The retirement of Niles police chief Whitey Emrikson brings back memories of other times in Niles when The Bugle contested other police chiefs.

When we started The Bugle back in 1957, Niles police chief was a tough talking cop named Bob Romey. He was a high hulk of a guy, six feet or so, with an oversized belly which gave him added girth.

During the pre-'57 days he was the top cop of a small staff of men who watched over a village of only a few thousand people, most of whom lived south of Touhy Avenue.

In this small community the people who ran Niles were "family". They were all close friends and more often than not were relatives.

Romey, for all practical purposes, was Niles police department. When some menacing guy was holed up in a room holding off the police with a gun, it was Romey who kicked the door in, and restrained the gun-wielder.


### District 71 teachers sign

### Maine Beat

LAWRENCEWOOD SAGA ENDS...the battle between Niles and Lawrencewood property owner Robert Krilich has drawn to a close with a recent court settlement that gives the property to the village. In return, Krilich will be \$13 million richer via the purchase of the shopping center by a builder who plans to redevelop the site.

Although village officials aren't saying much until the money and

documents are in hand, the off-the-cuff reaction is great relief the village will no longer have to lock horns with Krilich on the Lawrencewood issue, according to an attorney for the village. The saga of the almost 25-year-old shopping center began around 1980 (prior to that there were battles over other Krilich-owned properties) when it lost two major tenants, Jupiter Store and Goldblatts. The village started having problems with the owner

when the center started falling into disrepair, with Krilich reluctant to put money into its upkeep, according to the attorney. Building code violations started to increase and went as high as 50 to 75 violations. The village was able to block the owner from bringing in any new tenants until the violations were corrected by obtaining an order from the courts.

Some time later, the case went back to the courts because a tenant, Higher Horizons Foundation Inc. had been allowed to move into the center when numerous building code violations had not been corrected.

Adding to village woes were unsuccessful attempts by outside developers to purchase the property to improve the center for a revitalized Lawrencewood.

The legal chess continued. At one point, the village filed a motion with Circuit Judge Arther Dunne to put the center in receivership, in which all rent payments would go to a court-appointed custodian who then would use the money to repair code violations. That case was lost in limbo

### When school decisions raise questions

by Arthur C. Kobos Principal, Culver School

There are a multitude of people involved in making decisions which affect our children's educational process. It is important that parents and other members of the community understand who is responsible for what decisions.

Let us begin with the board of education. Board members are elected by the public to represent the community in making general policy decisions. The board also deals with such issues as budget, finance, legislation, hiring and firing of employees, and set-

The school board works closely with the superintendent, whose ob it is to carry out the board's policy decisions. Building principals report to the superintendent. And they are responsible for the day-to-day logistics of their individual buildings. Classroom teachers report to their principal and are accountable for everyday classroom activities. Sponsors and coaches are responsible for their club and team members, but also report to their building ad-

Each school district is run in much the same manner as a corporation. The school board functions as the board of directors. The president of the school board plays a role akin to that of the chairman of the board. The superintendent of schools is like the president of the company. The assistant superintendent functions much like a vice president. The principals are comparable to division presidents, the teachers are the middle managers, and the students are the customers. Students' parents, as well as community members who do not have children in school, are the investors in the corporation. Remember, all taxpayers are investors in the schools because their tax dollars go to support the educational pro-

When you wish to get to the root of a problem which has occurred in school, decide in advance who you believe is accountable for the decision which was made.
