay.

The first couple of years of testing is mainly to corner those who removed their catalytic converters or widened the opening of their gas tank to accommodate the larger nozzle of a "leaded" gas pump (due to the lower cost of leaded fuel). In the future, the limits of the emission readings will get tighter.

The emission readings found on your test sheet are "HC" (hydrocarbon), "CO" (carbon monoxide) and "CO<sub>2</sub>" (carbon dioxide). Hydrocarbon is defined as unburned fuel. If you had a completely fouled spark plug or a bad ignition wire, the hydrocarbons would be very high because no spark is getting into that particular cylinder to burn up the fuel. Hydrocarbons contribute to photochemical smog, act as an eye irritant and contain known cancer causing agents.

Carbon monoxide is a highly toxic gas that forms in the cylinders when there isn't enough oxygen. Some of the most common causes for high CO readings are a dirty air filter, sticking choke, inoperative air pump, clogged PCV system or leaking fuel injectors.

Carbon dioxide (CO<sub>2</sub>) can be best explained as engine efficiency. If the first two readings (HC and CO) are within the limits of your particular automobile, the CO<sub>2</sub> will also be within the limits. One cause noted for too low a CO<sub>2</sub> reading is holes in the exhaust system. A car with rusted out exhaust pipes or a blown muffler will not pass the test.

Even if your engine seems to be running well, there is always a chance you may not pass. The best way to be sure is to ask your local service station or dealer ship if they have the emission testing equipment to check your car. Most shops are purchasing this type of equipment.

Another good suggestion is to make sure your engine is fully warmed up before taking the test. If the engine is still a little under normal operating temperature, the machine will not pick up true readings. You can tell when your engine is fully warmed up when hot air can be felt coming out of the heater. Also, do not shut the engine off if you have to wait in a long line at the test center. Starting and stopping the engine causes emissions to build up in the exhaust system.

If it's been at least a year since you've had a complete engine tune up, you should have that taken care of before your test date. At this time your mechanic can make sure everything is in order under the hood and perform a pre-test for you. Who wants to wait in line for an hour or more only to find out you didn't pass?

Another plus in having your engine set to emission standards is that your car will be operating at its optimum gas mileage. Many people didn't realize how much more gas mileage their car was capable of until all the settings were correctly made. Don't forget, the better the gas mileage, the more money you save in the long run.

Not all cars have to meet the same emission standards. A car built in 1978 would never be capable of as low an exhaust emission reading as a car built in 1986. For this reason the state tests each model year vehicle on its own potential.

Even though we may not be able to see the difference in our air now, other states have proven that mandatory emission testing has cleaned their air considerably. If the difference in the quality of our air doesn't seem to change over-night, you can bet our children and grandchildren will be thankful in the future.

### Pullen seeks help in banning smoking on school property

Dear Editor:

I need the help of your readers to persuade the Illinois General Assembly to pass HB-54, requir-

ing school boards to ban smoking on school property.

With so much concern about the proven harmful effects of second-hand smoke, what better place to begin cleaning up the air than in our public schools? After all, most smokers begin their habit long before they reach age 18; most young people who make it to age 19 or 20 without using tobacco never do take it up.

We teach youngsters not to use tobacco and alcohol and other drugs in health class, but many schools in Illinois are still grappling with the issue of student smoking lounges or outdoor smoking areas. And the same teachers bringing the "say no" message come into the classroom smelling of smoke either because they themselves have been using tobacco in the teachers' lounge or because they have had to put up with colleagues doing so.

My bill would end this mixed message problem and would help clean up the environment where our young people live and learn during most of their waking hours.

But it won't pass without the active interest of those parents and teachers and other citizens who think it makes sense to "say no to smoking" in school. This letter is to let you and your readers

know that the bill is pending in the Illinois House and to ask the people of your community to contact their state representative and their state senator and ask them to say "yes" to HB-54. Thank you!

## Reduced cost mammography tests at Weiss

During April and May, area women may obtain mammography tests for early diagnosis of breast cancer at a reduced cost of \$50, about 35 percent lower than the usual fee, at Louis A. Weiss Memorial Hospital, 4646 North Marine Drive. The cost includes the examination and evaluation by a Weiss Hospital physician specialist in radiology. ## Sheridan Road initiates voice improvement program

Lisa Doolittle, the lead character in the play "My Fair Lady," learned that a person really could go far by repeating "The rain in Spain stays mainly in the plain." All Professor Henry Higgins had to train her to drop her accent and use her voice to its greatest ability.

Today, people who want to enhance their personal and professional images through improved pronunciation, voice projection or vocal quality can attend the Voice and Accent Improvement Program offered by the Sheridan Road Hospital of Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center.

The Voice and Accent Improvement Program is tailored to meet participants' personal and professional needs. The program benefits adults who are foreign-born and speak English with an accent, have regional American dialects, desire to improve vocal quality, or abuse their voice in the course of business.

"Two categories of people can be helped by participation in this program: those who want to use their voices to greatest advantage, and those who could be damaging their voices by improper use or continual vocal strain," explains Leslie Swanson, M.A.C.C., the speech pathologist who heads the Sheridan Road Hospital program. Commodity traders, who spend the day shouting, are prime candidates for damaging their voices," she adds.

"We can train traders to project the voice without straining the vocal cords," she adds. The speech pathologist works with a person on a person's individual needs. Private, one-on-one, sessions are held during the day or evening for one hour per week. The number of sessions varies with the specific problem being addressed. Accent program participants are encouraged to complete a 12 week course to achieve maximum success.

## Thompson to study health insurance plan

The Illinois House overwhelmingly sent to the Governor a Comprehensive Health Insurance Plan (CHIP) targeted for "high-risk" individuals who have difficulty obtaining medical coverage, according to State Representative Cal Sutker (D-Skokie), a supporter of the measure.

"The CHIP program will help meet the severe unmet demand for affordable insurance coverage faced by disabled people throughout the state," Sutker said. "The plan is specially designed to help those

with critical illness or disabilities who pose a high-risk and are unable to secure coverage by traditional means."

Sutker said the insurance pool, supported by both state funding and individual premiums, would be overseen by an 11-member, governor-appointed board.

"The program's cost is expected to be met primarily through premiums, which should average about \$1,000 per year. In the event of a shortfall, the state is directed to make up the difference."

"Anyone who has a serious medical problem today must pay an exorbitant fee to obtain proper coverage, if they can afford it at all. In a growing number of cases, critical health problems bare an overwhelmingly financial toll and are the leading cause of bankruptcy," he said.

"CHIP offers welcome relief to the disabled and provides an opportunity for uninsurable citizens to get the basic medical coverage they need," Sutker added.

Sutker said similar insurance plans are operating in 11 other states, including Minnesota, Wisconsin and Indiana, all of which are experiencing excellent results.

The program is part of the continuing O.A.T.E.S. Thursday night education series on substance abuse. "The Family Illness" program is offered again on July 9, Sept. 17, and Dec. 3. For more information, call O.A.T.E.S. at 492-6385.


Matlin said "it was very challenging."

discuss amending legislation that established a TIF district to allow redevelopment of the shopping center. Tied into the amendment are Niles plans to use part of Lawrencewood as a consolidated site for village offices and municipal facilities.

Brown noted Niles is proposing spending \$6 million for acquisition of seven acres of land at Lawrencewood. "Of that, \$5 million would go for condemnation legal fees," he said, adding that Krilich has turned down \$10 million for the property in the past.

He stated that within the past 60 days, a contractor-purchaser has been drawing up plans to "totally redevelop" the center and the property would have a potential value of \$30 million. Brown added the current equalized assessed valuation is \$4.1 million.

Brown's co-counsel, Tom Dehannet, said the contractor for the development has been getting letters of intent from prospective tenants for Lawrencewood.

"Financing for the project will come from private money tied in with TIF," he noted.

In a last verbal shot, Brown said he was aware of newspaper accounts indicating "bitter feelings" on the part of Mayor Nicholas Blase toward Krilich involving village citations issued to Lawrencewood over fire and code violations at the shopping center (1981-82).

"The village brought the case to court. We won, and it was never appealed," he said. "No citations have been issued since the litigation ended in 1986. We are asking this board to deny the proposed amendments to TIF."

Dr. Kenneth Olsen, superintendent of High School District 219 read a letter to the board saying the high school district could not unequivocally support the village's efforts to redevelop Lawrencewood by purchasing the land under its condemnation powers.

Olsen stated endorsement for use of part of the property would be reserved until it was determined that the municipal portion will not be completed "at the cost of education dollars which were to have been paid for the benefit of the high school district."

"Provisions should be made for the return of revenue to the district," Olsen said. "Hopefully, the school board can work with the village to reach a mutual agreement."

The board will make a decision on the proposed TIF amendments at a May 12 public hearing.

Approved a contract with Haul-A-Way for garbage disposal in the village. Terms are for one year with a monthly cost of \$7.42 per unit for garbage collection.

Other actions affecting the 1987-88 school year were authorized. The book rental fee schedule is: Kindergarten \$20, Grades 1-8 \$24.

A motion was passed to approve fees for bus transportation for the amount of \$70 per student subject to \$25 deposit payable by June 5 with the balance due August 13. Otherwise, the fee will be \$120 per student payable no later than August 13. New pupils moving into the district after June 5 will automatically pay \$70. The maximum charge per family will be two times the amount due for one student.

Million dollar contracts were awarded to two corporations - one for asbestos removal, at Gemini and Twain Schools in the amount of \$1,265,000, and another for repairs at Gemini and Twain Schools in the amount of \$1,325,000.

In other matters, the Board passed a resolution supporting National Teacher Day May 5. Citizens are urged to make special efforts to demonstrate appreciation for the special services and dedication District 63 teachers provide.

In one of the last orders of business, Donald Stetina proudly announced that a \$14,000 national grant has been awarded to District 63 for its highly acclaimed reading program, Chapter 1. Five years ago the State of Illinois, recognizing the excellence of this program, asked to use Chapter 1 statewide. District 63 was one of only six districts for the State of Illinois chosen for this honor.

there will be a village property tax increase of 4.5%. In dollars and cents, this means if you have a tax bill of \$1,500, your village taxes will increase \$13 for the coming year. On an \$1,800 tax bill, there would be a raise of approximately \$18. Larry Arft, Village Administrator, reminds residents that village property taxes account for only 5.5% of the total village budget.

Corporation Counsel Marty Ashman reported on his negotiations with the law firm of Jenner and Block over a bill for legal fees stemming from the controversy over the handgun control bill. Jenner and Block had agreed to reduce their fees to 1/2 the normal amount the National Coalition to Ban Handguns was to pay. This they did to the tune of \$20,000. Due to the fact that the case went all the way to the Supreme Court, the costs doubled which the Coalition could not afford to pay. After hard negotiations, Ashman got Jenner and Block to agree to cut the cost of the remaining legal fees in half if they are immediately paid in full. This the board voted to do.

Police Chief Larry Schey made special presentations to David Hildebrandt and Irwin Kushner who were instrumental in helping apprehend a suspected abductor and a carful of garage robbery suspects, respectively. Chief Schey reminds the public they are the best help the police can have.

Kathy Mohrdiecke and Trustee Henry Szachowicz presented awards to donors for the blood drive. Recognition was given for donations ranging from 1-9 gallons.

Mayor Richard Flickinger made several commission appointments. On the Appearance

Committee, David Hirsch and Clarence Lawrence were reappointed for 3 year terms. At the next meeting, it will be officially announced that Chairman Jerrold Brim will be replaced by Lawrence Reiss due to pressure from the Board of Trustees as evidenced at several past meetings. A big bite in the budget is reflected in a sewer project. The village will receive a Build Illinois grant of \$469,000 for the project, which is estimated to cost more than \$1 million, with construction to begin in July. Niles is funding the remainder of the cost for separating a combined sewer system on designated neighborhood streets.

An across the board salary increase of 4 percent for village employees was also approved at Tuesday's meeting.

The budget shows an increase of \$50,000 in anticipated building permit fees and a \$500,000 increase in the amount of sales tax collected.

The biggest increase in the budget is the public works fund, which rose about 29 percent over last year to \$5,144,025. The sewer grant money will be used to help bring Niles sewer system into compliance with federal laws, according to a board member.

Also, the budget is \$250,000 from the general fund and another \$1,200,000 from the motor fuel tax fund allocated for road construction and repaving of Niles streets.

The police department fund shows about a 5 percent budget hike...from \$2,557,000 last year to \$2,679,1500 this year, and includes purchase of mobile data terminals in each squad car to cut

down radio air time. The police department also received funds for a new recorder at the police station that records all radio traffic and calls on the emergency telephone line.

The fire department fund increased almost 6 percent, from \$1,817,000 last year to \$1,925,700 this year. The money was budgeted for equipment and training of firemen.

The finance department is the only unit to show a decrease (3 percent) in funding. This year's budget was \$3,173,500 compared to last year's \$3,288,000.

The budget also includes: Code enforcement, \$336,040 (last year, \$292,300); family services, \$186,730 (last year, \$240,500); and senior citizen department, \$150,300 (last year, \$130,000).

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
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
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
