



MEDICARE CATASTROPHE COVERAGE ACT OF 1988 On May 25, U.S. House and Senate conferees finally reached a compromise on H.R. 2470, the Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act of 1988, paving the way for the largest expansion of Medicare since the program was established in 1965. The compromise legislation, approved by the House on June 2 and by the Senate on June 8, is expected to be signed by the President. While the new legislation will help Medicare beneficiaries with massive bills resulting from acute illness, it will not protect seniors against the larger catastrophe of long term care costs. Although Congress is aware of the public's desire for action on this front, long term care legislation will have to wait until

The catastrophic bill has been controversial among seniors and senior advocates for its break with the past approach to financing benefits. H.R. 2470 abandons the traditional social insurance model which spreads costs among all taxpayers. Instead, the price of the new catastrophic benefits will be borne almost entirely by seniors. Younger taxpayers will chip in only to pick up part of the tab for low-income beneficiaries.

FINANCING CATASTROPHIC COVERAGE The basic monthly premium already paid by all beneficiaries enrolled under Part B (physician care) is now \$24.80. The catastrophic bill will add to this basic premium a new "flat premium" of \$4 a month in 1989. By 1993, it is estimated that the basic monthly premium will have risen to about \$32.30 and the new catastrophic "flat premium" will have gone up to \$10.20, for a total premium of \$42.50 a month. In addition, the 44 percent of the elderly with incomes high enough to be subject to federal income tax will have to pay a "supplemental" premium based o the amount of their taxable income. In 1989, the supplemental premium is set at \$22.50 for each \$150 of taxable income, up to a maximum of \$800. Only individuals with incomes of at least \$50,000, or couples with incomes of more than \$80,000, will have to pay the maximum premium. It is estimated that most people will pay only the flat premium, and may not choose to pay it at all if they opt to drop Medicare Part B.

NEW BENEFITS OF CATASTROPHIC COVERAGE Hospital Care (Part A): Unlimited free care will be provided after payment of a deductible estimated to be about \$564. Currently, benefits cover the first 60 days and a portion of the next 90, not covering most hospitalizations over 150 days. (To begin

Physician Care (Part B): 100 percent coverage of reasonable physician charges and other covered costs under Part B after the deductible of \$1370 is paid. (To begin Jan. 1, 1990)

Prescription Drugs: Providing reimbursement for outpatient prescription drugs, to be phased in over four years beginning in 1990 where Medicare will pay for part of the cost of intravenous and immunisuppressive drugs. Then by 1993 and beyond, will pay 80 percent after a deducible of \$600 that will be adjusted up-

Skilled Nursing Facilities: The current 100-day limit is increased to 150 days and the requirement that this care be preceded by a hospital stay of at least three days has been dropped. Patients must pay a copayment of about \$21 per day for the first eight days.

Mammograms: Women over 65 would be covered for mammogram screenings for breast cancer every other year, starting in 1990. The cost of the mammogram could not exceed \$50.

Medigap Insurance Policies: The prevention of medigap in-

surance companies from charging policy holders for benefits now covered under Medicare. Other benefits outlined by H.R. 2470 include provision for

Medicare buy-in by state Medicaid programs, low income drug benefits, spousal impoverishment provisions and continued study of national insurance coverage for long term and adult

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

Reasons cited for opposing this year's Con-Con call included satisfaction with the present amendment procedure and fear

adopted in 1970 has allowed the placement of nine different constitutional proposals on the ballot, of which four have been approved by the voters. "The League is disappointed at the failure of the General Assembly to submit a judicial merit selection amendment to the voters. said Barry. "But we are redoubling our efforts to achieve this reform through the amendment

The 1970 constitution provides that the question of calling a convention shall be placed on the ballot automatically every twenty years. A majority of those voting in the general election of three-fifths of those voting on the question are needed to approve the convention call.

# See for yourself... a guide to healthy eyes

American population moves into its middle or elderly years, vision changes due to aging are affecting an increasing number of people. These changes may be as minor as needing glasses to read the fine print or as significant as cataract removal and intraocular lens implantation or treatment of glaucoma.

"Each year, about 50 percent of new cases of blindness occur in the elderly," said Melvyn A. Gerstein, M.D., Eye Center, a Medicareapproved facility in Chicago. 'Nearly half of these could have been prevented by early detec-

tion and treatment." The effects of the aging eye are more noticeable by the time most people reach age 40. At this time, the lens begins to lose its elasticity and develops problems switching back and forth to focus from far objects to near objects. The inability to adjuct is called presbyopia. By age 50, nearly 100 percent of Americans experience some form of presbyopia.

"There is no exercise or medication which will reverse presbyopia, " explained Dr. Gerstein. "In order for the eye to focus, reading glasses or bifocals are prescribed. About every two years, new glasses are required to overcome the continuing effect of aging."

Among the more serious diseases of the eye common in the elderly are glaucoma, cataracts and macular degeneration. Nearly two milion people over age 65 are affected by glaucoma. Glaucoma, the build-up of excess fluid in the eye, causes blindness if not treated early and properly. Although glaucoma has no early symptoms, it can be diagnosed through a routine eye examination. Treatment of glaucoma includes medication to lower the eye pressure, or in more serious cases, laser treatment.

"Other causes of blindness in senior citizens are macular degeneration and vision loss linked to diabetes," said Robert M. Stein, M.D., ophthalmologist and partner at Northshore Eye

As a large percentage of the Center. "In macular degeneraof the retina, deteriorates leaving the eye unable to clearly see objects straight ahead.

"Although patients suffering from macular degeneration cannot expect to regain their vision, new methods of examination and early treatment with a laser have successfully reduced vision losses in some patients.

Laser treatment is also being used to treat diabetic patients retina. Diabetes can affect the eyes through leaking blood vessels which causes detachment of the retina.

The most common disorder of the eye in elderly patients is cataracts. Cataracts are the cloudiness that develops in the lens and reduces vision. They are removed on an outpatient basis through one of the most common surgical procedures performed

Costs for extending the Skokie Swift from Dempster St. in Skokie to Lake Cook Rd. could be as low at \$23.7 million, according to a recently completed study commissioned by NORTRAN (the North Suburban Mass Tran-

This compares with an estimate of \$91 million contained in an earlier study by the Chicago Area Transportation Study (CATS) for building a doubletract line. The latest study into the costs of extending the line a distance of 8.5 miles was made by Emanuel Siegel, an independent consulting engineer with extensive experience in evaluating rail lines nationwide. The Siegel study estimates costs of extending the service to Lake Cook Rd. at \$24 million, still less than a third of the CATS study estimate. "Mr. Siegel's study indicates that extending light rail service to Northbrook is not a pie-in-the sky scheme but a very reachable goal," according to Stanley

database. "Criminals today are highly mobile and tend to operate ir several jurisdictions," said J. David Coldren, executive director of the Athority. "Our philosophy with PIMS has always been to give law enforcement agencies access to a broad range of information they need to identify crime patterns, including those that cross jurisdictional

boundaries," he said. The Chicago-area PIMS network is operated by the Authority on computers located in its downtown Chicago office. Terminals and printers in each department are linked to the cen-

tral site via telecommunications Coldren said this arrangement saves local agencies from having to purchase expensive computer hardware or hire specialized systems personnel. In addition. agencies can share information with one another more easily

through the Authority's centrally
