

Przybylo hosts dinner for air ace

Ted Przybylo, owner of the House of White Eagle, 6845 Milwaukee Ave., Niles realized a life-long dream when he hosted a testimonial dinner Dec. 3 for famed World War II and Korean air ace Colonel Francis Gabreski whose achievements earned a niche in Military history.

The testimonial dinner was sponsored by the Polonia Cares Foundation of which Przybylo is a member. The event which drew almost 1,000 people included World War II, Korean and Viet Nam veterans, Mayor Nicholas Blase and other officials and friends.

"I always wanted to meet the colonel during my army days, and having him here in my restaurant is something I will never forget," Przybylo said.

Przybylo served in World War

II and was an avid reader of Gabreski's air exploits in the army's Stars and Stripes newspaper. "I followed him in print the whole time I was in service. He's a great man," he said. "It's too bad a movie was never made about him as with other war heroes."

Col. Gabreski (ret.) was the top American air ace in the European Theater of Operations with 31 enemy fighters destroyed in aerial combat. He was also an ace in the Korean War with 6.5 in aerial combat.

A summary of his military career and achievements aired to the audience at the testimonial reads in part: Gabreski completed pilot training in 1940 at Maxwell Air Force base, Alabama, and was subsequently stationed at Wheeler Field, in Hawaii when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941.

In 1942, he was sent to England where he served as liaison officer to the Polish Air Force during which he flew 20 combat missions in Spitfires. He was then assigned to a fighter group in England.

In July, 1944, Gabreski was returning from a mission in Germany and in a second pass, his propeller tip hit a small rise on the runway causing him to crash land. After eluding the Germans for five days, Gabreski was captured.

Niles library to get new roof

A \$59,000 low bid to replace about 13,500 square feet of roof for the older portion of the Niles Public Library building was approved by board members at a meeting Wednesday, December 9. The approved low bid was submitted by SAI, a Wisconsin roofing contractor.

The library is located at 6960 Oakton St. in Niles.

At past meetings, some board members complained the move was long overdue and cited a lack of funds to correct the situation as an earlier date.

Library, large sheets of plastic are scattered at various locations to collect leakage from the ceiling.

Bids were also set back when a second set of bid specifications had to be prepared. The first set did not provide that new roofing should match that of the recent library addition. Also, roof drains needed to be cleaned by a Park Ridge firm in preparation for roof replacement.

Although roof repair may take

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

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

PUMPKIN BANANA NUT BREAD

(Makes 1 loaf)
1 cup LIBBY'S Solid Pack Pumpkin
1/2 cup (1 medium) mashed ripe banana

Woman charged with using stolen credit card



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Auto Update

Winter driving requires change in driving habits

Because winter weather often makes driving hazardous, motorists must adjust their driving habits when adverse weather conditions prevail, according to AAA-Chicago Motor Club.

During winter, a snow brush and ice scraper should be kept in the vehicle for use as needed. Motorists should remove snow and ice from all windows for maximum visibility and make sure all exterior lights are not obstructed, AAA-CMC advises.

Drivers should allow plenty of time to reach their destinations because traffic moves slowly when road conditions are hazardous. Motorists should be come accustomed to driving at slower speeds due to hazardous road conditions and increase the gap between their car and the vehicle in front to allow more stopping distance, according to AAA-CMC. A constant safe speed should be maintained on slippery roads, especially when they are snow

packed or icy. Sudden stops or quick acceleration should be avoided to decrease the chances of a skid.

If a skid occurs, don't panic and don't touch the brake pedal. Keep a firm grip on the steering wheel, ease off the gas pedal and steer the vehicle in the direction you want the front of the car to go. This technique is for both front and rear wheel drive cars.

Roads are perhaps most treacherous when the temperature hovers near freezing and the road surface has a near invisible coating of ice. Overpasses and hills also are dangerous spots where ice covered road surfaces often times prevail.

During winter, AAA-CMC advises motorists to pack an emergency kit in the vehicle which includes extra clothing, windshield washer fluid, a shovel, rock salt or sand, a basic automotive tool kit and jumper cables.

Tips for more Safety, Economy, Convenience

Cars of the Near Future

The Express may be impractical, but it is an attention getter. And even if the designers' ideas prove as impractical as the Chevy Express, they're still fun to look at and dream about.

Designers are the dreamers of the automotive world. Give one a cocktail napkin, and before you know it, he or she will be sketching out some wild new idea. But it's a long way from a few lines on a napkin to a car rolling off an assembly line.

Show cars certainly tantalize the public, but they also help automakers choose those dream cars that will actually sell. For instance, the Pontiac Trans Sport, a four-wheel-drive mini van seen at last year's shows, was so well received by both showgoers and GM executives that, next year, the company will put a similar mini van into production.

Chevy calls its yellow and black Blazer XT-1 "a vision of the truck of tomorrow." It was built to try out ideas dreamed up by various GM suppliers. As you might expect, most of these ideas involve some sort of computer. Indeed, there are 30 computer boxes in all.

The XT-1's electronic four-wheel steering may be the most radical thing about the truck. Each wheel has its own 24-volt steering motor, all of which are wired to a central computer. Chevy engineers say that since each wheel steers independently, the Blazer XT-1 can turn into a corner more quickly, and is more stable in lane change maneuvers than a four wheel steer vehicle on which each pair of wheels is linked.

One problem though! Unlike conventional power steering, the XT-1's electronic system has no mechanical backup. This means that a computer glitch might point each wheel in a totally different direction. Isn't that a wonderful thought?

Closer to production, and therefore closer to reality, is the Plymouth Grand Voyager. Based on the current Chrysler mini van, it's designed to appeal to those families who take their traveling seriously.

There's a fold-down video screen to entertain the kids on long trips, and a headphone jack so mom and dad don't have to listen to numerous hours of heavy metal music. For the littlest member of the troop, the Grand Voyager even has a built-in child safety seat. Thank you, Chrysler for that smart addition to the interior. The van was designed with the young family in mind.

A storage bin in the roof holds skis and luggage, and a picnic center in the tailgate makes for easy roadside stops. Plymouth even threw in a kitchen sink for washing those sticky hands, and a portable vacuum for cleaning smashed granola bars out of the carpeting. Imagine taking the van to your local mechanic and asking him if he could fix your vacuum!

All of these features in the Grand Voyager, including dual tires in the rear, are now available in at least limited quantities.

In addition to the Chevrolet Blazer XT-1, General Motors showed two futuristic coupes at this year's auto shows. Though they look similar with sleek bodies, covered wheels and dark bubble cockpits, the Pontiac Pursuit and Chevy Express are very different versions of the future.

The Pontiac Pursuit seems a lot more realistic according to today's standards. The engine is a turbocharged, intercooled 2.0-liter Pontiac four cylinder, very close to what is now powering the Pontiac Sunbirds.

The pursuit is four-wheel-drive and the body has air chambers at each corner which raise and lower the car for optimum ground clearance and reduced wind drag. Naturally, this is all done through a computer.

The Chevy Express is a fantasy sure to appeal to anyone who's spent Friday evening parked on the expressway. Chevrolet engineers modestly describe the Express as a "four passenger, 150 mile-per-hour alternative to the hassle of short distance air travel."

The heart of the Express is a GM gas turbine engine, similar to those used in airplanes and helicopters. Gas turbines have been proposed for cars before. But they're inefficient during stop and go driving, and they put out a blast of jet exhaust hot enough to turn passers-by into walking shish kabobs.

Fortunately, for technicians, the Express looks to be about 90% fantasy. If Chevy ever gets around to building a four seat touring coupe, it will probably look something like the Porsche 928.



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
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

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
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Save handicapped parking spaces for handicapped

Experts predict cocaine blizzard for the holidays

The staff at LIFELINE, the only substance abuse treatment program in Chicago to specialize in cocaine addiction, are predicting a cocaine blizzard for the Holiday Season.

"With the parties and long weekends, the holidays provide a built-in excuse for the cocaine user to use more," notes Dr. Larry Kroll, Clinical Director for

LIFELINE, "and one of the hardest hit areas will be the Black community." According to a recent study by the Department of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse (DASA), within the past six years the number of Blacks admitted to treatment for cocaine addiction, has increased thirteenfold.

The impact of cocaine abuse is devastating and, for many, cocaine will truly be "the grinch that stole Christmas." Family get-togethers will be forgotten, job absenteeism will increase, and money for presents will instead be spent on cocaine. By January, the cocaine abuser will be out of money, out of cocaine, and very remorseful about the holidays; severe depression is common, sometimes to the point of suicide. "Admissions will skyrocket in January," predicts Kroll.

The post-Holiday depression creates a crisis situation for the cocaine addict. This crisis is fueled by the widespread availability of "crack", as well as the cocaine abusers' inability to stop using the drug until the entire supply is exhausted. In 1987, Chicago saw the highest percent increase of cocaine abuse since 1975.

The title of 'Santa' comes only after rigorous training

Not only is it an old cliché, it's an irrefutable scientific law. You cannot be in more than one place at any given time. Yet every year without fail, a centuries-old perennial problem confronts a world begging for answers and solutions - How can Santa Claus himself give a preholiday visit to all the children of the universe?

The potential problems inherent in such a trip would boggle the minds of even the most illustrious corporate executives and world leaders. Who would supervise a cadre of elves whose ranks may number in the thousands as they battle time constraints under pressure-cooker conditions? Who would mediate labor disputes? Remember the falling out among the reindeer that left Rudolph "out in the cold" because of discrimination which could have only been resolved by Santa once that heavy fog rolled in.

And what about the state of Santa and Mrs. Claus' marriage in an age when divorce is rampant? The extra four weeks before Christmas could precipitate a marital breaking of the Santa family in a season emphasizing family togetherness.

These problems may not seem as weighty as the Middle East Crisis or the U.S.-Soviet Summit talks, but they exist, they demand realistic answers, and straightforward action. Santa needs helpers.

SMC Promotions, located in Deerfield, sensed the crying need for quality assistants to the man in the red suit. They developed the concept of Professional Santa, the creme de la creme of Santa helpers.

Phil Wenz, Professional Santa, SMC area trainer, and official Santa helper at Golf Mill, explained SMC's rigorous approach. They do not hand over a beard and red riding togs to just anyone.

According to Wenz, all potential Santa helpers must pass a minimum six-hour course. The curriculum includes storytelling, do's and don'ts, makeup, child psychology, and history of the original St. Nicholas. They are instructed to handle sticky situations ranging from candy-cane-coated fingers to a right jab in the abdomen to see if Santa's belly really shakes like jelly.

At the present time Wenz is in the process of training 40 other Santa helpers in the Chicago area besides carrying his own sack at Golf Mill.

According to Wenz, "Even the six-hour course does not cover all the training needed to attain the title, 'Professional Santa.' One must graduate from an even more intensive course of study at Santa College in Bay City, Michigan. There are only 45 people in the entire country eligible for registration as Professional Santas.

Wenz leaves no stone unturned in his mission to be worthy of his title. His top priority is being sensitive to each child's needs. He said, "Santa has to reflect the personality of the child. If a child is boisterous, Santa should be jovial and jolly. To the quiet type, a grandpa figure."

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

Don't turn holidays into tragedy

This is National Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week. As the holidays approach, all motorists should remember that drinking and driving can turn a celebration into a tragedy.

Many Illinoisans will be drinking at family gatherings and office parties during Christmas and New Year's. The following tips will help you use alcohol responsibly:

1. Know your limit. You can be legally intoxicated without feeling intoxicated. The body rid itself of alcohol through the liver at a rate of approximately one drink per hour. Do not drink more than one drink per hour and do not drink for at least an hour before driving.

2. Designate a driver. The "designated driver" is a person in the group who will not drink and will drive everyone home. This will help you to enjoy a holiday party where liquor is served and get home safely.

3. When eating out, patronize restaurants that provide escort services for customers who drink too much. Some restaurants also offer free soft drinks to "designated drivers."

4. Be a responsible host. Provide a variety of non-alcoholic drinks for "designated drivers" and for others who do not wish to drink.

5. Do not "push" alcohol. Anyone mixing or pouring drinks should be instructed to pour small amounts of liquor and avoid "overloading" drinks.

6. The food and beverage area should be set up so that guests are encouraged to nibble snacks or eat food throughout the party. Food in the stomach slows the impact of alcoholic drinks.

7. Stop serving drinks at least an hour before the party ends, and make sure intoxicated guests do not drive. Call a cab or arrange a ride for an intoxicated guest, or drive him home yourself.

Alcohol affects judgment, reduces field of vision and impairs balance, coordination and motor skills. All of these skills are critical to safe driving. Remember, you do not have to be legally drunk to be impaired.

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Ten tips for comfortable holiday travel

If taking planes, trains and automobiles over the hill to grandma's house gave you a kinked neck, still back or cramped muscles in the past, you can rejoice. Just dragging bags around the airport sends some travelers to the doctors at KJOC. And travelers in casts, on special medications or on physical therapy regimens need warnings to avoid further injury.

KJOC orthopaedic specialists offer the following 10 tips:

1. Walk, stretch and stand periodically on an airplane, bus or train. Stop the car and walk around as well. This may be all you need to make the trip en-

joyable, rather than miserable.

2. Make yourself comfortable in the seat. If you're traveling by airplane, it's a good idea to put a small airline pillow at your lower back or the back of your neck. This frequently helps the seat fit you better.

3. Carry the right kind of luggage. This can make or break your trip. Two small bags are better than one when your back is concerned. Balance them on each side rather than twisting and turning your body carrying once oversized bag.

4. Sleep on a plane or in a car or train if you need to, but make sure you use a pillow or position yourself comfortably to make the difference between a restful trip and a pain in the neck.

5. Wear loose fitting clothes—no binding belts or tight collars and sleeves.

6. Don't watch a movie if you have to look up for two hours in

the same position you could get a cramped and painful neck or shoulders.

7. Walk, don't sit, if you have to be in an airport or train terminal during a layover or bad weather.

8. Prop up your feet if you are prone to leg problems, such as swelling, or if your knees ache.

9. Use wheeled carries if you must travel with heavy bags. When lifting your luggage, bend your knees to get the handle so that you are in a semi-squatting position.

10. Plan ahead to coordinate your wardrobe so that you pack lightly.

If you suffer from back problems or are in a cast, the doctors recommend that you get to your terminal early enough to avoid the crowds. Don't get pushed or shoved, and move slowly and carefully. Take as little luggage as possible and have someone travel with you, the doctors advise.

If you are taking prescription drugs, find out there are any side effects when flying or if you should discontinue use during your trip. Carry a written prescription for a refill with you in case you lose your medication.

The Senator pointed out that smoke detectors will be required by law in every Illinois residence next year. Beginning Jan. 1, wired-in, interconnected detectors will be mandated in every newly-constructed or substantially remodeled home, whether it's an apartment, house or condominium, owned or rented. All other housing is to have detectors in place by next July 1. They can

be battery-powered or wired into the electrical system.

"We are particularly aware of the fire tragedies that occur during the holiday season," Dudydz said. "If you have a relative or friend who hasn't gotten around to installing smoke detectors yet, why not show your concern by choosing a detector as your gift? Statistics show that a high proportion of deaths in residential fires are the result of smoke inhalation rather than burns. Because these devices give early warnings of fire, they help people to escape before they are overcome by smoke."

Senator Dudydz said the new law (HB 3) requires a smoke detector within 15 feet of every room used for sleeping. In addition, all residential buildings are to have the devices in every stairwell, and single-family houses are to have the on every level, including basement.

Norwegian Christmas Tree at Museum

This year for the first time ornaments made by Norwegians and Canadians and Americans of Norwegian descent will decorate the Norwegian Christmas tree at the Museum of Science and Industry's 46th annual "Christmas Around the World" festival, which continues through January 3, 1988.

For more than 30 years, the Trollhaugen Sons of Norway Lodge 417 in South Holland has decorated the tree representing Chicago's Norwegian ethnic community. In anticipation of this project, the lodge members wrote to 375 other Sons of Norway lodges and rosmaling clubs across the U.S., Canada and Norway, asking that they contribute an ornament for the tree. The response has been strong and personal. Ornaments, often handmade,

have been sent with letters commemorating family members, such as the last Captain Arnie Veek of North Dartmouth, Mass. who was born in Skudeneshavn, Norway. His daughter was so enthusiastic about participating in the Norwegian decorations for the tree at the Museum, she made two ornaments in the traditional Norwegian art of rosmaling.

Capt. Veek's daughter painted his old sailing schooner amidst rosmaling designs. She wrote, "Dad loved his countries—both old and new, and he loved people. He would have liked this reaching out for displaying Norwegian ornaments on the Christmas tree."

The ornament that traveled the farthest for this year's tree was a carved rosmal spoon from Norway.

The lodge in Tampa Bay, Fla. made this a project for its young people by holding a competition to determine which ornament would be sent to Chicago.

The Trollhaugen Sons of Norway Lodge plans to continue its project until it has ornaments from every state in the U.S. and from every province in Canada and Norway for future trees at the Museum.

In addition to the contributed ornaments, the Norwegian tree is decorated with flags of Norway, white lights, a few pine cones and a rosmaling star on top.

Lynn V. Sove of Des Plaines, president of the Trollhaugen Sons of Norway Lodge, says: "This year our tree is the result of the true meaning of Christmas—giving and sharing. We are proud of this tree because it belongs to all those people nearby and far away who made it possible."



Festive season also time for fire safety

Along with gift shopping and holiday celebrations, homeowners should review the fire hazards of holidays in December — Chanukah, Christmas and New Year's Eve.

State Fire Marshal Tom Bestudik repeated his warning that "Along with the joy and excitement, religious significance and hope, we must take time to identify fire hazards, to assure smoke detector operation and to examine fire safety practices, with emphasis on established, reviewed and practiced exit plans so that if a fire starts, everyone has an opportunity to flee to safety."

"As far as Christmas is concerned, the tree is usually the central focus, especially for children," Bestudik said, "however, we offer a few recommendations for parents for all holidays:

Chanukah (December 16), Christmas (December 25) and New Year's Eve (December 31) — are endangered by fires as they are being celebrated with happiness and abandon. These dangers need not be if relatively simple precautions are observed. Among the precautions for every celebration would be the following:

"Be sure all exits are clear. Provide large ashtrays. Dispose of smoking materials in covered metal waste containers. Don't dump matches, pipe debris or cigarette and cigar butts in trash — smoldering smoking materials can cause paper to burst into flames later.

Establish and practice a procedure to follow in the event of a fire.

Provide a switch for controlling the lights away from a tree; do not crawl under or around a tree for any reason.

Indoor lighting sets should not be used outdoors. Outdoor lights, extension cords, and fixtures should be testing-agency approved.

Use only flame-retardant or noncombustible materials. Do not use untreated cotton batting, flocking, tissue paper or flammable foam plastics on or around the tree. Keep gift wrapping and electric trains away from tree.

Adding the 708 area code to the Chicago area will provide Illinois Bell with an additional seven million possible phone numbers.

For three months after the change, calls made without dialing the respective area code will continue to go through. When the three month "grace period" ends in February, 1990, customers will be required to dial "1" plus the area code for calls between the 708 and 312 areas.

Telephone numbers are assigned by prefix, the first three digits of a customer's phone number. Today, there are only 51 prefixes left from a pool of 792 possible number combinations in the 312 area.

In 1981, Illinois Bell introduced seven new prefixes. The number doubled in 1983 when 14 more were introduced. In 1985, the number of new prefixes put into service in one year doubled again to 33. This year Illinois Bell has assigned 28 new prefixes.

"As of today, there are 51 prefixes left," Eibel said. "These will be nearly exhausted in two years even though we are carefully conserving the supply of unassigned numbers."

All calls between the 312 and

708 areas will continue to be charged in message units at the same rates that existed before the new area code was added.

"No matter where you are in the 708 or 312 area, the cost of a call between the two area codes will not change," Eibel emphasized. "The only change will be the need to dial an area code."

For example, a call from Rogers Park in the 312 area to Evanston in the 708 area will remain a one-unit call and will cost about a nickel, just as it does today. A five-minute call from Arlington Heights in the 708 area code to downtown Chicago in the 312 area code will remain a 5.3-unit call and will continue to cost about 27 cents, the same as today.

The announcement of the date for adding 708 was made by Illinois Bell nearly two years in advance to allow customers ample time to plan for advertising and business letterhead changes and to notify clients and friends.

The current boundaries for the 312 area code extend from the Wisconsin state line, Hampshire and Oswego, to the west, south to Peotone and Beecher and east to Lake Michigan and the Indiana state line. The new boundary between the 708 and 312 codes will follow the Chicago city limits.

Since 1982, area codes have been added for New York, San Diego, Los Angeles, and Galveston. In 1988, area codes will be added in Massachusetts, Colorado, and Florida.

Set the tree in water, after cutting off about an inch of the tree to assure water absorption. Use a non-tip stand and guy-wires for stability; keep tree away from candles, TV sets, fireplaces, open flames and heat vents. Do not set it up or near an exitway.

Add water to natural trees every day; plain water is best. When the needles get dry, discard the tree.

Plastic and metallic trees should carry the label of an approved safety-testing agency. Use indirect lighting unless the tree has a built in electrical unit; do not use decorative lights on a metallic tree.

Replace worn insulation, loose bulbs sockets and broken plugs. Be sure all lighting sets are testing-agency approved.

Be sure decorative lights are away from combustible materials. Do not use candles or open flame near a tree. Do not use candles in decorations or displays.

Make sure all decorative lights are turned off before going out or to bed.

Provide a switch for controlling the lights away from a tree; do not crawl under or around a tree for any reason.

Edison construction budget hits 15-year low

Commonwealth Edison has announced its lowest five-year construction budget since before the start of the Byron and Briardwood Nuclear Generating Station construction projects.

The company announced a construction budget of \$3.65 billion for the period 1988-1992, the lowest such amount since 1972-1976. The new budget continues an overall downward trend that has prevailed since the spending plan peaked at \$6.85 billion for the period 1981-85. The 1988-1992 budget is \$450 million lower than the \$4.1 billion budget announced for 1987-1991.

The latest reduction reflects the completion of Edison's current generating station construction program. The company expects to load fuel into Briardwood Unit 2, the last remaining unit under construction, in mid-December. Fuel load, followed by low power reactor testing, officially signals the end of construction of a nuclear generating unit.

The reduction in the total construction program is the result of dropping \$1.5 billion from the forecast for 1987 and adding \$550 million to the forecast for 1987 and adding \$550 million to the forecast for 1992, plus an increase of \$500 million for the common years 1988-1991. The common years increase is caused primarily by higher expenditures for the operating generating stations as well as reinforcement of the transmission and distribution systems.

The projected outlays for each of the next five years are: \$950 million in 1988; \$800 million in 1989; \$750 million in 1990; \$600 million in 1991; and \$550 million in 1992.



The history of telephone area codes

In the late 1940's, the North American Numbering Plan (NANP) was designed by AT&T and Bell Laboratories to provide three-digit numbers as area codes. The goal of this "telephone address" system was to provide a stable numbering plan that would provide an orderly process to create and assign new area codes to meet demand driven by growth. The NANP area code system is used in the United States, Canada, the Caribbean and Mexico. Out of 152 available area codes, 137 have been spoken for and assigned, according to Bell Com-

munications Research, the administrator for the NANP. The first round of area code assignments occurred in 1947. However, there was not wide public knowledge of the action. In those days, a caller in Chicago, for example, would call a telephone company operator and say, "Give me Denver". The operator in Chicago would use the area code to connect the caller to a Denver operator, who would complete the call. In 1951, direct long-distance dialing by customers was introduced, and the national assignments of area code numbers was shared with public so customers could place their

own calls without going through an operator. New area codes have been added almost from the inception of the nationally-coordinated numbering plan. According to Bellcore, an area code was added in Missouri in the 1950s, not long after the direct long-distance dialing plan was put into place, to satisfy customer service requirements resulting from growth. In 1982, the area code 619 was added in San Diego, Calif. and in the same year, 409 was added for Galveston, Tex., in the division of Houston's 713 area code. Burank, Calif., added the 818 code in 1984 in the division of Los

Angeles 213 area code. In New York, the area code 718 was added in the 1984 division of the 212 area code. In 1988, three other area code additions have been announced: 508 for eastern Massachusetts, 719 in southern Colorado and 407 in southeastern Florida. In 1984, administrative responsibilities for the numbering plan passed from AT&T to Bell Communications Research or Bellcore, which provides research, engineering and technical support for the seven regional Bell holding companies, including Ameritech, Illinois Bell's parent company.

Smoking law...

He explained the restaurant, which seats about 80, created a 20-seat non-smoking section but does not have barriers or a separate room to prevent smoke from drifting into the no-smoking area.

The ordinance, which was amended after it was passed last June, covers any public place including retail stores, hotels and doctor's offices. Exempt from the ordinance are restaurants with 40 or fewer seats, bars, bowling alleys and tobacco stores.

According to Skokie officials, the law would be enforced on a complaint basis. If one is lodged, the location will be checked on to determine whether reasonable efforts are being made to comply with the ordinance.

If the ordinance is not complied

with, offenders can face up to \$500 a day in fines.

A co-owner of a 400-seat restaurant in Skokie, who opposed the ordinance, said he complied with the law, but does not "like it."

He noted a particular room in his restaurant attracts a majority of patrons and resolved the problem by setting up the room for half-smoking, saying the plan worked very well.

Other restaurateurs in the village reportedly resent the law because the majority of customers do not live in Skokie, but come from Morton Grove, Niles, Park Ridge and other suburbs, pointing out Skokie is imposing their rules on other suburbs.

Niles library vote...

She said library expenses have "increased considerably" and a tax increase is necessary for continued positive growth of the library district, i.e. the bookmobile, the corner parking lot and continued improvement of the book collection and services. A similar move to increase the tax rate to 25 mills failed last spring.

In a second motion by Rajski, board members set a priority of library services to be retained if the referendum is successful. Both motions arise from recommendations by the board's expenditure committee chaired by Myles Dimand.

Board priorities following a successful referendum will be to:

- ...Retain and improve the bookmobile.
- ...Remain open on Sundays during the school year.
- ...Remain open mornings, evenings and Sundays.

Board member Charlene Wagner indicated the library

County Jail and an additional six months on a work-release program in which he must return to the jail at 7 p.m. each day.

"He also must make restitution of \$1,000 to the park district. In addition, there will be a four-year probation period after his release from the county jail," McEneaney said.

In referring to the \$1,000 payment, he commented, "It's too bad it wasn't more, but I understand financial problems were involved."

Two juveniles who were also arrested and charged in connection with the fire at the Niles Recreation Center, 7877 N. Milwaukee, were found guilty in October. They were placed on probation and ordered to make restitution in the amount of \$1,000 each.

Board attorney Gabriel Berrafato said he had conferred with the state's attorney on the amount of fire damages in efforts to boost the amount from the adult offender. "I was really not optimistic this would be done," he said.

Commissioner Elaine Heinen said the park district had not received payment ordered for the two juveniles. "How long will it take in Elarde's case?"

The attorney noted because of his financial problems, the money would probably come from the county's probationary office with the check (for \$1,000) issued by Cook County.

He added there was a possibility the insurance company could claim the total \$3,000 restitution because of the

may be forced to cut services or become a municipal library if it does not receive more adequate funding. A municipal library would serve residents living in the Village of Niles, said Wagner.

"In that case, all of the unincorporated area, or about 20,000 residents would be dropped unless they buy a non-resident library card for about \$70 a year," she said.

The proposed tax increase will be about 26 cents on each \$100 of assessed valuation or about \$12 more than present library taxes, Wagner told the Bugle.

Besides the 15 mill levy, the library receives funds from an annual 2 mill site levy and additional sources such as corporate replacement taxes, revenue sharing grants, fines for lost or overdue books and fees for copies.

The Niles Public Library District serves residents in Niles and unincorporated Maine Township.

ladder and a goat balancing his four feet on the cylinder. As the musicians played their cacophony, the goat slowly tuned on the cylinder. And below the goat, in front of the ladder, two terribly forlorn three and four year old ragamuffins had tambourines in their hands, using them for collection plates to capture the pesetas which were dropped into them.

These were the sights and sounds of Christmas. The trumpet player repeated a thirty-two bar melody over and over again. The blond lady banged the bottom drum, then the top one, in a staccato-like rhythm which you couldn't get away from if you were within two blocks of the music. And there were those sad-faced children, completely immune to all the activity surrounding them, hanging on to their tambourines, while the shoppers filled up their collection plates. It was a money-maker. We estimated the effort was worth at least \$50 an hour.

The following weekend we were at the Lighthouse Shopping Center in Michigan City. Again, it was Saturday afternoon and there was a Pooh Bear and Ronald McDonald and a sleigh-ride buggy entertaining the children.

While all this good Christmas cheer was taking place, a rather oversized Elvis Presley look-a-like came walking out of one of the stores and moved into the central circle of the small center. He was wearing a white cowboy outfit, with white boots and lots of shiny things around his rather substantial waist and over his chest outfit. He was a very cool look-a-like for Elvis. As the shoppers strolled by he went into his act. He carried a microphone which he sang into while he gyrated around the circle. He was doing a lot of moves that Elvis must have done. And after several hip swivels, with all the bumps and grinds, he struck a still

pose, freezing in his tracks, while a photographer with a video camera came in and took a close-up of the new Elvis. Then he'd go on with his act, singing into his microphone which was connected to a much too weak speaker system, which came out of a small radio he had perched on a bench. tured and interned for 10 months until he was liberated by the Russians in April, 1945.

On returning to the United States, he held several top positions in the air force, and briefly returned to civilian life until he was recalled to active service in 1947. In 1951, the ace became commander of the 51st Fighter Interceptor Wing in Korea. His last assignment before retiring from the military was in Nov., 1967 as commander of the 52nd Fighter Wing in New York, where he and his wife now reside.

His decorations and service awards include the Distinguished Flying Silver Star, Bronze Star, Legion of Merit, Air Medal with four Oak Leaf clusters, British Distinguished Flying Cross, Polish Cross of Valor, French Croix de Guerre with palms and many others.

Przybylo said he took the colonel and his wife on a tour of Chicago prior to the Dec. 3 event. "They enjoyed the Christmas decorations on Michigan Ave. and State St. We were there for five hours and had a wonderful time," he said.

Przybylo explained the Polonia Cares Foundation was formed last year and is committed to aid educational programs and elderly persons through fund-raising efforts.

about 11 p.m. Monday. Crews then plowed neighborhood streets.

"It wasn't even snowing at 10 p.m. and the next thing I knew, the sky let loose and all this snow came down," Peck said. "Because of the intense, heavy wet snow, this is the worst snowstorm since 1979 posing a problem with clean-up chores."

"It explained the large trucks could not go into the neighborhood streets, because it was difficult to maneuver around the parked cars. However, he said, even the small trucks had problems with clean-up chores because of the type of snowfall and the parked cars.

"Another problem was the continuous falling snow. We would clean up the streets and have to go back and do it all over again," he said.

Peck said workers went back to neighborhoods all day Tuesday and "probably will continue until Wednesday" where cars have been removed from the streets. "I would encourage residents to keep their cars in the driveways when there is a forecast of heavy snow. It would make it a lot easier on the men," Peck said. "These men did a wonderful job."

Change driving techniques during winter

Recent light snow and freezing rain in Illinois should remind many motorists to change their driving techniques during winter months. One of the first things to remember is how to correctly and safely brake on snow and ice.

Pumping the brakes of a front-wheel-drive vehicle can cause them to lock, resulting in steering loss and possibly causing the vehicle to spin out of control. To avoid spinning out, squeeze the brakes with slow steady pressure until just before they lock. Ease off the pedal until you feel the wheels rolling easily and then squeeze the brakes again.

Practice this technique until squeezing the brakes becomes automatic. The technique works equally well with both front- and rear-wheel-drive vehicles.

If you go into a turn too fast and your front-wheel-drive vehicle starts to slide straight ahead, take your foot off the accelerator but do not squeeze the brakes. Once you are in a skid, hitting the brakes could make it worse.

Two practices sometimes used to increase traction on snow-

covered streets are not safe. Reducing tire pressure and putting extra weight in the trunk of the vehicle can affect steering adversely. Reducing tire pressure also increases tire wear.

The times turned in at this meet is definitely an indication that the program is working well, for the swimmers have been dropping seconds, consistently.
