I grew up south side Irish. You didn't have to be Irish, but all around you were the markings of the Irish.

At the centerpiece of our growing up was football. Saturday morning we played four-hour games in the empty lot a couple of doors from our house. The kids from the next block would bring their motley group and we would play until 1 p.m. We'd leave the glories of the playing field, go home and scrub the grime from our faces and head for St. Columbanus Church where the quarterback and the linemen would attend confession. The Jewish kid would sit on the steps facing 71st street and wait for the guys to complete their duties.

We then hurried home and tuned in Graham MacNamera who broadcasted the Notre Dame game.

From 2 p.m. until 4 p.m. on Saturdays there was nobody on the streets. Notre Dame became a second religion on the south side and only the fallen would dare go out Saturday afternoons.

Local libraries receive Cook County grants

Secretary of State and State Librarian Jim Edgar announced that 96 libraries in Cook County will receive state grants totalling \$5,260,827.48 this year.

According to Edgar, 541 libraries statewide will receive more than \$9 million in per capita grants. In addition, \$475,820 in equalization aid was awarded to 94 libraries throughout the state. "Per capita grants to libraries

in Illinois have always been an important source of revenue and that importance has taken on even greater significance as outside funding sources become scarce," Edgar said. Assording to Gary Karshna, the village's finance director, the village received a credit of \$37,616 which will be applied toward premiums because of a good loss control record. "Because of a good safety program, total claims paid out on all types of insurance provided by IRMA totaled \$44,652 in 1987 compared to \$61,110 in 1986," he said. Some of the towns in the IRMA membership face penalties because of a reported poor record on insurance claims. In the overall picture, however, IRMA has cut the fees to its members by more than 22 percent, according

to an official of the Oakbrook Terrace-based agency.



Senior Citizen Real Estate Tax Exemption

Senior citizens are now eligible for a homestead exemption during the year in which they turn 65, according to Niles Township Assessor Robert P. Hanrahan.

The homestead exemption provides tax relief by reducing the equalized assessed valuation of a property by \$2,000.

Those seeking a homestead exemption must be 65 years of age or older during the year for which they apply and must either own their principal residence or have a lease in which they are responsible for property taxes. Applicants must provide proof of age, ownership, and a recent real estate bill

COST OF LIVING ADJUSTMENT
Social Security benefits will increase 4.2 percent beginning with the benefits received in January, 1988. This year's cost of living adjustment is reported to be the largest in the past five years. Average Social Security monthly benefits are currently \$513 for an individual and \$876 for a couple. Widows average \$468 per month, and disabled persons, \$508. For those who retired in 1987, \$822 is the maximum individual monthly payment.

TAXABLE BENEFITS

Up to half of an individual's Social Security benefits may be subject to tax if a person is single and taxable income and interest income plus half of those benefits are more than \$25,000. For couples filing jointly, the base figure is \$32,000. The amount of benefits subject to tax with combined incomes exceeding the base amount is the smaller of: half the amount over the base figure, of half of the benefits received. If combined income is under the base figure, breathe a sigh of relief, the taxman will not cometh.

Severe hearing loss affacts only thirty percent of the people over the age of 65, but some hearing loss affects a great number of older people. High pitched sounds are the first affected. Asking the speaker to lower the pitch of the voice can often overcome this problem and is more effective than speaking louder, which usually makes the speaker's voice high. Many older people complain that people mumble when they are talking, when a speaker is not facing the listener, speaks rapidly, or does not ennunciate clearly, the problems are magnified. Free hearing screening and hearing aid maintenance will be available for Morton Grove senior citizens from 10 to noon on Thursday, January 21 in the Prairie View Community Center. OSTEOPOROSIS PREVENTION

Research findings indicate that bone loss can be slowed and possibly stopped by correcting the lifestyle factors that provided the initial stages of rapid bone loss. Prevention early, in the youthful years is the key. Since once a person develops osteoporosis, there is no cure. Some tips on prevention are: 1) Consume an adequate amount of calcium. 2) Exercise regularly. 3) Stop smoking and drink alcoholic beverages only in moderate amounts. 4) Obtain an adequate level of vitamin D daily. 5) Avoid excessive consumption of phosphorus, proteins, fats, vitamin A, sodium, caffeine or fiber. All are known to decrease intestinal absorption of calcium and increase the chances of calcium excretion from the body. 6) Reduce emotional stress and anxiety.

The destructiveness of an accident increases with the velocity of the cars involved. What is not understood or is deliberately ignored is the magnitude of the forces possessed by moving cars. Those in favor of increased speed limits pretend that accident severities are about the same at 65 MPH as they are at 55 MPH. Recent data released by the National Safety Council show that the death rate resulting from automobile accidents has increased 50. in those states that have opted for the higher speed limit. Advocates of higher speed limits pooh-pooh these data and

Chicagoans have held on to their football heritage. When the recent resurgence of the Bears brought a championship they expected the glory days were back. Chicago has been a tough town. We kick butt.
