Maine/Niles taxes see little change

Because this is an in-between quadrennial re-assessment year, this year's tax rates for Maine and Niles Townships residents remained about the same as last year.

Maine Township residents in School Districts 63 and 64 will see an increase of approximately 2 percent, while most Niles Township residents will see small decreases. In Niles School District 71, the rate was down 3

percent, and Niles and Morton Grove's District 67 decreased 4 percent. In Morton Grove School District 70, the rate went up 5 percent.

In terms of tax dollars, a 2 percent increase on a \$75,000 home would result in a \$20 hike on a tax bill; a \$100,000 home would be increased by \$25 and a \$150,000 home would be approximately \$45 more than last year.

Buglebits:

Most of us are somnambulate taxpayers three out of every four years. For three years we doze off and pay roughly the same tax bills as we had the previous year. Then comes the fourth year, when we are re-assessed, and we get clobbered by a heavy increase.

Last year Maine Township residents paid 20% to 33% increased tax bills. This year, the figure will be about 2%.

If you received a 33% increase in 1986 and 2% during the following three years, you received a total 38% increase over four years, which averages about 10%. By handing out the increases in this manner, the tax people can hear the pained taxpayer holler and scream for one year, while remaining mute for three years. But you're really being socked for 10% a year.

Last year we reported School District 63 increased taxes by 28.6%, Oakton College by 26.21% and Maine High by 23.79%. Add the 2% for the next three years and you can average out the increases to the school districts

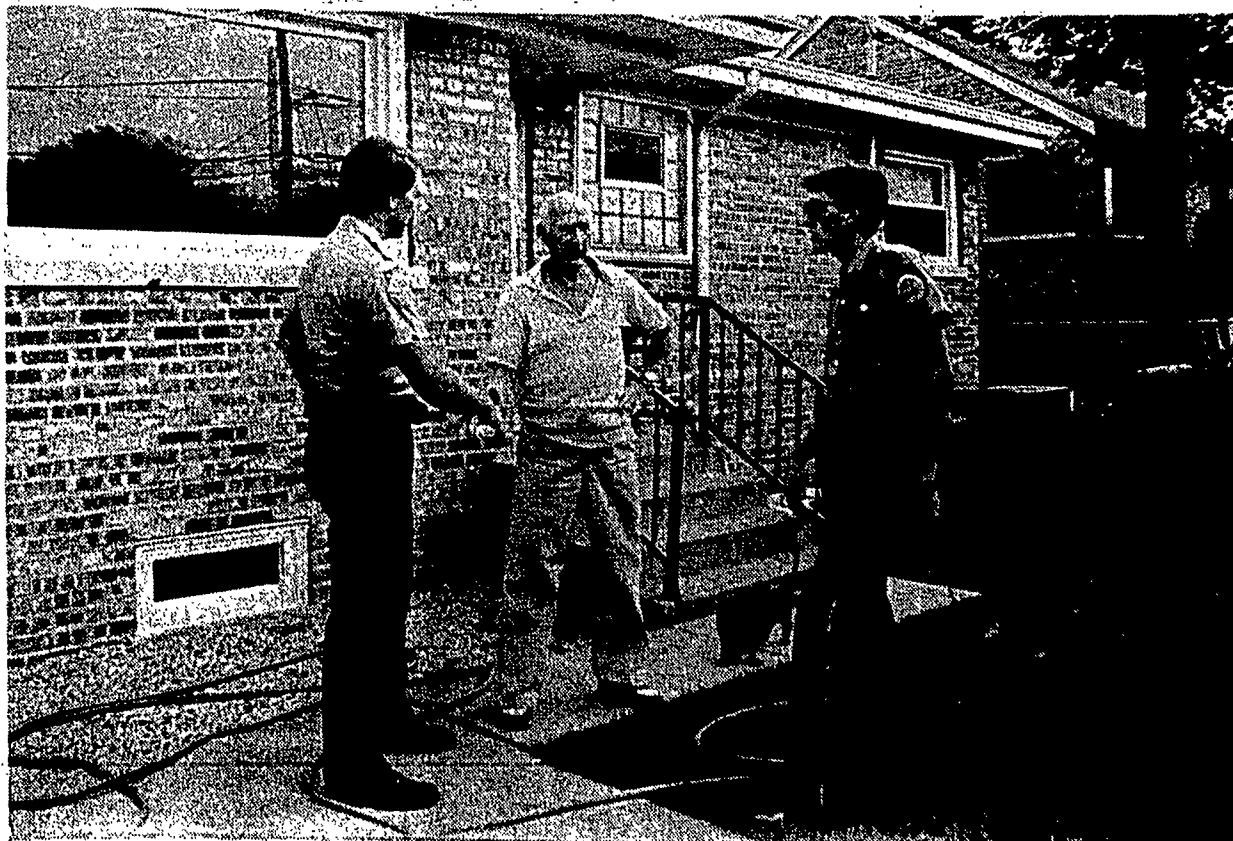

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission said children activate the garage door opener, then run out of the garage in an effort to beat the door before it closes. Deaths occur when the descending door strikes the child and pins him or her to the ground. Even garage doors equipped with an automatic reverse mechanism have been involved in fatalities.

CPSC urged parents to keep remote control devices locked in the accessory compartment of the car to prevent access by children.

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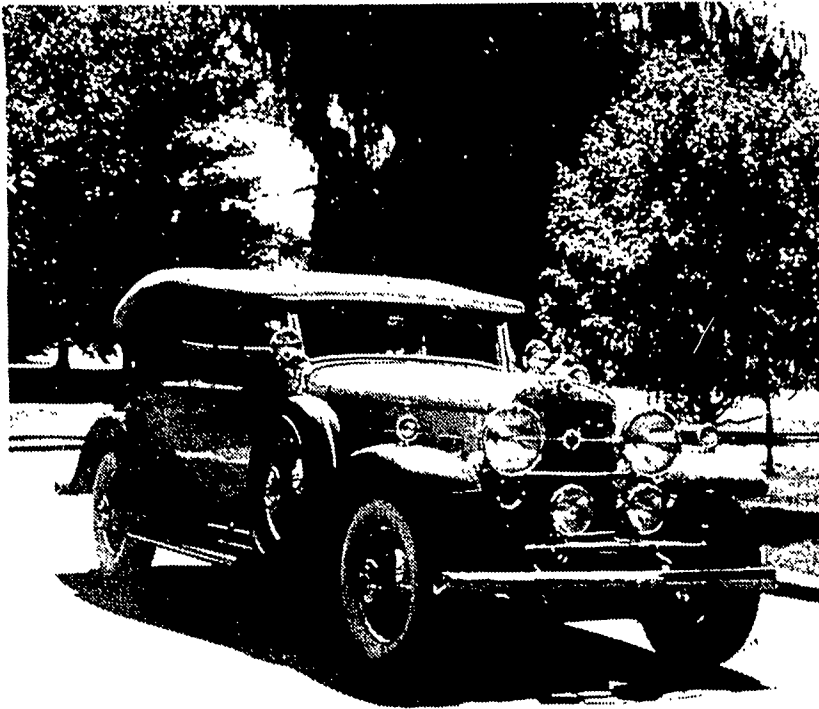

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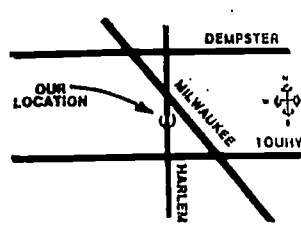

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Track owner mulls plans for Niles betting parlor

The owner of Hawthorne Race Track is weighing the pros and cons before coming to a decision on a plan to locate an off-track betting parlor in Niles.

Race track operators had proposed a betting facility at the Lawrencewood shopping center and submitted the location to the Illinois Racing Board. The bid was then put on hold by the board at the request of Thomas Carey, owner and attorney for Hawthorne.

Carey said Monday there are many factors to consider before committing to the Niles site. "We don't want to locate a parlor where it isn't wanted, and village

officials appear to be opposed to the idea."

He noted another drawback is the village's condemnation suit against Lawrencewood, which would "complicate things."

Another snafu are the state requirements for off-track betting parlors which prohibit them from being situated 500 feet from schools, churches or residences.

"I understand there is a residential area behind the shopping center and a nearby elementary school (Dist. 71). It's just one more factor to consider," he said.

Carey stated the betting facility proposed for the Niles site

Court hearing continued in rec center fire

Anthony Elarde of Niles, who is facing charges of alleged arson and burglary in connection with the July 12 fire at the Niles Recreation Building, 7877 Milwaukee, appeared at the Niles Third District Court for a preliminary hearing last Friday.

Judge George Zimmerman continued the case to Aug. 21 where Elarde will be arraigned in the felony deviation of the Third District Court in Des Plaines. Elarde, who lives at 7845 Odell, was represented by a public defender and remained silent during the hearing, during which testimony was presented by a detective investigating the alleged arson fire that caused at least \$50,000 damage.

Niles Detective Dennis McEnaney gave details concerning the fire that occurred in three rooms of the recreation center and the burglary of several items, as well as the events leading up to Elarde's arrest on July 16.

Two juveniles were also arrested at the same time and charged with burglary and arson. They are being held in Audy Home in Chicago pending an August court date at Niles Third District Court.

According to a Niles police official, Elarde has been unable to raise the stipulated \$35,000 bond and will remain in Cook County jail pending his arraignment in the Des Plaines court.

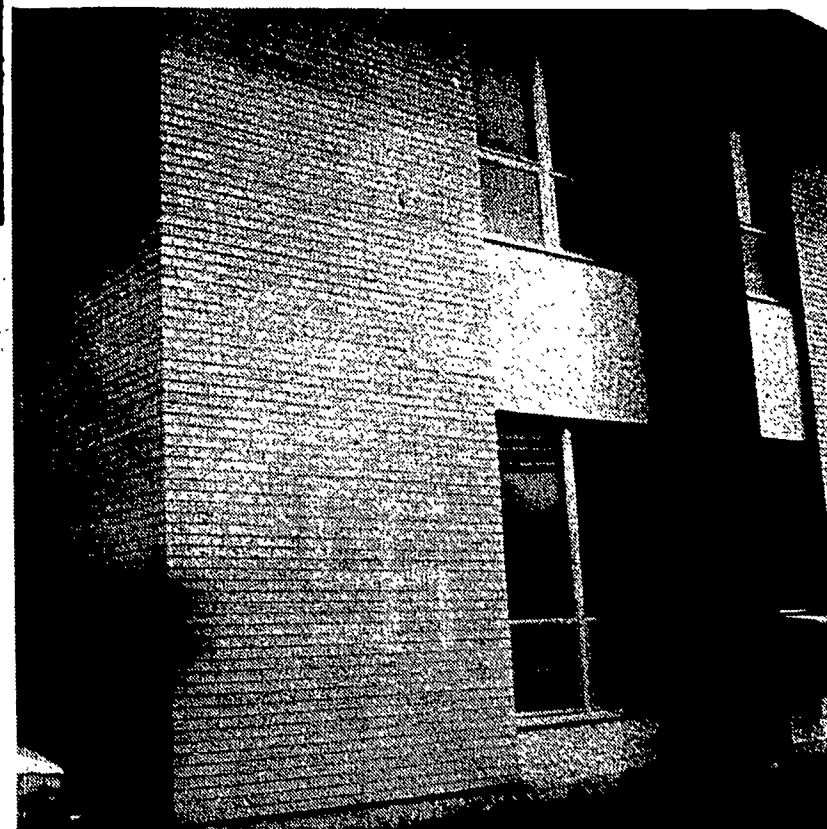
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MTJC to leave swastika on temple

Niles Firefighter receives Paramedic Award

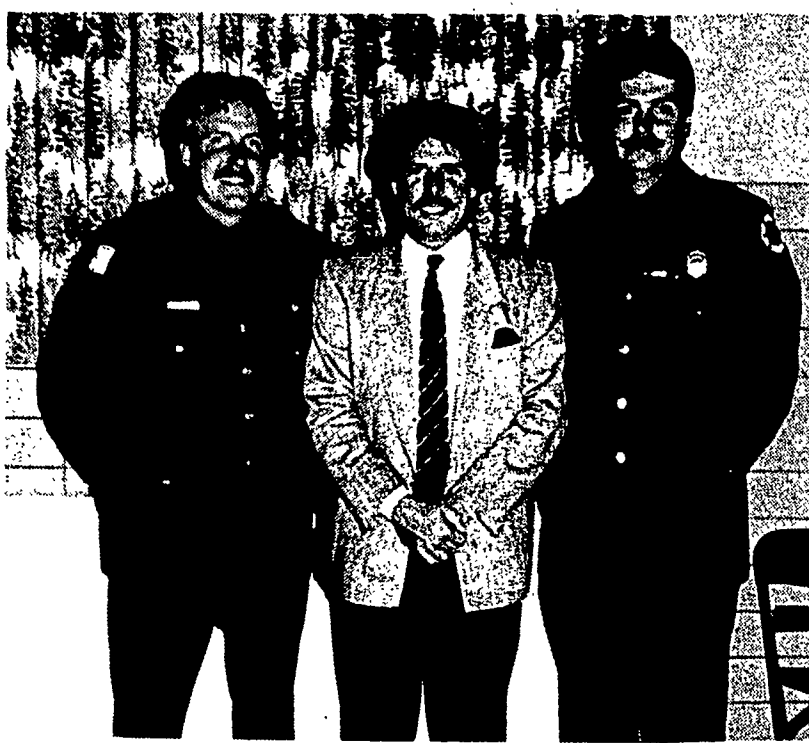

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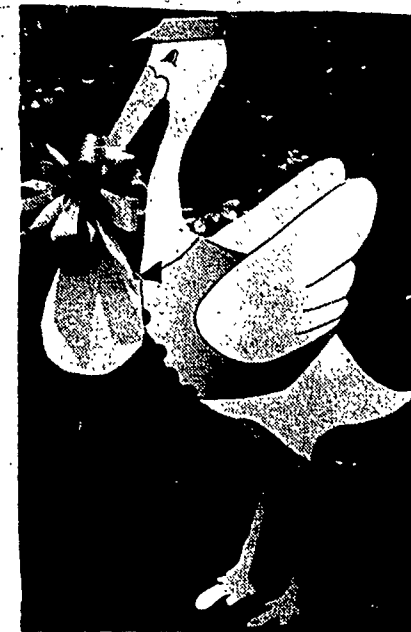

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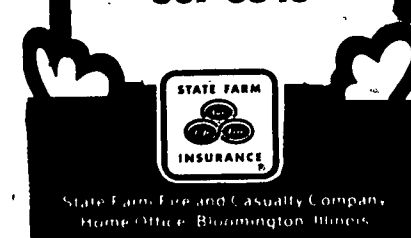

Bill to protect paramedics, firemen

Model legislation to require hospitals to notify ambulance personnel when they handle patients with infectious diseases has passed the General Assembly with unanimous support.

State Representative Ralph C. Capparelli (D-13), sponsor of the bill, said the legislation was proposed by the Chicago Fire Fighters union.

Under House bill 1242, hospitals will be required to notify the employer of ambulance workers within 72 hours after the workers have handled a patient who is diagnosed to have a contagious disease as listed by the Department of Public Health. Failure to do so could result in a \$200 fine for a first offense and \$500 for any subsequent offenses. In turn, the employer faces civil action if they fail to then notify the affected workers.

Capparelli passes O'Hare credit

Homeowners within five miles of O'Hare Airport will get a tax credit for insulating their homes against the sounds of jets flying overhead under a bill passed by State Representative Ralph C. Capparelli (D-13).

"When those jets start using the east-west runways over the Kennedy Expressway, the sound can be deafening," Capparelli said. "Although we are still working on cutting the number of noisy planes using O'Hare, we can at least offer some relief from the noise in our homes through this soundproofing program."

The Capparelli bill, House Bill 1908, compensates homeowners for the cost of installing soundproofing insulation with a tax credit equal to 50 percent of the cost, with a maximum credit of \$10,000 a year.

The bill also included \$35 million in bond funds for soundproofing schools and hospitals around O'Hare.

"It's a tragedy that some children must have their education interrupted constantly by the sound of jets flying overhead," Capparelli said.

The bill now goes to the governor for his signature into law.

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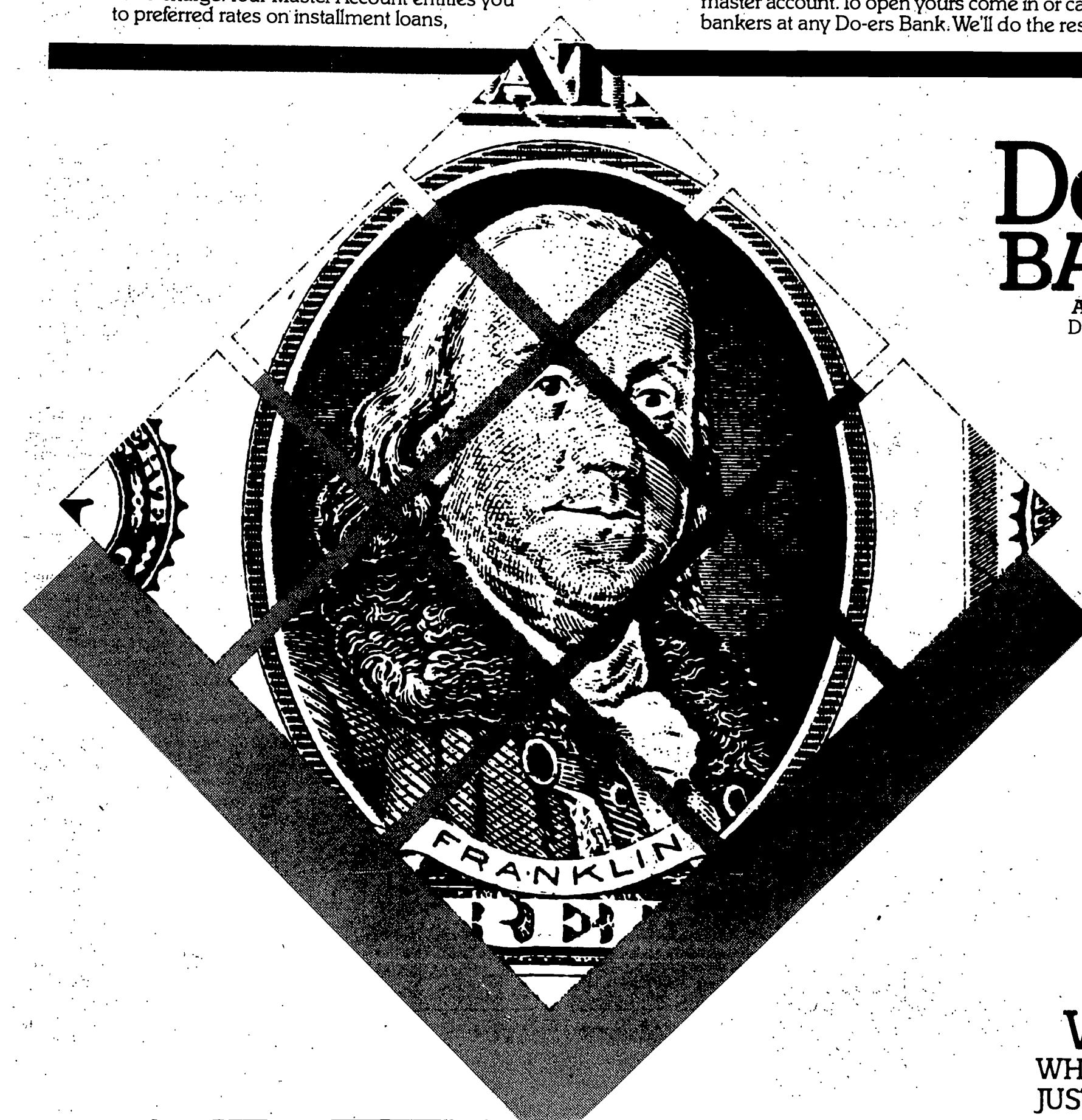

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Auto Update Vacation Car Care Tips

To avoid ruining a summer motoring vacation due to a mechanical breakdown, AAA-Chicago Motor Club advises motorists to properly prepare their cars before departure.

First, consult the owner's manual for recommended services, maintenance schedules, proper grades and amounts of fluids and explanations on how to check basic automotive systems.

Under the hood, a tune-up helps an engine run smoothly and use less fuel. Other mechanical services should include an oil and oil filter change and a new air filter, according to AAA-CMC. Check the levels of all fluids including windshield washer, power steering, master brake cylinder, radiator, transmission and rear end.

Examine belts for wear and proper tension. Inspect the electrical system for proper performance. Run the air conditioner to check for proper operation.

Check tire inflation, look for signs of wear and rotate tires if necessary. Lubricate the chassis, and door, trunk and hood hinges. Examine all suspension components including shock absorbers and check wheel alignment.

Utility vehicles safety tips

Because of their high center of gravity, jeeps, vans, light trucks and other utility vehicles have a tendency to roll over. According to the University of North Carolina Safety Research Center, the rollover rate nationally is 70.8 per 10,000 vehicles, compared to a rate for cars of 13.6 per 10,000 vehicles. The center also reports that utility vehicle fatality rates are as high as motorcycle fatality rates.

Since most utility vehicles roll over while turning, avoid abrupt turns and drive at moderate

speeds. When university researchers steered jeeps into 90-degree turns at only 22 miles per hour, all of them rolled over.

Passenger cars with the highest rollover rates were tested for comparison, but they showed no tendency to roll over at that speed.

If your utility vehicle starts to roll, you will feel the sensation of sliding. To abort a roll, take your foot off the accelerator — braking will provoke the roll more — and turn your steering wheel into the slide if necessary.

"Locking hubcaps"

What was so terrible about "baby moon" hubcaps? They didn't squeak, rattle or fall off while driving over a set of railroad tracks. Very seldom did anyone get them stolen. Best of all, they were extremely easy to wash and keep looking nice.

Over the past few years, many of us have gone to our mechanics complaining about a funny sounding noise we knew for sure had to be coming from the brakes. It was a pleasant surprise to learn the brakes were fine and the noise was our spoked hubcaps flexing as we drove down the road.

Spoked hubcaps are now offered on almost every model automobile. Even if your car doesn't have them now, almost all automotive related stores sell them at a variety of prices. You have to admit that a set of shiny spoked hubcaps can dress up even the most ordinary looking car.

Now comes the question of how in the world are you supposed to clean all those little spokes while washing the car without spending an entire weekend on each hubcap? The dishwasher! If you take off all four hubcaps first and clean them as best as possible with a nylon brush and the garden hose, they're ready for the dishwasher. Stack the hubcaps on the bottom rack with plenty of space in between each of them. Use the normal amount of dishwasher soap you would use for a full load of dishes. Run the dishwasher on a normal full cycle and you'll be amazed at how nice your hubcaps look when they're finished.

Most stores sell a wide variety of spray-on cleaners for hubcaps. Some of them are a foam spray, but nothing will work better than a shot in the old dishwasher. Some of your men out there might have to wait until the wife goes shopping before trying this method.

A very common problem with lock-on hubcaps of any make or size occurs if the screw-on lock assembly has not been moved in a long time. It will rust itself in place so removal is almost impossible. Once every couple of months, it's a good idea to remove the screw-on lock, coat the threads with a little grease, and re-install it on the car. This will insure the fact that if you have a flat tire, you will be able to get the hubcap off in order to remove the tire lug nuts. The tool the car manufacturers give you to remove the lock assembly is sometimes very weak. A rusted lock can ruin the tool on the first attempt at trying to remove them.

A loud squeaking sound coming from the hubcap area is usually caused by a thin film of rust between the hubcap and the wheel. If you remove the hubcaps, you will see four or five obvious rust spots on the inside of the wheel. By putting some grease on these spots, you will all but eliminate those annoying squeaks. Unfortunately, nothing can be done about broken spokes on the right side of the hubcaps that result from rubbing against the curbs.

While the hubcaps are off, it's also a good idea to get out your tire wrench and make sure the lug nuts can be loosened a little, then retightened. If any lug nuts are too tight to break loose, drive over to your mechanic and ask him to loosen them. Have him tighten them the proper amount, but not so tight that you can't loosen them with your tire wrench.

The straight tire wrench that comes with your car is usually very hard to use. Almost all auto parts stores and department stores (in the automotive section) sell the old "cross style" tire wrench for a very reasonable price. You can get much more leverage with this type tool and it is a lot easier for the ladies to use.

We can think of nothing worse than to be stuck on the side of the road with a flat tire and not be able to get off the hubcap or lug nuts.

State gives safety tips on driving trailers

Many motorists enjoy camping trips with travel trailers for fun summer vacations. To ensure safe travel, select a trailer and hitch compatible with your car and follow these safety hints.

First, the weight your car hauls should not exceed your hitch's tongue weight, the maximum load the hitch can pull. Class A hitches, for example, pull a maximum weight of 2,000 pounds. If the tongue weight is exceeded, your car's body could buckle and the roof even collapse, possibly in the middle of an expressway. You could lose your trailer if the hitch fractures.

To avoid these vacation-ruining situations, check the owner's manual for the tow load and the

passenger doorjamb for carrying capacity. Many popular subcompact cars cannot tow heavy trailers.

Front-wheel drive cars sometimes sway in a fish-tailing motion, presenting another potential hazard. Fish-tailing is caused by poorly distributed trailer weight reducing tire traction and maneuverability. If your car starts to fishtail while pulling a trailer, stop and shift the load.

Braking distances also increase with added weight. If the trailer is not properly secured, it could jackknife when you brake, spill its contents, and cause an accident. Brake earlier than normal and always drive in the right lane at 55 miles per hour.

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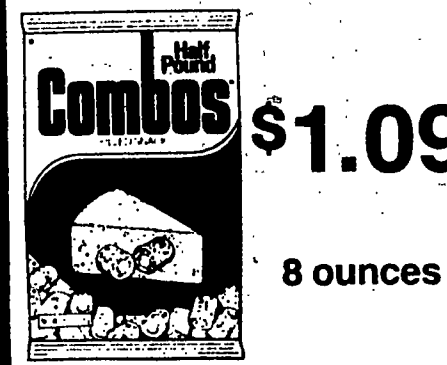
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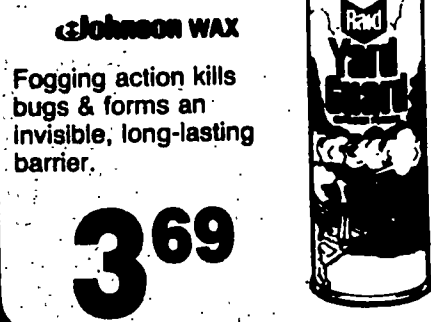
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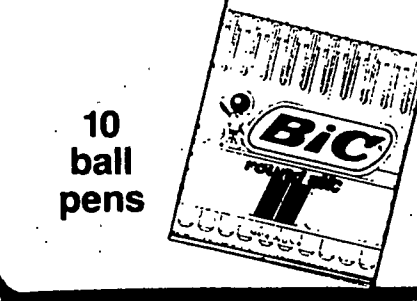
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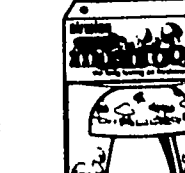
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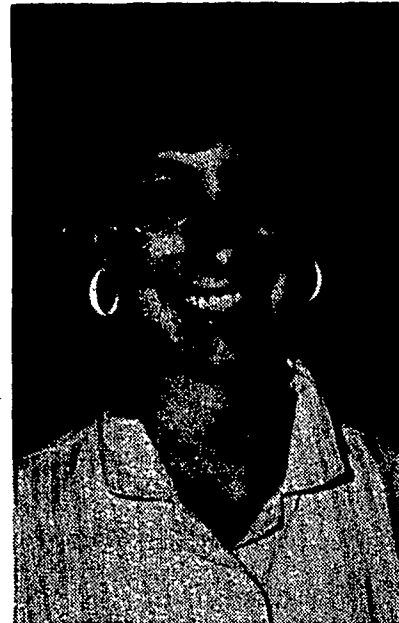

First of all, the accident took place in the batting cage, not on the playing field. When it was realized what happened, people reacted very quickly, caring and dependably. The manager immediately when to his vehicle to get the first aid kit. With the help of other parents, the child was then laid on the ground. The manager then wrapped the child's head, applying pressure and applied an ice pack. At the same time, one of the parents made the call to the paramedics on his car phone, and also tried to reach the home of the child thru the numbers given by the manager. Someone else propped his head and covered him with a blanket. At that time the play was resumed. The child was totally attended to, never ignored or left alone. During a happening such as this it is very difficult to keep concerned adults to a minimum as not to interfere with the emergency attention being given. I feel it was in good judgment on the umpires' and managers' part to resume play, for no other reason but to keep twenty little leaguers occupied since their teammate was, at that time, resting comfortably.

When the paramedics arrived, they rebanded his head, put him on a stretcher and left for the hospital. The paramedics were given all the information by the manager. A parent from the team told the manager to stay and he would follow to the hospital. The mother did show up at the park shortly afterward at which time the manager approached her in her car and explained what happened. Before the game was over, the injured child came back to watch the end of the game.

I, as a parent, felt very satisfied as to the attention,

capabilities and efforts given to the child by the manager and all other parents who helped. I feel they did a fine job and should be commended for their behavior, not scorned.

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Morton Grove author 'high on sci-fi'

A former Morton Grove resident, whose love of fantasy and science-fiction was an integral part of her growing up years, recently had her first book "Dragonharper" published.

Jody Lynn Nye, who recently moved with her husband, William Fawcett to Lake Zurich, said her book deals with the world of Pern, the subject of nine books written by science-fiction writer Ann McCaffrey.

Nye said she received permission from the author to write the book which tells the story of Robinton (a masterharper), characterized in McCaffrey's original stories. In "Dragonharper", Robinton is on an adventure quest in a magic land.

Nye's book is the first Pern work not written by McCaffrey. "She (McCaffrey) was interested in my concept of a Pern story and even wrote an introductory essay in my book," Nye said.

To those not familiar with the McCaffrey books, Nye explained there are three established divisions of society on Pern. "There are Holders made up of farmers, city people and administrators; there are the Halls featuring the ferrymen, cart makers and tanners and there are the Weyrs who are dragons and dragon riders."

She added the masterharper is a respected member of society. "They are historians and are in the role of minstrels singing about the history of Pern wherever they go. They also resolve disputes and occasionally officiate at weddings."

Nye's book was published by Crosswords Adventures. It is the first Pern "interactive game novel", which is both a game and an adventure.

She noted that in the book's introduction, it asks readers if they have ever read a book and then thought they would have been able "To think more clearly or see a way out of the hero's dilemma. In a Crosswords adventure, readers will have the opportunity to do just that," Nye said.

Using dice, each reader has the opportunity to make his own decision, and each of these decisions will affect whether the hero succeeds in his quest, or even survives.

"McCaffrey and I both agree

this is a good way to get young people into reading," she said. "It's a book where persons can actively participate in their reading instead of relying on television."

Nye became interested in science-fiction in her early teens after reading "The Crystal Gryphon" by Andre Norton. "It was a beautiful story and I became hooked. I also grew up with Dr. Who and Star Trek on television and still watch the reruns," she said.

Nye graduated from Maine East High School in 1975, where she was involved in writing scripts for the school's radio station WMTH. She attended the University of Southern California for one year participating in the cinema and news department. She transferred to Loyola University to earn a degree in communications and English.

Nye became interested in writing "Dragonharper" as a free lance writer for Mayfair Games in Niles, which produces board games and fantasy role games. She helped develop the Ellery Queen Magazine Mystery game and authored the supplementary mystery module for the Nick Velvet Mystery game; a character developed by Edward Hoch.

"Dragonharper" is available at Walden's Book Store, Kröch and Brentanos and Dalton Books. Nye has a second book coming out in February, 1988, "The Encyclopedia of Xanth" in the fantasy venue created by the noted science fiction writer, Piers Anthony.

Urinary tract infections affect many people of all ages, but some experience such frequent repeat bouts with these infections that they consider them an accepted annoyance of life. "Repeated urinary tract infections are not normal, and require treatment," explained Herbert Sohn, M.D., a Weiss Hospital staff specialist in urology and a member of the Strauss Group of surgeons.

Speaking to an audience at a free Community Education Seminar presented by Weiss Hospital in recognition of "Older Americans' Month", Dr. Sohn said, "Not all people have the same symptoms when they have a urinary tract infection, but all should be treated to avoid potentially serious complications."

Common symptoms include discomfort, pain or a burning sensation while urinating, frequent urination, or a feeling of immediate need to urinate. Other potential symptoms may include back pain, abdominal pain, fever, and the appearance of blood in the urine, noted Dr. Sohn.

Infection starts when bacteria gain entry into the urinary tract, where they can multiply rapidly, according to Dr. Sohn. "The

bacteria that most often cause urinary tract infections are those normally found in the stool and, therefore, in and around the rectum. These bacteria may accumulate in significant numbers in this area, which in the female is very close to the urethra, the tube through which urine passes from the bladder to the outside of the body. This is believed to be the reason that women are more susceptible to urinary tract infections than men, explained Dr. Sohn.

"It is not uncommon for urinary tract infections to recur," he said. "Repeated episodes can be either a relapse, recurrence of infection by the same bacteria, or reinfections, a new 'infection' caused by different bacteria. Generally, most reinfections occur within weeks or months of the preceding urinary tract infection, and most relapses occur shortly after the patient has completed the therapy course for the initial infection. Relapse is likely to oc-

cure if treatment is stopped too soon."

In cases of recurring infections, the physician may recommend other diagnostic tests, including an x-ray called an IVP (intravenous pyelogram), in which contrast material is injected into an arm vein before the x-ray is taken. This contrast material shows up in the urinary tract, and enables the physician to see if there are any obstructions which could be interfering with normal urinary flow.

Dr. Sohn recommended several ways to minimize the risk of recurrent urinary tract infections. "Drink at least eight glasses of water every day, and avoid alcohol, tea, coffee and carbonated beverages, which can irritate the urinary tract. Also, if you are on medication for a current infection, take it for as long as it has been prescribed, even if you are feeling much better. This will help minimize the likelihood of a recurrence."

which take about 60% of your total tax dollars.

While ole Rip Van Suburbanite is sleeping three of every four years, the guys at the public trough are adding 10% to their feedbag each and every year. Or putting it another way, the feed which makes the public bag plumper comes from ole Rip Van Sub's bag which shrinks each and every year.

Go back to sleep for a couple of more years.

A couple of weeks ago, during a fiercely hot day, a neighbor of The Bugle's passed out in the alley next to our office. We were told a Chicago resident, who works in a next door store, called the Chicago emergency 911 number rather than the Niles 827-2121 number. Unfortunately, if there was a time lag in notifying Niles, it really didn't matter. But it is imperative every resident should know his local emergency number.

We notice Skokie has a 911 emergency number. Because the number is used nationally, it would certainly be helpful if the entire country used this same number. And certainly, here at home, 911 would be a welcome improvement over the present numbers which requires memorizing seven digits. And if a Niles resident is in Morton Grove, he has to look up its 963-2121 number and in Park Ridge, 825-2131. How much simpler one number would be for all communities. Not only would it be simpler, but knowing one number could prove life-saving in many cases.

Niles now has foot police patrols on its streets. About 40 reserve police officers will be on the streets two to three days a week until Labor Day from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.

While moaning about taxes three paragraphs ago, nevertheless, this extra-cost project

seems very re-assuring. Big bucks Niles, with its wealth of sales tax, can better afford such a project than its sales tax poor neighbors. Nilesites have to be pleased with the new service. If the money is available, it would be a real plus for the community if the service could be extended through the fall.

In Duncan McKenzie's library report last week he noted the district will lose 22 million dollars in assessed valuation from property disannexing from the district at the north end of the library district (the Zenith property, etc.) He also noted the branch library had been costing the district \$250,000 a year and the new parking lot property at Oakton and Waukegan will cost \$100,000 to improve.

The library district is forced to cut back and eliminate programs because of the money shorts, which means villagers are being short-changed because of the district's money woes. Meanwhile, the village's sales tax money continues to flow into the community. It seems obvious the village's taking over the library district would solve the many problems the library district now has. And since most of our neighbors' libraries are run by the villages, it begs the question why Niles shouldn't follow suit? Each year it is delayed, children and adults are being penalized. They are living in a tax-rich village but are being robbed of a comparable library system. Employees are suffering from lower paid salaries. Library services are being cut back. And the village continues to get mountains of money from its many retail outlets in town. The time has come to move the library forward. It takes only a handful of residents to initiate action which would improve this part of the community for all its residents by petitioning for the village to annex the library district.

It's true that if one of our paramedic units is tied up with a victim who really doesn't need us, another unit can be dispatched from the next nearest station. However, he continued, "time is the only thing that we have going for us and for you, and we lose this advantage because of the abuse."

Fire administrators all over the country are looking for a solution to this ever increasing problem. Some cities have started filtering calls and dispatching only for true emergencies. Others have begun programs of billing for transportation where no emergency existed. Still some other departments have authorized their paramedics to refuse to transport when they, and the hospital staff with whom they are in radio contact, judge to call to be a "non-emergency."

Some "non-emergency" calls cited by the paramedics are direct hospital admissions where some "victims" have actually been waiting with suitcase in hand, minor cuts or bruises and

alcohol abuse.

Niles has two fully equipped paramedic units, each representing a \$95,000 investment, manned around the clock. And with Niles' participation in the successful R.E.D. system with five other neighboring departments, there are five more such units on duty. All have earned accolades from hospital personnel for their know-how and efficiency.

"We don't want to deprive our citizens of this most valuable, life saving service, but something has to be done. After all, how would you feel if one of your loved ones was struggling for life but had to wait for additional minutes, because the nearest unit was tied up unnecessarily down the street treating a cut finger?" Kinowski concluded.

shopping strip will be resolved. He added this has to be an improvement on the present eyesore condition of that corner.

Highland Apartments will be the anchor store of the shopping center. The annexation agreement provides for landscaping, ease of access to the shopping area, no commercial signs on Washington and limited hours. Trustee Don Sneider promised to watch for congestion and problems with severance.

In other business, the appointment of Corporation Counsel Jordan Kaplan was approved and he took his seat on the Board. Mr. Kaplan has been the Village Prosecutor for many years.

Mayor Richard Flickinger proclaimed Sunday, August 2, as Blood Drive Day. It cannot be emphasized enough how critical the blood shortage is. The Village is in desperate need of donors. The location for the drive will be the American Legion Hall, 6140 Dempster from 12:00 noon until 4:00 p.m. All donors will receive beer and brats. Buford the Bloodhound made an appearance to aid in the plea.

A special use ordinance was granted to Phenix Management to develop the property described as 7118 Golf Road as a parking lot. This is the area adjacent to Loehmann's. At the planning commission meeting, no residents expressed any objections to the action.

An equally large group of angry residents appeared at the meeting to voice their displeasure over the parking situation at China Chef located at Lincoln and Mason. The source of irritation appears to lie in the fact that the restaurant does not have sufficient parking and the overflow cars park on the nearby residential streets. For several months the Traffic and Safety Commission has been trying to solve the issue between the residents and the owner Art Fong. Residents asked for special resident parking permits on Mason which were denied. A request by Nick Lianos of Mar-

mor St. was denied for closing off the alley behind the 5900 block of Lincoln Avenue. Even though everyone involved seems to agree the alley, which is half unimproved, is a hazard and is used as a thoroughfare by those exiting China Chef, the request was denied.

The owner, Mr. Fong, is looking into tearing down a house at the end of Mason and creating several more parking spaces. Residents were extremely upset at the potential loss of property value such a proposal seems destined to bring.

Toward the end of this debate after petitions from the residents protesting the potential parking lot were presented to Village Clerk Wilma Wendt, a resident of the Mason block in question, Cindy Suchan, made some suggestions for a solution to the problem. These included making Mason between S. Park and Lincoln one way going south to relieve the traffic congestion.

This would be coupled with allowing diagonal parking on the east side of Mason between the alley and Lincoln along with closing off the alley in back of China Chef and allowing them to use it for extra parking.

Niles man leads police to hit and run driver

A Niles resident used a little detective work to help police apprehend a hit-and-run driver after an accident at Oakton St. and Cumberland Ave. Monday causing the victim's car to leave the road and come to rest beside a house.

Maine Township residents last year had increases from 20 percent to 33 percent during its quadrennial re-assessment year. In 1985, Niles Township experienced increases during its quadrennial re-assessment year.

Following is a list of tax rates announced by the Cook County Assessor's Office that will be used to compute 1986 tax bills for Maine and Niles Townships. The listed rates are the sums levied by a number of taxing authorities within the municipalities. Property owners in different areas will pay taxes at different rates, depending on which park, school, library or fire protection district is providing these services.

Morton GROVE School District 63...9.759. In 1985, the tax rate was 9.332.

Niles School District 63...8.197, a 2.5 percent increase over last year's 7.995.

School District 64 in a portion of Niles, the tax rate figure is 8.054, an increase of 1.8 percent over last year's 7.911.

Niles School District 67 (east of Harlem)...6.851, a decrease of 4 percent from the 1985 tax rate of 7.151.

Niles School District 71...5.701, a decrease of 3.89 percent from last year's 5.902.

Morton Grove School District 70...8.194, an increase of 5 percent from last year's 7.801.

noted Emrikson would be hard to replace. "I personally hate to see him go."

Emrikson joined the police department in 1957 and was appointed police chief after Blase was elected in 1957 to his first term as mayor.

The police chief, who is 59, said he plans to remain in Niles after he retires and will work "at some job." I have had offers to work with the (police) Metro Training Board, or the crime lab for testing drugs, as well as the private sector," he said. "My retirement is almost a year away, and there is plenty of time to make a decision on what I'm going to do."

As for his years on the Niles police force, the police chief said, "I would not trade those years for anything."

feasibility study on the cost, structure and other criteria to establish a "high quality" day care center at Ballard School.

At a pre-board meeting Tuesday, Goldberg said she had researched day care centers and talked with experts in children and family services. She noted that Elk Grove and Palatine Townships partially subsidize day care centers and "it is working for them."

The estimated cost to the village for operating a high quality day care center would be \$379,000. Of that amount, about 75 percent would go for staff salaries (directors, teachers, teacher aides, food handlers).

"The figure (\$379,000) is theoretical at this point...it could be higher or lower," she said.

Goldberg said the facility could accommodate 115 children with the majority in the 3 months to 5 1/2 year old age bracket. There would be 15 Kindergarten and 30 children in the after-school program.

"A high quality day care center would mean reduced fees for Niles families...about a third less than others in the area," she said.

"Residents could also take advantage of the after-school program."

Various board members discussed whether the village wanted a day care center "just to have one" or for the purpose of attracting young families to Niles.

Village Trustee Abe Selman commented, "these issues should be resolved before making a decision on a day care center."

The board agreed to put the matter on hold until a meeting is arranged to discuss the day care plan.

In regular business, the board approved a request by Tony Schmid for a Class B industrial tax classification for Howard Commons, 7651 Howard St. (an industrial multi-tenant building).

Schmid explained the classification (introduced by Cook County for industrial tax relief incentives) would mean reduced assessed valuation for the building over a four-year period. "This would allow tenants to occupy space at less cost," he said, adding the tax portion of the rent would be reduced about

would not be similar to those in New York, saying it would be a first class establishment with a public restaurant, dining area and a lounge where the betting windows would be located. "The facility would have 20 to 30 employees," he noted.

"Hawthorne Race Track has been in my family since the turn of the century and we never had any problems that I can recall. Village fears are unfounded because these legalized parlors are not remotely like the messenger-type services which had an unsavory reputation," Carey said. "Betting parlors are strictly regulated by the state."

A consortium of Hawthorne, Spsman Park, Maywood Park and Balmoral Park plan to jointly own and operate a total of eight parlors around the state. Under state legislation, each race track is allowed two branch parlors for

half. Plans are to construct a 50,000 square foot building adjacent to Howard Commons. "We anticipate 20 or 21 new businesses will occupy the building which will benefit Niles," Schmid said.

In other business, the board approved an engineering service agreement between the village and Donahue & Associates. The engineering firm will oversee construction of sanitary sewers on Lyons and Washington. The sanitary sewer project for several village neighborhoods will total \$800,000 with Niles getting \$469,000 back from the state.

...passed an ordinance that will allow the village to conduct bidding for bench advertising and would have jurisdiction on the locations for the benches.

...approved vacating an alley at New England and Caldwell for the use of tenants for a driveway.

...passed a resolution for payroll deductions at the request of employees who want to join the ICMA Retirement Corporation Deferred Compensation Plan.

The plan permits employees to participate in stock options and investment programs, according to Gary Karshna, Niles finance director.

including Cripe, Stetina and Superintendent of Schools Dr. Eldon Gleichman. No additional salaries are connected with Cripe's appointments.

As director of finance, Cripe was also appointed authorized agent for the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund and the Teachers Retirement System.

Bowen retired under the district's early retirement policy and will continue to work less than 600 hours a year for the district. From August 1, 1987 to January 1, 1989, his salary will be \$28,074.20. According to the early retirement policy, Bowen will receive a salary increment of \$7,626.12 and \$830 for unused sick leave.

Board members also rescinded a resolution to extend a contract for former Buildings and Grounds Director Joseph Irpino. Stetina said, "Mr. Irpino found he could not accept the terms of the extension." Irpino's job became almost unnecessary following the board hiring of a maintenance service.

As an addition to the shakeup, Julie Isaacson will leave the central office where she was in charge of special education and return to the district as a teacher.

At a former meeting, board members appointed Michael Johann as director of special education.

Board members approved extension of maternity leave for Isaacson from June, 1987 through the 1987-88 school year.

Applications for director of curriculum are in the process of review by Gleichman. He said an appointment may be presented to the board by the August 18 meeting. Former director of curriculum, Dr. Lenore Page, was dismissed by the district.

According to board action, Forest Care, a day care center, will have 10 days to vacate its present location at Melzer School. Melzer will be needed to house several tenants from Oak School who must leave when life and safety work is scheduled to begin at Oak this fall. Oak tenants include the Maine-Niles Association of Special Recreation (MNASR), a recreational facility for the handicapped; Olive Tree Congregation, church; Kid Care, day school; and East Maine Multi-cultural Education (EM-ME), district educational program for non-English speaking children.

In contract awards, the board allotted \$34,580 to repair boilers in the district's seven schools. Five of the schools are open to students.

On advice of attorney and recommendation of a board committee, board members rejected all bids to repair the roof at Oak School in Niles and will seek bids for "replacement" of the roof. Joe Buri, a district spokesman, said a warranty for a completely replaced roof is about 10 years as compared to five years for a repaired roof. A contract for repairing the school's roof would have cost about \$69,000.

Other contracts included awards for shade repairs and uniforms and jackets.

Board members were informed that the Center on Deafness, now located in Apollo School in Des Plaines, is interested in renewing its lease but with additional space. Gleichman said the Center's requests will probably be given to the board in August.

District 63 serves Niles, Des Plaines and Morton Grove.

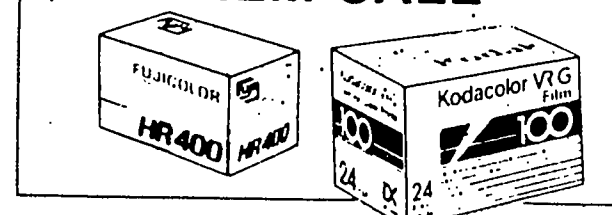


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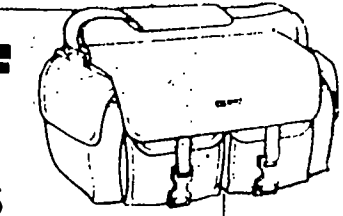
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
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
