The retirement of Niles police chief Whitey Emrickson brings back memories of other times in Niles when The Bugle contested other police chiefs.

When we started The Bugle back in 1957, Niles police chief was a tough talking cop named Bob Romey. He was a big hulk of a guy, six feet or so with an oversized belly which gave him added girth.

During the pre-'57 days he was the top cop of a small staff of men who watched over a village of only a few thousand people, most of whom lived south of Touhy Avenue.

In this small community the people who ran Niles were "family". They were all close friends and more often than not were relatives.

Romey, for all practical purposes, was Niles police department. When some menacing guy was holed up in a room holding off the police with a gun, it was Romey who kicked the door in, and restrained the gun-wielder.

LAWRENCEWOOD SAGA ENDS...the battle between Niles and Lawrencewood property owner Robert Krilich has drawn to a close with a recent court settlement that gives the property to the village. In return, Krilich will be \$13 million richer via the purchase of the shopping center by a builder who plans to redevelop the site.

Although village officials aren't saying much until the money and documents are in hand, the off-the-cuff reaction is great relief the village will no longer have to lock horns with Krilich on the Lawrencewood issue, according to an attorney for the village.

The saga of the almost 20-year-old shopping center began around 1980 (prior to that there were battles over other Krilich-owned properties) when it lost two major tenants, Jupiter Store and Goldblatts. The village started having problems with the owner when the center started falling into disrepair, with Krilich reluctant to put money into its upkeep, according to the attorney.

Building code violations started to increase and went as high as 50 to 75 violations. The village was able to block the owner from bringing in any new tenants until the violations were corrected by obtaining an order from the courts.

Some time later, the case went back to the courts because a tenant, Higher Horizons Foundation Inc. had been allowed to move into the center when numerous building code violations had not been corrected.

Adding to village woes were unsuccessful attempts by outside developers to purchase the property to improve the center for a revitalized Lawrencewood.

The legal chess continued. At one point, the village filed a motion with Circuit Judge Arthur Dunne to put the center in receivership, in which all rent payments would go to a court-appointed custodian who then would use the money to repair code violations. That case was lost in limbo.

In last ditch efforts, the village last year filed a condemnation. Continued on Page 55

Beginning about two weeks ago, several acts of vandalism have occurred in the parking lot of the Niles Public Library, as reported to board members at a regular June 8 meeting. Board member Irene Costello said the library probably will ask Niles police for increased protection as well as increase their own "Vigilance."

Board president Terri Carmen said, "I think it definitely would be worth pursuing for a year."

In other matters, board members voted to adopt a tentative budget in August following a public hearing.

According to committee report, plans are moving ahead for resurfacing and landscaping of the parking lot adjacent to the library. The lot, purchased by the

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First colonial bankshares quarter earnings

First Colonial Bankshares Corporation (NASDAQ/FCOLA), today reported net income of \$2,075,000 for the first quarter of 1988 versus \$2,302,000 in the same quarter a year earlier excluding a \$515,000 cumulative effect of a change in accounting for income taxes. Total assets rose to \$1.025 billion, a 7% increase over the first quarter of 1987.

C. Paul Johnson, Chairman, said that the company was especially pleased with a number of first quarter developments, in particular a 17% increase in noninterest income highlighted by good increases in service charge income, trust fees and leasing income. Noting that net interest margin declined to 4.57% from 4.84%, Johnson attributed the decline, in part, to the effects of FASB 91, having to defer \$244,000 of income. He said, "The company is not at all disappointed with the results. In fact, we were budgeting flat earnings for the quarter in anticipation of the impact of deferring loan fee income and the somewhat seasonal nature of the equipment leasing business. We do not expect, at this time, to have difficulty in attaining our earnings goals for 1988."

Use of IRS label will not cause an audit

Contrary to a popular rumor, the use of the IRS pre-printed label does not trigger a tax audit, noted R.S. Wintrobe Jr., District Director of the Internal Revenue Service for northern Illinois. In fact, what pre-addressed labels do is to reduce the chance of processing errors and speed the delivery of refunds.

"Many people believe that if they use the pre-printed label that comes with their tax package, they will increase their chance for an audit," said Wintrobe. "Most returns are selected for audit by computers which evaluate the information on the returns. A small percentage of returns are also randomly selected for audit."

The pre-printed label contains only information needed by the IRS to process your return, and by the U.S. Postal Service to deliver the tax package in December. The use of the label helps processing in two ways. First, the IRS computer operator only has to type the two identification letters and the taxpayer's social security number to get the correct account on the computer. Second, by not having to type the entire label, it reduces the chance of wrong information being input on the computer. This could be due to IRS error or because the taxpayer placed the wrong information on their return or did not print neatly. For example, this could result in an undeliverable refund because of a bad address.

Take a moment to review the information on the pre-printed label for accuracy. Any corrections, name or address change, should be made directly on the label itself.

Edison's summer rate plan wins ICC approval

Commonwealth Edison's proposal for an immediate 13 percent reduction in summer electricity rates was adopted today by the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC). The first bills reflecting the lower summer rate was issued June 17.

The summer rate phase-in period began May 17 and will continue through June 15. The new lower summer rate is retroactive to May 17, so any electricity used during recent warm spells by customers already on the summer rate will be billed at the reduced summer charge. Customers are billed at the summer rate for four full billing months and at the non-summer rate for eight full billing months.

Depending on when a customer's meter is read, the summer billing period began as early as May 17 or as late as June 15. The non-summer period can begin as early as September 15 or

as late as October 14. A customer can determine the beginning of the summer rate by looking at the time covered by his or her bill. If the end of the billing period is from May 16 to June 14, that will be the customer's final non-summer bill.

Under the plan adopted, summer rates will also be reduced by another 17 percent in 1989, bringing the total summer rate reduction to about 27 percent. Energy charges in the non-summer month will be increased to make the change revenue neutral to Commonwealth Edison.

This year's total summer bill for an average single family residence will decrease approximately \$47. An average apartment resident will see a decrease of about \$21. During the second year, these summer savings will increase to about \$84 and \$38, respectively.

City vehicle stickers available at Norwood

Illinois Bell asks to drop Connections party lines

Illinois Bell today ceased operation of its Connections party-line service on the 900 telephone network and requested Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) approval to discontinue the service permanently.

Connections service provided two conversation lines - one for teenagers and one for young adults - in which a number of callers are bridged together for a group conversation. Illinois Bell's Connections service was one of dozens offered on the 900 telephone network. Other 900-number party-line services operated by independent companies are not affected by Illinois Bell's action.

"Illinois Bell introduced Connections last June with the objective of meeting an identified market demand for telephone-based, live conversation services," said Robert Liggett, the company's general manager for

residence marketing. "Toward that objective, we instituted the service and established guidelines for its use. However, it became clear that a small number of Connections callers abused the service, ignored the guidelines and used the service in ways we had not intended."

"As a result, the public's perception of the Connections service was inconsistent with Illinois Bell's good name and public reputation among its customers. Liggett reiterated that many other 900 party-line services are continuing on the network. He said Illinois Bell has no advance knowledge of their content, format or price, and that Illinois Bell does not monitor them."

The company also noted that it provides a free-of-charge service to customers who want to block calls from their telephones to 900 numbers.

Record Enrollment at North Central

Spring Term enrollment at North Central has continued the steady pattern of record-setting increases which has characterized the College's growth in the last decade.

According to figures released by the office of the Registrar, Spring Term enrollment for the 1987-88 academic year totals 2,056 students, up from 1,990 students one year ago. Included in that total are 1,869 undergraduates and 187 graduate students.

Sixty-two percent of North Central's 1,869 undergraduates attend classes full time. The remaining 38 percent, including 421 adults enrolled in Weekend College, have registered for less than 2.5 course-credits. Only 25 of the 187 adults enrolled in the master's degree program in computer science are registered as full-time students.

North Central's student body is comprised of 1,044 men and 1,012 women. They come from 14 states and five foreign countries. DuPage County residents constitute 44.8 percent of the College's enrollment and an additional 17 percent of the students are residents of Cook County.

The Report Card

ST. JOHN BREBEUF ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Like all suburban Catholic elementary schools, St. John Brebeuf is supported by tuition paid by the families of the attending students, parish contributions, and unpaid volunteers. The archdiocese controls the school's curriculum but makes no financial grants. Thus, each parish must support its own school without any outside help. Beyond the "basics", the total curriculum of each parish may differ depending on how much the school charges and the willingness of the parishioners to underwrite the educational program. A family sending one child pays \$925 per school year with a maximum of \$1,413 for three children. Non-parishioners pay 20 percent more. The school accepts non-Catholics and has some Buddhist and Moslem children. Chicago, Des Plaines, and Glenview are some of the areas outside the parish that send children to the school. The student body is no longer predominately Polish and Italian. Now, twenty five percent of the student body comes from an Asiatic background.

The school has 560 students with 30 teachers, five of whom are nuns. Seven of the teachers have advanced degrees. The starting teacher salary will be \$12,200 for the coming year with a maximum of \$22,200. Adjacent District number 71 which is on the lower end of the elementary public school salary scale, pays a starting teacher salary of \$19,500 and a maximum of \$50,000. Because of money limitations, courses such as foreign languages, shop and home economics are not offered. Sister Rita Green, the school principal with whom I spoke, volunteered that the caliber of the mathematics curriculum is below that of nearby public schools, but computer use begins in the lower grades. Graduates are encouraged to attend Catholic high schools and 54 percent do. As high school students, its alumni perform below average. However, the Parents' Newsletter proudly cites the honors the school's graduates receive and reports the names of all who make the high school honor rolls.

The primary goal of Catholic education is religious indoctrination. In the past, secular education was a secondary consideration. The school system was often accused of not caring how its graduates fared as long as they remained staunch Catholics. Times have changed. The church now realizes that if its school system is to survive, it must give its students a good secular education so they can compete successfully in all phases of society. Outside of religious education, the courses now approximate those offered in the public schools. The textbooks given the children are standard textbooks obtained from publishers who sell them to all schools. History and social science courses are no longer taught from a Catholic perspective. Also, parents are encouraged but not pressured to give their children a Catholic education.

One of St. John's greatest assets is the feeling of oneness and community which is shared by students and faculty. The students feel their teachers are personally interested in them and are anxious for them to learn and progress. They give their teachers much love and respect. This results in a harmonious, disciplined environment and few class disruptions. They also see parents and neighbors performing volunteer work in the school where hired help would be used elsewhere. Each family receives a brochure which clearly spells out the school's rules and regulations and what it expects of each student. Disruptive and incorrigible students are expelled. Few have been expelled. Non-Catholics who send their children to the school do so because they want them to be educated in a loving, disciplined environment. Most St. John Brebeuf parents are "blue-collar workers" for whom money does not grow on trees. The yearly tuition payments represent a significant bite out of the family income. They impress upon their children the necessity of taking advantage of the sacrifices they make to send them to St. John. This is a positive effect on the students' performance and behavior.

As I listened to Sister Rita Green, I heard her relate how monetary restrictions limit her ability to offer many courses and services available to public school students. However, she said these deficiencies are counterbalanced by the very intense instructions her students receive in the courses they take. After I left Sister Rita, I asked myself, "Why would parents send their children to a school that can't offer them what a public school can and have to pay extra to boot?" The obvious answer "religious indoctrination" isn't good enough. Then, I sat down and thought of the many friends and people I encountered during my life who were products of the Catholic school system. Few seemed to have "suffered" from their experiences or were inferior in performance to their counterparts. In fact, many were damned smart. Then, I talked to friends who sent their children to parochial schools. All stated they were satisfied with the education their children received and the progress they made late in life. All this corroborated Sister Rita's statements and made me realize she knows what she is talking about.
