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## OCC seeks compromise over flooding issue

Twice within the month of August the Oakton College Board of Trustees heard pleas from Des Plaines citizens' groups and elected officials regarding a perceived threat of improper flood plain usage by the College. Specific allegations made by residents alleged the building of

the Northwest Municipal project and the creation of an athletic field on the campus's north end would add to the future flooding problems by depleting water absorption areas. The protestors also alleged that the baseball field on the south end of the campus is illegal and in violation of

flood plain restrictions.

At the last Board meeting, August 23, these issues were addressed in a lengthy presentation by hydraulic engineer, David Gannett, representing the engineering firm of Barton-Aschman & Associates. Through

Maine North High School and its 48 acre campus were sold at auction last June to a private developer who hopes to build about 960 townhouses and condominiums on the property.

Back in the 60's Maine High School board member Walter Craigie told us how proud he was the board had the foresight to purchase the land for Maine North at that time. Eventually, the land and the building cost about \$12,000,000. Last June it was sold for \$7.5 million to the Lexington Development Corporation.

The State of Illinois is interested in purchasing the high school building for its District 3 headquarters for the Illinois State Police now at two locations, 4501 Harlem Ave., Chicago, and 477 S. River Rd., Des Plaines. But the state is balking at the figure Lexington wants for the facility. If the building isn't sold or rented it will be demolished.

The history of Maine North indicates how difficult it is to foresee the future. When Maine North was on the planning board enrollment in the high school district was expected to reach 14,000 with the

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## Lawrencewood neighbors voice concern over parking

Approximately 100 residents along Nordica Ave., who attended a meeting Monday at the Trident Center to discuss parking problems, were assured by developer Jerry Biehl that parking would be available when the Lawrencewood shopping center is redeveloped as the Civic Center Plaza.

At issue were concerns that parking spaces directly behind Lawrencewood used by Nordica townhouse owners and apartment tenants (east of the center), would vanish when the shopping center is redeveloped.

In the past, former Lawrencewood owner Robert Krilich, who developed the Nordica townhouse complex and the Greenleaf apartment complex allowed residents to park there. Encouraged by village officials, Nordica residents recently

formed a homeowners association to deal with area problems. Attending the meeting were Mayor Nicholas Blase, Joe Salarno, director of code enforcement, and Todd Bavaro, director of housing, who acted as advisor to the new homeowners group and conducted the meeting.

Biehl said 188 spaces would be provided behind the shopping center which would be used by service trucks during the day. However, residents could continue parking there at night. "About a dozen spaces will be lost because shopping center tenants will use them," he said.

Biehl assured the audience he wanted to be a good neighbor to bring about a good relationship. "The new shopping center will be good for me and you. I want you

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## Maine Beat

VACATION VIGNETTE...just returned from enchanting Hawaii cruising the blue Pacific waters with ports of call at Maui, Hilo, Kona and Kauai. The latter is called Paradise Island...and those who have been there...agree the name is no exaggeration.

Although we had visited Aloha land some years ago, the tropical beauty of the various islands, each with distinctive features of its own, never fails to impress.

Like most returning travelers, we thought we had "seen it all", but a drive to unspoiled Kauai's Hanalei Valley along the north shore was an unforgettable experience. From a look-out point, the valley blends into shades of green, brown and red, with the silvery Hanalei River winding its way through checker-boarded rice fields and taro patches to the bay, where the rich and famous anchor their boats near a resort site.

Our cruise on the U.S. Constitution is notable for a room dedicated to the late Grace Kelly, former actress and Princess of Monaco, who sailed on the ship (then operating in New York) in 1956. Various photos are on the walls showing Kelly en route to Monaco to marry Prince Rainier, and the couple's return to Hawaii in the early 1980's to rededicate the newly refurbished Constitution.

Memories on board the Constitution should include fellow passengers Edna and Norma Flyte, who were the big attention-getters on the dance floor during the week-long cruise. The couple, who celebrated a 50th wedding anniversary last June danced each night away with the grace and style (including the Cha Cha and jitterbugging) of a professional dance team. In a conversation, they told us they were former residents of Rogers Park and took dance lessons years ago from Agnes and Tom DeBartolo of Park Ridge...well-known dance instructors for that town's park district.

The couple now live in Sun City, Arizona.

Other highlights...the sight of wild orchids growing on the roadside. A unique self-serve fresh fruit stand operating on the honor system in Kauai. Farmers leave the prices on the various fruit, with a coin box available to pay for the food. And we were told the honor system works. A luncheon stop was made at Charo's, owned by the dynamic singer who performed with Xavier Cugat band and who had left the day before to perform at a Las Vegas nightclub.

Impressive sights...watching the fiery red glow of lava flowing down a mountain into the sea at midnight as the ship passed Hilo. The spectacular Waimea Canyon, known as the "Grand Canyon of the Pacific" in Kauai and Lualaba Beach where actress Mitzi Gaynor "washed that man right out of her hair" in the film version of "South Pacific" and the location for the television movie "The Thorn Birds." Also impressive in Kauai was the new Westin Hotel that has to be seen to be believed.

This vacation vignette should not end without relating a live comedy show witnessed by passengers as the ship was leaving its berth in Maui. Two men and two women were late coming back to the ship, which had left the dock and then stopped (for the late arrivals) leaving several feet of space between the dock and the vessel. Several crew members jumped onto the dock and helped the two men passengers and one of the women to jump over the space to a door level with the dock. It was done without mishap despite

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## Greenwood Ave. home to shelter women & children

A shelter for homeless women and children will start operating in a residence at 9300 Greenwood Ave., in the near future following approval of the Cook County Board last week.

The board followed the recommendation of the county's zoning of appeals that approved a petition to operate the Housing and Shelter Program (HASP) in the residential area of unincorporated Des Plaines.

The home is expected to open in September to suburban women and children who are having hardship problems. The zoning board had stipulated that no men will be housed in the shelter, according to HASP spokesman.

Plans are to clean and paint the

house and to do some remodeling prior to the opening of the home, the spokesman added.

At the zoning board hearing in July, neighbors in the area objected to the shelter being located in a residential neighborhood.

They were also concerned with the appearance of the property, noting that previous owners of the residence did not take care of the grounds.

The house, located on the corner of Greenwood and Lyons, has been used since 1977 as a foster home for emotionally disturbed children from a school in Park Ridge. However, many neighbors told county officials they were unaware the property was being used for that purpose.

# Niles bus system celebrates 15 years

## Niles Fire Department calls

The Niles Fire Department responded to 12 fire alarms and 22 ambulance calls from August 19 to August 22.

Firemen responded to 5830 Dempster St. on a report of something burning in a store on August 19. A check of the building showed no cause for alarm, and the system was put out of service until the key holder arrived.

Firefighters went to F&M Distributors, 8251 Golf Rd. on August 19 and found the occupant was concerned about water condensation coming from the air conditioning ducts, and the alarm activating in the building. The alarm box was reset after it was determined there was no hazard.

An alarm at Argus Press, 7440 Natchez Ave. was probably caused by maintenance men working in the plant on August 19.

A smoke scare at 9011 Ballard was attributed to a pan of food burning on the stove on August 21.

A car fire at Doc Weeds, 8832 Dempster St. was extinguished with a pump can on August 29. The fire, which caused \$200 damage, started in the engine compartment of the vehicle.

On August 22, firemen responded to a lockout at 8761 Osceola. The original route was scheduled to run from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday and from noon to 6 p.m. on Saturdays and

Sundays. The buses wound through the village every hour during these time frames and response to the use of the buses was excellent, according to a 1976 report on the system's status.

In late August of 1973, the village purchased a 19 passenger air-conditioned demonstration bus from Mercedes-Benz Inc., of North America and placed it into service. During that month, the system carried 5,936 passengers, which included 1,378 senior citizens. From this point the system continued to grow. Two more Mercedes-Benz buses were added during the following year and the total ridership for the month of June, 1974 jumped to 19,540, an increase of 329 percent over the original August, 1973 figure.

According to the report, a fourth Mercedes Benz went into service on December 11, 1974 and one of the school buses, a 1965 Chevrolet had to be retired from service. The village received a grant from the state and federal governments for four additional Mercedes-Benz buses and received them in November of 1975. At the close of the 1975 year, the System's fledgling years, Niles used two old school buses borrowed from the Niles Park District. The route was set up to include all major points of interest to residents, such as park facilities, shopping centers, senior citizen facilities and municipal facilities.

The original route was scheduled to run from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday and from noon to 6 p.m. on Saturdays and

tion over the entire household. Over a period of time, the mezuzah's letters or parchments can deteriorate. To avoid owning invalid mezuzahs, a competent person must check them twice in seven years, if possible, during Eilat, the month before Rosh Hashanah.

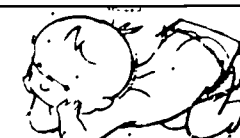

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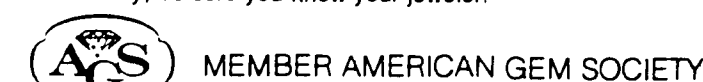

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### Why do so few Americans carry Donor Cards?

In 1987, more than 1,400 people in the United States received heart transplants. But each year at least one-third of those on waiting lists die before getting hearts, reports the September 1988 Reader's Digest. Hundreds of usable organs are wasted weekly because potential donors didn't carry an Organ Donor Card, or failed to make their wishes known to next-of-kin and the families wouldn't agree to donate.

Why do so few Americans carry Donor Cards? Mostly, it's because of misinformation about organ donation. Consider these facts:

- Everyone, regardless of age or medical condition, is a potential donor.

- Organ donation is consistent with the beliefs of all major religions in the United States.
- There is no cost to the donor's family or payment by the recipient.
- Donation does not delay funerals. Organs are usually removed immediately after consent is obtained. And there is no visible evidence of the surgery.
- Children under 18 can carry a legal Organ Donor Card as long as it is witnessed and counter-signed by parents or guardians.
- All patients awaiting organ transplantation are registered on the waiting list of the United Network for Organ Sharing (UNOS) in Richmond, Va., the government-mandated agency that coordinates the nationwide distribution of organs. They are

rated on the list on the basis of blood type, geographic location and medical urgency.

With Autumn fast approaching, the Northwest Real Estate Board recently listed several "critical maintenance" items important to properly protect structural components of a homeowner's building, as well as items which will improve the "cosmetics" of property.

"Critical maintenance" generally relates to the soundness of the structure; if not performed regularly as needed, the lack of critical maintenance can adversely affect other structural components and ultimately harm the building.

Since water damage usually presents potentially the most harmful damage to a home, some examples of critical external maintenance include repairing or replacing a damaged, weathered, or aging roof, proper tuckpointing of a brick chimney, or sidewall bricks and masonry, repair or replacement of broken, cracked, or rotting wooden frame wall panels or damaged aluminum siding, and inspection of cracks or broken concrete in the building's foundation. The exterior of the building should also have soffits and fascia in good condition, with strong, sturdy gutters and downspouts, and the water collected should be able to drain away from the building.

Frame buildings should have all exterior components examined to guard against rotting, broken, missing, or decaying wood. All exterior walls should be level and straight, and wooden structures in Chicago should undergo a termite inspection on a regular basis. Where necessary, exterior wooden components of the building should regularly be scraped and repainted with two or more coats of a quality exterior-type paint, if the frame home is sided, aluminum siding

should not be mixed with panels of the steel variety, for a harmful galvanic reaction could result.

Buildings with brick, stone, or frame porches or stairs should have these items checked on a regular basis, with repairs made when and where necessary to these components.

Within the structure, the interior of the roof and atticsides of and ceiling should be inspected, as well as the ceilings in every room and closet checked for structural soundness, with repairs made to any possible water damage, holes, cracks, or breaks. Water seepage is a possible hazard, and the basement walls, the interior of the building's concrete foundation, should be inspected for breaks or cracks. Repairs include patching with concrete and coating with a high-quality water-resistant commercial sealant.

All plumbing throughout the building should be examined on a regular basis, with repairs or replacements made to rusting, aging, or broken pipes, fixtures, and faucets. Plumbing problems can easily result in both interior damage from water leakage and high water bills for the homeowner. Broken, non-functioning, or leaking radiators can also result in damage to the interior components of a building.

All electrical components throughout the building should be examined, with repairs or replacement made to any aging, defective, or frayed wiring, outlets, fixtures, or other electrical items.

When examining the interior of a home, floors with too much "give" when walked on should be examined for broken, rotting, or buckling sections, conditions resulting in a "spongy" feeling to

the floor. All interior wooden trim and doors should receive regular attention, with repair, replacement or repainting made as necessary. Wooden cabinets should be inspected for damaged or rotting wood, and should also receive a coat of varnish or paint when necessary.

Examples of exterior cosmetic maintenance include proper landscaping, with grass seed or sod added when necessary, routine trimming of trees and bushes, and the replacement of bushes or plants made on a regular basis. Since outdoor vegetation items have different life cycles, replacement should come before the plants or bushes become too "woody", and made alternatively, so that the plants and bushes are all in different parts of their respective life cycles. Other exterior cosmetic items include patching or replacement of sidewalks and driveway, with a regular exterior sealant applied to driveways or parking areas requiring such attention.

Interior cosmetics include replacing carpeting, tile, or linoleum as needed, repainting walls and ceilings to give a "new" or "larger" look, and regular washing of windows, trim, ceilings, and walls.

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## School traffic flow

by Secretary of State Jim Edgar  
With school starting, school buses are again a part of the traffic flow in many urban and rural areas. Illinois law requires motorists to stop before meeting or overtaking a school bus that has stopped to load or unload passengers.

Bus drivers signal an approaching stop at least 100 feet in advance (200 feet in rural areas) by the flashing amber and red lights on the front and rear of the bus. The stop signal arm is extended after the bus has come to a complete stop.

You must then come to a complete stop. Do not proceed until the school bus resumes motion, the bus driver signals you to go ahead, or the flashing lights are turned off and the stop signal arm is no longer extended.

If you are convicted of passing a stopped school bus illegally, your drivers license will be suspended for 30 days. If you receive two convictions within three years, your license will be suspended for 60 days.

When driving on a street or highway with at least two lanes of traffic in each direction, you are not required to stop when approaching a stopped school bus from the opposite direction. However, you should slow down and drive with care.

According to the Department of Transportation, there were 2,792 school bus accidents in Illinois last year, a decrease of 120 from 1986. Help further reduce the number of accidents and ensure our children's safety by stopping for school buses.

Dear Editor: Ben Franklin once said that death and taxes are inevitable. But Mr. Franklin did not say it's inevitable that Illinois homeowners have to be taxed to death by our state's runaway property tax system.

That's why Illinois taxpayers need "Proposition 2", a constitutional amendment that would limit property taxes on residential property to no more than 2% of its market value.

The purpose of Proposition 2 is to lessen Illinois' excessive reliance on the property tax to finance local government, especially education. Right now local property taxes account for

54% of the money spent on elementary and secondary education in Illinois. State government pays only 38% of the school finance burden, down from 48% in 1976.

As Commissioner of the Cook County Board of (tax) Appeals from 1982 to 1986, I heard more than 150,000 property tax appeals from families and businesses disgusted with Illinois' complicated and unfair property tax system. Our state should not continue to over-rely on a regressive 19th century property tax system which has no relationship to the ability to pay.

Adoption of Proposition 2 would establish a reasonable limit on

what Illinois government can expect from property taxpayers and grant relief to those who are already overtaxed.

According to statistics released by the Illinois Department of Revenue, Illinois citizens now pay more money in property taxes every year than any other levy except the federal income tax.

In just the past six years, property taxes have doubled on the average Illinois homeowner and if we don't do anything to put a reasonable ceiling on property taxes, then they will double again in the next six years.

The plain fact is the property tax system with its bewildering array of terms, deadlines, and officials is designed to be intimidating to the average taxpayer. The idea is to get homeowners to dig deep in their pockets and pay up - without asking too many questions.

Proposition 2 offers homeowners a simple, straightforward way to end Illinois' addiction to property taxes and reform a system that is presently out of control.

Adoption of Proposition 2 will force local governments to be more economical and competent in handling their budgets. Proposition 2 will also force state government to finally live up to its responsibility to fund at least half the cost of education in Illinois.

A constitutional amendment to establish Proposition 2 is possible through a state constitutional convention. This November 8 Illinois voters will vote on a referendum on whether to call a constitutional convention.

The best defense against such special interests tactics is an informed and active electorate. I hope your readers will contact U.S. Senators Alan Dixon and Paul Simon and ask them to protect their rights to lower prices and choice of goods and to vote in favor of Senate Bill 430, "The Retail Competition Enforcement Act of 1988".

I'm afraid if your readers fail to look into this for themselves their pocketbooks will be hurt for years to come.

## Travel trailer tips for safe camping

Camping in a travel trailer can be fun and inexpensive recreation. If you plan on traveling with a trailer this summer, be sure to use a trailer and hitch that are compatible with your vehicle.

First, the weight of the trailer should not exceed the maximum load the hitch can pull. For example, Class A hitches can pull a maximum of 2,000 pounds. If that weight is exceeded, your car's body could buckle and the roof could collapse.

Since small cars may not have enough power to haul large travel trailers, look in the owner's manual for the maximum tow load of your car. The trailer's weight should not exceed the

maximum weight your car can pull safely.

Maneuvering problems may occur when pulling a trailer with a front-wheel drive vehicle. The heavy load of the trailer pressing down on the back wheels of the car can cause the front wheels to be lifted slightly. This hazard, referred to as "fishtailing," is caused by poorly distributed trailer weight. Use an equalizing hitch to distribute the weight of the load over the car's entire chassis.

Novice campers should practice driving with the trailer before attempting a long trip. When backing up, turn the steering wheel in the opposite direction you want the rear of the trailer to go. Braking distance also increases with additional weight; therefore, increase following distances and remember to brake earlier than normal.

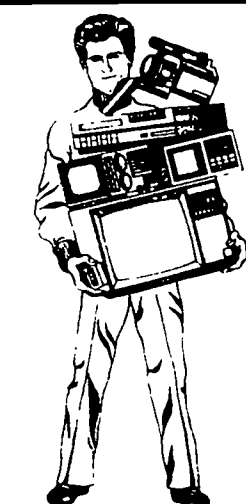
We had juice, coffee, and donuts and chewed the fat with our neighbors while waiting our turn in line to be tested.

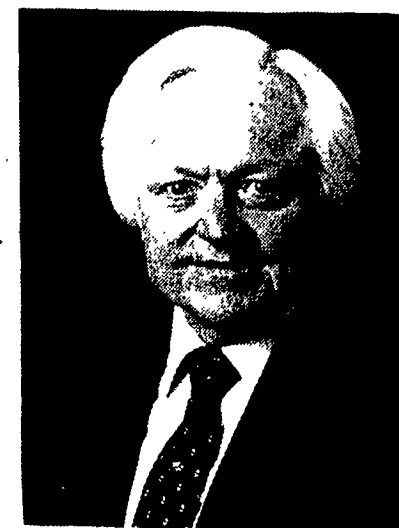

### Arrhythmia patients being helped at Loyola

More than 400,000 people in North America are stricken each year with ventricular arrhythmias. It is a life-threatening situation because the heart's rhythm is out of control.

In most cases, the victims die of what is called "sudden cardiac death."

Now a variety of medical and surgical therapies have been developed at Loyola University Medical Center to treat this problem, giving patients a chance to survive and live productive lives.

Loyola, a leader in cardiac care at all levels, is a referral center for sudden cardiac death and has successfully treated 110 patients for life-threatening ventricular arrhythmias during 1987. One-half received surgical treatment, and the other half receive medication.

Staffing the center are Dr. David Wilbur, assistant professor of medicine and chief of electrophysiology; Dr. Brian Olshansky, a cardiologist and electrophysiologist; and Dr. Bradford Blakeman, assistant professor of thoracic and cardiovascular surgery.

The use of high tech computers in the electrophysiology lab and a technique called epicardial mapping has enabled Loyola physicians to pinpoint the problems of heart patients referred to them.

Patients referred to the center have had heart attacks or some other heart problems and are experiencing palpitations. They are

usually being treated with medications. In some cases, the medicine is not working, or the side effects of the medicine are so intolerable that the patient cannot take it.

It is here that the electrophysiology lab and epicardial mapping come into play. This is where the investigative work is done to help the physicians learn the specific nature of a patient's problem so that proper therapy can be recommended.

In the electrophysiology lab, electrode leads are placed on the patient's chest and a catheter is manipulated inside the heart. What has been created is an external and internal electrocardiogram. The purpose is to stimulate an abnormal ventricular rhythm - a tachycardia - in the patient's heart under controlled conditions. This is done to help define the type of tachycardia, and to determine the best form of treatment.

Once a determination has been made that surgery is the best treatment, epicardial mapping is done right in the operating room before beginning the surgery. A computer prints out a multicolored map of the front and back of the patient's heart. The colors, red, green, blue and yellow, provide vital information to the cardiac surgeon, Dr. Blakeman.

The yellow area pinpoints for him the "irritable focus." This is

scar tissue on the left ventricle of the heart which is the result of a previous heart attack; Dr. Blakeman will remove or freeze this tissue which is the cause of the patient's problems.

In some cases of poor ventricular function, the evaluation of the electrophysiology study may show that implanting a cardioverter defibrillator within the patient's chest is the best therapy.

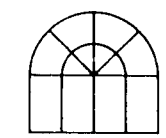
"This device monitors heart activity and treats abnormal rapid heart rhythms by administering an electrical shock directly to the heart," Dr. David Wilbur said. "An abnormal heart rhythm is usually detected within five to 20 seconds. In another five to 15 seconds, the cardioverter defibrillator delivers a counter-shock. Patients describe the experience as similar to a hard thump on the chest."

There are other therapies, which includes medication and antitachycardia pacemakers, to control the ventricular arrhythmias.

But, as Dr. Blakeman notes, the method of treatment must be individualized for each patient. Recommending the appropriate therapy depends on the following factors: age, type of arrhythmias and the rate, existence of a ventricular aneurysm, extent of coronary disease, the heart's ejection fraction and effectiveness of medication.

## Senator Carroll releases health care charges info

## Charity gambling fundraisers halted

Fundraisers involving gambling for charity will again be illegal beginning September 1, 1988.

State Senator Bob Kustra (R-28, Des Plaines) said he regretted that the General Assembly, in its final days of the last session, did not pass the necessary action to allow such events to continue. According to Kustra, Roger Sweet, Director, Illinois Department of Revenue has issued a bulletin notifying all organizations that hold charitable games licenses, or that are applying for them, that the licenses will not be in effect as of September 1.

"The original law allowing

casino-type gambling fundraisers passed in 1986," Kustra said. "It contained a sunset provision which causes the law to expire automatically on September 1, 1988. Sunset provisions are a good way to get rid of bad laws, but we have to make sure we take the necessary action to keep the good laws in effect. We didn't in this case."

Kustra said that a bill lifting the September 1 expiration date is stalled in the House.

"We need to take action on this as soon as we reconvene in November. Some very good organizations are losing their ability to raise their necessary operating funds."

From 1976 to 1980, Boyle served as State's Attorney for Macoupin County in Carlinville. Prior to that, he was a three-term State Representative from the 49th Legislative District. As a member of the Illinois House, he served as Chairman of the Appropriations Committee.

Boyle, a University of Illinois Law School graduate, had extensive trial experience as a practicing Attorney from 1962 to 1976. He earned a bachelor's degree from the U. of I. in 1960, majoring in Political Science and received his law degree at the State's largest University in 1962.

Boyle earned numerous academic honors while in college, including the coveted Phi Beta

Kappa key and undergraduate honors with "Highest Distinction in Political Science." A lifelong Democrat, Boyle was President of "Illini For Kennedy" in John F. Kennedy's 1960 presidential campaign. Boyle's group registered 2,800 voters on campus, and he had the honor of introducing Kennedy at an October, 1960 rally - the first political speaker ever at the University.

Boyle is married and has six children. He is 50 years of age.

## Lindquist challenges Pullen to debate

Bonnie Lindquist, Democratic Candidate for State Representative for the 56th Representative District, recently issued a challenge to incumbent Penny Pullen to a debate.

"I will debate Penny Pullen anytime, anywhere," said Lindquist, a longtime resident of Des Plaines. It is time that she be held accountable for her poor job in public office."

I hope Penny Pullen has the courage to discuss her voting record with her constituents and will not run away from it."

## Marcus challenges Stucker's priorities

Shel Marcus, Republican candidate for the Illinois House, says that Cal Stucker's priorities have become abundantly clear during the final days of the session of the Illinois General Assembly.

"Apparently Cal Stucker considers it more appropriate to subsidize millionaires than to help the people of his district by providing any meaningful improvements in education, tax reform or property tax relief," according to Marcus.

"Cal Stucker continues in his role of party hack every time he bends to the will of Mike Madigan and the Chicago bosses and votes in their best interest and not that of the 56th district," added Marcus. "By giving \$150 million to the White Sox before dealing with the more important issues of a fairer

state aid formula for education, returning the tax exemption for the blind and elderly, and property tax relief, Mr. Stucker has made it clear that his priorities are the priorities of Chicago party bosses, not the priorities of our communities."

Marcus called on Stucker to try and explain to the people of the 56th district why he has apparently abandoned them in favor of the whims of political bosses.

"When elected," said Marcus, "I will vote based on the views of this district, views expressed to me during my thirteen years on the Niles Township School Boards and my many years devoted to civic and community projects, and views ignored by our current representative."

## Dudycz child-protection measures among bills signed by Governor

Child-protection legislation sponsored by State Sen. Walter Dudycz (R-7th Chicago) and signed Aug. 19, by the Governor will crack down on teenage prostitution and provide more assistance for the victims of child abuse.

Also during the State Fair week, Gov. James Thompson signed legislation designed to curb elder abuse, clear the way for long-term care insurance for senior citizens and expand educational assistance to the children of veterans.

Among the youth-related legislation signed was House Bill 3331 - which will have a strong impact on the way cases involving children are handled in Illinois courts.

Dudycz said the new law allows for more testimony and input from the children during court proceedings. The measure states that any person—no matter what age—is qualified to be a witness in court. It also makes admissible in court the hearsay statements of a child regarding an unlawful sexual act against that child.

House Bill 3331 requires judges to consider the adverse effects a delay or continuance of a trial may have on the well-being of a child victim or witness in a kidnapping case, Dudycz said.

Also signed into law was House Bill 3485. The measure establishes fines and penalties for those convicted of luring a juvenile into a home or other building—without the consent of a parent—for the purpose of committing a crime.

Previously, state law only covered the luring of children into cars or trucks. Those convicted under the new law would face one to three years of prison and a fine of up to \$10,000.

## Gottlieb calls on opponent to stop O'Hare Noise Map

George S. Gottlieb, Republican nominee for U.S. Congress (11th), called on his opponent in the upcoming general election to pressure government officials to refrain from filing the O'Hare Noise Map on August 31.

The City of Chicago Aviation Department plans to file the contoured noise map showing noise levels around O'Hare Airport. This action is expected to have an adverse effect on property values in the surrounding area.

"I am calling upon Frank Annunzio to respond to the request of homeowners in the area to stop this map from being filed," Gottlieb said. "I am asking him to intervene on behalf of the people who have elected him to office. No one is in better position to work out an amiable settlement of this problem than the congressman of the district which in-

cludes O'Hare Airport. His failure to do so, in effect, says that he wants the map filed. His silence on this issue speaks louder than anything he has said or done."

In a strongly worded statement, Gottlieb asked Annunzio to reveal his position on the filing of the O'Hare noise map. Gottlieb also petitioned the congressman to act on behalf of the homeowners of the 11th District.

"Our Congressman should be assuming a leadership role in this matter. Instead, the so-called 'voice in Congress' is not acting or answering," Gottlieb added. "The property values of homeowners in the 11th District are being threatened. But we are receiving no help from the congressman."

"There are several things he

could do to help," Gottlieb continued. "He could pressure his friends in Chicago's City Hall to refrain from filing the map until a workable plan for noise abatement is completed. He could petition the Federal Aviation Administration to not include the map in their plan 150 study until flight patterns and time schedules are revised. I don't know if it is lack of concern or lack of energy on the part of the congressman. But his inactivity on this matter is incredible."

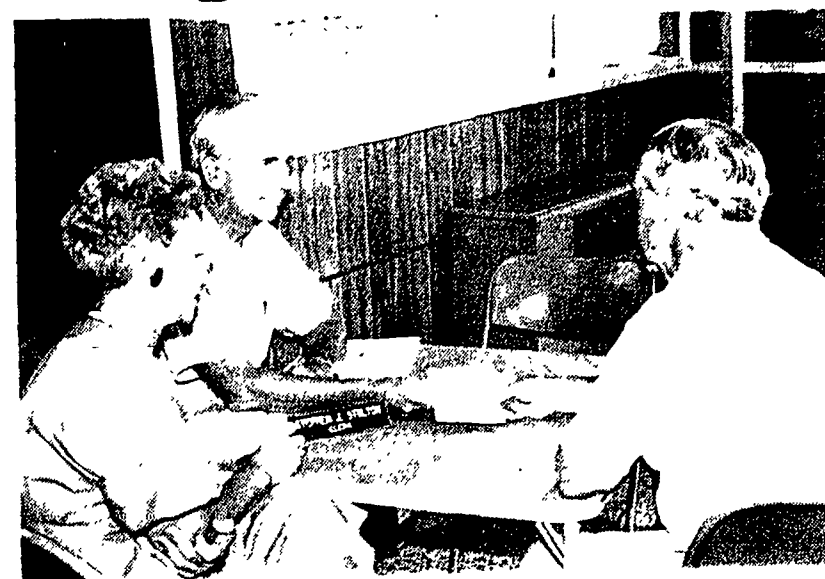

Veterans' legislation signed at the Governor's mansion includes:

**Assistance for Children of Veterans (HB 4689):** Expands the eligibility for educational assistance to include children of deceased and disabled active duty veterans, instead of limiting it to the children of wartime deceased and disabled. Eligible children can receive \$250 a year for educational expenses.

**New Veterans' Home (SBs 2007 & 1456):** Gives the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs the legal authority to establish and operate two new veterans' homes: one in Anna, to serve southern Illinois, and one in LaSalle, to serve northwestern Illinois. There are currently veterans' homes in Quincy and Manteno.

four schools average enrollment being 3,500 in each school.

In 1970 when the school opened, student enrollments were peaking all over the country. By the end of the seventies the decreasing enrollments in the grammar schools presaged what was to come in the 80's in the high schools.

As the 90's approach, indications are school enrollment will again be heading up. The year 1988 is seeing the largest birth rate since the middle sixties. Today's newborns will be entering kindergarten by 1993. It means there will be a need for more classrooms.

In Niles the village has refused to OK commercial use of school buildings which have been shuttered. Only private schools and religious institutions have been approved to use the school facilities. It has been a farsighted rule which will insure the shuttered public schools will be available for the new students when the enrollment goes up.

School District 63 has also been wise in retaining its shuttered schools. It's quite likely Oak and Melzer schools will be re-opened for public school use when the new baby boomers march into kindergarten.

The history of the last thirty years has shown the difficulty in keeping pace with the up and down numbers of students entering our schools. It has been difficult selling residents on the need for new schools years before they're needed. And it has been difficult

holding back empire builders who want to build more and more schools.

In retrospect this past thirty years has shown being more conservative about building would have been more prudent. Pushing classes up to 35 or 40 students per classroom would not have been a disaster (our Chicago grammar school days had 48 students in a classroom). And taxpayers would have saved \$5 million at Maine North. Many more millions would have been saved by not accepting the propaganda of administrators and educators who were always talking about those buzzwords, "quality education". The phrase meant more and more money for bricks. And it overshadowed the greater need for better education by better qualified teachers.

We know now buying more and more bricks could not replace what was going on inside the schools. It was easier to build buildings than to improve the inner quality of the education system.

As the 1990's approach we wonder whether we will have learned from the past thirty years. Will there be another building boom? And will mortar and bricks replace the need to concentrate on improving the education process?

It's much easier to build buildings. And if building becomes the number one priority, it once again can become very costly—both to the taxpayers parents... and to their student-children.

the use of maps, definitions of the differences between flood plains and flood fringes, and exhaustive explanations of other issues, Ganett came to these conclusions:

"The Oakton campus is on the flood fringe and not subject to flood plain legislation. Oakton's campus and future projects present such a minuscule change in the environment that it is hardly measurable. Oakton has never violated the law or refused to cooperate with necessary governmental agencies."

Des Plaines citizens' pleas did not fall on deaf ears. When first approached, the Oakton Board and Administration promised to be "good neighbors" by investigating the complaints.

Although the college has not been found to be in error, last week Oakton's Board of Trustees extended the hand of good will even further. Rather than leave the situation unresolved, Oakton's Board asked the Administration to expand and improve the retention pond which already has the capacity to absorb over 25 percent more water than the legal minimum.

According to Oakton's President, Dr. Thomas TenHoeve, "The north area (to be used as an athletic field) is also under consideration and may be regraded

although the area does not diminish absorption capacity at the present time."

TenHoeve also pointed to the fact that during the last flood Oakton's parking lots were totally flooded, which prevented more water from going downstream.

TenHoeve concluded by saying, "Plans will not be finalized and made public until the September Board meeting. We have always shown great concern as a college in terms of creating extra capacity for water absorption. We intend to cooperate with our neighbors now and in the future."

## State grant program for libraries

Secretary of State and State Librarian Jim Edgar today announced a grant program for improving public libraries and expanding library services.

The program, developed with the advice of the Illinois State Library Advisory Committee (ISLAC), will be offered in light of the successful pilot programs that have resulted from other mini-grant projects.

The goal of the program, which uses federal funds, is to give all sizes of public libraries the opportunity to begin or improve public library service to the physically disabled, to youths and to the elderly. Projects involving intergenerational programming are encouraged, as are activities

involving the cooperation of two or more public libraries.

Projects will be funded for eight months, beginning in November 1988, and the maximum grant award will be \$10,000.

to shop there," he said. "I'm not Krilich and never will be."

Blase stated the village has always been sensitive to the needs of the community and would try to accommodate all problems linked to the development. "You have been looking at a blighted area for a long time, with Krilich doing nothing about it. The improvements will keep your property values up," Blase said.

According to Salerno, Biehl will provide a 5-foot chainlink fence on the shopping center side adjacent to the Niles Park District property on Nottingham, with two 24-foot gates for equipment to get in and out of the shopping center and for pedestrian access at that location. More parking would be available at the east of

the tennis courts, he said.

Several persons in the audience said they were concerned about past flooding problems in the shopping center and snow removal that could prevent cars from parking there.

Blase noted the property is zoned for enough parking spaces (1,488) and snow removal would be handled like other area shopping centers. "There are no pat answers when certain situations arise in large developments. We can't avoid problems and the best we can do is deal with them as they come up," he said.

Biehl assured the group that plans are to construct enough water retention areas to hold heavy water runoff.

According to Biehl, demolition

of the shopping center would begin in 40 days. Included in plans for the center are an Omni super store, a 60-store mall, restaurants, a village administration building and community theater.

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
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
