

Niles Library tax hike seeks voter approval Tuesday

Voters in the Niles Public Library District will be asked again for the second time in 17 months to approve a referendum on Tuesday, March 15 that will give the library authority to increase its tax rate ceiling.

The tax levy would be .281 per \$100 of assessed valuation, which means the cost to the average taxpayer would be approximately \$12 additional on tax bills if the referendum passes, according to Duncan McKenzie, library administrator.

In the event of a failed referendum, the library board has decided to cut or eliminate children's programs to cut costs. In addition, bookmobile services to all Continued on Page 63

Niles asks railroad for double warning gates

In efforts to reduce the potential hazards at railway crossings in Niles, Mayor Nicholas Blase has contacted the president of the Soo Line Railroad, Inc. to request additional gates at Lehigh and Touhy, and Legish and Howard where two fatalities occurred last month. Double warning gates would block the entire crossing with the exception of a small space in the middle.

The car-train accidents occurred within two weeks of each other at the two rail crossings. Gates at these two locations are "half-roadway" models which extend across only half the roadway, blocking only oncoming traffic.

Niles police are uncertain why a 66-year-old Arlington Heights

man ran into a Loop-bound commuter Metra train at the Lehigh-Touhy crossing on Feb. 12, but they assume he was in the wrong Continued on Page 62

A series ticket including the March 10 dialogue, the Yehoshua and Appelfeld lectures, the Meridor-Burg Debate and the Shermers concert is \$35.

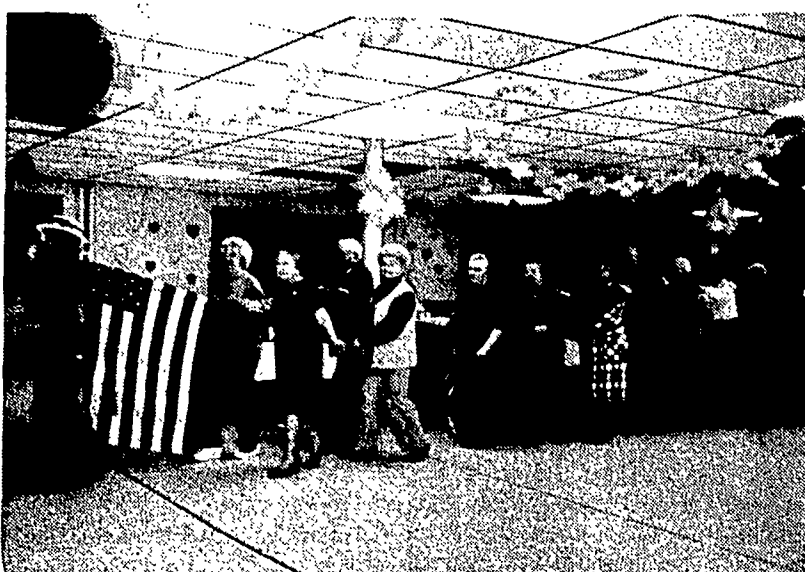

Maine Beat

DISTRICT 63 HUBBUB...the battle between parents-teachers and the School District 63 board over proposed program-teacher cuts to solve district overcrowding and budget problems marks the end of a relative quiet period the district has enjoyed for the past eight years...with stormy sessions reminiscent of the turbulent 1970's when the old boards made unpopular decisions on controversial issues.

Supt. Eldon Gleichman, like his counterparts in the 70's, is getting his share of criticism from angry parents and teachers on his recommendations to resolve student housing in the district. Reportedly, the board has looked at 21 plans recommended by the "super" to arrive at a solution.

Part of Gleichman's latest proposal entails cutbacks in art and music classes which means four teachers would be laid off if the proposal is approved. He also proposes increasing student-teacher ratios for 4 to 6 grades only (from 27-to-1 to 28-to-1) with another four teachers lost if the proposal is adopted by the board. The measures are being opposed by the teachers' union and angry parents for the same reasons voiced at the stormy meetings of long ago.

An initial plan that met with opposition by parents was to move 6th grade students from Nelson and Stevenson Schools to a wing at Gemini Jr. High. Gleichman also initially proposed placing portable classrooms at Mark Twain if the student population increases there.

Following two continued hearings, the Niles zoning board approved a special use request by Montgomery Ward & Co. Inc. for construction of an automotive store and an addition for future retail stores at 9643 Milwaukee Ave. at Monday's meeting.

Board approval came after Attorney Lawrence Friedman representing Montgomery Ward said a crossover agreement (common driveway and parking) had been finalized with Fluky's Restaurant, north of the site which now contains the vacant Sizzler Steak House.

The agreement had been the subject for the two continuances. The first was granted at the January meeting to allow the petitioner time to work a cross easement agreement with Fluky's. It was again continued when representatives from Ward's failed to appear at the February board meeting.

Friedman said some changes had been made to the original plan in which the driveway would be moved 44 feet to the north to improve parking amenities. Another change, he said, was to expand the retail space from the original 5,514 square feet to 6,200 square feet with the stores facing Milwaukee Ave. The automotive store would contain 9,300 square feet.

"Treasure your Library" Festival

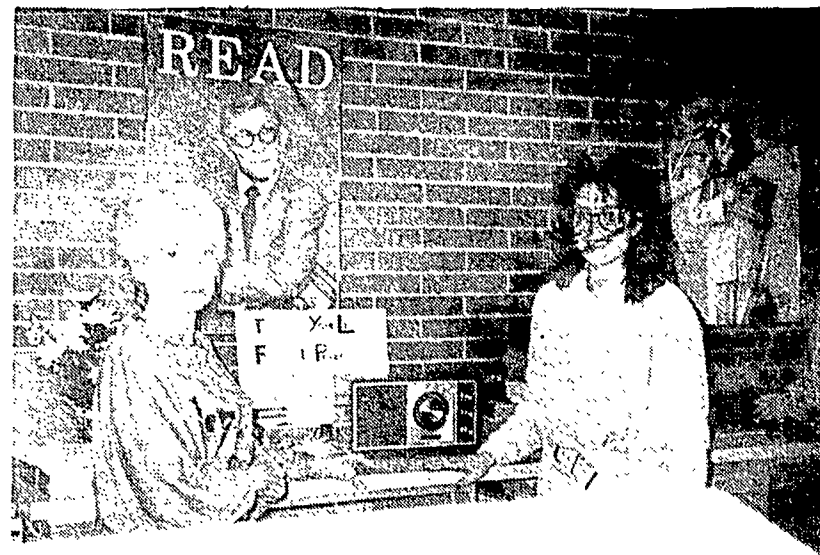

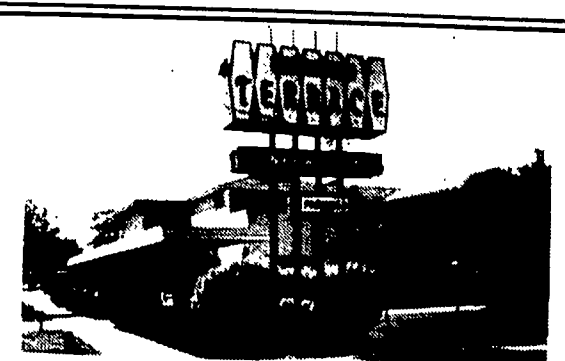

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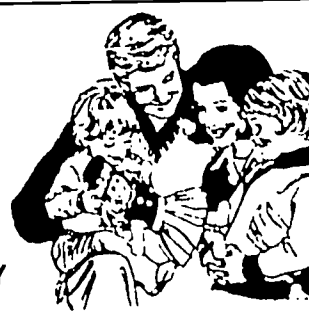

Driving at night safety hints

by Secretary of State Jim Edgar

Driving safely at night is difficult because you cannot see as far or well as you can during the day. Use extra caution at night and observe the following safety tips:

Avoid overdriving your headlights, which the National Safety Council says is the most persistent problem of night driving. Reduce your speed so you can stop within the distance lighted by your headlights (about 350 feet).

As you look down the highway, gaze further ahead into the area that is barely illuminated. You may be able to see the faint glow of a distant headlight or other movement that will alert you to a possible hazard.

If you are blinded suddenly by the bright headlights of an oncoming vehicle, turn your eyes away from the lights and use the right edge of the road to guide you. Dim your headlights when you are within 500 feet of an approaching vehicle.

Increase your following distance at night. Dim your headlights when you are within 300 feet (the length of a football field) from the vehicle in front of you.

Drive with low beams in snow. High beams reflect more off snow, increasing glare and throwing off your vision.

Never stop on the road at night. Carry an illuminated or reflective device, such as a flare or reflecting triangle, in case of a flat tire or another emergency. If you must stop, pull as far off the road as possible.

The intersection of Dempster and Lehigh is a safer one because of its construction and the fact that the traffic lights allow no movement at all when the gates are down.

It would seem to me that the respect for traffic control devices is now a thing of the past. One need only watch as a light changes for those who will continue as if the light does not exist.

Safety be damned, I am late for whatever I am going to.

In my opinion, for what it is worth, stronger enforcement of existing regulation is a better, less costly means of providing safety at these intersections.

AIDS IS DRAGGING SEX OUT OF THE CLOSET

Americans hate to admit that sex, urination, defecation, and death are natural parts of life. In the U.S., rooms called "toilets" are rare. Instead, we refer to them as powder rooms, restrooms, bathrooms, washrooms, laboratories, mens' rooms, and ladies' rooms. People don't die, they pass away or are called to their eternal rest or maker. With AIDS becoming a serious problem, we must realize that, except for drug addicts, most adults who contract AIDS do so by sexual intercourse. It cannot be transmitted by kissing, hugging, sneezing, coughing, breathing, toilet seats, or using another's eating and drinking utensils.

The AIDS virus is the most delicate of all known viruses and can be transferred only by internal body contact with contaminated blood and/or seminal fluid. Among married couples in the U.S., its spread has not been as rapid as anticipated. The spreading rate is high among homosexuals, bi- and heterosexual couples who engage in anal intercourse. Doctors believe that the body parts performing the act become bruised in the process, releasing contaminated blood. People who have open sores and lesions in their genital regions are potential victims and transmitters. In Africa, AIDS is rampant throughout the entire population because of the prevalence of a large variety of sore-producing diseases. In order to protect ourselves and our children, we and they must learn the facts of life from knowledgeable people. It no longer is adequate to say that sex is dirty and sinful, and that abstinence is the only way. History has shown that this never stopped or scared anyone. The time has come to end this prudery which only helps spread the disease.

VITAMINS

What can be more American than apple pie, motherhood, or vitamins? From all sides we are bombarded by ads telling us to take and give vitamins to our children as a daily routine. Vitamins are important growth and health constituents of our foods. So, what harm can there be in taking lots of them? The truth of the matter is that unless they are specifically prescribed for you by your doctor, you are literally throwing away your money. Vitamins are expensive. If you can afford them, you can afford a proper diet.

Vitamins are present in many foods and work best when vitamin-containing foods are eaten. We cannot counteract the effects of an improper diet by swallowing scads of vitamin pills. Inasmuch as the body has no storage capacity for vitamins, excess amounts make a quick trip through our digestive tracts to the toilet. Vitamin A taken in large doses is a poison. Many people believe that taking massive doses of Vitamin C will prevent colds and the flu. No reliable medical evidence exists to support those beliefs. Before taking any vitamins, consult your doctor. Otherwise you may be flushing your money down the drain.

SALTING ICY SIDEWALKS AND STEPS

Hardly anyone in the snowbelt exists who has never slipped or fallen on icy steps or pavements. This is certainly a winter hazard. Many put salt crystals on icy areas to melt the ice. Salt melts the ice by dissolving in it and lowering its freezing point. Thus, the ice turns to a liquid. There are two types of ice melters sold. One is rock salt (sodium chloride) and the other is small white pellets containing a mixture of calcium and sodium chlorides. The pellets although they are cheaper and more effective, are also less desirable. Because calcium chloride is an acidic compound, it can cause extensive damage to concrete and produce rapid corrosion of outdoor iron railings and fences.

If the outside temperature is much below zero, the ice melters won't work when it's that cold. Remember if you use lots of salt and often, you can kill or severely damage your lawn, trees and shrubbery. When warm weather comes it melts the ice and snow, and the salt water runs off into nearby lawns and flower beds. So, be careful what you buy and how much you use.

Camp Shomria based on kibbutz-like atmosphere

Hi! My name is Taal Hasak and I am a freshman at Washington University in St. Louis. I'm really happy that I have this opportunity to write to you about Camp Shomria. Some of my best memories are from camp. I've been going to Camp Shomria, every year, since 1979.

Camp Shomria is not like most other camps. Of course we have; swimming, hiking, rollerskating, horseback riding, and windsurfing, but I believe there is something very special and unique about Camp Shomria, and I think that everybody at camp (or "Mosh", as we call it) would agree. Let me tell you about it. The special mood first hits you as you drive into the camp and catch the scenery of Perth, Ontario. We spend as much time as possible outdoors, and try to take full advantage of our natural surroundings. The friendships created at Mosh are genuine and the bonds that are made there last far beyond the campers' days. The bonds that grow between the staff and the campers are particularly special because they are based on mutual respect and friendship, not an adult babysitting a child. The campers know that if they have a problem, want to talk, or just "hang out", they can approach any staff member at any time without any problem. The staff is responsible for the campers, and they serve as role models in addition to authority figures. The staff makes sure that no problems arise and that nobody's safety is endangered.

Mosh is based on a kibbutz-like atmosphere. This atmosphere and the special role that Israel plays at Mosh helps to make it very unique. We try to use as many Hebrew words as possible to describe our daily activities. We see what impact Israel plays on us here in North America, and what impact we have on Israel.

The judges, who were from every walk of life in the community, included 8 parents of current students, 3 Willows alumnae, 8 teachers (college through elementary), and 8 volunteers from industry. The students were rated and ranked individually in work sessions by the judges.

Trophies were awarded to Larua Pavola of Park Ridge, 6th grade, as the best of the junior high section; and Marianne Heckman, 12th grade, Park Ridge, was rated the best of the high school section.

Dr. Philip Jaffe, Dean of Science at Oakton Community College gave the keynote address and awarded ribbons and trophies together with Mrs. Kathy Wentz, Chairperson of the Science Department and manager of the Science Fair.

March 12, 9 selected and qualifying students will compete at the Illinois Junior Academy of Sciences Regional Fair at Wheeling High School.

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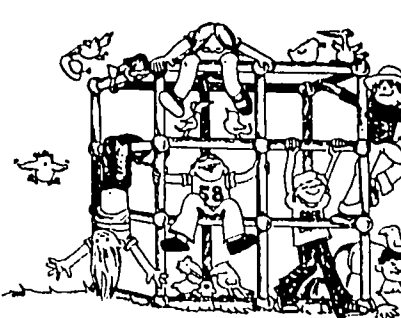

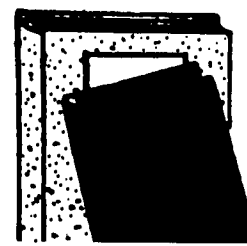

District 207 initiates drug free schools program

When teens use alcohol or other drugs, it not only affects their behavior and interferes with their emotional and physiological development, it also hinders learning. In its continuing efforts to deal with the problem of substance abuse, Maine Township High School District 207 is widening the base of staff members who are equipped to identify alcohol and other drug-related problems and also seeking to strengthen and expand the relationships between the school and community drug problem.

"All staff members, teachers, or support staff, who come in contact with students must know the signs - and what to do about it when they see them," said Dennis P. Dresen, Coordinator of Planning and Special Projects, who is spearheading the project.

But educating staff members and forging links with community programs are only the first steps in the new wellness oriented program, "Drug Free Schools," which will focus on developing a structure for a continuum of care, according to Dresen. That continuum will include plans for prevention, intervention, refer-

ral, and after care. Funding for the program, comes from a grant provided by a federal program, the Drugs Free Schools and Community Act of 1986.

By the beginning of the 1988-89 school year, all professional and support staff members will receive a quick reference drug information brochure. An inservice program in the fall of 1988 for support staff members will help them learn how to deal with students who have alcohol and other drug-related problems. "Although teachers have already received such training, it's not only teachers who come into contact with students who have problems. It may be teacher aides or paraprofessionals and we want them to know what to do should such situations arise," said Dresen.

To provide leadership for the program Drug Free Schools committees have been organized at both the district level and the school level. AAA answers questions on car starting

When the thermometer dips to incredibly low readings, motorists are willing to try anything to get their cars started. Some of these last-ditch techniques will work, but others are just old wives' tales, according to the AAA-Chicago Motor Club.

The Club's auto technicians have compiled this list of answers to frequently asked questions:

Q. Does the "wind chill factor" affect my car?

A. Not really. Wind chill factor is an indication of the effect of wind on human skin. When wind blows across skin, it causes moisture to evaporate, giving the effect of a much lower temperature. However, when the wind is blowing heavily, the parts of a car remain close to the actual air temperature.

Q. Does it help to park out of the wind, or to put a blanket over my car's grille?

A. The wind carries snow and ice which can cake up on moving parts. Reducing the amount of wind blowing into the engine compartment will increase your chances of getting started.

Q. I've always heard that turning on my lights for a few seconds before I start will get the juices warm in the battery. Won't this help me get started?

A. Not at all. Keep all accessories off before you begin cranking the engine. Turning your lights on will cause a slight drain on your battery.

Q. If antifreeze keeps the radiator from freezing, shouldn't I put 100 percent pure antifreeze into my cooling system?

A. Absolutely not. When adding antifreeze, follow the directions on the container. Generally, the best protection is afforded by a slightly more than 50/50 mixture of antifreeze and water.

Q. Should I really bother to "top off" my gas tank on a night when it will be extremely frigid?

A. Yes. A full tank of gas reduces the chance of having gas line freeze-up because it allows less open space for moisture to form.

Q. Can a hot potato cure gas line freeze-up?

A. If you can locate the frozen point in your fuel line, applying a hot potato will thaw it out. Anything else would be too hot and might cause a fire. Incidentally, you know you might have a gas line freeze-up if the car starts and then dies after a few minutes.

Q. The best way to get started on a cold winter day is to pump on the accelerator until the car takes off, right?

A. Wrong. AAA-Chicago Motor Club has towed thousands of cars with engines flooded due to improper starting procedure. Consult your owner's manual to learn the right procedure for your car. You might be surprised to find out you haven't been doing it right.

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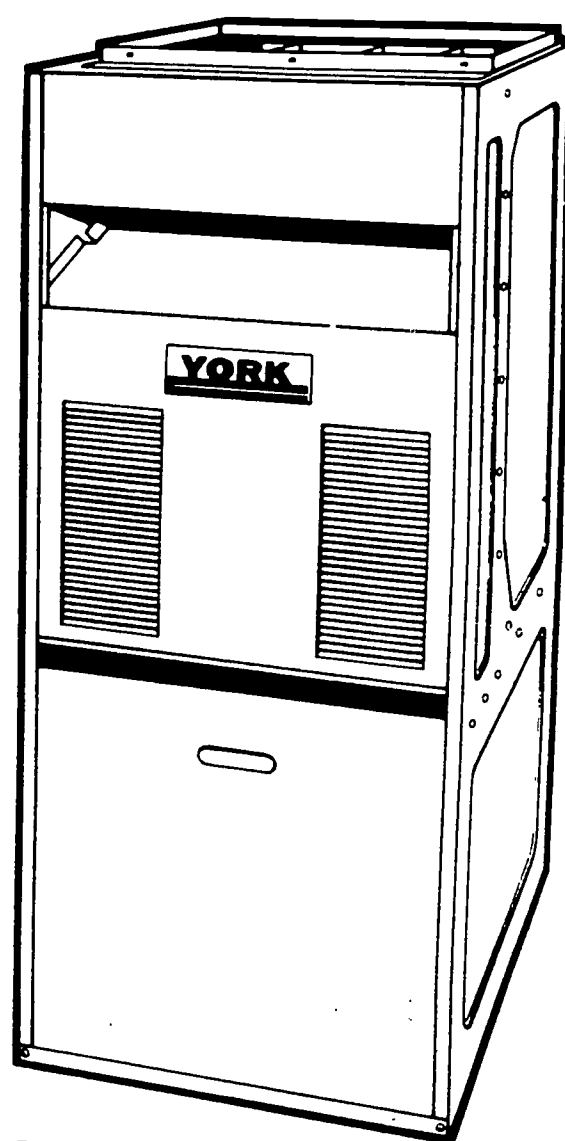

Roll Over Pension Funds Into Tax-Deferred IRA

If you receive disbursements from a pension or profit sharing plan this year, you can reinvest it and avoid paying taxes immediately.

Moving your money from an employer's retirement plan into your own tax-deferred Individual Retirement Account (IRA) is called a "rollover." By sheltering the initial investment and interest earned, you defer paying taxes until retirement when your taxable income may be considerably less. It also can mean a dramatic earnings growth.

The federal government allows 60 days after the lump sum disbursement is made before you must invest the money in an IRA. Otherwise, the disbursement is considered ordinary income for the year and taxed accordingly.

A rollover is to your advantage in several instances:

If you plan to retire soon and live on funds other than your pension (such as social security and savings), you can roll over into a tax-deferred IRA. Your money will continue to grow without paying income tax on the disbursement or on interest earned until funds are withdrawn later.

Changing jobs is another instance. If vested in the company plan, your vested portion can be rolled over into an individual IRA even if your new company has its own pension or profit-sharing plan.

Again, rolling over the cash disbursement within 60 days is a must if you want to avoid paying taxes in the same year.

A firm's pension plan may be terminated when it is acquired by another company. When this occurs, you can roll over funds if your company moves and you choose not to move with it.

Some companies allow you to remain in their plans after you leave. Before deciding whether to keep or pull funds, compare the company's rate of return and the risks involved with your own plan.

You may find a higher rate of return on your own or a fund that is riskier or more conservative in its investment strategy to match your own risk personality. Rolling over is a way to preserve the tax-deferred status of your funds when you pull out of a company plan.

If you decide to invest in a tax-deferred IRA, seek the advice of a knowledgeable specialist at your local financial institution to review your investment choices. A specialist can help you sort through the many options available, and still meet your personal financial goals.

A rollover into a tax-deferred IRA is a great way to continue saving for retirement and lower your taxes at the same time.

Capparelli: "No need to raise taxes"

State Rep. Ralph C. Capparelli (D-13th) said that Illinois doesn't need any new taxes because of the growth of the economy, only more determined ways in which to collect the money already owed the state.

Capparelli's comments came in the wake of Gov. James Thompson's budget message to Illinois legislators.

"There's plenty of money around," said Capparelli. "The state expects to receive about \$840 million in increased revenue through normal growth of the state's economy. This should meet existing expenses and leave some additional funding for critical state programs. In addition, there's about \$900 million in uncollected monies owed the state."

"Regardless of what others say, this money is collectable," said Capparelli. "All that is needed is for the Department of Revenue to become more aggressive in going after these funds. When the revenue department tells me that about \$600 million is uncollected because it belongs to deceased people, is in litigation or the subject of federal/state dispute, I say that's bunk. It's a copout. If we have fewer collectors today than we had several years ago, then the ones we do have need to work twice as hard. It's time we begin to run government like a business and obtain greater productivity from our employees."

Schoenberg calls opponent hypocritical on appointment issue

Jeff Schoenberg, 56th district Democrat House candidate, is accusing his opponent of being a hypocrite.

Schoenberg made the charge in reference to Rep. Cal Sutker's published promise to introduce legislation to change the way

vacated legislative seats are filled if the Illinois Supreme Court strikes down a law that allows committeemen to fill vacancies by appointment.

At issue is a court challenge of the law that allowed Democratic committeemen to fill a state

House seat vacated by former State Rep. Alan Greiman last summer.

"This is the same law that Sutker used as a committeeman to appoint himself to the state House three years ago. This is the same law that facilitates the appointment of cronies," Schoenberg said. "It's a loophole in the system that people like Sutker take advantage of."

If Sutker hadn't been able to use this law to appoint himself to the legislature he would have made all kinds of noise to repeal it.

"For him now to say that he'll introduce legislation to rewrite the law clearly demonstrates what a hypocrite he is. What's he been doing for the three years since he used this law to appoint himself," Schoenberg asked.

Schoenberg added that "this is just one more example of Sutker's leadership failure, of his inability to take the initiative on legislative matters."

"What kind of legislator constantly has to be told to do something that's appropriate before he does it," Schoenberg asked, adding that Sutker is "the kind of person who has to be led to an issue in order to recognize it."

Valentino vows to back home equity program

Richard Valentino, Democratic candidate for the Illinois Senate in the 7th district, vowed to work to implement a home equity program for Chicago.

"Last year the voters on the northwest side of the city overwhelmingly supported a home equity plan," Valentino said. "I support an equity plan for single family residences to reduce or eliminate fear of neighborhood change resulting in declining land values of single family residences," he added.

Valentino pledged his support at a Monday hearing of state and city officials, neighborhood groups and real estate agents on the home equity concept. The village of Oak Park has had a home equity assurance program since 1980, and Valentino believes it is time for the City of Chicago to adopt one as well.

"This is a priority for our city. I plan to work with the community and our government so we are able to move forward to create a home equity plan this spring," Valentino said.

"The Mainstream Pumping Station has been constructed to be used with the reservoir. I think we should begin construction as soon as possible before we are hit with yet another 'Hundred Year Storm,'" Migala said.

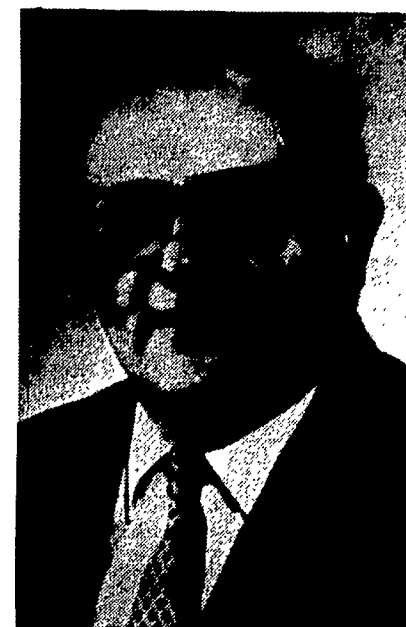
The speeding up of TARP is just one of Migala's points in his Ten Point Program to solve flooding problems, save taxes and beautify the environment.

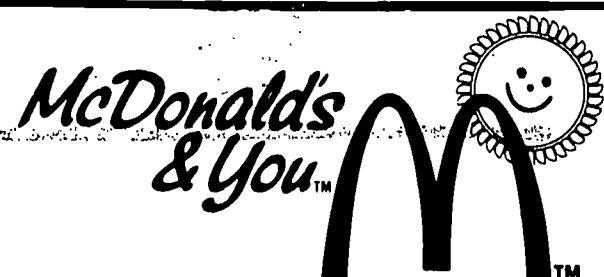
Special pipe organ show

Home repair fraud company put out of business

Attorney General Neil F. Hartigan announced today that Father & Son Construction Company of Park Ridge accused of bilking customers of thousands of dollars, has been enjoined from engaging in the home repair business.

Hartigan charged that Ronald Reynolds and Richard Zak, who operated Father & Son Construction Company from 676 Busse Highway, Park Ridge, accepted payments of up to \$20,000 for home repairs they never completed.

In addition, Hartigan charged the pair with not only producing shoddy work or token work but of saddling their customers with thousands of additional charges through unpaid liens.

Circuit Judge Thomas J. O'Brien granted Hartigan's request for a preliminary injunction and will rule on April 15 on making the injunction permanent. In addition, Hartigan's office is conducting a criminal investigation involving Zak and Reynolds.

Brunswick named "Employer of the Year"

Brunswick Corporation of Skokie was recently named the 1988 Employer of the Year by the Associated Employers of Illinois (AEI). Accepting the award was Jack F. Reichert, Chairman, President and Chief Executive Officer of Brunswick Corporation.

"Failure to do so could leave the home owner with a lien against his property which he may well have to pay off in order to clear title to his property."

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Hartigan sues subscription solicitation company

—Attorney General Neil F. Hartigan announced he has filed a consumer fraud lawsuit against an Illinois-based company that allegedly uses high-pressure telephone solicitation tactics to sell magazine subscriptions on an installment basis to consumers nationwide.

Named in the lawsuit, filed today in Sangamon County Circuit Court, are Neighborhood Periodical Club of Illinois, Inc., which does business as Neighborhood Periodical Club and as Consolidated Readers Institute, and its president, Paul L. Coffey. The company is headquartered in Arlington Heights, Illinois. Coffey lists his residence as Holiday, Florida.

—My Consumer Protection

Division has been inundated with complaints about the high-pressure methods that consumers say this company routinely uses," Hartigan said. "This lawsuit will show that we will not tolerate deceptive and abusive sales practices."

Hartigan's suit alleges that the defendants have engaged in unfair and deceptive business practices which violate provisions of the Illinois Consumer Fraud and Deceptive Business Practices Act. According to the suit, Neighborhood Periodical Club makes unsolicited telephone calls or other contacts with consumers. During the company's presentation, numerous misrepresentations are made to consumers concerning the alleg-

ed magazine subscription service, in an effort to include consumers to agree to accept the magazines. These include promises of free gifts, or representations that the consumer has "won" the chance to participate in the company's plan.

The suit further alleges that, in some cases, the consumers' telephone conversations are tape recorded by Neighborhood Periodical Club without telling the consumer that the recording might later be used as evidence of a contract.

Of the 57 complaints Hartigan's Office has received to date, the average amount of money the company alleges consumers owe ranges from \$300 to \$500.

Illinois Bell's plan for call-blocking approved

Illinois Bell's plan to offer a free-of-charge service to residence and business customers who wish to block calls to 900 to 976 numbers was approved today by the Illinois Commerce Commission.

Illinois Bell now can begin offering call-blocking in 30 days - first to customers in the 312 area code - on a neighborhood-by-neighborhood basis. The company said it would inform customers soon about procedures to follow if they wish to have calls blocked.

"We believe that access to objectionable messages without any possibility of customer control damages our relationship and our reputation with our customers, and that this plan addresses this need," said Bob Ligett, Illinois Bell's general manager for residence service.

Ligett said the call-blocking service will be available to customers statewide within four months. He said each of Illinois Bell's telephone switching machines must be reprogrammed to provide the service.

In the 312 area code, the free-of-charge service gives customers three options:

- to block all calls to Illinois Bell's 976 TELEPROGRAMS(sm) service;
- to block all calls to 900-number services;
- to block all calls to both 976 and 900 numbers.

Outside the 312 area code, business and residence customers will have the option to block calls to 900-number services only.

976 TELEPROGRAMS(sm) service is a public announcement

system of tape recorded messages that includes information on sports, time, weather, stocks and other topics. 976 TELEPROGRAMS(sm) service messages are available on a local-call basis in the 312 area code.

Ligett reminded customers that once a 900 or 976 call blocking option is chosen, calls to numbers on the 976 or 900 network will be blocked.

The 900-number network is a special access network on which companies provide both tape-recorded messages, telephone-based polling services and live conversational lines.

New area code to affect Centel customers

The new "708" area code for Chicago suburbs that was announced recently by Illinois Bell Telephone also will affect customers of Centel Telephone Company (Centel) in the northwest suburbs, including Niles residents and businesses.

Under the changes, which will take place Nov. 11, 1989, Chicago will keep the "312" area code while suburbs with the "312" area code will switch to "708." The change is being made to provide the Chicago metropolitan area with an additional seven million possible telephone numbers.

According to figures compiled by Illinois Bell, only 51 prefixes out of 792 possible number combinations are available for the Chicago area. A prefix is the first three digits of a customer's telephone number. Those prefixes which are still available are expected to be used up within the next two years as the growth of new residences and businesses continues in the area.

Prefixes in the Cental area that will have the new 708 area code are 296, 297, 298, 299, 318, 390, 391, 635, 692, 696, 698, 699, 803, 823, 824, 825 and 827. Prefixes that will

keep the 312 area code are 380, 399, 693 and 694.

The change in the area code will not cause any increase in a person's bill, according to Lyle Williams, customers services manager for Centel. "Our call-paks, which are based upon regional boundaries, will stay the same," said Williams.

However, the new area code will impact how a person has to dial. For example, a person living or working in Rosemont will have to dial 1-312 and the phone number, instead of the regular seven-digit number to call someone in Chicago, which includes O'Hare International Airport.

The announcement of the new area code was made at this time to allow customers sufficient time to plan for advertising and business letterhead changes and to notify clients and friends of the number change.

Adding new area codes in major metropolitan areas have become a necessity in recent years. Since 1982, area codes have been added for New York, San Diego, Los Angeles and Galveston, Texas.

Besides the Rosemont area, Centel serves customers in Park Ridge, Des Plaines, Chicago, Elk Grove, Mount Prospect, Prospect Heights, Niles, Glenview and Northbrook.

The superintendent has stated the measures would be short-term solutions and assessed that when cuts are made there will inevitably be some objections. Amen to that. It's now up to the board to come up with a decision that meets with the best interests of the district and at the same time...not cause a rift in the community similar to the days of yore.

Longtime observers of the Dist. 63 scene remember Supt. G. Allan Gogo's stormy tenure in the early 1970's which began with early proposals to restructure student-teacher ratios at Gemini followed by another proposal to move children from overcrowded facilities to other schools in the district. The plan was also attached to using portable or mobile classrooms.

The administrator served the district for five years it is well remembered the last three years of his tenure were marked by stormy periods concerning controversial issues, charges of authoritative decisions and strained relationships with the East Maine Education Assn. (EMEA), the teachers' union.

Some of the administration-board-teacher controversies involved the declining enrollment problem, proposed program-teacher cuts, construction of an administration building (proposed by Gogo and approved by the board) and runnings of the EMEA which precipitated a key role in the school board electoral process. Gogo resigned in April of 1977 under pressure from the school board composed of new members who created a liberal-minded majority on the board.

Supt. Kenneth Moe succeeded Gogo in 1977, inheriting the short term solutions to various issues and declining enrollment problems in the financially troubled district. Moe was able to hold on to the job for two years despite community opposition.

Among Moe's woes was the closing of Ballard and Wilson Schools causing controversy among parents in the district. Some residents reacted by filing a class action suit calling for a temporary injunction to prevent the school closing...but the suit was dropped because of the legal expenses involved.

The dissident community also criticized Moe for his involvement in the controversial Selection Research Inc. student-teacher perceiver testing program (an evaluative process). Parents attacked the program claiming the process was an invasion of the child and the program had "psychological" overtones.

A second suit, filed in 1979 by several residents, also later dropped, called for a temporary restraining order to prevent the school board renewing a contract for the administrator before a board election. Moe subsequently resigned citing personal and family reasons.

Moe stated at a board meeting (during the contract brouhaha) that something "was wrong" in the district in which "we focus on people negatively rather than solve issues." He also contended the two year-period he had been in the district was a period of "artificial criticism"...and noted citizens should act with a more positive attitude in working together to solve district problems. Moe's statement should be remembered in the current hubbub at School District 63.

two daughters wanted to speak to board members about their art and music experiences at Stevenson School. Lisa Perelgut, a student at Gemini Junior High School, asked that her younger sister be able to take part in the same range of activities available to her while attending Stevenson.

The youngest Perelgut added, "When I draw a picture, I do it from my heart. Please don't take away art and music." She stood on tiptoes to speak into the microphone.

About 100 parents and teachers were present at the hearing. Many addressed board members with the same message—do not increase the class ratio and do not cut art and music to one semester each. However, a few youngsters seemed to draw the most attention as well as introduce a note of levity into the otherwise solemn hearing.

Following the lengthy hearing, board members agreed with teachers and parents to keep full time art and music programs although the curriculum or place of instruction may need to be made adjusted in various buildings. Board members indicated they preferred these adjustments be made by educators and administrative staff of each school. Votes were not taken at the hearing.

Board President Joan Futterman said, "I'm sure the administration realizes there are certain options which must be kept on the back burner." These options could include submission of proposals for use of portable units as required by the state.

Dr. Eldon Gleichman, school district administrator, proposed modification of some classrooms in overcrowded Nelson and

Stevenson schools. Costs would be about \$1,500-\$2,000 at the former and about \$1,800 at the latter. Board member Norman Padnos indicated plans for temporary partitions were received prior to the meeting and board members did not have ample time to review them.

Also, board members seemed to agree a detailed district study should be available early next school year. The study could include details on building utilization and revenue problems.

According to previous information supplied at hearings and meetings, the district budget has been in deficit for five years. Over the past 20 years, state revenue decreased significantly and more than 70 percent of district revenues is realized from property taxes. Board member James Friedlieb said, "We're living off the last of our reserves."

Among the many speakers was Elaine Lampros, Mark Twain teacher and head of the East Maine Teachers Educational Assn. "For what are we looking? Is it space or is it simply a budget cut? Must we always save money at the expense of the children? Ultimately, they are the ones who pay," said Lampros.

She said a student ratio of 28:1 would result in homerooms with between 26 to 31 students while reading and math groups could range from 30-35 students, added Lampros.

These numbers do not include students who are "mainstreamed" from special education or the East Maine Multi-Cultural Education (EMME) program, she said.

Also, Lampros said cutting art and music programs in half would cause the district to lose four "of its finest young teachers." She suggested the classrooms be freed by placing music and art on mobile units for a semester each.

Phyllis Burg, a Nelson parent, spoke for the Nelson School Parent Teacher Assn. Mobile units should be used temporarily to alleviate space problems, said Burg.

"We are in favor of keeping all programs intact, including art and music," she said. Burg noted all children, especially those with special needs, may need the arts to help develop their self-esteem and offer "creative expression", she said.

"As a last resort," the arts and music program be taught one-half year each in classrooms,

A brochure outlining disciplinary procedures mailed to each parent of district students costs the district an amount in the vicinity of \$9,000 as well."

In financial news, Board bills totalled \$3,393,403.25 for the month of February.

The Board offered special congratulations to the Maine West Girls' Basketball Team. The team stormed through the ranks capturing championships on the Conference level, Regional level, Sectional and Super-Sectional levels, and the grand finale—the State Championship.

This team set a new state record of wins for a single season with 35 with no losses.

two crossings when a train is coming, but the request was turned down. "People keep getting hit while the gates are down. We cannot say that motorists should know better...since by putting additional gates up, we could prevent this kind of disaster," the letter said.

Niles Police Chief Ray Giovannelli also met with a representative of the railroad company last Tuesday to discuss the possibility of putting double gates at the two rail crossings. "I told him something had to be done to prevent any more train-car accidents," he said.

During the discussion, the chief noted that police, via radar, have clocked trains at a speed of up to 73 mph at the railroad crossings. "That is much too fast going through there," he said.

The Soo representative agreed double gates would be an extra safety measure for motorists, but said he would have to discuss the matter with railroad officials.

The police chief will also meet with an official from the Illinois Department of Transportation this Friday to request that all traffic lights along Lehigh automatically turn red when trains are coming through at the crossings.

"Lehigh traffic lights are green because the street runs parallel to the tracks. There is a 'no left

turn" sign at the crossing to warn motorists, but then can become confused with the train standard lights flashing and warning bells operating at the same time," he said.

Giovannelli noted that even with the "no left turn" sign, a motorist might want to "fudge" and turn left into the crossing. "However, double gates would stop him from going further," he said.

The police chief added getting tough with motorists who ignore flashing lights and lowered warning gates by issuing tickets is not a workable plan. "Traffic enforcement is a temporary solution. We need a long term solution which means putting double gates up at these crossings," he said.

areas of the district would be stopped, and access to outstanding computer facilities would be curtailed two mornings, two evenings a week and on Sundays, McKenzie said.

Another cut would be to close the library on Sunday which would mean a layoff of staff, the administrator continued, saying the library district cannot carry on as usual without additional funds.

The library board failed in an attempt to raise a tax levy via a referendum in November 1986 because the consequences of a failed referendum were never made clear to the voters. The board subsequently voted to close the branch library at Cumberland and Ballard.

McKenzie noted there has been a 61 percent increase in library patrons and a 15 percent increase in circulation in the past two years. "We are short of staff to handle the work and it places a burden on librarians. We need more staff to provide better services," McKenzie said.

Niles maximum library tax rate is lower than that of Des Plaines, Skokie, Morton Grove, Indian Trails (Wheeling) Mount Prospect and less than half that of the Park Ridge and Glenview libraries.

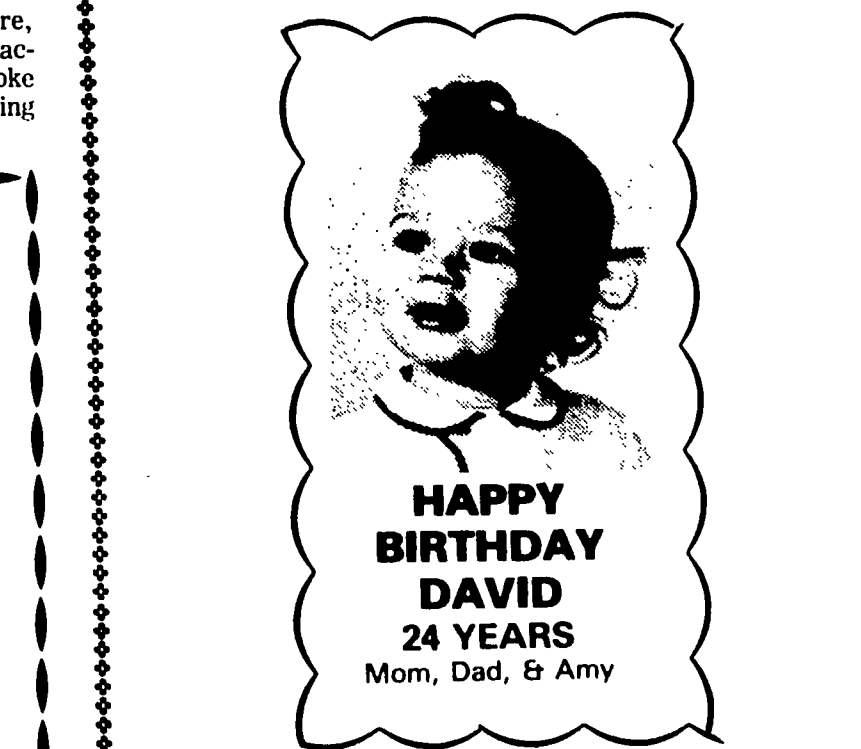

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
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
