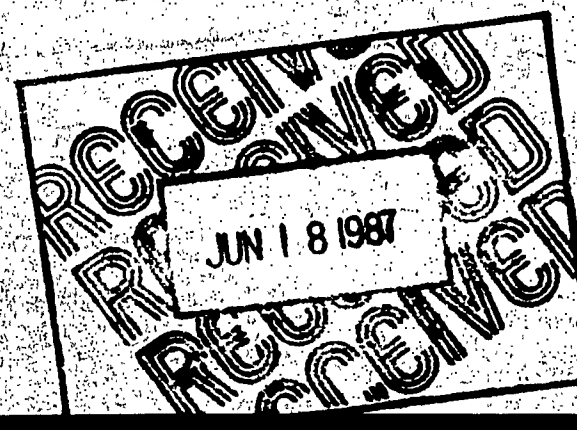

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Library changes mind on tax referendum

In a surprise action at the June 10 regular meeting, board members of the Niles Public Library District rescinded a former motion to hold a tax referendum this November. Passage of a referendum would

have increased the library's tax base from 15 to 25 mills. Trustees indicated they will attempt to budget this year with available funds and attempt a referendum in the future. Board President Terri Carman

said no board members on the Referendum Committee said the library could survive indefinitely without additional tax funds. In other action, three staff members were honored by the

Tentative 1987-88 budget
set at \$3,718,153

Park budget decreases by 3.6 percent

The Niles Park District Board has submitted a tentative \$3,718,153 budget for 1987-88, a decrease of 3.6 percent from last year's \$3,857,106.

The budget figures were finalized last week at a committee of the whole meeting following sessions that began last March, said Bill Hughes, park

director, at Tuesday's meeting. Money budgeted for specific funds include: corporate fund, \$580,000; recreation, \$547,000; ice rink, \$253,000; swimming pools, \$84,000; golf course, \$425,500; paving and lighting, \$26,300; police (patrol), \$34,000; I.M.R.F. (Illinois Municipal Retirement

When public bodies have personnel matters to discuss, they go into "executive session." They discuss hiring and firing matters behind closed doors. It protects people who are the center of discussion and it protects the public board. It allows the board the freedom to pursue the matter without the inhibitions of being more cautious or tentative. And it protects the board from possible legal suits resulting from its discussions.

In reporting the news the press waits for the public body to announce what action it will take as the result of their discussions behind those closed doors. There is no obligation on the part of the board members to explain their actions because they are exempt from public discussion as the result of their closed door session.

On occasion there is a genuine conflict between the private closed door sessions and the right of the people who elect the board members to know why personnel actions are taken.

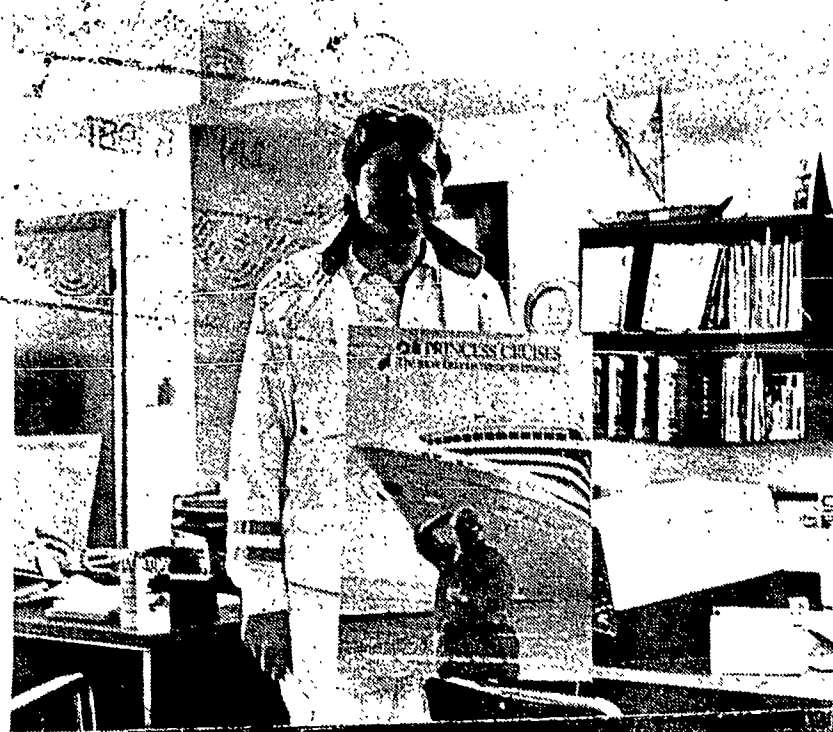

Amateur radio field day

Field day is an annual event occurring every June when amateur radio operators ("hams") take their equipment into the great outdoors and test it for use in case of disaster. Using electricity generated at the operating site or battery power, hams not only test their equipment but make a contest out of the exercise and try to contact as many other hams operating emergency type stations as possible. Often hams make field day a club social event while they are operating.

A major justification for the existence of amateur radio in the USA is to provide a pool of experienced operators in time of national or community need. When the call for emergency communications is voiced by cities, counties, states or the federal

government, mobile and portable radio equipment is pressed into service where needed. Setting up an effective portable station requires organization, planning and some experience. The experience gained by field day operation is valuable to both beginners and more experienced hams.

Members of E.S.D.A. and Des Plaine Services are invited to visit the Echo Repeater Association's 1987 field day site to see amateur radio firsthand. The site will be at the north end of the Oakton Community College campus, just east of river rd. on Central ave. It should be easy to spot the antennas and other equipment from noon on Saturday, June 27, until noon on Sunday, June 28. Please drop by and say "hello" and meet some of the hams.

POLITICAL TIDBITS. Republican legislators in Springfield are predicting that the suburb's priority issue...the regional airport authority bill...will get off the ground via a tradeoff with the House's majority Democrats.

The RAA measure would give the suburbs a voice regarding jet noise and expansion at O'Hare Airport. The bill recently passed the Senate, but GOP lawmakers fear it will be deep-sixed by the Democratic-controlled Illinois House.

The 68-50 advantage in the House calls for some kind of strategy to offset the numbers game traditionally played by politicians on both sides of the fence when it comes down to the nitty-gritty. In this particular deal, the Republicans are hoping the Dems will have a pet bill of their own which requires their support as a tradeoff for some acceptable form of the airport authority bill.

When conventional legislative methods don't work, tradeoffs inevitably come into play. Some consider such deals a compromise, and the more politically astute call it backroom politics. But like everything, it's all in the eyes of the beholder.

Creation of a regional airport authority would call for establishing a board (suburban members outnumbering those from Chicago) that would have to be consulted before any project costing \$2 million or more could get underway. It would also have some control reducing noise at the "world's busiest airport."

Niles Fire Dept. calls

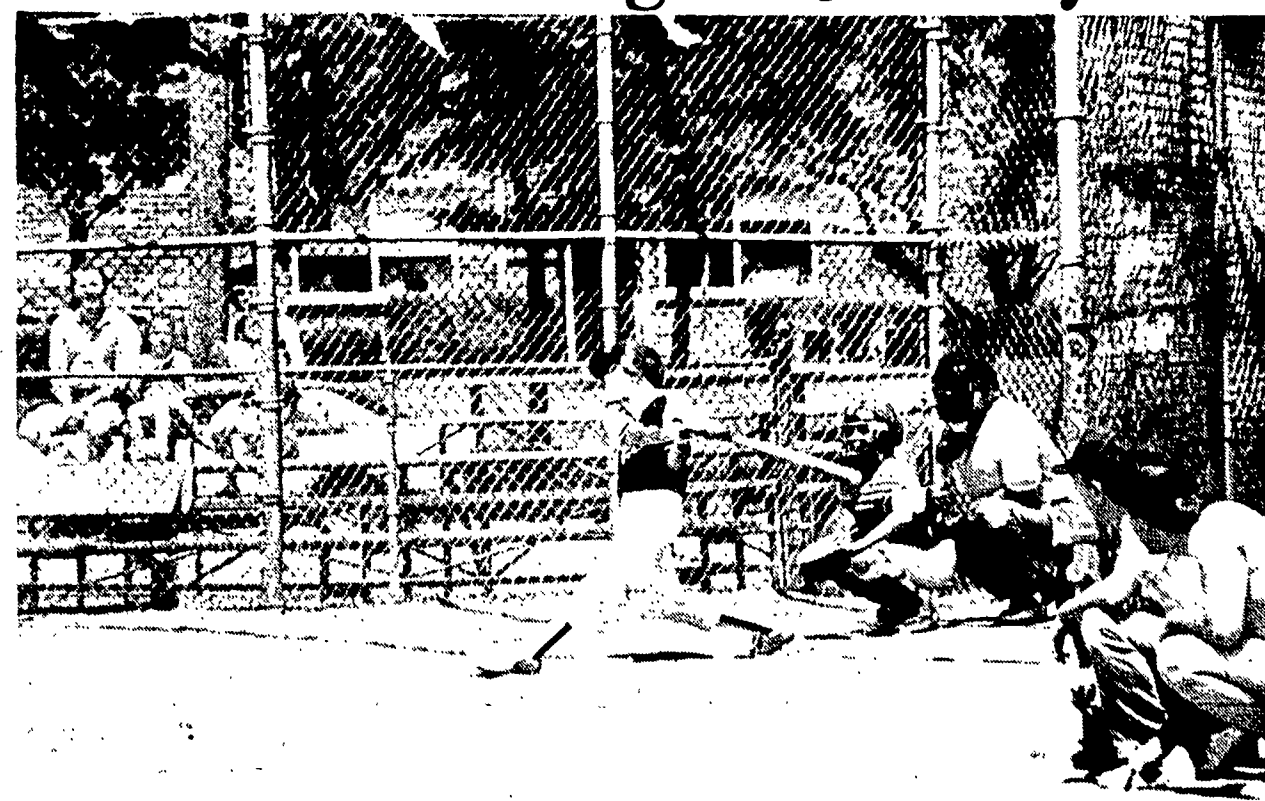
The Niles Fire Department answered 37 fire alarms and 45 ambulance calls between June 5 and June 12.

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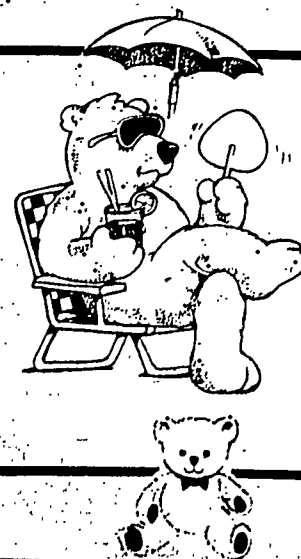

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Social Security numbers required for dependents

J.R. Starkey, District Director of the Internal Revenue Service for Northern Illinois, today reminded individuals that they will be required to list social security numbers for all dependents who will be at least 5 years old by December 31, 1987. The numbers must appear on 1987 individual income tax returns to be filed by April 15, 1988.

If a dependent's social security number is not shown, or if an incorrect number is used, the taxpayer may be subject to a \$5 penalty.

If a dependent does not have a social security number, either the taxpayer or the dependent should apply for one as soon as possible by completing Form SS-5 with the Social Security Administration. This form can be obtained from the IRS Forms Distribution Center by calling 1 (800) 424-3676, toll free. Information about applying for a social security number is available at the local Social Security Administration office.

Starkey advised all persons needing to apply for a social security number to make the application as quickly as possible. This new rule will generate a very large volume of applications nationwide. Applying early will allow time for Social Security Administration to assign the number.

Turning on red poses safety problems

Turning right on red has become a popular time saver for many Illinois motorists. Unfortunately, some motorists risk causing accidents by turning right on red without fully stopping and yielding the right of way.

The right-turn-on-red law permits a right turn at a red light only after coming to a complete stop. Look for traffic on the street you are entering and yield the right of way to any vehicles or pedestrians in the adjacent crosswalk. Then make the right turn cautiously.

Before turning, look down the

sidewalk and past parked cars for pedestrians or cyclists. You can also help to prevent accidents by looking for pedestrians and cyclists before turning right at a stop sign or uncontrolled intersection.

Watch for and obey "no turn on red" signs at intersections where right turns are prohibited. Turning left on red after stopping is permitted from a one-way street to a one-way street heading left.

The right-turn-on-red law is appreciated by busy motorists everywhere. However, remember to stop, look, yield and turn cautiously.

The next step is to go home and evaluate the purchase options. If possible, talk with owners of cars identical to the one you want to buy.

After comparison shopping to determine the car you want to purchase, a fair price and value of any trade-in, return to the showroom -- this time to talk dollars.

Check those rear lights

Last weekend we packed the car for a two day trip down to Champaign-Urbana for a high school graduation. We took 157 all the way down. Silly us, we thought the Indy 500 was held on a track in Indianapolis.

After entering 157 off of 294, we spotted the recently erected 65 mile per hour speed limit signs. In the right lane we accelerated from 55 to 65 MPH, only to be almost run off the road by two semi-trailers and an elderly couple in a Lincoln. We kicked it up to 70 MPH but had to stay in the right lane because we weren't going fast enough to earn the right to drive in the left lane.

It seems awfully hard to understand why so much of the taxpayers' money was spent debating the pros and cons of raising the rural interstate speed limits to 65 MPH. On 157 where the speed limit is 65 MPH, most everybody was traveling 70 to 80 MPH. After getting back on the Tri-State 294 where the speed limit drops to 55 MPH, everybody still held at 70 to 80 MPH. It doesn't really seem to matter what the signs say.

While driving along admiring Illinois' many acres of farmland we couldn't help but notice that very few drivers ever use their turn signals when changing lanes. Aside from being a law, it is also a very courteous gesture to turn on a signal when you are about to squeeze into a space too small for your car to fit into in the first place.

Brake lights, turn signals, tail lights and backup lights all play a very important role in driving safely. All too often, these lights on our cars are overlooked during normal maintenance procedures.

When changing your oil or just washing your car on the weekend, it's a good time to perform a light check. First, turn on the headlights to check their operation and check all tail lights in the rear. Then turn on the turn signals, one at a time, checking both front and rear of the automobile. Next turn the key on without starting the engine, put the gear selector in "reverse" and check the backup lights in the rear of your vehicle. Last of all, have someone apply the brake pedal while you check the rear brake lights.

Most bulbs are fairly easy to replace if burned out, but some of the newer cars require removing the entire lens assembly in the rear just to gain access to the bulbs. In the case of headlights, make sure the bulbs are installed so you can read the writing imprinted on the glass. These bulbs can be installed upside down in which case the prism built into the bulb will make the beam of light shine straight up into the sky no matter how much you try to adjust them.

If the turn signal indicator light on your dash lights up but does not flash when you turn on your signals, this usually indicates a burned out bulb in the front or rear. If both bulbs are on bright, then you know the turn signal flasher has burned out. If a bulb or flasher doesn't take care of the problem, it is time for a qualified technician to take a look.

The other interesting thing we noted on our trip was how many camper trailers and rented trailers didn't have the turn signals and brake lights working properly. At night these trailers can be very hard to see when approaching them from behind without proper lighting. Why ruin an entire vacation just because you didn't check your trailer lights?

The most common cause of trailer lights not working properly after being hooked up to the car's electrical system is the lack of a good ground on the trailer. The ground wire coming off the trailer's wiring harness usually goes directly to a screw in the trailer's frame. Remove the wire, use some sandpaper to clean the area where the wire attaches and reinstall the wire. Any mechanical place of business will help you if you have problems, but remember they will need both your car and trailer to correct any problems.

Safe driving this summer will depend on both you and your mechanic to check even the simplest functions of your car.

Fund) \$100,000; general liability insurance, \$100,000; medical insurance reserve, \$3,000; handicap program, \$54,453; audit, \$10,000; bond and interest, \$615,000; special and donations, \$4,300 and bond issue proceeds, \$881,600. Linked to the budget is a \$4,396,680 appropriation.

No tax increase is expected, according to Hughes.

Board president Mary Marusek said there will be a 10-day inspection period for the budget. June 19 through July 20. A public hearing concerning the budget will be held at 6:30 p.m. on July 9. Adoption of the budget and appropriation ordinance will take place at the regular board meeting at 8 p.m. on July 21.

In regular board matters, board attorney, Gabriel

Berrafato said that condemnation proceedings to acquire property for a new maintenance garage were concluded in the court on May 26, with a judgment of \$550,000 awarded to owners of Jus-Rite Machine Co., 7530 N. Oak Park.

"The building and land now belongs to the park district," Berrafato said. "The court also ordered that the people there must vacate the premises by June 30."

The building contains 14,544 square feet. The park district intends to house its trucks and other park equipment, a repair shop and some offices in one-story building, which lies directly across the street from Tam golf course.

Board members expressed concern the building would not be vacated by June 30. "There is heavy machinery and office equipment that must be moved out before the deadline," Commissioner Walter Beusse said.

On the premise the building would be vacant at the scheduled time, board members said they will inspect the facility on July 1 to determine how to utilize the facility to meet park district needs.

Various board members said that the present buildings at Tam utilized to house equipment can be torn down.

"The land can now be used for development in the future," said

Marusek.

In other business, Marusek said that Mayor Nicholas Blase had contacted Hughes regarding a change concerning a planned day care center at Ballard School. The original plan by the park district was to have the facility on the second and offices on the first floor.

Children under three years old must have a first floor location in line with state stipulations, Marusek said. "There are concerns regarding accidents to small children going down the stairs."

In other reports, Beusse said revenue from the Niles Recreation swimming pool on Sunday was \$1,274. Figures were not available for the opening day on Saturday. He also reported the batting cages at Jozwiak Park brought in \$1,754 and the mini-golf course, \$6,692 since opening on May 15.

Revenue from the golf course to date was \$68,156.72. In 1986 for the same period, receipts were \$68,207.21. Beusse noted the 1986 amount included \$10,000 from the concession stand. "It was torn down, (the concession stand) which means the golf course made more money this year," he said.

Commissioner Elaine Heinen reported there has been a problem with maintenance and repairs due to lack of part-time help. Part-time employees usually are hired in June, Heinen

status on Feb. 19. "I then learned that Callas purchased the property on Feb. 25," he said.

Salerno stated Niles had filed objections to a commercial project on the Greenwood-Elm site in 1979. After the Illinois Appellate Court decision, he said the village sent a letter asking county officials to revert the C4 status to the original R-5 zoning on the county map. "It was assumed this was done," he said.

A petition signed by 16 homeowners near the subject site favoring the proposed project was submitted to the board by Callas. Tom Merlin, president of the homeowners' association then presented a petition containing 60 signatures opposing the shopping strip. "The sub-division contains 70 homes. Some of the homeowners who signed his (Callas) petition, later signed ours after getting more information about the project," he said.

In a presentation to the board, Merlin said if the petition was approved, the entire block of the sub-division on Greenwood would fall under Commercial zoning. "Residents would be adversely affected. It's a unique community where neighbors enjoy their lifestyles," he said. "Most of us who moved into the neighborhood in recent years realized the American Dream of owning our own homes. Now someone wants to shatter that dream for the highest net return on his investment," he said.

Merlin presented photos of homes constructed over the past four years ranging between \$150,000 and \$200,000 on Greenwood and west on Delphia.

"There has been an intensive residential development, directly opposite of petitioner's arguments that the trend is commercial in this area," he said.

Al Sompolinski, a resident on Elm Dr. pointed out Elm has a closed cul de sac at Greenwood that could pose a problem for emergency vehicles going into the site.

"The experts keep talking about heavy traffic on Golf and on Greenwood, but failed to mention traffic would be increased with the proposed retail center," he said.

Sompolinski read excerpts from the appeals court decision which said that although there has been an intensified trend for "more and more commercial developments" near residential areas, commercial zoning "must begin and end somewhere" with appropriate boundary lines.

The audience applauded when Sompolinski said, "the court reversed the lower court decision because, in its opinion, Golf-Greenwood Gardens was an appropriate boundary line 'between residential and commercial.'"

The board granted a 30 day continuance requested by Salerno, who will report to the village concerning the zoning case. Niles Village trustees will then determine whether an objection to the proposed development will be filed with the county.

The county appeals board is a recommending body only with a final decision made by the Board of Commissioners.

The Chicago North facility, 5401 N. Elston, the Chicago West facility, 5301 W. Lexington, and the Charles Chew Jr. facility, 9901 S. King in Chicago, will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Wednesday, June 24, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday, June 27, and from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Wednesday, July 1.

Regular operating hours at the Springfield facilities are 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. The three major Chicago facilities are normally open Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Wednesday from noon to 8 p.m. Flat weight truck, truck-trailer and trailer plates, and "B" truck, "TA" trailer and passenger stickers are also available during regular hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, at the Chicago East

facility in the State of Illinois Center, 100 W. Randolph.

All second division vehicles licensed on a fiscal year basis, including trucks, truck-trailers, trailers, semi-trailers, farm trucks and trailers, and mileage trucks and trailers must display 1988 license plate by midnight, June 30. The deadline will not be extended.

Mileage tax and farm plates may be purchased only in the Commercial and Farm Truck Division, Room 300 in the Centennial Building. Applicants for mileage tax plate must file \$500 surety bonds when they register, and also must file semi-annual mileage reports to the Secretary of State's office.

Installment registrations are available in the Commercial and Farm Truck Division and at the Chicago West facility. Applicants must file certificates of deposit or surety bonds for all second installment when they register. The installment plan applies to trucks and truck-trailers. Trailers are not eligible. "B" truck, "TA" trailer and passenger stickers are also available at many financial institutions in Illinois, including banks, savings and loan associations and currency exchanges. Anyone driving a vehicle with expired plates or sticker will be subject to a fine for improper registration.

board for 20 years of service to the library. Receiving watches as well as thanks were Lee Biga, Anne Hoglund and Virginia Zymar.

In keeping with the recommendations of library administrator D.J. McKenzie, board members approved a revision in the salary schedule, request for a subscription to a book, indexing system, purchase of additional computer terminals and \$375 for a three-day training of an executive secretary when one is hired.

The most costly recommendation is the book indexing system designed to be used with an IBM computer. It will cost about \$4,162 each for five years and the

library will hold title to the equipment by the sixth year. "We are doing this a year at a time," said McKenzie.

The system is designed to help patrons quickly find magazine articles. Two additional computer terminals will cost \$650 each, said McKenzie.

In regard to McKenzie's search for an executive secretary, he said the \$10,000 salary offered by the Niles library was considered low by both the Illinois Security Commission as well as a private job service. Both considered the salary should be about \$15,000 for someone "out of high school."

McKenzie said a reference

librarian with a master's degree is earning \$15,000 at the Niles library. Any salary increased by 50 percent would create "major" staff problems, he said.

A \$400 cash advance was authorized for each staff member or trustee attending the annual convention of the American Library Assn.

In a statement to the board, member Robert Quattrochi estimated that library participation in the Niles Days event would cost about \$550 for distribution of folders and balloons and salaries for driving the bookmobile.

"This gives us a chance to go out into the public," said Quattrochi.

year. Bowen has been manager for 22 years and intended to work two more years until he retired at 66 years old. When first year superintendent Eldon Gleichman re-classified jobs at the administrative level, he eliminated Bowen's and Kolvek's jobs. And while there was a similar job title as business manager which Bowen could have applied for, he declined, he said if the superintendent desired Bowen

fulfill the job he would have asked him.

A Skokie newspaper wrote an editorial criticizing the manner in which these people were dismissed.

The Bugle tried to elicit information from board members why they would accept Bowen's dismissal before his retirement. Board members insisted the matter was a closed door subject and they could not discuss the dismissal. value of the property could be determined by a trial jury.

Troy said village arguments are based on "facts" that Lawrencewood is a "shambles" and owners have not been able to redevelop the center. "It's a place that is blighted and a detriment to the community. No one can argue the village should stand by and be powerless to do something about the problem. It would not make sense," he said.

Angelo Marcheschi, village trustee, said Monday that village officials are anxious to begin developing Lawrencewood. "We would like to see the center back on its feet by turning it into an attractive complex."

The village would redevelop the entire center, Marcheschi said. Future plans include turning the existing theater into a cultural center similar to Centre East in Skokie, and construction of a shopping mall. "We want a blending of architecture for the municipal facilities, shopping center and other facilities to present an aesthetic appearance," he said, adding a land planner will probably be hired to give input on the project.

Blase.

"This will be an opportunity for our president to meet with the mayor and see of a cooperative venture could be worked out for the renovation and beautification of the corner. The corner is an area of mutual concern," according to board member Myles Diamond.

The lot, a former Shell station, was purchased by the library last year for \$250,000 with \$100,000 of that amount donated by the Village of Niles.
