## Low library budget means no salary hikes

A first draft of next year's 1987-1988 fiscal budget for the Niles Public Library District may be about \$1,556,361, or about \$105,000 more than last year with about \$186,000 of the funds to be slated for capital improvements, according to Dan Macken, library chief

of operations. The draft was to be reviewed by the board for a first discussion Wednesday, July 15. However, it is clear to Macken the board will not be able to purchase extra items from tax moneys. it receives. "No matter what the

equipment is, we couldn't afford to get it out of taxes," he said. Macken said the library will need funds for two major capital improvements. New roofing will cost about \$80,000 and the first half of resurfacing a parking lot

## Rec center fire under investigation

A fire of suspicious origin early Sunday morning in the refreshment and storage area of the Niles Recreation Building, 7877 Milwaukee Ave. is under investigation, according to Niles Fire Chief Harry Kinowski.

There is no confirmed cause of the blaze, but there is suspicion of arson in a preliminary investigation of the case conducted by a team of fire and police investigators, according to Sgt.

Jack Leske called Tuesday morning to remind us July 21 will be the 25th anniversary of the passing of Niles' Park District's first referendum.

You younger whipper-snappers will probably arch an eyebrow and say, "Big deal...What's so important about noting such an event?" You older guys, who lived here in the early sixties, will remember what a difficult time Nilesites had in passing a park referendum.

The July 21, 1962 vote succeeded after four previous ones had been turned down. The vote 25 years ago enabled Niles to buy four pieces of land for \$395,000 totaling more than 12 acres. And an additional \$310,000 was approved for the building of Niles' first swimming pool on Milwaukee Avenue as well as for the rec center, bath-house "and other improvements for the area at Kirk-Odell and Milwaukee Avenues."

In 1956, two years after the park district was formed, Nilesites turned down a

A Niles man will appear in Third District Court in Niles on Friday, July 17, to answer charges involving drug dealing operations in his home at 8041 N. Oconto.

Steven Wikstrom, 31, was charged with possession and delivery of marijuana July 2 after his mother tipped police about her son's alleged drug dealing business, according to police. He was released on 10 percent of \$5,000 bond and assigned a July 17 court date.

According to Niles Police Chief Clarence Emrikson, when police arrived at the house, Wikstrom's

## Police corner driver after high speed chase

A resident of Albuquerque, New Mexico was released on \$2,000 bond after leading police on a high-speed chase through Niles throughfares and parking lots on June 26.

The 24-year-old offender was charged with speeding, reckless driving, fleeing and eluding and improper turns, according to the police.

He was first observed driving west in the 8500 block of Dempster at 75 mph. A traffic stop was initiated in a restaurant parking lot in the Dempster Plaza shopping center. During questioning, the offender calmed down, he was told to follow the squad car to the police station and when the offender approached Oakton, he drove past the squad car on Milwaukee cutting the vehicle off. He then accelerated to 75 mph driving down Milwaukee Avenue with the police car in pursuit.

As he approached the 7300 block of Milwaukee, he made a left turn into a parking lot at 50 mph with no turn signal and continued northbound through the parking lot exiting on Milwaukee at 75 mph. He disobeyed a red light at Harlem and Howard and then made a left turn into a parking lot at 7900 Milwaukee at a speed of 50 mph. The offender stopped after he was boxed in by five police cars in the parking lot. Niles police attempted to take the offender into custody by removing him from the car, at which time the subject held onto the steering wheel refusing to get out of the vehicle. After he was transported to the police station, he was taken to a jail cell where he began complaining of pain in his right wrist. The offender was taken to Lutheran General Hospital, and later posted bond and was assigned a July court case.

**FOURTH OF JULY CELEBRATION...** Independence Day this year coupled with the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution was a day of floats, marching bands, flags waving in a gentle breeze, clowns cavorting in the streets and floating balloon elephants. The bank float, and float entries by the Village of Niles, St. John Lutheran Church Bible School, Oakton Community College and the Niles Squares won special recognition plaques for their efforts.

Included in the parade were the Viet Nam Veterans (Chapter 311) stepping smartly to the drums and band music, and the Niles West marching band with members wearing the Fiesta Bowl shirts that will be worn in the Phoenix, Ariz. parade. ## Maine Township To Distribute Surplus Cheese

Maine Township will distribute surplus government cheese from 1 to 3 p.m. Thursday, July 16, in the Maine Township Town Hall, 1700 Ballard Road, Park Ridge.

Recipients must bring their surplus food identification cards issued by Maine Township. Those who do not have identification cards and would like to participate in the government surplus food program should bring verification of residency and proof of income to the township offices at the time of the distribution.

Proof of income must include

one of more of the following: Social Security award letter; paycheck or stub; public aid card; pension award letter; and interest income verification.

Federal guidelines for income eligibility are: \$547 per month for one person; \$735 for a family of two; \$923 for three; \$1,110 for four; \$1,300 for five; \$1,485 for six; \$1,673 for seven; and \$1,860 for eight. Add \$181 for each additional family member.

A proposal for an off-track betting parlor at Lawrencewood shopping center in Niles may not get off the ground because of zoning restrictions and legal problems linked to the site.

Thomas Carey, owner and attorney for "Hawthorne Race Track," filed an application June 30 to the Illinois Racing Board to locate a betting parlor in the shopping center. If the application is approved, Carey would then have to go before the village board to receive a special use permit to open the facility.

The board approved an ordinance in June for the special zoning classification, which requires on parking space for every 10 square feet of floor space.

The Illinois Racing Board has delayed consideration of the request at the request of Carey, who asked the board to table his application until its next hearing July 18.

In a related matter, owners of Arlington Park Race track asked

the Racing Board to deny permission for the Niles betting parlor because it would be close to Arlington Park.

Carey could not be reached for comment.

Mayor Nicholas Blase said that members of the village board have some concerns for that "type of activity. Betting parlors ultimately attract a segment of what could be called unsavory characters, and we don't want them running around here," he said. "Although the state has legalized off-track betting parlors, there are concerns on what type of operations would be run on the site."

Off-track betting facilities were legalized in Illinois by the General Assembly in December, 1986.

Asked whether the village would be vulnerable to the state superseding home rule powers in a board denial of a petition for betting parlors via zoning, Blase

#### Strawberry Sauce

1 pint strawberries, hulled and sliced (2 cups)

1 tablespoon lemon juice

Place 1 cup strawberries in blender or food processor; blend until smooth. In 2-quart saucepan combine sugar and corn starch. Gradually stir in water until smooth. Stir in pureed berries and remaining 1 cup sliced strawberries. Stirring constantly, bring to boil over medium heat and boil 1 minute. Remove from heat. Stir in lemon juice. Serve over ice cream, cake or pancakes. Makes about 2 cups.

Variation: 1 pint blueberries or raspberries may be substituted for strawberries.

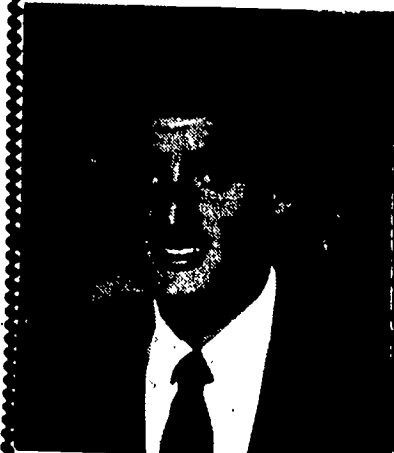

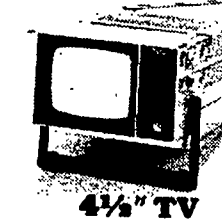

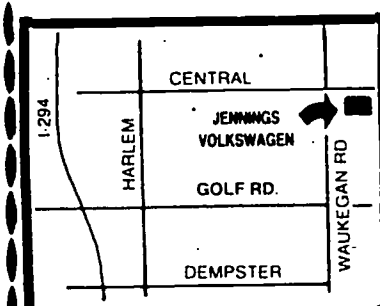

## *Niles ham operators aid in ship's crew rescue*

On Friday evening, June 12, while we in Niles were enjoying a peaceful summer eve, a ship was sinking off Henderson Island in the far South Pacific. Henderson is one of four islands that make up the Pitcairn group. Pitcairn itself is the only one of the four that is inhabited, by 50 hearty souls who ek out a living on a one mile by two mile volcanic island. Pitcairn is the spot that was chosen by Fletcher Christian to flee to after taking command of "The Bounty" from Captain William Bligh in 1789. Pitcairn had been mischarted on Royal Navy maps of the day and, therefore, proved to be a safe haven for the mutineers for some

18 years after the famous event. Pitcairn today is much like it was then in terms of remoteness, although many modern "improvements" have been brought in from the "outside world" (as the Pitcairners call us).

One such "improvement" was received only one month ago. My husband and I have been enjoying shortwave radio schedules with Brian and Kari Young on Pitcairn Island for the past year and a half (via ham radio). Last winter, my husband, Dave heard about a project being sponsored by the University of Hawaii in Honolulu called PeaceSat. PeaceSat is an acronym for Pan-Pacific Education and Com-

munications Experiments by Salluste and seeks to promote meaningful communications and educational opportunities among the Pacific Basin Islands. The program utilizes a "retired" NASA communications satellite in geo-stationary orbit 25 thousand miles above the Galapagos Islands. It has been used as a satellite for exploratory and humanitarian purposes. The oceanographic community uses it for communications with their research vessels, scientists in the Antarctic for talking with the mainland and the Navy for bringing the Pacific Islands a bit closer together. During late winter here, Dave set up, modified, and thoroughly tested a ground station at our home in Niles. The station was shipped to Ptolemais this spring and was put into service by Brian Young, who, as magistrate, just last month,

Last Friday, all of our efforts bore fruit. The "Iron Cumberland", a freighter on her way from Auckland, New Zealand, to Panama, and eventually to the U.S., floundered 30 miles from uninhabited Henderson Island and sank. A distress

call was received on Pitcairn some 150 miles away. The 29 crew and officers of the "Cumberland" managed to launch their two lifeboats and all safely evacuated the ship. The seas were particularly rough that day with cold north winds and heavy swells; it is wintertime in the South Pacific in June, some 3,000 miles north of Antarctica where the Pitcairn Group is located. The "Iron Cumberland" was carrying magnesium and concentrated lead in her hold. Apparently the cargo shifted suddenly in the heavy seas causing two large holes in its sides allowing sea water to rush in flooding two compartments quickly. She went down abruptly.

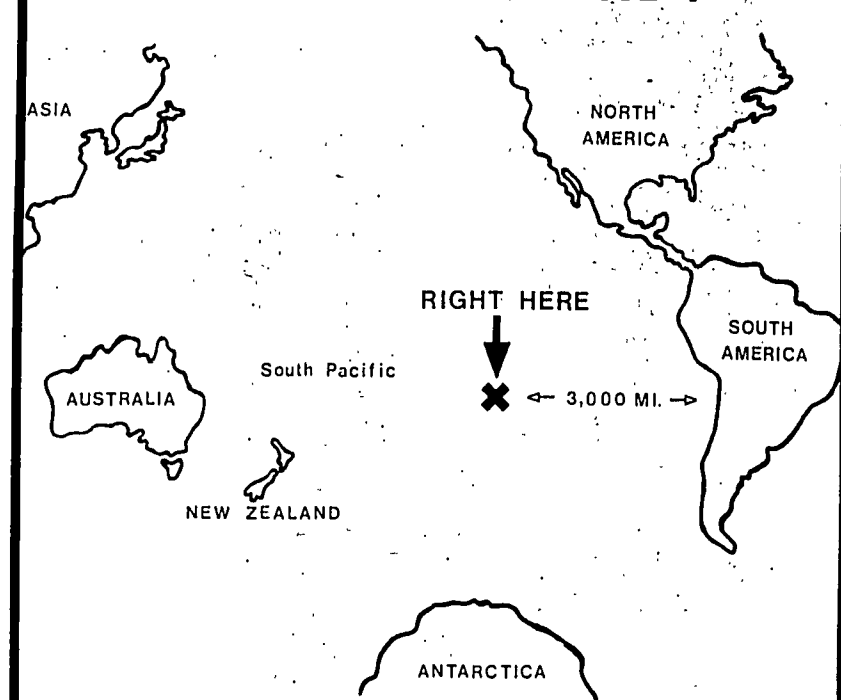
Immediately after receiving the "Cumberland's" distress call, Brian put out a call on the satellite radio. He was first answered by a research vessel, then by the satellite controller in Florida. The station placed a phone call to the Jointed States plane and what happened next was a race against time. The plane was located and the rescue was organized. The plane was found and the rescue was successful.

from either Tahiti or Easter Island, each some 1,200 miles distant and in opposite directions. Since Pitcairn's shortwave station was in contact by Morse code with the lifeboats and no one suffered a medical emergency, we could buy a bit of time. Two hours later, a French aircraft out of Papeete, Tahiti, made visual contact with the bobbing lifeboats and the 29 seaskick inhabitants.

In the meanwhile, Pitcairn's shortwave station, ZBP, was desperately attempting to contact a nearby ship which might divert to the scene of the sinking and rescue the crew. Honolulu Coast Guard had notified Pitcairn via the satellite of several ships in the area, and the radio operators on "Taro Ground" (the high, flat spot on the island) kept their message up across the bleak winter Pacific water. Finally the Act V, a British container vessel, answered the plea and agreed to divert and rendezvous with the lifeboats. The

Act V was some 500 miles away at the time, and it would take another 24 hours for her to reach



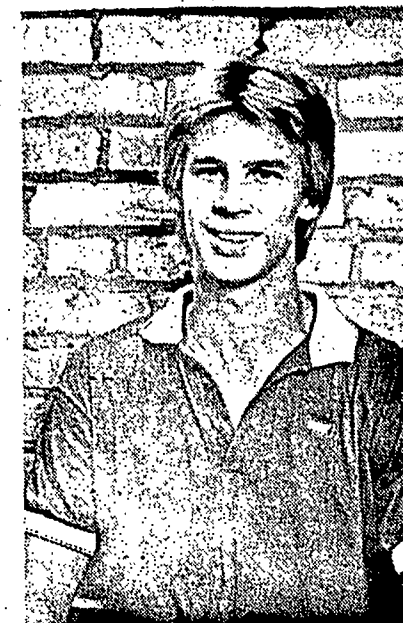

felt she was near the breaking point when she brought her mother to live at Bethany Methodist Terrace.

Today, Rose lives at the Terrace's Care Center. Carly Hellen, the Alzheimer's Services Coordinator, says Rose is not restrained either physically or medically, and is free to enjoy her never-ending strolling of the hallway. She smiles as she walks. Ruthy says of her mother, "She was just content from the moment she walked in, as if there was relief in the security of the place."

Carly explains, "We stress a feeling of security, and we try to change the environment to meet the needs of the patients. We try

to call on their abilities and not their disabilities. For instance, we don't say 'what day is today,' or 'go to your room.' We take them to their room, and if we find that they've wandered into the wrong room, we don't make an issue of it."

Decreasing patient anxiety, says Carly, is just one of the goals of the Care Center. Others include keeping residents active, reducing restraints and medications, and meeting the needs of the families.

Ruthy has become an activist on behalf of Alzheimer's patients and their families. She's vice president of the Chicago-area chapter of Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Association, or ADARDA. She's involved in most of the association's activities, and is an authority on legislation pending and passed that will impact the lives of Alzheimer's families. She also runs a support group for the families of Alzheimer's patients at the Terrace.

Ruthy's energy for the cause is limitless. As she puts it, "We have no idea if there's a hereditary factor involved in this or not. So I'm fighting for myself and my family, and anybody else who comes along this way..."

### Handicapped parking bill sent to governor Congregate living

Parking spaces for the disabled would be widened, and posted warnings would tell motorists they face a \$50 fine for misusing

the spaces, under a bill proposed by Secretary of State Jim Edgar, approved by the Illinois Senate Monday and now awaiting the

Governor's approval.

"Handicapped parking laws have greatly increased the mobility of people with disabilities and the accessibility of public places. We hope this bill will make a good law even better," Edgar said.

Senate Bill 832, approved by a 57-0 vote, would require that handicapped parking spaces be 16 feet wide and marked by posted signs carrying the phrase "\$50 fine" beneath the international disabled symbol.

"This legislation will help to address the problems which were brought to our attention in the course of our public hearings last year," Edgar said. "We often heard stories from persons confined to wheelchairs who were denied parking because of a lack of space to maneuver between vehicles."

"Designated handicapped parking spaces serve no purpose to the disabled if they are used by other drivers who do not realize the seriousness of the offense and the penalty involved," Edgar said.

Currently, there are more than 80,000 handicapped parking cards in use and 35,375 disabled license plates.

The bill was sponsored in the House by State Rep. Jim Kirkland (R-Elgin) and in the Senate by State Sen. John Friedland (R-S. Elgin).

### provides dignity and comfort

An environment providing companionship, dignity, comfort and safety. This is the right of every member of society, young and old. To live and enjoy the years we are granted to their fullest requires that as America ages a new life style be developed to provide an opportunity and facility where the senior citizens can fulfill the American dream.

To satisfy this need various forms of senior housing are being developed. One style finding favor with seniors is congregant living facilities. This type of facility has certain distinctive characteristics. First, it is NOT a medical institution. The presumption is that all residents are in good health, ambulatory, able to care for themselves and require no daily medical attention. Medical care is secured by residents in the same manner as they are securing care prior to living in the center. Some facilities will have leased space to private physicians not affiliated with the facility, others provide a system to secure emergency medical treatment.

The following services are provided:

1. Each resident (larger units are available for married couples) resides in their own private apartment or housing facility.

2. Main service with towels and linens provided on a weekly basis. Light housekeeping is performed by the maids.

3. Heat is landlord provided. Some facilities offer air conditioning as an option at a set charge.

4. Planned activity programs are scheduled. These include both activities within the facility and field trips. There are arts and crafts, discussion groups, study groups, woodworking, sewing, movies, video tapes, music programs, shopping trips, picnics, boat trips and a multitude of similar activities.

5. Religious services are normally conducted on the premises by local religious leaders or facilities are made available to transport the residents to the Churches.

6. 24 Hour telephone service with phones in the resident's apartment.

7. Security is maintained at all times. The residents, however, have the right to leave the premises at will and there are no restrictions (except those normally required under any lease for the benefit and protection of other tenants) regarding visitors.

8. Stores and services are usually provided including: barber and beauty shops, commissary, newspaper sales and mail facilities.

Dependent upon the cost of the rental facilities there may be such items as pools, a Chapel on the premises, flower shops, grocery stores, etc.

The major service provided is the meal service. Although some centers do provide kitchen facilities, most do not provide for cooking in the apartments. All meals are provided on a com-

munity basis often with two seatings for every meal. An entree selection is sometimes provided and is beneficial in providing variety and alternative meals.

Many facilities also provide for refrigerators to be made available in the apartments and for snack-service in the common areas. This enables people with special nutritional needs to provide for themselves.

A great variance exists in congregant housing in the nature of ownership and operation but it can safely be stated at this time that the most well known and majority of facilities are expensive, and unavailable to those of fixed income. The majority, but not all. Many facilities are now in operation with monthly rates between \$450 and \$650 an apartment and meal service and activity program. The better facilities in this price range do provide a good meal program with entree selection and table service. Security and 24 hr. switchboard service along with some maid, linen and towel service is provided by affordable facilities in an environment of safety and security.

However, many people are reluctant to investigate the market yet when they do they discover that comfortable, secure and enjoyable environments are available at reasonable rental without the requirements of large endowments or financial investments (as high as \$100,000.00) that are required.

Some centers provide 90 day trial programs so that one can determine if they desire to live in the center without the need of a long term lease or major investment.

The congregant center provides to its residents that most important and essential emotional feeling, that of self-worth and independence. Here the senior need not surrender any of the activities they have enjoyed all of their lives. They are relieved of the need to prepare meals and may enjoy selecting meals and being served. They also know that they maintain the ability to leave the center and dine at restaurants of their choice. They maintain their homes and this is a private living facility. Yet there is the knowledge that care and help is always near if they require assistance.

This is senior living for healthy seniors. I believe that this type of accommodation can and will provide for the fulfillment of the dreams of our seniors. To explain more about this type of congregant living, I suggest that you visit a congregant living center and on behalf of the Crown Plaza, 1039 W. Lawrence, Chicago. ## CJE in-home companion service

Council for Jewish Elderly's In-Home Companion Service that provides care for elderly people

in their homes, is now accepting applicants, announced Ronald Weismehl, Executive Vice-President of the social service agency.

The program, funded by noted Chicago philanthropist and art collector Gabriella Rosenbaum, helps families care for infirm elderly relatives by placing trained and screened companions who assist with meal preparation, bathing, dressing, writing letters, and caring for the older person. This service can provide up to 24 hours daily care and allows family and older individuals the time to thoroughly investigate long range plans.

A unique component of the program, is the CJE nurse and social worker's assessment of the elderly clients' needs. CJE stays involved to help families plan for the changes that often accompany the aging process.

"These services are very important to the well being of family members or those providing full-

time care to an older person," says Weismehl. ### Dudycz legislation would benefit older citizens

State Sen. Walter Dudycz (R-Chicago) is seeking legislative approval of several measures designed to help the state's older residents.

Dudycz's proposals would help protect older citizens from abuse and neglect, increase penalties for teen-agers who commit felony crimes involving physical harm to senior citizens, and preserve a special state income tax exemption for elderly taxpayers.

"The physical, mental and social changes associated with aging can create challenges that may not have been present at a younger age. Health problems, fears of being victimized, and limited finances are some concerns commonly expressed by older people," Dudycz said. "I am sponsoring several measures that address these concerns."

"Elder abuse is one of the more pressing problems. Recent studies have revealed startling data about the number of our senior citizens being abused, neglected or exploited," Dudycz said. "Circumstances like chronic health conditions or isolation that make older people

vulnerable can also make it difficult for them to free themselves from abusive situations. We must provide some assistance so their retirement years are not marked by fear or neglect."

Senate Bill 2228 would direct the Department on Aging to design and maintain a statewide program to assess alleged or suspected abuse or neglect of people 60 or older and provide necessary services.

"The Department on Aging has been studying elder abuse and neglect to determine the extent of the problem, evaluate the success of current services and determine what is still needed," Dudycz said. "The studies show that in one year, a statewide program could expect to process more than 2,500 reports of abuse and neglect."

Teen-agers who physically harm senior citizens should face stiffer criminal penalties under a bill co-sponsored by Dudycz to curb youth gang violence against older people. Senate Bill 1124 would require 15- and 16-year-olds who commit felony crimes involving harm to seniors to be

tried in court as adults.

"Senior citizens, especially those who live alone, can be easy targets for juvenile delinquents and youth gangs," Dudycz said.

"Under current law, people younger than 17 may only be tried as adults when they are charged with serious crimes like first-degree murder, armed robbery or aggravated criminal sexual assault. Senate Bill 1124 would add felony crimes that involve physical harm to people 60 and older."

The status of Senate Bill 1124 is uncertain, Dudycz noted, because it has not been released by the Senate committee to which it was assigned. "I see a need for such a measure and will work to get it out of committee and before the full Senate," he said. "If we are not successful this spring, we will continue our efforts next fall."

Dudycz is also co-sponsoring Senate Bill 113 to preserve an extra state exemption elderly taxpayers may claim, which will otherwise be dropped next year as a result of recent changes in federal tax laws.

"For those on a fixed budget, the money saved by that extra exemption can be important," Dudycz said. "We must act now to make sure it isn't dropped."

The 7th District Senator said he is also studying other senior citizens proposals being considered by the General Assembly and will support "those measures that will genuinely benefit Illinois' older residents."

cigarette smoking are dealt with," said Bailey.

The one and one-half hour treatment takes effect within minutes. Many immediately experience a diminished desire to smoke and the majority do not experience the side effects of nicotine withdrawal as do those who try to quit on their own.

### Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption Applications

Senior Citizens are now eligible for a Homestead Exemption during the year in which they turn 65.

They no longer have to wait another year as was the situation with the Homestead Act prior to 1984. The Homestead Exemption has also been increased from \$1,500, which it was prior to January 1, 1984 and is now \$2,000. However, this benefit will not be reflected on a Tax Bill until the Second Installment will be due Summer of 1987. Therefore, the 1986 Homestead savings will not be received until the 1986 Bills are paid in full with the Second Installment in the year 1987.

The Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption provides tax relief by reducing the equalized assessed valuation of an eligible residence by \$2,000 which can result in a tax savings of as much as \$200. This savings is in the form of a deduction on the Second Installment of the Real Estate Tax Bill. If you forgot to file, a Certificate of Error can be requested!

To be eligible for this exemption you must fulfill the following requirements:

- 1.) You must be 65 years of age or older during the year for which you are applying.
- 2.) As of January 1 of the year in question you must either own the property or have a lease or contract which makes you responsible for the real estate taxes.
- 3.) As of January 1 of the year in question the property must be your principal residence.

You may file for this Valuable Exemption at the Niles Township Assessor Hanrahan's Office, your documents indicating the following will be examined, copied and returned to you at the time you file.

You must provide us with:

- 1.) Proof of Age: Birth Certificate, Baptismal Certificate, Naturalization Papers, or Social Security Form SSA-2458 showing date of birth.
- 2.) Proof of Ownership: Warranty Deed, Quit Claim Deed, Torrens Certificate, Trustee's Deed, Deed in Trust with Trust Agreement, Executor's Deed, Owner's Title Policy (Schedule A), Proprietary Lease with a Tax Clause, or Article of Agreement to Purchase with a Tax Clause. Note: Trust Deeds (Mortgages) and Release of Trust Deeds are not acceptable.
- 3.) Recent Real Estate Tax Bill: this will verify the Permanent Index Number of the residence for which you are seeking the Exemption.

### Taxpayers who filed an ext. must file

Taxpayers who filed an extension of time on April 15, 1987 to file their 1986 income tax return, must file their return by August 17, 1987.

When you file the return, show on the appropriate line, the amount of payment you made when you filed the extension. If you underestimated the amount you owe, you must now pay interest on the unpaid amount. If the unpaid amount is more than 10% of your tax, you will have to pay, in addition to interest, a failure-to-pay penalty. Any interest or penalty applies from the original due date of the return, which is usually April 15.

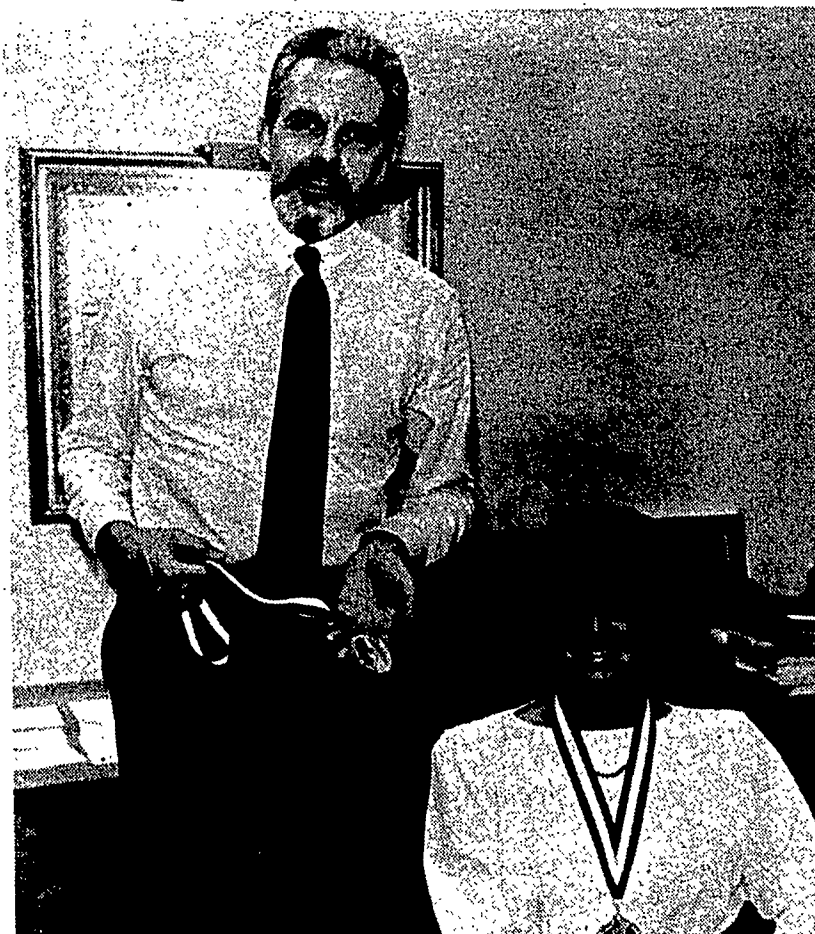

commented, "all the state has done is authorize these facilities, but not where to put them. Home rule powers would stand."

Joe Salerno, Niles director of code enforcement, said Monday after he learned of Carey's proposal, he contacted the attorney to inform him of the zoning classification and the village's condemnation proceedings on Lawrencewood. "Carey said he had filed an application because of a deadline for submitting bids for a site."

According to Salerno, Carey explained he had called Robert Krilich (owner of Lawrencewood) to find out if space was available in the shopping center for a betting parlor. Krilich said there was space. Salerno noted Carey was not aware of the condemnation suit filed by the village.

Allen Brown is the attorney on record representing Krilich in the condemnation suit. However, Carey's Chicago-based law firm of Carey, Filter, White & Boland act as general counsel for Krilich, according to Richard Troy, Niles village attorney. "The firm has acted in that capacity for years," he said.

Troy explained Krilich has the legal right to rent to tenants or sell the Lawrencewood property until a court order is entered for "just compensation" for the property established by a jury.

"The village must also have vested title to the shopping center in the transfer of ownership. I think it would be ill-advised for someone to come and rent space at Lawrencewood and end up being forced to vacate along with other tenants after the case is settled in court," Troy said.

He added village officials have a right to be concerned about a track betting parlor in Niles, especially in the area of security where vast amounts of money are involved. "There is a potential for burglary that could pose a problem for police."

He noted that petitioners going before the zoning and village boards must submit criteria regarding security guards for the betting parlor, the amount of people that would be in the facility at one time, whether food would be served to patrons and other information. "Village officials would want to take in all the facts before making a decision on this type of business," Troy said.

Jerry Sheehan of the Niles Police Department.

Knowski said firefighters arrived at the scene at 2:16 a.m. after a patron in Wag's Restaurant (across the street from the Recreation Center building) reported seeing smoke coming from the roof. Niles Administration Building, 7801 Milwaukee, where they found that someone had accidentally activated the alarm.

A fire alarm activated at the York School Council Columbianes edition was a beautiful book cited for its unique layout of pages.

referendum to build several kiddie parks in town. In 1961, voters turned down a \$1.5 million referendum for parks and a community center. Two other votes rejected a community center and a huge park which would have been built between Oak School and Notre Dame High School, which was then open land.

During the period preceding the 1962 referendum, Keith Peck led a brigade of residents yelling "Um Pa Ta" as they hustled votes for the parks and pool. Park Commissioner Lou Schreiner was able to get some Indian headgear from his paint company and everyone in town was sporting the new chapeaus which were part of the promotion for the referendum.

Leske served the park district 18 years. That very young Keith Peck joined the park board the next year and moved on to the village board and then moved to his present position heading the Public Works Department.

Old Bugles tell us a "Julie" was another pied piper who organized the kids in town to get their folks out to the polls. We assume he was Julie Pandra who served as rec director and later a park board member as well.

Jack reminded us it's 25 years since Niles moved its park programs forward with this vote. And we'd like to let younger residents know there were guys like Leske and Peck and Pandra and Schreiner and Aug Scully who spent hundreds, perhaps more than a thousand hours of their time to insure you would have the facilities you now have.

Leske reminded us how little was spent for facilities in those days implying more should have been bought then. But voters watched their tax dollars very prudently and voted only when they were convinced their money would be well spent.

Our friend Bob Wagner died this past weekend. Bob drove the Bugle truck from 1970 well into the 1980's. He was special for many of us because he was such a good human being. When Bob would deliver newspapers to the boys' and girls' houses he soon became friends with many of their mothers. Niles' Millie

Kroll would often leave cookies at her doorstep for him and occasionally include a six-pack. Bob improved our circulation by handing out papers to friends he acquired along the route. It was a weekly ritual to give newspapers to fellows from the Public Works Department who were working around town. He'd stop by a project and make sure they all got their Bugles.

The Bugle family has been a close one through the years and Tuesday we said goodbye to one of our own.

Morton Grove village attorney Marty Ashman has been appointed a Circuit Court Associate Judge for Cook County. And Niles attorney Ken Cohen, who is a former judge, will fill the vacancy of village prosecutor in Niles.

As we have mentioned many times before, as a layman we have no credentials to judge the qualifications of these men for their jobs. But after reporting more than 50 indictments in the Greyford trials, it is time we find a better way of choosing men to serve as judges.

Cohen, who was relieved of his judicial role because he lacked either judicial temperament or judicial knowledge, became a judge because of his close association with Niles Mayor. Likewise, Ashman also has political connections which undoubtedly helped his ascending to the bench. In past years, Ashman was an associate of State Representative Aaron Jaffe, serving in the same law offices.

A system of appointing men to the bench after being scrutinized by several review boards seems a much better means for making judicial appointments. Paying off favors to politicians by placing their friends as judges is certainly not the way to administer the best justice. Critics of such a selective process are wary who the selectors are. Setting up review commissions with representatives from the bar associations, the State Supreme Court's representatives and perhaps Deans or professors of law schools in Illinois would be preferable to the political-clout system we now have.

library, utility and reception areas. The project will cost \$278,000, according to a school spokesman, who noted the conference will enter into a 30-year lease agreement with Oakton. Reportedly, the rate will be \$40,000 to \$50,000 annually.

The conference composed of 31 towns lost its lease with the library last May, according to William Grams, NWMC director, who said he was happy about the board decision. "We have been looking for a central location for our headquarters, and the campus is ideal because of its central location to membership towns."

Grams said the next step is to submit a site plan to the State Board of Higher Education, and attorneys for the conference and Oakton will develop a contract and lease agreement. "We anticipate that groundbreaking will take place in September. Hopefully, the building will be under roof before the end of the year."

He added a large section in the building will have a library that will be a federal depository (Congressional Records, census reports, legal documents and other government material) that will be available to conference members and the college," Grams said.

OCB board member Joan Hall said she cast a negative vote because she felt the college should not get involved in putting up a building for the NWMC "no matter what the merits are."

"I feel as a board member that we should be in the education business and not dealing in real estate matters," Hall said.

"However, on the positive side, the college will have access to the federal depository for reference."

Diana Loveland, another board member who voted no on the issue, was unavailable for comment.

Chuck Scheck, Director of Community Development received approval for a construction project for paving the alley south of Capulina between Ferris and Calle, as well as paving of the alley north of Lincoln between Morton and School Streets. This project will also include the installation of storm sewers.

In committee reports, Trustee Bob Leavitt reported the "no-smoking in restaurants" resolution should be ready for reading at the next Board meeting. Trustee Leavitt also commented he had received many complaints about traffic coming out of the new strip shopping center at Beckwith and Waukegan. A traffic study will be conducted.

Trustee Don Snider received approval for a resolution calling for the construction of the Superconducting Super Collider at Fermilab. Construction at this site would promote economic development throughout Northeastern Illinois. Copies of this resolution are to be sent to the President, members of Congress and the Governor. Snider also announced a meeting with executives of Continental Cable on July 28. He urged all residents with complaints or suggestions to attend.

Trustee Henry Szachowicz received approval for amending the Animal Control portion of the Municipal Code and achieved passage of a resolution calling for the licensing and regulation of alarm systems. This is in response to the problem of entirely too many false alarms. The police report that out of a total of 2200 alarms going off, only 1% were actual problems. Most of these false alarms were due to owner negligence.

In other business Szachowicz introduced the idea of a stamp for property transfer as a revenue raising measure. Many other communities use this to raise money. They charge at the rate of from \$1-\$3 per thousand dollars of value. Artt will further research this idea.






