FOURTH OF JULY CELEBRATION...Independence Day this year coupled with the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution was a day of floats, marching bands, flags waving in a gentle breeze, clowns cavorting in the streets and floating balloon elephants. The parade sponsored by the Niles Park District began at Notre Dame High School, passed the reviewing stand in front of St. John Brebeuf and ended at Grennan Heights Park, where people were entertained by the Windy City Troupe and jazz bands. There was also a petting zoo and face painting for the children.

Mayor Nicholas Blase and village trustees Peter Pesole, Angelo Marcheschi and Jim Mahoney walked the parade route dispensing hand flags to spectators. Riding golf carts were Park Commissioners Elaine Heinen, Walter Beusse, Dan Kosiba and Jim Pierski throwing candy to children.

Floats receiving a lot of applause included Golf Mill Bank's colorful "We The People" float featuring a large replica of the Declaration of Independence with employees Michael Crisci costumed as Ben Franklin and George Nikolas as Thomas Jefferson. Crisci was kept busy handing out copies of the "freedom document" to the crowds lined along the parade route. The bank float, and float entries by the Village of Niles, St. John Lutheran Church Bible School, Oakton Community College and the Niles Squares won special recognition plaques for their efforts.

Included in the parade were the Viet Nam Veterans (Chapter 311) stepping smartly to the drums and band music, and the Niles West marching band with members wearing the Fiesta Bowl shirts that will be worn in the Phoenix, Ariz. parade.
