Faculty Association subject to minor language modifications.

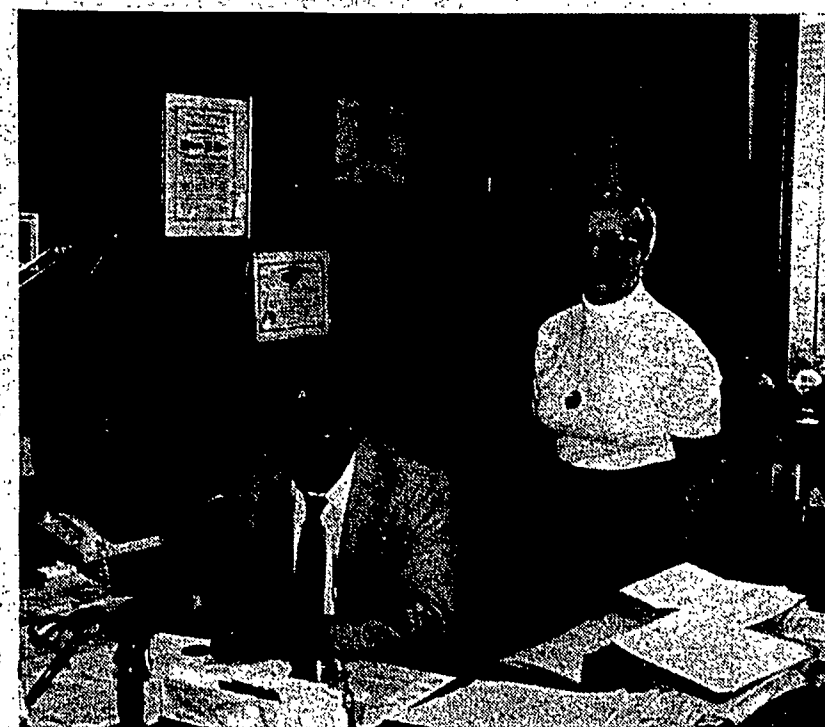

Video store brouhaha...Niles is getting out its ammunition to battle a newly-opened video store nestled in the Dempster Plaza shopping center between a florist shop and a gift store, which is renting alleged obscene material in adult section of the facility. Probably adding a thorn in the sides of officials are the flashing light bulbs around the store front to attract VCR buffs. One official compared it to a "honky tonk" shop and out of keeping with the rest of the shopping center.

However, the subject of controversy is not over aesthetics, but the sale and rental of X-rated movies...a "no no" in Niles since it passed its obscenity laws in the 1960's.

On the other side of the coin, owners of the video store claim that censorship is an abridgement of Constitutional rights.

The question of First Amendment rights versus village ordinances (under home rule powers) has come up before, where certain business operations were considered offensive to the community and became a matter of litigation in the courts.

A Niles resident recalled that in the early 1960's shortly after the obscenity ordinance was passed, Mayor Nicholas Blase spotted some "adult" soft cover books in a bookstore in the newly-opened Golf Mill shopping center...and soon after, they disappeared from the shelves.

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District 207 amends AIDS policy

In addition, the Superintendent/Principal may require a student to submit to an examination by a board-selected physician.

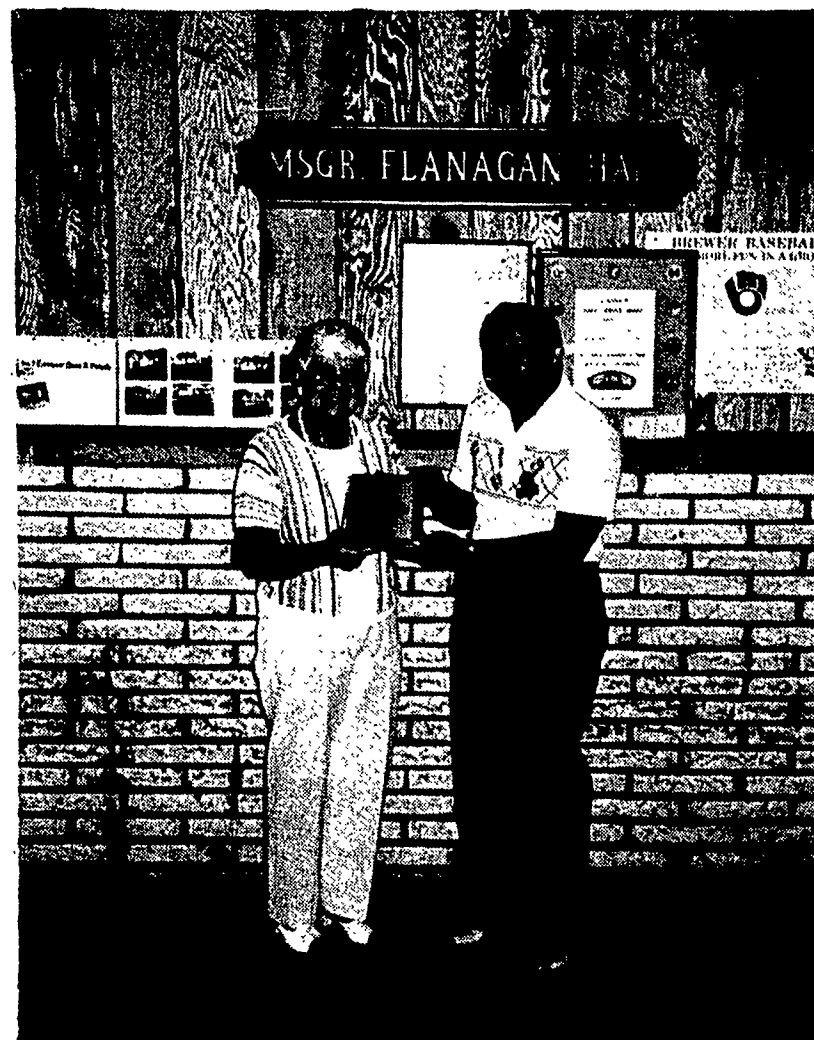

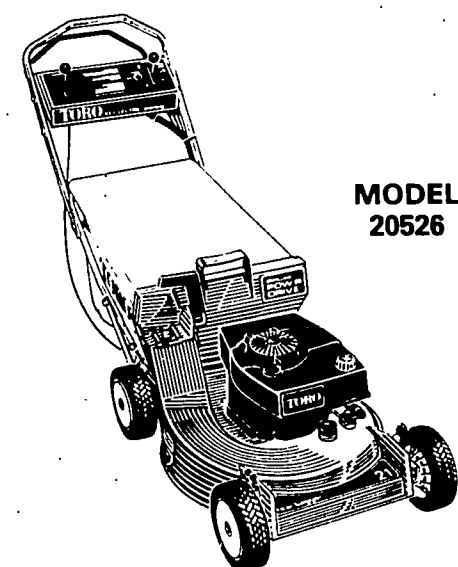

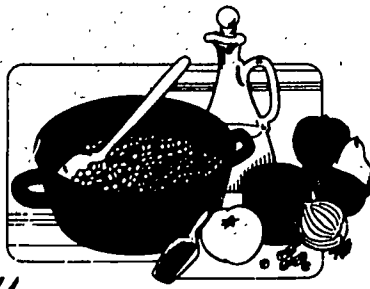

MICROWAVE MENUS

Hot Tamale!—Meal Made in Minutes

One of the hottest regional food favorites, whether eaten in a restaurant or cooked at home, is Mexican food. It's informal and fun food the whole family can enjoy.

Tamales are a basic Mexican food prepared with a seasoned ground or shredded meat filling, which is encased in a cornmeal or masa dough. An easy-to-make variation is a Micro-Quick Beef Tamale Pie. It uses a seasoned ground beef mixture placed in a casserole dish, topped with a cornbread batter and cooked in less than half an hour in the microwave oven.

Ground beef cooks quite efficiently in the microwave oven. To do so, shape one pound of ground beef into a ring in an all-plastic sieve or small colander. The need for pouring off the excess drippings can be eliminated by placing the sieve in a bowl. The bowl collects the drippings while the beef cooks. To speed the cooking process, stir the ground beef half-way through the cooking time and break it into smaller pieces.

Micro-Quick Beef Tamale Pie

Preparation time: 15 minutes
Cooking time: 11 to 12 minutes
1 pound ground beef
1/2 cup chopped onion
1 clove garlic, minced
1 tablespoon chili powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon ground cumin
2 dashes liquid hot pepper sauce
1 can (10 ounces) whole tomatoes, drained and broken up
1 can (8 ounces) refried beans
1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
1 can (3 ounces) chopped green chilies, drained
Cornbread Topping*

Combine ground beef, onion and garlic; arrange in a ring in all-plastic sieve or small colander. Place sieve in bowl; microwave at HIGH 3 minutes. Stir to break up beef. Continue cooking at HIGH 3 minutes; stir after removing

from oven. Pour off drippings. Place beef in bowl; sprinkle chili powder, salt, cumin and hot pepper sauce over beef, stirring to combine. Stir in tomatoes, refried beans, cheese and chilies. Place beef mixture in 9-inch round microwave-safe baking dish, pressing lightly to flatten top. Prepare Cornbread Topping; spoon around edge of baking dish. Microwave at HIGH 5 to 6 minutes or until topping is done, rotating dish 1/4 turn every 2 minutes. 4 servings. 577 calories per serving.

In just half an hour you can prepare a variation of a Mexican favorite when you make Micro-Quick Beef Tamale Pie.

*Cornbread Topping

1/3 cup cornmeal
1/3 cup flour
1 teaspoon each baking powder and sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons milk
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 tablespoon oil

Combine cornmeal, flour, baking powder, sugar and salt in medium bowl. Combine and stir in milk, egg and oil.

Note: Cooking times are based upon a full power output of approximately 650 watts. If your microwave oven has a lower or higher power wattage than 650 watts cooking times may have to be adjusted. Consult your oven manufacturer's instruction book.

Mixed Vegetable Mold

2 packages unflavored gelatin
3 1/2 cups "V8" no salt added vegetable juice
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon fennel seed powder
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

In 2-quart saucepan sprinkle gelatin over 2 cups "V8" juice to soften. Over low heat, heat until gelatin dissolves, stirring occasionally. Add remaining "V8" juice, lemon juice, fennel and garlic powder. Refrigerate until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon. In 5-cup mold, for garnish place 2 tablespoons peas in decorative design in bottom of mold. Meanwhile, gently fold remaining peas, asparagus, carrot and cucumber into gelatin mixture. Pour into mold. Cover; refrigerate until set, about 2 hours. Unmold gelatin onto chilled platter. Serve with mayonnaise or plain yogurt. Makes 4 1/2 cups or 9 servings.

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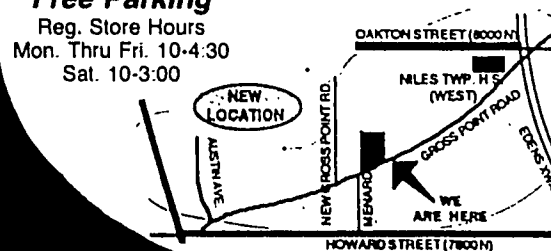

Car neglect causing failure

A recent survey of almost 400 certified auto mechanics and their employers reveals telling information about today's drivers. The unscientific survey was conducted by the non-profit National Institute for Automotive Service Excellence (ASE), the only national group to test and certify the competency of auto technicians.

The one overriding theme to the responses? The importance of regular and timely vehicle maintenance.

An overwhelming majority of technicians and employers - 98% - said that longer vehicle life would be assured if owners maintained their vehicles "according to the manufacturer's specifications."

How much more vehicle life? Almost three-quarters of these same respondents (72%) felt that car owners could increase the life of their vehicles by 50% or more through regular vehicle maintenance.

This is good news for drivers if they will only heed it. But even though this is the era of take-charge, self-improvement programs, motorists' habits have

not changed significantly during recent years. Asked if people were taking better care of their cars today than they did five years ago, respondents split their vote almost evenly, with 52% saying that motorists were taking better care of the vehicles, while 47% said that there had been no improvement. (One percent was uncertain.)

When asked to list the problem(s) caused by neglect that they encounter most frequently, the technicians listed a virtual litany of driver sins. Neglect of oil, fluids, tires, brakes, belts & hoses, batteries, transmissions, ignition systems, and more were mentioned. Topping the list by being cited 29% of the time was the old-fashioned oil change. Neglect of tires/wheels and brakes was also seen frequently, being cited 21% of the time.

The result of this neglect has far reaching effects. But in the main, it is the engine which is most likely to suffer when fluids and parts such as belts & hoses, spark plugs, etc. are neglected. (Over 66% of the respondents felt this way.)

The lesson? Read your owner's manual and follow its advice. Do not cut corners. Have your vehicle serviced on schedule. Look for auto technicians who have proven their competency by earning certification from the National Institute for Automotive Service Excellence (ASE). Such technicians can be identified by their blue and white ASE insignia and wallet credentials. Their employers often display the ASE outdoor sign.

Remember, the pros agree, the money you spend for your car's upkeep is a wise investment. Longer vehicle life and increased safety will result.

Video Dimensions refutes Niles' right to judge video ratings

Dear Editor:

The people of Niles are not being given the truth. Mayor Blase, Village Attorney Richard Troy and Niles Police Chief Emrikson, have either been given some bad information or are misleading the community with their statements to the press.

Richard Troy stated, "A Gentlemen's Agreement was signed by video stores not to rent or sell hard R or X-rated material." This is not so. We spent \$100,000 to open Video Dimensions II at 8094 Golf Road (Golf Glen Shopping Center). Two days before we were to open, a member of the licensing department came in, stated I had to sign the agreement, or we would not be given a license. ("A copy is enclosed.") That is not a "Gentlemen's Agreement." It is an illegal document since it is against ALL Supreme Court rulings. "R-rated" and "X-rated" materials are legal according to the Supreme Court rulings.

The State of Illinois, in 1986, adopted the MPAA standards for rating all movies and video cassettes. There is no such rating as "hardR" - only "R".

Obscene material is against the law, but must be judged on an individual basis by a jury in the courts. Niles has not conformed to this Supreme Court ruling as stated.

The Mayor and Chief Emrikson stated that the videotape "Deep Throat II", rented by undercover policeman Sgt. John Katsoulas, was judged to be obscene by the

courts. The conviction has never been made in the courts. This is a sergeant's decision, not a court decision.

The statement by the Mayor says that "all employees will be arrested" if material that has been judged obscene is found on the shelves. Since the film has not been found to be obscene, this follows the usual pattern of harassment and intimidation.

Perhaps the undercover police in Niles should investigate the Niles Police Station where they can view the Playboy Channel on cable. That is a soft "X" channel, gentlemen! Did the police department sign an agreement?

The mayor and trustees have cable. Check the cable company's records. Do they have HBO, Showtime, AND the Playboy Channel? If so, they are watching "R" and soft "X".

Check the village records. Not ALL video businesses, who rent or sell video, have the agreement on file. I wonder why?

An adult has the right to watch or read what they want, when they want. The First Amendment of the Constitution protects that right. We are only asking for freedom of choice and freedom to decide for ourselves. Anything other than that is a dictatorship. If Niles could once again be for ALL the people, maybe we could be an All-American City again.

EDITOR'S NOTE:

Several Niles officials responded to some of the questions raised in the letter concerning the village's obscenity laws and the legality of the "gentlemen's agreement" not to rent or sell X-rated films before the village issues a business license. Joe Salerno, Niles director of code enforcement, said the agreement is legal and the courts have ruled communities have the right to set their own standards.

He said owners of video stores applying for licenses are told about provisions in the village ordinance by the licensing department. "That goes for all businesses coming into the com-

munity. They must comply with village law, whether it's constructing a building or renting or selling obscene material."

Salerno refuted a statement in the letter claiming that few video stores had signed the agreement. "That is not true...18 stores signed the Gentlemen's Agreement and there has been no problem concerning adult films," he said.

In answer to a statement from the Video Dimensions letter that "Deep Throat II" was never judged obscene by the courts, village attorney Richard Troy said the Second District Court of the Illinois Appellate Court ruled the film was obscene. "The conviction carried a \$500 fine and 140 days in jail," he said.

Troy went on to say the courts make the definition on obscene material, saying there are many categories in which obscene material may fall. "Anyone has the right to challenge violation of First Amendment Rights, but the final determination is made in the courts," he said.

Sgt. John Katsoulas of the Niles Police Department said the police station does not carry the Playboy channel on cable. "We have basic cable here and the television monitors are used for training films. The village ordinance is similar to state laws in regulating restricted films," he said. "The videotapes rented from West Coast (video store) were considered obscene by police officers who reviewed them," he said.

An Arlington Heights home repair con artist who has eluded the law for years was sentenced late yesterday afternoon to three years in prison, Attorney General Neil F. Hartigan announced.

Robert White, 53, alias Robert Blackwell, 2428 Shagbark Ln., Arlington Heights, received the sentence for contempt of court in defying a 1979 injunction forbidding him to ever again engage in the home repair business in Illinois.

Hartigan's office discovered that despite the injunction, White has done business as Airflow Heating and Cooling Company, 5901 N. Milwaukee ave.

During the trial assistant attorneys general prosecuting the case presented eight elderly witnesses ranging from 69 to 84 years in age, who testified that White had bilked them out of more than \$300,000. Although he performed very little work for any of the witnesses, he would play on their sympathy, talk about his "sick daughter," and request large "loans."

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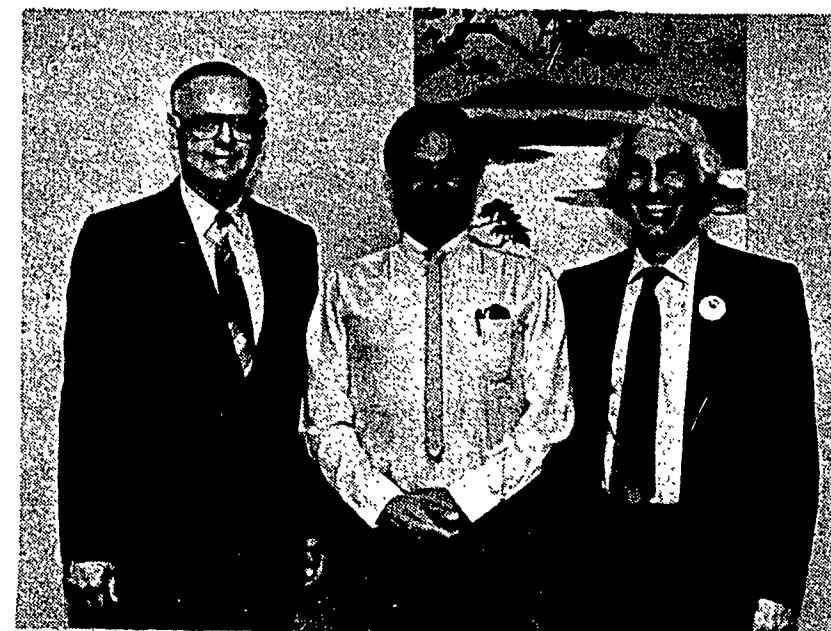

Wedding invitations

Choosing the right invitation style for your wedding is among the most important tasks a couple must undertake before their wedding.

Order invitations three months before your wedding day to allow time for printing, addressing, and mailing. Visit your department store, local printer, jeweler or bridal salon to order them. Be sure to request a sample to check for mistakes before you order is printed.

Inviting your favorite people to celebrate your wedding is a big part of the day's fun. If you're having a larger wedding (100 or more guests) you'll want to send formal wedding invitations.

Word formal invitations the traditional way. And do write out what you want before you order. Or ask your printer to show you personalized versions. If all your guests are being invited to both ceremony and reception, consider the "combination" invitation, below:

Mr. and Mrs. John Sampson request the honor of your presence at the Marriage of their Daughter Teresa Dawn

to
Mr. Darrell Charles Tucker on Saturday, the Fourth of August at Four O'Clock
St. James Church
Mt. Prospect, Illinois
and Afterwards

at Old Orchard Country Club
Request replies with an R.S.V.P., Kindly Respond, or Please Respond in the lower left corner, and make it easy for guests to mail them. Printed reply cards do make it easy for guests. But traditionally, they're reserved for business functions only. If you use cards, why not "code" the envelope with different stamps for your guests and his. It'll make it easier to give an accurate head count to the caterer.

Spell everything on formal invitation - the wedding date, time and all numerals, and names. No

abbreviations, initials or nicknames are used - except Mr., Oe., Mrs., and Jr. Traditionally, only the bride's first and middle names are printed. But if you're a doctor or military officer, you can add your title and full name below the phrase, "their daughter." You may or may not want to add Mr. before your fiancé's name.

Begin your invitations with the name of the person or sponsoring the wedding. The name at the top of an invitation is not supposed to tell your guests who's paying the bills, so whether you live at home or not, your parents' names should head the invitations. You might also include the groom's parents name below his on the invitation. John North Fleming son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Fleming... if your parents are deceased, your guardian, a relative, or a friend can host the wedding. Or you two can be your own sponsors. If your parents are divorced, the parent who raised

you usually does the inviting. If that's your mother, and she's remarried, she uses your stepfather's name, inserts the phrase at the marriage of their daughter... then adds your full name. Divorced but friendly parents can issue a joint invitation.

Have your formal invitations printed in black script on the top page of a double sheet of paper in pale ivory or white. It can be paneled or plain. The most popular size 4 1/4" x 5 3/4" fits into an envelope without folding. A larger size 5 1/4" x 7 1/4" is folded once for mailing. It's for very formal weddings.

Add more "personality" to your invitations by choosing a translucent (parchment perhaps) or shiny paper in a pretty pastel or an earthy tone. Use colorful ink, or even a photograph of the two of you.

How to plan the perfect honeymoon

When planning your trip, start with a good travel agent. She can

be a big help by arranging ground transportation, sightseeing tours, theater tickets and providing information about currency, passports, good restaurants and points of interest.

Whether you'll be enjoying country comforts or big city living, there are many considerations when choosing a place to stay.

•How far from the airport is it and how will you get there?

•Does the place you've chosen offer any special honeymoon packages?

•Are there sports facilities available that coincide with your interests?

•Be aware of what papers may be needed (passport, visa). Are immunizations needed?

Planning your wedding

ANNOUNCING YOUR ENGAGEMENT

Announcements should be sent to the newspapers, both in your home town and your fiancé's, if he lives elsewhere. Type or print all information. Indicate the date when you would like the announcement to appear. Allow plenty of time. Be sure your name, address and telephone number are on the upper right hand corner.

Many papers and some photographers have forms on which to fill in your name, your fiancé's name, names and residences of both sets of parents, background material on you both, and the expected date of your wedding. Society editors decide how much of this they can use. You may send along an 8" by 10" glossy photograph.

AN ENGAGEMENT PARTY

Often the bride's family wishes to celebrate the official announcement with a party for the couple. If the bride's family lives a great distance away, the groom's parents may do this. If they wish, it is absolutely essential that both the bride and her fiancé be in attendance. If this is not possible (military separation, school separation, etc.), the party must wait.

The engagement party usually includes relatives and close friends and is given in the form of a cocktail party, dinner or even a summer barbecue. Informal printed invitations should read: first line - your parents name (or his, if they are hosts); second line - your name (or his); third line - "To meet Thomas Johnson (or Jane Jones)." Handwritten or telephone invitations are also correct.

FOUR TO TWELVE MONTHS BEFORE WEDDING

Determine your budget with your parents and decide whether your wedding will be formal or informal and where the ceremony will take place. Visit your clergyman with your fiancé and set the date. Plan the reception, reserve all the services you'll need.



Decide which friends you wish to have for attendants.
Draw up your invitation list and have your fiancé do his.
Enroll with the Bridal Consultant of your favorite store and select your wedding dress, veil and accessories.
Choose attendants' dresses and men's formal wear.
Select the photographer.
See your florist.
Plan your music.
Plan your home furnishings.

THREE MONTHS BEFORE THE WEDDING

Order your invitations, personal stationery and note paper.
Make plans for your honeymoon destination.
Begin to shop for your first-year trousseau.
Have both mothers choose their gowns.
Visit your doctor. Check on rubella immunization.

TWO MONTHS BEFORE THE WEDDING

Plan recording and display of wedding gifts.
Finish addressing the wedding invitations.
Decide upon gifts for your attendants.
Select the wedding ring, if you have not already done so.
Go with your fiancé to get the marriage license.

ONE MONTH BEFORE THE WEDDING

Have your hair styled as you

would for the wedding.
Attend parties in your honor.
Make transportation plans for the wedding party.
Have the final fitting on your bridal gown.
Arrange for the Bridesmaids' gowns to be fitted.
Order your wedding cake and the package of groom's cake for guests to take home to "dream on."

Arrange for your rehearsal dinner if you plan to have one.
Plan accommodations for out-of-town guests.
Mail your invitations.
Plan bridesmaids' luncheon.
Prepare the newspaper announcement of your wedding.
Make a household check.

TWO WEEKS BEFORE THE WEDDING

Record each gift as received.
Check on attire for everyone in the wedding party.
Plan how to handle traffic and parking for guests.
Arrange a seating plan for the reception. If you plan to have a bride's table at the reception, write out place cards.
Go over personal trousseau.
Send your typed announcement and glossy photograph to the newspaper.
Arrange for name changes on social security, etc.
Arrange to move belongings to your new home.

ONE WEEK BEFORE

Have final consultations with caterer, photographer, florist.
Give bridesmaids' luncheon.
Have hair done.
Plan the rehearsal and inform attendants.

Shapely silhouettes new for brides

All-over lace, interesting details and more shapely silhouettes are just a small portion of the fashion news for fall brides, according to the National Bridal Market Fashion Show held at the Chicago Apparel Center, recently.

"As is often the case, the bridal industry reflects the trends in the ready-to-wear market," said Chicago Apparel Center Fashion Director Susan Glick. "For fall we'll see more of the hourglass silhouette and more shapely looks."

"There will be more of the princess-line gown too this year. And the narrow look is still with us but now the mermaid dress gets a peplum or overskirt," Glick said.

Other over-all trends, found in every segment of the show, include a great deal of focus on the hip. Sometimes it will be accentuated through draping, ruching or shirring. Other important details seen will be sequin and pearl appliques, cut-outs in the gowns and on the trains and back interest in the form of bows and deep V's. Although lace has always been a staple in the bridal industry, this fall entire gowns will be made of lace instead of using it primarily as an accent.

Other trends of particular interest seen at the fashion show were: COLOR—The use of color for formal wedding gowns is becoming increasingly popular. Mint green, peach and pink are some of the colors being incorporated. "We're going to see

more blushing pink brides," Glick said.

INFORMAL—This is a very growing area. The slightly older, more sophisticated woman getting married is looking for a more bridal-inspired, trendsetting dress. Just that was seen in tea lengths with asymmetrical flounces, illusion necklines, side draping and drop waists.

VICTORIAN—The Victorian bride will always be with us. It is a more covered-up look with high necklines and long sleeves. The details come through the use of illusion necklines.

FANTASY—Fantasy becomes the news of the season with whimsical creations. Fabrics used include chiffon and organza with rhinestones and butterfly motifs as accents. Special treatments along with interesting details make this grouping particularly newsworthy as evidenced by the silk organza gown with a shirred long torso, embroidered fan appliques and detachable net skirt.

MEDIEVAL/RENAISSANCE—In the category of what to look for in the future, make a mental note of the Medieval/Renaissance influence. Some of this grouping's characteristics are: scalloped hemlines, Sabina necklines, basque bodices, embroidery and Elizabethan sleeves. The National Bridal Market is held biannually at the Chicago Apparel Center and houses the largest concentration of bridal and related lines outside of New York City.

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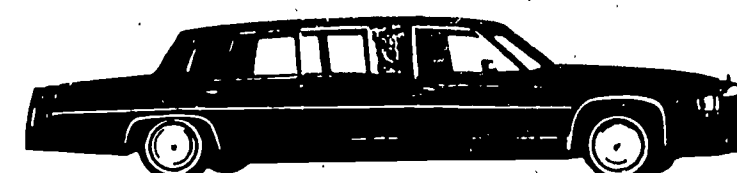
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THE COLOR OF DIAMONDS
A few columns ago, the article that appeared here described the record-breaking sale-at-auction of the jewelry estate of the Duchess of Windsor. Not long after that auction, another was held that brought seven times the previous recorded per carat sale of a diamond. The diamond, which was actually a 96 carat diamond, was sold for \$880,000, at a carat price of \$928,000. What made this single diamond so costly? It was red. And it was naturally red, meaning the red color existed in the diamond when it was mined.
Perhaps one in 100,000 diamonds are fancy colored diamonds. Their rarity makes them extremely valuable. The Duchess of Windsor's jewelry brought a high price at auction in part because of the romance associated with Edward abdicating the throne of England for love of her. The significant price at auction of this fancy colored red diamond was paid by a gem merchant and was apparently purchased for the Sultan of Brunei.
Fancy colored diamonds may be yellow, blue, orange, yellowish-green, brownish-yellow, as well as red. Because they are so rare, locating a fancy colored diamond may take some time. The fancy color red diamond had been part of private estate in Montana and had been part of that estate since the 1950s. To the new owner, this diamond was worth waiting for.

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Groom's wedding check list

Just as the bride has her check list for her wedding, so has the groom, reports the Jewelry Industry Council, which submits the following list to help the groom make the wedding plans go smoothly.

After Engagement
Make up your guest list and give it to your fiancée. Visit the clergyman or justice of the peace together. Discuss wedding expenses with fiancée and both sets of parents. Select your best man and ushers and invite them to participate; you will need about one usher for every 50 guests.

Six Months Before
Discuss honeymoon plans with fiancée; make transportation and accommodations arrangements. Update your passport if you plan to go abroad,

and check on visas and inoculations needed.

Three Months Before
Select wedding rings with fiancée. Order wedding attire, and talk with ushers about their wedding attire. Complete plans for honeymoon; buy tickets.

One Month Before
Make arrangements for flowers for bridal bouquet, going away corsage, boutonnières for best man and ushers, and mothers' corsages. Pick up wedding rings, check engraving. Arrange lodging for out-of-town relatives and ushers.

Select bridal gift and gifts for attendants. Get legal, medical and religious documents for the wedding in order. Check that ushers have ordered their attire.

Two Weeks Before

Go with fiancée to get marriage license. Organize bachelor dinner with best man. Double check honeymoon reservations. Make sure to arrange transportation from the reception to wherever you are planning to leave on your honeymoon. Move belongings to new home.

One Week Before
Make sure best man notifies ushers of rehearsal time and place. Explain any special seating to head usher. Pack for your honeymoon and get going-away clothes ready to change into after reception. Present gifts to attendants at bachelor party.

Questions brides ask

Q. Who gives the clergyman his fee?
A. The groom pays; but best man hands it over in plain white envelope before or after the ceremony.

Q. May a house wedding be just as formal as a church wedding?
A. Yes, although there are never as many attendants.

Q. How can wedding gifts be displayed if a home reception isn't being held?
A. Close friends may be invited to a tea or cocktail party several days before the wedding.

Q. Are checks displayed with wedding presents?
A. No, but they may be noted on a card.

Q. Is it correct to use "and family" on invitation envelopes?
A. No. Send separate invitations to adult sons and daughters. For small children address the outside envelope to their parents, write their first names on the inner envelope under their parents' names.

Q. How should invitation be inserted in envelope?
A. Invitation is folded with the

wording outside and put in the inner envelope (which has no gum on flap) with the folded edge down. The inner envelope is then placed in the outer one facing the flap.

Q. Are reception cards enclosed with invitations?
A. Yes, and so are the reply cards and reply envelopes. The home address would be printed on reply envelopes.

Q. Are identifying cards put with the presents on display?
A. Not these days.

Q. Are gifts ever brought to the reception?
A. No.

Q. Do ushers and best man stand in receiving line?
A. No.

Q. May guests be invited to a reception and not the wedding itself?
A. Yes, when the ceremony is attended only by relatives and close friends.

Q. Must invitations be engraved?
A. They can be. However, simulated engraving is less expensive and just as satisfactory.

Something she is sure to want on hand is a personalized emergency kit containing items she may have overlooked when taking care of the bigger details. 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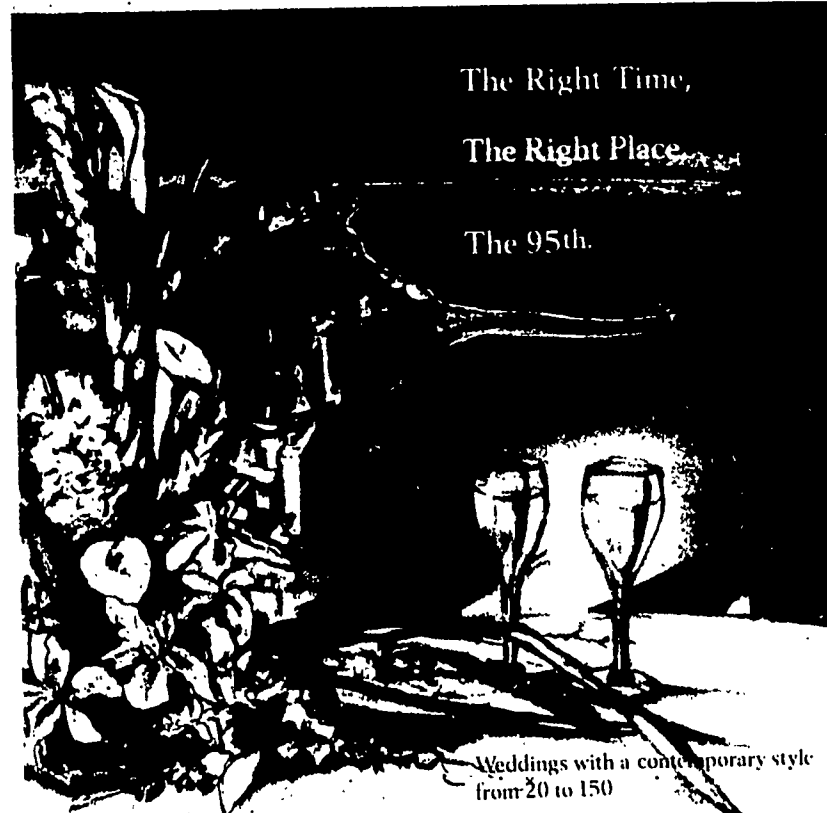
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The Bride's Handkerchief

• No amount of makeup will substitute for plenty of rest. However, do make yourself up several times until you achieve the natural look you want in your color portrait. Eye makeup is a must when you sit for your portrait because eyes without it all but vanish.

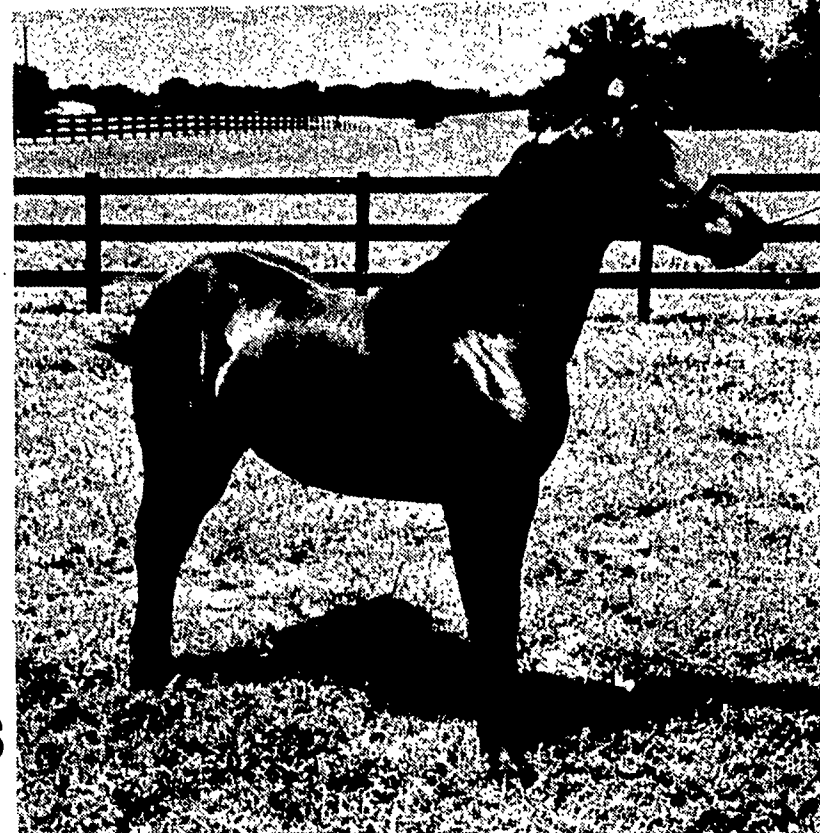

Chicago Alzheimer's day care center opens

An adult day care center serving the unique needs of Alzheimer's disease victims and their families has opened on the city's Northwest side.

The Alzheimer's Day Care Health Program is a collaborative effort of the Johnston R. Bowman Health Center for the Elderly (JRB) at Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center, the Chicago Area Chapter of Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Association (ADRDA) and the West Side Veterans Administration Medical Center.

"There are an estimated 8,500 Chicagoans moderately impaired by Alzheimer's disease who could benefit from the kind of care the program provides," said Jacob Fox, M.D., professor of neurology and Alzheimer's research at Rush.

"For many families, the burden of caring for an A.D. patient is draining both emotionally and financially," said Carol Kallish, president of the Chicago

Area Chapter of ADRDA. "Adult day care offers families the opportunity to rest from the '36-hour-a-day' care required by A.D. patients who become progressively unable to think or care for themselves."

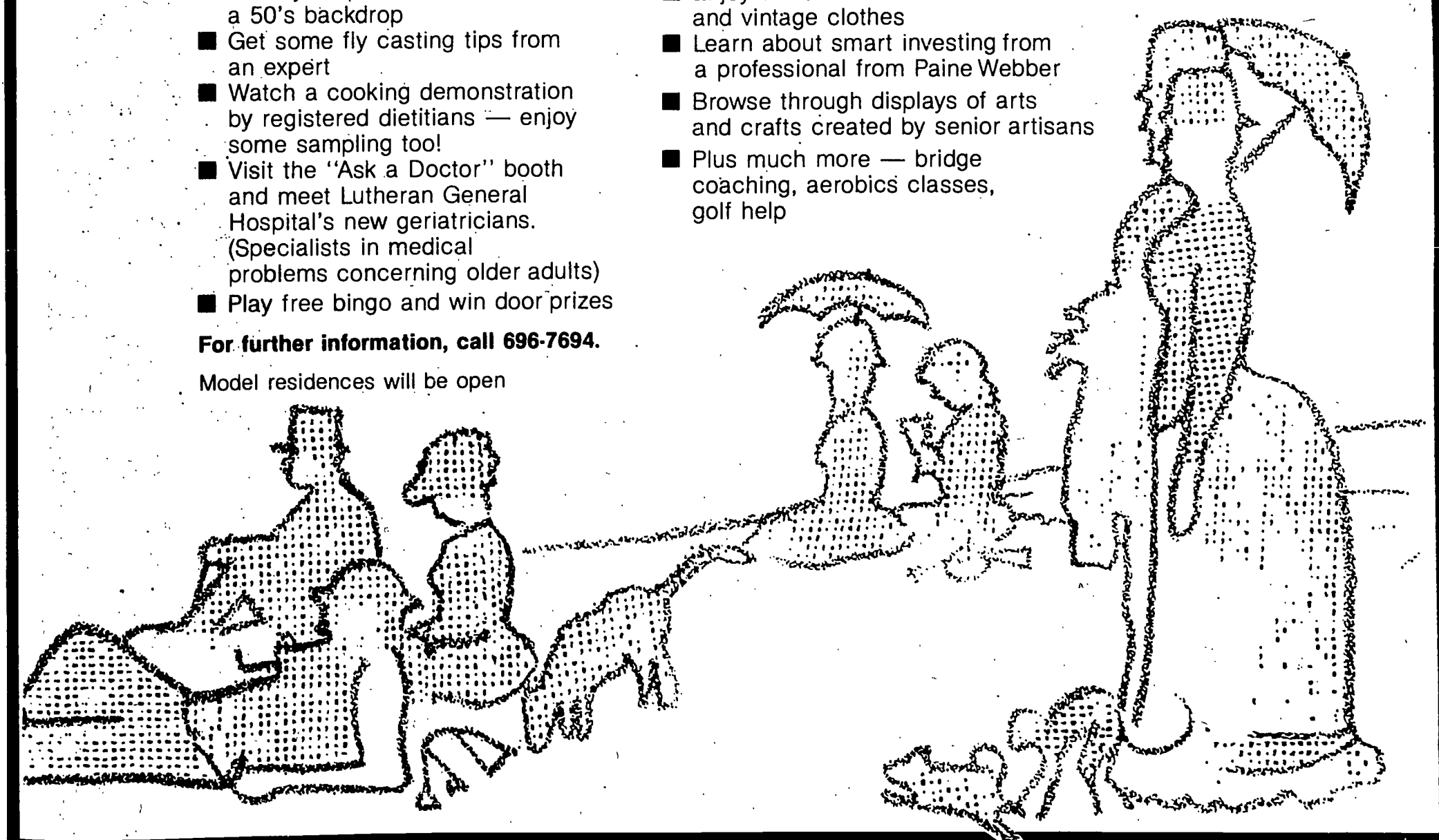

Governor signs Dudycz bill to protect senior citizens

Senior citizens will be better protected from insurance fraud under legislation co-sponsored by State Sen. Walter Dudycz (R-7th) and signed Aug. 21 by Gov. James Thompson.

"Senior citizens are often targets of unscrupulous insurance agents who take advantage of their natural concern about having enough health insurance," Dudycz said. "This new law addresses three situations when a senior citizen could be vulnerable to insurance fraud."

Senate Bill 822 requires policies that don't supplement federal Medicare health insurance to state this fact in their coverage outlines.

"We are trying to avoid those unfortunate cases of people buying a policy without being told that it wasn't intended to supplement Medicare coverage," Dudycz said. "They should know up front what they are buying."

The new law also allows senior citizens who become ineligible

"A person who is discontinued from group coverage and has to find more insurance could be more vulnerable to high-pressure agents. This provision will give senior citizens the time they need to shop around for other coverage," Dudycz said.

A third provision of the new law will keep insurance agents from pressuring senior citizens who buy policies, but decide to cancel during the 10-day examination period.

"Refunds will be sent directly to buyers, instead of agents, who may try to pressure them when delivering the refunds," Dudycz said. "If buyers change their minds, they should be able to get their money back without having to listen to more sales pitches."

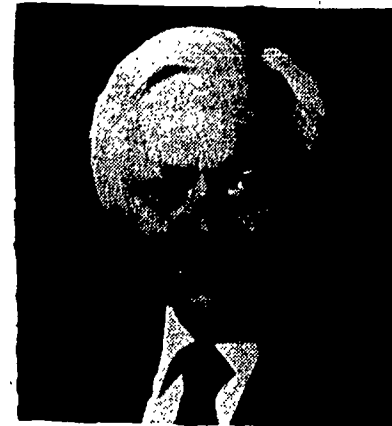

Protect your home against burglary

Vacation time is often a very profitable time for thieves. So, before you go away, protect your home against burglary. According to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's most recent figures, in 1985, major crimes against property totaled \$2.9 billion. Therefore, regardless of the length of time that you are away, you must take precautions to prevent your home from being burglarized. To help, Herbert Davidson, Director of Property Service Systems in Liberty Mutual Insurance Company's Loss Prevention Department offers the following tips.

- Locks are the single most important tool for protecting your home. Make sure all entrances are locked, including windows and garage doors. Go one step further by installing dead-bolt locks. However, be wary of locks that require a key to open from the inside, since they may prevent a quick escape during a fire.

- Always keep several lights on, preferably upstairs, in bathrooms, and other rooms where a burglar can't see that the room is unoccupied. Another alternative is to install an inexpensive timing device that will automatically turn lights, TV, or a radio on and off at regular intervals.

- Make your home look lived-in by arranging to have all regular deliveries, such as mail and newspapers stopped or held for you. If you are going away for several days, Davidson and Liberty Mutual suggests that you have someone mow your lawn, and pick up any other deliveries that are accumulating, while you are gone. Don't close the curtains and blinds, as these can be clues to a burglar that you're away. Turn down the volume on the ring of your phone so a burglar won't hear its ring go unanswered.

tioned. A security system is an effective way to deter a thief. There are various systems on the market. Alarm systems scare intruders away, while silent systems transmit a signal to a central security unit or local police headquarters. Regardless of what type you buy, be sure that detectors are on every door and window. Don't leave any part of your home unprotected.

- Don't leave ladders and other tools outside your house. These could be just what a burglar needs to break in. Portable air-conditioners can be pushed in, providing a convenient entrance for a robber.

- Trim all overgrown shrubs and bushes. They provide the cover and darkness that burglars need.

- Don't carry an identification tag with your keys. They may fall into the hands of a potential intruder and make it easier to find and get into your house.

- Put your smaller valuables in a safety deposit box at the bank.
- Use a marking tool to engrave your license or social security number on the back of items such as television sets and stereos.

- Liberty Mutual suggests that you give details of your absence only to your close friends, relatives and local police. Have them check your house periodically while you're away.

- Be sure to report any suspicious activities in your neighborhood to the police. Check with them for details about a Neighborhood Watch program.

There is no sure way to completely protect your home against burglary. However, by following these tips you can better protect your home and possessions by decreasing your chances of being burglarized.

delivered to the FairOaks address. In an arrangement with police, the manager of Baker and Taylor said there had been computer trouble, and the merchandise would be delivered the next day.

In the previous contract, step increases stopped at the sixth year of service. Under the new agreement, the sixth and seventh year steps are eliminated. The fifth year of service jumps to the eighth, where they then stop.

principal would then be notified when contagious disease is present. He would require the exclusion of the student for the period of time in which there is any risk of transmission. If such a case occurs, a Review Team would determine "the least restrictive educational setting for the student."

The policy goes on to state that employees with a communicable disease would be placed on sick leave for the duration of the time such employee would pose a risk. Similar proceedings would determine the employees' status as contagious. A review team would also be called in to determine eligibility to return to work when the risk of contagion ceases to exist.

Principals of the three high schools comprising District 207 agreed the extended 8-period schedule was working well at all schools. Principals at Maine East, South, and West said the

about \$78,500 to MEG undercover policemen.

The charge is a class X felony which carries a minimum sentence of six years and a maximum of 30 years without probation, if convicted, according to a spokesman from the Cook County State's Attorney's Office.

According to Lt. Ray Giovannelli of the Niles Police Department, Weiner's wife, Arlene, was also charged with delivery of a controlled substance after she allegedly sold a small amount of cocaine to Niles police early in the investigation. "She made the sale because her husband was not at home at the time," he said.

The two men were arrested in a parking lot of Hoffman Estates after a pre-arranged deal to sell the drugs to MEG police, with Niles undercover police acting as backup, according to Giovannelli.

He added the four officers involved in the case worked undercover for six months on the investigation. "The usual procedure is to develop the case working in close contact with MEG agents in drug-dealing operations," he explained.

Weiner's wife was released on \$2,000 bond. Jager posted \$25,000 cash bond and was released from the Cook County jail. Weiner posted \$200,000 bond, reduced from the original \$5 million bond, and was released from the jail on Sept. 10, according to a spokesman from the Criminal Courts building in Chicago.

West Coast Video had won a restraining order which expired Sept. 10. It allowed the store to open in Niles and sell or rent X-rated videotapes to adults.

The video store owners refused to sign an agreement stating they would not sell X-rated films, and that the village has final say over what movies fall into that category. The owners claimed it was censorship and the ordinance

illegal.

Reportedly, the president of West Coast has stated the store would fight to stay open and sell adult videos via litigation in the courts, if it becomes necessary.

poses a threat to books and computers, according to one board member. At this date, large sheets of plastic serve to catch water leaking through the roof and ceiling so it may be funneled into buckets placed in several areas of the library.

Under the agreement the Adjunct Faculty Association was given legal power as the sole bargaining agent for part-time faculty teaching less than 6 hours per semester in an academic year.

The agreement also includes provisions for teaching assignments, working conditions, compensations, and grievance procedures.

A separate agreement was also accepted by the Board for part-time faculty teaching less than 6 hours per semester authorizing a pay scale and benefits.

The Board heard one of a series of reports on the progress of the Comprehensive Curriculum Review Committee. The Committee was formed in January by Dr. Margaret Lee, Vice President for Curriculum and Instruction, and is in the process of revising the general educational requirements core for associate degrees.

The Committee's goals are to focus on "the ideal Oakton graduate: what is the least the college wishes its graduates to know and be able to do." According to Mary Mittler and Richard

Storinger, co-chairpersons, "Requirements need revision to accommodate the changing skills and qualifications Oakton students need for preparation for assimilation into the world."

The 28-member Committee intends to concentrate on curriculum changes in the areas of Communications, Math/Science, Social Science, Humanities, Life Skills, International Studies, Computer Literacy, and effective writing skills.

A progress report will be presented at each Board meeting. The final changes are not expected to be researched and voted upon in full until 1989.

In other news Oakton's President Ten Hoeve announced enrollment for the fall semester exceeded the initial expectations of a 13% increase—it is 3%. Trustee Bill Spaulding recommended the Board commend the efforts of those involved in marketing and recruiting for the increase.

It was announced the three candidates running in November's election to fill two vacancies will be briefed by the Board next Tuesday, September 22.
