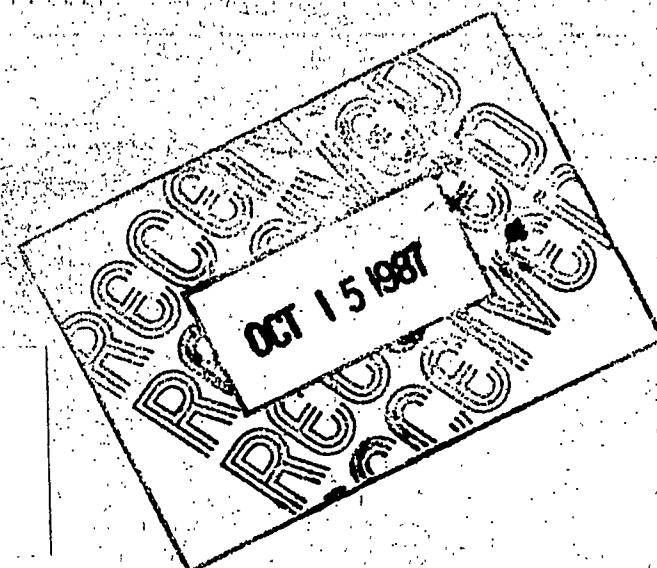

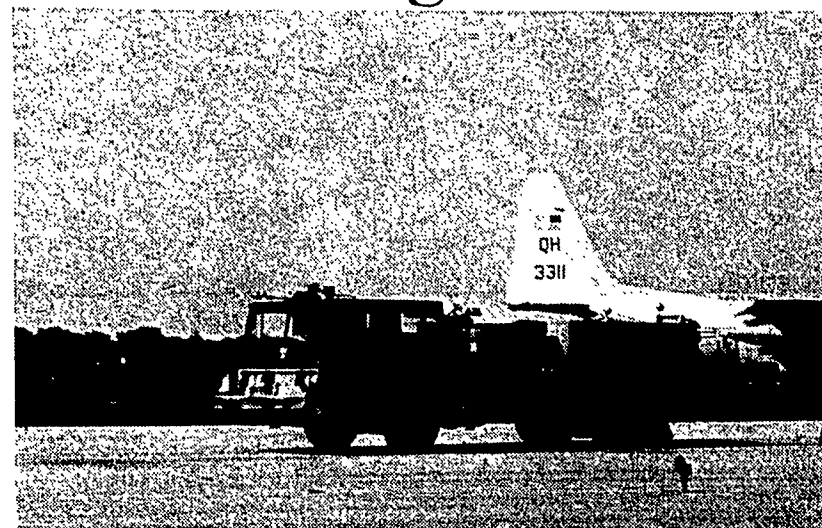

Dan Coglianese, Niles police dispatcher dies at 57

Daniel Coglianese, 57, who served as a radio dispatcher for the Niles Police Department for 19 years, died Wednesday, Oct. 7 in Lutheran General Hospital.

Coglianese joined the Niles Police Reserves in May, 1964 and then became a full-time radio dispatcher in Jan., 1968. In 1985, he assumed the position of supervisor of the communications department.

Niles Police Chief Clarence Emrikson said the former police officer was meticulous and exacting in running the day-to-day operations of the communications department. "He was dedicated to his job and was well-liked by his fellow officers," Emrikson said. "He will be hard to replace."

Motel fire causes \$4,000 damage

Officials of the Niles Fire Department are investigating a fire that broke out in a vacant room at the Royal 6 Motel, 6450 Touhy Ave. causing \$4,000 damage on Oct. 8.

Niles firemen and the Morton Grove Fire Department arrived at the scene about 4:30 a.m. to find heavy smoke coming out of the first floor window of room 168, according to Fire District Chief Walter Blase.

The fire, which was contained to the window area and a mattress on the bed, was extinguished in about 10 minutes.

The fire did not reach the ceiling and did not extend beyond the room. "The first floor and upper floors of the building were checked for occupants with negative results," Blase said.

A security guard for the motel reported prior to the fire, he had seen a light in the room and bathroom. The room was not rented, the guard stated.

The Niles Fire Prevention Bureau is conducting an investigation because of the suspicious nature of the fire, Blase had stated.

Niles Fire Department Calls

The Niles Fire Department answered 32 fire calls and 40 ambulance calls between Oct. 2 and Oct. 9.

Firemen on Oct. 2 responded to 9300 Callero Dr. where they found an electric wire hanging from a pole blowing in the wind and occasionally making contact with the ground. Firemen remained on the scene until arrival of a Com-Edison crew.

Firefighters on Oct. 2 went to check out a report of an electrical problem in a house at 7027 Jonquil Terr. Cause was traced to a broken circuit which was replaced. There was no fire hazard.

A smell of smoke was reported at 9315 Murray Ct. on Oct. 2. Probable cause was traced to a furnace running for the first time this year. There was no hazard.

On Oct. 3, firefighters responded to 7710 Milwaukee Ave. where a fence had caught on fire. The fire, which had been extinguished when firemen arrived, caused \$100 damage.

A report of smoke at 9074 Terrace Sq. proved to be a false alarm on Oct. 3.

Direct gas purchase to ease District 207 heating bills

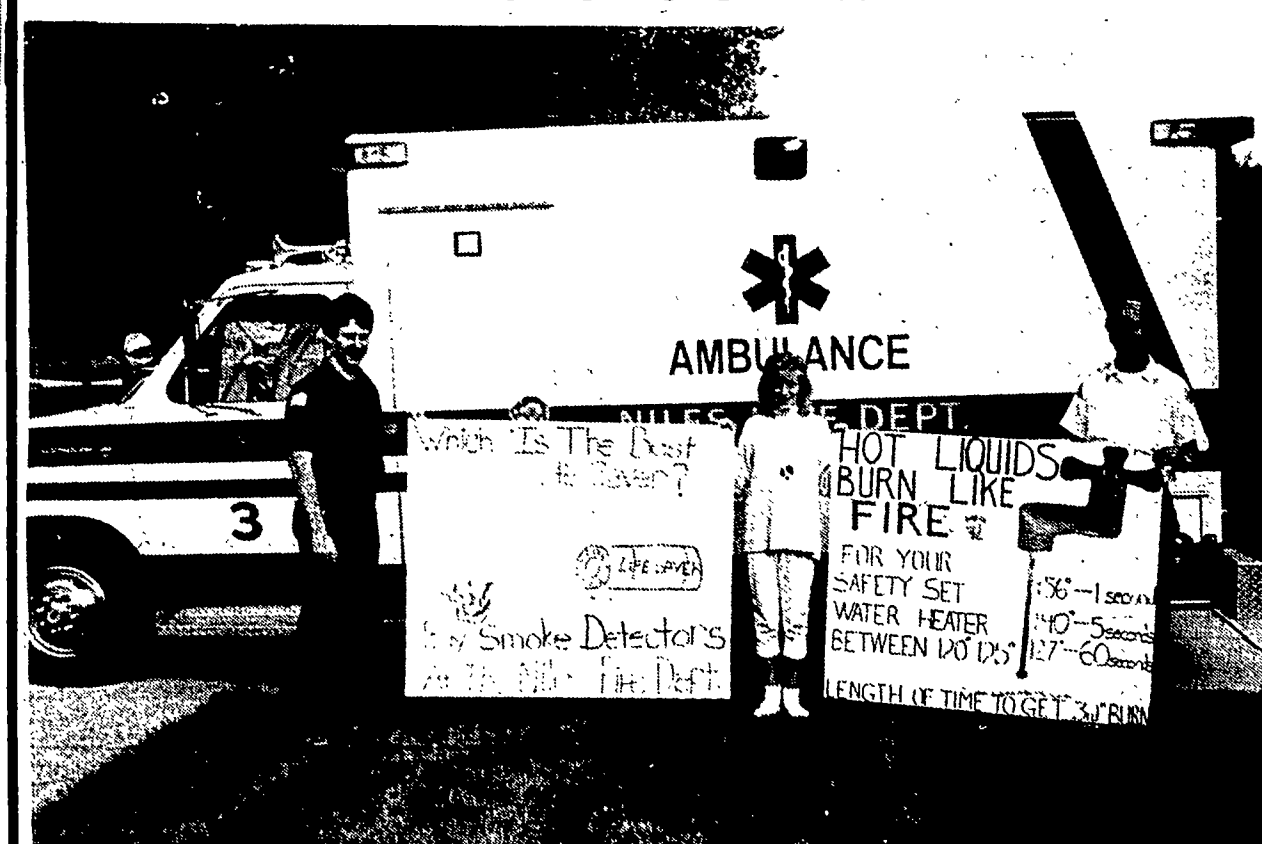
Maine Township High School District 207 could save 20 to 30 percent on its heating bills by purchasing natural gas on the "spot market," according to Donald E. Kenney, Assistant Superintendent for Business.

The Board of Education approved a resolution at the October board meeting authorizing the district to buy gas from suppliers other than the regular supplier, Northern Illinois Gas Com-

pany. "The resolution could save the district as much as \$220,000, depending on the number of degree days in the heating season," said Kenney.

"This is exactly the kind of cost saving I like to see the district make," said Ben Herman, Chairman of the Finance Committee. "It saves significant dollars, yet it does not adversely affect the educational program."

CANCER FACTS FOR PEOPLE OVER 50
Most people know something about cancer, but fear keeps many of them from finding out what they can do about it. Because many cancers occur more often in people 50 or older, it is this age group that has the most to gain from learning about symptoms of the disease. When cancers are detected early, they are more likely to be treated successfully. Individuals can safeguard their health by learning the early warning signs of cancer and having regular checkups. Some of those warning signs include:

Lung: cough that won't go away; coughing up blood, shortness of breath.
Breast: Lump in the breast; change in breast shape; discharge from the nipple.

Colon and rectum: Changes in bowel habits; bleeding from the rectum; blood in the stool which appears bright red or black.

Prostate (men): Difficulty or pain while urinating; the need to urinate often, especially at night.
Uterus, ovary, and cervix (women): Bleeding after menopause; unusual vaginal discharge; enlargement of abdomen; pain during intercourse.

Skin: Sores that do not heal; change in shape, size or color of a wart or mole; sudden appearance of a mole.
Some people, as they age, attribute medical symptoms to "growing older." People should not fail to mention symptoms to their doctor just because they think they are unimportant or normal for their age.

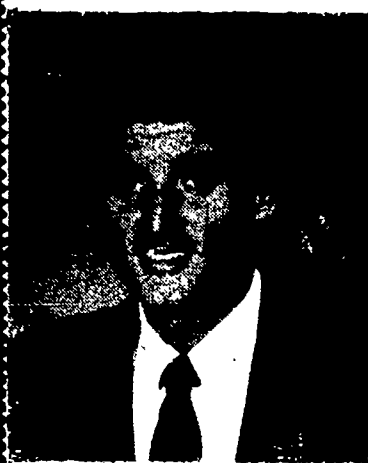

Nilesite named basketball coach

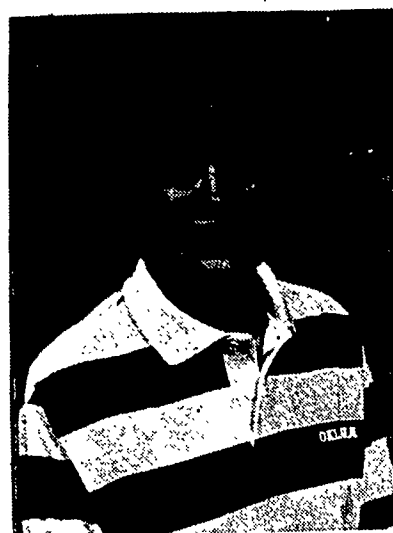
Caryn Kaufman of Niles, has been named assistant women's basketball coach at the University of Oklahoma.

She is the daughter of Edmund and Shirley Kaufman of Niles.

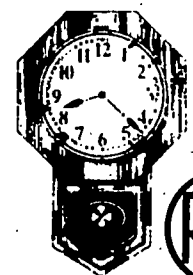
Oakton Golfers get help

"The Gumps have made themselves a part of our history"

Dear Sir/Madame:

Our good friend and long-time neighbor, Joe Gump, will go to trial in Kansas City on October 19. He will be tried for what he sees as an act of disarmament and healing for the nation, but what the government calls "destruction of government property and conspiracy to destroy government property." On Hiroshima Day, last August 6, at 8:15 a.m. by Japanese time, Joe and Jerry Ebner entered a Minuteman Missile site in a Missouri cornfield, hammered on the cover of the deadly weapon, and left at the site a cross formed from their own blood, an eloquent message explaining their action, plus some banners of hope and love which they hung on the fence. In doing this, Joe was following the example set by his wife, Jean, a year and a half earlier.

Joe and Jean Gump have brought their convictions and their case to the American people through their acts, which tell us that we are responsible for eliminating these instruments of mass murder. A number of equally dedicated people have carried out similar acts of symbolically dismantling nuclear weapons. Supported by strong religious faith, they have associated themselves with Isaiah's vision of a world in which "nation shall not lift up sword against nation; neither shall they learn war anymore." They have called themselves "Plowshares" or "Pruning Hooks", in their role as messengers of peace. Jean and

Joe joined this honorable community with pride. Also Jerry, and others who are continuing the tradition.

In their courtroom arguments, Joe and Jerry will use a "necessity" defense. They will insist that nuclear war would be a global catastrophe, and will contend their action is justified by the fact its purpose was to alert people to the unparalleled danger we face, and to avert it. They will argue, also, preparation for nuclear war is immoral, and is in violation of national and international law. The several Hague and Geneva Conventions prohibit acts of war that target citizens, cause cruel and unnecessary suffering, severely damage the natural environment, and violate the neutrality of non-participating states. The Nuremberg Principles state, among other things, it is the obligation of individuals to refuse to carry out immoral orders of their government. The Allies executed people after World War II for not committing civil disobedience.

For the first time, in April 1985, this argument was accepted by an American judge as a valid one; Judge Alphonse F. Wilt instructed the jury that "the use or the threat of use of nuclear weapons is a war crime..." The jury then acquitted activists who had blockaded the entrance to the Great Lakes Naval Training Center, because they believed the blockade was an effort to avoid a greater public injury, namely, nuclear war.

In American law, the jury

represents the conscience of the community, and is empowered to transcend a narrow interpretation of the law in order to apply moral principles in bringing in a verdict. However, most jurors are unaware of their right in this respect and humbly follow the judge's instructions about ignoring motive, for example, while feeling very unhappy in doing so. So Joe and Jerry's fate will probably depend upon the judge's attitude.

However, Joe quotes Thomas Merton as saying: "Do not depend upon the hope of results...You may have to face the fact that your work will be apparently worthless. As you get used to the idea, you start to concentrate on the value, the truth of the work itself." Jean and Joe have accepted this, and have bravely faced the consequences of their acts. For Jean, this has been more than a year in prison and ten to come.

These courageous and fine people have made themselves a part of the history of our times, and I believe their sacrifice will not have been in vain. 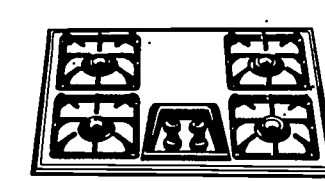

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Loyola prepares dental students to treat older patients

The number of older adults, now approximately 28 million, will rise to 36 million by the year 2000, an increase of close to 30 percent. This increase in our older population is resulting in a greater number of persons dependent on health care services, specifically oral health services.

The dental profession is trying to meet the challenge of rising health needs of older adults as young dentists learn about the emotional and clinical aspects of geriatric dentistry. One educational institution, Loyola University School of Dentistry, requires that students provide treatment to older patients in long-term care facilities as a fulfillment of community service. Every two weeks from September through May, junior dental students leave the

classroom and clinic in Maywood and visit Colonial Manor Living Center in La Grange, a long-term care facility primarily focused on geriatric patients, and the Holy Family Villa, a typical geriatric care facility in Lemont. They provide dental treatment to senior citizens in treatment rooms or at their bedside and are accompanied and evaluated by Stephen Martin, D.D.S., clinical associate professor of operative dentistry at Loyola's School of Dentistry, and James Grieco, clinical assistant professor of preventative dentistry and community health.

"Like dental students to have a good feeling about treating the elderly," Dr. Martin says of the extramural experience. "They have a chance to learn about the special needs of a growing segment of our population and

realize you need to listen to what the older person is saying and respond accordingly. Students also learn they can actually perform dentistry in a patient's bed."

The problems many of these patients have are age-related oral diseases and associated symptoms. Some of the more common problems are recurrent caries, root caries and fractured teeth. Although dental caries has been associated primarily with children and adolescents, a continuous need for treatment exists among older adults, especially terminally ill patients or those institutionalized.

In providing dental care to older adults, it is extremely important to obtain a thorough and precise drug history. Their reaction to medication differs from children and young adults in terms of the time it takes for a drug to reach the appropriate receptor and the manner in which it is eliminated from the body. Side effects from frequently prescribed medication can affect a patient's ability to tolerate certain dental procedures. Some medications can cause "dry mouth" or a lack of saliva, which, in turn, may produce caries. Also affected by medication is an older patient's ability to maintain good oral hygiene and his or her capacity to insert and remove certain types of prostheses like dentures. Dr. Grieco adds that

many dentures of nursing home patients are recovered from plumbing facilities and clean laundry baskets due to patient memory loss, another sign of aging.

Dr. Grieco prepares his students for treating oral lesions, another common condition they see in these patients as a result of "chewing their cheek." They learn that patients with Parkinson's disease often grind their teeth due to uncontrolled muscle contractions which causes cracked teeth or trismus (lock jaw). Alzheimer's patients may be taking medications which inhibit salivary gland function, resulting in "dry mouth" and odor. Poor oral hygiene and mouth odor are other common problems found in older patients.

Many geriatric patients retain the same fear of dental treatment they had when they were younger. However, the older patient is less able to tolerate these stresses to the same degree as their younger counterparts. Therefore, effective management of their fear and pain is essential. One way to do this is to listen carefully to their complaints, explain how the problem will be treated and proceed slowly. Local anesthetics are the preferred drugs for pain management, but they must be used carefully.

Providing dental care to persons in long-term care facilities is not new. In the 1950s and 1960s, a dental consultant, usually an oral surgeon, made occasional visits for emergencies such as extractions and denture repairs. Today, general dentists such as Dr. Martin and Dr. Grieco, who have private practices including geriatric patients, are actively involved in delivering oral health care to older adults. The number of dentists who are willing and enthusiastic about delivering dental care to older patients in long-term care facilities also is increasing. The dentist who does provide treatment for geriatric patients does so for professional satisfaction and challenge rather than mere financial reward.

1987 Tax Changes

The IRS has released a summary of 1987 tax law changes: The Zero Bracket Amount is replaced by the standard deduction. The following items have been repealed in 1987: dividend exclusion income averaging, two earner deduction, sales tax deductions, political contributions credit, deductions for travel as education, charitable contributions for non-itemizers and capital gains.

Mortgage interest will become deductible on first and second homes only. Personal deductions and investment interest deductions will be very limited. Most miscellaneous itemized deductions must exceed 2% of the adjusted gross income. Medical expenses must exceed 7.5% of AGI. Individuals may still contribute and deduct up to \$2,000 (\$2,250 for spousal IRS's) unless they are covered by another retirement plan. For those who are, allowable reductions will be reduced for single tax payers with AGI between \$25,000 and \$35,000 (\$40,000 and \$50,000 for joint filers). No IRA deductions will be allowed for single filers whose AGI exceeds \$35,000 or joint filers whose AGI exceeds \$50,000.

Any taxpayer who can be claimed as a dependent on another person's return cannot claim a personal exemption for their own return. Unemployment compensation is fully taxable in 1987. The 60% long term capital gain deduction is eliminated. All capital losses are deductible in full up to \$3,000 per year (\$1,500 on separate return). Excess losses are still carried forward. The maximum capital gain rate is now 28%.

The 3 year rule is repealed for pensions and annuities for payment after July 1, 1986. They must be taxed under the general rule. For lump sum distributions, 10 year averaging is changed to 5 year averaging. Capital gain treatment for distributions attributable to pre-74 plan participations is repealed. The 5 year averaging can only be used by taxpayers who are over 59½ when they get the distribution and it can only be used once.

Trips outside of the home are also a part of the activities Grace is involved in at Bethany.

Residents go to church and see Chicago attractions such as the museums and both Lincoln Park and Brookfield zoos. Grace observes that residents enjoy the aviary exhibit, but their favorite zoo attraction seems to be the polar bears. Most exhibits hold their interest only a short time, but they may stay for 15 minutes watching the polar bears swim and play. Trips also include lun-

ches at The Omega on Golf Road and Hollywood Fred's on Dempster Street. An upcoming event is a Venture shopping spree.

Alzheimer's isn't a disease that affects the average teenager, but Grace works with it every weekend. Definitely "the hardest part of my job is seeing active seniors slowly get worse."

"The freedom of working by myself, in my own corridor, is what I really enjoy at Bethany compared to my two week job at a clothing store as a cashier," related Grace, who lives in Niles.

Grace's future plans are to graduate in January and then attend Columbia College with a major in broadcasting. The main influence toward broadcasting is her father, who was a disc jockey in El Salvador before the family moved to the U.S. permanently in 1979.

The active senior doesn't want to pursue a career in caring for the elderly because "it's sad to see people without families to care for them."

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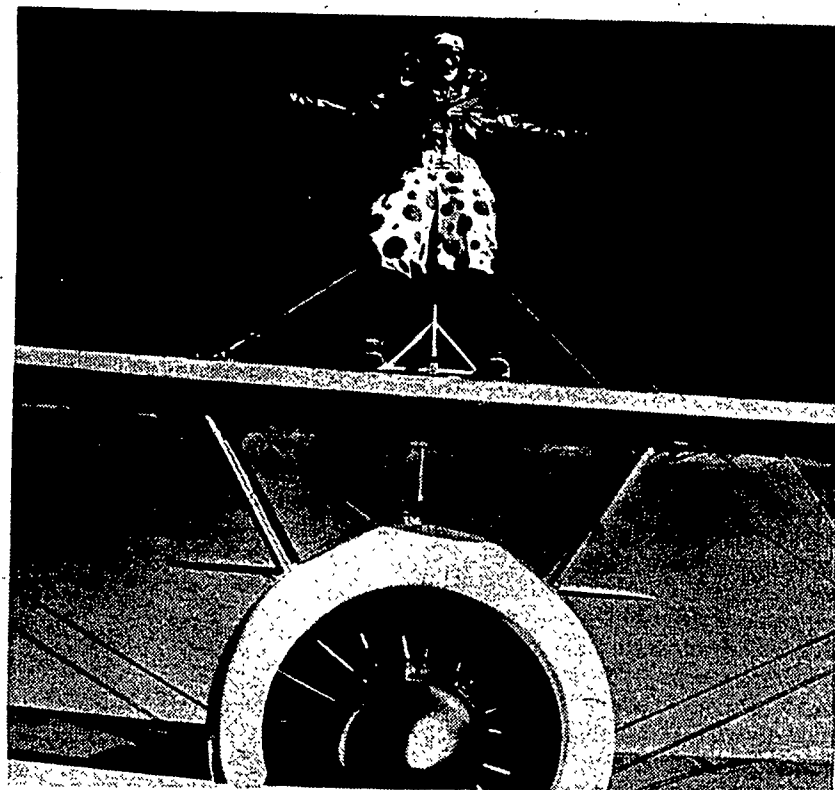

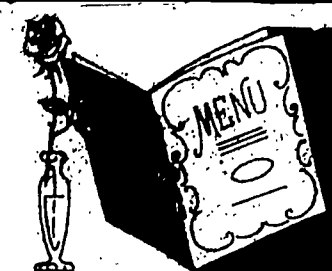

Discussion on "Life Care" contracting

Eugenia S. Chapman of Illinois Attorney General Neil F. Hartigan's office, will point out the dangers, as well as the advantages, for seniors contracting for "Life Care" when she addresses members of ORT at Temple Judea in Skokie on October 20.

Her talk will begin at 1:30 p.m. at the temple at Niles Center Road.

For persons considering entering a life care facility, Mrs. Chapman suggests a 12-point checklist to avoid disappointments or financial disasters. The checklist should be completed before any contract is signed.

Life care is a contractual agreement in which a person may invest all or most of his or her life savings and income in return for guaranteed lifetime health, care, food and housing and other amenities. Or, persons who have chosen life care programs may sell their homes and pay an endowment ranging from \$20,000 to \$120,000 to the life care facility and agree to pay monthly fees of from \$300 to \$1,200.

Life care is attractive to many seniors who worry about becoming a burden to their family or being left alone without care or companionship.

Most life care proprietors are reputable, honest and responsible. However, since the mid-1970's, at least 40 life care communities have gone bankrupt, leaving the residents high and dry. Misrepresentations of a home's services and stability have occurred in contracts, in advertising, and in promotion. Some people have been led to think that there will be a doctor on the premises, only to learn that the doctor is almost never available. Some contracts fail to mention that monthly fees may increase; some have misrepresented how much of the entrance fee will be refunded if a resident terminates the contract or dies.

Mrs. Chapman, before joining Hartigan's office, was a state legislator for 18 years, bringing to government her expertise in education, public health, children and family problems, employment, discrimination, medical costs and administration, governmental finance and budgeting. In Hartigan's office, she has specialized in addressing the problems of senior citizens. She heads the Attorney General's Community Education Program.

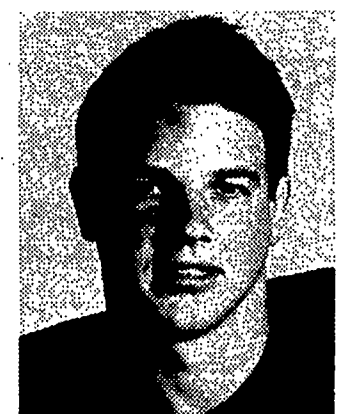
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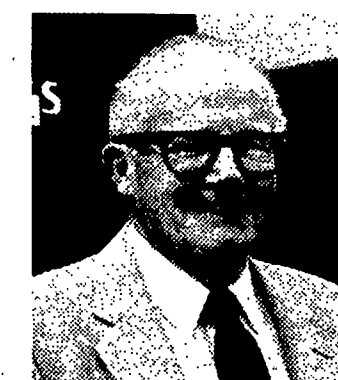

In the past, most senior citizens were expected to live alone, in nursing homes or with their families. But recently another housing alternative called Shared Housing has become a more acceptable option. Within the past several months four existing Shared Housing programs have joined forces and created a very supportive network which reaches the far Northwestern Suburban areas to the

more Northern suburbs and includes most of Evanston and the Roger Park area, as well as the Northern outlying Chicago vicinity. These four agencies meet on a monthly basis to exchange ideas about developing a stronger Shared Housing concept and to exchange individuals, pair up homeseekers with homeseekers.

The Center of Concern coordinates Shared Housing for those in need of a place to live with those who have extra room within their homes or apartments. If the homeseeker is extremely limited with finances then work exchanges are often available where a homeowner agrees to have the individual take over some of the errands such as cooking, laundry or shopping in exchange for some or all of the rent. Temperatures at O'Hare International Airport dropped to 28 degrees at 4 a.m. Monday. It broke the record of October 12, 1987, when the thermometer registered 30 degrees.

Nearly 24,000 people were killed in alcohol-related accidents in 1986. Last year on Oct. 24, 12 people were killed and 1,344 were injured in Illinois auto accidents. In Illinois this year Mothers Against Drunken Driving (MADD) has scheduled a Drive For Life day on Oct. 24. Borrowing from the American Cancer Society's American Smokeout, where smokers are asked to give-up smoking for one day, drivers will be asked not to drink and drive on Oct. 24.

Forecasts for beef and veal consumption in 1988 will continue to show a downward trend. Next year U.S. per capita consumption will be 88.4 pounds, down from 104.3 pounds this year. Average world per capita consumption is about 25.5 pounds. Argentina and Uruguay outconsume U.S. beef-eaters. Canada places fourth with 40.5 pounds and Australia was fifth. France ranks sixth and Russia with 28.8 pounds ranks seventh.

Europeans hogged the pork consumption records. America does not place in the top ten countries as pork eaters. Hungary, Denmark, East and West Germany, Czechoslovakia and Austria lead the pork consumers of the world and China is the largest swine producer.

A poll of nearly 4,000 University of Notre Dame graduates show a high percentage of alumni disagree with Roman Catholic Church teachings on

moral issues.

The poll, published in the August edition of Notre Dame Magazine, show alumni are more politically conservative than they were ten years ago and theologically, more liberal. A previous poll was taken ten years ago.

The survey found 37 percent of respondents were Republican compared with 22 percent in 1977. Those viewing themselves as conservatives went up from 31% to 41% in the decade.

In the area of obedience to traditional church teachings:

• About 78 percent said they never or hardly ever went to confession compared with 57 percent a decade ago.

• Seventy-nine percent said the church should allow divorced Catholics to remarry compared with 57 percent a decade ago.

• Eighty-three percent said they believe artificial contraception is morally permissible, compared with 76 percent a decade ago.

• Little change was noted in attitudes about abortion with 54 percent saying abortion is immoral on request. About 75% said abortion is morally permissible in some instances.

Alumni seem to be attending weekly mass less, down from 57 percent to 53 percent, but more who attend mass regularly are receiving communion at least once a week, up from 40 percent 10 years ago to 47 percent today.

The survey was mailed to 5,311 randomly selected people who had earned undergraduate degrees. Responses were received from 3,822.

It was reported 23 percent were in their 20's, 28 percent in their 30's, 20 percent in their 40's, 14 percent in their 50's and 15 percent in their 60's or older.

M-NASR cites problems in relocation

Two representatives of Maine-Niles Assn. of Special Recreation (MNASR) cited difficulty in planning programs after undergoing moves in East Maine Elementary School District 63 to accommodate the district's asbestos removal program, according to Lynn Parfitt and Martin Peccia speaking at a regular board meeting last Tuesday.

To clarify the situation, they asked to meet Friday with Superintendent of Schools Dr. Eldon Gleichman.

MNASR, a tenant at Oak School in Niles temporarily was moved to Meizer School in Morton Grove because asbestos is scheduled to be removed from Oak. Asbestos removal is being conducted throughout the district due to a state mandate.

MNASR Director Lynn Parfitt said, "Our plans for future programming are being seriously impaired because we don't know where we are going to be

located."

Both Oak and Meizer were closed to students due to declining enrollment.

Also, board members officially accepted two PTA donations, both for Washington Elementary School.

In other board action, members approved routine appointments, assignments, hirings, changes in contract and salary adjustments.

LaSasso, 17, of Niles, were arrested last month after Sgt. John Katsoolias rented four videos at the store. Of the four films, only one, "Backdoor Romance," was deemed obscene and confiscated for evidence.

Violation of the village obscenity ordinance is a Class C misdemeanor. The two employees were released after posting \$50 bond.

Despite the legal action and other activity initiated by Niles on the issue, negotiations are continuing to reach a settlement.

Mayor Nicholas Blase said Monday that village attorney Richard Troy met recently with West Coast attorneys and another meeting is scheduled for Friday, Oct. 16.

"The agreement must be compatible to both parties and would have to be something the village can accept," he said.

Richard Abt, West Coast vice president, has stated that in order to reach a settlement "to avoid going to court," an offer had been made to remove from shelves any movie found obscene by the courts. In exchange, the village would agree not to prosecute the two employees.

Blase said there are flaws in the West Coast offer. "They can remove them, but the problem is they get in 10 new films every other day which they are not going to review to see if they are obscene."

In addition, he added, Niles police would find it difficult to view every adult film that comes into the store to learn if a videotape is obscene. "It would be hard to police," he said.

In recent action, Niles made a survey of residents asking whether the village should prohibit the sale or rental of obscene material to persons 18 years and over. About 1,500 residents responded to the village letter, and as of last Friday, returns were 8 to 1 in not selling obscene material in Niles.

West Coast reacted to the opinion poll by putting a petition on the front counter early last week which asked customers to support the store in its constitutional right to sell or rent adult films.

Carolyn Ward, co-manager of the store, said Monday she had received over 200 signatures supporting constitutional rights. "Many people from Niles have signed the petition," she said.

She explained X-rated films are on shelves in a back room of the store, "Those under 18 are not allowed to go in there," she said. "Business continues to be good despite this problem with the village. That should mean something."

taking inventory and will reopen this Saturday for business, according to Pat Herbert, manager of the store.

Michael Costello, operations vice president for McDade, confirmed the six showrooms will close after a liquidation sale in December. "All our showrooms will close for a few days this month to take inventory," he said.

Jenner & Block in Chicago, which represented creditors in McDade's bankruptcy, attributes the store closings to insufficient capital and hard times for catalogue showrooms.

Reportedly, under the plan of reorganization approved in U.S. Bankruptcy Court June 30, McDade paid creditors about \$10.5 million. The company owed creditors about \$23.5 million when it entered bankruptcy March 4.

McDade opened its first store (in Carol Stream) in 1957 and the Niles facility in 1980. The catalogue store sells brand-name appliances, jewelry, electronics, toys and other merchandise. The company has assured its 800 employees it will do whatever it can to help them find other jobs.

The store which claims censorship from the village, said it has received around 200 signatures as of last week. The X-rated tape battle is getting to be a chess game and people are wondering about the next move.

On a related subject, there could be another outcry on censorship when the new version of "Peter Rabbit" hits local libraries.

The updated version of Beatrix Potter's classic "Peter Rabbit" story uses photographs of puppets, rather than the original hand-painted illustrations, and has changes in language and story content. Flopsie, Mopsie and Peter Cottontail have hit the dust with new characters introduced...making "Peter Rabbit" purists mad.

Chicago and local library specialists have voiced anger at alterations in the 1901 classic, saying that copyrights on Potter's books have expired and are fair game to anyone who wants to change them. Potter died in 1943.

A British publishing company is reprinting Potter's "The Tale of Peter Rabbit". According to a director of the Chicago-based American Library Association of Intellectual Freedom, the Inner London Education Authority has banned several books, including Potter's original 1901 classic, saying they only concern "middle class rabbits."

Now that's a carrot for Peter Rabbit to chew on.

at a regular board meeting last Tuesday. At present, aides are working without a contract, she said.

Voller said aides want a 7 percent salary increase for this school year and inclusion of a "fair share" agreement in aide contracts. The latter would provide that aides, once hired by the district, will be obliged to join the union, she said.

In a show of support, both aides and teachers from the East Maine Teachers Union (EMTA) attended the board meeting and planned on paper buttons indicating their support of the Voller read her union's stand to board members. She had attempted to read a similar paper at a September board meeting but was dissuaded by board members.

Prior to the breakdown of negotiations, District 63 offered aides a 6.55 increase, or about 1.50 more than its original offer but refused to include "fair share" clauses in new contracts.

A 7 percent increase is equivalent to that received by district custodians this year and 1 percent less than that to be received by regular teachers this year. Voller's statement to the board implied possible sex discrimination if aides are not given as high a percentage raise in salaries as male custodians.

"We perform an important supportive service to the educational process...Our role in the educational process is as important as the custodians who are receiving 7 percent. Since the men custodians are entitled to 7 percent this year and fair share, the female teacher aides should be entitled to like compensation for their work efforts," read Voller.

Voller told the Bugle the majority of District 63 aides are certified teachers and earn as aides between \$10,100 and \$12,000. Uncertified teachers earn less, or about \$9,800 to a maximum of \$10,600, she said.

Uncertified teachers have earned about 30 credit hours, or completed two years work in college, said Voller.

District 63 serves most of Niles, a portion of Morton Grove and unincorporated Maine Township.
