Homeowners victims in home repair scam

Day in court...the Lawrencewood saga may be going into its final chapter of turbulent history now that the Niles condemnation suit against the 25-year-old shopping center is in the courts. It probably will take months before a decision is made on the case ... and it's expected property owner Robert Krilich will put up a big fight to keep the 37-acre property in his domain.

A key issue is the \$5.8 million offered by the village for the property, which Krilich reportedly sneezed at. According to his attorneys, the property is worth in the neighborhood of \$10 million. As the drama unfolds at the trial, it should be interesting to see how the issue turns out in the hands of the jury.

In its heyday, Lawrencewood was a viable, revenue-producing entity and a popular site for Niles Days, as well as other activities sponsored by various civic organizations. Lawrencewood woes began in the mid-1970's when its anchor store, Goldblatt's closed its doors followed with a move-out by Walgreen's National Foods and Jupiter, a subsidiary of K-Mart.

Over the years, the village waged a battle with Krilich to bring the shopping center into compliance with municipal codes via the courts. His apparent inability to assure conformance, or to improve the aging center with outside developers, is believed to be a major factor in the village's move last June to file the condemnation suit. 



Honey is made by bees from flower nectar. It is a water solution of sugar, colorants, and congeners which produce its pleasant taste, aroma, and color. I'm not knocking honey. But we should enjoy it for what it is and not pretent that by substituting it for sugar we are doing our bodies a favor and prolonging our lives. Nothing beats a nice slice of honey cake. When anyone in my family gets a cold, they always ask me to prepare them a nightcap of honey, lemon juice, and whiskey. Sugar just won't do!

HINTS FOR BETTER PHOTOGRAPHY

Photography has been my hobby for 53 years. I have exhibited my work and have been awarded prizes. Whenever I see people misusing their camera, I shudder. I often try to suggest better ways to take pictures. Some thank me, but most resent my advice and don't hesitate to tell me so. Now, I hold my tongue and let them suffer the inevitable consequences. Since you can't directly reply, I can safely present some simple, but effective pointers for better, more pleasing snapshots. So, here goes!

Flash Use - Never take a picture with a built-in flash if the subject is more that 20 feet away. Even with a large, powerful flash gun, 50 feet is the limit. Do not place your subjects directly in front of a mirror, window, or a glass pane. If you can't avoid it, stand at an angle to the reflective surfaces so the flash won't bounce back into the lens and produce a burned out spot in your picture.

Indoors - Clear away all objects from the foreground that will obstruct the view. These will also be distracting. Outdoors - On a bright, sunny day, always pose your subjects with the sun behind you, shining on their faces. Never take a picture with the lens facing into the sun. To circumcise or not to circumcise: that is the dilemma many expectant parents face as the birth of a child approaches. Jewish boys are automatically circumcised 8 days after birth in a religious ceremony marking the covenant between God and Israel. Moslem boys are circumcised at 13 to emulate the age when Mohammed was circumcised. The USA is the only western nation which extensively practices nonreligious circumcision. If you walk through a male locker room, you'll see how widespread it is. Until recently, few questioned this practice and doctors advocated circumcision for health and hygienic reasons. Most parents followed their doctors' recommenda-


The number of circumcisions is declining because of negative publicity. Magazine articles and books have appeared claiming the health benefits are exaggerated, circumcision is a barbaric mutilation, and even that "many circumcised adults have had bad psychological after-effects caused by a sense of deprivation and a loss of wholeness". The U.S. Army has just released a report supporting circumcision, citing data that a very high percentage of uncircumcised soldiers suffer recurrent, painful urinary infections. Circumcised soldiers rarely have these ailments. The area under the foreskin of a penis is an ideal spot for the accumulation of dirt and the growth of disease-causing bacteria. Proper cleaning reduces the incidence of urinary infections but does not eliminate them. Other studies reveal the wives of Jewish husbands have a low incidence of vaginal infections. I urge all obstetricians to read this report and to act accordingly. I hope that expectant parents will consider the long-term interests of their children-to-be when asked "the question".

HONEY VERSUS SUGAR

CIRCUMCISION

Food faddists proudly proclaim they use honey instead of sugar. Honey, they claim, is a natural, nutritious, and healthful food while refined sugar is practically a poison. This is a lot of baloney. These faddists not only deceive themselves, but also reveal their ignorance of nutrition and the chemistry of sugar compounds. Common sugar (sucrose) is a pure, crystalline product derived from sugar cane or sugar beets. The sugar in honey is chemically very similar to sucrose and has identical caloric and nutritional values. Both represent "empty calories", devoid of minerals, vitamins, protein, or fiber. They merely supply energy. If honey had the nutritional attributes claimed, we would have to eat huge quantities to reap the imaginary benefits. This would give us bad teeth and make us fat.

Elementary School District 63, board members approved reporting on the district's 1987 salaries for 31 aides based on the summer school, said about 331 district's final offer. Following board action, aides at Stevenson School. will be paid an annual salary ranging from \$9,026 to \$11,343 if they have 30 hours of college work and from \$10,571 to \$12,918

with four years of college credit. According to Judi Voller, president of the East Maine Teachers' Aides Assn. (EMTAA), union members asked for a 7 percent salary increase for the 1987-88 school year. Voller said a 7 percent increase would be equivalent to that received by that without additional revenue, custodians and 1 percent less the library may lose the than that received by regular teachers.
