Niles Park District swamped with revenue losses

It was announced at Tuesday night's meeting the Niles Park District is literally being swamped with revenue losses. The flood damage caused by last week's torrential rainfall and another incident of vandalism

have caused considerable expense and disruption of services at many Park District facilities. Tam Golf Course sustained extensive flood damage which resulted in a 10 day shut down and a loss of \$2,000 in revenue.

Several fairways were under water with turf and sand traps sustaining damage. Spraying is under way to prevent disease and insect infestation. The clubhouse suffered severe damage to

Abt and architect Larry Basel proposed the lot would have ingress on Oketo as well as ingress and egress on Dempster. They also planned a six foot woodstock fence for the south and west sides of the property.

RAINSTORM '87...the deluge will find a niche in weather history with the so-called "100 year rain" that measured 9.22 inches in a 24 hour period.

When it was all over, the majority of weary suburban homeowners labored for three days hauling out debris and sodden household items from flooded basements for garbage collection. In addition, the rain-swollen yards emitted a stench from the water sewage that people had to contend with until the sun dried terra firma.

It was the worst of times for adults, and best of times for children. The rain-created lakes on neighborhood streets provided sea-going activities as children and teenagers got into small pontoon boats and air mattresses and floated down the street. On Emerson St. in Niles, two teenagers paddled a canoe on the water waving to trapped homeowners looking out the windows of their homes.

The activity wasn't all fun and games. Older teenagers in the sea-going crafts acted as couriers when they were flagged by neighbors to deliver messages to other neighbors or go overland to make phone calls for residents at Golf Mill shopping center after telephones went dead in the area.

The ravishing rains also brought out the neighbor-helping-neighbor philosophy. After it stopped, the more fortunate homeowners who had very little flooding came to the aid of their neighbors, assisting in pumping out water-logged basements and other clean-up chores. Garden furniture that had floated into other yards was collected and put back in place and meals were served in neighbors' homes for the flood victims. It was true Americana spirit.

In other storm-related incidents, Maine township officials had their shares of woes when 100 unincorporated residents of Des Plaines stormed the township hall on Ballard and Home Ave. on Sat. to complain about backed-up sewers resulting in heavy flooding of basements and streets.

Reportedly, some voiced suspicion that the Metropolitan Sanitary district had closed off storm drains from the neighborhood to prevent flooding in nearby Park Ridge.

Township officials argued in vain that was not case, and explaining that backed-up sewers and flooding had affected all the suburbs

2 last-minute candidates file for Oakton Board

Tension mounted Monday in Oakton College's administrative office as the 5:00 p.m. deadline approached for filing petitions for their Board of Trustees for November's election. Only one petitioner, seven year incumbent, Cecile Vye, had filed. It appeared Oakton might face a unique situation.

Late that afternoon, almost under the wire, petitions were submitted by Jody Wadwa and John DiLeo. What began as a one-person race is now a contest between three very different individuals. Each of the three candidates represents a different background and has different reasons for wanting to serve a six year term as trustee.

Incumbent Cecile Vye, a seven-year veteran of the Board, holds a Doctorate in Education. She has authored educational text books and helped initiate the honors program. Vye had no second thoughts about serving another term. She stated, "Oakton has never been in better shape. We have a strong President, administrative staff, and an outstanding faculty. Everyone is working well together, and it's a thrill to be a

part of this."

Candidate John DiLeo freely admits his was a last minute decision to enter the race. DiLeo has consistently agreed with Trustee Kenneth Latos' outspoken opposition to many of the fiscal and curriculum-related motions passed by the Board. With Latos not seeking reelection.

Reduced assessments for flood damaged properties

Case continued in Niles Park arson

A Niles man who appeared at the Des Plaines District Court last Friday to answer arson charges in connection with the Aug. 12 fire at the Niles Recreation Building, 7877 Milwaukee Ave., received a continuance to Sept. 8, at which time he will be arraigned prior to trial.

Anthony Elarde, 20, 7845 Odell St. was charged with arson, burglary and criminal damage to property after he and two juveniles broke into the Rec building and allegedly set fire to the refreshment stand and storage room area in the facility facing the pool. A few items of office equipment were also taken from the building. Elarde is out on \$35,000 bond, according to Det. Dennis McEnerney.

Revised figure for the estimated damage to the building is \$60,000, according to Gabriel Berrafato, Niles park district board attorney. The two juveniles who pleaded guilty to arson will appear Oct. 14 at the Skokie District Juvenile Court for sentencing.

Rec center break-in causes \$500 damage

Unknown persons gained entry through a door in the southwest lower level of the Niles Recreation Center Building, 7877 Milwaukee Ave.

Once inside, the offenders pried locks off five cabinets in the upstairs kitchen, the lock on a janitor's closet and two other locks on cabinets near the closet. The lock on the refrigerator door, and a door knob of a closet were also pried off, according to police reports.

Nothing appeared to be missing. Two bottles of glitter were found half empty and spread on the floor and around the outside of the building, which was dusted for fingerprints.

Damage was estimated at \$500.

Maine Township Assessor Thomas E. Rueckert says property owners who have been severely damaged by the recent flood may come to his office at 1700 Ballard Rd., Park Ridge, to file a complaint form for reduced property assessments.

To qualify for an assessment reduction, there would have to be structural damage to the foundation or walls, the flooring in the living area or central heating and air conditioning units. Assessment relief is not available for damage to personal property such as carpeting or furniture or

for normal weather damage such as basement seepage, roof leaks or loss of gutters.

Properties are eligible for assessment reductions if the damage was substantial enough to affect the market value of the property.

To file for assessment reduction, the property owner must complete and sign an Assessed Valuation Complaint Form.

Along with the complaint form, the following materials should be included:

Time to check earnings estimate

People who receive Social Security checks and work should take time to check their earnings. Thomas A. Curin, Social Security manager in Des Plaines, said recently.

Those who earlier estimated that in 1987 earnings would not exceed the annual limit should check to make sure they have not earned more than they anticipated. The 1987 annual limit is \$8,160 for people 65 through 69 and \$6,000 for people under 65 all of 1987.

If a person's annual earnings exceed the limit, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the limit. A person will have to repay any benefits that were incorrectly paid.

If a person finds that he or she is earning more or less than expected, he or she should notify Social Security right away so that benefits can be adjusted and an overpayment avoided. In 1986, approximately 1700 Des Plaines area Social Security

beneficiaries were identified as being overpaid because their earnings exceeded the annual limit. The total amount of benefits incorrectly paid them was approximately \$2,000,000. This number represents 35 percent of the people under age 70 in the area who estimated they would work and earn over the annual limit.

If a person's earnings are less than expected, benefits may be restarted if they have been stopped.

As a car approaches and the beam focuses into the distance, the frightened deer regains its sight and has a tendency to rush across the road into the car. If the highway is crowded, brace yourself and try not to swerve. But if no other motorists are near, it is better to swerve away from the animal because of its weight.

Deers are found in abundance in every part of Illinois—even Cook County—and their numbers are increasing. In 1978, 2,175 deer were killed, while the number swelled to 4,517 in 1985. Help to preserve this Illinois resource by driving carefully.

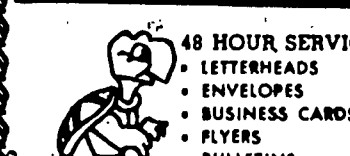
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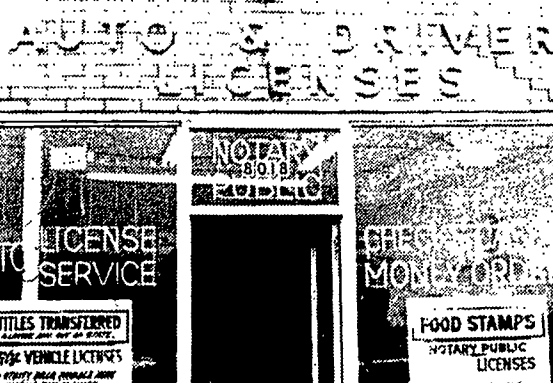
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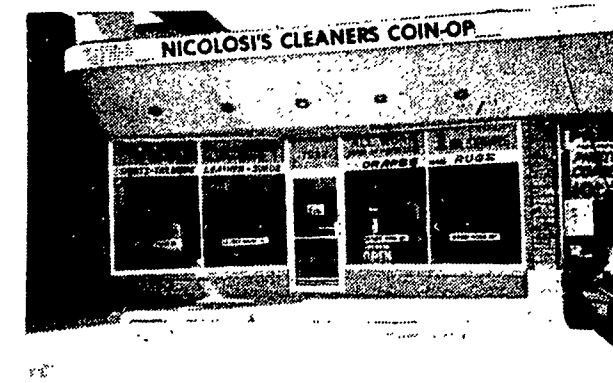
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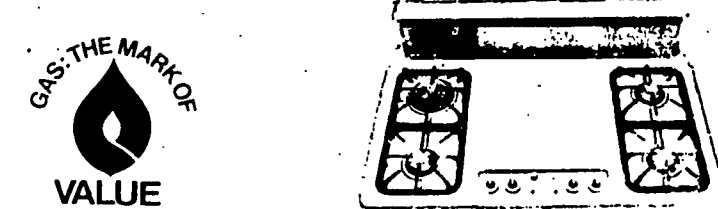
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Vehicle accidents involving animals

More than 9,500 Illinois motorists were in vehicle accidents involving animals last year, according to the Illinois Department of Transportation. The accidents resulted in 627 human injuries, some serious, and four fatalities.

When an animal darts across a

street or highway, do not panic. You may have to make a split-second decision on whether to hit the animal or swerve out of its way, which could mean the difference between safety or injury to yourself or another driver.

In urban areas, pets, squirrels, raccoons and other small animals

often cause collisions. Avoid hitting the animals if it can be done safely. However, motorists who brake suddenly are often hit from behind, and those who turn suddenly may collide with oncoming cars.

Since there is less traffic in rural areas, there is less risk of an accident by swerving to avoid an animal. Farm animals can be large and hitting them is serious. Therefore, swerve to avoid them unless other vehicles are near.

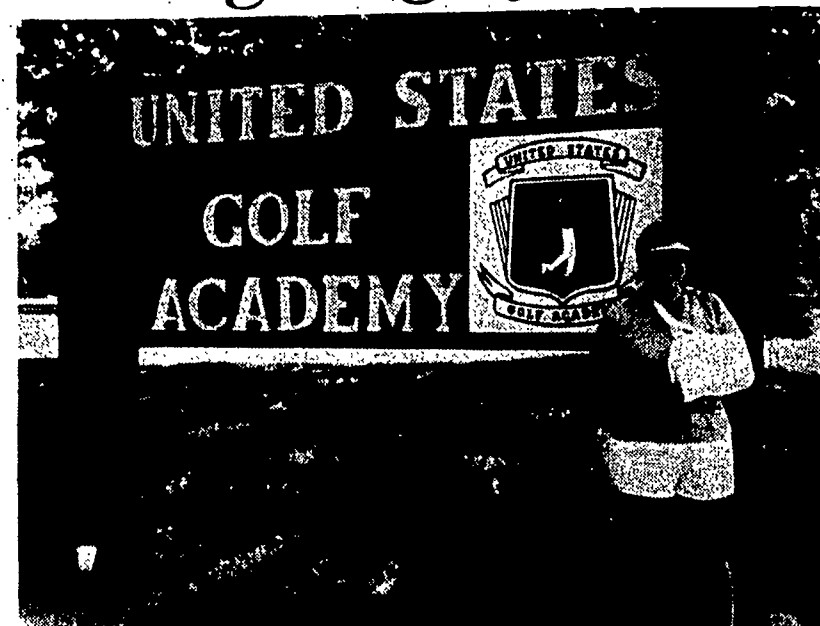

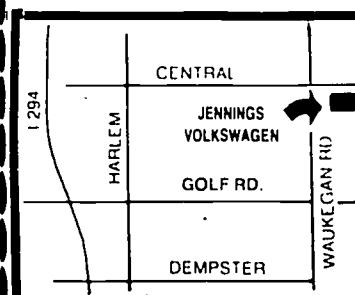

Northeastern expands Honors Program

Northeastern Illinois University has announced the expansion of its Honors Program beginning with the fall 1987 trimester. Juniors and seniors must meet the following requirements to join the Level 2 Honors Program: complete Level 1; or a 4.25 GPA; or honors participation at another 4-year college; or an associate's degree with a 4.25 or higher GPA.

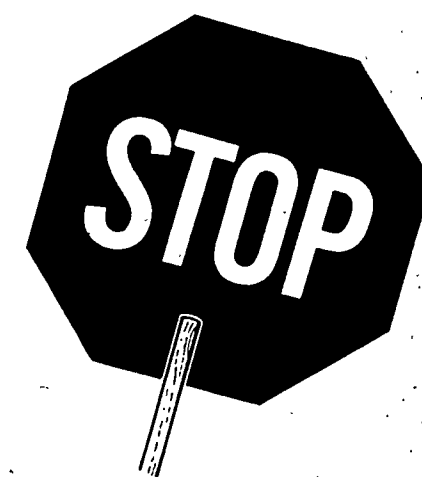

Changes in mortgage rates cause homebuyers to reconsider ARMs

When mortgage interest rates went into reverse and returned to double digit levels this spring, home buyers began to take a second look at adjustable rate mortgages.

"Adjustable rate mortgages (ARMs) appear to be regaining popularity among home buyers," said Bill Alston of ERA Callero & Catino Realty, Niles. "During April the average interest rate on 30 year fixed-rate mortgages climbed two percentage points, from 8.5 or 9 percent to 10.5 or 11 percent. Meanwhile initial rates on adjustables remained steady at about 7.5 or 8 percent."

Alston said the difference of two to three percent in these rates makes ARMs an attractive option. "Adjustable rates also are more attractive today because consumers have become more accustomed to the concept," said Alston. "When ARMs were first introduced, they were a revolutionary concept, we went all the way through a learning curve."

Today's adjustable rate mortgages are attractive to home buyers because ARMs mean lower monthly payments. Although rates and monthly payments will rise if rates overall go up, ARMs today have built in controls that establish limits on how much rates can rise over a period of time. A standard ARM can't rise more than two percentage points a year or six percent over the life of the loan. "Caps build in an element of control and predictability," Alston said. "It's important to note, too, that in times of declining rates, ARMs too will decline."

Alston said the National Association of Realtors has predicted that this summer half of all new mortgages could be ARMs, up from 24 percent in March.

Comparing monthly payments with and without an ARM, Alston said that on an \$80,000 loan, the monthly payment not including taxes and insurance would be about \$559 on an ARM at 7.5 percent and about \$717 on a 30-year fixed rate loan at 10.25 percent. If

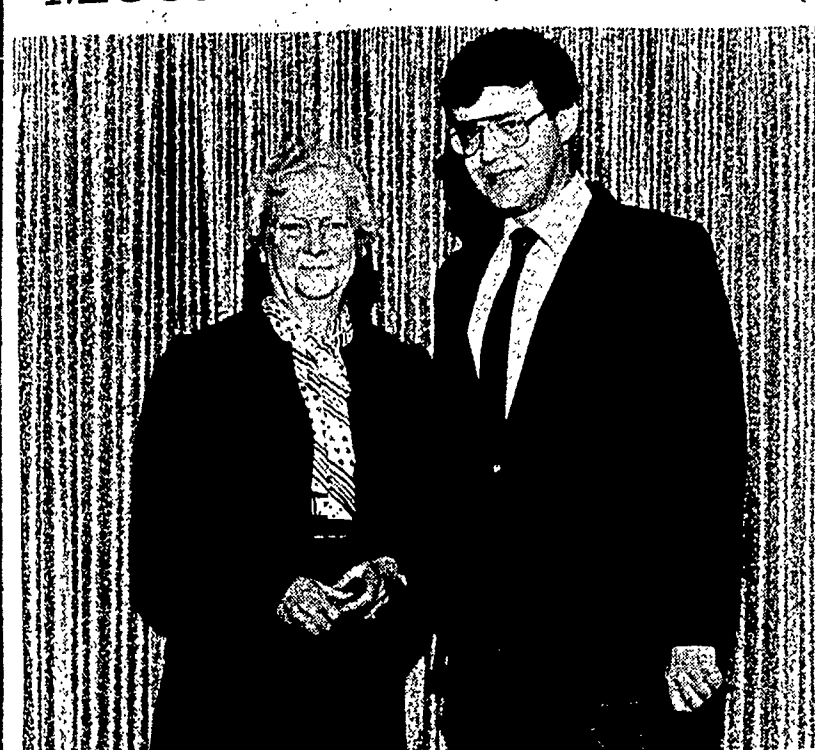

"There are still so many things that we can't explain," according to Planetarium Senior Astronomer Eric Carlson, co-author of the show. "We see the inconsistencies in the theories and we observe things in space that just don't fit with what we 'know' now."

"There are even secrets hidden right next door in our own solar system," Carlson adds excitedly. "Some astronomers believe there is a tenth planet beyond Pluto, Planet X. The search has been on since Pluto was discovered in 1930."

Long ago the nature and movement of the stars were mysteries but telescopes brought the planets and stars much closer. Now the development of more advanced methods for observing allows astronomers to peer into the previously unseen realm of invisible light.

"What we are finding out," says Carlson, "is that almost all of the energy and matter in the universe is invisible."

"In actuality, much of what goes on in the universe is hidden from us," he adds. "Our eyes are not sensitive to all the colors of light waves. Consequently, we must rely on other means for observing."

"Secrets of the Hidden Universe" offers an up-to-date view of current knowledge and theories of the universe. "We look at some very recent developments in astronomy and astrophysics, which I think are fascinating," comments Carlson. "For example, astronomers have found that space itself is completely filled with invisible microwave light. This microwave 'ocean' makes up 99

percent of the total energy in the universe! We believe this 'glow' is light left over from the birth of the universe, the initial surge of energy we call the Big Bang."

One astronomer has even predicted that the Milky Way Galaxy will collide with the neighboring Andromeda Galaxy some four billion years from now. The collision will feed the giant black holes that seem to lie at the center of the two galaxies creating what Carlson terms "an awesome display of cosmic fireworks."

After the liberation he was a displaced person until 1947 when he came to Chicago. While studying at night he worked as a carpenter during the daytime. In 1948 he built his first house in West Rogers Park and went into the construction business with his father-in-law and brother-in-law. In subsequent years they built thousands of residences in the north and northwest suburbs.

He went home to visit where his parents died. He died in the arms of his brother while going to the hospital in Warsaw, Poland.

Niles, Morton Grove and Des Plaines.

The organization approached Oakton officials (after considering alternate sites) after the lease expired at their current headquarters in the Mount Prospect Library. They occupied about 1,800 square feet of space in the building. The OCC suite was selected because of its central location to membership towns. In addition, the conference and the college have similar functions, in which both have federal depositories (government material, books) which can be used for reference by both agencies, the spokesman said.

The proposed plan to construct the \$700,000 two-story building containing 8,000 square feet of floor space was approved in early June by the NWMC board. The Oakton Community College gave its approval later that month. The Illinois Community College Board is expected to meet Sept. 8, and if the plan is approved, construction will begin at the end of that month.

Oak School asbestos removal delayed by roof repairs

Because of needed roof repairs, asbestos removal from Oak School in Niles will be slowed down requiring transfer of three district tenants to Melzer School in Morton Grove, as approved by board members Tuesday at a regular meeting of East Maine Elementary School District 63.

The meeting was continued from the preceding Tuesday. Asbestos removal was scheduled to be completed at Oak before the beginning of school but the district architect certified that some roof beams are structurally unsound.

Tenants to be moved are the Maine-Niles Association of Special Recreation (MNASR), a township cooperative in charge of recreation for the handicapped; Kid-Care, a day school and the Olive Tree Congregation, a church.

In previous board action, members approved transfer to Melzer of four school programs. They are O-3 children to service infants with special needs and Project Predict for pre-schoolers with special needs. Also transferred is the East Maine Multicultural Program, or bilingual program, and Vision East, a regional program for the visually impaired.

Forecasting possible delays in the asbestos removal program, board members first scheduled

work on Melzer to be completed for temporary placement of students, programs or tenants from other district schools. Both Oak and Melzer schools were closed to students due to declining enrollment.

Tuesday, five days following last week's record rainfall, water damage was discovered in the south gymnasium of Gemini Junior High School in Niles, said Dr. Donald Stetina, assistant administrator of East Maine Elementary School District 63.

Stetina's comments to the Bugle followed the regular board meeting.

He said some floor tiles appeared to be buckling under furniture moved from an area in the gym. District administrators were scheduled to tour the building Wednesday, August 26, in a "Boot Brigade," said Stetina. Earlier reports by Gemini Principal Donald Huebner noted only "surface water" and light damage because most school furniture was removed during the summer to enable asbestos removal under the life and safety program.

In other action, board members approved the 1987-88 administrator contracts with salaries approved at an earlier board meeting.

"some" customer parking. Objectors included a resident from 8748 Oketo who contended the lot would be a nuisance. He said the traffic congestion would not be alleviated by the lot and suggested there is "all kinds of empty parking space in two shopping centers nearby." He said the parking lot would affect property values and it would not have a positive effect on the community. If the lot was approved he "could not see himself staying there (living on Oketo)."

A resident at 8712 Oketo said the lot would be a hazard to school children who use a bus there.

A man who lives at 7342 Carol behind the store said the next door Dempster Street car wash is an eye sore and he said his residence's value has depreciated \$35,000. While complimenting the Abts for being good business people he said their business is growing and there is enough parking space in the surrounding shopping centers.

An objector from 8738 Oketo said Abt's adding the lot would be the beginning of making their business another Polk Bros.

A resident at 7338 Carol asked where Abt would stop once he uses the one lot for parking.

An 8722 Oketo objector said Abt should keep his trucks off Dempster Street and they presently park them on the median strip which is a danger.

Niles trustee Pete Pesole made the motion to defeat the proposal. He said it isn't right for a resident to buy a house in a residential area and then have the next door house torn down. He said it was wrong and he felt "duty-bound" to oppose the change in the make-up of a residential area. Trustees Mahoney, Murphy and Selman joined with Pesole in opposing the parking lot while Marcheschi favored the lot.

After the proposal was

defeated Village President Blase rebuked a resident who brought up the information village clerk Frank Wagner owned the property. Blase said it was improper for the man to make any implication because Wagner was a village official. He said Wagner can sell his home to whomever he wants and Wagner upholds the laws and standards of the community.

Blase said there is a genuine conflict in the parking problem of a commercial business alongside a residential area and Niles is trying to solve it. He said it was obvious the village board was showing its concern.

Prior to the board meeting Niles officials dedicated new village properties at the entrance to the village on south Milwaukee Avenue. Eve Dattilo, chairman of the Garden Club of Illinois, helped with the dedication ceremony.

Niles man charged with drug dealing gets continuance

Steven Wikstrom, 31, who was in Niles Third District Court last Friday to answer charges involving drug dealing operations in his home at 8041 N. Oconto, received a continuance to Sept. 18.

Wikstrom was charged with possession and delivery of marijuana July 2 after his mother tipped police about her son's alleged drug dealing business, according to Det. Dennis

McEnerney of the Niles Police Department.

After police received permission from the mother to search the house, they found half a pound of marijuana in the closet, a plastic pipe and suspected cannabis in the garage. Police also allegedly took a phone call meant for the alleged offender for an order of drugs, according to McEnerney.

Wikstrom is out on \$5,000 bond.

carpeting and floors. Cleanup is still in progress. Damage costs are estimated at \$10,000.

The Recreation Center was hard hit as well. Two sump pumps failed. Four feet of water flooded the basement damaging the furnace and gas valves.

Vandals targeted the Recreation Center for the second time this summer. Almost on the heels of the burglary and fire of July 12, the center was burglarized August 17. Locks were broken on cabinets and doors, and some supplies were vandalized.

By comparison with the estimated \$55-60,000 worth of destruction caused by the earlier fire, the results of this break-in were minor. Insurance coverage has paid \$13,000 in cleanup costs and \$28,000 for damages to structure and contents leaving the Park District with a hefty remainder, most of which will probably not be reimbursed.

In other news, the Park District is eagerly awaiting a lease for use of the Ballard School property owned by the Village of Niles. The entire first floor and gym facility have been set aside for

Park District programs. The building is in the process of renovation. The first program to be housed in this facility, the preschool, is expected to begin around mid-September.

Commissioner Walter Beusse suggested the Tam Golf Course should receive additional support through a program called "Adopt a Green, Tee, or Fairway". Similar programs have been successful in other communities to generate extra funds. The Adoption Program involves tax deductible contributions of \$5,000 from individuals or corporations.

Favorable reports were given on the pools and day camp programs. As a regular part of its agenda, the Board awards special recognition to outstanding employees at each meeting. This month employees Dave Deja, Dave McFeggan, and Mary Ellen Smith were recognized for their contributions to Park District programs.

The next meeting of the Board is scheduled for September 10 at which time a public hearing will be held for the purpose of adopting the annual tax levy.

prepared by a professional at the cost of \$50 an hour, not to exceed \$3,000. Several field observations also would cost \$50 an hour, not to exceed \$1,000, he said.

Assistance in preparing specifications may be given by the village of Niles suggested board member Margaret Rajski and will be investigated by board members. Also, board members voted to seek other aid for bid preparations if the village is unable to help.

In other matters, Administrator D.J. McKenzie asked for higher staff salaries. He reported to board members that 10 percent of the library's 50 staff openings are vacant, salaries are not competitive with other libraries and employee morale is low.

According to McKenzie, the library has doubled the book budget. In addition, book circulation increased 43 percent at the main library since closing of the branch in January with a 3 percent increase district-wide over last year, he said.

Library employees, aided by automation, processed 79 percent more books than each of the prior

two years, said McKenzie. "We are putting through four times the amount of work," he said.

In response to McKenzie's report, Board President Terri Carman said the present level of staff pay should be raised. "If it means cutting back in some other areas, we may have to do it," she said.

Salaries now constitute about 43 percent of the total budget.

In other action, board members approved purchase of a \$1,000 per year maintenance contract for the newly-purchased book detection unit.

McKenzie said library staff discovered a problem in the unit only 14 days after the 90 day warranty expired. The detection unit hardware and installation cost about \$18,000.

In a report on the North Suburban Library System (NSLS), Board President Terri Carman said the Niles library borrowed more books than any other system library under the reciprocal borrowing plan. The library borrowed 16,000 books more than it lent and 10,000 more than the second highest borrower, said Carman.

arrived on the scene and first aid was administered, but there was no response. She was then transported to Lutheran General Hospital.

Police found an empty pill vial (belonging to the victim's husband, Marvin) on the ledge of the tub, along with a drinking glass.

An open vial of Tylenol was found on the vanity next to the tub and a bottle of pills marked Valium

were found in a purse in the master bedroom.

According to Niles Detective Dennis McEnerney, the husband was contacted at work who related that his wife sometimes took three to five valium pills at a time, but had no medical problems.

The body was taken to the Cook County Medical Examiner's Office where an autopsy will be performed. Police are waiting for a report to determine the cause of death, McEnerney said.
