

District 71 approves addition of four bus stops

To alleviate a possible safety problem for students north of Howard walking to Culver School, Niles Elementary School District 71 board members approved adding four new bus stops in the district at Tuesday's meeting.

According to board member Vincent Bugarin, the bus stops will be in the general vicinity of Howard and Harlem and Nordica and Howard. "The decision on the exact locations will be made by administrators," said Bugarin.

The former policy required all children living north of Howard to walk to Culver School at 8921 Oakton St. Parents were upset because they live just over the line. Others criticized who had already been riding the bus, even

Illinois History Display

Documenting 250 years of Illinois history, will be on view at the Skokie Public Library from Feb. 29 to March 19. Developed by the Illinois State Archives, the exhibit illustrates Illinois heritage through documents, photographs

and publications. Through preserved State Archives documents, the exhibit traces the roots of early Illinois settlers to modern day Illinois. This exhibit provides a unique opportunity to view archival materials from the State Archives Building in Springfield. A sampling of actual and facsimile documents to be exhibited are the 1739 French Register of Donations, showing the legal transfer of property, 1846 Registry of Negroes, from a county record of free black residents, photos of early Illinois schools, product trademarks from 1891-1930 and many maps and documents from the early statehood years and the Lincoln era.

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Williams takes Conroy's seat on Maine Board

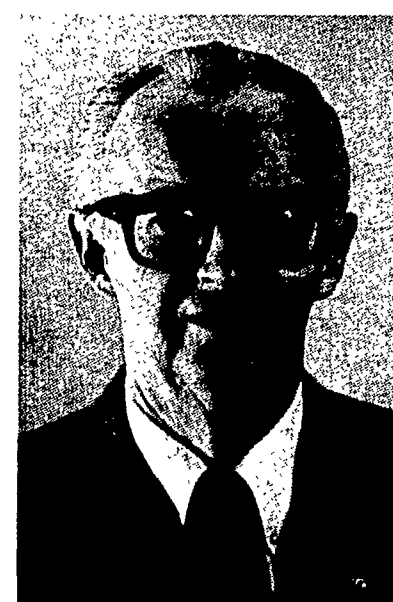
Robert C. Williams of Park Ridge has been appointed to serve on the Maine Township Board of Trustees to replace Dee Conroy who died in December.

Pro-lifers stage second rally at Lutheran General

About 100 members of various pro-life groups marched for a two hour rally in a second major demonstration at Lutheran General Hospital, 1775 Dempster St., Park Ridge, last Saturday, Feb. 13, to protest the hospital's abortion policy.

Among the groups represented at the protest march Saturday afternoon were the Northwest Christian Action Council, Park Ridge Pro-Life, Illinois Citizens Concerned for Life, and representatives from the Willows Academy and Our Lady of Ransom parish, both in Niles.

In the past, various pro-life

groups have protested the hospital's policy of permitting abortions during the first trimester (three months) of pregnancy.

Hospital board members recently approved a proposal to allow second trimester abortions if a fetus is determined to have severe birth defects during prenatal screening.

The hospital will also permit abortions if a fetus is believed to endanger the health or life of the mother. The decision to abort will be up to the mother in such circumstances, a hospital

"After the last referendum, held in November 1986, residents told us they didn't know that the branch library was going to be closed if the referendum failed," said Terri Spreckman Carman, Library Board President. "We are taking every step available to us to make certain that as many people as possible are fully aware of the impact of this referendum."

On March 15 the Library District will be asking the voters to approve a maximum tax levy of .281. This is an increase from the library's present maximum levy of .150. The library has not had a tax increase since 1973, and during that time the library's costs have risen drastically. "Our costs have risen 217% for hardcover books, 306% for paperbacks, 300% for electricity and 417% for gas," said Charlene Wagner, Board Treasurer. "We

Library layoffs inevitable if March referendum fails

Niles Fire Dept. calls

Niles Library staff reductions may take place in departments affected by service reductions and according employee evaluations if a tax increase referendum for the library fails to pass in a March 15 election. This was reported to the library board by the board's referendum committee at a regular Feb. 10 meeting.

Following some debate, board members agreed with the committee in a 4-3 vote that tenure should not be a factor in retaining personnel if cuts are necessary. Also, cuts will not take place until next fiscal year which begins July 1, 1988.

Board member Margaret Rajski argued almost all organizations consider employee tenure before layoffs and, no to do so, is "almost obscene."

Library Administrator D. J. McKenzie said the board decided five years earlier to provide staff members with merit increases.

"Do you want to begin giving mixed messages by awarding tenure," he said.

"Let's face it. There's no easy way to make cuts," said Board President Terri Carman.

About one-third of the library's staff of 50 may be laid off if and when some library services cease, according to estimates by

board members.

In Dec. of 1987, the board voted its first cut following failure of the referendum would be discontinuance of bookmobile services. This could include layoff of bookmobile staff members.

Other staff members may be laid off if the library is forced to close on Sundays and/or shorten weekday hours.

Voters will be asked to approve a .281 tax levy for an increase of about \$12 a year in library taxes. The present library levy is .150, lowest per capita support of eight area libraries. Following failure of a former referendum in Nov., 1986, a Niles branch Library in Ballard School was closed.

In other actions regarding the referendum, three board members reported successful discussions with the public about the library's need for increased revenue.

Other public relations efforts will be aimed at schools, homeowners associations, press releases, cross-referencing of names and telephone numbers and production of other election materials, according to a member of the referendum committee.

help paying their utility bills.

Apartment dwellers whose heat is included in their rent may also be eligible for the subsidies.

Income eligibility guidelines based on a 90-day period are: \$1,719 for one person; \$2,313 for a household of two; \$2,906 for three; \$3,500 for four; \$4,094 for five; \$4,688 for six; \$5,281 for seven; and \$5,875 for eight.

An appointment is necessary and can be made by calling the Maine Township Social Services Department at 297-2510.

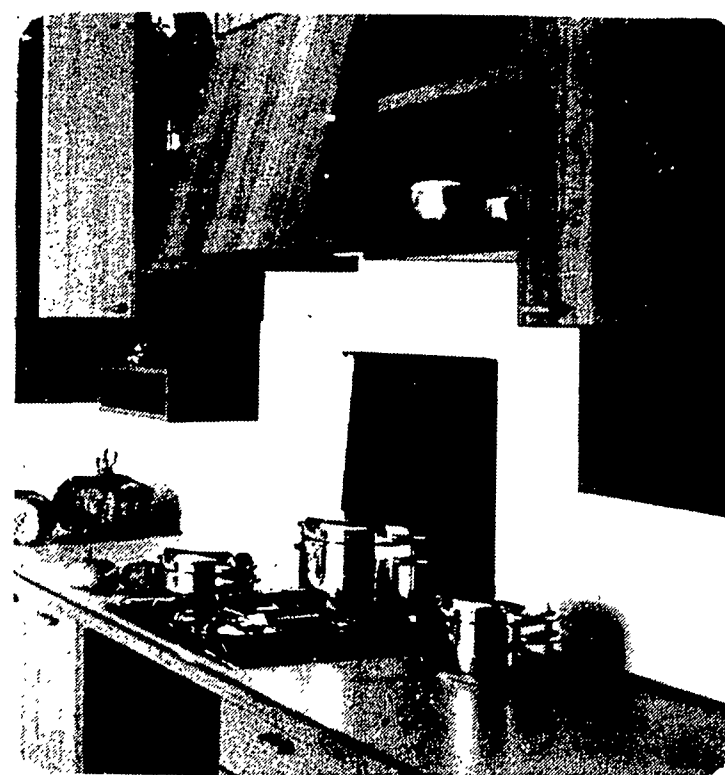

EXTRATERRESTRIAL WORLDS

All of us would like to know if other worlds exist, what their inhabitants would look like, how far away these other worlds are, and could their inhabitants easily reach us. These are interesting, but difficult questions to answer. Much has been written and said about aliens from outer space and many have claimed "to have sighted UFO's." From the number of "sightings", you would think the aliens operate a regular commuter service. Scientists of many learnings agree that, for life to exist on other worlds, the conditions for life on earth must be duplicated. Also, earth chemistry is identical to chemistry everywhere in the universe.

If we microscopically examined living cells from trees, animals, fish, and humans, we couldn't tell them apart. These cells live and grow by identical biochemical processes. The only difference lies in the genes and chromosomes of the nuclei. These determine what a cell becomes, a cat or a baby boy. While we can say that an alien will have a biochemistry identical to ours, we can't predict what he may look like.

Astronomers feel that there may be a trillion stars in the universe. If one millionth of these were the same size as our sun with a similar solar system, we could have a million celestial cousins. The nearest star is 4.2 lightyears away and does not fit the size requirements. A lightyear is the distance light will travel in one year at a speed of 186,000 miles/sec. If it were possible for a space ship to travel from this star to earth at the incredible speed of 1,000,000 miles/hour, it would take 3,000 years to arrive. At a life expectancy of 75 years, we would greet the 41st crew generation. Where would they get all the needed food and supplies? No star with any proven solar system has yet been found. So, the next time you hear about UFO sightings and aliens, just smile.

BLAND DIETS AND HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE

One day in a supermarket, I overheard a saleswoman while she was handing out sausage samples. She warned a mother to whom she was giving a sample not to give it to her baby because it was spicy and garlicky. Most Americans claim to love simple, plain food. Not really! They compensate for the tastelessness by using large amounts of salt as do our food manufacturers. In addition, we employ lots of salty sauces and condiments. This large salt intake contributes to high blood pressure: the use of a little tobacco and garlic would be better for us.

Surprisingly, the Japanese who are a small people, not prone to obesity, have a greater incidence of high blood pressure than we. Japanese food is even blander than ours. They correct for this by using large amounts of soy sauces which are loaded with salt.

The Italians and the French strive to prepare tasty, delicious dishes by employing herbs, spices, wines and other ingredients in their cooking. They use very little salt. Anyone who has eaten a meal in Rome will have noticed that the same food tasted much better than in an Italian-American restaurant. Americans should adopt cooking techniques which not only please the palate but are healthy as well.

AUTOMOBILE UNDERCOATING AND BODY RUSTPROOFING

Hardly a person buys a new car who is not asked to have it undercoated or given an expensive, in-body rustproofing. Once upon a time, this practice was almost standard. The treatments cover exposed metal surfaces with a tar-like, petroleum product to protect them from corrosion. In undercoating, the car's bottom is sprayed. For the in-body treatment, holes are cut into doors, rocker panels, and elsewhere. A spray nozzle is inserted and the metal surfaces are coated.

Independent consumer testing organizations have studied these treatments and have found they are not effective and in many cases actually promote corrosion. Rusting results when the coating dries out, cracks, and partially lifts off. When this happens, saltwater gets under the coating. Since these areas never dry out corrosion goes unabated. Today's car makers use rust-resistant galvanized or zinc-chromium treated sheet metals and improved body designs. Don't let anyone talk you into having your new car rustproofed. It already is.

In response to requests or at the discretion of the IEPA, a public hearing may be held to clarify one or more issues concerning the closure plan. Public notice will be issued 30 days before any public hearing.

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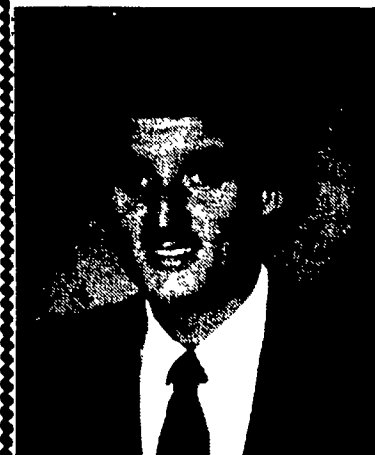

The fight ended with the 2 boxers on their feet and the referee lying on the canvas. After the referee was revived, he awarded the decision to Buxton.

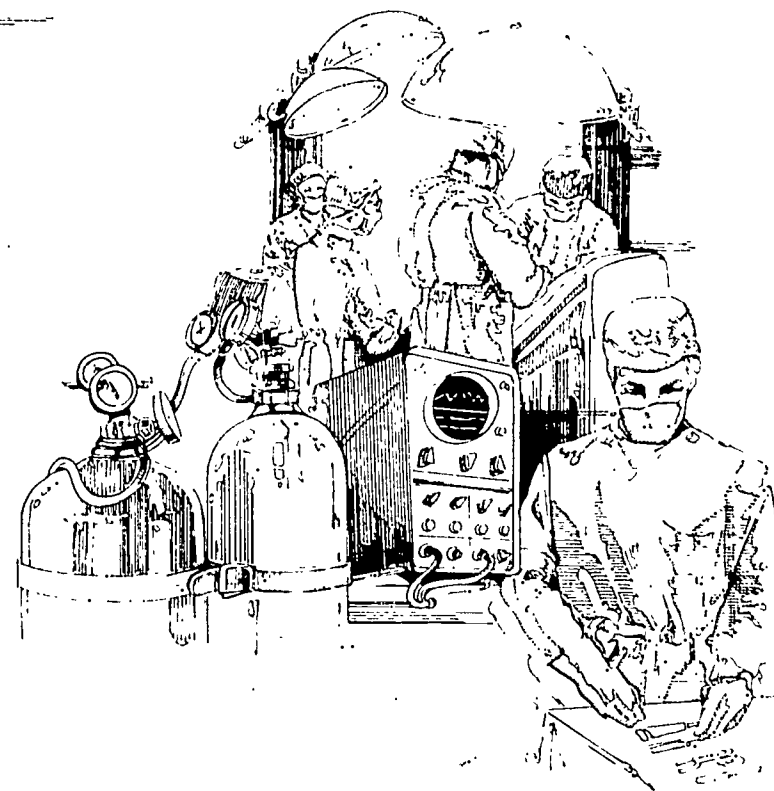
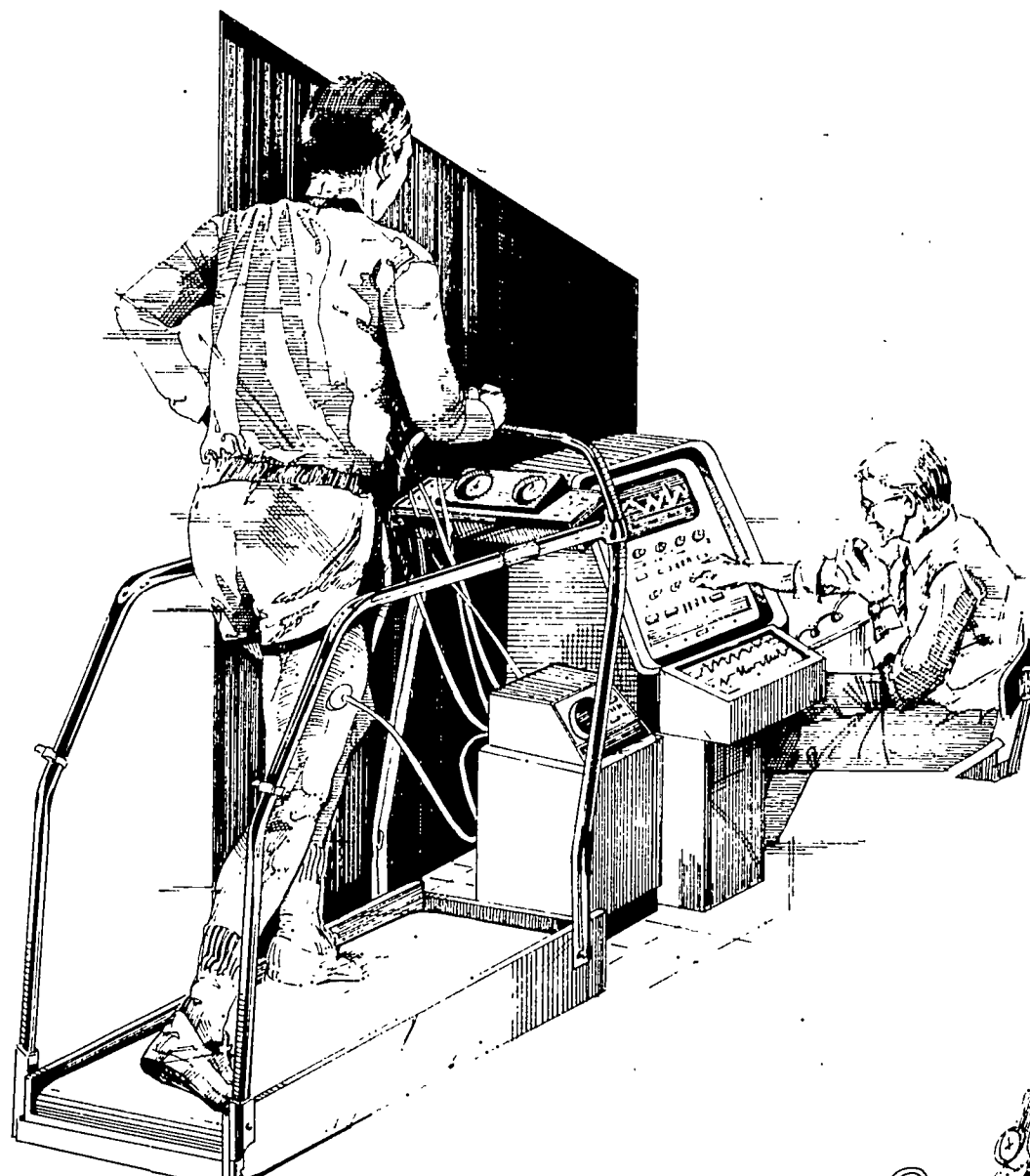

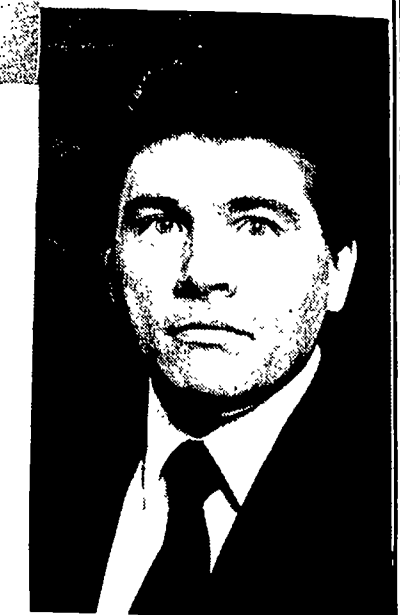

Teen fights battle of courage

15-year-old Cheryl Hogarty had just made the varsity basketball team at Barrington High School. She was looking forward to an exciting new season. Enthusiastic and spirited, Cheryl was determined to give 100 percent to the team.

However, during basketball practice Cheryl started getting sharp ankle pains. "It felt like someone was sawing through my ankle," remembers Cheryl. "I couldn't sleep, I looked pale and felt very weak." Her parents took her for a physical exam, but her doctors couldn't find anything wrong. Cheryl's pains persisted, however, and her doctors began to suspect that she might have arthritis. A rheumatologist could find no evidence of arthritis, but noticed that she had a low white blood cell count. Cheryl then went to see a hematologist, who ran blood tests and performed a bone marrow biopsy.

The results of the tests showed that Cheryl had acute lymphocytic leukemia, with lymphatic complications. "What lymphatic complications means," explains Cheryl, "is that I had a tumor in my thyroid gland. Most leukemia patients don't have that. I was immediately admitted to the hospital where another bone marrow biopsy was done." Cheryl was prepared for surgery, and then a central line was put in her chest for chemotherapy.

During surgery, Cheryl received several units of platelets, a blood component. Blood was transfused to raise Cheryl's hemoglobin count and to replenish her platelet supply. Because of the location of her biopsy, she remained in the Intensive Care Unit overnight so her condition could be monitored.

If Cheryl's neck had swollen, her breathing could be cut off. Chemotherapy treatment was started right away, and with it,



Cheryl's hair began to fall out.

Later, Cheryl began vomiting blood. Her blood pressure went to 60 over zero. Cheryl had a heart attack. Cheryl said, "I coded, which is considered death. After I coded, a double looman, an arterial line and an IV were put in." She was revived, her condition critical. To keep Cheryl's heart beating regularly, she was given oxygen.

Cheryl's condition remained critical. "The doctors wanted to give me enough drugs so I could slip into a coma and then put me on a respirator, but my Dad said no," says Cheryl.

Cheryl's father made the right decision because two days later, her breathing improved and her heart pains went away.

Despite all this courageous teenager has been through, she

keeps her spirits high and energy soaring. "People tell me I have a positive attitude. I attribute this to my friend Irena who recently passed away from another form of leukemia. She taught me a lot, especially on maintaining a positive attitude."

This past summer Cheryl started her first job as a telecaller at LifeSource. As a telecaller, Cheryl calls on blood donors and asks them to schedule their next appointments to donate.

Currently a junior at Barrington High School, Cheryl says, "With a positive attitude, there isn't anything you can't do."

Muscular back problems fall into three categories

Muscular conditions of the back may be generally divided into one of three categories.

Acute, in which the individual undergoes extreme discomfort for a relatively short period of time, perhaps a week to ten days. Once this condition is rectified the patient is usually free of pain for months, perhaps years, until it occurs again if not properly corrected.

Chronic, wherein the patient has a low grade, rather insidious problem. This is usually not debilitating but does indicate that "something is wrong". It may occur daily, several times a week or many times on a monthly basis. People, unfortunately have a tendency to ignore this type of disorder because it "goes away".

A unfortunate combination of both previously mentioned varieties in which the chronic condition, upon being aggravated, exacerbates into an acute situation.

Any one of these varieties, if severe enough, may be accompanied by a nerve involvement. If low-back in nature pain, burning,

numbness or tingling may ensue along the Sciatic nerve in the leg. If upper back or neck these same symptoms may present themselves in the arm, forearm or fingers. Women are especially susceptible to the upper back, neck condition which may be attended by headaches commencing in the area of the shoulders and radiating up the back of the neck to the base of the skull. Men, generally, are more prone to low-back conditions.

Despite the severity and frequency of these conditions, an even more distressing complaint a patient may have is "why do they keep coming back?" This question is completely justified. Our records indicate that eighty percent of those people we see for the first time have had previous and similar problems. We will discuss this aspect of recurrent problems in the near future.

Weiss physician offers new weight loss plan

Fat people pay a double price for their obesity, suffering both health-wise and socially, according to Theodore Balsam, M.D., a Weiss Hospital specialist in internal medicine and gastroenterology. From a health standpoint, it is well documented now that obesity tends to contribute to serious health problems including hypertension, diabetes, hyperlipidemias, or high levels of fat in blood, as well as osteoarthritis and other conditions. Weight loss is recognized as the first line of treatment in many of these problems.

Under Dr. Balsam's guidance, nearly 30 people are currently participating in an effective daily diet plan that utilizes a tasty protein supplement enhanced with vitamins and minerals, complemented by meals and even snacks, while limiting caloric intake to under 1,000 calories. In order to enroll in the program, participants must need to lose more than 25 pounds, Dr. Balsam explained.

Participants usually stay in the program 8-12 weeks or longer, he added. The cost of the program is approximately \$30 per week for the protein supplement, and about \$25 weekly in professional fees. Some insurance plans provide partial reimbursement for participation. The program began about a year ago, and its membership is increasing rapidly, Dr. Balsam said. "We believe this is a very effective, medically supervised weight loss program suited to today's lifestyle, with the involvement of the physician as the key factor to success."

"The program emphasizes the link between health and weight, as well as the psychological

aspects of eating habits. The patient works one-to-one with the physician, receiving a specific diet, including a protein-fructose supplement, along with appropriate support and individual counseling. An important factor is that we also adjust the patient's lifestyle throughout the program. If it's necessary for the patient to eat out a few times a week, we advise how to do it while staying within the diet limits."

"The program involves weekly visits to the physician for monitoring and evaluation, during which the physician is also attending to checking for chemical abnormalities or emotional problems, should they develop during the patient's participation. If a specific medical problem arises, the patient is referred back to his or her own physician."

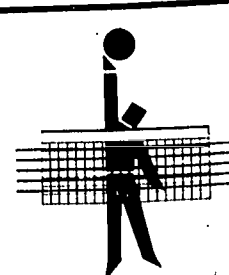

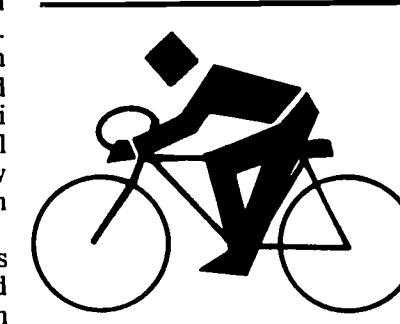
Mount Sinai Hospital North's Advisory Board will be expanded to represent the constituents in

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St. Francis holds down healthcare costs

Maintaining our current prices is especially important given the amount of care we provide to the poor," added Gizzi. The 1988 budget includes more than 3 million dollars for patients who cannot afford needed services, said Gizzi.

"The hospital provides all its services to the needy on a sliding fee scale, which requires patients to pay only what they can afford," said Gizzi. A sliding fee is offered at all the hospital's facilities, including the Howard Area Health Center in Chicago and the St. Francis Health Center in Lincolnwood.

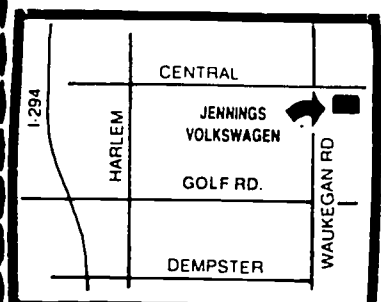

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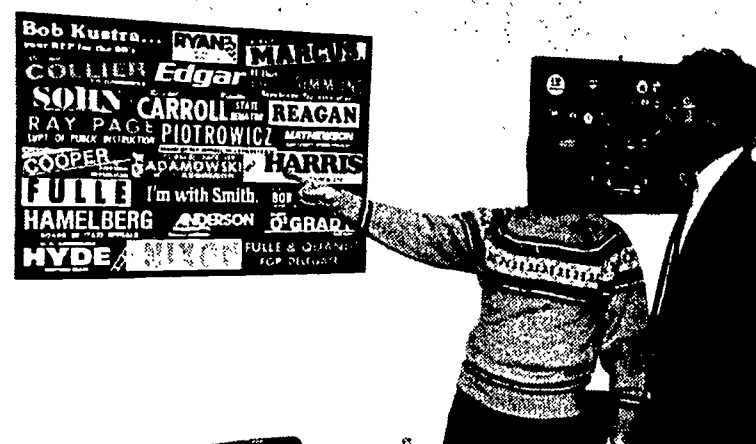

Schoenberg criticizes Sutker for evading debate

Democratic candidate Jeff Schoenberg is charging his opponent in the March 15, 1988 primary election with hiding from 56th Legislative District voters.

Residents of the 56th District "are well educated and well informed people who expect open debate of the issues that are important to them. Sutker is cheating them by evading the issues and refusing to talk," Schoenberg said.

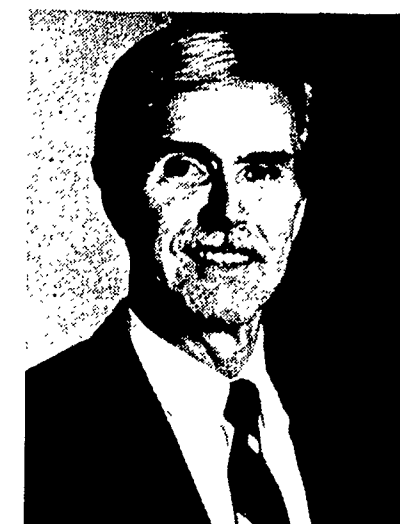
Let's Eat Out

Records fall as Edison turns up power

For the second consecutive day, Commonwealth Edison customers established an all-time record demand for electricity during the non-summer season when the peak electrical load reached 12,452,000 kilowatts between 5-6 p.m. Tuesday, January 5. The new record easily surpassed the previous mark of 12,258,000 kw, set 24 hours earlier, which, in turn, had shattered a record that had stood since December 1985. The new record stands 6.3 percent higher than the 1985 peak.

As they did on Monday, all 10 of Edison's nuclear generating units in commercial service produced electricity to help meet the record demand, Edison noted. Nuclear energy accounted for 76 percent of the company's power generation on Tuesday. Nuclear power is Edison's lowest cost form of generation. The balance of the record breaking demands are being met mostly by coal, the company's second-lowest-cost fuel.

District 64 announces procedure for emergency school closings

Heavy snow, unsafe streets or other emergencies may make it necessary to close District 64 schools or limit transportation.

When it is necessary to close schools, the local Parent/Teacher Organization "calling Trees" will be used so parents and children can be notified. Information regarding emergency school closings or emergency bus routes will be given to radio stations as follows: WBBM - AM 780, FM 96, WGN - AM 720, WCLR - FM 102, WMAQ - AM 670, WLS - AM 890, WFYR - FM 103.

School closing decisions are made on the basis of District-wide student safety. When schools are open on extremely bad weather days, parents should decide whether or not their children should attend school.

St. John Brebeuf School registration

Registration for Pre-School and Kindergarten for the 1988-1989 school year will be on February 28 from 10:00 - 1:00 in the school lobby. Those already in our program may register on February 24, 25, & 26 from 8:45 - 9:15 or 12:00 - 12:30. The registration fee for pre-school is \$20. Children registering for the 3 and 4 year old programs must be 3 or 4 respectively by Sept. 1, 1988.

Kindergarten students must be 5 years old by September 1st and must bring a baptismal certificate with them if they were not baptized at St. John Brebeuf. There is a \$25 registration fee, which will be applied to tuition, for new families in kindergarten.

Students in K-7 currently enrolled will receive forms in school, which need to be returned.

District 63 Kindergarten registration

East Maine School District #63 will hold kindergarten registration on Friday, March 18. Children registering for kindergarten must be five (5) years of age on or before Sept. 1, 1988, and those entering first grade for the first time must be six (6) years of age on or before Oct. 1, 1988.

A certified copy of the birth certificate must be presented at the time of registration or the child cannot be enrolled. points and get a bit of publicity (which he's getting), his enduring the bitter cold impressed a guy like me who's turned into a February couch potato.

We drove cross-country on I-80 the last week in January to deliver a car to our kids in Klamath Falls, Oregon. It proved to be a great adventure and a relatively easy ride.

When our kids were youngsters we went out there several years. In those years in the sixties we carted along a jammed-filled station wagon, which included four kids and a mother-in-law, who baked enough cookies to feed the four young urchins for fifteen days, the donkeys in Yellowstone Park and any other animals, human or otherwise, which crossed our path.

In those days it cost around \$60 a day to drive the brood out west. Today, it cost about \$30 a day for the two of us.

The only difficult driving was west of Omaha, which had been closed because of snow drifts the day before we arrived. They opened I-80 the morning we started west from Omaha and we spent a day driving across glassy ice heading for North Platte. Since there was no way to prevent sliding off the road we drove 60 MPH. Had we driven half the speed we would likely have been at a similar risk since a sliding car or truck had no resistance from sliding into the snowbanks. During that one day's drive we saw as many as 200 trucks jack-knifed off the sides of the road.

Driving cross-country is still a very pleasant experience. Iowa, Nebraska and Wyoming flatlands are not scenic but we amused ourselves by listening to taped book cassette. They're a great diversion.

We got off the road by 3 p.m. and found motels which had indoor swimming pools. An afternoon swim for the frau, a snooze for the non-swimmer and a good dinner was pleasant.

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Travel observations of a minor note include:

...Always take along a respectable alarm clock. I bought a bargain clock some years ago and spent ten minutes each night checking it for a wake-up call the following morning. The hands on the bargain are bent so you have to adjust your thinking to read the clock correctly. The key which turns the hand alarm didn't work so you had to change the hands of the clock accordingly. Since the alarm hand was stuck on one o'clock and you had to wake up at six, you had to change the hands on the clock to make up for the five hours difference. Thus, if you go to bed at 11, the alarm is on one and you want to get up seven hours later, you have to re-set your clock seven hours earlier than the alarm which is set for one. I'm sure you understand!

...At a Utah Jazz basketball game the fans all seemed so well-scrubbed and homogenized. There were no ethnics in the crowd which I found unusual for a basketball game. The Chicago stadium crowds look much rancier. I feel more comfortable in Chi town.

...Every time I'm out west I discover something new which hasn't yet arrived back east. At a Shell gas station you insert your charge card in the actual pump which feeds you gas. You receive a receipt and a certificate for a free car wash without leaving the car island.

...When you watch the summer Olympics you're likely to become aware of the large contingent of athletes who come from California. Driving in the San Francisco area we saw loads of high school and college baseball games already being played and dozens of track athletes already competing outdoors. California's golden kids have a decided edge over midwestern athletes who have less opportunities to work out all year.

...The airlines are really giving poorer service than they were a couple of years ago. We took off an hour late from San Francisco, which is becoming standard procedure. The dinner menu aboard United Airlines included a sandwich.

If you've got the time, try driving across country. It's fun, it's interesting and you eat much better on the ground.

'Recycling Week' in Morton Grove

It has been proposed that Morton Grove should begin responding to Cook County's pending solid waste disposal problem by declaring a "Recycling Week" in the village.

Larry Gomburg, a Morton Grove resident and State Attorney's Environmental Task Force member, suggested that village residents be informed of the disposal problem, encouraged to recycle their garbage, and told what and how to recycle through the village's newsletter, local newspapers, and cable T.V.

Gomburg said "I hope to contribute to this solid waste management effort by working with more village residents, village officials, and the State's Attorney's Environmental Task Force on developing workable options to the solid waste disposal problem in our area."

According to Athas, the cost of the 410-acre site is \$4 million. The conference paid \$100,000 for an option on the land.

She noted the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency is expected to issue an operating permit in March, 1989, with construction to begin in May, 1989. The landfill is expected to open in 1990, she said.

The landfill, called a "halefill" because garbage would be baled before burial, is expected to keep garbage disposal rates down preventing increases in charges to haul away garbage without the project.

Village trustees estimated that in the long run, Niles would see a 140 percent savings by using the landfill.

Pat Durava, a parishioner of Our Lady of Ransom Church said the hospital's practice of abortion is inconsistent with the healing ethics of medicine and "our Catholic faith," stating Lutheran General should live up to its stated mission and image of a truly caring Christian hospital. "They should put an end to abortion," she said.

Durava said boycott efforts by the group include asking people with similar pro-life views to make every effort not to use Lutheran General for any follow-up treatments that may be required by their doctors on the hospital staff. "Unless it's a serious type treatment, they would have that option to exert more pressure on them," she said.

Father Thomas Bishop, associate pastor of Our Lady of Ransom, who is involved in pastoral ministry (visits to Catholic patients) at Lutheran General, remarked its a "Catch 22" situation. "It is necessary to serve the needs of Catholic patients there. At the same time, our faith to preserve human life is inconsistent with their policy," he said, adding the matter will be discussed with a "cluster of area priests" involved in pastoral ministry at the hospital.

to join a Solid Waste Agency to be established by the conference, in which a representative from a participating town will serve on the agency's board of directors. Those who join the agency will be committed to pay its pro rata share (by population) of \$5.5 million in a two-year interim financing plan general obligation bonds for land acquisition and development of the site.

Athas noted municipalities who join the agency have the option of using the landfill in the future. "However, a town decides to withdraw from the agency, it would be obligated to pay its share of bond indebtedness," she said. "At this point, we are looking for commitments to the \$5.5 million before April 15 so the project can begin."

A resolution on the two measures is expected at the March village board meeting.

Niles pro rata share for the \$700,000 amount would be approximately \$30,000 and about \$170,000 for the \$5.5 million, according to Mayor Nicholas Blase.

General obligation bonds will be used in the interim financing plan, Athas said, adding it will cost a total of \$40 million for construction and operation of the landfill in a long term financing plan to be repaid from revenue generated from landfill operations.

had to completely eliminate the Outreach Department three years ago, and last year we were forced to close the branch library, all because our funds could no longer support those services."

The big question on everyone's mind is what services will the library have to cut if the tax increase fails. "We prefer to state that in the positive," said Myles Dimand, Vice-President. "If the referendum is successful, we'll be able to keep the bookmobile running; we'll be able to stay open on Sundays during the school year, and we'll be able to stay open evenings and mornings. All we need from our tax payers is twelve more dollars a year."

"It's too important an issue to lose," said Crman. "We figure that the average tax bill will go up twelve dollars a year. Without it, there will have to be drastic cuts at the library."

The Board voted at the first December meeting that the first cut will be the shutdown of bookmobile service. This will include the layoff of the bookmobile staff and the discontinuance of book purchases for the bookmobile. The next cut will be the closing of the library on Sundays and the laying off of more staff. The third but will be the closing of the library two mornings and two evenings per week and the laying off of even more staff.

"In all," said Dimand, "we're seeing the necessity to layoff one-third of our staff. That's hard to realize. Every time I visit the library, I look at the staff and try to picture one out of every three gone. I don't know how well operate if that happens."

"What's important for everyone to understand," said Treasurer Wagner, "is that this isn't just scare tactics. Just as we were serious about the financial necessity of closing the branch when that referendum failed, if this one fails, we'll be forced to make these drastic reductions at the main library."

"It's just too important an issue to lose," emphasized Irene Costello, Board Secretary. "We have not had a tax increase since 1973. Everyone knows that costs have gone up drastically since then. A 'Yes vote on March 15 will mean the average tax bill will rise twelve dollars a year, and that's enough to continue our present level of library service."

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Democratic candidates stress a theme of unity

Democratic-endorsed candidates for various Cook County offices stressed a theme of unity in resolving problems affecting Chicago and the suburbs at a press conference last week held at the Skokie North Shore Hilton.

The slate of candidates running in the March 15 Primary are Aurelia Pucinski for clerk of the circuit court; Joseph Berrios, board of tax appeals; and incumbent James Kirie, Joseph Gardner and Harry (Bus) Yourell seeking commissioner seats on the Metropolitan Sanitary District Board.

Richard M. Daley seeking reelection for state's attorney was not present at the conference because of prior commitments. Ill. Rep. Carol Mosely Braun (D-25th) running for recorder of deeds was also absent.

State Rep. Calvin Sutker (D-56th Dist) introduced the candidates saying the "blue ribbon" slate had been selected by the Democratic Party because of their background experience and dedication in serving the people of Cook County.

Pucinski, an attorney and current commissioner on the MSD board, said she is committed to providing the new leadership necessary to make the court process in Cook County efficient, fair and effective if she is elected circuit clerk.

In addressing the 68,000 backlog of cases in the county courts, her reforms would include shifting adjudication of uncontested divorce cases to suburban district courts, development of more effective use of computers in courtrooms, initiation of a uniform system of "reminder slips" for witnesses and litigants in continued cases, and establishment of a full service "hot line" so witnesses and parties to litigation can get up-to-date information on the status of their case.

"I have outlined a 21-point plan for changes in the court system to make it a more efficient operation," Pucinski said. "I would like to move forward in a new direction in the office of circuit clerk."

Kirie, who serves as finance chairman on the Metropolitan Sanitary District Board, noted during his 18 years on the board no scandal has touched the agency. "Our tax levy remains stable, finances are in good shape and we maintain a low budget."

He stated construction of a new 20-story MSD office building at a cost of \$29.95 a square foot (via public bid) is unlike "Gov. Thompson's Taj Mahal (State of Illinois Building) that cost about \$200 a square foot."

Kirie said proposals to elect board members by districts for better suburban representation is unnecessary. "Sectionalism is not involved on the board and the suburbs have always been taken care of," he said, adding that since 1969, the board has spent \$1,700,000,000 in Chicago and \$2,400,000,000 in the suburbs.

"We were elected by the people to serve the entire county and we are doing just that," he said. Kirie added he has been a major supporter of the Deep Tunnel plan and will continue to strive for its completion.

Yourell, who served as a state representative for a number of years, resigned his post as recorder of deeds to run in the MSD race.

Yourell said the primary

responsibility of MSD is to protect Lake Michigan from pollution, clean up waterways and to provide regional outlets for combined sewers and flood controls. "My goal is to see the Deep Tunnel completed to alleviate flood problems in the county," he said.

In discussing flooding of the Des Plaines River area, Yourell said, if elected, he will see all necessary steps are implemented in flood relief measures.

He noted the General Assembly last November mandated no building permits be issued in watershed and flood plains in Cook County. "I believe it's important this legislation be expanded to include Kane, Will, DuPage and McHenry Counties. This will decrease flood damage in the future," he said.

Gardner said he is seeking a MSD commissioner's seat because of his interest in the environment and his goal to bring government closer to the people it serves.

His major campaign themes include protection of the environment, fairness in government and economic development (job creation). "The protection of our natural resources, the air we breathe, water we drink, and our land must become a major priority for the residents of Cook County," Gardner said.

He added he will support tough criminal penalties for illegal dumping of hazardous waste, industry and will find effective methods of waste disposal and source reduction. "The MSD should develop realistic strategy to deal with solid waste," he said.

Berrios, a current state representative, is seeking a spot on the Board of Tax Appeals to replace the late Harry Semorov. Berrios said, if elected, he would have an outreach program to inform people not only what the board of tax appeals is all about, but to explain procedures they must follow to apply for reduction in taxes.

"Fairness is the bottom line," he said. "All property owners, regardless of size or value of their property, will always be treated equally. My door will always be open to the citizens of Cook County."
