After the observance of a moment of silence in memory of the late Mayor Richard Flickinger, the Village Board turned to the business at hand—the election of a temporary mayor to fill out the balance of the term. The new mayor will serve until the municipal elections of April, 1989. The meeting was recessed while the trustees went into executive session to decide upon nominations.

Two candidates were nominated—Neil Cashman and Richard Hohs. The two trustees are the senior members on the council, but there seemed to be some controversy over the nomination of Cashman. Some trustees felt that due to the fact Cashman's son owns a business in Morton Grove that serves liquor, and the mayor is automatically a member of the

Gleichman proposes student move options

Following extensive parent and teacher protests on a recommendation to gain additional classroom space by next September, Superintendent of Schools Dr. Eldon Gleichman proposed 15 additional options at a regular board meeting February 9.

A majority of options included clustering students by grades, opening Apollo Junior High or Melzer schools and closing

smaller Stevenson School. Student clusters, for example, could include kindergarten to 3rd graders in one school while 4th to 6th graders attend a different school.

CIRCUMCISION

To circumcise or not to circumcise: that is the dilemma many expectant parents face as the birth of a child approaches. Jewish boys are automatically circumcised 8 days after birth in a religious ceremony marking the covenant between God and Israel. Moslem boys are circumcised at 13 to emulate the age when Mohammed was circumcised. The USA is the only western nation which extensively practices nonreligious circumcision. If you walk through a male locker room, you'll see how widespread it is. Until recently, few questioned this practice and doctors advocated circumcision for health and hygienic reasons. Most parents followed their doctors' recommendations.

The number of circumcisions is declining because of negative publicity. Magazine articles and books have appeared claiming the health benefits are exaggerated, circumcision is a barbaric mutilation, and even that "many circumcised adults have had bad psychological after-effects caused by a sense of deprivation and a loss of wholeness." The U.S. Army has just released a report supporting circumcision, citing data that a very high percentage of uncircumcised soldiers suffer recurrent, painful urinary infections. Circumcised soldiers rarely have these ailments. The area under the foreskin of a penis is an ideal spot for the accumulation of dirt and the growth of disease-causing bacteria. Proper cleaning reduces the incidence of urinary infections but does not eliminate them. Other studies reveal the wives of Jewish husbands have a low incidence of vaginal infections. I urge all obstetricians to read this report and to act accordingly. I hope that expectant parents will consider the long-term interests of their children-to-be when asked "the question".

HONEY VERSUS SUGAR

Food faddists proudly proclaim they use honey instead of sugar. Honey, they claim, is a natural, nutritious, and healthful food while refined sugar is practically a poison. This is a lot of baloney. These faddists not only deceive themselves, but also reveal their ignorance of nutrition and the chemistry of sugar compounds. Common sugar (sucrose) is a pure, crystalline product derived from sugar cane or sugar beets. The sugar in honey is chemically very similar to sucrose and has identical caloric and nutritional values. Both represent "empty calories", devoid of minerals, vitamins, protein, or fiber. They merely supply energy. If honey had the nutritional attributes claimed, we would have to eat huge quantities to reap the imaginary benefits. This would give us bad teeth and make us fat.

Honey is made by bees from flower nectar. It is a water solution of sugar, colorants, and congeners which produce its pleasant taste, aroma, and color. I'm not knocking honey. But we should enjoy it for what it is and not pretend that by substituting it for sugar we are doing our bodies a favor and prolonging our lives. Nothing beats a nice slice of honey cake. When anyone in my family gets a cold, they always ask me to prepare them a nightcap of honey, lemon juice, and whiskey. Sugar just won't do!

HINTS FOR BETTER PHOTOGRAPHY

Photography has been my hobby for 53 years. I have exhibited my work and have been awarded prizes. Whenever I see people missing their camera, I shudder. I often try to suggest better ways to take pictures. Some thank me, but most resent my advice and don't hesitate to tell me so. Now, I hold my tongue and let them suffer the inevitable consequences. Since you can't directly reply, I can safely present some simple, but effective pointers for better, more pleasing snapshots. So, here goes!

Flash Use - Never take a picture with a built-in flash if the subject is more than 20 feet away. Even with a large, powerful flash gun, 50 feet is the limit. Do not place your subjects directly in front of a mirror, window, or a glass pane. If you can't avoid it, stand at an angle to the reflective surfaces so the flash won't bounce back into the lens and produce a burned out spot in your picture.

Indoors - Clear away all objects from the foreground that will obstruct the view. These will also be distracting.

Outdoors - On a bright, sunny day, always pose your subjects with the sun behind you, shining on their faces. Never take a picture with the lens facing into the sun. Avoid pictures where the subjects are in shade and you are in sunlight and vice versa.

Nilesite, cohort indicted in Medicaid Fraud

A Niles man and a consultant to the Chicago Board of Health were indicted in connection with a \$306,000 Medicaid fraud scheme Monday, Feb. 9.

Indicted were Rogelio Delacruz, 48, of Niles, and Mario Rubinelli, 69, of Chicago, an optometrist and Board of Health consultant who formerly was a consultant to the Illinois Department of Public Aid.

A federal grand jury charged that from August, 1984, to August, 1987, Rubinelli allegedly billed the state for more than \$300,000 in fictitious optometry services and kicked back part of the proceeds to Delacruz for his help in the scheme, according to Asst. U.S. Attorney Mary Hankenrider.

The Department of Public Aid administers the Medicaid program here, but the federal government provides part of the funds, she said.

The federal indictment charged that Delacruz, who is not licensed to work in the state's Medicaid program, allegedly treated patients at health clinics he and Rubinelli opened at two Chicago offices.

Delacruz allegedly provided eye examinations for Medicaid recipients and prescribed glasses for patients even though they were unnecessary, according to the indictment.

The grand jury also charged Delacruz allegedly obtained Medicaid numbers from patients at the clinics and passed the in-

formation to Rubinelli, who then used it in submitting bills for eye examinations and other services he never performed, Hankenrider said.

Hankenrider stated the case will go to trial in three weeks in the Federal Court Building in Chicago.

Capparelli seeks owners of unclaimed assets

State Representative Ralph C. Capparelli (D-13) is trying to locate constituents who may have funds which they have forgotten.

He is working with the Illinois Department of Financial Institutions in a cooperative effort to find owners of unclaimed assets.

"Many area residents have at least \$100 of assets waiting to be claimed," Capparelli said.

"These unclaimed assets generally consist of checking or savings accounts, dividends, uncashed payroll checks and safe deposit box contents, although they could consist of nearly any unclaimed financial asset," he said.

After assets have been abandoned or inactive for seven years, the holder of that property must attempt to locate the owner. If the effort fails, the assets are turned over to the State. The State then holds the assets indefinitely until they are claimed by the owner or heirs of the estate. To date, the State of Illinois has reunited owners with over 12 million dollars.

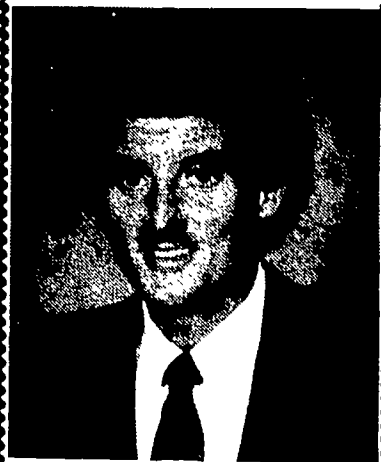

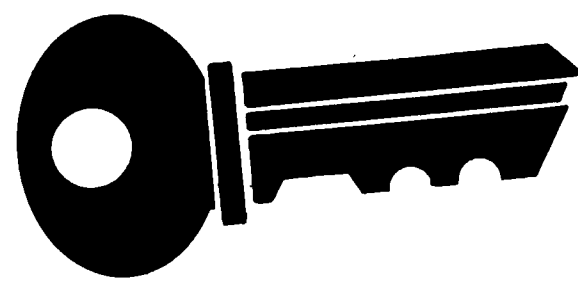
goal in the period to take a 2-1 lead as the period ended.

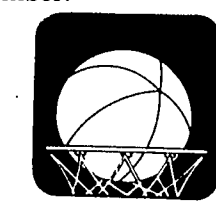
After a well played but scoreless second and third period the game ended in a 1 to 1 tie and both teams are to be congratulated for their fine play.

Winter enrollment up at North Central

When Fall Term classes for the 1987-88 academic year started at North Central College last September, 2,196 students - the largest number ever in the 127-year history of the independent college of liberal arts and sciences - had enrolled.

Nilehi Schools among top AP schools

For the second year in a row, both Niles West and Niles North High Schools are among the top 50 midwestern schools in the number of Advanced Placement (AP) tests their students took in 1987. Niles West ranked seventh and Niles North 27th in AP participation according to the College Board, which prepares and scores the AP examinations.

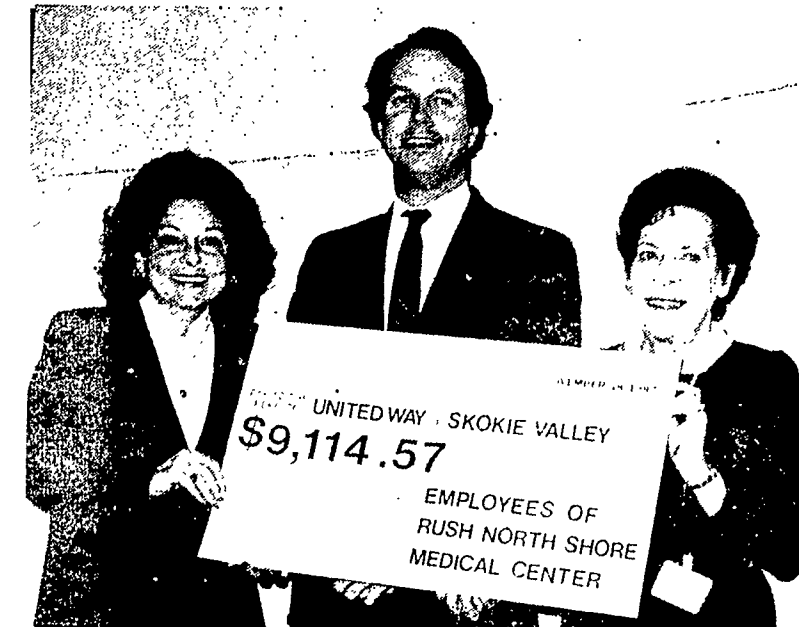

Arroyave Academy teaches 13 languages

In today's shrinking world, nations are increasingly dependent on one another, and this includes the United States. Isolationism is past history. We see an increasing need for Americans to become proficient in another language. This is particularly true among those being trained for overseas assignments in government, business, educational or religious missions; or to head up a foreign executive post. International understanding and cross-cultural communication are essential skills.

Whether one travels to soak up the sun on Mexico's sunny coasts or to negotiate a contract in Japan, knowledge of a foreign language is needed for good public relations, besides being a plus for any post with an international flavor. Japanese companies in Illinois alone have billions of dollars invested.

Basic communication is the pass-word for improved relations between countries and corporations at the conference table. It is not uncommon to hear stories of U.S. executives—and, at times, scores of American personnel—being sent abroad with no knowledge of the language, geography or customs of the country in which they will live and work.

Guillermo L. Arroyave, director and founder of the Arroyave Academy of Languages, cites the case of an international lawyer from a very large company, who

Elementary and high schools should offer foreign language instruction, and colleges and universities must raise their standards by requiring knowledge of a second language for graduation.

There has been little support for foreign language or geographic study in this country's schools. "In Illinois public grade schools, geography is not taught on its own...and it's possible to be certified in social studies without ever taking a course in geography."

The appeal we made on behalf of Niles' finest was a bit schmaltzy, a bit emotional. But, despite the years of bumping heads with Niles Mayor, we've been aware Nick has a heart. And when you can't appeal to Nick through cerebral channels, you go to that soft spot just below his left shoulder.

The selection of Giovannelli completes a Daily Double which is strictly big league. Blase and friends did themselves proud when they chose Harry Kinowski to head the fire department. Now, with the new police chief choice, they made two excellent selections which should give Niles great leadership well into the 1990's and perhaps into the 21st century. It's likely both men will still be heading their departments after Blase and his friends have retired from public office. Hopefully, they will stay

in place when the new politics take over.

The passing of Morton Grove's mayor, Dick Flickinger, saddens everyone who knew him. Despite his previous bouts with illness he remained actively in office. Dick was a fighter who bucked the old-timers in town in bringing Morton Grove into a more progressive era.

While Morton Grove's overall efforts are no more significant than their neighbors, nevertheless, their gun ban ordinance gave the community a bit of national recognition. Monday, The New York Times, the newspaper of record in the United States, had an article about the passing of Flickinger, noting he led the town's efforts as one of the first in the U.S. to ban handguns.

The list of 15 options was released verbally but not in writing either to the public or press at this time because of its preliminary nature, said Gleichman.

In presenting the list, however, Gleichman said he is not retracting an original recommendation to house 6th grade students from crowded Nelson and Stevenson schools at Gemini. To date, 7th and 8th grade students attend Gemini which is the district's only open junior high school.

Under Gleichman's original plan, 6th grade students from Mark Twain and Washington schools will remain at their respective schools. Also, all special education students who are to be mainstreamed, or placed into a regular academic setting, will be sent to Washington and Mark Twain.

Apollo, the district's second junior high school, was closed in 1981 due to declining student enrollment but, according to Gleichman, provides the financially ailing district with needed revenue from two tenants, Northridge Preparatory Academy and the Center on Deafness.

It is probable the district will lose both tenants if they are forced to move, he said.

Both parents and teachers seem to be united in opposing Gleichman's first plan which many termed "educationally unsound" in dividing 6th graders and a "band-aid" approach to district problems. About 50 persons attended Tuesday's meeting and approximately 200 parents protested Gleichman's recommendation at a February 1 meeting.

Cook County State's Attorney Richard M. Daley is scheduled to attend the Feb. 23 meeting of his Senior Advisory Council beginning at 10:30 a.m. at Maine Township Hall, 1700 Ballard Rd., in Park Ridge.

The council was created by Daley to advise him on the needs and concerns of senior citizens in the judicial district, which includes Des Plaines, Niles and Park Ridge.

defray such costs as traffic lights, sewer extension and road improvements. The arrangement allows for money to be repaid through future sales tax revenues from the shopping center.

According to Niles Village Trustee Abe Selman, chairman of the finance committee, Niles can sell bonds to defray the cost of improvements and then retire the bonds through sales revenue from the project. Skokie's portion of the site is 70 percent and 30 percent is on the Niles side. Niles allocation under TIF is \$5.5 million for the AT&T property, he said.

Selman explained construction costs for the development are the burden of developers who do their own financing for the project. TIF is restricted to improvements only (traffic signalization, public utilities, road and sewer improvement, etc.).

"Any unused funds under TIF may be utilized for other property in Niles as long as it is within the financing district," Selman said.

He added village officials will meet with developers in the near future to discuss "reasonable expenditures" for improvements on Niles portion of the property. The finance committee will then make a recommendation to the village board for final approval, he said.

The villages must also agree on how to provide such services as fire and police protection and public utilities. "There is a tentative agreement to have joint coverage for the entire site to avoid confusion in the event of a fire or police problem," Karshna said.

Seymour Taxman, whose Taxman Corp. is developing the center with Trammell Crow Co., said the first phase of construction is scheduled to start on the Niles side this spring.

The project cannot begin, however, until AT&T gives both villages required documentation that any hazardous waste has been removed from the site.

District 63, aides reach salary accord

Following a January impasse in negotiations between a union for teachers aides and East Maine Elementary School District 63, board members approved salaries for 31 aides based on the district's final offer. Salaries were approved at a Tuesday, February 9 meeting.

Following board action, aides will be paid an annual salary ranging from \$9,026 to \$11,343 if they have 30 hours of college work and from \$10,571 to \$12,918 with four years of college credit.

According to Judi Voller, president of the East Maine Teachers' Aides Assn. (EMTAA), union members asked for a 7 percent salary increase for the 1987-88 school year. Voller said a 7 percent increase would be equivalent to that received by custodians and 1 percent less than that received by regular teachers. There are a total of about 31 full and part-time aides in District 63.

EMTAA also asked for inclusion of a "fair share" agreement in contracts between aides and the district. The latter would provide all aides hired by the district be obliged to pay EMTAA dues, she said.

In other action, board members resolved to consider four additions to board policy, including one for students with chronic communicable diseases such as AIDS, tuberculosis and hepatitis.

Other policy additions will be for employees with temporary illness or incapacity, unpaid disability leave and employee inability to evaluate and observe.

"We have to see what happens at Lawrencewood before we decide what to do with the site," he said. "If no use can be found for the property, it will probably go on the market."

Marcheschi added village officials at the time were also considering the purchase of additional property to the north of the corner for easier access to the site, but the plan has been dropped.

The property, which is located across the street from the police station, would have given the village a fourth corner at the Touhy-Milwaukee intersection, giving it a more hypothetical center of town image.

However, if the Lawrencewood suit is successful, a centralized location for the various departments on a large acreage at the shopping center will better serve the interests of both the village and residents, Marcheschi explained.

Niles filed the condemnation suit in June, 1987 and is expected to go to trial at the Cook County Circuit Court this week.


